## City of Panacea gets closer

Approval by county commission passes 4-1, legislative delegation will take up matter at hearing next week

Commissioner Howard Kessler's was the lone vote against allowing efforts toward the incorporation of Panacea to move forward, which came before the board at their meeting on Dec. 9.

Commissioner Kessler cited subsidization and his wish for a revenue neutral proposal as the reason for his vote.

"I don't see the county doing the best thing by jumping in," he said. "I'm not willing to take taxpayers dollars and gamble on this."

Others were unhappy with the item, but for a different reason. Citizens expressed concern about the fact that they had no idea about the issue at hand due to its absence on the meeting's agenda.

"I have no idea whether this is a good idea or not because it wasn't on the agenda," said Chuck Hess, a citizen at the meeting. "I think you're doing it wrong."

Commissioners contended that the reason it was put on as a county administrator item was because there was a crucial upcoming deadline.

Before Panacea can incorporate, they must obtain legislative approval before then presenting a referendum for the citizens of Panacea to vote on. In order for that to happen, information must be prepared and submitted in time for a Dec. 19 meeting held by the county's legislative delegation.

"This is not a vote on whether or not to incorporate Panacea," said County Administrator David Edwards. "The citizens of

that city will do that."

It was also pointed out that an interlocal agreement still had to be worked out between the two governments in the event of incorporation and that is where most of the

important details will be hashed out and voted on.

Instead, the vote on Monday was on whether or not the county would support its efforts moving forward, or in other words, approve the effects that

incorporation will have on the county's budget.

According to Edwards, since the workshop held in November where Panacea's draft budget allocations were less than satisfactory for the board,

### Legislators will be here Dec. 19

The Wakulla County Legislative Delegation will be holding a public hearing in the county commission chambers on Thursday, Dec. 19, at 6 p.m.

All residents and elected officials are invited to attend. This hearing will allow the citizens the opportunity to meet their legislators, discuss concerns, ask questions and offer comments for upcoming 2014 Legislative Session.

Also, immediately following the regular public hearing, the delegation will be taking up for consideration and discussion a proposed local bill for the 2014 Legislative Session, relating to the incorporation of Panacea.

county staff has done a lot in an effort to help the small town, while still protecting the county's interests.

"We have minimized the risk to county taxpayers while still supporting Panacea," he said.

In the first year, Edwards said, it will cost the county about \$28,000 in tax revenues if the city does decide to incorporate. However, it was pointed out that with the ability to apply for grants and improve their town individually, there will be doors opened up which could potentially boost property values as well as bring in taxpaying citizens or, at least, more visitors to the area.

"There are pros and cons to this," Chairman Richard Harden said. "But I fully support a community that wants to take this initiative." Harden reiterated that the vote would allow the issue to go to the Legislature. "If that doesn't happen, then people will never get to vote."

Commissioner Randy Merritt seemed to look at it from an investment point of view. "I think it's worth the \$28,000 to allow Panacea the opportunity for them, like St. Marks has done, to obtain grants and improve their community."

At the November workshop, Commissioner Ralph Thomas expressed his uneasiness with moving forward due to what he called "the price tag" for the county. However, he commended Edwards on Monday night for the hard work he put in to find the best way possible for moving forward. "There is never enough money to go around and we're charged with balancing that," said Thomas. "I think this would be a small investment on our part and it will give them the opportunity to benefit our county."

With support from Commissioners Merritt, Thomas, Moore and Harden the item passed with a 4-1 vote.

## BP restoration money funds three Wakulla projects

Improvements slated for Mashes Sands, Shell Point Beach and St. Marks boat ramp

County Administrator David Edwards announced at Monday night's board meeting that Wakulla will receive funding for three of the Natural Resource Damage Assessment (NRDA) projects that it submitted.

An upgrade to Mashes Sands Park in the amount of \$1.5 million was approved, as was \$880,000 for the renourishment of Shell

Point Beach and \$50,000 was approved to go towards improvements to St. Marks' boat ramp.

The St. Marks project, Edwards said, was one that the city had applied for and received with some help from the county.

The Shell Point renourishment project will address concerns raised in a 2007 feasibility study executed by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, which designated that the approximately

one mile long shoreline as critically eroding.

The effects of the erosion, most likely caused in large part by Hurricanes Kate in 1985 and Dennis in 2005, plan to be reversed by dredging the channel and restoring sand to the beach's shoreline.

Also envisioned for the project will be the establishment of a public boat ramp and navigation signage.

Improvements to the Mashes Sands Park are

intended to enhance the beach enjoyment and services to the public as well as to protect the beach area. Categories of improvements outlined in the application submitted by the county last year include:

- Beach restoration and a concrete retaining wall;
- Rehabilitation of the roadway and parking area;
- ADA parking and access path to restroom and

Santa will be calling children when he has time so please include your name and phone number on your letters.



## Santa will appear Friday at Christmas in the Park



Santa will arrive at about 6 p.m.





# Workshop held for potential candidates

Elections supervisor Buddy Wells talks about issues of running for office

About eight people attended a workshop held on election procedures put on by Supervisor of Elections Buddy Wells on Friday, Dec. 6.

According to Wells, even though legislation is constantly changing, becoming a candidate is a very easy process.

"It's nothing to be afraid of," Wells said. "If you want to run, come on. There are requirements, but you can do it." The elections office, he said, is there to help with anything they can. "We're limited as to what we can do, but I'll help in any way I can," he said.

The first step in becoming a candidate is filing an Appointment and Designation of Campaign Depository, which is also referred to as a DS-DE 9 form. A campaign treasurer, Wells said, can be anyone, including the candidate. Any one treasurer is allowed to serve more than one candidate and each candidate may have up to three deputy treasurers to manage reports and detail campaign account transactions. The DS-DE 9 form must be filed for each intended treasurer before a candidate may accept any contributions, make any expenditure, collect any petition signatures or open a campaign account.

In 2014, there will be two elections. The primaries will take place on Aug. 26 and the general election on Nov. 4. Those running for local offices will be up for election during the primaries, said Wells.

For the upcoming local election in August, a candidate who intends to qualify by means of petition signatures must have their minimum valid signatures (185) in by noon

on May 5.

According to Wells, petition signatures will be strictly checked against requirements which include:

- Signatures must be submitted on the form prescribed by the elections office;
- they must be signed by voters residing within the county;
- they must have the voter's date of birth or their voter identification number, as well as the address or P.O. box, and the voter's signature and date.

Something to watch for, Wells said, is the voter's last name. "It has to match the voter's registration card," he said. "If you've married and changed your name, be sure to make the necessary changes beforehand," he said.

For those who choose not to collect signatures, or attempted to but failed to reach the threshold and still want to run for office, they may pay a cash amount during a qualifying period between noon on June 16 to noon on June 20.

"Very few people choose to go the cash route," Wells said.

Either route a candidate chooses, however, they are required to submit other important forms, including a Form 6, or a Public Disclosure of Financial Interests, by their qualifying week. A Form 6 is really important, Wells said.

"The Commission on Ethics doesn't play around, it's serious," said Chief Deputy of Elections Joseph Morgan.

"If you've got it, put it down," said Wells. "It's best just to be straight up with people."

Party affiliations are also something to think about when a candidate decides to run for office. "You must be a member of the party you're running as for at least a full year before the qualifying date," said Wells.

However, there are three nonpartisan offices, which do not permit candidates to run on any platform. "Soil and water, judges and school board candidates are not allowed to include their party affiliation in their campaign," he said.

Wells wanted to remind voters that their voting registration becomes invalid if they don't vote for four consecutive years - or two general elections.

"The main idea is to encourage people to stay active in the electoral process," he said.

There are three methods of voting for convenience: Voting by mail - or requesting an absentee ballot - in which case a ballot will be mailed to the voter and must be returned by 7 p.m. on election day; Early voting, where voting may take place up to 10 days prior to election day at a designated place and regular election day voting where voting takes place at a pre-determined voting precinct.

Currently, Wakulla does have one candidate who has already filed for the upcoming election - Jo Ann Daniels, who is running for the Wakulla County School Board from District 5.

Wells and his staff were commended for their hard work by attendees of the workshop as it came to a close.

# Minor injuries in school bus crash

A Wakulla County school bus was involved in a crash on Wednesday, Dec. 4, on U.S. Highway 319, north of Bloxham Cutoff, as the bus was driving students home from school.

According to the Florida Highway Patrol, the bus was traveling northbound on 319 at about 3:15 p.m. and was slowing down and preparing to stop and had turned on its yellow flashing warning light when a vehicle behind the bus failed to slow down and struck the rear of the bus.

Two children in the vehicle that struck the bus suffered minor injuries and were transported to Tallahassee Memorial Hospital. A 14-year-old child on the bus was also reported to have minor injuries, but it's unclear from the report if the teen was taken to the hospital.

A 2001 Toyota Sequoia driven by Rodney Preston Massey, 24, suffered an estimated \$10,000 worth of damage in the collision. Massey and a passenger in the vehicle, Claudia Jenette Massey, 23, suffered minor injuries, as did a 4-year-old and 9-month-old in the car with them.

The bus suffered an estimated \$8,000 worth of damage, according to FHP.



## Astounded at county in CHAT issue

**Editor, The News:**

I am continually dumbfounded with some of the politics in Wakulla County.

For many years the county has received excellent treatment of abandoned or rescued animals. I use animals because for many years CHAT (Citizens for Humane Animal Treatment) took care of horses, goats or whatever was rescued in the community.

As a member of CHAT and past president, I am very familiar with the efforts of our volunteers. The fundraising by citizens of Wakulla County has provided medical treatment for all the animals brought to us. We provided an aluminum animal carrier for the back of animal controls truck. We built a pole barn and storage facility for the horses and other livestock. The storage area kept the hay & feed protected from the elements and rats. We have had animals taken to various veterinary schools for specialized treatments. All of this at no cost to the citizens of Wakulla County.

We are a private non-profit. Many people have spent countless hours developing grant requests, scrutinizing financial records for accuracy and meeting with professionals to guarantee

CHAT followed the letter of the law. At no cost to the county.

Spay and neuter vouchers were provided. All of the animals that were adopted from CHAT had a clean bill of health and were spayed or neutered at no cost to the county. I wonder if the citizens of Wakulla County realize what the cost will be to them for this because it is required per F.S. 823.15. School children have received publications that CHAT paid for. Community events were held at CHAT's expense.

Now because of short sightedness of our county administrator, most of that will end. Someone else may take over the adoption program, however I cannot perceive that they will have the dedicated volunteers to provide the oversight CHAT has.

I hope the citizens of Wakulla county understand the impact financially this may have on them. Also, the reputation this community has had of providing our animals with the best care possible. It is sad that this community ignored the gift they had with CHAT's adoption program.

## TCC to offer diving course

Special to The News

Beginning in January 2014, the TCC Wakulla Environmental Institute, in conjunction with the Wakulla Diving Center, will offer a semester long Introduction to Professional Diving course.

The training will be held at the Florida A&M University pool, in cooperation with the Florida A&M Aquatics Program. In addition to in-state or out-of-state tuition, as appropriate, the three-credit-hour course will have a lab fee of \$297. Applicants must take a swim test before beginning the course.

The 16-week multidisciplinary course will train students in the fundamentals of basic diving, with the opportunity to learn the elements of professional diving. Students will learn basic and advanced diving skills and receive training in life support tools, hose diving, side-mounts,

closed-circuit re-breathers, and remotely operated underwater vehicles (ROVs). Upon course completion, students will become qualified as SCUBA open-circuit air and nitrox divers.

"This is an exciting, unique opportunity for students and will be the first of many yet to come at our Wakulla based Environmental campus as it continues to grow," said Bob Ballard, executive director of the TCC Wakulla Environmental Institute.

Among upcoming opportunities in Wakulla County will be the eventual diving exploration of the natural cave system and sinkholes that run under the TCC Wakulla Environmental Institute campus, possibly linking the campus to the Gulf of Mexico.

## BP funding for three projects

- beach;
- Restroom facility improvements;
  - Stabilized solid waste receptacles; and
  - Signage and education kiosks.

Once funds are actually received, the projected implementation time for each of the above projects is one year, followed by completion estimated between one and five years.

The funding originates from the Deepwater Horizon oil spill commonly

referred to as the BP oil spill.

In April of 2011, the oil company agreed to provide \$1 billion in early restoration funds to NRDA for projects.

According to a Dec. 6 press release from DEP, 28 total projects have been approved throughout the state's panhandle - three of which were submitted by Wakulla.

All 28 projects will total \$88 million of the \$100 million that is accessible to Florida.

Wakulla's total awarded amount is \$2.4 million

with no match required for the funding.

"This is big for our county," Edwards said Monday night. "We received 10 percent of the funds that we applied for and are very pleased with that."

Moving forward, DEP will hold two public meetings before entering into an agreement with the BP Trust - the provider of the funds.

Those public meetings will take place in Pensacola on Jan. 28 and in Panama City on Jan. 29, according to DEP.



# Laws prohibit co-mingling of human remains

Ground burial has long been the traditional choice for interment in America.

In recent years, however, cremation has become a viable choice among the adventurous baby boomers.

As they prepare for their final expenses, many questions arise.

One question, in particular, is asked more often than any other, "Can my pet be cremated with me?"

It is illegal to co-mingle human remains. In other words, two humans may not be cremated in the same chamber, at the same time.

Likewise, it is illegal to cremate an animal where human beings are cremated. Plainly speaking, your pet may not be cremated at the same crematorium where you may be cremated.

As a licensed funeral director, I often witness family members slipping mementos into a loved one's casket, immediately before it is closed. In fact, I recently observed a

very young nephew slip a little wooden box into his Uncle's casket.

The box had a doggy paw engraved upon it, next to the name, "Love."

It was a very touching moment, and caused me to think seriously about my own pet's living situation, when my time comes to meet my maker.

As with interment, inurnment (the process of placing cremains in an urn) offers unique choices to achieve your final wishes. One might choose an appropriate location where their cremains, and the cremains of their pet, might be sprinkled together.

An appropriate choice might be the old oak tree, at his or her family home place. If one has chosen to have their cremains buried, a double cremation vault might be an appropriate selection. A double cremation vault encases two urns of cremains. One urn might encase the master's cremains, the other urn might encase the pet's cremains.

If you find yourself in this unique situation, you will need to have the assistance of a very special someone to accomplish your final wishes. It may just turn out that your very young nephew surprisingly steps forward to accomplish this final act of "Love" for you and your pet.

My best advice: "Be kind to animals, and to your very young nephews. Sometimes even the tiniest humans turn out to be our biggest champions."

## Barnes is named 2013 Top Academic Scholar

Wakulla County received the Florida's Bright Futures Scholarship Program final summary report this last week.

According to the report, Wakulla High School had 55 eligible students that qualified for the three different Florida scholarships. Each scholarship is based on a student's cumulative grade point average (GPA), top scores on ACT/SAT tests, and required community service hours. Of the 55 students awarded, 10 were awarded the Florida Academic Award (FAA), 35 were awarded the Florida Medallion Award (FMA), and 10 were awarded the Florida Gold Seal Award (FGA).

The FAA awards the highest monetary amount of the three scholarships, paying more per credit hour but it also has the most rigorous qualifications.

There is only one Florida Academic Scholar (FAS) award recipient in each district (including both public and private high schools).

The Academic Top Scholar Award award recipient receives a cost

per credit hour award (established by the Florida Legislature in the General Appropriations Act) in addition to the Florida Academic Scholars award.

To be designated an Academic Top Scholar, a student must meet the eligibility requirements for an initial FAS award, have received funding at an eligible Florida postsecondary institution during the fall term of the academic year following high school graduation, and be the highest ranked FAS award recipient in the county where the student last attended high school.

Jeffery Drew Barnes met all of these qualifications and was named Wakulla County's Top Academic Scholar for 2013.

Wakulla County School Board and the Wakulla High School teachers, staff and administrators congratulate Jeffrey on a job well done.

Five lucky anglers who signed up at TrophyCatchFlorida.com started celebrating the holidays early when their own special Santa delivered big, with a boat and motor, or fishing trip and gift cards.

TrophyCatch is a special reward-driven angler recognition program that encourages Florida anglers to take extra care to document and live-release largemouth bass heavier than 8 pounds.

The program is conducted by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and supported by corporate partners, who provide the incentives.

By simply registering, more than 4,000 anglers became eligible the first year in a drawing for a Phoenix 619 Pro bass boat powered by a Mercury 200SX outboard.

In October, a random drawing was conducted to select five finalists

for the boat and special consolation prizes. The finalists were announced by Teresa Johnson, Phoenix's chief operating officer, along with Tom Champeau, director of the FWC's Division of Freshwater Fisheries Management and KP Clements, TrophyCatch coordinator (see video at YouTube.Com/TrophyCatchFlorida).

Frank Ay, the grand-prize winner, originally learned about TrophyCatch through an email sent out by FWC (Note: Anglers can sign up for custom emails at MyFWC.com by selecting the red envelope in the top banner).

Ay lives in North Lauderdale and works at Sy Katz Produce as an inspector, where his boss sympathizes with Ay's bass fishing addiction. Ay is a member of Big Reel Bassmasters of Margate, which is known for its charity Ghosts & Goblins fishing event. Ay said his



biggest largemouth bass was 10 pounds, 2 ounces. He caught it in a small pond in Coconut Creek.

Ay was surprised at a Big Reel Bassmasters club tournament on Lake Okeechobee on Nov. 24 by pro angler Bobby Lane, Champeau, Clements and television celebrity and producer Keith Alan, where he was awarded the \$40,000 boat and outboard motor (see video at bit.ly/Phoenix-giveaway).

The four runners-up

in the TrophyCatch registration giveaway were Rocco Cantalupo from Clearwater, Mark Frost from Melrose, Jason Haynes from Lady Lake and Andrew Walton from Toronto. The runners-up each won a trip to Bienville Plantation and \$100 gift cards (\$300 total) from FWC TrophyCatch partners, including Bass Pro Shops, Dick's Sporting Goods and Rapala lures, as well as a Bass King T-shirt.

Every angler in a

household should register separately, because Phoenix and Mercury will be giving another boat and motor to the lucky angler for season two, which began on Oct. 1 and ends on September 30, 2014.

Whether registrants catch a fish or not, they are eligible for the drawing. If you are already registered, you do not need to register again. However, this year, for every bass you have verified in TrophyCatch, you'll get 10 additional chances to win the boat. So register, go fishing and document your catches at TrophyCatchFlorida.com.

By submitting photos for verification online, anglers also become eligible for a custom certificate and decal, plus awards based on the bass's weight. Lunger Club entrants (8-9.9 pounds) each receive a \$50 Bass Pro Shops gift card and Bass King T-shirt. Trophy Club participants (10-12.9

pounds) earn a total of \$150 worth of gift cards (Bass Pro Shops, Dick's Sporting Goods and/or Rapala), plus a long-sleeve T-shirt.

To be entered into the Hall of Fame, anglers must catch, carefully document and release a bass weighing more than 13 pounds – but it's worth it. Hall-of-Fame entrants also receive a free \$500 fiberglass mount of their fish from New Waves Taxidermy, \$200 in gift cards, a duffle bag full of Bass King apparel, a Glen Lau video library and other prizes worth a total of \$1,000.

The biggest bass of the year, for the second season will again win a TrophyCatch championship ring, from the American Outdoor Fund.

### OUTTA THE WOODS

## December filled with holiday hunting traditions

There's finally a chill and certain festiveness in the air as most of us try to take time off from work to enjoy spending quality time with family and friends and reflect on the passing year.

Children will be out of school on winter break soon, and while the holiday season is upon us, so are several traditional hunting opportunities.

The second phase of waterfowl and coot season comes in statewide Dec. 7 and runs through Jan. 26.

In addition to the usual hunting license and permit requirements, duck hunters also must have a Florida waterfowl permit (\$5) and a federal duck stamp (\$15).

The daily bag limit on ducks is six, but you need to know your ducks before you pull the trigger, because there are different daily limits for each species.

For instance, within the six-bird limit there may be only one black duck, one mottled duck and one fulvous whistling-duck.

Only two of your six-bird limit may be canvasbacks, pintails, redheads or scaup, and three may be wood ducks.

And you may have no more than four scoters or four mallards (of which only two may be female)

in your bag.

All other species of ducks can be taken up to the six-bird limit, except harlequin ducks.

The daily limit on coots is 15, and there's a five-bird limit on mergansers, only two of which may be hooded.

When hunting waterfowl, hunters may use only nontoxic shotgun shells. Only iron (steel), bismuth-tin and various tungsten-alloys are permissible.

For something different, try woodcock hunting. Woodcock season again runs Dec. 18 to Jan. 31. Woodcocks are excellent game birds because they hold well for pointing bird dogs and provide a challenging shot when flushed. The daily bag limit is three.

The third phase of mourning and white-winged dove season opens Dec. 14 and runs through Jan. 12. The daily bag limit is 15 birds.

From November on,

the shooting hours for all migratory birds are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

However, you must get a no-cost migratory bird permit where you purchase your hunting license before you hunt any of these birds.

The only firearm you can use to hunt migratory game birds is a shotgun, no larger than 10-gauge.

Shotguns must be plugged to a three-shell capacity (magazine and chamber combined). Bows also are legal.

Retrievers and bird dogs can be useful in hunting migratory game birds. Artificial decoys and manual or mouth-operated bird calls also are legal and essential gear for duck hunters.

You may hunt migratory game birds over an agricultural field if the crop was planted by regular agricultural methods.

However, don't even think about "sweetening" the field by scattering

agricultural products over it – or anywhere near it – or you could wind up in serious trouble.

It doesn't matter if you aren't the one who scattered the bait. If you knew or should have known that such bait was present, you're accountable under federal law.

Some other things you can't do while hunting migratory game birds include using rifles, pistols, crossbows, traps, snares, nets, sinkboxes, swivel guns, punt guns, battery guns, machine guns, fish hooks, poisons, drugs, explosive substances, live decoys and recorded bird calls, sounds or electrically amplified bird-call imitations.

It is also against the law to shoot from a moving automobile or boat and herd or drive birds with vehicles or vessels.

Bobcat and other hunting season always runs Dec. 1 to March 1, and there's no daily bag or season limit on either

species.

Like foxes, bobcats may be chased year-round with dogs, but possessing firearms during the closed season, between March 2 and Nov. 30, is prohibited.

On a few wildlife management areas, bobcats and otters may not be taken, so please consult the specific area brochure before you hunt.

December has the hunting opportunities you're looking for, whether you are upland-bird hunting with friends and family, shooting ducks on the pond with your favorite lab or taking that big cat as he slips up behind an unsuspecting fawn.

Here's wishing you happy holidays and a successful hunting season.

If you can, remember to introduce someone new to our great sport.

As always, have fun, hunt safely and ethically, and we'll see you in the woods!



WEEKLY ROUNDUP – (Recap and analysis of the week in state government)

## A week on the battlefields of the past

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 6 – You could be forgiven for looking around and wondering whether you've stepped back in time a year or two – or even further.

The gambling discussions that have tied the Florida Legislature in knots over the last several years keep coming up. Gov. Rick Scott and Secretary of State Ken Detzner are still tangling with elections supervisors over voting procedures.

And, at least in one corner of the state, Union soldiers are still the least popular people around.

On most of the issues, there at least appears to be some movement. Suggestions by House Speaker Will Weatherford, R-Wesley Chapel, on how to move gambling legislation forward might help prod his reluctant chamber to action. And Detzner and Pinellas County Superintendent Deborah Clark have defused their conflict over where absentee ballots can be returned in an upcoming congressional special election.

As for the Civil War? In some ways, it's still raging 150 years after it was fought for the first time. Why would it end now?

### PLUGGING THE 'DRIP, DRIP, DRIP' OF EXPANDED GAMBLING

With the Senate seeming to gear up for gambling legislation next session and some House members reluctant to expand gambling, Weatherford suggested a new idea this week that could provide cover to some lawmakers: a constitutional amendment.

In an interview Monday with The News Service of Florida, Weatherford said he wants to put a proposal on the 2014 ballot that would let voters decide if they should weigh in on future expansion of gambling.

While the details are still

being crafted, the amendment would set in stone any changes lawmakers agree to during the 2014 session and require statewide approval of any future gambling expansion. Like other constitutional amendments, the proposal would require 60 percent approval by voters to pass.

Weatherford said it's part of the "holistic look at gaming" the Legislature is undertaking that includes a swath of issues from casino-style resorts to blackjack at South Florida tracks to getting rid of greyhound racing altogether.

"I have become over the years very concerned with the drip, drip, drip expansion of gaming that's taken place in the state of Florida. I am certainly warming up to the idea of having a constitutional amendment that would require all future expansion to go before the voters. I'm very, very intrigued by that concept," Weatherford said.

Weatherford's proposal would be linked in theory to a comprehensive gambling bill that could include a rewrite of the state's gambling laws and regulations, the creation of a gambling commission and, possibly, a kitchen-sink of elements sought by existing race tracks and frontons as well as destination resorts coveted by out-of-state casino operators.

The idea could also spark a lobbying frenzy, given the increasing difficulty of getting any expansion of gambling through if the amendment passed.

"There's no question that if everyone believed any future expansion after the 2014 session required a statewide vote, all the gaming interests would do whatever they could to try to include anything they could in the comprehensive legislation," said lobbyist Nick Iarossi, who represents Las Vegas Sands, one of the casino operators pushing lawmakers to approve at least one convention-style hotel and casino in Broward or Miami-Dade counties.

But enshrining the new laws so quickly into the constitution could be problematic. Any mistakes would leave lawmakers scrambling to get a fix through the Legislature – and hoping that voters would approve it.

### DON'T CRITICIZE IT, LEGALIZE IT?

Of course, a constitutional amendment also has to gain the approval of the Supreme Court to get on the ballot – a bar that supporters of an initiative to legalize medical marijuana are trying to clear. Justices considered on Thursday whether the proposal would make it too easy to get one's hands on weed.

"The way I read it, it would seem to be if a student's just stressed over exams, and they go in and see a doctor, and they said, 'I'm really stressed out.' (The doctor says,) 'Well, I've got something I can help you with,' and prescribes marijuana. Wouldn't that be included in this?" said Chief Justice Ricky Polston.

Supporters disagreed and said some open-ended language was meant to leave the ultimate decision of what could be treated with marijuana to doctors.

"The sponsors were focused on two things: the patient and how best to make that determination for a patient, which is very much focused on physician decision," said Jon Mills, representing the amendment's backers. "So a list (of conditions) alone would not be adequate."

Whatever happens at the court, Orlando attorney John Morgan – who has shelled out more than \$1 million so that his "army of angels" could bring pot to ill Floridians – said his side would eventually win the battle.

### BALLOT BOX BATTLE

The relationship between Scott and local elections supervisors has been rocky at

best ever since an election overhaul approved by the GOP-controlled Legislature and signed into law in 2011.

Detzner was ranking elections supervisors, but later dropped the idea after the independent-minded officials complained. There was the flawed attempt to purge suspected non-citizens from the voting rolls, abandoned last year after more outrage from supervisors but revived by Detzner this year.

And added to that list was a Nov. 25 directive by Detzner essentially ordering supervisors to stop providing secure boxes at early voting sites where voters could drop off completed absentee ballots.

"Supervisors should not solicit return of absentee ballots at any place other than a supervisor's office, except for the purpose of having the absentee ballots cancelled if the voter wants to vote in person," Detzner wrote in the directive.

One supervisor overseeing an important special election said, in so many words: No.

Clark, the Pinellas County supervisor, said this week she didn't plan to follow Detzner's order in the special election to choose a successor for the late Congressman C.W. Bill Young. The primary is scheduled Jan. 14, while the general election is set for March 11.

In a letter to Detzner, Clark laid out the security procedures that her office uses at the locations where voters can drop their ballots.

"They are specifically directed at ensuring the sanctity and integrity of both the ballots and the election," Clark wrote. "Given my firm belief that my use of drop-off locations for absentee ballots as set forth herein is in full compliance with the law, I plan to continue using them, including in the impending special primary election."

Eventually, Detzner agreed not to go to court in an effort to force Clark to follow the directive.

### OLD TIMES THERE ARE NOT FORGOTTEN

Meanwhile, the state parks system was taking fire over a proposal to add a Union monument to the Olustee Battlefield Historic State Park near Lake City. A public meeting at the Columbia County School District Auditorium drew a rousing rendition of "Dixie," the waving of a large Confederate flag by an African-American opponent of the monument and at least one call for the Legislature to intervene.

The chorus of the song about the land of cotton was led by H.K. Edgerton, the black man who called Union soldiers rapists and wielded the Stars and Bars like a conductor's baton as the audience sang.

Speakers blasted the proposal as disturbing hallowed ground in a rural community where most families stay for generations.

"Men died there. Let their spirits rest in peace," said Nansea Marham Miller, who is descended from a Confederate soldier who died at Olustee. "Let my grandfather rest in peace."

The park – in the Osceola National Forest, 50 miles west of Jacksonville – was the site of a four-hour battle on Feb. 20, 1864, in which Union forces were routed by Confederate troops.

## Rioja Gran Reserva: Expensive but a remarkable value

Each year, the wine world eagerly awaits Wine Spectator's Top 100 list.

Since 1988, the magazine's editors have looked back over the wines they've reviewed over the previous 12 months to rank the 100 wines that most impress them "based on quality, value, availability, and excitement."

This year, the competition was stiffer than ever; more than 20,000 wines vied for a spot on the coveted list. It's no wonder why retailers and consumers alike have made a parlor game out of speculating which wine will land at the top.

This year's highest honor went to the 2004 Imperial Gran Reserva from Cune, a fifth-generation, family-run winery in Rioja, Spain. This marked the first time that a Spanish wine came in first, so the news was celebrated across Spain. In the United States, the announcement helped bring attention to a region that's been overlooked and undervalued for far too long.

Cune's 2004 Imperial Gran Reserva isn't cheap – it retails for around \$60. But it still represents a remarkable value and helps demonstrate why smart wine consumers love Rioja.

Consider its age. Few wine shops – and even fewer restaurants – offer aged wine. There are storage constraints, to be sure, but there's also the fact that

consumers have grown accustomed to young wines. It's estimated that nine in 10 bottles are consumed within 24 hours of purchase. So vintners craft their bottlings with this statistic in mind, producing wines that are juicy and approachable from the get-go.

Once upon a time, though, wine consumers would have scoffed at such drinking habits. High-quality wines develop complexity in the bottle. The tannins soften, interesting aromas emerge, and flavors become more harmonious. That's why, even today, most oenophiles insist on waiting about a decade before opening high-end wines from Bordeaux, Barolo, and other famous wine regions.

In Rioja, where reds typically consist of Tempranillo with a healthy dose of Grenache and a few other grapes, four different styles of wine are produced – and each comes with specific aging requirements.

A basic "Rioja" is typically released one year after harvest. A "Crianza" is aged for at least two years, with at least one full year in oak. A "Reserva" is aged for at least three years, with at least one full year in oak. A "Gran Reserva" – like Cune's 2004 Imperial – is aged for at least five years, with two years in oak and three years in bottle.

Some producers go well beyond the official aging requirements, only releasing their wines when they're

ready. That's why Cune's "current" Gran Reserva is about 10 years old. One of Rioja's most established producers, Lopez de Heredia, only recently released its 1994 Gran Reserva!

Or consider the quality of Cune's Gran Reserva.

Cune, like most producers in Rioja, only designates certain vintages the Gran Reserva designation. At Muga, another traditional producer in Rioja, the winemaker decided that 2002, 2003, 2007, and 2008 weren't worthy of Gran Reserva status.

These wines are expensive, to be sure. One of my most memorable drinking experiences of the year was with La Rioja Alta's 2001 Gran Reserva "904," which cost about \$50. A special-occasion wine, to be sure. But an incredibly compelling experience that could only be matched in Bordeaux or Napa by spending about three times as much – and waiting 10 or more years.

It's no wonder why Cune's 2004 Imperial Gran Reserva took home Wine Spectator's top prize this year. When it comes to "quality, value, availability, and excitement," Rioja leaves most regions in the dust.

## Some tips for holiday survival

Recently we hosted a Girls Night Out: Holiday Survival workshop during which we gathered with women from across the Florida panhandle through interactive video and shared food, gifting and stress relief ideas to better prepare for the upcoming holiday season.

Sometimes the season's many activities get in the way of really enjoying the family times that happen during this season. Consider these ideas during these last days before the celebrations begin.

Food offers such a magical touch to the holidays. Consider how your food preparation can be enhanced through such simple ways.

**The table:** Dig out all of your votive candle holders and place them in the center of square of iridescent, metallic or holiday cellophane wrap that you have had in storage from a package you received last year. Bring the edges up and ruffle them evenly, tie a ribbon or cord midway around the candleholder, then flare the ruffled edges outward. The candle will look larger and have more reflection when burning.

**Appetizers and snacks:** Use hollowed-out vegetables as edible containers for dips. Try red, yellow or green bell peppers, cutting off the tip where it's widest so there is ample room for dipping. Small heads of red or green cabbage or iceberg lettuce with the center removed also make an attractive bowl. Squash (zucchini or yellow), cut in half right through the stem with the centers removed provide a great bowl for dips. Surround the "bowl" with cut-up vegetables or other dippers. Consider that you will need no serving bowls and the storage space you will save. Serve snack mixes, in carafes or pitchers with wide spouts for easy pouring.

**Meats, main dishes and side dishes:** Use sprigs of fresh rosemary as a garnish. Dust it with powdered sugar to look like snowy evergreen branches. Use holiday-shaped whole wheat pasta for a festive twist to your pasta dishes. Use green onion tops or chives to make bows around bundles of vegetable sticks or whole green beans.

**Breads:** If making breadsticks, curve one end to look like a candy can.

#### DE-STRESSING DURING THE HOLIDAYS

Since the celebrations are about to begin, my final reminder to you is to take care of yourself. Do so by eating healthy foods, getting plenty of rest, exercising and taking time out for relaxing activities. By doing so, you will renew yourself physically and emotionally.

#### GIFT IDEAS

Several years ago my sister and close friends determined that our homes were filled to capacity and that often the gifts exchanged were really not necessary to show the affection and the blessings realized through our relationships. We now seek out alternative markets to choose appropriate charities to make a donation in another's name. We have been able to assist others in our communities, around the country and worldwide. If a gift is determined necessary, we give useful gifts, not trinkets and souvenirs.

We tried to focus on these gift-giving ideas during our Survival workshop. We made bath salts, cheese trays from old cookie sheets painted with chalkboard paint.

We explored Japanese Furoshiki, a gift wrap that promotes caring for the environment by reducing waste. It is an eco-friendly wrapping cloth used initially to wrap gifts and then later used as a home or personal adornment.

Use new fabric or previously-used clothing by cutting a fabric square no smaller than 15x15 inches. Diagrams of creative wraps are available to encourage creativity.

For another gift, we used re-cycled cups and saucers from the local re-sale stores to make a teacup bird feeder.

## Mustard Greens

The uncertainty of fall weather makes autumn gardening a challenge in Wakulla County. It is too cold for the summer vegetables, and the ups and downs of the temperature can make cool season crops a challenge.

If it is warm too long the leafy, cool season vegetables will bolt, putting up flowers to produce seed. When bolting occurs, the quality and quantity of usable vegetables declines.

Luckily, mustard greens are a somewhat temperature-tolerant, cool season vegetable that is easy and inexpensive to grow. A dollar will purchase hundreds if not thousands of seed.

Mustard plants are several species identified in the Brassica genus. The edible leaf can be curly or straight, but are prolific producers for gardeners, novice or expert.

Brassic plants include turnips, cabbage, collards and radishes, all popular vegetable garden plants in the United States. All have small seed, mustard especially so.

Mustard plants have been cultivated in Europe and Asia for more than 7,000 years, and were one of the

basic staples of early civilization.

The hard small seed were a challenge to harvest, but had excellent storage features.

In the ancient days when population shifts could be sudden and without much notice, mustard seeds were compact, dependable and a short-season crop. These same qualities made them ideal for early trade.

Like many other recent imports, mustard arrived via sailing ship. Spanish explorers introduced mustard to the Americas as a cheap, high volume crop.

Sowing mustard is simple. Distribute the seed in rows and cover with a slight amount of soil.

Mustard seeds usually germinate in three to 10 days. Cool temperatures and a moist soil offer the best chance for success.

Many gardeners dilute their seed for ease of sowing. If properly mixed, the sand allows for the even distribution of the seed.

Thinning the plants, once they germinate, is advised. If the plants are too thick disease and insect problems may result.

Mustard greens are the most pungent of the cooking greens and lend a peppery flavor to food. The leaves are the basis for many regional and

family dishes.

When preparing a dish, look for leaves with a green color and no blemishes or which show any yellowing or withering. Discard any bruised or yellow leaves and gently wrap unwashed mustard greens in paper towels and store loosely in a plastic bag.

Keep moist and cool in the lower part of the refrigerator in a vegetable bin. Mustard greens can be stored for up to five days.

Mustard greens are fat free, low in sodium, cholesterol free and a good source of fiber, vitamin A, C and K, folate and manganese. As part of a healthy diet of fruits and vegetables, they are one of the best ways to develop a strong defense against disease.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. -- Sooner or later, they were bound to run out of Powerade coolers on the Florida State sideline.

As the seconds ticked down on No. 1 Florida State's 45-7 victory over No. 20 Duke in the ACC Championship Game, just about every member of the Seminoles' coaching staff fell prey to a shower of ice, water and high-fructose corn syrup in the midst of 40-degree temperatures in downtown Charlotte.

"I just felt like everyone else was doing their coaches, so why not do our coach?" Devonta Freeman said after he and fellow running back James Wilder Jr. doused coach Jay Graham.

Not that anyone minded. In clinching their first appearance in the BCS National Championship Game in 13 years, the Seminoles partied like it was, well, 1999.

Senior safety Terrence Brooks clutched an oversized rose between his teeth, a nod to the title game's host site, the Rose Bowl stadium in Pasadena, Calif.

Players danced, hugged and swam through a sea of confetti as quarterback Jameis Winston preached from the post-game podium that they still had work to do.

Even newly minted celebrity Frankie Grizzle-Malgrat, the FSU ball boy better known as "Red Lightning" after his bright-as-a-tomato hair and beard, took part in the revelry on the field at Bank of America Stadium.

"It's surreal, man," senior receiver Kenny Shaw said. "It's what we came here for and we finally got it."

It was hardly an easy road. A program that won a combined 22 games in the three seasons before Jimbo Fisher took over as head coach required a thorough renovation.

A year ago, after a 12-2 season, an ACC title and a victory

in the Orange Bowl, the Seminoles were needled by national media who said that this was as good as things would get for this program. That season-breaking losses to the North Carolina States and Virginias of the world, the likes of which FSU had suffered often in Fisher's first three seasons, were here to stay.

But by the time the clock hit zero here on Saturday night, Florida State – from Fisher on down to his senior class, Heisman favorite quarterback and beyond – had irreversibly rewritten the narrative.

Jimbo Fisher's Seminoles are the unanimous No. 1 team in the nation. In a month, they'll play SEC champ Auburn for the national championship.

"It was just a reckoning," senior linebacker Telvin Smith said. "We tried to put ourselves back to where we were supposed to be."

In the 13 years following the end of Florida State's "dynasty" era, the program has been fol-

lowed by the same, dogged question:

When will Florida State be "back?"

We asked it as the Seminoles slogged through a decade that

actually featured more highlights – in the first half of it, anyway – than people tend to remember.

We doubted it when Florida State sunk to once unthinkable depths in the late-2000s, regularly losing to perennial ACC bottom-feeders while its chief rival hoarded Heisman Trophies and national championships.

And as the program started to show signs of life under Fisher, we still wondered if he was the right man for the job after its occasional stumbles.

It turns out, though, that we were asking the wrong question all along.

These Seminoles were never interested in placing themselves alongside their predecessors from the '80s and '90s. They're making their own way.


It's fitting, then, that Florida State will play for the national championship game at the Rose Bowl, a place where no FSU team has ever played.

No, the Seminoles aren't back.

They're going somewhere they've never been.





# Cousins of the common house fly aren't so bad

The housefly, *Musca domestica*, is the most common domestic fly in Wakulla County and just about everywhere else on the planet. It accounts for about 90 percent of all flies in areas of human habitations.

It has the notoriety of being one of the most widely distributed insects and is universally loathed. The housefly is considered a disease carrying pest which can be the vector for some serious bacterial infections.

Any insect which is labelled a fly becomes an immediate target for annihilation. There is a whole industry which produces flyswatters, flypaper, and fly baits and is committed to the wholesale destruction of the fly.

In Wakulla County the housefly has two insect cousins which have many of the same negative personal habits, but a few positive attributes which warrant consideration.

The soldier fly and the robber fly are not nearly as well known, but frequent many of the same locales as the housefly.

The scientific name for the soldier fly, *Stratiomyidae*, is derived from the Greek word for soldier.

Variations of this insect are also found in Europe too, where the Germans refer to it as an armed fly.

The soldier fly's appearance is somewhat wasp-like which is considered a form of defensive mimicry, confusing potential predators into believing that a sting will accompany any close encounter.

They are identified with black and yellow or sometimes metallic green markings. The soldier flies are often seen in their inactive state which is usually resting with their wings placed one above the other over the abdomen.

Soldier fly larvae are found in varying environments, most commonly in damp soil, sod, under bark, in animal manures, compost and in swamps. The larvae are mainly scavengers, consuming the organic scraps and castoffs of other animals and insects.

Like many scavengers, their importance is in converting waste products into usable form for plants. The larvae are dark earth tone and may be confused with leaf litter, unless they wiggle.

Adults usually are found near the larval habitats. They have distinctive three segment antennae and have a maximum length of about three-fourths of an inch.

The adult soldier flies sustain themselves on wildflower nectar, which is easy to locate most of the year in North Florida. The remainder of their short lives is committed to finding the ideal site for their eggs.

The robber fly is slightly smaller than the soldier fly. It too has antennae with three segments, but its behavior is quite different.

They are tiny predators that attack and feed on a long list of insects and spiders. If traditional prey is in short supply, they will feed on each other.

The robber fly bayonets its victims with its short, strong beak or proboscis. The target is injected with saliva containing digestive enzymes and a neurotoxin to immobilize it.

The unlucky insect or spider is quickly paralyzed as the robber fly's venom dissolves its internal structure. The liquefied material is syphoned through the robber fly's proboscis and the search for a new mark begins. Luckily, humans are not on the menu.


