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Unemployment rates continue to drop

WASHINGTON COUNTY - Washington County is steadily holding down its unemployment rate.

While the state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for August was the same as July and

down .3 of a percentage point from a year ago, Washington County saw a .3 decrease from July and a .6 percentage point lower a year ago.

According to CareerSource Chipola jobless rate report, the region, which also includes Calhoun, Holmes, Jackson and Liberty counties, unemployment rate went from a rate of 4.0 from 4.4 last month and 4.7

a year ago.

Liberty County saw the greatest improvement from a year ago, decreasing its unemployment rate by an entire point.

In the region, there were 1,626 unemployed residents out of a labor force of 41,278, the report stated. The state gained 220,200 jobs over the year, which is an increase of 2.6 percent.

WASHINGTON COUNTY - Critical life-saving training was at the top of the list when Vernon, Wausau and Washington County Volunteer Fire Departments came together for extraction training on September 15.

Training that Washington County Fire Coordinator Rick Kerr says is essential to providing the best care and service possible.

"This is just another tool in the tool bag," said Kerr. "Being able to extract a patient from a car without causing further injury is an art, we need to train regularly to keep our skills sharp."

The departments came together to train with the Jaws of Life and an airbag system.

The Jaws of Life can be used to pop open doors, cut away pieces of metal that are trapping a patient or to make room to access the patient.

The airbag system is designed to lift the vehicle off of a patient or to lift it to make room for straps should

the vehicle need to be pulled from a location.

Although the departments don't make use of the Jaws of Life regularly, the need for working knowledge is great.

"We don't cut unless the car is on fire," said Kerr. "Emergency Medical Services usually does the cutting since they are on scene first and can see to the critical patient care.

If we make it before then, then we will give Basic Life Support until they arrive and stabilize the patient."

This is monumental

training that hasn't taken place in several years. Most departments don't train with others, that is what makes this huge, according to Kerr. All departments will be on one accord.

The personnel gained working knowledge of other department's equipment making it possible for all to work together should the need arise.

The next training is set for late October.

Kerr thanked Mike Jones Salvage and Towing in Graceville for providing the vehicles for the training.

Don't touch the Second Amendment

The ongoing debate over guns in America has led some to vociferously call for abolishing the Second Amendment.

That's just not wise thinking. There are common-sense restrictions on guns that fall within the scope of the Second Amendment.

So there's no need to even consider abolishing it.

Nevertheless, calls for abolishing the Second Amendment are coming from such respected figures like retired Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens.

And a new poll shows about 20 percent of Americans favor repealing the Second Amendment.

In reality, that probably shouldn't be a surprising statistic.

There are actually Americans, after all, who regularly support restrictions on speech that would not be allowed under the First Amendment. So, of course, there will always be a fringe minority out there yapping for scrapping the Second Amendment.

Or the Third Amendment.
Or the Fourth Amendment.

You get the point. Fortunately, the anti-Second Amendment extremists have little support in Washington; even blue-state Democrats like Sen. Dianne Feinstein of California have made clear they support gun ownership for self-defense and hunting.

What's even more striking is that noted, liberal-leaning Harvard law professor Laurence Tribe also has dismissed the campaign to abolish the Second Amendment.

In a piece for The Washington Post, Tribe wrote that the Second Amendment isn't the problem; in fact, Tribe declared, repealing the Second Amendment would not limit a single gun or enact a single regulation.

The fact is abolishing the Second Amendment isn't necessary because the Supreme Court already set some reasonable parameters.

In the Supreme Court's historic 2008 Heller decision that underlined an individual's right to bear arms, the court also noted that right wasn't unlimited — and that certain classes of “dangerous and unusual” weapons could be limited.

The court also has allowed limits on assault weapons, large magazines and the number of weapons that can be stockpiled.

That's why instead of abolishing the Second Amendment, the focus should be on reducing the ability of Americans to use military-style weapons to kill innocent fellow citizens.

The focus also should be on restricting the ability of mentally ill people — and those with histories of domestic violence — to have easy access to firearms; clearly more safeguards must be built in to immediately “red-flag” such Americans whenever they try to purchase weapons.

There is certainly widespread support for that kind of proactive approach.

Gun advocates like to criticize the 1994 ban on assault weapons for its emphasis on cosmetic features; they deride it as a naive and unrealistic law designed by people who know nothing about guns.

In an opinion piece, Palm Beach County criminologist Thomas Gabor said such poor standards of definition have undermined attempts to strictly regulate assault weapons because “the gun industry can easily make cosmetic modifications to skirt the regulation.”

Bert and Ernie Supposed to Teach ABCs, not LGBTQ

Bert and Ernie are not gay. That I even have to say this is the problem, not the actual fact that they aren't.

This week, long-time Sesame Street writer Mark Saltzman revealed that he wrote Bert and Ernie's relationship as that of "a loving couple" and based it on his own relationship with film editor Arnold Glassman.

Soon after, Sesame Workshop took to Twitter with a denial — not just of Bert and Ernie's romantic relationship but of the very concept of sexual orientation for puppets. I'm with them.

It always seemed evident to me that Bert and Ernie were not gay because of the way they dressed. Clearly, neither of them would have fit in on Queer Eye for the Straight Guy. (Though Kermit might be the Muppet most likely to be the target of a questionable #MeToo accusation from you-know-who.)

Have I offended you with the non-PC references yet? Christine, how dare you suggest that gay men must be well-dressed?

And that not-so-veiled reference to Miss Piggy and the possibility that she'd lie? How dare you! Puppets must be believed!

I'm obviously joking. Frankly, I find it easier to laugh about the topic than to take it seriously. Of course, Bert and Ernie aren't gay. They're just sweet, nebbish little animated socks who had to split the rent on a fourth-floor walk-up.

But these days, we need to worry about the backstories and implications of everything, from Supreme Court nominees to animated socks.

There is no question that Sesame Street has been on the cutting edge of diversity and inclusivity since the beginning. Over the years, the show included characters that reflect different demographics, such as Julia the autistic Muppet, and Muppets who had accents (other than the Count because there isn't a huge lobby for Transylvanians in the U.S.) and Muppets whose parents were divorced. From the beginning, the human characters, such as Maria and Gordon and Mr. Hooper, were of different ethnicities, and some of the vignettes were in Spanish, which was very exotic for 1969, when the show started. Teaching kids from an early age that everything and everyone has value is, unquestionably, one of the most positive lessons Sesame Street can impart on its viewers.

But Sesame Street is not — and should not be — in the business of helping kids explore their sexuality. It's always been a show geared to the youngest of the young, the toddler set who were too tiny to really understand sex at all. No 3- or 4- or 5-year-old should have to deal with a topic that will cause them decades of angst later in life.

Children shouldn't be forced to acknowledge their sexuality as toddlers. That's not a burden that should be placed on their young shoulders. I call it "burden" not because we should have a negative view of different forms of sexuality, but because children should not have to think about those concepts while trying to figure out what number comes after "7" or what letter comes after "K."

I'm tired of adults turning childhood into some version of The Real Housewives of Sesame Street. Reality is a good thing, but children should be able to suspend it for the first few, sweet years. Making Bert and Ernie's sexual orientation an issue deprives Sesame Street's prime audience of living an unencumbered childhood.

The creator of the Muppets, Frank Oz, has denied that the pair are gay.

The LGBTQ community is angry.

To that I say, just wait. The kids will learn about those other letters soon enough.

An Influx of Foreign Doctors, but Qualified Americans Shut Out

Last month, the American Medical Association issued a press release that urged U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services to process more H-1B visas, thereby allowing more nonresident physicians to come to the United States to practice medicine. The AMA claimed that a shortage of nonresident physicians who help fill care gaps in medically underserved regions diminishes overall patient care.

In a letter to USCIS Director Francis Cissna, AMA CEO James L. Madara said that the fixed per country caps which govern H-1B visa issuance keep the agency from processing enough petitions. The AMA, citing data from the Association of American Medical Colleges, concluded that the nation had

a physician shortfall of nearly 20,000 in 2016. And since all pleas for more special interest, employment-based visas routinely include doomsday forecasts for future decades, the AMA predicted that by 2030 the shortage will increase to between 42,600 and 121,300.

But ample evidence exists that the AMA doesn't need to lobby for foreign-born doctors. Thousands of American medical school graduates are eager for the opportunity to practice their life-saving profession.

In 2018, nearly 1,100 U.S. medical school seniors and more than 800 previous U.S. graduates did not match to a residency at a teaching hospital. Without fulfilling a residency, the doctors can't practice medicine.

The National Resident Matching Program data reveals that from 2011 to 2018, 8,218 U.S. seniors did not matriculate into residency training. During that same period, 27,866 foreign-trained physicians, non-U.S. international medical graduates (IMGs) on H-1B and J-1 visas

were selected for residencies. Although an impressive 94 percent of U.S. citizen medical graduates do match, the six percent that don't translates to hundreds of individuals who have many years and hundreds of thousands of dollars invested in their extended medical education, but can't find a job.

For those that don't match immediately post-graduation, they can reapply for a residency slot. But the longer they're out of medical school without a residency, the more difficult their chances of success are.

Taxpayers subsidize non-U.S. medical school graduates. Federal Medicare funding underwrites residency training positions for about 3,700 non-U.S. IMGs annually. Reducing the number of IMGs who receive residencies would help U.S.-trained physicians get a fair shot at a job. The goal, then, isn't to eliminate foreign doctors altogether, but rather to put U.S.-educated physicians at the head of the line for coveted residencies.



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Probation search recovers drugs

CHIPLEY - Two Chipley residents were arrested on a number of charges related to drugs and violation of state probation.

Angela K. Anderson, 44, and Rodney G. Anderson, 44, were arrested following a probation search at the residence of 856 Second Street, a Chipley Police Department news release stated. The search, which was carried out in partnership with Florida Department of Correction State Probation Office, led investigators to find glass pipes containing methamphetamine, several small bags containing methamphetamine residue, digital scales, marijuana smoking

pipes, a small bag of marijuana and marijuana blunt and a box of live shotgun shells.

Both suspects are currently on state probation for past drug and driving while license are suspended or revoke charges, the CPD release stated. Their charges are as follows: violation of probation, felon in possession of ammunition, possession of marijuana less than 20 grams and drug paraphernalia.

Laws on PTSD benefits, animal abuse set to take effect

TALLAHASSEE - Laws will take effect next week that will add benefits for first responders who suffer post-traumatic stress disorder and impose harsher penalties on people who abuse animals, along with 19 other measures signed by Gov. Rick Scott after the 2018 legislative session.

The laws taking effect Oct. 1 range from allowing credit cards to be used for background checks when firearms are purchased to doling out tougher punishment for people who steal bee colonies or trespass at airports.

Most laws crafted during the legislative session, including the state's \$88.7 billion budget, hit the books on July 1. But others had later "effective" dates.

The change for first responders (SB 376) would expand workers' compensation insurance benefits for firefighters, police officers, paramedics and emergency-medical technicians who suffer from PTSD.

The office of state Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis, who has started running a campaign ad that highlights his support for the law, announced last week the launch of training materials for first responders on PTSD.

"We've heard terrible stories about the impact tragedies like Pulse, Parkland and most recently Jacksonville Landing, have on our first responders and their families," Patronis, whose job includes serving as state fire marshal, said in a statement. "The training is an important step needed to help our first responders."

According to a 2015 article published in the Journal of Emergency Medical Services, 6.6 percent of 4,000 first responders

surveyed had attempted suicide, which is more than 10 times the rate in the general population.

Under the new law, first responders who have witnessed the death of a minor or witnessed a death that involved "grievous bodily harm of a nature that shocks the conscience" can file workers' compensation claims for lost wages.

The new law is expected to increase workers' compensation costs for cities and counties that employ first responders by upward of \$7 million, according to the National Council on Compensation Insurance.

Another new law (SB 1576) taking effect next week stems from the beating death last year of a 9-month-old Labrador retriever puppy in Volusia County.

The new law, named "Ponce's Law" after the puppy, will allow judges to bar people convicted of animal cruelty from owning pets. The legislation also increases the severity ranking of animal-abuse related crimes, making it more likely that offenders would go to jail upon conviction.

Kate MacFall with the Humane Society of the United States hopes the new law will allow judges to make sure people who mistreat animals are not allowed to repeat the cycle of abuse.

"It gives that judge discretion to say they can't have any contact with animals during their probation," MacFall said. "It clarifies that and gives the judge the authority to have that as part of the sentencing, so that the criminal cannot have contact with animals during their probation."

In addition to dealing with animal cruelty, the new law also creates policies and procedures for animal shelters to use following natural disasters, such as

hurricanes, to return lost pets to their owners.

"It puts more teeth into it. It stiffens the penalty for people who abuse animals," MacFall said. "Who wouldn't support that? This all came from a dog named Ponce, that was beaten to death last year. It was a horrific tragedy."

Other new laws going into place on Oct. 1:

--- HB 55, allows people buying guns to use credit cards to pay for background checks. They have been required in the past to pay with personal checks, money orders or cashier's checks.

--- HB 135, allows deaf people to voluntarily identify themselves as hearing-impaired when they register vehicles. The idea, which came from a Tallahassee police officer whose son is deaf, is intended to prevent communications issues with deaf drivers that could inadvertently lead to confrontations.

--- HB 523, increases penalties to a third-degree felony for people who trespass on airport property to injure other people, damage property or impede the operations of aircraft. The bill is in reaction to instances since 2014 of people getting on property at Florida airports, including Orlando International, Tampa International and Miami International.

--- HB 961, allows businesses such as bars to receive up to 10 cases of branded glassware --- 24 glasses per container --- a year from brewers or importers. Supporters of the "beer glass" bill maintained that the change would allow small businesses to save on the cost of glassware. But a number of craft brewers opposed the measure, arguing it would allow a small number of brewers who could afford the costs to flood the market with company-branded glassware.

One arrested after man hospitalized

CHIPLEY - A 26-year-old Chipley man was arrested last week after reportedly striking a man in the head with a wooden club.

Jesse Dylan McKinney, 26, of Chipley, was jailed on suspicion of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon after Washington County Sheriff's Office responded to a report of a physical disturbance at a residence on Caroline Drive on Sunday afternoon.

According to a news release from WCSO, the caller advised dispatchers that a man was struck in the head and was conscious but not moving at the time. When deputies arrived on scene, the injured man could tell the

deputy that he needed help now because he was "barely hanging on."

In attempts to stabilize the man, deputies assisted Washington County EMS as they transported him to a nearby hospital, the release stated.

McKinney was booked into the Washington County Jail, according to the report.




PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS AND REVISIONS FOR THE 2018 GENERAL ELECTION

I. Ken Detzner, Secretary of State for Florida, do hereby give notice that the following proposed amendments and revisions to the Florida Constitution will be presented in each county on the 2018 General Election ballot.

The language for these amendments may also be found at FloridaPublicNotices.com, at DOS.Elections.MyFlorida.com/initiatives, and at this newspaper's website.

NO. 1 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE VI, SECTION 6 ARTICLE XII, SECTION 37

BALLOT TITLE: Increased Homestead Property Tax Exemption

BALLOT SUMMARY: Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to increase the homestead exemption by extending the assessed valuation of homesteaded property greater than \$100,000 and up to \$125,000 for all levies other than school district levies. The amendment shall take effect January 1, 2019.

FULL TEXT: ARTICLE VII FINANCE AND TAXATION SECTION 6. Homestead exemption.—

(1) Every person who owns legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains therein the permanent residence of the owner, or another legal or naturally dependent upon the owner, shall be exempt from taxation thereon, except assessments for school district levies, for the assessed valuation of twenty-five thousand dollars and, for all levies other than school district levies, on the assessed valuation greater than fifty thousand dollars and up to seventy-five thousand dollars, and on the assessed valuation greater than one hundred thousand dollars for all levies other than twenty-five thousand dollars upon establishment of that tier in the manner prescribed by law. The real estate may be held by legal or equitable title, by the entireties, jointly, in common, as a condominium, or indirectly by stock ownership or membership representing the owner's or member's proprietary interest in a corporation owning a fee or a leasehold initially in excess of ninety-eight years. The exemption shall not apply with respect to any assessment of real property that has been established in compliance with the provisions of section 4 of a state agency designated by general law. This exemption is repealed on the effective date of any amendment to this Article which provides for the assessment of homesteaded property at less than just value.

(2) Not more than one homestead exemption shall be allowed any individual or family unit or with respect to any residential unit. No exemption shall exceed the value of the real estate assessable to the owner or, in case of ownership through stock or membership in a corporation, the value of the proportion which the interest in the corporation bears to the assessed value of the property.

(3) By general law and subject to conditions specified therein, the Legislature may provide to renters, who are permanent residents, an ad valorem rate on all ad valorem tax levies. Such ad valorem tax relief shall be in the form and amount established by general law.

(4) The legislature may, by general law, allow counties or municipalities, for the purpose of their respective tax levies and subject to the approval of the Florida cabinet, to grant either or both of the following additional homestead tax exemptions:

(a) An exemption not exceeding fifty thousand dollars to a person who has the legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains therein the permanent residence of the owner, or another legal or naturally dependent upon the owner, who has attained age sixty-five, and whose household income, as defined by general law, does not exceed twenty thousand dollars or;

(b) An exemption equal to the assessed value of the property to a person who has the legal or equitable title to real estate with a just value less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, as determined in the first tax year that the owner applies and is eligible for the exemption, and who has maintained therein the permanent residence of the owner for not less than twenty-five years, and who has attained age sixty-five, and whose household income does not exceed the income limitation prescribed in paragraph (1).

(5) The general law shall allow counties and municipalities to grant the additional exemptions in the manner prescribed in this subsection, by ordinance adopted in the manner prescribed by general law, and must provide for the periodic adjustment of the income limitation prescribed in this subsection for changes in the cost of living.

(6) Each veteran who is age 65 or older who is partially or totally permanently disabled shall receive a discount from the amount of the ad valorem tax otherwise owed on homesteaded property the veteran owns and resides in if the disability is a result of the veteran who was honorably discharged upon separation from military service. The discount shall be in a percentage equal to the percentage of the veteran's permanent, service-connected disability as determined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs. If the veteran is not a member of the subsection, an applicant must submit to the county property appraiser, by March 1, an official letter from the United States Department of Veterans Affairs stating the percentage of the veteran's service-connected disability as determined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, a copy of the veteran's discharge, if the property appraiser denies the request for a discount, the appraiser must notify the applicant in writing of the reasons for denial, and the veteran may reapply. The Legislature may, by general law, waive the annual application requirement in subsequent years. This subsection is self-executing and does not require implementing legislation.

(7) By general law and subject to conditions and limitations specified therein, the Legislature may provide ad valorem tax relief equal to the total amount or a portion of the ad valorem tax otherwise owed on homesteaded property to:

(a) The surviving spouse of a veteran who died from service-connected injuries or illness while on duty as a member of the United States Armed Forces;

(b) The surviving spouse of a first responder who died in the line of duty;

(c) A first responder who is totally and permanently disabled as a result of an injury or illness sustained in the line of duty. Causal connection between a disability and service in the line of duty shall not be presumed but must be determined as provided by general law. For purposes of this paragraph, "total and permanent disability" means a chronic condition, chronic disease, unless the injury sustained in the line of duty was the sole cause of the chronic condition or chronic disease.

As used in this subsection and as further defined by general law, the terms "first responder" means a firefighter, an emergency medical technician, a paramedic, and the term "in the line of duty" means arising out of and in the actual performance of duty required by employment as a first responder.

ARTICLE XII SCHEDULE SECTION 37. Increased homestead exemption.—

(1) The amendment to section 6 of Article VII increasing the homestead exemption by extending the assessed valuation of homesteaded property greater than \$100,000 and up to \$125,000 for all levies other than school district levies shall take effect January 1, 2019.

NO. 2 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE XII, SECTION 27

BALLOT TITLE: Limitations on Property Tax Assessments

BALLOT SUMMARY: Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to permanently retain provisions currently in effect, which limit property tax assessment increases on specified nonhomesteaded real property, except for school district levies, to 10 percent each year. If approved, the amendment removes the scheduled repeal of such provisions in 2019 and shall take effect January 1, 2019.

FULL TEXT: ARTICLE XII SCHEDULE SECTION 27. Property tax exemptions and limitations on property tax assessments.—

(1) The amendments to Sections 3, 4, and 6 of Article VII, providing a 25% exemption for tangible personal property, providing an additional \$25,000 homestead exemption, authorizing transfer of the accrued benefit from the limitations on the assessment of homesteaded property, and section 6 of Article VII, providing for the sale for approval or rejection at a special election authorized by law to be held on January 29, 2008, shall take effect upon approval by the electors and shall operate retroactively to January 1, 2008, if approved at the general election held in November of 2018. Sections 3, 4, and 6 of Article VII are repealed effective January 1, 2019, however, the Legislature shall, by joint resolution, propose an amendment to the Constitution to extend the effective date of sections 3, 4, and 6 of Article VII to the date of the general election held in November of 2018 and, if approved, shall take effect January 1, 2019.

NO. 3 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE X, SECTION 29

BALLOT TITLE: Voter Control of Gambling in Florida

BALLOT SUMMARY: The amendment clarifies that Florida voters shall have the exclusive right to decide whether to authorize casino gambling by requiring that in order for casino gambling to be authorized under Florida law, it must be approved by Florida voters pursuant to Article XI, Section 3 of the Florida Constitution. The amendment does not conflict with federal law regarding state/casino compacts.

FINANCIAL IMPACT STATEMENT: The amendment's impact on state and local government revenues and costs, if any, cannot be determined at this time because of its unknown effect on gambling operations that have not been approved by voters through constitutional amendment proposed by a citizens initiative petition process.

FULL TEXT: ARTICLE I. FLORIDA CONSTITUTION is amended to include the following new section:

Voter Control of Gambling in Florida

(1) This amendment ensures that Florida voters shall have the exclusive right to decide whether to authorize casino gambling by requiring that in order for casino gambling to be authorized under Florida law, it must be approved by Florida voters pursuant to Article XI, Section 3 of the Florida Constitution. This amendment does not conflict with federal law regarding state/casino compacts.

gaming) includes any electronic gambling devices, simulated gambling devices, video lottery devices, internet sweepstakes devices, and any other form of electronic or digital gambling device, including any computer, tablet, machine, or casino-style game, regardless of how such devices are defined under GFLA. NO. 4 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE VI, SECTION 4

BALLOT TITLE: Voting Restoration Amendment

BALLOT SUMMARY: The amendment extends the voting rights of Floridians with felony convictions after they complete all terms of their sentence including parole or probation. The amendment would not apply to those convicted of murder or sexual offenses, who would continue to be permanently barred from voting unless the Governor, by general law, set voter voting rights on a case by case basis.

FINANCIAL IMPACT STATEMENT: The precise effect of the amendment on state and local government revenues cannot be determined, but the operation of current voter registration laws, combined with an increased number of felons registering to vote will produce higher overall costs relative to the processes in place today. The impact on revenues from the amendment cannot be determined. The fiscal impact of any future legislation that implements a different process cannot be reasonably determined.

FULL TEXT: ARTICLE VI, Section 4. Disqualifications.—

(a) No person convicted of a felony, or adjudicated in any other state to be mentally incompetent, shall be qualified to vote or hold office until restoration of civil rights or removal of disability, except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, any disqualification from voting arising from a felony conviction shall terminate and voting rights shall be restored upon completion of all terms of sentencing including parole or probation.

(b) No person convicted of murder or a felony sexual offense shall be qualified to vote until restoration of civil rights.

(c) No person may appear on the ballot for re-election to any of the following offices:

(1) Florida representative;

(2) Florida senator;

(3) Florida Lieutenant governor;

(4) Any office of the Florida cabinet;

(5) U.S. Representative from Florida;

(6) U.S. Senator from Florida

if, by the end of the current term of office, the person will have served for eight consecutive years.

NO. 5 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE VII, SECTION 19

BALLOT TITLE: Super majority Vote Required to Impose, Authorize, or Raise State Taxes or Fees

BALLOT SUMMARY: Prohibits the legislature from imposing, authorizing, or raising a state tax or fee except through legislation approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature in a bill containing no other subject. This proposal does not authorize a state tax or fee otherwise prohibited by the Constitution and does not apply to taxes imposed or authorized to be imposed by a county, municipality, school board, or special district.

FULL TEXT: ARTICLE VII FINANCE AND TAXATION SECTION 19. Supermajority vote required to impose, authorize, or raise state taxes or fees.—

(a) SUPERMAJORITY VOTE REQUIRED TO IMPOSE OR AUTHORIZE NEW STATE TAX OR FEE. No new state tax or fee may be imposed or authorized by the legislature except through legislation approved by two-thirds of the membership of each house of the legislature and presented to the Governor for approval pursuant to Article III, Section 1.

(b) SUPERMAJORITY VOTE REQUIRED TO RAISE STATE TAXES OR FEES. No state tax or fee may be raised by the Legislature except through legislation approved by two-thirds of the membership of each house of the legislature and presented to the Governor for approval pursuant to Article III, Section 1.

(c) APPLICABILITY. This section does not authorize the imposition of any state tax or fee otherwise prohibited by this Constitution, and does not apply to any tax or fee imposed by, or authorized to be imposed by, a county, municipality, school board, or special district.

(d) DEFINITIONS. As used in this section, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

(1) "Imposes, authorizes, or raises" means any change of payment required by law, including any tax, service fee, or cost for licenses, and charges for services;

(2) "Raise" means:

a. To increase or authorize an increase in the rate of a state tax or fee imposed or authorized by law; or

b. To increase or authorize an increase in the amount of a state tax or fee imposed on a flat or fixed amount basis; or

c. To increase or eliminate a state tax or fee exemption.

(e) STATE-SUBJECT. A state tax or fee imposed, authorized, or raised under this section must be contained in a separate bill that contains no other subject.

NO. 6 CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION ARTICLE I, SECTION 16 ARTICLE V, SECTIONS 8 AND 21 ARTICLE XII, NEW SECTION

BALLOT TITLE: Rights of Crime Victims; Judges

BALLOT SUMMARY: Creates constitutional rights for victims of crime; requires courts to facilitate victims' rights; authorizes victims to enforce their rights throughout criminal and juvenile justice process; and requires judges and hearing officers to independently interpret statutes and rules rather than deferring to government agency's interpretation. Judges mandating retirement age of state justices and raises from seventy to seventy-five years; delegates authorization to complete a term if one-half of term has been served by retirement age.

FULL TEXT: ARTICLE I DECLARATION OF RIGHTS SECTION 16. Rights of accused and of victims.—

(a) In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall, upon demand, be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, and shall have the assistance of counsel and shall have the right to confront and have compulsory process for witnesses, to confront at trial adverse witnesses, to be heard in person, by counsel or both, and to have a speedy and public trial by impartial jury in the county where the crime was committed, if the crime is not limited to the county or information may charge venue in two or more counties conjunctively, and proof that the crime was committed in that area shall be sufficient; but before pleading the accused may elect to be tried in any other county the trial will take place. Venue for prosecution of crimes committed beyond the boundaries of the state shall be fixed by law.

(b) To preserve and protect the right of crime victims to achieve justice, assure a meaningful role throughout the criminal and juvenile justice process, and ensure that crime victims' rights and interests are respected and protected by law in a manner no less vigorous than protections afforded to criminal defendants and juvenile delinquents, every victim is entitled to the following rights at the time of the trial or sentencing:

(1) The right to due process and to be treated with fairness and respect for the victim's dignity;

(2) The right to be free from intimidation, harassment, and abuse;

(3) The right, within the judicial process, to be reasonably protected from the accused and any person acting on behalf of the accused. However, nothing contained herein is intended to create a special relationship between the crime victim and any law enforcement agency or crime victim, and ensure that crime victims' rights and interests are respected and protected by law in a manner no less vigorous than protections afforded to criminal defendants and juvenile delinquents, every victim is entitled to the following rights at the time of the trial or sentencing:

(1) The right to be informed of the conviction, sentence, adjudication, place and time of incarceration, or other disposition of the convicted offender, any scheduled release date of the offender, and the release of or the escape of the offender from custody;

Die-hard fans

may have more to worry about than winning the game

If tailgate parties with brats, cheese dips and chili bowls aren't enough to give passionate sports fans heart problems, all the close calls and tense final game moments just might. "When there is an emotional attachment, there can be emotional stress, and emotional stress is one of the triggers of cardiovascular events," said Dr. Robert Kloner, chief science officer of the Huntington Medical Research Institutes in Pasadena, California. Studies have shown sporting events like the Super Bowl, World Cup soccer and the Rugby World Cup can lead to arrhythmias for certain die-hard fans and, in some cases, heart attacks. During the summer, numerous World Cup spectators tweeted about getting warnings from their smartwatches over heart rate spikes recorded during soccer matches.

Whenever there is a longstanding rivalry or a game's intensity is turned up, the heart-breaking conditions absolutely ripen.

"You essentially get a fight-or-flight response," said Kloner, a professor of medicine at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. "What happens? The sympathetic

nervous system gets stimulated and there's a release of catecholamines (hormones), like adrenaline," he said. "Heart rate and blood pressure go up. The contractility of the heart goes up. All of those things contribute to an increase in oxygen demand."

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



TODAY'S WORKOUT

Lunge with kickback challenges arms and legs

Our move today is a deep lunge with a double triceps kickback. You will need a set of light to medium hand weights. This move will be working your triceps, back, core and toning the lower body by holding your lunge.

Begin this exercise by grasping your hand weights in each hand and splitting your stance to prepare for your lunge.

Roll your shoulders back and down, tucking your arms into your side holding your weights. Proceed to bend in your front knee, with your toe facing

forward and turning your back foot sideways for

proper balance, and keeping your back leg straight. As

you bend into your lunge, slightly drop your chest forward over your front knee to create resistance on your triceps as you kick the weight backward.

Tucking both arms into your sides with your elbows bent to begin, you are ready to start your kick back motion. Proceed to lift the hand weights parallel with your torso.

Once you reach your fullest extension, return your arms to the starting position. Continuing to hold your lunge, repeat this kick back motion with both arms for at least eight to 10 times.

Release the exercise by standing up, taking a small break, and switching your

lead leg. Resume your lunging position on the opposite leg, find your arm placement, and continue into your next kickback set.

Shoot for at least two to three sets on each side. If the hand weights become too heavy, grab lighter weights or no weights at all.

This move is great combined with either upper or lower body workouts or on its own, since you are getting a little bit of everything.

And that can lead to heart problems.

In 2009, Kloner published a study that looked at heart-related deaths following two Super Bowl games involving Los Angeles teams. Researchers found death rates from heart attacks and ischemic heart disease in the city increased in 1980 after the Rams lost an intense championship match to the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Know your risk factors

Heart disease is the No. 1 killer in the United States. Cardiologist Robert Kloner cautions that fans who get excited during sporting events and have the risk factors for heart disease (high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and smoking) should consult their doctor before a big game.

In contrast, a Raiders victory in the 1984 Super Bowl against the Washington Redskins was

associated with a decline in deaths from any cause.

A big factor in whether a sports enthusiast suffers heart problems during an intense game may be the person's health status, said Dr. David Waters, a cardiologist and professor emeritus at University of California, San Francisco.

"The prototypical sports fan is overweight, he's sedentary, doesn't exercise much, maybe has high blood pressure," Waters said. "He's older, a male and has a lot of cardiovascular risk factors to begin with, in other words."

Many sporting events also

take place in extreme weather, he said. The cold that cloaks a Packers fan trying to watch a game during a snow storm in Green Bay, Wisconsin, for example, can easily contribute to the kind of stress that leads to a heart attack or stroke.

"There's a confluence of several different things that increase your risk at that particular moment," Waters said.

So how can passionate sports fans protect themselves during close games? They should reach out to their doctor if they know they get easily excited. They also should start better

addressing any heart disease risk factors they have.

"So that means don't smoke. Modify food intake. Watch your cholesterol. Be on a statin if you need to," Kloner said. "Make sure your blood pressure is under control. Keep your diabetes in check. Those are the risk factors that we know we can modify."

Waters agreed. But he added that taking some risk isn't entirely bad for the heart.

"Life in general is stressful," he said. "There's good stress and bad stress and if you avoided everything in life that could give you a heart attack, you'd have a very boring life."

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



Struggles on the side

Why the 'gig' economy may not be the workforce of the future

WASHINGTON — The "gig" economy might not be the new frontier for America's workforce after all.

From Uber to TaskRabbit to YourMechanic, so-called gig work — task-oriented work offered by online apps — has been promoted as providing the flexibility and independence that traditional jobs don't offer. Yet the evidence is growing that over time, these jobs don't deliver the financial returns many workers expect.

And they don't appear to be reshaping the workforce. Over the past two years, pay for gig workers has dropped, and they are earning a growing share of their income elsewhere, a new study finds. Most Americans who earn income through online platforms do so for only a few months each year, according to the study by the JPMorgan Chase Institute released Monday.

The study, along with other research, points to

three conclusions about the gig economy:

Don't believe hype

Online work platforms took off after Uber's founding in 2009. They benefited from a weak economic recovery that had left millions of Americans unemployed and desperate for work. The initial popularity of gig work prompted a rash of speculation that independent workers — freelancers as well as gig workers and contractors — would soon occupy a steadily larger portion of the workforce. In October, a study by the Freelancers Union and Upwork, a freelancing website, predicted that a majority of U.S. workers would be freelancers by 2027. Yet the JPMorgan Chase Institute's report casts doubt on that likelihood. It found that among drivers, 58 percent work just three months or less each year through online economy websites. These include ride-hailing services such as Uber and Lyft as well as delivery drivers and movers who find work through online apps. Amazon, for example, now uses independent drivers to deliver some packages.

Falling pay hurts

The number of gig workers has grown substantially in the past five years, the institute found, but growth is slowing. Among drivers, a flood of competition on sites like Uber and Lyft has led to lower pay. In March 2018, about 1.6 percent of families participated in the gig economy, equivalent to about 2 million households, the study said. That is barely up from 1.5 percent a year earlier. Drivers for Uber, Lyft and other platforms now collectively earn only about half as much each month as they did five years ago, the institute said. Average monthly incomes have fallen from \$1,535 in October 2012 to just \$762 in March of this year, not adjusted for inflation. That drop likely reflects the fact that many drivers are probably working fewer hours, Grieg said.

Many have probably found other sources of income as the job market has strengthened.

Online-platform companies are evolving

So far, these trends don't appear to be harming most of the online platform companies themselves. Uber is still growing and preparing to sell shares to the public. Some other sites are forming partnerships with larger retailers. The JPMorgan Institute study found that transportation is increasingly the dominant force in the gig economy. Driving makes up 56 percent of all gig work, up from just 6 percent in 2013. Selling items through such online sites as eBay and Etsy has sunk to 19 percent of gig work, down from 72 percent. "It's really those transportation

platforms that have grown tremendously and now represent the lion's share of the dollars and participation," Grieg said. Uber is still reporting rapid expansion. Its revenue jumped 63 percent to \$2.8 billion in the April-June quarter from a year ago. Other platforms are being bought or are linking up with larger companies. Furniture retailer Ikea purchased TaskRabbit last year. Walmart has developed a partnership with Handy; both sites enable consumers to pay people for odd jobs like home repairs or furniture assembly.

The new partnerships may spur more growth for companies like TaskRabbit. Yet the odd jobs platforms have never attracted as many workers: Just 0.1 percent of households earned income through companies like TaskRabbit in March 2018, the institute found.

Global stocks dip on China report

NEW YORK — Global stocks took small losses Monday after China reportedly pulled out of trade talks with the U.S. Industrial companies and banks suffered some of the worst declines among American stocks.

The U.S. and China officially began taxing larger amounts of each other's goods Monday, and the Wall Street Journal reported that China pulled out of talks that could have led to a new round of negotiations to end the trade war.

The U.S. is now taxing another \$200 billion in Chinese imports at a rate of 10 percent, and China added taxes of 5 to 10 percent on \$60 billion in U.S. products. Oil prices jumped after OPEC decided not to produce more oil.

Technology and health care companies rose, leaving U.S. indexes only slightly lower.

"The market's been remarkably resilient over the last couple of months while trade tensions were heating up," said Terry Sandven, chief equity strategist at U.S. Bank Wealth Management.

Sandven said the trade spat will endure past the midterm elections in November, but stocks are likely to keep rising because of strong earnings growth for U.S. companies, combined with low inflation and low interest rates.

After a volatile stretch early this year, the S&P hasn't risen or fallen 1 percent in a day since late June.

Sandven noted that this year's stock gains have been concentrated in technology, retail and health care companies. That was the case Monday, as Apple gained 1.4 percent to \$220.79 and drug and infant formula maker Abbott Laboratories advanced 3.5 percent to \$71.44.

Sandven said it would be an encouraging sign for the market if other sectors do better.

OPEC and key allies like Russia decided not to increase their oil output further. Production is falling in some OPEC nations, including Iran, which faces new sanctions from the U.S.

Benchmark U.S. crude gained 1.8 percent to \$72.08 a barrel in New York while Brent crude, the international standard for oil prices, rose 3 percent to \$81.20 a barrel in London, its highest price in more than three years.

Airlines and other transportation companies fell as investors anticipated they will have to pay higher prices for fuel.

US, China hike tariffs as trade row intensifies

BEIJING — China and the United States imposed new tariff hikes on each other's goods Monday and Beijing accused Washington of bullying, giving no sign of compromise in an intensifying battle over technology that is weighing on global economic growth.

U.S. regulators went ahead with a planned 10 percent tax on a \$200 billion list of 5,745 Chinese imports including bicycles and furniture. China's customs agency said it responded at noon by beginning to collect taxes of 5 or 10 percent on a \$60 billion list of 5,207 American goods, from honey to industrial chemicals.

The conflict stems from U.S. President Donald Trump's complaints Beijing steals or pressures foreign companies to hand over technology.

American officials say Chinese plans for state-led development of global competitors in robotics and other technologies violate its market-opening obligations and might erode U.S. industrial leadership.

China's leaders offered to narrow their politically sensitive, multibillion-dollar trade surplus with the United States by purchasing more natural gas and other American exports. But they have rejected pressure to

change industry plans the communist leadership sees as a path to prosperity and global influence.

Monday's tariff hike follows a report by The Wall Street Journal that Chinese officials pulled out of a meeting to discuss possible talks proposed by Washington. The Chinese government had given no public indication whether it would accept the invitation.

Envoys last met Aug. 22 in Washington but reported no progress.

With no settlement in sight, forecasters say the conflict between the two biggest economies could trim global growth through 2020.

On Monday, the ratings agency Fitch cut its forecasts for next year's Chinese and global economic growth by 0.1 percentage points to 6.1 percent and 3.1 percent, respectively.

"The trade war is now a reality," said Fitch's chief economist, Brian Coulton, in a report. "The downside risks to our global growth forecasts have also increased."

Earlier, the two sides imposed 25 percent penalties on \$34 billion of each other's goods in July and another \$16 billion in August. Business groups say American companies also report Chinese regulators are starting to disrupt their operations through slower customs clearance and more environmental and other inspections.
