"We ended up with four Bs and two Cs, which is what we had last year - we had a swap: We had two schools that improved and we had two schools that went from Bs to Cs," said Superintendent Joseph Taylor.

slipped from B to C, Vernon Middle School and ChIPLEY High School improved from C to B.

According to Taylor, though there were preliminary signs that Vernon High School could face challenges, the elementary



was sort of a shock.

He said Principal Steve Griffin "was digging very deep as to 'where did this come from' - because most elementary schools won't do that."

For Vernon Middle School,

Taylor was "extremely proud of them."

"And I certainly have to take my hat off to ChIPLEY High School, who has been sitting there (at a C grade) - and they got it," he said, regarding the school's improvement.

Taylor also said schools staff feedback has been promising. Even with a district that performed above average, staff are looking at ways to push through to greater improvements.

"As a district, I think we're in a very good position," he added.

Putnam: FWC prescribed burn caused Eastpoint fire

EASTPOINT - A prescribed burn conducted by Wildland Fire Services Inc. on behalf of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission caused Sunday's wildfire in Eastpoint, which burned more than 800 acres and destroyed 36 homes, according to Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam.

Putnam's office made the announcement after an investigation led by Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement.

"My heart goes out to those affected by this devastating wildfire, and I thank all of our partners in the response effort to stop the spread of the fire," said Putnam.

The Florida Forest Service led response efforts to contain and extinguish the wildfire with assistance from: the Franklin County Sheriff's Office, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, the Department of Environmental Protection, the Eastpoint Volunteer Fire Department, and other local fire departments.

During the course of the investigation, other possible causes, such as lightning, arson and fire accidentally caused by man, were eliminated.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission also released the following statement:

Vernon reverses decision to discontinue sludge acceptance

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VERNON - Vernon City Council members have walked back their "forever" decision to discontinue accepting septage sludge.

Despite council member Gwen March's blanketed motion early this year that City of Vernon no longer "accept anymore sludge, forever," the council voted at a special meeting Thursday to rescind the Feb. 1 action to no longer accept outside sludge at its waste water treatment plant.

City Clerk Tracy Walker pointed to a new state mandate has been implemented "which is causing a hardship on our local septic system businesses." The City of Vernon has the Florida Department of Environmental Protection permit to "help alleviate some of this burden," she said.

Earlier this year the plant had a breakdown from being overwhelmed by the by-product produced during sewage treatment of waste water. The City received a notice from FDEP to fix the equipment and properly handle the clean up.

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Florida gets another chance to make case in 'water war'

TALLAHASSEE - In a victory for Florida, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that the nation's third-largest state should be given another chance to prove its case that overconsumption of water in Georgia is damaging the Apalachicola River system.

The 5-4 decision, written by Justice Stephen Breyer, overturned a 2017 recommendation by a court-appointed special master that found Florida had not proven its case "by clear and convincing evidence" that imposing a cap on Georgia's water use would benefit Florida water systems, including oyster-rich Apalachicola Bay in Franklin County.

Breyer said the special master had "applied too strict a standard" in rejecting Florida's claim.

"To require 'clear and

convincing evidence' about the workability of a (water) decree before the court or a special master has a view about likely harms and likely amelioration is, at least in this case, to put the cart before the horse," Breyer wrote.

The immediate impact of the decision is to send the case back to Ralph Lancaster, a Maine lawyer who was appointed as a special master by the Supreme Court to oversee the dispute. Florida filed the lawsuit in 2013, although the case is only the latest iteration of a decades-old battle about the Apalachicola-Chat-tahoochee-Flint river system, which starts in Georgia and flows south to Florida.

Among the key questions Lancaster will have to settle is whether an "equity-based cap" on Georgia's water consumption in the Apalachicola-Chatta-hoochee-Flint system

would increase the water flow into the Apalachicola River and whether the amount of that extra water would "significantly redress the economic and ecological harm that Florida has suffered," the

opinion said.

The special master could also seek further findings on his preliminary rulings that Florida had suffered harm from the overconsumption of water by Georgia. And the

future deliberations will have to weigh Georgia's claims that any limits on its water use would undermine its economy, including the growth of the Atlanta area and the state's agriculture

industry in southwestern Georgia.

"We repeat, however, that Florida will be entitled to a decree only if it is shown that 'the benefits of the (apportionment) substantially outweigh the harm that might result,'" the court said.

Breyer's opinion was supported by Chief Justice John Roberts and Justices Anthony Kennedy, Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Sonia Sotomayor.

In a dissent, Justice Clarence Thomas, a Georgia native who was joined by justices Samuel Alito, Elena Kagan and Neil Gorsuch, argued the court had enough evidence "to decide this case now."

"Giving Florida another bite at the apple will likely yield no additional evidence, but it will be unfair to Georgia, which has already spent the time and resources to defeat the case that Florida chose to

investigate the unknown cause of the Limerock Wildfire that destroyed a significant amount of property in Franklin County late on Sunday, FWC initiated an Inspector General investigation and has suspended its prescribed fire program statewide.

On Monday, June 18, seven days prior to the Limerock Wildfire, a private company which was contracted by FWC conducted a 480-acre prescribed fire in the Apalachicola River Wildlife and Environmental Area. This prescribed fire was separated from the Eastpoint neighborhood by 580 acres

of private land. ... (T)he FWC Inspector General is also investigating that all protocols and operations at FWC's prescribed fire program were followed and that the agency's program provides the safest operation.

Eric Sutton, executive director of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission said, "At FWC, safety is always our top priority. Due to the proximity of last week's prescribed fire to the Limerock Wildfire that caused severe damage, we have launched an investigation and will completely review all policies and procedures with prescribed fires. If the multiple ongoing investigations find that any safety protocols were not followed, we will take the proper steps to ensure

accountability. Our focus remains with the families who were affected by the wildfire and our agency is committed to working to help this community get back on its feet."

FWC is one of several government agencies responsible for burning and burns more than 100,000 acres a year on public lands.

The prescribed fire protocols and training requirements are thorough and rigorous. In Florida, prescribed fires are carried out by multiple state agencies, and each prescribed fire plan is approved by state fire safety experts with several checks and balances in place to ensure public safety.

Prescribed fires carried out by FWC are done by both FWC staff and contracted certified experts.

since pressured the City to continue acceptance, despite the likelihood of more complications and penalties. The City Clerk said the City is now prepared to monitor the plant.

"The City will have a staff member from our Public Works department

on site, monitoring the belt press while it is in operation. If the staff has any concerns with the operation of the plant, immediate action will be taken to discontinue acceptance until the following Council meeting," Walker wrote.

"A proper screen must be installed to capture the larger items that would hinder the efficiency of the WWTP. Only Washington County businesses Odom Septic

Service and Kolmetz Portables will be allowed to use the facility."

The only other facility with the capability to accept outside sludge is located in Port St. Joe, Walker noted.

"The City of Vernon is looking to increase this service by expanding our septage equipment in the near future," she wrote.

The reversal went into effect immediately following the vote.

Daughtry, 33, was arrested in her home on felony drug and child neglect charges after deputies

executed a state violation of probation warrant, according to the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

WCSO responded to a residence on Pipkin Road around 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, after receiving a tip

that an occupant of the home had an outstanding state probation warrant, the WCSO news release stated. Under a search warrant, deputies recovered multiple paraphernalia items, dozens of used and unused syringes,

methamphetamine, and marijuana.

Daughtry was arrested and booked into the Washington County Jail on the violation of probation warrant as well as the additional charges of possession of

methamphetamine, possession of marijuana, possession of paraphernalia, and child neglect.

Daughtry had been placed on probation in January on previous drug related felony charges stemming from 2017.

How to help the Eastpoint fire victims

The region continues to rally to support those who lost their homes in Sunday's fire in Eastpoint. Here are some ways you can help:

SPONSOR A FAMILY: The Franklin County Sheriff's Office (FCSO) is seeking businesses, faith-based groups and individuals to adopt one of the 36 families who lost their homes through the "Love 36" campaign. Bethel Missionary Baptist Church, WOCY-FM radio, and Tallahassee Memorial Health Care already have agreed to adopt a family and support them in rebuilding their homes.

The groups are asked to walk alongside the families for 36 months to provide them with life's basic necessities.

According to FCSO, this crisis does not rise to a level where the governor can declare a state of emergency, and FEMA will therefore not be providing assistance. FCSO instead has declared a "State of Compassion" and calling in its own FEMA: "Faith-Energy-Mercy-Action," the agency announced in a news release. Families will be matched with partners as they become available.

DONATIONS: The Panama City Rescue Mission is collecting donations

through Saturday at the Lynn Haven Bargain Center, 2701 S. State 77 in Lynn Haven. Toiletries, pet food, litter, pet bowls, tables, chairs, face masks, outdoor cleaning supplies such as rakes and wheelbarrows, leather work gloves and diapers are all needed. Supplies like rakes and face masks are needed to sift through the soot and clean the damaged acreage.

The bargain center is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Donations will be delivered to Eastpoint on Monday morning. **DISASTER FUND:** The Franklin County Emergency Management office has started a disaster fund, which can be found at franklinpromisecoalition.wildapricot.org/

Fire-Aid-Disaster-Fund. The office says cash donations are desperately needed, as clothing donations are covered.

GOFUNDME: The Franklin County Sheriff's Office has started a GoFundMe to help the victims, which can be found at www.gofundme.com/eastpoint-fire-victim-relief-fund?member=353902.

HORSE HOUSING: Heartland Rescue Ranch, 1435 Skunk Valley Road, Panama City, FL 32409, has offered to temporarily house horses for families affected by the fires.

3 dead in head-on crash

CALHOUN COUNTY - Three people are dead after a fatal car accident Sunday afternoon.

A Florida Highway Patrol identified Robert Downing, 68, of Donaldsonville, Ga. and had not identified two female victims involved in the fatal Calhoun County crash.

According to the FHP news release, around 1:45 p.m. at State Road 71 and SE Coley O'Bryan Road,

the two unidentified women were traveling southbound on the state road and had attempted to pass several vehicles when it collided with Downing, who was traveling northbound on the same road.

The 1995 BMW sedan driven by the two women collided head-on with Downing's 1995 GMC SUV, the release stated.

Both vehicles caught on fire and came to a final resting position on the east shoulder of SR 73.

State to offer up to \$5k per household for those impacted by Franklin County fire

TALLAHASSEE - As a result of the recently released cause of the Franklin County fire, Florida Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and State Fire Marshal Jimmy Patronis has directed his Division of Risk Management to send adjusters to the area to assist residents with filing a partial settlement claim for up to \$5,000 per household for emergency living expenses such as temporary housing, clothing, food or pet care.

CFO and State Fire Marshal Jimmy Patronis said, "Residents who lost everything shouldn't have to wait for government bureaucracy. I've directed my staff to get boots on the ground to help those impacted to have an expedited track back to normalcy."

"Insurance experts from my office were also in the area this week to assist residents with any

claims, and my Division of Investigative and Forensic Services helped officials with structural damage assessments and securing the impacted areas.

We will continue working to find ways to help Franklin County recover from this tragedy. Thank you to Sheriff Smith for his leadership and coordination throughout this difficult time."

CFO Patronis' Division of Risk Management sent a team of adjusters to Franklin County Thursday, June 28, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., and Friday, June 29, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

They will be stationed at the Franklin County Sheriff's Office located at 270 FL-65, Eastpoint. Residents should bring proof of residency such as a driver license, utility bill or other bills.

Those who could not attend on June 28 or June 29 are asked to call the Division of Risk Management at 850.413.3122 for assistance.

Applause for those who kept looking

For more than a half-century, the family of U.S. Air Force Col. Peter Stewart could speculate only what happened to him over in Vietnam.

A native of Scotland who lived in Winter Haven, Stewart was a fighter pilot who flew dozens of combat missions during World War II, Korea and Vietnam. According to the Defense Department, Stewart's last mission occurred on a fateful spring day 52 years ago when his F-4 Phantom erupted in a ball of fire while engaging enemy trucks. The military could not conduct any search or recovery operations in the immediate wake of the incident because conditions on the ground were too risky. Thus, the Pentagon initially declared Stewart missing in action, and a few years later updated that to killed in action.

It appeared he was lost forever to his widow, Marnie, and the couple's six children. "It's a terrible feeling, and I wouldn't wish that on anybody," Marnie Stewart, who met her husband in 1944 when he was stationed at the Bartow Air Base, told the Alabama NewsCenter last month. "We always hoped that we would hear something."

The family finally received that long-awaited word this past spring, when the Air Force notified the Stewarts that Col. Stewart would be coming home after all.

The Defense Department says that in 2014 a joint U.S.-Vietnamese search team found an F-4 crash site in the Dien Bien Province. Further investigation and subsequent testing revealed last June that some remains belonged to Col. Martin Scott of Oklahoma. But the team kept digging and uncovered more. Based on dental records and a St. Christopher medal recovered at the scene, the military eventually identified them as Col. Stewart. His remains were returned to Winter Haven earlier this month, and Stewart was given a funeral with full military honors last week.

Despite the decades-long wait to put their loved one to rest and their minds at ease, Marnie Stewart, now 94, and her children are among the lucky ones.

When the Paris Peace Accords, which ended America's involvement in Vietnam, were inked in 1973, the Pentagon determined 2,646 American troops were unaccounted for in Southeast Asia. That meant they had either been killed and no remains found or were considered missing in action.

Stewart is among 1,049 Americans located and recovered from Vietnam, but that leaves 1,597 Americans still unaccounted for from Vietnam. We appreciate and applaud the diligence of American officials and the cooperation of governments in Vietnam and elsewhere, some that were once our enemies on the battlefield, in helping U.S. families like the Stewarts find closure. Their work truly gives meaning to the phrase coined by legendary American Lt. Gen. Hal Moore: "Leave no one behind. Dead or alive, we will all come home together."

The Photo with Borderline Truth

The little girl at the border with tears in her eyes.

We saw her on front pages, on TV newscasts and on the cover of Time magazine.

It's a powerful image - perhaps more responsible than anything else for forcing a change in the administration's policy on separating kids from parents in immigration cases.

Yet, as we learned a few days later, this particular child was never separated from her mother. At the moment the photo was taken, the mother was being frisked by border agents, a fairly routine process that took roughly two minutes.

Does it matter? That's a question prompting robust debate among journalists as well as fierce pushback from the White House.

The photographer, veteran John Moore of Getty Images, never suggested that the young Honduran girl was being separated from her

parent. Moore called the photo "a straightforward and honest image" showing a "distressed little girl" whose mother was being searched.

However, the flood of emotion and outrage that swept across the nation was clearly not about searches. It was about separation. And Moore's photo quickly became an icon in protests about the later.

The picture was used by a California couple who set up a fundraiser on Facebook. Over a half-million people have contributed, and the fund has exceeded \$20 million.

The New York Daily News ran the photo as its entire front page. A tiny caption stated that the girl's mother was being searched, but the clear implication was that this was a case of separation. Indeed, the paper's accompanying headline spoke of "children ripped from parents at border."

News photos play an important role in selling a story - and a point of view - because photos never lie. Or do they?

Consider the quickly-viral photo of President Trump and German Chancellor Angela Merkel, seemingly locked in a stare-down at the Group of Seven gathering. Mr. Trump tweeted that it was a neutral

moment, but many editors used the image to accompany reports of a contentious meeting.

Perhaps editors felt the photo truly reflected both a moment in time as well as the bigger picture. But what about the girl at the border? Is it journalistically responsible to use an image to represent something that it clearly is not?

The administration and conservative commentators have pounced on John Moore's photo to criticize media and promote the notion that if this photo was misleading then perhaps the entire immigration coverage is too.

That's not the case. But editors and advocates did themselves no favor by allowing the image to illustrate a broad position rather than a specific fact.

Moore told the Washington Post: "I believe this image has raised awareness to the zero-tolerance policy of this administration." He added that "this photograph for me is part of a much larger story."

Perhaps. But ends-justify-the-means coverage is not good journalism.

The notion that a picture is worth a thousand words is of no use if those words must be devoted to clarifying what the picture is really about.

Permanent Family Separation, an American Tragedy

Back on Father's Day, I got a call from another Dad, my friend Billy Inman. Billy's call must have been tough for him. On Father's Day 2000, intoxicated Mexican national and illegal alien Gonzalo Harrell-Gonzalez, driving above the speed limit, killed Kathy and Billy Inman's 16-year-old son, Dustin.

The family had stopped at a red light on their way to a fishing trip when Harrell-Gonzalez rear-ended them. Despite being in the U.S. illegally, Harrell-Gonzalez received a North Carolina-issued driver's license. Kathy sustained injuries that would keep her in a wheelchair for life; Harrell-Gonzalez fled to Mexico where he remains today.

Family separation's root cause isn't overly harsh immigration laws, but foreign national parents who knowingly violate U.S. federal law. Consider the manner in which the children, often accompanied but sometimes traveling alone, arrive at the border: crossing miles of desert on foot, traveling atop trains, being handed off to human traffickers or swimming across the Rio Grande River under duress. The U.S. would classify those actions as crimes of felony child abuse, which carry a possible lifetime

prison sentence, and most certainly would lead to custody loss.

In a nationally televised interview, National Border Patrol Council Vice-President Art Del Cuerto explained what he and his agents see each day. Compare Del Cuerto's from-the-front reality reporting to the purposely distorted perspectives from some at Capitol Hill and newsrooms. Del Cuerto said that daily his agents see migrants "literally drop the child and run" to escape capture. In egregious cases, Del Cuerto said that children are stuffed into vehicle trunks, then handed off to coyotes. As for the so-called cages the minors are allegedly detained in which has created a media circus this week, Del Cuerto described them as, in reality, "similar to boarding schools." For example, Casa San Diego offers the children play areas, language classes and hot meals before they're eventually released to sponsors.

One solution is already available to migrants. According to Attorney General Jeff Sessions, migrants who enter through a national port of entry with their children can request asylum. Parents would not be prosecuted and the family unit would remain intact while the petition is adjudicated. Another potential fix could keep asylum-seeking migrant families together: Designate the U.S. Embassy in Mexico City as the starting point for all petitions - no congressional action required, and neither minor nor adult would be confined while officials decide the case.

The U.S. welcomes valid asylum

claims. "Valid" is key. According to the Transactional Records Access Clearinghouse, nearly 80 percent of more than 15,000 of the asylum claims made between 2012 and 2017 from El Salvador were denied. Pursuit of a better life or other economically motivated reasons are not valid asylum claims. A 2017 Pew Research report found that El Salvadoran, Guatemalan and Honduran migrants cite economic opportunity as among their main reasons for traveling north.

In midst of the frenzy about illegal immigrants separated from their children, the nation would do well to remember that the Inman family, the Kate Steinle family and thousands of other victim families endure the forever-lasting pain of separation that is the result of illegal immigrants' criminal actions.

I asked Billy what Kathy and he feel when they watch the wall-to-wall mainstream media's frenzied coverage. Billy said that he hurts for every child kept from his parents, however briefly. But for Kathy and Billy, Dustin was permanently taken from them 18 years ago, and counting. In most cases, the Central American minors face separation of a few days.

On a personal note, I lived in Guatemala, and traveled extensively throughout Central America. My takeaway from my time spent with Central Americans is that, overwhelmingly, they want to stay with their people, their language, and their culture. Removing asylum loopholes would go a long way toward establishing common sense on the border.

A Powerful Symbol



Mini Fact:

Eagles are **diurnal** (die-URN-ul). They hunt during the day and sleep during the night.

Our country has a special bird as its national symbol. The bald eagle is so powerful and so strong, and soars so high in the sky, that it is a symbol of freedom to many.

Types of eagles can be found on every continent except Antarctica. The bald eagle is one of two species found in North America. (The other is the golden eagle.) The bald eagle is found only in North America.

An icon

The bald eagle was selected to be placed on the design of the Great Seal approved by Congress in 1782. The Great Seal is the official **stamp**, or mark, of the United States.



You can find the great seal and eagles on several of our coins and bills, including the quarter.



Raptors

Bald eagles are raptors. **Raptors** are birds of prey. This means that they prey upon, or hunt and eat, other animals.

Raptors also:

- Grab their prey with their powerful feet and carry it away.
- Have very good eyesight.
- Have hooked beaks.

Other raptors include owls, ospreys, hawks, vultures and falcons.

These birds are important to the balance of nature. They control the population of rodents and other prey species. Since raptors eat dead animals, they help clean up the environment.

Meet an eagle

An eagle's **eyesight** is possibly as much as eight times sharper than a human's with perfect vision. From about 1,000 feet high, an eagle might see prey over a three-mile area.



Bald eagles have as many as 7,000 **feathers**. They **molt**, or gradually lose and grow new feathers, once a year. When they lose one feather on one wing, they lose a matching one on the other. In this way, they don't lose their balance.

Their feathers are used for:

- Insulation in all kinds of weather.
- Protecting the skin.
- Camouflage to make the eagle harder to see.

Eagles use their **talons** for grabbing, squeezing and piercing their prey, then holding onto their catch while eating.



A bald eagle feeds on a lake trout.

Bald eagles can lift only half their weight into the air. They don't weigh much, so they can't lift much.

Eagle homes

Bald eagles live near lakes, rivers, marshes and sea coasts. Alaska is the state with the most eagles. Other states with many eagles include Florida, Wisconsin, Washington, Minnesota, Oregon and Michigan.

Some bald eagles migrate. Others who have a good food source year-round do not.

Nesting

Most eagle pairs mate for life. If one is killed, the other might take a new mate.

Pairs return to the same nest every year, so they build their nest bigger and bigger. Nest-building is a part of courtship. They build their nests in trees or on the ground if there are no trees.

Parents take turns sitting on the nest 24 hours a day for about 35 days while incubating one to three eggs. Babies are called **eaglets**.

Threats to eagles

Eagles were once on the endangered species list, but conservation efforts helped them recover. They are threatened by:

- Being hit by cars, trains and planes.
- Running into power lines.
- Poisoning and pesticides.
- Being shot.
- Drowning.
- Eating a dead animal that was shot with lead bullets.

Cook's Corner

Pear & Cherry Cobbler

You'll need:

- 3 (14-ounce) cans pear halves in 100 percent juice, drained and diced
- 1 cup sweetened dried cherries
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 (12-ounce) can refrigerated buttermilk biscuits (10 biscuits)

- cooking spray (preferably butter-flavored)
- 1 tablespoon sugar

Gunman kills 5 in attack at Maryland newspaper building

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — A gunman opened fire at a newspaper office in Maryland's capital on Thursday, killing five people and gravely wounding several others before being taken into custody in what appeared to be one of the deadliest attacks on journalists in U.S. history, police and witnesses said.

Police gave no immediate details on the gunman or his motive in the rampage at The Capital Gazette and said he was being interrogated. Authorities said they also found what they believed to be an explosive device.

Phil Davis, a reporter who covers courts and crime for the paper, tweeted that the gunman shot out the glass door to the office and fired into the newsroom, sending people scrambling for cover under desks.

"A single shooter shot multiple people at my office, some of whom are dead," he wrote.

Davis added: "There is nothing more terrifying than hearing multiple people get shot while you're under your desk and then hear the gunman reload."

The attacker had mutilated his fingers in an apparent attempt to make it harder to identify him, according to a law enforcement official who was not authorized to discuss the investigation and spoke on condition of anonymity. Another official who also spoke on condition of anonymity said investigators identified the man using facial recognition

technology.

The shooting — which came amid months of verbal and online attacks on the "fake news media" from politicians and others from President Donald Trump on down — prompted New York City police to immediately tighten security at news organizations in the nation's media capital.

At the White House, spokeswoman Lindsay Walters said: "There is no room for violence, and we stick by that. Violence is never tolerated in any form, no matter whom it is against."

The gunman, whose name was not immediately released, was believed to have used a shotgun, according to a U.S. official who was briefed on the investigation but not

authorized to discuss it publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity. The gunman was not carrying any identification, authorities said.

"The shooter has not been very forthcoming, so we don't have any information yet on motive," Anne Arundel County Executive Steve Schuh said. "To my knowledge, there was no verbal aspect to the incident where he declared his motives or anything else, so at this point we just don't know."

Anne Arundel County Acting Police Chief William Krampf confirmed five deaths and said several others were gravely hurt. At least two hospitals said they received three patients, two of them with minor injuries not caused by gunshots.

Police spokesman Lt. Ryan Frashure said officers raced to the scene, arriving in 60 seconds, and took the gunman into custody without an exchange of gunfire.

About 170 people in all were evacuated from the building as a multitude of police cars and other emergency vehicles converged on the scene. People could be seen leaving the building with their hands up.

The newspaper is part of Capital Gazette Communications, which also publishes the Maryland Gazette and Capital-Gazette.com.

In an interview with The Capital Gazette's online site, Davis said it "was like a war zone" inside the newspaper's offices — a situation that

would be "hard to describe for a while."

"I'm a police reporter. I write about this stuff — not necessarily to this extent, but shootings and death — all the time," he said. "But as much as I'm going to try to articulate how traumatizing it is to be hiding under your desk, you don't know until you're there and you feel helpless."


Davis told the paper he and others were still hiding under their desks when the gunman stopped firing.

"I don't know why. I don't know why he stopped," he said.

New York police sent counterterrorism teams to news organizations around the city in a move authorities said was a precaution, not prompted by any specific threat. Police could be seen outside The New York Times, ABC News and Fox News early in the evening.



SEATTLE Former ICE chief lawyer in Seattle gets 4 years for ID theft

A former chief counsel for U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement in Seattle has been sentenced to four years in prison for stealing the identities of people facing deportation and using them to run up bills totaling \$190,000.

Raphael Sanchez, who was sentenced Thursday, resigned when he was charged in the four-year scheme in February. He had overseen immigration proceedings in Alaska, Idaho, Oregon and Washington as the agency's top lawyer in the region.

Under a plea agreement in which Sanchez pleaded guilty to wire fraud and aggravated identity theft, the Justice Department and Sanchez's attorney, Cassandra Stamm,

agreed to recommend the four-year prison term. Prosecutors said he abused the public's trust.

PONCA CITY, OKLA. Woman accused in murder plot sentenced for making ricin

An Oklahoma woman accused of plotting to kill her ex-husband in Israel has apologized for manufacturing the poison ricin as a judge sentenced her to more than three years in prison.

The Oklahoma reports that Danielle Dana Layman was sentenced Tuesday. The Ponca City woman pleaded guilty to unregistered possession of ricin in February.

The 38-year-old Layman was arrested last year after another woman told the FBI of the murder-for-hire plot. The informant says she met

Layman after responding to a Craigslist ad for an overseas acting job. The woman said the job involved poisoning a taxi driver in Israel, later identified as Layman's ex-husband.

KINSHASA, CONGO Congo says countdown toward end of Ebola outbreak begins

Congo's health ministry says the countdown toward the end of its latest Ebola outbreak has begun, as all people who were in contact with the last confirmed case have passed the 21-day incubation period with no sign of the virus.

The ministry announced the milestone Thursday. The outbreak's end can be declared, or 42 days, pass without any new confirmed cases.

QUAKERTOWN, PA. Owner of chemical sales firm arrested in explosions probe

The owner of a home-based chemical sales company has been arrested in connection with a series of mysterious explosions the past three months in suburban Philadelphia, authorities said Thursday.

Bucks County District Attorney Matt Weintraub said 30-year-old David Surman Jr. had been arrested on charges of weapons of mass destruction, reckless endangerment, possession of methamphetamines and other counts after search warrants were executed at his home and his business. Weintraub shared a picture during a news conference of an 18-inch bomb with four fuses that he said was ready to be detonated.

PHOENIX Melania Trump returns to border state amid outcry

First lady Melania Trump made a second visit to a border state Thursday, meeting face to face with people directly affected by her husband's hard-line immigration policies. This time, she chose less controversial apparel than her last trip, which was overshadowed by a jacket.

"I'm here to support you and give my help, whatever I can" on "behalf of children and the families," Mrs. Trump said as she sat down with officials at a U.S. Border Patrol facility in Tucson, Arizona, the first stop of her trip. She later traveled to Phoenix, where she visited a complex that is housing dozens of migrant children separated from their parents.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. NFL fines ex-Panthers owner \$2.75M

The NFL has fined former Carolina Panthers owner Jerry Richardson \$2.75 million following its investigation into sexual and racial misconduct in the workplace.

The league said Thursday the investigation conducted by former U.S. Attorney Mary Jo White substantiated allegations against Richardson, that the improper conduct was limited to Richardson and that the team failed to report the allegations or any resolution agreements to the league.

The league also says most of the money will go toward organizations that address racial- and gender-based issues in and outside the workplace.

LONDON Past Wimbledon runners-up qualify

Two past runners-up at Wimbledon, Eugenie Bouchard and Vera Zvonareva, earned their way into the main draw at the All England Club by making it through qualifying.

Bouchard, who lost to Petra Kvitova in the 2014 final, won her last match in the preliminary rounds 6-3, 6-2 against Mariana Duque-Marino on Thursday. The Canadian is ranked 191st.

In February, Bouchard settled a lawsuit against the U.S. Tennis Association related to a concussion she said she got when she fell in a locker room at the 2015 U.S. Open.

Zvonareva, beaten by Serena Williams in the 2010 Wimbledon final, got past 19-year-old American Caroline Dolehide 6-2, 6-3 in qualifying Thursday.

The 33-year-old Zvonareva, also the U.S. Open runner-up in 2010, has not played in a main draw at any Grand Slam tournament since the Australian Open in 2015. She last competed at Wimbledon the year before that.

Europe, South America dominate World Cup's knockout phase

MOSCOW — The thunder-clapping Icelanders have gone home, along with the Egyptians and Peruvians. Now comes the business end of the World Cup, a European- and South American-dominated club that rejects most new applicants as unwanted hoi polloi.

The group stage is the crossroads of cultures, a mixture of multitudes filled with happiness and hope.

Then comes the knockout stage, where soccer's powers pump their pecs and the blue bloods almost always prevail.

Ten European nations reached the round of 16, matching 1998 and 2006 for the most since 11 in 1990, the record since the current format began in 1986.

Four South American teams have advanced, plus Mexico and Japan. For the first time since 1982, no African team made it past the first round.

History is instructive: Europe earned 41

of 64 quarterfinal berths and South America took 16 since 1986. Among the other regions, Africa and CONCACAF got three apiece and Asia one.

Winnowing to the inner sanctum becomes even more pronounced after that: Europe filled 23 of 32 semifinal spots and South America eight, with South Korea in 2002 at home becoming the only outsider to reach the final four.

Among 20 previous World Cups, Europe has lifted the trophy 11 times and South America nine.

Germany's departure was the biggest group phase jolt. Projected by many as the first repeat winner since Brazil in 1958 and '62, Die Mannschaft became the fourth champion in five tournaments to exit early.

FIFA has favored the bottom of the bracket with far easier travel, with the Russia-Spain winner headed from Moscow to a quarterfinal in Sochi, then potentially a semifinal and the final in the capital. The Colombia-England winner in Moscow goes to a quarterfinal in Samara, then would be on track to finish at Moscow.

A look at the Round of 16:

SATURDAY

FRANCE VS. ARGENTINA

Lionel Messi & Co. were on the verge of elimination before Marco Rojo's 86th-minute goal against Nigeria. With an average age of 26, France is among the youngest teams, led by dynamic 19-year-old striker Kylian Mbappe. At 31, this likely is Messi's last chance for the World Cup title he needs to match Diego Maradona in the minds of many Argentinians. While Argentina struggled, France must awaken from a somnolent group-stage finale against Denmark.

URUGUAY VS. PORTUGAL

Cristiano Ronaldo, like Messi a five-time FIFA Player of the Year, has four goals in the tournament and leads the European champions against a Uruguay team known foremost for the bite marks Luis Suarez left in Italian defender Giorgio Chiellini four years ago. Uruguay is the least-populous of the round of 16 teams.

SUNDAY

SPAIN VS. RUSSIA

World Cup hosts outside the soccer powers usually perform better than expected. Russia should have huge support at Luzhniki Stadium, making it closer than the 10th vs. 70th matchup in the rankings. Andres Iniesta, who scored the goal that won Spain's first World Cup title in 2010, remains on a rebuilt roster that struggled defensively in the group stage.

CROATIA VS. DENMARK

Tottenham past vs. Spurs present, with Luka Modric leading Croatia and Christian Eriksen sparking Denmark. Croatia was among the most impressive group-stage teams, beating Nigeria, Argentina and Iceland by a combined 7-1.

MONDAY

BRAZIL VS. MEXICO

El Tri fans hope for the elusive "quinto partido" — to reach a World Cup quarterfinal for the first time since 1986, which was on home soil. This is their best chance in years, with an attack led by Javier Hernandez and Carlos Vela. Center back Hector Moreno is suspended for yellow-card accumulation. Brazilian players are trying to atone for the 7-1 humiliation against Germany in the semifinals at home four years ago.

BELGIUM VS. JAPAN

Belgium was among three teams to go 3-0 in group play, joining Croatia and Uruguay, and No. 61 Japan will be a heavy underdog against the third-ranked Red Devils. Star forward Romelu Lukaku started the World Cup with consecutive two-goal games but missed Belgium's group-stage finale with an ankle injury.

TUESDAY

SWEDEN VS. SWITZERLAND

In its first World Cup in the post-Zlatan Ibrahimovic era, Sweden is looking to get past the round of 16 for the first time since finishing third in 1994. Swedish midfielder Sebastian Larsson is suspended, as are Swiss defenders Stephan Lichtsteiner and Fabian Schaer. Switzerland is led by midfielders Xherdan Shaqiri and Granit Xhaka.

COLOMBIA VS. ENGLAND

Harry Kane, whose five goals lead the World Cup, heads a young England team that finished group play without a shutout for the first time. Los Cafeteros, led by James Rodriguez and Radamel Falcao, were the only team to reach the round of 16 after losing their opener.

George decides to become free agent

Paul George turned down one option and created a slew of new ones.

George has decided not to exercise his \$20.7 million option for next season with the Oklahoma City Thunder, a person with knowledge of the situation said Thursday. George will become an unrestricted free agent on Sunday.

The person spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity Thursday because neither George nor the team has publicly announced his decision. ESPN first reported George's decision about the option year.

It was not an unexpected move for George, who averaged 21.9 points, 5.7 rebounds and 2.0 steals for the Thunder this past season. By not opting in to the final year of his existing deal, George opens up an array of possibilities — such as going elsewhere, possibly the Los Angeles Lakers, or signing a new deal with Oklahoma City.

He is also expected to be pursued by the Houston Rockets, who finished this past season with the NBA's best regular-season record.

George may opt to sign a short-term deal, either with the Thunder or someplace else. He could also command as much as \$176 million in a five-year deal if he chooses to stay in Oklahoma City and pair up with Russell Westbrook for years to come.

He will be one of the headline attractions when the free-agent shopping period officially opens at 12:01 a.m. EDT on Sunday, along with LeBron James — assuming that James chooses not to exercise his \$35.6 million option for next season with the Cleveland Cavaliers.

The Thunder have long maintained that they want to keep George, whom they acquired a year ago in a trade with the Indiana Pacers.

"From the day that he arrived, we really made a specific and intentional effort to build a relationship with Paul and his representation built on three things: collaboration, transparency, and trust," Thunder GM Sam Presti said after the season. "Those tenets were followed throughout the year and continued to be. I felt strongly about the relationship. I feel great about the communication and the honesty, about the way we started the relationship."

REMOVING A TICK

The following tips for removing a tick come from the Centers for Disease Control:



- Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible.

- Pull upward with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk; this can cause the mouth-parts to break off and remain in the skin.

- After removing the tick, thoroughly clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.

- Dispose of a live tick in alcohol, or by placing it in a sealed bag/container, wrapping it tightly in tape or flushing it down the toilet.

Cold-cap therapy

Treatment may help chemotherapy patients keep hair

Jen Tassi felt like a bobblehead as her oncologist explained her breast cancer diagnosis, the various drugs that would make up her chemotherapy treatments and how and when they'd be delivered.

The barrage of information overwhelmed her, so she just nodded and kept saying "OK."

She felt like she had no control.

So when the Ohio woman discovered something that she just might be able to control, she went for it.

That something was her hair.

And so Tassi ventured into the world of cold capping, a technology that cools the head during chemotherapy treatments, allowing some patients to retain at least a portion of their hair.

"It was a huge thing to look at yourself in the mirror every day and not look like I was sick," she said. "You looked like a healthy person, so you kind of felt like a healthy person, or you didn't look like a cancer patient when you were out."

The therapy limits both the amount and strength of the drugs that reach hair follicles by constricting blood vessels and slowing metabolic activity. Patients either wear gel-containing caps, often rented from manufacturers, that are frozen before use or caps that are attached to cooling devices.

Tassi, a 38-year-old survivor, has become an advocate for the therapy and for the Susan G. Komen organization.


Julie McMahon, who directs mission and strategy for Komen in Columbus, Ohio, said retaining hair can help motivate people to maintain healthy habits during treatment.

"It's kind of hard for them to feel healthy in other ways, to eat healthy and exercise when they feel like they look ill," she said.

Tassi and some other local patients who have used the cap want providers to make patients more aware. OhioHealth responded to a suggestion from one of the cap users by forming a committee that is working with providers to get information to patients.

"You want to be able to compartmentalize what is happening to you. So the cancer and the treatment of it is one part of your life, but you don't want it to become your identity," said Pauline Russ, a breast cancer survivor. "You want to blend in as much as possible."

At Ohio State University's Stefanie Spielman Comprehensive Breast Center, patients can use a machine that circulates coolant through a cap. Since it arrived at the beginning of May, seven or eight patients have used it, said Dr. Maryam Lustberg, an associate professor of medicine and medical director of survivorship. Previously, patients

had been bringing in frozen caps.

"It's about privacy and going to the grocery store and not having to explain to everyone what's going on with you," Lustberg said. "We see such an incredible impact on the quality of life experience of these patients."

Insurance usually does not cover the cost of cold capping — around \$500 a month — though it will credit the cost of a wig. The effectiveness of the capping treatment can depend on what chemotherapy drug is being used.

Tassi borrowed the caps she used, four of them, from other survivors and took them to her treatment sessions at the Bing in a cooler of dry ice. Her husband, Pete, rotated them out every 20 minutes or so to ensure that her scalp stayed cold.

Because the caps need to go on an hour before therapy and stay on for three hours after, Tassi wore them for six to seven hours during each of her 16 chemo treatments from November 2016 until April 2017.

She could only wash her hair once a week, in cold water in the bathtub.

And even with the cold-cap therapy, she didn't keep all her hair.

It thinned out quite a bit.

But, she said, "I still looked like me." "I wanted to keep my life as normal as possible," she said. "And I didn't want cancer to take things away from me."

What's the difference between cold caps and scalp cooling systems?

Cold caps are similar to ice packs in that they are kept in a special freezer before they're worn. They also thaw out during an infusion session and need to be replaced every 30 minutes. The caps and the special freezer are usually rented by the patient.

With scalp cooling systems, the cap is attached to a small refrigeration machine that circulates coolant, so it doesn't need to be changed during the chemo treatment. The refrigeration machines are owned by the chemotherapy treatment center and patients pay a fee to use them.

TODAY'S WORKOUT

Overhead shoulder pulse tones back and shoulders

Have you hit a lull with your upper-body workout? Then try something different, for your body and your sanity!

Our move today is an overhead shoulder pulse with a resistance band. This move will be toning the shoulders and the upper back. You will need a light to medium resistance band for this exercise. The stronger the band, the more resistant it will be.

Begin this move by gripping the handles of the band and looping the center under one or both feet. Position the band on the back side of your

body, hold your chest tall, engage your core and lift your hands to shoulder level — just to each side of your body. Roll your shoulders back and down — and you are ready to go!

Gripping the band, proceed to lift to a halfway point, creating enough resistance to challenge your muscles. At this point, it's time to pulse.

Make sure to hover around the halfway mark, only lifting and lowering a few inches at a time during your pulse.

Shoot for at least 20 pulses at a time, or pulse for a determined time frame. Take a small break, then return to your shoulder pulses for three to five sets.



This exercise is great to add in to any upper-body workout routine, possibly as a finisher. Or it can be used as a warmup also.

Remember, we have plenty of warm weather ahead of us, so our arms will be bare for quite some time. Don't get bored with your fitness, add a band!
