Sign ordinance passes

Chamber, some business owners object; majority of board contend it has little immediate effect

If you're a business owner in Wakulla County, you may want to pay special attention to the sign ordinance passed by county commissioners on Monday, June 3.

The amendment has local businesses in an uproar.

Commissioner Ralph Thomas, who cast the lone dissenting vote, said: "I'm very concerned that this is going to create a lot more nonconforming signs,"

said Thomas who had prepared a slideshow of 10 to 15 examples of businesses that would be affected by the new legislation.

"That is just the beginning of businesses that are concerned about this," said Chuck Robinson of the Chamber of Commerce. "And it seems as if the businesses have been ignored when it comes to this ordinance."

After Thomas' presentation Commission Chairman Randy Merritt asked county staff if the new ordinance makes the

signs in Thomas' presentation nonconforming.

"A lot of them predate the sign ordinance or probably did not get permits," said Serna. "We simply adopted what was on the books with some slight revisions." Serna said that enforcement has been "spotty at best" and that "we need to get some sign ordinance on the books and then come back and address individual issues."

Merritt asked again, "Does the new ordinance make these signs nonconforming?"

"Well, if they're nonconforming now they'll be nonconforming when we adopt the new

ordinance, let me put it that way," Serna said.

Tallahassee Lenders Consortium helps a Wakulla family get into a newly refurbished home

The rain slacked off just long enough on Thursday, June 5, for the Simmons family and dignitaries to gather for a ribbon-cutting ceremony at a home in Wakulla Gardens.

John and Sara Simmons were able to buy the home with help of Tallahassee Lenders Consortium. That afternoon, the couple and three grandchildren moved into the home.

Libby Lane, executive director of TLC, said the group had partnered with Wakulla government "to help people become successful home buyers."

The home in Wakulla Gardens had been repossessed and was donated to TLC by Chase Bank and then refurbished by Bill Wilson.

This was the first home

to be sold under a program to turn vacant, foreclosed housing into rehabilitated, affordable homes.

"This project is a mutually beneficial, win-win situation for all concerned," Lane said. "It places qualified low and moderate income families in nice, affordable hous-

ing while, at the same time, returning a restored vacant house to the local tax roll."

"I want to thank everyone involved," Sara Simmons said at the ribbon cutting. "We are excited to be here for our grandsons' sakes."

She smiled as she re-

counted one of her grandsons asking if what was happening meant the family wouldn't be moving anymore - that this was their "forever home."

Yes, she answered. "This is our forever home."

TLC created an LLC to acquire, rehab and sell homes to low and moderate income families. Donna Dickens of Ochlockonee Bay Realty and Patti E. Ketcham of Ketcham Realty helped with the sale, and Dustin Grubbs of Centennial Bank provided the financing.

"We are proud to be a part of building stronger communities, one family at a time," Lane said.

TLC provides services in Wakulla County by helping low income families purchase their first home and helping families of any income range avoid foreclosure.

Wakulla prison officer busted on drug charges

Wakulla County Sheriff's Office narcotics officers arrested a 35-year-old Crawfordville man in connection with a month long investigation into obtaining heroin and other illegal substances for distribution as contraband at a state prison, according to Sheriff Charlie Creel.

Rocky L. Butler was arrested on Tuesday, June 11 at 1 a.m. and charged with two counts of possession of a synthetic schedule 1 narcotic with intent to sell and possession of heroin with intent to sell. He also faces a charge of bribery and public order crime.

The WCSO Narcotics Unit joined forces with the United States Postal Service, Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) and Florida Department of Corrections (DOC)/Office of Inspector General during the investigation.

The investigation revealed that Butler received packages containing Spice, rolling papers and a smoking apparatus. In addition, a substance believed to be "bath salts" and 24 baggies that contained a substance believed to be heroin were seized. An envelope containing \$325 was also confiscated.

The Spice and Bath Salts were seized and sent to an FDLE laboratory for analysis. The lab analysis later confirmed the presence of the schedule 1 narcotics. The heroin had an estimated street value of \$4,000.

DOC and FDLE conducted an investigation into Butler being suspected of bringing the contraband into Wakulla Correctional Institution. The contraband was to be delivered to certain WCI inmates in exchange for cash payments. During an interview, Butler admitted to bringing contraband into WCI on numerous occasions.

Butler was arrested at his home and was transported to the Wakulla County Jail without incident where he remains under a \$35,000 bond.

City election complaints

CITY ELECTION RESULTS will be online at thewakullanews.com.

Reports of the alleged mishandling of absentee ballots, voter suppression tactics and canvassing board irregularities have surfaced about Sopchoppy's June 11 city election.

According to Wakulla Democratic Party Chair Rachel Pienta, reports were made to the Wakulla Supervisor of Elections and the Florida Division of Elections.

However, Supervisor of Elections Buddy Wells said he didn't know much about the complaints.

"I don't know what

to say because I don't know where it's coming from," said Wells. "I know those who are working the election down there are dedicated to doing their job well."

Sopchoppy City Clerk Jackie Lawhon expressed surprise at the allegations and said she hadn't heard anything about it.

Pienta said reports revealed that some voters were having difficulty obtaining absentee or provisional ballots without argument and that their

right to vote was being challenged.

It was also alleged there may be a conflict of interest as one of the candidates reportedly has relatives in the election process.

The fact that the city runs the election rather than the regular supervisor may be where some of the confusion is stemming from, says Pienta, "but this should be investigated objectively by a third party to ensure that procedures

Soil district donates to RMS science program

The students of the Riversprings Middle School LIFE program now have brand new water quality monitoring equipment thanks to the Wakulla County Soil and Water Conservation District board and their roughly \$400 in donations.

On Friday, May 31, members of the soil and water district along with Greg Ira of the state Department of Environmental Protection's Office of Environmental Education, Wakulla Springs Park Services Specialist Jeff Hugo and Park Manager Peter Scalco gathered at the waterfront to unveil new equipment that will better enable hands-on learning for students.

The donation resulted in two new heavy duty, high quality nets as well as an easy to use and accurate water monitoring system.

LIFE stands for Learning in Florida's Environment and is a statewide

program that, in Wakulla, serves about 180 RMS students with room for expansion depending on volunteer participation. There are about 22 LIFE programs throughout the state with an average of two or three added each year.

"Each LIFE program is unique based on the resources available at the host site and the needs of the teachers and the students in the school that is served," explained Ira. "It's part of a statewide effort, but each program itself is specific to the location where it is held."

Soil and water conservations were established in the 1930s under state statute and are charged with the caring for the public's health, safety and welfare through the conservation of soil and water.

Wakulla's soil district board consists of five members: Chairman Joseph C. Duggar, Vice Chairman Allan Loftin, Secretary and Treasurer Ed Brimmer, Joe Glisson and Cal Jamison. Members

stressed that water is critical to agriculture, which means that monitoring its quality is vital.

"We're in a crisis situation with water quality all over the state," explained Glisson. "So we're really glad to be able to help this education program."

Those present attributed appreciation and success in large part due to a

critical effort by RMS Principal Dod Walker and other staff at the school who help to develop a schedule that allows students to get out of the classroom and to the park. This allows them the opportunity to learn through a hands-on approach, building a three-year foundation for environmental appreciation.

RMS sixth graders in the LIFE program study macroinvertebrates such as insect larvae.

"You can tell a lot about the quality of the water by what type of insects there are," he explained. Participating seventh graders study water quality through water chemistry and the eighth graders get introduced to the ge-

ology of the area through resources such as the Leon Sinks area.

"The best part about all of that is the students become invested," says Jamison. "They come out here to Wakulla Springs and they love it, they get a sense of ownership. When they grow up to do things such as sit on the county commission they'll already be protective of our springs and aquifers. It's good. It's a good program."

Ira stressed that, although his organization is the one that plants the LIFE programs around the state, local organizations have to be able to support the implementation if it is to be successful.

"I think it's fantastic that the soil conservation district has been able to make this contribution to this particular site," Ira said. "Without continued local partners' support, this program wouldn't be sustainable. This is a great contribution. This new equipment is exactly what this program needs."

Shot dog is recovering

The German Shepherd puppy "Zeke" has had his first round of surgery and is "responding amazingly well," according to Animal Control Officer Ivanhoe Carroll.

Carroll added that Zeke has gained four pounds since he was picked up from the side of the road last week.

Currently, Zeke spends his nights with his temporary primary caregiver, Bonnie Brinson of Cauzican Animal Rescue and his days with Dr. Reed and Heidi Gurht and the team at Craw-



fordville Animal Hospital, Carroll said.

Zeke's surgery involved placing a pin in his good leg, and Carroll reported the dog is already putting weight on it. The other leg has been deemed as "not salvageable," as he will not regain full use of it again.

For balance purposes only it is possible that it may be saved, but "the threat of amputation is still very real," says Carroll.

Behavior and appetite both seem to be improving rapidly, Carroll said. He is eating and plays with his toys, she said.

Zeke's hair is beginning to grow back and he is free of all parasites - all-in-all a great report for the five month old pup, she said.

Reportedly, Zeke has a list of potential adopters, one of whom has a three legged dog of their own.

Carroll said that Zeke's rescue can be attributed to the Animal Control shelter and officers, Bonnie Brinson of Cauzican Animal Rescue, the Crawfordville Animal Hospital team and the generous donations and support of the community. Thanks to them, Carroll said, Zeke is "safe, clean, warm, as pain-free as can be expected and is on the mend!"

are being followed correctly and that the Fourteenth Amendment is not being violated."


Both of the first ever African-American women every to be elected to Sopchoppy commission, Anginita Rosier and Colleen Skipper-Mitchell are both up for re-election and, according to Pienta, there were reports by African-American voters were challenged at the polls.

Commissioner Rosier said that some in the community had alerted her about the issues

late last week and she is concerned that "all potential voters in Sopchoppy may not have an equal opportunity to have their vote counted in this election."

In addition to Rosier and Skipper-Mitchell, the other candidates on the city ballot are Eddie Evans, Nathan Lewis and Glen Rudd.

"The idea that race-motivated voter suppression could happen in the United States in 2013 is disturbing," said Pienta. "These allegations should be given close scrutiny."



Sopchoppy Land Development Code under review

With new overlay district, city trying to bring in more weekend visitors

A few members of the Sopchoppy city council together with a small group of citizens and local business owners, held a workshop on Thursday, May 30 to discuss ideas about land development and a new downtown overlay district.

The group discussed updates for the land development code (LDC), the purpose of which is to protect the health, safety and general welfare of the community as well as to comply with state law.

A key element to the LDC is a comprehensive plan, which aims to effectively manage growth and

development by designating areas of anticipated future development. As the Sopchoppy comp plan has not been updated for over 10 years, the project to do so was described as "long overdue."

One thing on the city's to-do list is to update the future land use map to make it consistent with the current zoning map, which will allow for the new downtown district overlay.

The overlay will span about two blocks by three blocks and will designate certain rules and regulations in order to maintain the character of Sopchoppy's downtown.

City Clerk Jackie Lawhon says that the

overlay will allow for full lot build-out and that land use and development procedures stay the same, but that the overlay will allow for more flexibility in the downtown area with building and rebuilding.

"It encourages business to come downtown rather than set up on Highway 319," Lawhon says.

Andy Easton and his firm out of Tallahassee was hired to develop Sopchoppy's land development code and was present at the workshop to give insight and a presentation on the definitions, logistics and things to think about when it comes to developing an LDC.

The group looked at several examples of ex-

isting codes and plans, which included architectural recommendations.

Easton explained that the city's land development code can be as detailed or as vague as is desired, but the comprehensive plan would be a mandatory portion for businesses to adhere to.

When discussing things like architectural recommendations and whether or not to make them a mandatory part of the code, Leonard Tarrt made it clear that he would rather not make architectural guidelines mandatory.

"We have enough mandatory things in this country," he said. Others seemed to agree but expressed the idea that they

would not like to see very much change by way of appearances.

"The charm of our town is what it is, the way that it is," said Lawhon.

Ideas on how to improve the city were also tossed around. Everyone seemed to agree that something as simple as striping the roads would be an asset.

In addition, it was said that with amenities such as signs, streets, sidewalks, parks, boat ramps and parking - the city could improve any and all of these in order to improve the condition and attractiveness of Sopchoppy.

A suggestion was even made for the city to consider becoming a golf cart

community or to market the area as a retirement community. This led to the suggestion of adding a medical facility, which in any case, some thought may be a good idea.

Adding a location for kayak, canoe and even summer cottage rental was also suggested, but the point was made by council members that the problem is getting someone with the resources to actually do something.

It was clear at Thursday's workshop that Sopchoppy citizens want to bring in more weekend visitors and hopes are that this new land development code will help them move forward in that direction.

Commissioner Richard Harden made it a point to say that he was in support of the grandfathering in of existing signs, only making them come into compliance if they are damaged.

"The way I understood this was that if the sign is already in place at the time that we do this, that they can stay in place," he said. "But in the event that they blow down or get damaged they're going to have to be replaced to the new standard."

"I would recommend we do this," urged Merritt. "We're not making it any worse on these signs if they're in noncompliance today - we're not making it any better, but we're not making it any worse."

Commissioner Jerry Moore seemed to agree with Merritt. "I can go along with this if we strike the 20 square feet and if everyone stays where they are and if your sign blows down you've got to come back under the code."

Commissioner Howard Kessler then asked: "The prior sign ordinance, when did it get put into place?"

A few moments passed as County Attorney Heather Encinosa and Serna searched for a date, during which time a few unnamed voices were claiming either 2005 or 1986.

"There were sign regulations in 1986 apparently," Serna found. "But billboard

changes were made in 2005."

"So, at least since 2005, we had restrictions and rules in place," said Kessler.

"And these are no tighter than they were back then with possibly the exception of a new category of the way-finding sign and addressing political signs during election years. So we've had no problem with the sign ordinance for at least eight years and we're not making it any tighter."

"That's correct," Serna said.

But Thomas stood by his argument. "Let's fix this," he said. "We're about to throw a lot of properties into a nonconforming status. I think the peo-

Concern about vote on wetlands ordinance

Town hall meeting set

Editor, The News:

An extremely important item is on the next Board of County Commissioners meeting agenda for Monday, June 17. It is so significant that I have scheduled a Town Hall meeting on June 13, Thursday, at 7 p.m. in the Commission Chambers in order to give citizens an opportunity to understand what is being proposed, express their opinions, and formulate how they may wish to respond to this proposal.

This agenda item states: "Request Board Approval to Direct Staff to Revise the Comprehensive Plan to Allow the BOCC to Grant Variances Inside the 35 Foot Wetland Buffer Zone And to Remove Isolated Wetlands from the Wetlands Ordinance."

If adopted, this will allow variances for construction of homes and buildings with zero space between themselves and the wetlands. In other words, it would make it possible for someone to build a home where he or she could step directly from that home into a wetland.

And, most importantly, it would completely eliminate protection for all isolated wetlands in Wakulla County - i.e., all

wetlands not connected to navigable waters.

Why is this so important? To properly answer this, one needs to consider the type of community Wakulla County is.

We are a community heavily dependent on seafood production, sport fishing, and sightseeing, specifically because of our wetlands.

Our wetlands produce the fish and seafood served in our restaurants. Our wetlands produce the fish that both our commercial and sport fishermen catch.

Our wetlands attract tourists to our county, who in turn spend thousands of dollars in our restaurants, motels, marinas, service stations, gift shops, grocery stores, and other small businesses.

Our wetlands bring birdwatchers and nature lovers to our county. Our wetlands have even brought people to our county who decide to live with nature and commute to jobs inland. It is the wetlands that make us the type of community that we are and that many of us wish for it to remain.

Need political balance

Preserving Wakulla's wetlands ordinance shouldn't be a partisan issue.

Across the aisle agreement on how to preserve the ecology of our county as the best local resource we have to stimulate the economy should be easy to achieve. However, the fact that this issue is coming back now that the county commission's party composition has changed leads me to believe that our local Republicans represent developers rather than Wakulla citizens.

It is a shame that we lost Commissioner Alan Brock in the last election. He was an advocate for a strong and sensible wetlands ordinance. He did not cave to the pressures of the developers. With the support of Commissioners Mike Stewart and Lynn Artz, he managed to stop this proposal the last time Commissioner Randy Merritt brought it up.

It appears that commissioners Merritt, Jerry Moore, and Ralph Thomas have all committed to getting rid of the wetlands ordinance. Without a serious effort by citizens to express opposition, it looks like the anti-wetlands commissioners will finally get their way.

We used to have some balance on our county commission. I believe in the system of checks and balances. Florida ran into trouble when one party

held all the seats in the legislature. Now that the Democratic Party has been able to break the super majority, some balance has been restored to the legislative process.

People often try to pretend the Republican Party is the party of Nixon, that the GOP is the party protecting the environment while cutting spending - but that isn't so. Nixon's cuts still left us with taxes at a higher percentage per capita than we pay today, so we could still maintain services.

It seems ironic that we are waiting on BP settlement funds to restore our local ecology while we advocate for variance changes that will contribute to further environmental deterioration.

If these commissioners have their way, the new Wakulla Environmental Institute will only be able to offer opportunities to study the ecological history of the beautiful wetlands that we used to have.

For this year's wetland assault, they are hoping to water it down to be all but nonexistent with variances allowed by them.

Some of these commissioners are the very ones who wanted it thrown out altogether just last year.

With the recent excitement in the air of Wakulla County moving forward and breaking ground with the Wakulla Environmental Institute, one would think that our county officials would get the message to stop trying to kill the goose that laid the golden egg, our ecosystem.

On one hand we are a county that embraces its ecotourism and natural wonders; on the other hand we have a BOCC majority that wastes time and energy at taxpayers expense trying to tear down the very ordinances that protect it.

The irony and hypocrisy of this BOCC may sadly be their legacy.

It's a shame that our BOCC isn't working to strengthen our Wetlands Ordinance.

This is the case in many forward thinking communities that understand that there is no healthy

ecosystem without a commitment to wetland protection.

You have to wonder whose interests are these commissioners representing? Not the citizens.

If adopted, this will allow variances for construction of homes and buildings with zero space between themselves and the wetlands.

In other words, it would make it possible for someone to build a home where he or she could step directly from that home into a wetland.

Most importantly, it would completely eliminate protection for all isolated wetlands in Wakulla County - i.e., all wetlands not connected to navigable waters.

Show up for the town hall meeting this Thursday, July 13 at 7 p.m. and let them hear your voices. Then plan to be at the June 17 BOCC meeting to let them know just how important our wetlands are and demand an end to this once and for all.

And when our commissioners are running for re-election a year from now, remind them again about their inexcusable and constant assault of our wetlands.

Remember, they all talked the environmental talk at election time, now let's see the walk.

Commissioner Jerry Moore will introduce a Proclamation at the County Commission meeting on June 17 to recognize the long and rich history of fishing and boat-building in Wakulla County and one individual who exemplifies this passing generation of craftsmen - master boat builder and lifelong fisherman, Larry Tucker.

The son of Edith and Jack Tucker from Panacea, Larry learned the trade 55 years ago as a child from his Uncle, Henry Taylor, a shipbuilder, and his grandfather, a shipwright.

They came from McIntyre where they lived for many years.

According to Tucker, "They built boats, and they built barrels, and they built anything that it took to survive. What they could trade, they traded. And that's how I got into it. Uncle Henry, he said, 'Boy, if you want something or other, all you got to do is just take the time and build it.'"

Together with Roger Pinholster, Tucker has been a driving force in founding the highly successful Boat Building program at the Big Bend Maritime Center, which is

located adjacent to Woolley Park in Panacea.

The Center, a project of Wakulla County in partnership with the public, is dedicated to furthering the skills and traditions of the founding generations through its program and displays, thereby advancing a wider understanding and appreciation by citizens of today and tomorrow.

In addition to declaring June 17 "Larry Tucker Day," the Maritime Center will christen its boat shop the Larry Tucker Watercraft Center.

Who has no major vic- es? Who never gets into trouble?

We're not just to be a little company of respectable people. What effect do you think it would have on the world if this is all it was and all it ever is?

This world is in desperate need for more than just the common, more than the insignificant.

How do we pull ourselves out of insignificance?

Well, the first step is

self-appraisal, not of what you are, but what, by the power and grace of God, you can become.

Most of us don't have any concept of our possibilities.

God's Word is the story of common, ordinary, insignificant persons. Most of them had all kinds of excuses, just like we do, good excuses. They were stammerers. They weren't very learned. They weren't gifted with intelligence. They didn't come from royal blood. They weren't strong physically. They didn't have much

money. They were young. They were old. They were middle-aged.

Besides, that, they had a lot of important things to do, just like you and me! Very important! You see, they had to fill barns and then build bigger ones and fill them. They had wives and children to look after. They had fathers to bury. They had to weave tents and catch fish and pay taxes - all of these very important things, you see.

The story of all of them is there. And almost all of them said, "Who me?"

Also, without exception, they were completely astounded at what the Lord was able to make out of their lives when they answered God's call.

It was Paul who said: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

Have you ever tried seeing what you could accomplish by the strength of Christ? Most of us, confronted by the problems of the world are just overwhelmed. Many feel like, if we can't do the whole job, we won't do anything.

It's been said: "I'm not everybody, but I'm somebody. I can't do everything, but I can do SOMETHING."

We can go through the daily routines, with a greater enjoyment of life, when those routines are more than ruts but are reaching out beyond ourselves, making a difference in the lives of others, for a purpose to which God is calling, challenging, equipping and fulfilling through us.

When that happens, even the mundane becomes divine, and daily life becomes more than a daily grind.

Poll: Most believe in Heaven; God not responsible for tragedies

Against a backdrop of horrific crimes and devastating natural disasters, 56 percent of Americans surveyed believe in the devil, 53 percent believe in hell and 43 percent believe in hell as "a place of suffering and punishment where people go after they die," according to a poll of 1,218 Americans conducted over Memorial Day weekend.

The survey also found that Americans don't hold God responsible for these tragedies with 86 percent believing natural disasters such as the Oklahoma tornado and Hurricane Sandy are a function of nature.

Sixty-one percent believe recent terror and crime episodes, such as the London terrorist attack, the Cleveland kidnapping/imprisonments and the Sandy Hook massacre are caused by "the evil in people's hearts" rather than "divine retri-

bution."

Equal numbers of respondents (38 percent) believe that people who commit violent criminal acts go to hell, as well as those who don't ask God's forgiveness for their sins before they die.

More than 61 percent believe they're going to heaven, while less than 2 percent believe they will go to hell.

Commissioned by the True Life in God Foundation, www.tlig.com, established by international humanitarian Vassula Ryden (author of the bestseller "Heaven is Real But So Is Hell" released in March 2013), the poll was conducted online from May 23-27 among 1,218 Americans age 18 and older with a margin of error of +/-2.9 percent. Respondents were equally split (50 percent) between male and female.

The new survey shows that while a majority of

Americans still believe in hell (54 percent), the number is declining. A 2008 Pew Forum on Religion & Public Life/U.S. Religious Landscape Survey showed that 59 percent of Americans believed in hell, and an earlier Pew study reported that 71 percent believed in hell as of 2001.

Other key findings include:

- 62 percent believe in heaven and think they are going there.

- 44 percent believe in hell as "a place of suffering and punishment where some people go after they die;"

- The 56 percent overall belief in the existence of the devil and 53 percent belief in hell was consistent across all the four survey age groups;

- With regard to what causes evil in the world, i.e., the Boston Marathon bombings, Sandy Hook school shooting and 9/11,

older respondents (45-60) say people are evil while younger respondents (18-29) say people are sick;

- 41 percent identify the devil as "Satan the fallen angel who rebelled against God and now tempts humans to do the same";

- 47 percent believe heaven is "God's dwelling place" while 44 percent believe heaven is "a spiritual dimension where good people go when they die."

The True Life in God Foundation conducted the survey to help Americans explore the existence and causes of evil in the world.

The foundation commissioned Survey Monkey, one of the leading polling companies in America, to survey a cross-section of Americans from every age group, region, ethnicity, religion and household income.

The survey follows the

release of "Heaven Is Real But So Is Hell," which hit No. 1 on Barnes & Noble online, as well as No. 1 in Christian Orthodoxy on Amazon following its March 16 release.

The book details Ryden's spiritual journey in which she received visions of heaven, hell, demons and angels, and the battle between good and evil in the world.

Vassula cautions skeptics who scoff at the existence of the devil: "The devil's most powerful tool is convincing us that he - and hell - do not exist. He works subtly and silently, feeding our doubts and inadequacies, sowing dissension and creating chaos and confusion in our lives. Evil is real, and we have to know how to respond to it."

Vassula believes prayer, forgiveness, reconciliation and service to others are the main tools to overcome the forces of evil.

The True Life in God Foundation was founded by author Ryden as an international non-profit organization that funds 25 Beth Myriam homes serving the poor in six countries. A Greek Orthodox Christian, Ryden has more than 1 million followers on social media, and has spoken to millions of people in 80 countries, including more than 500,000 in the Philippines alone.

An internationally-acclaimed advocate for peace and unity, Ryden was twice awarded Bangladesh's 2003 Gold Medal Peace Prize for her work in religious tolerance and aid to the poor. She has been endorsed by many government and religious leaders, and has met with leaders at the United Nations, the World Council of Churches and the Vatican, including Pope Francis and his two predecessors.



Local Track Athletes Name to All-Big Bend Team

Three local track and field athletes were recently recognized for their excellent performances during the 2013 Track and Field season by being named to the All-Big Bend Team.

Freshman high jumper Keith Gavin led the way by being named to the first team All Big Bend. Gavin, just a freshman, had an unbelievable season in his specialty, the high jump. He started the season with win at the Rickards Kick-off meet and remained undefeated until the State Meet at the end of April, winning every meet he competed in during the regular season, winning the District and Regional titles and finishing up with a second place finish at the State Meet.

In the process, he set a new school record of 6'8", which is a State Elite height as well as a first team U.S. standard height.

Junior middle distance ace Madison Harris was named to the second team All Big Bend in the 800 meters. Harris had an outstanding season capped off by winning

the 800 meters at the District Meet, winning at the Regional Meet, for the third consecutive year and stormed to a second place, runner-up finish at the State Meet.

In the process, Harris placed in her specialty at three of the largest and most prestigious meets held in the state. She finished second at the FSU Invitational, third at the huge Bob Hayes Meet in Jacksonville and fifth at the ultra-competitive Florida Relays in Gainesville.

During the course of the year, Harris set new school records in the 200 meters (26.32 seconds), 800 meters (2:14.78), 1600 meters (5:13.52), and was the anchor on the record setting 4x800 meter relay team (9:57.63). Her 800 meter time qualified as a State Elite time and 2nd Team U.S. Standard.

Junior high jumper Corion Knight also capped off an excellent season by being named to the second team All-Big Bend squad. He was recognized for his performances throughout the season, including a second place finish at the Bob Hayes Meet in Jacksonville, a runner-

up performance at the District Meet and a third place finish at Regionals. He finished the year off with a 5th place finish at the State Meet.

Although a junior, this was the first year Knight competed in the high jump and he finished with a personal best of 6'6", which was a State Elite height as well as a 2nd Team U.S. Standard.

The annual Track and Field Awards cookout was held in May at Wakulla Springs State Park. This gathering is intended to recognize the many athletes who participated in Track and Field at WHS this year.

It also gave the coaching staff an opportunity to personally thank all the parents, grandparents and others who supported the athletes throughout the season, both by attending the meets and, of course by providing financial support for the kids.

This season was extremely successful with many highpoints and outstanding performances by both boys and girls. This

included three individuals and one relay team qualifying for the State Meet, with all three individuals reaching the podium.

This report represents some cases the FWC handled in the Northwest Region over the week of May 31 to June 6. NORTHWEST REGION

FRANKLIN COUNTY: Officers Matt Gore and Jason Lipford spotted a vehicle in the area of 8-Mile. The vehicle was identified as one that was operated by an individual who received a judgment permanently revoking his recreational and commercial fishing privileges. The two officers tracked two subjects from the vehicle to the shoreline of Apalachicola Bay. From a position of concealment, the officers watched two subjects using cast nets to catch mullet. The officers left their position of concealment, identified themselves, and directed the subjects to return to the shore for a license and fish inspection. The subject with the revoked fishing privileges began to discard the fish from his bag and returned to shore with no fish. The subject was arrested for fishing while his license was revoked and for failure to permit inspection.

Officers continue to work complaints of illegal shellfish harvesting. Officer John Allen was on water patrol in Apala-

chicola Bay when he set up surveillance on a commercial vessel engaged in harvesting oysters. When the individuals started to leave the area, Officer Allen conducted a vessel stop and found the individuals in possession of three bags of oysters. The individual harvesting the oysters was cited for taking oysters between sunset and sunrise. Of-

ficer Allen returned the product back to the bay. The vessel operator was issued six boating safety warnings.

SANTA ROSA COUNTY: Officer Brandon Lewis was on patrol in Blackwater River State Forest when he observed four individuals in possession of alcoholic beverages in an area prohibiting

possession of alcohol beverages. Officer Lewis explained to the subjects that they could not possess alcohol in the area. Two of the subjects were under 21 years of age, and another subject, who was over 21, admitted the alcohol was his. The over-21-year-old man was issued the subject over 21 a criminal citation for giving alcohol to a person under the age of 21. The other individuals for possession of alcohol in the primitive area.



Coast Guard Auxiliary Reports

Many people plan vacations for fun and relaxation, and members Duane and Carolyn Treadon are no different.

However, this year they had the opportunity to vacation in Ohio where they were able to visit and tour an historic lighthouse in Fairport Harbor along with visit family.

As iconic as the St. Marks lighthouse is to our area, the Fairport lighthouse is equally important. The history dates back to 1925 when it was built to replace the existing lighthouse that had been in use for over 100 years.

Built in Buffalo, N.Y. and brought by the steamship Wotan to the west breakwater, the iron and steel structure was moved into place. When the interior was finished, the light was first illuminated on June 9, 1925.

Thankfully the older structure has been preserved and maintained by the Fairport Harbor Historical Society.

Over the years the lighthouse was tended by keepers until falling under the care of the United States Coast Guard in the 1940s.

So why plan a trip around a lighthouse? In 2005, the lighthouse was deemed excess by the U.S. Coast Guard.

When no other government or non-profit organizations were interested in taking over ownership, the lighthouse was put up for auction in accordance with the National Historic Lighthouse Preservation Act of 2000 (NHLPA), an amendment to the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966.

After three unsuccessful auctions, the lighthouse was successfully purchased by Sheila Consaul.

Part of the purchase

agreement included negotiating with several government agencies including the Army Corp of Engineers, the Department of Interior, the U.S. Coast Guard (which still maintains an active light), NOAA, the Ohio Historic Preservation Agency and many more since the lighthouse sits on federal property and is still a working aid to navigation. It also has an active weather station fixed to the tower.

After closing on the property on Nov. 11, 2011,

renovations began in the spring 2012.

Consaul plans to restore the lighthouse to its original state and use it for her summer home. Every June 9th, the lighthouse is open to the public to celebrate her birthday.

This year, there was also a tour of the building for those who wanted to learn more about the history and future!

There may be more trips to visit the lighthouse as renovations progress. There are even opportunities for the public to participate in some of the work.

Underwater Wakulla

The aquarium.

Keeping a creature penned up in a cage always bothered me, so aquariums have never been of interest. That being said, Gregg Stanton is a marine scientist so putting fish in a box and watching them interact is his idea of a good time.

Out of his fish interest came a store aquarium with more to come.

The aquarium was mostly uninteresting until recently. We started with some simple live shrimp from the marine supply store, since I was new to aquariums and especially to salt water aquariums.

Shrimp can be entertaining but they mostly enjoy burying themselves in the sand.

My next attempt, out of sheer simplicity, was to get some baitfish from the same marine supply store. Though not colorful, there was a good bit of entertainment value in watching them feast on the shrimp.

Lesson one, being an aquatic creature can be rather precarious.

After a few months, the great folks at Gulf Specimen Marine Lab in Panacea helped us out with a few more interesting and colorful critters. Our new residents included two large anemone, three urchins, two starfish, and hermit crabs. I'm told many animals do well in aquariums and we have only a small portion of what is available.

One of our hermit crabs came with four very small anemones that live on his shell and help defend him against Shame-faced crab predation. When these crabs move to a different shell, they usually take the shell residing anemones off and place them on their new shell. Our crab seems to like his new shell with only one anemone at the moment, leaving the rest on the old and now vacant shell.

The pink urchins we have, called *Litichynus*, love to decorate themselves with sea weed or shells. In our case they decorated themselves with the skeleton of their dearly departed amigo. The remaining bits were happily cleaned up by the starfish. Lesson two, nothing in the ocean goes to waste including waste.

Our starfish are also almost always on a random adventure. They stick to the glass not unlike "Peach" from "Finding Nemo." If I hand the starfish a food pellet they slowly move it to their mouths with tiny hydraulic fingers. They stay there and digest the food for many hours. You can watch the pellet slowly dissolve, being digested by the starfish's inverted stomach.

One of our starfish has six legs instead of five. I'm told this was due to an injury. If they lose a leg they sometimes grow two in its place.

I have since collected a few more hermit crabs, some small conch, and a dozen snails from the boat ramp in Dickerson Bay.

One crab was released again as it was a bully and a second became dinner for our mini ecosystem. Overall though, the aquarium is remarkably stable and the animals get along rather well.

Snails get decorated with anemones and take free rides on the backs of crabs, the urchins play a game I call "rearrange the fake plants," and the crabs move the rocks around.

Those of us at the store have spent a good bit of time staring through the glass at these thought-provoking creatures and frequently customers and their children watch too.

We need small colorful fish creatures next!

I still don't agree with caging animals but there is a phrase which says, "we don't protect what we don't understand" and this couldn't be truer.

Lesson three: these animals are tiny in comparison to the large gamefish our divers seek and yet they are just as important to the reef and its ecology.

Bonus, they are fun to watch for hours on end, above or below the waves.

Compact fluorescent bulbs re-visited

Your assignment for this weekend is to walk around your home and count how many regular incandescent light bulbs you still have.

Then I challenge you that before the summer is over, every remaining bulb will be changed to a compact fluorescent bulb (CFL).

To accomplish this consider buying one package of bulbs each time you go to the hardware or grocery stores to enable you to spread the expense over the summer months. The Environment Protection Agency reports that if every home in America replaced just one incandescent light bulb with an Energy Star qualified CFL, in one year it would save enough energy to light more than 3 million homes and prevent greenhouse gas emissions equivalent to more than 300,000 cars. Are you motivated yet?

Why this request? Because I am all about saving money, energy and the environment.

CFLs save in three ways, which include:

- They consume significantly less energy than incandescent bulbs. To produce the same brightness, an Energy Star qualified CFL uses only about one-fourth of the energy that an incandescent bulb uses.

- By using Energy Star qualified CFLs, you will save on air conditioning costs because they generate three-quarters less heat than regular incandescent bulbs.

- A CFL lasts up to 10 times longer than an incandescent bulb saving both time and money.

Let's review some of the principles of lighting. What is a CFL bulb?

It is a fluorescent tube of small diameter wound into a coil, spiral, or typical incandescent bulb shape so that it is comparable in size and shape to conventional incandescent light bulbs.

There is mercury in as a metallic element used in small amounts that, because of its behavior when exposed to air, requires special handling.

When you purchase a bulb, check its packaging for any restrictions on use. Some bulbs should not be used in enclosed fixtures and some may specify that the base be up or down.

Bulbs have also been modified for dimmer and 3-way switches. Many are for a specific fixture, such as recessed cans, dimmer switches or outdoor fixtures. Remember that using a 100 watt bulb in a fixture that calls for 40 watts can cause fire and/or electric shock.

What should you do with it when it burns out? Save it for a hazardous waste day to dispose of it properly. Be careful when you are removing the bulb from its packaging, installing it or replacing it. Always screw and unscrew the lamp by its base (not the glass) and never forcefully twist the CFL into a light socket.

Because the bulb contains mercury (roughly the amount equivalent to the tip of a ball-point pen), no mercury is released when the bulbs are intact or in use. If one does get broken, proper processes need to be followed and they are available at <http://www.epa.gov/mercury/spills/index.htm#fluorescent>.

How do you select a light bulb? You do by shopping in lumens, which are the units of measurement of brightness issued by a light source.

The following chart may be helpful while you shop for your CFL bulb. Consider cutting out the chart and keeping it in your wallet to use as a guide to insure you get the bulb you need.

CFL	Incandescent	Light output (lumens)
14	40	450-500
20	60	800-900
25	75	1,100-1,220
32	100	1,600-1,700
50	150	2,600-2,800

Have I convinced you to change all of your remaining incandescent bulbs this summer? I hope so.

Plan on all of your incandescent bulbs being replaced by the time school starts again in the fall.

Wakulla Berries offers blackberries

There was a time when small farms dotted the landscape of north Florida. The farm families were self-sufficient and produced what they needed to survive, if not prosper.

Today, farms of any size are difficult to find, but there is a notable exception in Wakulla County.

Wakulla Berries was established in 2012 by business partners Hillary Brigham and Rachel McClure. Their crop is thornless blackberries for the u-pick market.

While there are a few chickens, turkeys and miniature donkeys on the farm, this is a specialty crop operation run by the Brigham and McClure families.

"I saw a terrific thornless blackberry operation over towards the east side of Florida and knew of no one growing that crop locally," said Brigham. "Local foods are gaining popularity, especially if the consumer can have a real farm experience gathering them" she said.

Wild blackberries have long been a staple of summer deserts, jellies and fruit salads.

This farm features rows of blackberries as straight and neatly groomed as West Point cadets. There are two berry cultivars developed by University of Arkansas known for their large sweet fruit, Ouachita and Natchez. The blackberry canes are trellised and pruned so harvesting is no more challenging than reaching for an item



on a shelf.

While it is true blackberries are in the same plant family as roses, unlike roses these blackberries are thornless.

"We will be open for picking by the second week in June with Mother Nature's cooperation" said McClure.



In the garden now:

June is delivering the bounty of spring gardens all over Wakulla County. One of the most popular and versatile vegetables or fruit is the tomato.

Botanically, a tomato is a fruit. It is the ovary, along with the seeds, of a flowering plant. The confusion arises because tomatoes have a much lower amount of sugar compared to other fruit.

Historically, tomatoes began in Central American around 2,500 years ago. Archaeological records indicate the Aztec referred to the tomato as "the plump thing with a navel." Tomatoes spread around the globe with Spain's colonial efforts.

Every region developed its own special cultivars, each having unique colors and skin patterns. No other vegetable has the wide skin variation of a tomato.

Use of tomatoes is simple. Always store tomatoes at room temperature and away from direct sunlight. Use within one week after they are ripe.

Tomatoes taste best if not refrigerated. Only refrigerate if they will not be used within the first week of ripening.

For the health conscience, tomatoes are a rich source of vitamin C. They are low in fat with no saturated fats, low in sodium, cholesterol free and low calorie. They are also a good source of potassium. Most importantly, the home grown varieties taste great.

Caterpillars are nature's circus

There was a time when the circus came to town with a parade of the unusual, the unlikely, and the outright absurd. The colors were bright, garish, and easily attracted attention of anyone who happened to be in the proximity.

Even the most oblivious resident knew something unusual was occurring, which likely justified more than just a casual glance. Clearly, a transformative event was underway.

Today circus parades occur only in movies which resurrect the spectacle of days gone by. Luckily, for Wakulla County residents, there is still a transformative event which combines the garish colors and absurd appearance of a circus parade, but on a much smaller scale.

This year has proven to be a good one for caterpillars. Last winter was relatively mild so a minimum of eggs were lost and the spring has

been sufficiently moist to promote the growth of plants necessary to feed the plethora of these soon-to-be moths and butterflies.

It is important to understand most caterpillars feed on a specific and narrow range of plants, in some cases only one type of plant. With few exceptions, they are not the Biblical plague which strips the landscape bare of all plants and trees.

The exceptions, such as armyworm and cutworms, quickly attract the attention of farmers, ranchers and flocks of birds which react accordingly. These multitudes of nascent moths and butterflies are a nuisance because they are attracted to vast quantities of a crop monoculture and they can reproduce quickly.

Fortunately there are other caterpillars with much better reputations, at least in Wakulla County. One is the orange dog caterpillar which can be a problem in Florida's

orange producing region given its exclusive diet of citrus leaves.

As a means of camouflage the mature caterpillar resembles bird droppings, dingy brown and olive green with large white small purple patches. They also have red osmeterium or horns which they project when threatened, emitting a foul odor.

From this incongruous appearance, this caterpillar transforms into a giant swallowtail butterfly. Its wingspan reaches four

inches with a distinctive black and yellow pattern.

The saddleback caterpillars are mainly green with a brown area at both ends, and a prominent, white-ringed brown dot in the center which resembles a saddle. To add a bit of freakishness to their appearance, they have well-placed defensive spine which can inflict painful stings.

This "punk rock" appearing caterpillar can be found in variety of foliage as they feed on a

large selection of plants. The moth produced is a non-descript dark brown and stout-bodied.

The whitemarked tussock caterpillar favors the area's oak trees. Its four white tufts are carried on its back and offset the black horns and tail. The bright red bulbous head is located just below the black horns and is in stark contrast to the remainder of the body. Their hairs are a noted allergen for any unlucky person who contacts them.

All of these and many

more caterpillars are active in Wakulla County in June. Caution is advised because some do produce a sting.
