Man given 3 life sentences plus 700 years for child sex case

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PANAMA CITY — A Chipley man convicted of molesting a sleeping infant and possessing more than 100 videos of child voyeurism, child pornography and bestiality has been sentenced to spend several lifetimes behind bars.

Scott Ernest Allen, 35, appeared in court Tuesday

Clark Jr. on Tuesday handed down the maximum sentence of three life sentences followed by almost 700 years in prison — all to be served consecutively, court records

to learn his fate in a sentence hearing. After a jury found Allen guilty of more than 100 sex crimes, Circuit Judge Brantley

show.

Allen also was deemed a sexual predator as part of his sentence. He displayed no emotional reaction Tuesday as he stood wearing the yellow jumpsuit of sex offenders and Clark read out the extensive prison term. Allen declined to address the court or any of his victims.

Prosecutor Jennifer Hawkins told the court the infant victim and the victim's

mother were in the courtroom. The victim's mother declined to speak during the sentencing.

At trial, prosecutors had several key pieces of evidence against Allen that arose from pictures he had taken of himself molesting the infant. Investigators tied a tattoo on the hand of the perpetrator in the picture to Allen's tattoo, and also matched a thumb print from the digital picture

to Allen's.

While admitting fingerprints into evidence is nothing new, lifting latent prints off digital media only recently has become possible through advances in modern cameras. Allen's case was only the second in the 14th Judicial Circuit where a conviction was cinched with a digital thumb print, officials said.

CRA eyes nonprofit grants

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CHIPLEY - The Chipley Redevelopment Agency will start accepting grant applications next year from nonprofit organizations.

"We are legally able to help nonprofits, but the CRA is in the process of developing a new policy procedure and guidelines for dealing with nonprofits," CRA Director Ted Everett said at Thursday's meeting, which hinged mainly on preliminary discussions on the policy that would govern the process.

"We want to be involved in the project, not the operation," said CRA Chairman Malcolm Nelson.

Some of the preliminary discussion included: the board would designate a finite amount of funds for nonprofits, require nonprofits to provide substantive documentation, such as, an IRS determination status letter, strategic plan, affiliation agreements and budgets, and establish what kind of improvements CRA funding would support.

Officials emphasized applications will not be available until the 2019 budget is approved, noting the state had recently added nonprofits to community redevelopment agency scope of funding.

"We have received permission to include them as part of the budget, but it can't be until the new budget comes in," Nelson said. "So we have to plan to put them in."

Budget talks begin in August and the new budget cycle starts in October. The grant will be available online on Jan. 1 next year.

City approves new charter for referendum

Voters will cast vote via mail-in ballot

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VERNON - Vernon voters will make their stamp-of-approval for the city's new charter before March city elections.

At Monday's meeting, Vernon City Council unanimously approved the amended charter for referendum. Voters will cast their vote via mail-in ballot. A date has not been set for when the ballots will be mailed to voters.

City Clerk Tracy Walker said the proposed new charter brings the city up-to-date in various ways and saves money.

"We're saving \$3,600 for one council seat," Walker said. "Plus, we'll be able to save money every other year for the elections. So, I think it will be good for the city."

The proposed new charter will eliminate the elected mayor position; and calls for the five-seat council to appoint a mayor from within the council. The move also eliminates the \$300 monthly salary for the seat and gives the appointed mayor voting power.

In addition to updating language, the charter will schedule elections every other year on even years.

"In 2019, all five seats will be open," Walker said. "The two members with the lowest vote will go up for elections in 2020; and the other three will go up for elections in 2022."

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Sides square off on greyhound racing ban

TALLAHASSEE — A Leon County circuit judge is scheduled to hear arguments next week in a battle about a proposed constitutional amendment that would ban greyhound racing at Florida dog tracks.

The Florida Greyhound Association, which

represents breeders and owners of racing dogs, filed a lawsuit in May seeking to keep the proposed constitutional amendment off the November ballot. The group contends the measure, which was placed on the ballot by the state Constitution Revision Commission, is misleading and inaccurate. But attorneys for the state

responded in a court filing last week and contended the plaintiffs have "failed to meet their substantial burden" to block what is known as Amendment 13 from going on the ballot.

"Because the ballot title and summary for the amendment provide ample notice to the electorate using clear and unambiguous language, this court

should reject plaintiffs' challenge and grant summary judgment in favor of defendants," the state filing said.

If the amendment receives approval from 60 percent of voters, it would outlaw greyhound racing at Florida tracks by 2020. Tracks would continue to be able to operate other types of gambling, such

as poker rooms and, in Broward and Miami-Dade counties, slot machines.

In a motion for summary judgment filed July 6, the greyhound association raised a series of arguments about flaws in the ballot title and summary, which are what voters see when they go to the polls. For example, the plaintiffs took issue with a description

that the proposal "ends dog racing" because people in Florida still would be able to bet on greyhound races simulcasted from other states and people still could legally race dogs in Florida if betting did not occur.

Circuit Judge Karen Gievers has scheduled a final hearing in the case for July 26, according to an online docket.

Greene joins Democratic debate for governor

FORT MYERS — The latest debate among Florida's Democratic candidates for governor will have a

newcomer: billionaire developer Jeff Greene.

Greene is joining the other four candidates Wednesday night at Florida Gulf Coast University

in his first debate since his late entry into the race.

The Palm Beach resident has spent \$10 million in ads, mostly his own money. He now hopes to shake up the race even

more during the live exchange with former U.S. Rep. Gwen Graham, Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum, former Miami Beach Mayor Philip Levine and Orlando-area

businessman Chris King.

The winner of the Aug. 28 primary will face the Republican nominee in November. The Republican candidates are Agriculture

Commissioner Adam Putnam and U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis.

Term-limited Republican Gov. Rick Scott is challenging Democratic incumbent U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson.

Originally, there were talks of synchronizing the city's elections with general elections held in November; however, guidance from the Supervisor of Elections Office walked back the idea.

Supervisor of Elections Carol Rudd said it would be "cumbersome" to attempt to help Vernon synchronize its regular elections with upcoming general elections and that

the City would have to look into spending money to print the amended charter on the ballot.

"Most counties do stay away from holding municipal elections along with the regularly scheduled Primary and General Elections," Rudd wrote in a follow-up email Thursday. "We have always assisted our municipalities in conducting their elections and are here to help in any way we can."


It's possible for Vernon and SOE to revisit the idea in the future, she added.

In the meantime, City of Vernon has copies of the

proposed charter available at City Hall, 2808 Yellow Jacket Drive. Walker also stated the City is planning to assemble an information packet that will easily spell out the proposed changes and what they mean. No completion date has been set.

"Honestly, it's been needed it for a while," she said regarding the update of the charter. "There were a lot of things that really didn't need to be in there and a lot of things that really needed to be updated."

"And we're just asking for you to vote," she added.

"We will make sure that they get money and

It took jurors a little more than an hour after the July 3 trial to convict Allen of a combined 127 sex crimes, including a capital offense of sexual battery on a child under 12.

Allen has been in custody since September 2016 after a child reported a man slid a cellphone under a Goodwill dressing room stall in an attempt to record her changing clothes. Officers later discovered a trove of disturbing videos on Allen's phone, including him sexually battering a sleeping 2-year-old child.

It took jurors a little more than an hour after the July 3 trial to convict Allen of a combined 127 sex crimes, including a capital offense of sexual battery on a child under 12.

Security video from the Goodwill store, a good description of the vehicle and a fast-food receipt left inside the changing room led officers to Allen. He was arrested in September and a search of his vehicle revealed several computer storage devices and computer discs, officials wrote. With Allen wanted on video voyeurism charges, officers obtained a search warrant for the devices, on which officers reported they found images of child pornography and bestiality, as well as photos of

Allen committing sexual battery on a child under the age of 12. Some of the recordings dated back more than a year, officers reported.

Allen initially was charged with video voyeurism, possession of child pornography and sexual battery on a child under the age of 12.

The Lynn Haven Police Department then filed 116 counts of possession of photographs or videos that depict sexual performances by a child under the age of 12.

Lynn Haven man arrested on drug charges

CHIPLEY - One man is back behind bars after police observed suspicious behavior.

Lynn Haven resident Justin Miller, 35, who was on state probation for previous drug charges, landed himself back in jail after admitting to Washington County Sheriff's Office deputies that he had marijuana inside of his vehicle. According to a WCSO news release, deputies made contact with him in the parking lot of a local convenience store, "following an observation of suspicious behavior" and noticing "an odor of marijuana coming from Miller."

As deputies were conducting the investigation, they received information

that Miller was seen throwing a brown paper bag under the vehicle, the release stated. Upon locating the bag, deputies discovered it contained methamphetamine.

Miller was arrested without further incident and booked into the Washington County Jail on the charges of possession of methamphetamine, tampering with evidence, and possession of marijuana not more than 20 grams, according to the report.

Miller was placed on state probation for felony drug charges out of Bay County less than a month ago.

3 arrested after failed attempt to elude traffic stop

Charlie Blackmon, 40, and Shannon Works, 36, both of Chipley, and 48-year-old Jennifer Bau are behind bars after a Washington County Sheriff's Office deputy attempted to conduct a traffic stop on their vehicle at the intersection of U.S. 90 and Sewell Farms Road at about 2:30 p.m. last Friday.

According to a WCSO news release, after attempting to elude the deputy, the vehicle abruptly pulled into the driveway of a residence on U.S. 90, where Blackmon and Works fled into the home. The deputy was able to apprehend Bau as she attempted to run.

Bau, who is currently out on bond, had Ambien in her

possession, the release stated. She was taken into custody without further

incident and booked into the Washington County Jail on the charges of possession of a controlled substance without a prescription and resisting an officer without violence.

A subsequent search led to discover cocaine, methamphetamine, marijuana, and multiple types of drug paraphernalia, the release

stated.

Blackmon was charged with of possession of cocaine with intent to sell, possession of methamphetamine, possession of marijuana less than 20 grams, tampering with evidence, resisting an officer without violence, and driving with a suspended license.

Works, who had an active warrant for a parole violation, was also charged with resisting an officer without violence.

Both Blackmon and Works were also booked into the Washington County Jail.

Graham's comments at heart of Roe v. Wade

President Donald Trump's nomination of Judge Brett Kavanaugh to the U.S. Supreme Court has fired up a testy debate over the future of Roe v. Wade, the 1973 U.S. Supreme Court decision that made abortion on demand the law of the land.

The argument from pro-choice forces is that putting Kavanaugh on the Supreme Court would spell the death of Roe. That's certainly possible, if Judge Kavanaugh joins the court and the justices are presented a case with the requisite facts to revisit this argument circa 1972.

What hasn't always been made clear during this debate is that overturning Roe would not end abortion in America. What such action by the court would do, however, is return control over abortion policy to the states.

At an appearance in Tallahassee over the weekend, Democrat Gwen Graham picked up on this theme in making her case to be Florida's next governor actually offered a sound rationale for ridding us of Roe.

According to the Associated Press, Graham spoke to more than 20 women, all of whom seemed to be distraught over the Supreme Court's potential action if or when Justice Kavanaugh comes on board.

Graham acknowledged Roe would "probably" be overturned, and if that happened, she added, "then the line of defense for women's health care rights — for women to be able to determine their own rights with their own bodies — becomes the states." Added Graham, "The states will either protect a woman's right to choose or not. We all know what's on the line."

Graham further noted that three liberal justices on the Florida Supreme Court are expected to retire soon, and the new governor would pick their successors. That lends new urgency to the Kavanaugh situation, she added, because our state justices would ultimately decide the legality of any new Florida law restricting or even outlawing abortion.

The AP rightly pointed out that all of Graham's rivals for the Democratic nomination share her opinion on this issue. But Graham told the group that on abortion her being a woman made her the unique catalyst in the contest to achieve "a changed world in which women are equally represented in any conversation about our health care options."

Setting aside the identity politics in her comment, Graham makes a very valid point: Who should make policy on the most divisive issue of our times? An oligarchy of nine judges who are neither elected by nor accountable to the American people, but who still set policy for the entire country, and whose selection for 30 years has ignited some of the most vicious political brawling imaginable? Or elected officials who come from our communities and who must win our votes to go to Tallahassee, where they make policy that affects only the Floridians to whom they are accountable?

For us, the answer, within the context of Graham's comments, is clear: the folks we send to Tallahassee.



Feel free to tell yourself that Donald Trump chose Brett Kavanaugh for the Supreme Court because the guy went to Yale (Trump reportedly loves Ivy League creds), or because the guy has been thoroughly vetted by the Heritage Foundation and the Federalist Society (the right-wing groups that have long been funneling conservative judges to the bench).

But if you really want to know why Trump chose Kavanaugh, just check out the article he wrote in 2009 for the Minnesota Law Review.

He said that serving presidents should be exempt from all criminal and civil investigations - because they're just too darned busy doing the people's business. He teed up his argument on page 1,460:

"I believe it is vital that the President be able to focus on his never-ending tasks with as few distractions as possible. The country wants the President to be 'one of us' who bears the same responsibilities of citizenship that all share. But I believe that the President should be excused from some of the burdens of ordinary citizenship while serving in office."

Then came this, on page 1,461:

"Congress might consider a law exempting a President - while in office - from criminal prosecution and investigation, including from questioning by criminal prosecutors or defense counsel... Even the lesser burdens of a criminal investigation - including preparing for questioning by criminal investigators - are time-consuming and distracting. Like child support, criminal investigations take the President's focus away from

his or her responsibilities to the people. And a President who is concerned about an ongoing criminal investigation is almost inevitably going to do a worse job as President."

There you have it, folks. Trump has purchased survival insurance.

Yes, Kavanaugh's ascent will virtually cement a 5-4 conservative majority for decades, tilting America further rightward on everything from civil rights to corporate power, but Trump would've punched that ticket by choosing anyone on the Federalist Society's wish list. As they say at Wharton, Kavanaugh is "value added." He has the requisite conservative creds, plus he's on record saying that presidents should be exempt from investigation. Trump's knowledge of jurisprudence could probably fit in a thimble, but he has a feral instinct for saving himself. Indeed, it has been confirmed in news reports that Trump's aides flagged that law review article for his edification.

So if or when Robert Mueller's investigation lands in the laps of the justices, on some crucial point of law, Trump can probably count on Kavanaugh to serve his interests by arguing that Mueller is burdening a very busy man and that therefore Trump shall not deign to honor a Mueller subpoena. That's the kind of fealty Trump craves.

Senate Democrats, who are virtually powerless to block Kavanaugh's ascent (in part because some of the red-state Democrats up for re-election could vote Yes), may well argue during the confirmation process that Kavanaugh should recuse himself if he's confronted with the Mueller probe, or with the current defamation suit that accuses Trump

of sexual harassment - on the grounds that he shouldn't sit on any case that involves the president who nominated him. Good luck making that stick.

By the way, there's a very funny moment in the Law Review article when Kavanaugh unveils his exempt-the-president argument and quickly adds: "This is not something I necessarily thought in the 1980s or 1990s." Yeah, no kidding. Because in the 1990s, as a lawyer with a Republican track record, he served on Kenneth Starr's team, in criminal pursuit of President Clinton.

At one point Kavanaugh told Starr in a memo, "I am strongly opposed to giving the president any break." So he had no qualms then about investigating a serving president (of the opposing party, anyway). Suffice it to say that he has since changed his mind.

Can Trump count on Kavanaugh's loyalty when the chips are down? Perhaps the nominee gave us a hint on Monday night, when he thanked Trump for the honor and immediately went into hyperbolic overdrive: "No president has ever consulted more widely, or talked with more people, from more backgrounds, to seek input about a Supreme Court nomination."

How could he possibly know that? Why should we believe that? If Brett Kavanaugh wants the American people to believe that he'll function as an independent member of the supposedly independent judiciary, and that he'll have an open mind when confronted with a potential constitutional crisis, it would surely behoove him not to sound like the daffy doctor who said that Trump was specifically the healthiest human specimen since the dawn of man.



Montenegro puzzled by Trump's attention

PODGORICA, Montenegro — World War III? Not us, say the puzzled people of Montenegro.


Public officials in this tiny European nation didn't know what to say initially when U.S. President Donald Trump suggested that NATO's newest and smallest member, which has a military with fewer than 2,000 members, could be the spark that sets off a global Armageddon.

That the leader of the world's dominant superpower would characterize the 620,000 or so Montenegrins as "very strong" and "very aggressive people" rendered their government speechless. It found its voice Thursday, and what came out was less a battle cry than a chorus of "Kumbaya."

"We build friendships, and we have not lost a single one," read a statement issued in the capital, Podgorica, in response to the media's clamoring for comment. "It does not matter how big or small you are, but to what extent you cherish the values of freedom, solidarity and democracy."

Living in a region that has seen more than its share of volatile conflicts, Montenegrins say they are much more interested in tourism than war. Montenegro, a former Yugoslav republic like Slovenia, the home country of U.S. first lady Melania Trump, is known for its long Adriatic Sea beaches.

"I laughed when I heard that and figured it could be a good

advertisement," retiree Slavka Kovacevic, 58, said of Trump's depiction while taking a break from her morning shopping.

Trump ventured his thoughts on Montenegro during an interview with Fox News host Tucker Carlson conducted Monday after the summit with Russian President Vladimir Putin in Helsinki. They were discussing NATO's mutual defense pact.

If Montenegro, for example, were provoked, having NATO behind it could embolden "a tiny country with very strong people" to engage, the president said.

"They are very strong people. They are very aggressive people, they may get aggressive, and congratulations, you are in World War III," he added.

The comment was not the first time Trump had taken notice of Montenegro in a way that attracted oversized attention. At a NATO summit last year, his first as president, Trump shoved Montenegrin Prime Minister Dusko Markovic out of the way while trying to get in front for a leaders' group photo.

Back then, Markovic refused to make a fuss over the

American president's manners. Markovic also took the high road regarding Trump's comments this week. He noted in a parliamentary debate Wednesday that Trump spoke within the context of questioning NATO financing and was not trying to put down a particular ally.

"Therefore, the friendship and the alliance of Montenegro and the United States of America is strong and permanent," Markovic's government said in its statement Thursday.

Trump's views have some basis in history. Montenegro, which means "Black

Mountain," does boast of a heroic warring tradition forged over centuries of conquest and contemporary conflicts in the troubled Balkans.

Montenegro was a rare country in the region to retain a level of autonomy during the Turkish Ottoman Empire. Its past ties to Russia, with whom Montenegro shared a predominantly Slavic and Orthodox Christian culture, were so strong that its leaders were said to have declared a war on Japan in 1904 just to support Russia.

Montenegro became part of Yugoslavia after World War I. During the breakup of Yugoslavia, Montenegro was bombed by NATO forces in 1999 before it split from Serbia in 2006.

"I just want to remind all the American public opinion and President Trump that Montenegro was an ally with American soldiers in two wars, in the first world war and the second world war," former parliament speaker Ranko Krivokapic told The Associated Press.

"Montenegrins are not aggressive... but the nation of brave warriors," he said.

As it happens, the governor of the U.S. state of Maine, Paul LePage, was visiting Montenegro in hopes of strengthening ties with business and political leaders when the president's interview aired. Maine is six times as big as Montenegro and has had a partnership with the country since 2006. LePage says it originally focused on disaster relief, emergency management and border security.

Inquest opens into woman poisoned by nerve agent

A coroner on Thursday opened an inquest into the death of a British woman who was exposed to a military grade nerve agent, while British media reported that police may have identified suspects in an attack that poisoned a former Russian spy with the same deadly substance.

Senior coroner David Ridley led a brief hearing on the death of Dawn Sturgess, but said the official cause won't be given until further tests are completed. He adjourned the proceedings until January to allow time for police inquiries to continue.

Sturgess, 44, and partner Charlie Rowley, 45, collapsed on June 30.

EU urging members to step up plans for no-deal Brexit

The European Union is urging member states to step up preparations for a possible disorderly British exit from the bloc, in which no deal on future relations has been agreed.

With Brexit negotiations at an impasse largely because the British government is struggling to command a majority in parliament, there is growing concern that the country could end up crashing out of the EU without a deal.

"We need to be prepared for all eventualities," Mina Andreeva, spokeswoman at the EU's executive Commission, said Thursday.

The European Commission published a document warning over the potential impact of no deal.

Global slavery report slams NKorea, repressive regimes

Modern slavery is most prevalent in North Korea and other repressive regimes, but developed nations also bear responsibility for it because they import \$350 billion worth of goods that are produced under suspicious circumstances, according to research released Thursday.

The Global Slavery Index estimates that 40.3 million people worldwide were subjected to modern slavery in 2016, with the highest concentration in North Korea where one in 10 people lived under such conditions.

The report was compiled by the Walk Free Foundation, an anti-slavery campaign founded by Australian billionaire Andrew Forrest.

Business owner spits on black man in parking dispute

A parking dispute at a social justice gathering in Detroit ended with a white business owner spitting on a black security guard, who captured the altercation on video and posted it on Facebook.

Ibrahim Mission was providing security at the event Tuesday when Detroit Mercantile Co. owner Robert Stanzler grew disgruntled over some participants parking on his property, the Detroit Free Press reported.

Stanzler asked Mission to stop people from parking near his business, which sells antiques and Michigan wares. Mission told Stanzler to speak to the building owner, and Stanzler responded by making an offensive hand gesture and spitting on Mission's face.

Belgium airspace closed for 2 hours over technical glitch

Belgium's airspace was closed off for landings and departures for about two hours on Thursday afternoon because of a technical glitch in the data system of the air safety control center.

Belgocontrol spokesman Dominique Dehaene said the control center had to execute a "clear sky" operation until the issue was fixed. He couldn't immediately provide details of the technical difficulties.

Dehaene said it was "a very specific problem" that created a risk that some information on flights might not be correct. Flights resumed by 6 p.m. local time.

About 15 flights were canceled and many more delayed.

that, the roof of the church was leaking profusely and finances were scanty.

Construction out of Lynn Haven. The call resulted in a new estimate of \$5,600 for materials and no labor costs to install the roofing.

"God brought me in contact with a roofing company out of Panama City, they came over and installed the roof for free," he said with tears in the wells of his eyes. "So the roof is fixed and the loan has been paid."

Chattanooga chew

The Tennessee city is on the right track toward culinary renown

Pardon me boys, but Chattanooga, Tennessee, is more than the home of the iconic Choo-Choo and of the Moon Pie, my childhood after-school snack.

Move over, Track 29, and make room for a renaissance in this charming Southern city.

With more than a trifle to share, nothing could be finer than to dine at St. John's Restaurant, located in a flatiron building constructed at the turn of the 20th century. This property served as a hotel and later as a brothel before being abandoned for the next several decades. In the year 2000, however, local architect Thomas Johnson bought and restored the building, and St. John's Restaurant opened within it soon thereafter, debuting Chattanooga's first farm-to-table dining experience.

Rebecca Barron, a Milwaukee transplant whose wrist sports a tattoo of a beet, honed her chops in the kitchen there and is today the restaurant's executive chef. She embraces farm-to-table cooking and her menu is inspired both by local farms and by her culinary travels through Europe, India and southeast Asia.

Barron's bold style was on display in an amuse bouche of pimento cheese on a cracker, topped with lump crab, a ripe strawberry and a sprinkling of caviar sustainably grown in the Aquitaine region of France.

Her Croque Madame was a study in Southern ingenuity: sunny-side-up quail egg over pork belly on a buttermilk biscuit, enrobed in a smoked Gouda Mornay sauce with a side of country ham and a dipping sauce of blueberry jam. How could it get any better? With a quaff of Anthill Farms 2015 Anderson Valley Pinot Noir ... and a magic trick.

The trick was performed by my server, who set down a Bell jar, twisted off its cap and stepped back while white smoke slithered out like a cobra, unveiling the jar's colorful contents: roasted beets and local Crabtree Farm green beans, blackberries and strawberries, all sitting atop a base of sheep's milk cheese from Blackberry Farm.

On my final day in Chattanooga, I made a visit to Songbirds Guitar Museum, where I oooh'd and aaah'd at its vintage instrument collection, from Gibsons to Fenders.

It was a hot and humid walk from the museum to my digs at the boutique Dwell Hotel. There I gratefully succumbed to a cleansing salt bath in my oversized, in-room soaking tub.

I emerged refreshed and headed to the hotel's lounge, Matilda Midnight, and on to its dining room, Solarium Cafe. Locally sourced ingredients and botanicals are the draw in this cozy, 35-seat restaurant, where a health-forward menu includes a Cashew Kale Dip worthy of sharing.

Cashew Kale Dip

Serves 4-6

NOTE: Prepare 24 hours in advance

- 2 cups whole, unsalted raw cashews (soak overnight in 2 quarts room temperature water)
- ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- ¼ cup nutritional yeast
- 1 bunch of kale
- ½ cup breadcrumbs (optional)
- Lavash crackers, veggie chips and raw veggies of choice



Soak cashews overnight or until plump and softened.

Drain the soaking liquid, reserving ¾ cup of the water. Add the nuts, garlic powder, black pepper, reserved cashew water, lemon juice and yeast to a food processor and pulse until the mixture is smooth. This is called cashew cheese.

Take 1 bunch of kale, with leaves stripped from stems, and sauté until wilted. Place kale in a colander to drain for 10 minutes, then press out

any excess liquid between paper towels and finely chop.

Fold together cashew cheese and kale, place in a baking dish, top with breadcrumbs (optional) and bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until top is golden and it is warmed through. Scoop up dip while still warm with lavash crackers and/or veggie chips.

Veggies in abundance for zucchini quick bread

Seeing freckles of orange and green bring smiles to the face and delight to the palate when you cut into zucchini quick bread. This time of year, when fresh vegetables are in abundance, I like to make Zucchini Carrot Bread. A crunchy crust and a tender crumb makes this quick bread special.

A bowl of overripe bananas on the kitchen table reminded me that it had been a long time since I had made a quick bread.

Of course, one of my all-time favorites is banana nut bread. I usually use pecans, but my granddaughter. Remember that bananas need to be very ripe.

Banana Walnut Bread

- ½ cup softened butter
- ½ cup sugar
- ½ cup firmly-packed light brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 ¼ cups mashed ripe bananas
- 2 cups self-rising flour
- ½ cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and lightly flour a 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Combine the butter, sugar and brown sugar in large bowl. Beat until mixed. Add eggs, extract

and bananas. Beat just until mixed. Gradually add flour and mix until blended. Stir in walnuts. Pour into prepared pan and bake for about 45 to 50 minutes, or until a toothpick comes out clean when inserted into center of loaf. Remove from pan immediately.

Zucchini Carrot Bread

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/8 teaspoon freshly-grated nutmeg
- ¼ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups oil
- 2/3 cup finely shredded

zucchini
• 2/3 cup finely shredded carrots
• ¾ teaspoon vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease a 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. In medium bowl, combine flour, brown sugar, baking powder, spices and salt. Stir to mix. In large bowl, beat together the oil and eggs. Stir in zucchini, carrots and vanilla. Add the flour mixture and beat until smooth. Pour into the pan and bake for 45 to 50 minutes, or until a toothpick comes out clean when inserted into center of loaf.
