Boyd talks healthcare in Sopchoppy

U.S. Rep. Allen Boyd (D-Monticello) stopped by Sopchoppy last week to talk with about a dozen residents about local concerns.

Their main concern was probably not that different than anywhere else in the country - the number one topic of discussion was healthcare reform, and the political stagnation in Washington.

The community meeting, held on Friday afternoon, Feb. 19, was hosted by Rick and Nell Ott at their From the Heart recording studio in Sopchoppy and was organized by County Commissioner Lynn Artz.

While the primary purpose may have been to solicit the congressman's support for a couple of local pet projects - a music concert series recently undertaken by the Ott's along with WFSU-TV, and the Heritage Village proposed by the Wakulla County Historical Society - the conversation was healthcare reform.

It was a far more relaxed atmosphere than last year's town hall meetings on healthcare as Boyd outlined the need for reform to the

healthcare system and his reason for opposing the bill that came out of the House of Representatives - mainly, that it wasn't "budget neutral."

Sopchoppy resident Judith Harris said she was concerned about "the inability of Washington to get anything done" - to which Boyd responded that the House and Senate

had both passed healthcare bills, the next step was for a conference committee to work out a compromise.

Boyd noted that there is a need for healthcare reform: the U.S., he

said, spends more than any other nation on healthcare, but ranks 37th in outcome.


"Other countries have figured out a way to get everybody in the system," he said, and that remains one of the challenges facing the U.S. how to cover the uninsured.

The four main principles he supported as part of any effort at reform was that it had to reduce costs; offer basic coverage to everybody; provide choice for those who want to stay with their current insurance coverage; and pay now, rather than borrowing against the future.

The 2,000 page House bill that came out offered little, if any, reduction in costs, he said. He voted against the bill, which passed the House. The Senate bill is "pretty significantly different," he said.

Boyd quoted a congressman who spoke against the bill, who claimed to come from one of the most educated congressional districts in the nation. The House was so complex, the congressman said, "I cannot explain, nor can my constituents understand, this bill."

Senior Scott Varner was dominant in his 140-pound weight class.

Man rides to raise awareness of teen suicide

David Alexander has traveled more than 6,551 miles over the past nine months on bicycles.

His goal is to raise awareness of the problem of teen suicide. His 17-year-old daughter killed herself.

At a convenience store north of Crawfordville recently, the soft-spoken Alexander, his face sunburned, dressed in a Denver Broncos sweatshirt, shared his story, telling of the sudden shock he suffered last year when his 17-year-old daughter Angela took her own life - "over a boy," he adds with a sad shake of his head.

He and his other daughter, Ivy, who turns 12 this March, didn't know what to do. They went for a long bike ride. She wrote a card to Angela and tied it to a balloon and let it go in hopes it would float up to her.

Alexander continued riding.

"I don't really know what to do other than this," he said. His goal

is to make parents aware of the problem, and convince teens that there are other ways of dealing with their problems.

He has journals from his travels - he has collected more than 3,000 signatures from people he's met along the way. He started his bike ride in Michigan.

He hands out flyers at his stops, that tell Angela's story. There have been setbacks along the way: his bike was stolen in Philadelphia. When a TV station did a story on him and his stolen bike, a retail store donated a bike for him. A church in Savannah bought him a better road bike and a bike trailer.

His goal on this afternoon in Crawfordville is to make it to the coast. Then he'll head west along the Gulf.

His 12-year-old, who lives with family in Massachusetts, is planning to join him during the summer and they will ride across Texas together.

Alexander continued riding.

convenience store is a flyer advertising a meeting of a local group concerned about the drastic increase in suicides in Wakulla County. The suicide rate has tripled.

Parents, listen to your children, Alexander says.

"Talk to your children, please,

before they make a mistake like

Angela did," he says. "Share your feelings together."

His mounts his bike and rides off, headed south.

"It's amazing what God does," he wrote on one of his flyers. "I think I'm healing as a person and as a father."

The story of Sandy Cornish

Until the African-American can Read-in earlier in the month - when some local stories were told for Black History Month - I had never heard the story of Sandy Cornish. While gruesome in some respects, it's also a remarkable story of what a man would go through to preserve his freedom.

There is a monument to Cornish in Key West, where he lived in the late 1840s, one of the richest men on the island and a leader of the African-American community.

Cornish was born a slave in Maryland around 1793. In 1839, his master hired him out to work on the Tallahassee-St. Marks Railroad. Cornish bought his freedom for \$3,200 but lost his papers in a fire. Unable to prove he was a freedman, Cornish was captured by six slave-catchers who intended to sell him at a market in New Orleans.

He escaped from the slaves and to prevent himself from being recaptured, he stood in the public square of Port Leon, aided by his wife Lillah, he severely maimed himself. He e

Kessler has malaria? or is it election-year hype?

Editor, The News:

Regarding your cover story of Feb. 18 ("Kessler treated for malaria"): Is this election year for our county commissioners? You would think so since Mr. Kessler seems to be doing his best to milk the maximum amount of mileage out of his very brief visit to Haiti. A politician will tell you anything. All you have to do is watch or read the news.

Reportedly, whites on the scene offered him no help, but black friends took him home in a wheelbarrow. He recuperated for six months and, with help from his wife, was eventually able to get around on crutches. The couple moved to Key West, where they helped establish the Cornish Chapel of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Cornish lived until sometime around 1869.

Port Leon was, of course, the original county seat of Wakulla County - between the St. Marks Lighthouse and the City of St. Marks. A railroad bridge spanned the St. Marks River connecting Port Leon to Tallahassee. Port Leon was destroyed by a 10-foot storm surge from a hurricane in 1843 and, for years afterwards, the twisted wreck of the bridge hung over the river - and remnants of the bridge are still visible on the bank of the river near the old Posey's.

Wetlands ordinance is nothing but a sham

I see Wakulla County is considering a new wetlands ordinance. Watch and see where this goes.: The new ordinance is expanded to include not only isolated wetlands, but also sinkholes and the coastline. The three most valuable areas of private property in Wakulla County are Oyster Bay, Shell Point and Live Oak Island, all waterfront communities.

Since approximately 75 percent of the county cannot be developed, primarily being tied up in the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and the Apalachicola National Forest, among other public lands, these three communities carry the highest property taxes in the county per acre of property.

Since the new ordinance being considered will include the coastline, Oyster Bay, Shell Point and Live Oak Island will either be ignored by the county (selective enforcement of the law), or the law will be enforced in these three communities. If the law is enforced in these

three communities, there will be property owners who will not be allowed to maintain some or all of their property. This will drive down property values, thus opening the door for a developer or development company to step in, pick up the property in these communities relatively cheap, then bulldoze, pave, and put in wall-to-wall condominiums closing out the public from access. See any large coastal city in Florida for an example of this.

When that happens property values in these communities will skyrocket, which will provide a boon to the county in property taxes. This ordinance has been touted as an environmental protection measure. It is not. It can easily become a pro-condo development measure. Developers with deep pockets can always find a way to get a variance.

Want to know why politicians do something? Just follow the money.

Gulf Specimen seeks donations to replace a major display tank

Gulf Specimen Marine Laboratory in Panacea is urgently seeking funds to replace one of its major marine education displays.

After decades of struggling with aging concrete in the tank walls and floor, spending endless hours and money playing "find the leak" our staff had enough. Wakulla County community service workers demolished it with sledge hammers and hauled away 20 tons of concrete rubble.

Gulf Specimen is now seeking \$40,000 to rebuild the facility and fill the empty space with new and exciting tanks and exhibits. A bioluminescent tank is planned where people can see luminous sea pansies, and plankton flash blue fire along with transparent tubular columns with jellyfish pulsing in the darkness. Special tanks featuring the "critter of the month" will magnify small and obscure pistol shrimp and sand fleas to show what monsters they are on giant television screens.

The new temperature-

controlled tanks will give us more room to hold a greater number of endangered sea turtles during cold stun emergencies. This January we kept 65 sea turtles alive of the 5,000 stranded by record cold until they could be released.

Until it was demolished, "C-5" – also known as the "shark tank" – was our largest concrete tank. Built in 1970, the U-shaped tank was 120 feet long, running around the perimeter of our 20 by 50 foot building.

It held 4,000 gallons of sea water and redfish that struck their food like a freight train, triggerfish that stared up at you with doleful eyes and remoras that we sometimes allowed kids to feed by hand.

On YouTube, you can watch kids squealing with delight as nurse sharks splash them during a feeding frenzy.

Our students, volunteers and alumni still recall the arduous back-breaking labor of hauling in beach sand by the bucket full, and working through the night building

the sub gravel filter system. Some helped erect the pole barn to keep out the rain, others worked on the insulation or the graphics and signs. Others helped us produce soft-shell crabs for a molting hormone study, working through the night, picking out the blue crabs that shed their shells and freezing them in liquid nitrogen.

The new facility will also help us provide live baby blue crabs to Operation Migration's young whooping cranes that struck their food like a freight train, triggerfish that stared up at you with doleful eyes and remoras that we sometimes allowed kids to feed by hand.

Field Trip Season starts soon and thousands of kids are coming. We don't want to disappoint them with fewer specimens to show.

Longtime historical society volunteer Betty Green said she was concerned about the lack of bipartisanship in government.

Boyd said the polarization of government was a reflection of the community and the country as a whole – and blamed it largely on states gerrymandering of congressional districts to create constituencies that are almost homogeneous.

A physician in the audience, visiting Rick and Nell, said that nation's model of healthcare needed to change – there needs to be more physicians

assistants and nurse-practitioners treating patients.

Pat Keating, general manager of WFSU, said he was pleased that the paygo bill had been signed into law by President Obama. Boyd explained the "pay-as-you-go" legislation meant "You cannot create a new program or cut taxes unless you show how you're going to offset the cost."

The musical program created by the Ott's, "From the Heart Music Hour," was filmed over two nights in January at the Monticello Opera House. The "Austin City Limits"-style show, featuring local musical acts, is to air in late March and

early April on WFSU.

The Heritage Village project is currently looking at the possibility of purchasing about 20 acres in Medart to locate some historically significant local buildings. It's been proposed that the Heritage Village would include reenactors and presenters who would tell visitors about how people lived in the past.



Gail Mathers, Food Service Director, said of Wheatcraft: "Laura brings a ray of sunshine to the



Last week, I went up to the Capitol for the Florida Library Association's Library Days. The purpose of the visit was to speak to as many state legislators as possible to ask that the State Aid to Libraries program continue to be funded at the current \$21 million level.

The Wakulla County

Public Library received \$91,000 this past year, which constitutes the vast majority of the budget for our collection development, computer classes, most of our office supplies, and our children's programs. The projected cut for this upcoming year is \$5 million which would cut what we receive to \$65,000. This would severely limit the services that we strive to provide to the citizens of Wakulla County.

So, as we did last year when the legislature almost cut out the State Aid to Libraries program entirely, we're asking for your help.

If you go online to tiny.cc/tXpk (case sensitive), you will find a list of committee members who have a direct say in library funding.

We'd like you to contact members of the

Transportation and Economic Development Appropriations committees in both the House of Representatives and the Senate, the House Full Appropriations Council on Education and the House committee on Economic Development, as well as the Senate's Policy and Steering Committee on Ways and Means to tell them how important the library is to you and how you make use of it.



FWC to consider relaxing rules on oystering

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission proposed a draft rule amendment Thursday to help oyster fishermen adjust to new restrictions that will affect the time they are allowed to harvest and transport oysters on the water in Florida.

The proposed change would affect a rule that now requires harvesters to stow their oyster tongs on their moored vessels during nighttime hours. Under the new proposal, they would be able to stow tongs on their vessels while they are in transit to oyster bars from sunset to sunrise. This would give fishermen time to leave their vessel-mooring site before dawn.

The proposed change is in response to a state Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services rule that would require harvesters to deliver their oysters to a certified dealer by 11:30 a.m. during May, June and July, and by noon during August, September and October. The rule is being developed to meet new federal health safety requirements to ensure harvested oysters are handled and processed during cooler morning hours in the warm-weather months.

Since oyster harvesting is permitted only between sunrise and sunset, the federal rule would limit oyster harvesters to working only in the morning hours from May to October.

A final public hearing on the FWC's proposed oyster rule amendment will take place during its April meeting in the Tallahassee area.

Wildlife Commission holds meeting in Apalachicola

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission waded through numerous high-profile issues during its meeting in Apalachicola Wednesday and Thursday Feb. 17 and 18.

The meeting opened with a presentation of the 2009 Louise Ireland Humphrey Achievement Award to former FWC Law Enforcement Director Julie Jones. In September, Jones was appointed executive director of the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles.

Commissioners recognized national-award-winning artist Elam Stoltzfus of Blountstown. The FSU graduate has already won 35 prestigious awards in his brief career as a film producer. He heads up the media company Live Oak Production Group.

In a vote of interest to sportsmen, commissioners gave a thumbs-up to revamping deer hunting zones and dates to align them with the rut – the period of peak deer activity associated with the breeding season.

Commissioners also gave final approval to new rules

to clarify regulation of nuisance wildlife and nonnative wildlife. In addition, they approved new hunting and fishing regulations for public lands and created a special two-day, youth spring turkey

season for supervised kids, under age 16. The rule package included substantial increases in a variety of hunting opportunities on public land.

In other action, commissioners directed staff to proceed with developing new rules to tighten regulation of reptiles of concern. Proposals include extending amnesty to pet owners who turn over reptiles of concern to licensed individuals and incorporate changes to the required permanent identification of the animals. Chairman Rodney Barreto urged staff to develop the strictest rules possible.

In addition, commissioners directed FWC staff to continue work on a series of rule proposals on captive wildlife regarding Critical Incident/Disaster plans, hobbyists and labeling on wildlife shipments. A draft rule also

was approved, updating the process by which counties notify the FWC regarding local zoning and building codes for proposed facilities housing Class I or Class II wildlife.

Commissioners received an update on the fox or coyote enclosure permit process on Wednesday. The report included the results of recent FWC investigations into the operation of enclosures where hunters pursue foxes or coyotes with dogs. Commissioners decided to temporarily prohibit the chasing of foxes and coyotes in enclosures while staff drafts rules guiding such enclosures in Florida.

Coast Guard Auxiliary Reports

Flotilla 13 held its February meeting Saturday night at the Shell Point Coast Guard Auxiliary Station. As Flotilla Commander Bob Morgan was out of town, Vice Commander John Sykes conducted the meeting.

Besides John, members attending were Sherrie Alverson, Judy Bentley, Glenn Edrington, John Edrington, Jim McGill, Ron Pagel, and James and Edith Taylor. Guests were Helen Branen, Dorothy Edrington, Ouida McGill and Mary Taylor.

The meeting moved smartly along. John gave a short overview of the district and division conferences held in

Fort Walton Beach last week. One of the courses that the Coast Guard Auxiliary will be offering to the public later this year is for canoes and kayaks. Boats of this type have been gaining in popularity since the increase in fuel costs and declining economy.

Just as soon as this course has been approved and textbooks are available the Auxiliary will begin teaching the course.

It was announced that the Flotilla would present a boating safely course on the third Saturday of every month beginning with March 20. For more information, call John

Edrington, Public Education Officer, at 926-2606.

Jim McGill was presented a certificate for completion of 75 instructor hours in 2009. The vice commander announced that Flotilla 13 had earned the Silver Oar plaque for the members' participation in the Auxiliary's various programs. Mae Waters was the flotilla commander then.

Following the meeting Jim presented one of the mandatory annual member training courses, Team Coordination Training.

While I was sitting here waiting for Flotilla 12 news, my curiosity got the best of me and I started looking for material on paddlesports as canoes, kayaks and rafts are officially called. In Chapter 6 of the Boat Smart work book I found the following:

to drown as individuals operating other types of vessels.

"The higher rate of fatalities can be attributed to two factors. First, paddlers don't consider themselves "boaters" and fail to follow the same safe practices as other small vessel operators. Second, many paddlers don't have the skills or knowledge to operate their small, unstable crafts safely. They may be unaware of hazards unique to paddle sports, such as fast currents and low-head dams, or don't follow proper safety procedures when encountering them."

The book recommends that a paddler prepare for safety by doing the following:

- * Always wear a life jacket (Personal Flotation Device), and know how to swim in a river current.

- * Never paddle alone. Bring at least one other boater. When canoeing, two canoes with two canoeists each are recommended. Three crafts with two paddlers each are even better. If unfamiliar

with the waterway, paddle with someone knowledgeable.

- * Never overload the craft. Tie down gear and distribute weight evenly.

- * Maintain a low center of gravity and three points of contact. Keep your weight balanced over the center of the craft. Standing up or moving around in a small craft can cause it to capsize.


- a leading cause of fatalities among paddlers. Leaning a shoulder over the edge of the craft also can destabilize it enough to capsize.

- * Stay alert at all times and be aware of your surroundings, including nearby powerboats. Be prepared to react when dangerous situations arise.

* Practice re-boarding your craft in the water with the help of a companion.

* Dress properly for the weather and type of boating.

* Check your craft for leaks.

* Map a general route and timetable when embarking on a long trip. Arrange for your vehicles to be shuttled to the takeout.

* Know the weather conditions before you head out. While paddling, watch the weather and stay close to shore. Head to shore if the waves increase.



Law Enforcement and the Courts

Sheriff's Report

The Wakulla County Sheriff's Office investigated a report of an attempted child abduction over the weekend at the recreation park in Medart, according to Sheriff David Harvey.

According to reports, a man approached a 12-year-old girl at the rec park on Sunday, Feb. 21. The girl, who was waiting for her parent to pick her up, ran when the man opened the door of his car and turned up his music and started walking towards her.

The girl went to a park caretaker, who called the sheriff's office.

The suspect was described as a black male, between six-foot-two and six-feet six inches, wearing a white T-shirt. He was said to be in his late 20s or early 30s.

Deputy Vicki Mitchell investigated.

In other activity reported this week:

- A 16-year-old juvenile was charged with making a bomb threat on Friday, Feb. 19, that was reported at the Sopchopy Education Center and caused the evacuation of more than 100 pre-K and Second Chance students, plus educators and staff.

The Leon County Bomb Squad and a K-9 unit searched the area, but did not locate any explosives.

The juvenile faces two felony charges of disruption of a school function and making a false threat of a bomb or explosive.

- The Sweet Magnolia Inn in St. Marks reported the theft of some garden items - wind chimes, potted plants, an iron plant stand and the like - that eventually turned up in the pickup truck of an employee at a nearby restaurant-bar.

The employee said that a customer had been in the night before, severely intoxicated, offering to give her some items she was reportedly taking out of her shed as she prepared to have a yard sale.

The manager of Sweet Magnolia reported the mischief on Tuesday, Feb. 16.

Among the items recovered were some ornaments and bird houses.

The drunken customer who gave away the items was interviewed, and the matter was turned over to detectives for further investigation.

- Somebody cut the power wires to a home on Mayfair Drive, it was

reported on Thursday, Feb. 18.

The homeowner discovered that wires to the panel box at the power pole had been cut, but was unsure of a motive.

A worker with Talquin Electric, who was on the scene to repair the damage, said the wires were live and didn't understand how whoever had made the cuts had kept from being shocked by electricity.

- A 52-year-old woman called to report some medications missing on Thursday, Feb. 18.

Missing were seven Clonazepam, an anti-convulsive medication. The woman's 28-year-old daughter was later taken to Tallahassee Memorial Hospital for a drug overdose after reportedly taking an unknown number of pills to help her sleep.

- A construction trailer was reported stolen from the Wakulla River bridge site on Friday, Feb. 19.

The site foreman described the missing trailer as a 2001 tandem axle, flat-bed cargo trailer, registered to the Anderson Columbia Company. Also missing were several re-bar forms used for bridge construction.

While inspecting the scene, it appeared that a bulldozer had been moved so that the trailer could be more easily taken.

- Deputies chased down suspects in two recent cases.

In one case, back in January, a 23-year-old Crawfordville man reportedly stole a car battery without paying for it from Ace Hardware. The case ended after a 20-mile vehicle chase through the Apalachicola National Forest and a short foot chase.

Miner Nolan Williams III was charged with retail theft as well as two counts of attempting to flee and elude.

Lt. Jimmy Sessor attempted to make a traffic stop of the suspect's car, but discontinued the chase when the Williams allegedly cut across the grass at Wakulla Bank in Crawfordville.

Later, while involved in another investigation, Sessor attempted to stop Williams, who

- again attempted to elude law enforcement, and took them on a 20-mile chase into the national forest. The chase ended when he crashed his car, and was subdued

when he tried to flee on foot.

A second pursuit case, this one on Feb. 13, involved Deputy Ian Richards, when he responded to a domestic complaint in Crawfordville about a male suspect allegedly smoking marijuana in front of juveniles.

Dal Tonica Wilson, 25, of Crawfordville allegedly twisted the arm of a female victim in an reportedly saw him hiding behind a tree.

Wilson allegedly took off running and ran through several backyards and jumped fences to escape. A K-9 unit eventually found Wilson in the back of a pickup in a nearby yard.

He was arrested without incident and charged with domestic battery and resisting arrest without violence.

The sheriff's office responded to 664 calls for service during the past week.

Note to readers: Those people reported as charged with crimes in this column have not yet been to trial and are presumed innocent until proven guilty.



The story behind Wakulla Transportation

It is amazing how much we take for granted, without ever realizing it. Most of us can jump into our car and go anywhere we want without thinking much about it, until something disrupts or changes that status. There are some people in our county that aren't as independent. Maybe at one time they owned a car, but now due to their health, age, or economic status, they no longer drive or own a car. Some may have family or friends that see that they get to the doctor and grocery store, but for some in the county, they are left without a support system. For those persons, the community transporta-

tion coordinator, Wakulla County Senior Citizens Council, Inc., doing business as Wakulla County Transportation, is meeting their transportation needs. Transportation is often the vital link for some of the most vulnerable citizens of the county between not only quality of life, but also, jobs, access to medical care and other life sustaining needs.

The transportation disadvantaged program was created in 1979 through the enactment of Chapter 427, Florida Statutes. The purpose of the transportation disadvantaged program was to provide transportation for those persons who because of physical or mental disability, income status, or age are unable to transport

themselves.

Wakulla County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. was designated by the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged in October 1990 as the community transportation coordinator. The council has continued to serve as the coordinator for Wakulla County since that date. The coordinator occupies a highly visible position in the Florida Coordinated Transportation System and must perform its duties in a thoroughly professional manner. The community transportation coordinator is responsible for the actual arrangement and delivery of transportation services for transportation disadvantaged persons in the county. All agencies

and transportation operators that receive federal, state, or local government transportation funds are required to contract with the community transportation coordinator for transportation services.

In 2009, Wakulla County Transportation provided 26,829 trips to 862 unduplicated residents of Wakulla County while driving 275,810 miles without any accidents or roadcalls. Wakulla County Transportation operates 11 vehicles providing service to ambulatory, non-ambulatory and stretcher required riders. 16,713 trips were made for medical purposes, 4,980 were for nutritional needs, 2,000 for employment, 416 for education/training/daycare, and the remaining 2,720 were for

various other purposes. Wakulla County Transportation reduced the number of unmet needs of last year, 10, to merely 4 in 2009.

Wakulla County Transportation has received numerous awards from the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged for its exemplary service to the county. The Wakulla County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board commends Wakulla County Transportation for the quality service that is provided to the transportation disadvantaged residents of Wakulla County.

With senior dogs in mind

Lately I have been thinking about some of the senior dogs in my house-

hold: I have a 13-year-old dog, one 11 year old and recently adopted an eight year old. The thought of losing any of them is a very sad prospect and unfortunately unavoidable.

How does one cope with the loss of an ani-

mal? Companion animals are family members with whom we share a very special bond. Sadly, our four-legged friends do not live as long as people do as a rule. Eventually

everyone who cares for a pet must deal with the difficult decision of whether or when to euthanize a very sick animal to spare them more suffering and provide them with a peaceful death.

Sometimes financial circumstances make it im-

possible to treat an animal with a very expensive procedure to prolong its life for a while, which in turn will add to confusion and guilt on how to deal with our limited choices.

It is natural and necessary to grieve for the loss of your pet as you would for any loved one who dies. It is very important to have compassion and support from friends and family in a time of grief.

I do believe that most people have no idea on how euthanasia works. Your veterinarian has spe-

cial training to provide dogs during my life and your pet with a humane prefer to be with them and gentle death. Most during their last moment often, a two step process is used. First, the pet is

injected with a sedative to make him comfortable and calm. Next, a special medication is injected that functions in such a fashion that the animals experience no awareness of the end of their life. It is sort of like undergoing a general anesthesia before surgery and the process will take 10 to 20 seconds. The vet will check to see whether

the heart stopped. With Please, spay/neuter this procedure, there is no your animals to prevent suffering. I owned many unwanted litters.

Wakulla soldier in Iraq takes in a found puppy

This is a story of man's best friend and the bond between them as told by Lynden Langford of Mashes Sands Road in Panacea:

Lynden and Pfc. Mitchell "Mitch" Robb of Mysterious Waters are "internet pals." Both grew up in Wakulla County, but their current lifestyles are quite different. Lynden is a student at Tallahassee Community College and Mitch is serving our country in Iraq – a cold and lonely place when you are away from home.

Recently, Mitch told Lynden about the litter of puppies his unit found while stationed outside of Bagdad. It was a big litter, and Mitch picked out a multi-colored pup to be his friend and companion. Via the internet, he was able to share pictures of the pup with Lynden. He named the pup Bogus, but Lynden convinced him that it deserved a name that more aptly described the dog. She thought the pup's coat reminded her of a cow, and hence a dog named Moo.

Mitch and his buddies have been feeding their pups table scraps, but there's always a mom in the background to worry about things like good health and nutrition – and so it is that Mitch's mom, Patricia, has been sending her son boxes of dog biscuits for Moo since this is not an item readily available at Mitch's military base.

Fortunately for Mitch and Moo, they are in a unit that has allowed Mitch to keep his pup, at least until he returns to the United States in the fall of this year. In many units, the commanders prohibit soldiers from

adopting any stray dog and require that stray dogs be killed.

According to the World Society for the Protection of Animals, in recent months, there has been a step-up in the rule against soldiers having mascots. For the time being, little Moo is Mitch's reminder of home and all things normal and loving. There is still time until they have to face the issue of separation.

Laura Salter, director of the World Society, said she often receives three to six calls a week from soldiers, fathers, mothers, wives and siblings trying to find out how to get a dog from Iraq to the United States. Her organization has made available a brochure to explain to soldiers the hurdles they have to jump through to get their new friend home.

Aside from the red tape involved in the transport of a dog, there is the cost of transportation which is at least \$1,000. One of the reasons for the transportation cost is because of longstanding orders that don't allow the soldier to use military transport to move nonmilitary animals.

"Pets may be shipped only when the member is being shipped on a permanent change of station orders," according to Capt. Stephen Honda of the U.S. Transportation Command at Scott Air Force Base in Mascoutah, Ill.

"When on temporary duty status (as in Iraq), only working dogs may travel on Department of Defense aircraft."

So for the time being, the few dogs who have made it home with their soldier are the lucky few.
