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City on spray field: 'Can't negotiate any further'

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CHIPLEY - It's possible City of Chipley could be very close to acquiring a property to dispose of its reclaimed water.

At Thursday's workshop, City Administrator Dan Miner informed the Chipley City Council the city is "at a point where we can't negotiate any further."

The deadline to secure a spray field property was mid-July.

He told the council more testing will be done over the next 60 days and then Department of Environment Protection will also conduct a review.

Miner said the terms of the offer would not be available until tests come back and the offer finalized. On Thursday, he stated within 120 days, he'd have a plan available for public viewing.

In other business, the council scheduled a special meeting for Aug. 30 to update the comprehensive land use plan with capital improvement changes, and to ultimately nail down which projects the city will pursue for the Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program grant. The application deadline is Oct. 15.

Also at the workshop, Washington County School District Superintendent Joseph Taylor spoke to the council about the proposed half-cent sale tax that will appear on the Aug. 28 ballot.

Schools train for shooter scenario

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WASHINGTON COUNTY - It has been nearly six months since Nikolas Cruz opened fire at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, killing 14 students and three staff members.

The Valentine's Day shooting rampage left campuses across the state and nation smoldering with fear and quandary about how safe schools are. With a two-day training, Washington County School District faculty and staff are more prepared than ever to have a safe school year.

During a two-day training, held Aug. 6 and 8, Washington County Sheriff's Office, Chipley Police Department, Florida Highway Patrol, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, and Florida Department of Corrections Probation and Parole Division, trained WCSD employees on how to respond during an active shooter situation.

According to a WCSO news release, law enforcement approach hinged on real-life simulations, including gunshots and screams. And during the final scenario, school staff had to determine the safest escape routes.

"As disheartening as the need for the training is, it is a priority," Crews stated in the release. "We have to overcome things we don't want to do in this business and planning for an attack on our children in our schools is one we should not have to face."

Being involved in a training where we learn the response tactics together so that we can face an attacker head on is critical. And that is what this training was about."

In response to the Parkland shooting, Gov. Rick Scott and state legislators rolled out a \$400 million package designated for school safety. The package included a mental health piece - a topic that continues to take shape as recently released confession tapes by shooter Nikolas Cruz reportedly show signs of mental illness.

City enforces signage code, seeks committee members

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CHIPLEY - If you've noticed your sign missing, City of Chipley may know what happened to it: code enforcement has enforced Chapter 15 of the city code which regulates sign placement.

Chipley City Council discussed and revisited the ordinance at Thursday's workshop. Of 40 code enforcement violations in July, 25 cases were for signage. Officials are seeking individuals to serve on a committee that will help guide policy for an updated ordinance.

"Temporary signs can be used on a short-term basis; now 'short-term' to you may mean something entirely different than it does to me," said Mayor John Sasser.

The ordinance states temporary signage is prohibited unless it is posted under the following circumstances: to indicate an owner/agent is actively attempting to sell, rent or lease property on which the sign is located; to indicate the grand opening of a business or activity; to identify construction in progress; to indicate the existence of a new business or business in a new location; or to advertise a special event.

Chipley track star races to top at Jr. Olympics

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CHIPLEY - At just 12 years old - and in her second year competing - one track runner has sprinted her way to become an All-American finalist at the National Junior Olympics.

Kinsleigh Hunter, of Chipley, became a finalist runner in the 100-meter dash (6th place; 12.42) and 200-meter dash (7th place; 25.42) at the 2018 Amateur Athletic Union Jr. Olympics Games held July 28-Aug. 4 at Drake Stadium in Des Moines, Iowa.

"She is an exceptional

athlete," said Track Coach Brett Stanley, head coach and founder of Tallahassee's Spartan Chosen Track Club. "I noticed it from the first day of practice."

The Roulhac Middle School student took no walks this summer, training six days a week daily under Stanley. She changed her diet and learned what it meant to have be on a track team.

Last year, she competed unattached, but still made it to the semi-finals.

My goal was to place and medal last year, but I didn't," Hunter said. "So, I tried my hardest this year - and I did."

"I'm thankful for all of my family celebrating me to this


- because it took me a long ways to get from Chipley, Florida to Iowa," she added. "And I'm happy to do this and make everybody proud."

With those titles under her belt, she is already preparing for next year's competition, Stanley said.

"She made a vision board last night and now she is willing to do anything to get herself to the point where she is considered the best in her age," he said. And "I have no doubt that she can."

"Just knowing that she has a complete year - it is very reachable for her to do as long as she stays healthy and motivated," he added.

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Slain students' families hammer School Board

SUNRISE - Family members whose loved ones were killed during a massacre at a Parkland high school in February slammed the Broward County School board for failing to make schools safe, just one week before classes begin.

The group, which held a press conference at an arena where the Marjory Stoneman Douglas Public Safety Commission was meeting Thursday, also called for the school board to be voted out of office, blasting them for a lack of leadership.

"We have focused on issues, but the school board has not provided answers," said Tony Montalto, whose daughter Gina, was among the 14 students killed in the Valentine's Day mass shooting. Three faculty members also died after

Nikolas Cruz, who confessed to the killings, allegedly opened fire at his former school. Cruz has been charged with 17 counts of murder.

"So today we would like to make the citizens of Broward County aware that the current school board has failed to properly prepare the county's 234 schools for the upcoming school year," said Montalto, president of "Stand with Parkland," a nonprofit organization launched by parents of Parkland victims in response to the mass shooting.

Montalto urged "everyone concerned with the safety of this county's schools" to take action at the polls.

"Vote for new school board representation that would be more concerned about the safety of students and teachers in all of Broward County," he said.

Two parents of

Lori Alhadeff, whose daughter Alyssa was among the 17 victims, and Ryan Petty, whose daughter Alaina also died, are running "in order to continue their fight for improved school safety, increased transparency and increased accountability in

Broward Schools in order to ensure a quality education," they said in a press release announcing their candidacy in May.

During a Broward County School Board meeting earlier Thursday morning, board member Donna Korn called the 2017-18 academic year "one of the best" for the county.

But Korn's comments

elicited outrage from April Schentrup, whose 16-year-old daughter, Carmen, was among the slain Parkland students.

"Being an employee of the school district, and a mother who has endured such tragedy, it was difficult to hear those words," Schentrup said. "Because I know we are not the only ones in Broward County who struggled. We know that it wasn't an amazing year. We know that it wasn't the best year for Broward schools."

Schentrup said the county needs school board members who are "compassionate, who understand and who lead."

Other parents vented frustrations with the school board's "lack of leadership" and failure to reach consensus about school security issues.

Max Schachter, whose 14-year-old son Alex also died, created a task force

to screen companies that want to donate and sell safety-related products to the school system.

Schachter, who serves on the public safety commission created by the state Legislature earlier this year, said that over \$2 million worth of products were donated, but the school district turned him away.

"There is no accountability," he said. "There's no leadership and we don't want this (school shooting) to happen to other schools. We don't want this to happen to any other children."

Andrew Pollack, whose 18-year-old daughter Meadow was also a victim, accused school district Superintendent Robert Runcie of reversing himself on major decisions related to the investigation of the Feb. 14 event as well as other school-safety issues.

According to City Administrator Dan Miner, the conversation surrounding signage came up when a fast-food restaurant requested to place temporary signs that were outside of city code. When the City refused the request, the restaurant pointed to several other businesses that were also out of compliance. The issue is that business would like to advertise their products

using temporary signage, which is against city code.

The code, according to officials, is aimed toward safety and to maintain an aesthetically please city.

Another part of the discussion at the workshop centered on the open-endedness of parts of the ordinance, and confronted the definition of how long is "temporary" or short-term sign and when is a sign a considered a work of art.

On art, Sasser expressly defended the mural painted on the side of Piggly Wiggly Grocery store. And, according to the drafted ordinance, it would be exempted from

violation. However, other advertisements that aren't as popular, but could be considered an art form by some, were Chief Scott Thompson's concern.

"What if a business at one of the main entrances of Chipley puts up a sign and say it's a work of art - and it's very large, grotesque and distracting to me or to you," Thompson said. "Under this, it's exempt."

After a thorough discussion, including input from residents and business owners in the audience, the council decided Thursday to advertise for individuals interested in serving on a

Temporary advertisement signage rules for City of Chipley

Temporary advertisement signage is prohibited within the city's code, except for the following purposes:

- To indicate an owner/agent is actively attempting to sell, rent or lease property on which the sign is located
- To indicate the grand opening of a business or activity
- To identify construction in progress
- To indicate the existence of a new business or business in a new location
- Advertising a special event
- Any temporary sign not complying with the requirements of this section or placed within the right of way is illegal and subject to immediate removal by the city.

In the \$430,000 Washington County School District received, \$172,599 was designated to the mental health component. The School Board used the money to hire a School Safety Administrator and two licensed professional counselors.

The School Board hired

Kimberly Register to take on the new state-mandated position of School Safety Administrator. The position offers up a broad job description - mainly stating the specialist should oversee all facets of safety district-wide and coordinate with county and state departments to make schools safer.

Also, the school district, in partnership with the county and sheriff's office, has placed armed School Resource Officers at all

school campuses, with the exception of WISE and Florida Panhandle Technical College. The SROs are trained in mental health crisis response, according to WCSO.

At a roundtable discussion between the School Board and WCSO faculty and administration held earlier this year, Superintendent Joseph Taylor, School Board member Milton Brown and Sheriff Crews reminded everyone that familiarizing and

equipping students with safety tools is one of the most effective ways to create safer schools in the future.

"We can't do it just by fencing and cameras, but it's the interaction of those officers with those individual students

and those students feeling comfortable enough to go to those officers and say 'Hey, I have a concern about this student,'" Brown said at the roundtable. "And doing it before the problem occurs is going to make the difference."

The Aug. 6 and 8 active shooter training was one of several that will take place throughout the school year, according to the WCSO news release.

"The color of our uniform does not matter when we are facing a crisis involving our children," Crews stated in the release. "We will all respond, for the sake of our children, and this is the reason multiple local and state law enforcement agencies trained together during the active shooter scenarios."

"The positive and proactive mindset of the school staff and teachers has played a huge role in the success of this training," he stated. For more information about Washington County School District go to wcsdschools.com.

He said he approached the council to tell them "don't be afraid of this, this isn't a huge expenditure piece."

Taylor touted the positive and swift

performance review it got from the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability released June 25.

If voters approve the surtax, the money would be used to fund capital projects and sooth educational technology needs over the course of 10 years, beginning in January. The funds

would not be used for athletics or stadiums, Taylor noted.

"Nobody likes taxes," he told the council, adding "a half-cent may not sound like a lot, but it's a million dollars to us."

Chipley City Council will meet in regular session 6 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 14 at City Hall.

Calls for repealing 'stand your ground' hit Capitol

TALLAHASSEE - Joined by the longtime girlfriend of a black man who was shot dead in a dispute over a parking spot at a Clearwater convenience store, black pastors, civil rights leaders and politicians marched to Gov. Rick Scott's office Wednesday to demand a repeal of the state's controversial "stand your ground" law.

Tensions over the July 19 shooting of Markeis McGlockton, with his three young children nearby, escalated after Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gaultieri decided not to arrest shooter Michael Drejka, who is white. Gaultieri said his hands were tied by the National Rifle Association-backed law that allows people who fear their lives are in danger to use deadly force without having to retreat.

"It's hard and, you know, I am still going to stand up and fight for what is right. My man was right. Markeis was right. He was just protecting us. He was a good man and a good father, and he didn't do nothing wrong," Britany Jacobs, McGlockton's live-in partner and the mother of his three children, told reporters and supporters gathered Wednesday morning at Bethel Missionary Baptist Church in Tallahassee.

McGlockton and Jacobs stopped at a convenience store to buy snacks for their children, Jacobs' lawyer, Benjamin Crump, said. While McGlockton was inside, Drejka began to berate Jacobs for parking in a handicap parking spot. A videotape of the

confrontation shows McGlockton shoving Drejka to the ground. Drejka then pulled out a gun and shot McGlockton, who appeared to be backing away. McGlockton, accompanied by his five-year-old son, ran into the store and later died.

Gaultieri has insisted that the state's "stand your ground" law prevented him from arresting Drejka but that the case remains under investigation and has not been closed. State Attorney Bernie McCabe's office is weighing whether to press charges.

But critics of the sheriff, including the NRA and some Republican lawmakers, have said the law did not prevent Gaultieri from arresting Drejka, whom Crump said was the instigator of the confrontation outside the Circle K.

"If he never would have started the altercation, there would be no reason for you to be in fear for your life," Crump said.

An expansion of the traditional "Castle Doctrine," the 2005 "stand your ground" law gives people the right to defend themselves with deadly force in their own homes or any place they have a right to be. Florida's first-in-the-nation law, used as a model elsewhere, says people are justified in using deadly force and do not have a "duty to retreat" if they believe it is necessary to prevent death or great bodily harm. When the defense is successfully raised in pre-trial hearings, defendants are granted immunity from prosecution.

A change approved last year by the Legislature

and Scott shifted the burden from defendants to prosecutors to prove whether a self-defense claim is justified.

The law has been a flashpoint for the black community since the death of Trayvon Martin, an unarmed teenager shot and killed by neighborhood watch volunteer George Zimmerman in 2012 in Seminole County. Black leaders maintain that the law is disproportionately used to exonerate white shooters of black victims.

The statute and the subsequent changes have created confusion for the public and law-enforcement officials, Crump said.

"There was never a problem or anything wrong with self-defense and the Castle Doctrine. It was very clear, and everybody understood it. If you came to my house, then I had a right to defend my house. Now, everywhere

is somebody's ground. It almost suggests that for black people and people of color, our ground is only where white people deem it appropriate to be," Crump said.

Gaultieri further outraged black leaders in Florida and the nation following a Sunday rally in Clearwater led by civil rights leader Al Sharpton, who demanded the sheriff either arrest Drejka or hand in his badge.

"I don't really care what Al Sharpton has to say. Go back to New York. Mind your own business," Gaultieri said.

The sheriff's comments elicited a sharp rebuke Wednesday from lawyer Michele Rayner, who represents McGlockton's family.

"Whether you are in Tallahassee, whether you're in Jacksonville, whether you are in Miami, whether you are in Tampa or whether you're in little old Clearwater, this is

all of our business. And guess what we won't do? We will not rest. We will not rest until the shooter is arrested, until charges are filed, but most importantly, until 'stand your ground' is repealed," she said.

Jack Heekin, a Scott deputy chief of staff, met with Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum, the Rev. R.B. Holmes and two others after the group marched to the Capitol. Gillum is a Democratic candidate for governor.

Scott's aides pointed to lawmakers when asked if Scott, who is trying to unseat incumbent U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson in November, would use his executive power to change the law.

"The governor expects that every Florida law be enforced and applied fairly by law enforcement and state attorneys, who are elected by Floridians. If the Legislature wants to make any changes to clarify Florida's laws next legislative session, they can do so," Scott spokesman McKinley Lewis said in an email.

Even the staunchest supporters of Florida's "stand your ground" law have questioned Gaultieri's decision not to arrest Drejka, while at the same time they have decried efforts to politicize the law.

"The law is very clear, if there is probable cause an arrest can be made. If opportunistic politicians took the time to read and understand the law they would know that issue is with the facts of the case not the text of the law," NRA Florida lobbyist Marion Hammer, a former president of the

national organization, said in an email. "It's irresponsible to second-guess law enforcement without all of the facts and it's appalling that politicians would attack a law that protects their constituents' constitutional right to self-defense to score cheap political points."

McGlockton's shooting death adds to the political minefield around firearms. Democrats and others have demanded stricter gun laws in the aftermath of the Feb. 14 massacre at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland that left 14 students and three faculty members dead.

"We have a major election coming up within 90 days," Holmes said, pointing out that all five Democratic candidates for governor have said they would work to repeal the "stand your ground" law. "So now it's in our hands to support a governor who has the courage and backbone to see the evil of the misapplication of stand your ground law."

The law "makes it less safe for everyone," said Gillum, the only black candidate running for governor.

"It creates tension in the community that shouldn't be there, between law enforcement, between citizens ... but ultimately it comes down to voters," he said. "The best way to make good on the demand to repeal 'stand your ground' is to show up with your voter identification card or whatever credential you need and cast your vote consistent with your belief that 'stand your ground' has no place in the state of Florida."

One charged in connection to death of Holmes County man

HOLMES COUNTY - Law enforcement has arrested and charged a man in connection to the October 2017 death of a Holmes County man whose body was discovered near his home days after he was reported missing.

David John Van de Bogart, 54, of 2290 Bear Hewitt Road in Holmes County, has officially been charged in connection to the death of 50-year-old Bruce Edward McCullough, a Holmes County Sheriff's Office news release stated Wednesday.

According to the news release, witnesses observed an altercation take place between Van de Bogart and McCullough on Oct. 3. Van de Bogart struck McCullough in the head with blunt force, which is the cause of death, according to records.

McCullough, who

resided on the same property off of Bear Hewitt Road as Van de Bogart,

was reported missing on Oct. 4, last year.

His body was found by investigators five days later in the Water Management Area in the south end of Bear Hewitt Road, less than a half-mile from the residence, the release stated.

Van de Bogart had previously been listed as a person of interest at the time the victim's remains were discovered. He was then held in custody at the Holmes County Jail on a \$110,000 bond and on other charges of obstruction of justice by intimidating a witness, aggravated battery and felony battery.

Van de Bogart is currently incarcerated in the Holmes County Jail, the news release stated.

Wild west of social media

It was a classic good news/bad news situation for Facebook founder, chairman and CEO Mark Zuckerberg. First, the bad news: One day late last month, he lost some \$16.8 billion. The good news: One day late last month, he lost some \$16.8 billion. That is to say, being in a position where you are capable of losing that kind of money suggests you are doing pretty darn well. Indeed, Bloomberg News estimated that even after the massive decline in his net worth, Zuckerberg was still worth a cool \$70-or-so billion.

Zuckerberg took a hit because Facebook's share price tanked that day, losing about 19 percent of its value, or about \$100 billion in market capitalization.

The world's largest social media company reported disappointing figures for daily active users and revenue growth.

Indeed, the number of daily active users the company has in North America and Europe is now falling. (Facebook remains banned in China, the world's largest internet market.)

Then there's the political messes and public relations problems the social network keeps finding itself in.

Earlier this spring, it was revealed that Cambridge Analytica, a UK-based consulting firm, had improperly harvested the data of its users for political purposes. (Zuckerberg eventually apologized.) Cambridge Analytica, which was hired by the presidential campaign of Donald Trump, surreptitiously used data gathered from Facebook to build voter profiles.

And there's also the endless scrutiny of the company over the apparent Russia-linked abuse of its platform. The New York Times reported earlier this year that Facebook, "more than any other technology tool, was singled out ... by the Justice Department when Robert Mueller's prosecutors charged 13 Russians and three companies for executing a scheme to subvert the 2016 election and support Donald J. Trump's presidential campaign."

It isn't only Facebook that is a site of disinformation. Twitter is arguably a more politically influential platform. It's beloved of political journalists and, of course, the president of the United States, who is nothing if not a prolific tweeter.

But like Facebook, Twitter, too, is another carnival of fake news, computer bots and trolls.

Meanwhile, many critics complain the sites' algorithms and censorship standards favor left-wing speech over conservative ideas.

Facebook recently blocked the Declaration of Independence, one of the foundational documents of American liberty, as hate speech, before reversing itself.

The advent of social media has kept families and old friends connected, aided job seekers, and given us ways to pass the time.

But we are still coming to grips with its effects. Facebook and Twitter have fueled our polarized culture, making it easier for people to confront only news that confirms their prior points of views.

And it provided fertile ground for cynical political operators to spread lies.

Tweet presidentially, Mr. Trump

Trump is still being Trump. Whether he's holding his stand-up political rallies in Wilkes-Barre or Ohio, or delivering his incendiary early morning tweet storms, he's not going to change his wild and crazy ways.

He's been doing a lot of great stuff in Washington, but if he wants to stay there he'd better be careful.

The raw party numbers are against him.

Last time around, in 2016, the Democrats had a deplorable candidate - Hillary Clinton - who lots of Democrats didn't like, either, and therefore didn't show up to vote for at the polls.

Now Democrats have someone even bigger to collectively hate - Donald Trump.

Just as more private-sector organizations are calling telecommuting workers back to the office, two politicians in Washington hope to encourage federal agencies to allow more government employees to work from home.

As it goes, the Trump administration is seeking to cut back on federal employee telework programs. But Reps. Gerry Connolly, D-Va., and John Sarbanes, D-Md., are promoting the Telework Metrics and Cost Savings Act to prevent telework reductions.

That's probably not a good idea.

Look, as a freelance writer and author, I've been telecommuting for years. I'm alone in my home office all day long. It's not for the faint of heart.

I hardly ever see real humans

during the day. Every time the FedEx guy shows up, I demonstrate how much this isolation is getting to me.

FedEx guy: "Sign here please."

Me: "I hear it's going to rain tomorrow. Would you like a cup of coffee?"

So, you see, I'm not so enamored with the home-office concept anymore. And I think I know why.

Human beings don't like to be alone. We are social animals - so social, in fact, that we would rather spend long days in corporate offices with other people than suffer longer days in utter freedom working alone in our homes.

That's why, according to Forbes, more private-sector organizations are calling teleworkers back to the office.

IBM, Apple and Google have discovered that when employees encounter each other in the office, they become more creative and productive than they are working alone at home.

Even Generation Z and millennials, according to a new study by HR staffing firm Randstad US, prefer face-to-face

conversations over electronic conversations and corporate offices over telecommuting.

"While technology can make us more efficient, and feel highly connected to one another, it will never replace face-to-face conversations," reports Forbes.

In any event, just as many organizations in the private sector are reversing course on employee telecommuting, two congressmen are pushing for full steam ahead.

"Federal government telework programs not only improve productivity, but also save taxpayer money by increasing efficiency, strengthening employee retention and reducing costs for federal office space," Sarbanes told the Federal Times.

If you say so, congressman.

All I know is that I'm spending way too much time alone in my home. And as much as it worries me, it worries my neighbors more. No matter how often I tell them I'm a freelance writer, they don't believe me.

A Dark Day

There's a big event happening up in the sky in a few days. Are you ready to experience the 2017 solar eclipse? The Mini Page explores the science of the eclipse and safe ways to observe it.

What is an eclipse?

An **eclipse** happens when one body in space passes in front of another. A **solar** eclipse happens when the moon passes between the Earth and sun, blocking the sun's light.

The solar eclipse expected on Aug. 21 will cover a large path from Oregon to South Carolina. In its direct path, experts say, the eclipse will make it appear as dark as dusk outside.

The last time a total solar eclipse passed over the continental United States was in 1979.

Watching from space

Scientists will get some rare views of the eclipse from several different spacecraft. For example, in 2006, the International Space Station (ISS) photographed the darkened Earth during an eclipse.



In 2006, the ISS watched a solar eclipse pass over the area around Turkey and Cyprus near the Mediterranean Sea.

Other spacecraft observing the eclipse will be the DISCOVER, the Deep Space Climate Observer; LRO, the Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter; and solar observatories called IRIS and Hinode. These spacecraft will be able to send different views and types of data back to NASA for scientists to analyze.

Scientists and students will also make observations from the ground and using high-altitude balloons.



Viewing the event

No matter where you live in North America, you'll be able to see at least a partial eclipse on Aug. 21. The path of **totality**, where people will see a total eclipse, is only about 70 miles wide and stretches from Lincoln Beach, Oregon, to near Charleston, South Carolina.

The shadow causing the partial eclipse is called the **penumbra** (peh-NUM-bruh). The shadow of the total eclipse is the **umbra** (UM-bruh).

Moon in motion

There are several stages of a total eclipse. In the first stage, the moon is partially blocking the sun. This stage can last more than an hour.

As the eclipse becomes total, the last bits of sunlight streaming through valleys on the moon cause a bright flash, known as the **diamond ring effect**.

When the diamond ring disappears and the moon completely covers the sun, it's safe to look at the eclipse. But this will only last for a few seconds. When you begin to see a crescent on the other side of the moon, it's time to protect your eyes again.

Safety first!

Looking directly at the sun can cause serious damage to your eyes!

The only way to look directly at the eclipse is through special "eclipse glasses." Even very dark sunglasses are not safe to watch through. Don't look through a camera, telescope or binoculars, even with eclipse glasses.

You can also use a pinhole projector to watch the eclipse safely. Read more about protecting your eyes in the Resources section below.

Spicy Baked Potato

WAUSAU - As politicians from across the state descended on the event, the 49th Annual Possum Festival kept its down-home cultural heritage found in its celebration of the possum.

"It's family heritage," said 2018 Possum Queen Christie Carter, noting her mother was also once named queen.

"I just try to think back to the years behind me with my parents and the heritage they come from," she said, exposing the colored black crevices of her teeth that matched her costume. "And I try to embody and embrace that past and utilize that for the future generations through my act and my talent."

The festival is the city's largest event of the year. The funds from the event go toward the volunteer fire department and other community-based needs.

"It's more of an honor that the people would come out to support such a little town," said organizer Captain Adam Smith. "The name 'Possum Fest' is a funny name, but it means something to the community. This is who are, this is our heritage. The possum saved a lot of people's life back in the Depression."

BATON ROUGE, LA. LSU linebacker Taylor implicated in burglary

LSU has suspended sophomore linebacker Tylor Taylor, apparently after learning he'd been arrested about two months ago in connection with a firearms theft from a pawn shop in Georgia.

An official university statement says only that the suspension stems from a violation of team rules. However, police records in Cumming, Georgia, show that authorities suspect Taylor drove four suspected burglars to and from the pawn shop where the theft occurred on Jan. 8.

A police report provided to The Associated Press shows stolen firearms were recovered and a suspect told police that Taylor was the getaway driver. The report states that Taylor declined to speak with police and requested an attorney.

AUSTIN, TEXAS Council urged to approve stadium proposal

The owner of the Columbus Crew is urging the Austin City Council to approve a stadium plan as he explores moving his team from Ohio to Texas.

Anthony Precourt sent a letter to council members Thursday saying they have already negotiated one of the "most favorable" Major League Soccer stadium deals in the country with a proposal for a 20,000-seat privately funded facility on cityland. Precourt's letter to council members said "let's bring Major League Soccer to Austin."

Precourt has courted Austin since late 2017 in an effort to move one of MLS's bedrock franchises. The Crew was one of the league's founding teams when MLS began in 1996.

BERLIN Gold for Guliyev at European Championships

World champion Ramil Guliyev won the men's 200 meters at the European Athletics Championships on Thursday, and Elvira Herman of Belarus denied German hopes of gold in the women's 100-meter hurdles.

Turkey's Guliyev set a championship record of 19.76 seconds in beating Britain's Nethaneel Mitchell-Blake and Switzerland's Alex Wilson.

The 21-year-old Herman clocked 12.67 seconds to beat Olympic bronze medalist Pamela Dutkiewicz (12.72) and Cindy Roleder (12.77) - both of Germany - for her first medal at a major meet.

FSU QB Francois heads list of players returning from injury

Florida State quarterback Deondre Francois is happy to be playing football again and is trying to get his job back.

He's back on the practice field after injuring his knee in a season-opening loss to Alabama last fall and sitting out the rest of the year.

New Florida State coach Willie Taggart has said he hasn't set a timetable on naming a starter for the Sept. 3 opener against Virginia Tech. The coach is also looking at James Blackman, who filled in for an injured Francois last season, and redshirt freshman Bailey Hockman.

Francois welcomes the challenge. "I've been competing all my life," Francois said. "Last year was devastating with

the knee injury, but me being back is good. I'm in a better place. It took a toll on me, but I'm in a better place."

Francois wants to build on what he accomplished in 2016, when he threw for 3,350 yards and 20 touchdowns while helping the Seminoles earn an Orange Bowl victory.

He's one of several notable players coming back from injury. A list of players returning this year compiled by The Associated Press only includes players who missed at least half the season with season-ending injuries.

That disqualifies Washington offensive tackle Trey Adams and Michigan quarterback Shea Patterson, who played just over half the season last year. They both could have a major impact on their teams.

Since Middle Tennessee quarterback Brent Stockstill and Alabama linebacker Christian

Miller returned from injuries late last season, they are also not listed.

TENNESSEE OT Chance Hall, WR Jauan Jennings, S Todd Kelly Jr. and LB Darrin Kirkland Jr.

Injuries to key players played a major role in Tennessee's fall from the Top 25 to the SEC East cellar last season. Hall, Jennings, Kelly and Kirkland have 62 career starts between them, but they played a combined total of three games last season. Hall and Kirkland didn't play a single down due to knee injuries. Kelly, Tennessee's leading tackler in 2016, played just two games before a knee injury shut him down. Jennings, the Vols' second-leading receiver in 2016, injured his wrist in the 2017 opener. They're all practicing now.



back now and will try to boost a defense that must replace nine of its starters from last year. During the 2016 season, Reid started all 14 games in the secondary and also returned punts.

SOUTH CAROLINA WR Deebo Samuel

He scored six touchdowns in South Carolina's first three games last season before a broken leg knocked him out for the remainder of the season. Now he's back as a fifth-year senior. Samuel's six touchdowns last year came on three receptions, one run from scrimmage and two kick returns. He shared team MVP honors with quarterback Jake Bentley in 2016.



TOLEDO WR Cody Thompson

Thompson caught 64 passes for 1,269 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2016, and he was on pace for another 1,000-yard season last year until he got hurt. He collected 28 receptions for 537 yards and four touchdowns in five games before a leg



injury shut him down for the remainder of the season. The fifth-year senior has career totals of 133 catches for 2,665 yards and 20 touchdowns.



UCLA TE Caleb Wilson

Wilson had 38 catches for 490 yards in only five games last season before a foot injury shut him down for the rest of the year. He already has shown an ability to produce big numbers against high-profile opponents. Wilson had 15 receptions for 208 yards when UCLA came from behind to beat Texas A&M in the season opener. He caught 11 passes for 145 yards against Stanford.

TEXAS A&M S Donvan Wilson

He headed into last season as a defensive team captain, but Wilson broke his foot in the opening loss to UCLA and didn't play again. He's back as a fifth-year senior this fall and should play a big role in Texas A&M's secondary. He picked off five passes in 2015 and made 59 tackles in 2016.

EPL wasn't always a global beast

LONDON — Somerville, Massachusetts, 26 May, 1989. Answerphone message, Beep:

"It's your brother-in-law, Andre. Arsenal needed to win by two clear goals at Anfield to win the league and did it with almost the last kick of the match!"

And that tinny, brief and precious Trans-Atlantic message was how I found out in post-university U.S. exile how my North London team had its greatest moment since 1971, winning the First Division title at Liverpool, a team that had dominated the English game since the late 1970s.

It's now globally known as the English Premier League, a multi-billion-dollar behemoth that is ubiquitous outside the stadiums in which it is played, paying some of the most eye-watering wages to international household names - Manchester United's World Cup Winner, Paul Pogba, Arsenal's Mesut Ozil, Chelsea's Eden Hazard, Liverpool's Mohammed Salah and Manchester City's Sergio Agüero to name but a few of its biggest stars. The new season begins Friday and the hype is in overdrive.

And where does this marauding cash cow get its vast mountains of money? In Great Britain, Sky Sports and telecoms group BT pay nearly 5 billion pounds (\$6.43 billion) per season to the EPL to show live games. The league's 20 teams get a hefty cut, thus enabling huge wages for some superstars and also some extremely average players. In America, NBC has the broadcasting rights, for which it pays handsomely. A six-year contract through 2021-22 is worth about \$1 billion. Stateside, games are shown in designated bars, or, via cable, on a phone or tablet.

Time zones are a challenge: get up early in the U.S. for weekend matches, watch later at night in parts of Asia. Acceptable to have a drink at 7:30am Eastern Time at kick off? Probably not. At Noon for the early evening game across the pond? Sure.

Rewind to the early 1980s, the start of my time away from England in the U.S.

A weekly phone call home with my parents was the key source of football information, or perhaps "The New York Times" or "The Boston Globe" would deign to print half an inch of results buried deep in the Sunday Sports section.

Later in the same decade, the Columbia University library provided recent copies of the British newspaper "The Guardian" where I could devour match reports and neglect my graduate studies on languorous afternoons.


on how to love people and to trust the Lord's faithfulness regardless of their circumstances.
