Jurors say Wilson is guilty as charged

Sentencing Nov. 5 for former chief assistant state attorney

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PANAMA CITY — Former chief assistant State Attorney Greg Wilson faces sentencing Nov. 5 after being found guilty as charged Wednesday of helping two Bay County Jail inmates pass communications and lying about it in a cover-up attempt.

The verdict came less than two hours after the defense,

which nudged the edges of going against a court order to claim Wilson was targeted out of retaliation, finished its case and jurors began deliberating.

Wilson, 46, was found guilty Wednesday of felony possession of contraband within a detention facility and misdemeanor perjury. He was arrested in October 2017 after the Bay County Sheriff's Office discovered he had been helping two segregated Bay County Jail inmates — who are sisters and one of whom said she was in a relationship with Wilson at the time — pass "kites," or folded pieces of paper, while

incarcerated. Wilson then lied under oath when confronted by investigators about his role, not knowing that the exchange had been caught on video. Jurors spent about an hour and 45 minutes deliberating.

Wilson, former second-in-command at the State Attorney's Office, looked into the distance as the verdict was read aloud. He could face up to a combined six years in prison when he is sentenced Nov. 5 by Circuit Judge Michael Overstreet.

Homecoming changes cause concern

King eliminated, queen open to all

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CHIPLEY - Changes are coming to the homecoming ceremony at one local high school.

ChIPLEY High School Principal Kyle Newsom said the ceremony will go back to how it was traditionally - when there was no homecoming king and the competition for queen was open to the general senior student body.

"Football players are the only ones allowed to be king and the only ones allowed to choose who can take part in the court," Newsom said. But "I don't think it should be in the hands of a few football players."

"It's not fair to the girls that would like to take part, if they're not the most popular that the football players chose," he said.

Amanda Kay Cloud has some concerns that it may turn out to be reverse sexist. Her son Gabriel Cloud, a junior on varsity at CHS, relayed the changes to her after Newsom revealed them to the team.

BOCC approves final budget and millage

CHIPLEY - The Washington County Board of Commissioners approved the millage rate of 8.9735, which is 2.03 percent lower than the rolled back rate of 9.1592. Also approved was a \$29.2 million budget when the board met in regular session September 20.

The total budget, excluding the Sunny Hills and Oakwood Hills Municipal Service Benefit Unit (MSBU), is \$29,242,990. The MSBU budget is set at \$877,500.

Projected general fund expenditures and revenues balance is at \$14,449,347, with the largest revenue coming from \$7.5 million in ad valorem taxes.

The largest expenditure is for law enforcement, which is \$5.1 million, and includes the sheriff's office budget of \$2,575,819, and the remainder for the jail and ambulance service.

After the verdict, prosecutor Jack Campbell, state attorney of the Second Judicial Circuit, immediately asked the court to suspend Wilson from law practice and prevent him from having contact with the jail.

"I don't want to see him compromise the criminal justice system in any other way," Campbell told the court. "He needs to be shut down in practice."

Overstreet, though, was not willing to grant the request.

"If the Florida Bar believes his license should be suspended, that is incumbent upon them to take action," Overstreet responded. "I will not independently suspend his ability to practice, however, he will be prevented access to the jail."

Campbell had been brought in as the prosecutor after Wilson's former boss and political rival, Glenn Hess, recused himself and his office from the case.

Wilson worked at the SAO for seven years under Hess until an unsuccessful bid for top prosecutor in 2016. -- When asked after the trial if he had discovered a pattern of power abuses committed by Wilson possibly dating back to his time in the SAO, Campbell said the scope of his investigation only pertained to events surrounding a Sept. 13, 2017, videotaped exchange of a "kite" in the Bay County Jail.

Campbell told the jury that the investigation began with a fear that Wilson was helping to smuggle the medication "suboxone" into the jail for a client. It eventually

evolved into the case that he helped two inmates — sisters Clista Robbins and Christy White — pass notes within the jail. But Campbell made the case in his closing that this wasn't just about a note but more broadly about a person of prominence abusing his position.

"That's why this case is important," Campbell told jurors. "It stands for the premise that we who are charged with upholding the law must be forever accountable to the citizens. If it doesn't apply to me, who am I to enforce it against everyone else walking down the street?"

Despite a court order against arguing Wilson was targeted out of political retaliation, defense attorney Lisa Anderson repeatedly called the case a "ruse" in her closing argument and attempted to show law enforcement bias against him. She pointed to shifting jail policy on cellphones to demonstrate inconsistencies about what items were allowed inside. Anderson then broke down the investigation in an attempt to show Wilson was pursued on the premise of smuggling drugs into the jail and was arrested when law enforcement could not substantiate the

theory.

"This has been presented to you in a completely misleading way," Anderson told the jury. "They wanted you to see drugs throughout this entire thing. But there has not been one scintilla of proof about drugs. This has been their subterfuge in their bias against Greg Wilson."

However, Campbell responded that didn't change the evidence in the case. The jury agreed.

The case stemmed from an Aug. 14, 2017, recorded jailhouse call in which Robbins told Wilson in vague terms that she thought something was in her car — "if it's there, it's there," she said — and Wilson responded he would get rid of it. Due to the possession of prescription narcotics charges Robbins had been arrested on and the belief that she and Wilson had a romantic relationship, BCSO expanded its investigation.

It eventually led authorities to install video cameras — without audio capability — into an attorney interview room where they could video Wilson and his clients. Because BCSO consulted with Hess about the legality of the cameras in the confidential room, Wilson's defense attorneys attempted to argue

political retaliation played a factor in the decision. In the video captured in September 2017, though, Wilson furtively accepts a folded note from Robbins during one meeting and then passes it to White in a different meeting.

When questioned under oath about his actions, Wilson categorically denied the allegations as "absolutely false," even reciting his rights to himself at one point, but at that time he was not aware of the video. He was arrested about three weeks later.

In the moments before Wednesday's closing arguments, Overstreet instructed the jury about the elements of the law. He said that to prove the crime of contraband introduction, the prosecution had to show Wilson knew of the presence of an item, gave or received the item and that the item was a "written communication." Overstreet also gave jurors an option for a legitimate defense to consider.

"If you believe he used regular channels or had authorization from the sheriff or officer in charge, you should find (Wilson) not guilty," Overstreet said.

Wilson's defense attorneys, however, continued to pursue the case that he had been targeted in the case while Campbell argued the video of the exchange and the audio of his denial sealed Wilson's fate.

"He represents a breach at the Bay County Jail ... that began an investigation into drugs or whatever else it could've been," Campbell told the jury. "We haven't charged him with that because the first day we had the video, he committed a crime before our very eyes. And when confronted about it, he showed his true character and lied."

"I spoke to a few players who said that being able to walk the ladies at homecoming is like an honor to them," Cloud said. "The team works hard and plays hard and it is an event held on their field. So they feel it is wrong to exclude them."

The upcoming ceremony, to be held during the home game against Walton on Oct. 19 at 7 p.m., will include the court already chosen by the football players, as well as, two at-large queens chosen by the senior class. It's a compromise

Woman exploits elderly, charges \$60k on card

CHIPLEY - A 24-year-old Chipley woman has been arrested for taking advantage of an elderly woman and making unauthorized charges in the excess of \$60,000 on the victim's credit card.

According to a Washington County Sheriff's

Office news release, Julie Nichole Skipper was arrested Sept.

14 and booked into the Washington County jail on the charge of exploitation of an elderly person

\$20,000 to \$100,000, a second degree felony.

Skipper had made the unauthorized charges to the 86-year-old victim's credit card over the past two years, the release stated. During the investigation, Skipper told WCSO investigators that she used the card for personal use, which included

daily lunches, vaping oils, cigarettes, vehicle insurance, clothing, and toys.

Skipper stated that she realized, "it had gotten out of hand, but did not know to what extent," the release stated. Also,

investigators found Skipper had charged more than \$19,000 in a three and a half month time period.

Federal lawyers: Gulf oil spills worse than thought

GULF OF MEXICO - Federal government lawyers say a 14-year-old leak is releasing much more oil each day into the Gulf of Mexico than officials previously claimed, and it might be getting worse.

A Friday court filing in a case involving Taylor Energy Co. says 10,000 to 30,000 gallons daily is leaking from multiple wells around a drilling platform toppled by 2004's Hurricane Ivan.

That estimate is far above the 16,000 gallons of oil that the U.S. Coast Guard estimated in 2015 had been spotted in slicks over seven months.

The government cites a report it commissioned from a scientist who has studied satellite images of persistent oil slicks and sampled floating oil at the site about 10 miles offshore. That report also suggests that while the amount of leaking oil decreased after some wells were plugged in 2011, the leak might be getting bigger again.

"There has been an uptrend of the areas of the slick during the last two years," wrote Oscar Pineda-Garcia, who runs a company that maps oil spills and is an adjunct professor at Florida State University.

New Orleans-based Taylor said only 2 to 3 gallons was leaking daily out of mud on the seafloor. Spokesman Todd Ragusa said the company disputes the government's new estimate and will respond in court.

"The government's recent filing is completely contrary to the comprehensive, sound science acquired by world-renowned experts, including those regularly relied upon by the government," Ragusa wrote in an email to The Associated Press.

A 2015 AP investigation revealed evidence that the leak was worse than the company, or government, had publicly reported during their secretive response. Presented with AP's findings that year, the Coast Guard provided a new leak estimate that was about 20 times larger than one cited by the company in a 2015 court filing.

Friday's court filing also says Taylor and the Coast Guard met in August and discussed plugging more wells as part of an effort to eliminate the persistent oil sheen seen at the site. The wellheads are more than 400 feet underwater and buried under 60 to 100 feet of mud.

Taylor sued the government in January 2016 to recover millions of dollars it set aside for work to end the leak. The suit claims regulators violated a 2008 agreement

The company argued the government must return the remaining \$423 million.

The government's lawyers disagree, though, saying no change to the agreement has been made and the money should remain on deposit until the work is done.

"The trust requires - and has always required - that Taylor complete all of its decommissioning obligations before the trust can terminate. The United States' denial of Taylor's request for a release from its existing obligations does not constitute an imposition of a new obligation," the lawyers wrote.

Waves whipped up by

Ivan triggered an underwater mudslide that buried a cluster of oil wells under treacherous mounds of sediment. In 2011, the company finished drilling a series of "intervention wells" to plug nine of the wells.

Using Coast Guard pollution reports, West Virginia-based watchdog group SkyTruth estimated in December that between 855,000 gallons and almost 4 million gallons of oil spilled from the site between 2004 and 2017.

Garcia writes in his report that the oil is thick enough that people need to wear respirators because of fumes. He says bubbles of not just oil, but natural gas is reaching the surface, while his report shows pictures of thick, brown oil emulsions in some places.

Political climate means fewer good choices

With his popularity issues, legal troubles, personality and tweeting habits, President Donald Trump has provided voters with plenty of reasons to send more Democrats to Congress. And it doesn't help his cause that two of his most ardent supporters in Congress were recently indicted, or that roughly 40 GOP lawmakers have opted for leaving Congress over re-election, a move many see as fleeing a sinking ship.

Yet, while Democrats seem prepared to surf the supposed "blue wave" to power, some of their actions might reveal an undertow that sucks down the party's chances of seizing control.

Consider some questionable behavior by Democrats from just last month.

- During this week's confirmation hearings for Supreme Court nominee Judge Brett Kavanaugh, Sens. Cory Booker of New Jersey and Kamala Harris of California acted more like actors playing senators than actual senators. Harris dramatically grilled Kavanaugh over whether he had discussed Robert Mueller's investigation with lawyers from a firm that represents Trump, then dropped it when pressed for details. Meanwhile, Booker on Thursday made a spectacle by announcing he would risk expulsion from the Senate by defying rules against releasing confidential documents about Kavanaugh's work under President George W. Bush. It turned out that former Bush administration officials had cleared the documents for release on Wednesday night, as Booker had requested.

- Minnesota Congressman Keith Ellison won the Democratic primary for state attorney general despite claims of domestic abuse by an ex-girlfriend. Ellison denies the allegations, but Minnesota Republicans are highlighting that Democrats throughout the state, including candidates for Congress, have refused to criticize Ellison, even after liberals wholly embraced the #MeToo movement.

- New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo, who is running for re-election, said at a bill-signing ceremony, "We're not going to make America great again; it was never that great."

- Sen. Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts was asked by CNN about Mollie Tibbets, the Iowa college student who was kidnapped and murdered by an illegal immigrant in July. Warren answered that she felt sorry for Tibbets' family but that the nation needed an immigration system that "focuses on where real problems are."

- The New York Times took heat for hiring Sarah Jeong, who is Asian-American, as one of its editorial writers, despite her history of racist anti-white tweets. As the controversy broke, Democratic U.S. Sen. Brian Schatz of Hawaii issued his own tweet, saying "I'm with" Jeong.

- Hillary Clinton endorsed 11-year-old Mariana Taylor of Baltimore for kneeling during the Pledge of Allegiance, mimicking NFL players who do so during the national anthem to protest police violence against blacks. Clinton said Mariana, who is white, was courageous for kneeling to "protest injustice" and encouraged her to "keep up the good work."

Republicans have sufficient problems, beginning with Trump.

But as the Democratic Party drifts further leftward on social and economic matters, and with prominent Democrats coming out in favor of illegal immigrants, bigots, perpetual liars and disrespecting the flag, voters might rightfully ask which of these two evils is really the lesser.

Gentrification begets gentrification

Gentrification is a function of power, not natural law or economic inevitability. It occurs when wealthy, politically connected interests make decisions in closed-door meetings to take over the neighborhoods of people who have little money and power and thus no effective voice or recourse in the taking. The takers usually make a pretense of negotiating with longtime property owners. But it's a scam, for the developers hurl high-pressure, low-ball pitches at the locals, overpowering families who can't afford lawyers to go to bat for them.

Renters are worse off, rarely even getting fair notice that a Dickensian disruption is coming at them. Even if they've been integral members of the neighborhood for decades, the ousted tenants' rights to appeal are curtailed by economic and legal realities. The seriously skewed balance of power is exemplified by eviction courts, where up to 90 percent of tenants don't even have lawyers to represent them. In one of many recent examples here in Austin, more than 200 working-class families (including 121 children) were abruptly ejected from an affordable apartment complex two years ago. Their lives were thrown into a tailspin when the megadeveloper that bought the complex

summarily canceled their leases. In a backroom deal, the city had given special zoning exemptions that allowed the new corporate owner to bulldoze the long-standing family homes of these mostly Latinx residents and erect high-end luxury apartments on top of the detritus. Rents for these new, ritzy dwellings ran up to \$36,000 a year — way above the total annual income of most of the displaced families. As one tenant said of the brusque eviction: "We didn't have any way to stop them. They treated us like dirt. All they gave us was a kick in the a—."

Millions of middle-income families previously secure in homes they owned or rented have had to move out of their neighborhoods, and even out of their cities, because gentrification has drastically raised home prices, property taxes and rents. While it's obviously beneficial to have such essential community servants as teachers, police officers and firefighters live among the people they serve, who among them can afford it?

When one Oakland, California, school principal started teaching in 2001, the story was: Teachers are never going to afford a house. And now it's: Teachers can't afford an apartment. So the city's teachers have to move clear out of the county and face long, dispiriting commutes to

and from their classrooms.

And so it goes: Gentrification begets gentrification.

A survey by RENTCafe, a nationwide apartment-search website, found that 75 percent of all new apartment complexes built in the U.S. in 2015 were luxury developments, particularly in the South and Southeast, where 78 percent of all apartments were upscale, and in the Southwest and Mid-Atlantic, where the number reached an appalling 88 percent.

For poverty-income families, being gentrified out of an affordable space can mean more than a long commute. It often forces them to move into bad and dangerous housing, pay up to 70 percent of their monthly income for a place to live, face eviction (there were 2.3 million evicted in 2016, not counting the unofficial cases where landlords often simply lock tenants out), fall into deeper debt and poverty, and frequently end up homeless — living in their cars or on the street. The toll lands heavily on children since, according to Open Door Mission, they make up a third of Americans without homes — astonishingly, the average age of a homeless person is 9!

Resistance in the White House

The stories of chaos, craziness and betrayal going on inside the Trump White House are nothing to worry much about.

White House staffers attempting to influence, question or thwart a president's ideas or goals are as old as George Washington, Richard Nixon or Ronald Reagan.

As we've recently seen, it's just a lot easier today for un-named White House insiders to get their criticism or embarrassing stories instantly published.

But the New York Times

hit a new low in its war on Trump last week.

It published an anonymous op-ed piece written by a Trump adviser who claimed that he and some of his fellow White House "resistance" members were so concerned with the president's actions and mental state that they contemplated using the 25th Amendment to remove him.

Maybe it's all true. Maybe it's all BS. We'll find out the real story someday, but it's certainly not new.

After my father was shot in 1981, some of his top advisers were seriously worried about his mental stability.

According to Bill O'Reilly in "Killing Reagan," they considered using the 25th Amendment to remove him on grounds of mental incapacity and even gave him a test.

My father passed the test with flying colors and, according to the history books, did his job pretty well afterwards.

No one read about those concerns about his advisers had about his mental state in a New York Times op-ed piece as they were occurring.

Likewise, no one read about how he trumped his top advisers on his decision to invade Grenada.

When he called a White House meeting to vote on the idea, the final tally was 7-3 to not invade. My father was one of the three.

Two days later, the world woke up to see TV images of American forces capturing the island.

When one of his shocked advisers called and said, "Mr. President, I thought we had a vote and we decided not to go," my father said, "Yes, we did. But my vote cancelled your seven."

No one at the time read about that "fight" with his White House staff in the papers, just as they never learned how his advisers tried to prevent him from speaking two of his most famous lines.

They kept deleting "Mr. Gorbachev, tear down that wall" from his Berlin Wall speech and they also tried to stop him from referring to the Soviet Union as "the Evil Empire."

The most important "fight" my father had with his advisers came in 1986, however, when he met with Mikhail Gorbachev at the nuclear missile summit in Reykjavik.

Everyone in the liberal media desperately wanted him to sign a nuclear arms treaty with the USSR -- any treaty.

Lice Aren't Nice

You and your family may have had to deal with head lice — the itchy, microscopic insects that love human hair.

More kids are infested with head lice than ever before. Experts believe this is because kids are with other kids so much, in day care, classrooms and after-school activities. Experts think between 6 and 12 million American kids get head lice each year.

Let's get ahead of lice with some information about these little bloodsucking critters.

It's not about dirt

Some people believe that people who get lice are dirty. This is not true. In fact, it is just the opposite.

Lice like clean hair. It is harder for them to cling to dirty, oily hair.

Lice infest children more than adults. This is probably because kids have more contact with one another than adults do. They are more likely to come in contact with each other while playing, for example.

Girls are more likely to get lice than boys. Girls usually have longer hair, which means it may touch other hair more often.

What lice are

A louse is a type of insect with no wings. When there is only one, it is called a louse. More than one are called lice.

Different kinds of lice live on different kinds of hair. They don't usually move from one type to another.

For example, human head lice would not be happy living on your pet. They don't live on other body hair, either. They like fine hair that grows fairly close to other hairs.

What lice do

A louse is a type of parasite. A parasite is a plant or animal that lives in or on another living creature. This being is called a host. The parasite feeds off the host and gives nothing back. Some parasites may harm their hosts. Head lice do not harm humans.


Lice suck blood from the host's body. They need to feed every hour and a half.

The bloodsucking causes itching and irritation in the person infested with lice. People can sometimes feel the insects crawling through their hair.

A growing problem

A female louse may attach an oval-shaped egg to a person's hair about one-half inch from the scalp. That spot is where the best hatching temperature is.

The egg hatches after seven to 10 days. When an egg hatches, the empty louse egg is called a nit.

What to do

Lice are hard to get rid of. Lice products sold without a prescription will probably not get rid of all the lice on someone's hair. Head lice have probably developed resistance to these products.

If people get head lice, they may need a special shampoo from the doctor. They can also use a nit comb to remove nits and live lice. This treatment takes a lot of work.

The most important thing to do is to remove live lice and nits from the hair.

According to experts, it is not as important to wash all bedding, stuffed animals and clothing. Lice cannot usually live for more than 12 hours away from a person's hair.

Preventing lice

To avoid getting lice, try not to share hats, scarves, helmets or hairbrushes with other kids. At slumber parties or when playing, try not to have head-to-head contact with other kids. Lice can't fly, but they can move from one head to another.

Toasted Tortellini

You'll need:

- 12 ounces cheese-filled tortellini
- 1 cup pasta or pizza sauce of your choice

These metros have the best job opportunity in renewable energy

Clean energy in the form of wind, solar and hydroelectric power comprised 18 percent of all U.S. electricity production in 2017, up from 15 percent the prior year. In 2017, the solar industry alone employed nearly 100,000 U.S. workers,

up 20 percent from 2015, and today the wind and solar industries employ more than 300,000 Americans.

Many state and local governments are getting proactive about tapping into this burgeoning industry to develop their economies. Especially across America's heartland, where corn and wheat fields once dominated the landscape, local governments are sponsoring programs to build wind and solar farms next

door to the traditional ones. Using the ZipRecruiter Best Job Market Index, we dug into the metropolitan statistical areas that provide the best opportunity for employment in renewable energy. Then we leveraged multiple factors to determine the overall quality of life in these areas.

1. Springfield, Illinois

Of the nearly 200 metro areas included in our study, Springfield topped our list. This is undoubtedly the result of the state government's passage of the Future Energy Jobs Act in late 2016.

While still in its infancy, the bill has set aggressive goals for developing Illinois' renewable energy sector. The legislation promises to provide up to \$220 million per year through 2030 to develop wind, solar and hydroelectric facilities, which will create thousands of clean energy jobs. The act also requires Illinois utilities to get 25 percent of their retail energy from renewable sources by 2025.

In response to this requirement, clean energy developers have descended on areas surrounding Springfield to claim land for solar and wind farms. In the short term, this will

bring construction jobs to the area. It will also require electrical engineers, earth scientists, environmental experts and IT specialists to maintain and improve the facilities.

Costly venues from Pyeongchang Olympics may eventually be razed

SEOUL, South Korea — The Pyeongchang Winter Olympics closed seven months ago. Left behind are empty venues, feuding over who pays for upkeep, and an icy ski course that's now an abandoned dirt runway, strewn with rocks and unused gondolas.

Rare trees once stood before the course was gouged out of a mountainside, and plans called for replanting the piste and restoring the forest.

Other venues sit mostly deserted: a speed-skating arena, a hockey center, a bobsled track and a ski-jump. Meanwhile, host Gangwon province has failed to persuade the national government to pay for maintenance, which would save the province \$5.3 million annually.

The eventual solution may be simple: raze the costly venues. The possibility surfaces as four bidders try to land the 2026 Winter Games. Beijing has already been awarded the 2022 edition.

"Honestly, I can't think of any other way," said Sangho Yoon, a senior researcher at Seoul's Korea Economic Research Institute. "Whether it's the national government or regional government, somebody will have to pay. The history of past host cities isn't promising. Very few of them experienced a meaningful tourism bump after the Olympics."

South Korea spent about \$13 billion on preparing for and staging the Winter Olympics. It spent about \$110 million alone on the Pyeongchang Olympic stadium, a temporary structure demolished after the closing ceremony on Feb. 25.

Provincial officials cling to the dream of developing a ski resort to drive the economy in one of South Korea's poorest regions, reluctant to let Pyeongchang's legacy be defined by demolished venues.

The Pyeongchang Olympics were generally viewed as a success, though some venues lacked fans and atmosphere, and a doping scandal kept away many Russian athletes.

South Korea's central government has agreed to a six-month study by the Korea Development Institute before deciding on next steps. The result may simply

delay the inevitable, since the institute is run by South Korea's finance ministry.

Gangwon Governor Choi Moon-soon has floated the idea of co-hosting the 2021 Asian Winter Games with North Korea, which he says would mean keeping the facilities intact. But it's unclear whether North Korea is a feasible host.

On Wednesday, South Korean President Moon Jae-in and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un announced a sweeping set of agreements that also promised a joint bid to hold the 2032 Summer Olympics. No details were offered.

"If Gangwon insists on keeping the venues, it's much better to build plans around the 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing, presenting the region as a training ground for Olympic athletes before they head into China," said Yoon, the researcher. "You know that the Olympics will be held in Beijing, but you don't know what will happen with North Korea."

The International Olympic Committee blames Korean organizers for the costly unused venues, saying it repeatedly warned about building unneeded stadiums.

The IOC, however, has encouraged previous Olympic organizers to construct expensive arenas that are abandoned when the games end.

"We've never been shy to raise concerns about the legacy of some of the venues (in Pyeongchang) that we read about right now," Christophe Dubi, executive director of the Olympics Games, told The Associated Press.

Dubi said "on the positive side" that the Pyeongchang Olympics "would generate a profit."

A more accurate word is "surplus," and any surplus refers to the operating budget for running the games themselves, and not to the other spending typically needed to build venues, ready roads and

transportation, and then maintain empty venues.

This also overlooks so-called "opportunity costs" — what might have resulted if the billions spent on the Olympics were used for something else.

The Japanese city of Sapporo withdrew earlier this week from pursuing the 2026 Winter Olympics, citing a deadly earthquake that killed 41. Four bidders remain: Stockholm, Sweden; Calgary, Canada; Milan and Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy; Erzurum, Turkey.

In October, the IOC will select all — or some — to go forward with formal bids by February. The IOC will pick the winner in September next year.

Erzurum in eastern Turkey is the outlier, presenting new security challenges and veering from the IOC's desire to return to a "traditional" winter sports area after games in Sochi, Russia, and Pyeongchang.

The other three have pluses — and minuses.

"I can tell you for '26, we are ruthless on this: Don't even consider building a venue if there is not a 50-year legacy plan," Dubi said.

Stockholm has never held the Winter Olympics and would seem ideal, but the bid lacks clear government support. However, it will not require a public referendum to go forward.

Calgary, Winter Olympics host in 1988, will hold a non-binding referendum on Nov. 13. Referendums have killed a half-dozen Olympic bids in the last several years.

Turin, the host of the 2006 Winter Olympics, withdrew this week from a three-pronged Italian plan, leaving Milan and Cortina to salvage the bid.

Italy has struggled with recent Olympics bids. Rome withdrew from bids for the 2020 and 2024 Summer Olympics for political and financial reasons.

"The candidacy needs to be saved," representatives of the two Italian regions said in a joint statement.

Ball in Wolves' court in Butler saga

MIAMI — Jimmy Butler knows that NBA players can force their way into trades.

Forcing their way into a trade that suits the player, that's an entirely different story.

Butler has told the Minnesota Timberwolves that he has no intentions of re-signing with the club next summer, his way of saying "trade me now" or "lose me for nothing later." The Athletic first reported Butler's decision.

It's a power move that players can make.

Thing is, it comes with risk — because what happens next is not up to Butler.

This was the lesson learned from the Kawhi Leonard situation, from the Kyrie Irving situation, from the Paul George situation. Leonard supposedly was hoping for a trade from San Antonio to the Los Angeles Clippers. Irving wanted to be sent by Cleveland to either San Antonio and Miami. George was widely assumed to leave Indiana for the Los Angeles Lakers.

Leonard is in Toronto, at least for one season.

Irving got sent to Boston, and is a free agent next summer.

George landed in Oklahoma City, and probably will be there for years.

Not a whole lot of people saw those exact moves coming. But the teams did what was best for them. In all three cases, the Spurs, the Cavs and the Pacers got the best deal they could make.

Now it's Butler's turn.

It should be easy to deduce that Butler can see himself with the Clippers, New York or Brooklyn, since all of those teams will have the cap space to give him the \$140 million (or \$190 million) max contract he's seeking.

The Timberwolves can basically make any of the following decisions:

- Move Butler right away and start camp without distraction;
- Hang onto him for a while and see if he changes his mind;
- Work out a sign-and-trade;
- Make him play out the year.

Butler was their leading scorer last season. He's an All-Star. He helped them end a 14-year playoff drought. Losing him, no matter what they get back, wouldn't seem to help the Wolves' chances of returning to the playoffs in a still-loaded Western Conference.

Sometimes, even irreconcilable differences work out.

Awesome sauce

No-cook chimichurri can be made lots of ways and goes on anything

This time of year, I like to ask my vegetable-farmer friends what they are making for dinner. They generally have a lot of people to feed, many vegetables on hand, and not much time to prepare.

One recent response to that question was, "Massaged kale salad, cucumber feta salad, a bacon plate and roasted potatoes with chimichurri."

Perhaps the platter of bacon from home-grown pigs caught your attention, and deservedly so, but it was that last entry, chimichurried roast potatoes, that excited us both. He was excited because of a potato trick he'd learned from a fellow farmer that he wanted to share, and I was excited because of chimichurri — and farmer chimichurri no less, which promised to be a delicious way to eat lots of parsley.

I've since confirmed that his potatoes, which are golden on the outside and puffy like tater tots on the inside, are indeed something with that famous Argentine condiment and marinade. Chimichurri is a sauce for those who don't mind it rough, or an occasional burst of adrenaline at the table.

Red and green

While most chimichurri is green, it has a lesser-known relative in red chimichurri, which contains ripe tomatoes and peppers.

The red and green sides of chimichurri recall those two hues in other great condiments, like the New Mexican chile or Mexican hot sauce. But the red and green historical parallels to chimichurri that stand out to me are the Italian red and white clam sauces, so beloved by pasta enthusiasts. The so-called "white" version is actually green, and like chimichurri, both red and white clam sauces are parsley-based. The rest of the ingredients in the two sauces are similar as well, which is probably no coincidence. The Italian population in Argentina is large, and its influence is strong. Argentine chimichurri, thus, is a New World evolution of a Mediterranean invention.

Regardless of its origins, when you have chimichurri, you find yourself looking for things to put it on, or in. Marinate meat in it, stir it into beaten eggs before scrambling, toss it into salad or a bowl of linguine.

Or better yet, put it on potatoes that have been soaked and

roasted, farmer-style.

Whichever flavor and hue of chimichurri you ultimately concoct, the next day it will be even better, and the world will be yours to explore through the lens of chimichurri.

Farmer's Table Chimichurried Potatoes

Cut potatoes to 1-inch chunks or thereabouts, and soak in cold water for an hour. For a recent batch (pictured), I soaked thickly sliced purple carrots as well, which are more earthy and bitter than sweet carrots, and great for cooking.

Let the roots soak for 45 minutes. Meanwhile, make some chimichurri (recipes below).

Turn the oven to 415 degrees Fahrenheit. Drain the potatoes, add them to a baking pan, and toss with olive oil, salt, garlic powder and a little black pepper. It doesn't matter that the potatoes are wet at first; they will dry off. The carrots behave similarly to the potatoes, developing exterior crisp and molten interiors. Toss with the chimichurri of your choice and serve.

The first recipe comes from my Argentine friend Diego Grant, owner of Gauchito Catering in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Gauchito Chimichurri

- 1 bush flat leaf parsley
 - 1 head of garlic
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon pepper
- "All together, chop," he says. "Then ..."

- 1 cup olive oil
 - ½ cup red wine vinegar
- "After that, let rest all together for 15 minutes. When you have the flavors out, add ..."
- ½ cup oregano
 - ½ cup red chile flakes

You have now made chimichurri verde. To make it roja, add chopped tomatoes.

Blender Churri

Dissolve one teaspoon of coarse salt into a half-cup of water. Set aside.

Chop a head of garlic, two cups fresh parsley and ¼ cup fresh (or dried; the same amount works fine) oregano or marjoram, and add it all to a blender, along with 1 tablespoon crushed red pepper.

Blend. Then add ¼ cup red wine vinegar and then ½ cup olive oil. Finally, blend in the salt water.

To make a red version, add tomatoes, but don't over-blend it to a pink sludge. Visible tomato chunks should remain.

Chimichurraise, or Farmerchurri

Is it any surprise that combining mayonnaise with chimichurri further improves the potatoes, or anything else to which you might add it? Mix:

- 1 head of garlic, chopped
- 1 bunch parsley, chopped
- ¼ to ½ cup red wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Cilantro and mayonnaise to taste

FLEUR DE LOLLY

Use last of summer's bounty for vegetable soup

When I was growing up, my family always had large summer gardens. My mother spent the majority of her summers (no air conditioning!) in the kitchen, with hours spent canning and freezing the vegetables my dad had grown.

After my mother had finished the weeks of canning dozens of quarts of the garden's bounty, she would save enough of the various vegetables to combine as canned soup for the cold winter months ahead.

I've added chicken to my version. However, you can certainly omit the chicken and substitute vegetable stock if you prefer a

totally vegetable soup.

Chicken Vegetable Soup

You can prepare the soup strictly from scratch, or you can use a rotisserie chicken from the grocery and store-bought chicken stock. If you choose that method, you'll need about 3 to 4 cups of shredded chicken and 6 cups of chicken stock. As for the vegetables, feel free to use either fresh or frozen, or a mixture of the two.

- 2 pounds chicken breasts or mixture of light and dark meat
- 6 cups of water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 large yellow onion, chopped
- 1 large green bell pepper, chopped
- 3 medium carrots, chopped
- 2 celery stalks, chopped (include some of the leafy greens)

- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1 quart diced tomatoes with juice
- 1 cup peas (my preference is Mississippi Silver Hull)
- 2 cups corn kernels
- 2 cups sliced okra pods
- 2 cup green beans, cut into 1-inch lengths
- 5 potatoes, peeled and chopped
- Salt
- Pepper
- 1 tablespoon dried thyme
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Using a 6-quart Dutch oven, add the chicken and cover with water. Add salt, pepper and butter. Over medium-high heat, bring to a boil. Reduce to simmer for about 45 to 60 minutes. Remove the chicken and set aside to cool. Strain liquid and add back to the Dutch oven. Shred chicken into bite-size pieces and add to the broth. Continue to simmer over low heat.

Heat olive oil in large skillet over medium-high heat. Sauté onion,

bell pepper, carrots and celery until softened, about 5 minutes. Add the garlic and let it cook for a minute.

Add the tomatoes to the simmering broth along with the sautéed vegetables. Bring back to a simmer and add the remaining vegetables, salt and pepper to taste, thyme and Worcestershire. Add additional stock if needed.

Simmer until potatoes are tender. Taste and adjust seasonings.
