## Arrest for coach's death

**Man charged with vehicular manslaughter reportedly didn't stop because he was drunk; had a previous hit-and-run in 2008**

A man was charged on Friday with the hit-and-run death of popular coach Paul Hoover last year.

According to the State Attorney's Office, Jarvis Strickland was arrested in Gadsden County by the Florida Highway Patrol on a Leon County warrant.

The state attorney's office said that Strickland faces charges of vehicular manslaughter and leaving the scene of a crash with death, both 1st degree felonies punishable by a maximum of 30 years in prison.

Hoover, a popular track and cross coun-

try coach, was hit in May 2017 while out for an evening jog on Springhill Road. Hoover was struck by a speeding car and killed as he crossed the road at a marked crossing. The site is just across the county line in Leon County, making it a Leon County case.

Hoover was a beloved figure as a coach at Wakulla High School and was credited with having a profound impact on the lives of the runners he worked with. A retired wildlife officer, he still worked part-time as a bailiff at the Wakulla County Courthouse.

According to the state attorney's office, Strickland was serving

probation on Wakulla charges and reporting to the probation office in Gadsden.

According to court records, Strickland was serving three years probation for possession of a controlled substance

from 2017. It also appears he had served two years of probation for a 2008 charge of leaving the scene of an accident involving personal injury.

According to the probable cause affidavit, the Florida Highway Patrol knew from an eyewitness and security cameras at a nearby convenience store what kind of car had struck Hoover – a gold Toyota Camry.

A break in the case came from some high school students reporting to Principal Mike Barwick, who told the Wakulla County Sheriff's Office, that another student had overheard a cell phone conversation between his mom

and Jarvis Strickland in which he said he had just hit somebody on Springhill Road.

Shortly after the incident, FHP went to interview Edna Sue Strickland, Jarvis Strickland's mother and

owner of the Camry, but she refused to talk and gave the investigator the business card of Tallahassee attorney Joseph Bodiford.

Bodiford told FHP where to look for the car, and the burnt-out remains were found off a two-rut road off Smith Creek Highway, about a mile from Ms. Strickland's home.

The car still had the tag and vehicle identification number attached.

The investigators knew they had the car, but faced the challenge of determining who was driving at the time of the wreck.

They did that using cell phone records –

Preston Gage Pitman, 22, was remembered at Wakulla Off Road's Crooked Creek mud event recently.

A hundred people turned out in attendance this past Memorial Day weekend, May 26-28, 2018.

Pitman was shot to death at a recent graduation party in the woods near the St. Marks River.

The entertainment for the mud event was entirely dedicated by local artist DJ Butch, Corey Benedict.

"I first met Gage at the Soppo Fourth of July celebration. Because of his warm personality and his love of family and music, we connected immediately," Benedict said.

"I went to school with his father, Page Pitman, and it is a shame to lose such a kind person as Gage. I wanted to dedicate my show to him (Gage) and keep his memory alive musically – by lighting up his memory and keeping the crowd focused on the great

## Jo Ann Daniels seeks re-election

**Retired principal is running for another term on the Wakulla County School Board**

School Board member Jo Ann Daniels is serving a four year term and is up for re-election in August.

Daniels is a retired principal who spent her entire career as a teacher and administrator in Wakulla County. She started as a science teacher at Wakulla High School and transferred to Wakulla Middle when it opened in 1980.

After receiving her Master's Degree in Educational Leadership in 1989, she was named Assistant Principal for Curriculum. In that role, she was able to write and win several grants which enabled her to design and implement two technology lab classrooms as well as order equipment, computers and software for students to learn job related skills such as graphics, animation, robotics and sign making.

Daniels became principal in 1997 and served in that capacity for 12 years.

As a teacher and administrator, Daniels earned experience



in all aspects of the school system and is very familiar with the budget, county policies and both school level and district level procedures. She feels that this gives her valuable insight when finding solutions and handling issues.

Since becoming a school board member,

Daniels has spent innumerable hours volunteering at Wakulla Schools. She has over 250 logged-in hours at the elementary schools alone.

Daniels tutors students in math, reads novels aloud, teaches Spanish to a group of 4th graders and works with small groups of

students in whatever subject they need help.

During Project Learning Tree days, Daniels volunteers her time to teach the students about our marine coast ecology, sea life or rocks and minerals. In addition, she is perfectly willing to teach the class how to make pumpkin pie as a lesson in measurement.

An active community member, Daniels is currently the Vice President of the Wakulla Academic Boosters and helps raise money to provide scholarships for high school seniors.

As a member of the Coastal Optimist Club, Daniels, who is serving as president, devotes a lot of time planning and organizing events that encourage academics such as the Oratorical, Essay and Poster contests.

She also helps purchase and provide school supplies each year for all county schools as well as toys at Christmas for kids in need.

## State may require advanced septic tanks

**DEP says advanced septic tanks will reduce nitrates in Wakulla Springs**

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection is proposing a plan to reduce pollution in many Florida springs. The Basin Management Action Plan (BMAP) may cost many local homeowners thousands of dollars.

The plans are required by the Florida Springs and Aquifer Protection Act of 2016 and must be approved by the end of this month.

County Commissioner Randy Merritt, who is an engineer, said right now they don't know what DEP will require, but he hopes the county can enhance drain fields, and the residents won't have to upgrade to performance-based systems.

Merritt said the initial costs for a performance based septic systems is about \$2,000 to \$3,000 but they are much more expensive in the long run.

Commission Chair Ralph Thomas said over a 20-year period it could possibly cost taxpayers \$100 million if Gov. Rick Scott signs off on the proposal on July 1. He noted that that is just a guess, depending on construction costs, and systems that may fail.

He also said that if the developer or homeowner has access to a sewer system, and can connect to it within the next five years, this wouldn't affect them if the BMAP is finalized.

DEP has assessed the water quality in 30 of Florida's more than 700 springs. They determined that 24 of the 30 springs are polluted with nitrates.

DEP drafted a priority focus area, which include a large portion of Wakulla, Leon and Gadsden counties, which they say largely contributes

# Clyde Collins hired as new building official

Wakulla County will soon have a new chief building official.

County commissioners voted unanimously on June 4 to confirm County Administrator David Edwards' appointment of Robert "Clyde" Collins to the position.

Collins, who has served as Gadsden County's building official for the past 12 years, was the top choice out of five candidates.

His last day in Gadsden County is June 18, and he's set to start in Wakulla on July 2, as the current chief building official James Melvin retires.

Collins said coming to work for Wakulla county is a better opportunity for him and his family.

"I'm looking forward to helping the people like I always have," Collins said. "I've enjoyed my time in Gadsden, but it's time for a new chapter."

Collins said once he

officially starts, he'll begin looking to find a new building inspector.

(Former Building Inspector Al Smythe was terminated by the county in March. He claims he was a whistleblower and his firing was politically motivated – that he had uncovered and reported shoddy work by county commissioner Randy Merritt, who is an engineer by trade. Smythe filed numerous complaints against Merritt with the state Board of Professional Engineers.

(The county fired Smythe for failing to respond to public records requests by Merritt's attorney.)

Edwards told the

commissioners that Collins "is going to be a big asset to our county."

In another matter, commissioners voted to advertise a public hearing on the Lake Ellen boat ramp.

"Right now we're proposing that there is going to be a primitive launch there," Commissioner Mike Stewart said. "If you can get your boat in the water with that primitive launch, then it can have no bigger than a 25 horse motor on it."

The commissioners are also want to prohibit the launch of personal watercraft such as Jet Skis from the boat ramp. However, these rules will not apply to property owners on the lake who launch from their own property. The prohibition on larger boat motors or personal watercraft would only apply to those using the public boat ramp.

Commissioner Ralph Thomas said he wants to allow swimming at Lake Ellen. He noted that the no swimming rule for Upper Bridge is

violated every summer. "I think we can coexist with boats there, just like we have our entire lives," said Thomas.

He added that it's important for the public to weigh in before the public hearing because they are about to decide.

Stewart suggested that concerned citizens

reach out to commissioners to voice their opinion on Lake Ellen.

In other matters:  
• The board voted unanimously to approve a resolution in support of Florida legislative action to adopt the Department of Environmental Protection's recommendations in their 2010

Retail Bags Report to the legislature.

• The board voted unanimously to approve Dewberry Preble-Rish, Inc. work authorization in the amount of \$30,000 for design and permitting services to relocate a sewer force-main on Crawfordville Highway.

## Bring back partisan elections?

Wakulla County commissioners rejected an idea to bring back partisan elections for county office.

At the June 4 meeting, commissioner Jerry Moore proposed amending the county charter to allow a return to partisan elections, but his motion ultimately died for lack of a second.

In 2014, citizens voted to amend the county charter to require non-partisan election of all elected county officials. (The only local political office that is still partisan is school superintendent.)

Moore argued that voters have no idea as to which party a candidate belongs, and so have no idea of the candidates' philosophy of govern-

ment.

Michele Harden of Sopchoppy, wife of former Commissioner Richard Harden, supported Moore's proposal. She said during the last election a young lady told her she had voted her party's ticket in the local election.

"I pondered that for a moment, and asked her how did you do that, because at his point, of course, the ballots don't include the party," Harden said. "She told me that her particular party always puts their candidate first on the ballot."

Harden said she told the woman she had voted very randomly for the person who had the good fortune to be the first alphabetically.

Moore said he wanted to reconsider it because several people have asked him who to vote for.

For favorite Fried Chicken, it's neck-and-neck between Lindy's Fried Chicken and Food 'n' Fill's Krispy Krunchy.



to the Wakulla Springs pollution.

Melissa Corbett, a senior planner with the Wakulla County Building Department, said the BMAP is for all springs suffering problems from pollutants. Its goal is to reduce pollution, and improve the overall health of springs.

Corbett said for the last 10 to 15 years there has been a decline in animal species at Wakulla Springs. For example, she said biologists have confirmed that apple snails are disappearing at Wakulla Springs, and they are important for the ecosystem. Meanwhile, there has been an increase in algae, which is blocking out light and choking the other vegetation.

"What they found is there are increased amounts of nitrogen," Corbett said.

Fertilizers and human and animal waste, feed algae that eventually suffocates water bodies.

Corbett said one way DEP is trying to cut back on the pollution is by enforcing farmers to use Best Management Practices for agriculture, which are practical, cost-effective actions that agricultural producers can take to conserve water and reduce the amount of pesticides, fertilizers, animal waste and other pollutants that enter water resources.

BMPs are designed to benefit water quality and water conservation while maintaining or even enhancing agricultural production, according to Fresh From Florida's website.

According to the drafted BMAP, farm fertilizer represents 20 percent of the total nitrogen loading to groundwater based on the DEP analysis, while sewage treatment and disposal systems represents 35 percent.

Corbett said they anticipate that DEP might also put forth new requirements on septic tanks.

"Essentially if you're in the area that they say contributes to Wakulla Springs, you may have to get performance-based or advanced treatment septic systems when developing, or if there is a sewer system, they can connect to it," Corbett said.

DEP previously documented elevated nitrate concentrations in groundwater beneath septage application zones in spring areas.

upset by hearing of Pitman's death that he had to shut down his shop for a few days.


Harrell later offered free tattoos to Pitman's family and friends to keep his memory alive forever through ink.

## Court shorts

Formal charges for second degree murder and carrying a concealed firearm were filed against Riley Attridge on Wednesday, June 6.

Attridge, 20, is charged with killing Preston Gage Pitman, 22, on May 19 at a graduation party in the woods off St. Marks Rise Road.

According to reports, Attridge and Pitman had a confrontation over a girl – Pitman's girlfriend, who had formerly dated Attridge.

Attridge reportedly pulled a .22-caliber semi-automatic handgun and shot Pitman

multiple times.

Other partygoers subdued Attridge after the shooting – including hitting him in the head with a beer bottle – to restrain him until deputies arrived.

Attridge reportedly told deputies he was

defending himself when he shot Pitman.

If convicted of second-degree murder, Attridge could face a maximum sentence of life in prison.

• Brian Harper, 39, pleaded no contest to a charge of armed robbery with a deadly weapon, a first degree felony punishable by life in prison, and retail grand theft, and, as part of a negotiated plea, was sentenced to 834 days in the Wakulla County Jail with time considered served.

The sentence was pronounced by Wakulla Circuit Judge James Shelfer in felony court on Thursday, June 7.

As part of the sen-

tence, Harper was also ordered to serve five years of mental health probation.

Harper's case has been pending for three years, and he has spent much of that time judged incompetent and under the care of state Department of Children and Families.

In court, Judge Shelfer confirmed that Harper understood the charges and what was happening.

According to the arrest report, in January 2015, Harper and another man were walking out of Walmart with a 50-inch flat-screen TV valued at \$1,000, when they were confronted by

a store manager who asked to see a receipt.

Harper allegedly pulled a knife and made an aggressive gesture.

The store manager, fearing for his safety, let the men pass but got the tag number of the Chrysler sedan they drove off in.

He also noted that the man who threatened him had a cloudy eye and spiderweb tattoos on his elbows.

Detectives got store surveillance video of the men, and traced the van to a woman in Tallahassee. Interviewed by detectives, the woman identified the men in the photos – including Harper – and said

Harper and the other man had recently borrowed her car.

Harper's cloudy eye, she said, was the result of having recently been sprayed by battery acid.

The other man in the photos agreed to talk to detectives and reportedly said that he drove Harper to the Walmart and that Harper went in and took a vacuum cleaner off a shelf and then tried to return it for money. When the return was refused, he walked out of the store with it.

Harper and the other man then changed their clothes and went back in a took a TV, with Harper confronting the manager on the way out.

## Arrest for hit-and-run death of Paul Hoover

knowing that Strickland had called his girlfriend shortly after the wreck, they subpoenaed phone records and were able to confirm phone calls Strickland made to his girlfriend at 8:08 and

8:11 p.m. Tracking the cell towers for the calls indicates his approximate location – which puts him at or around the scene of the death.

Hoover was struck around 8 p.m. in the crosswalk.

Strickland was at his girlfriend's home

in Panacea earlier that day, reportedly drinking. He reportedly became irritated that she had friends over and he left.

Sometime later, he called his girlfriend and told her he had hit someone and was going to kill himself. The call got dropped. He reportedly called back and said he had hit a person, and she said for him to go back. He allegedly responded that he couldn't because he was drunk.

At the time, a car headed southbound driven by a Wakulla County emergency medical technician – coming home from school at Tallahassee Community College – passed Hoover out running, and then saw the gold sedan speeding on Springhill.

Then the EMT heard the Toyota's brakes lock up and saw a

cloud of smoke as the car skidded. The EMT turned around and went to the scene to offer assistance and found Hoover dead and the car that struck him gone.

FHP accident reconstruction indicated the car that hit Hoover was going 87 mph in the 55 mph zone.

The car was speeding in the northbound lane, but crossed into the southbound lane in the marked crossing where it struck Hoover.

Hoover was knocked 35 feet by the speeding car and was dead when the EMT checked for a pulse, according to the FHP report.

FHP's report also notes that, had the car been traveling at the posted speed limit of 55 mph it would have been able to stop in 149.96 feet and would not have struck Hoover.

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
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# Camphor Shot borer drills holes to get to ethanol

Summertime with warm weather and leisure hours offers almost unlimited opportunity for residents and visitors to enjoy Wakulla County's unspoiled environment.

In some cases, gasoline-powered engines are necessary to reach the natural wonders on an expeditious schedule.

The presence of these modern conveniences is not necessarily intrusive or obnoxious to others who are propelled by animal power. The engines are similar, if not identical, to those used in home power equipment which is used to maintain the lawn and landscape.

In addition to accelerated travel, these contemporary conveyances have far fewer problems than draft animals which were utilized up until about a century ago.

Frequently, as in several times a day, watering and feeding along with insect control came along with four-footed transportation.

Internal combustion engines fueled by

gasoline have not had those requirements – until now. Today you may unexpectedly find holes in plastic gas containers left outside for a few days.

Worse, holes in the gas lines and gas tanks of power equipment have been experienced. The effected equipment appears to have been shot repeatedly with a BB gun or caught in the pattern of a shotgun's birdshot discharge.

Closer examination of the mysterious cavities will reveal the true culprit.

It is not a malicious 12 year old with a pellet gun and bad judgement nor a myopic dove hunter.

The offender is a bug known by an assortment of common names including Camphor Shot borer here in North Florida. This insect is a type of ambrosia beetle, the entomological cousin to the Redbay Ambrosia Beetle which is killing the local bay trees.

Euwallacea fornicates, as it is scientifically known, is also an exotic invasive

native to southeast Asia. Like its highly destructive cousin, it carries a fungus in its mouth which helps it digest plant material, and it is thought to be only mildly toxic to local plants and trees.

While it is not a horticulture threat in the United States, it is a major problem in some parts of the world.

Tea producing areas are frantically attempting to control this insect which has earned the name tea shot-hole borer.

Typical of this group of beetles, to locate potential meals

it focuses on a chemical compound exuded by distressed trees. Whether insects, disease or any other stressors, trees emit ethanol and therein lays the problem for power equipment owners.

The Camphor Shot borers detect the presence of ethanol in the fuel mixture and literally dig in for a meal. The unlucky equipment owner is left to replace useless components which have the fluid-holding capacity of Swiss cheese.

Unfortunately, the options for controlling

this situation are limited. Of course steel replacement parts are impervious to this insect's attacks.

The use of fuel without ethanol is another possibility. Both options are inconvenient and expensive, but not as expensive as replacing parts and fuel containers.

There are no insecticides on-label to spray or dust power equipment and it is doubtful any of those chemical would remain for long.

Proper storage in a secure site may offer some protection.

Riding a donkey is

fine for a trip to the bottom of the Grand Canyon, but it would be a slow and rough trip through the forest.

Worse yet, the yellow flies will put holes in the beast of burden and the rider.

## Enjoy the water safely this summer

During the hot summer months, many people flock to the water for a little fun in the sun. Fortunately for us, Wakulla County is blessed with an abundance of water bodies which are popular recreation sites.

However, the water can be dangerous if proper safety precautions are not followed.

Be aware of the surroundings, especially when swimming in natural bodies of water. Take heed of rapidly changing weather conditions and seek shelter when appropriate. Fast-moving currents, even in shallow water, should be avoided.

Sharp rocks or debris at the bottom of a river, pond, or lake can be hazardous. Be careful when swimming or diving where this type of debris is present.

Diving should only be done in designated places and in water at least nine feet deep and free of underwater obstacles.

Know the swimming skills of everyone present. Stronger swimmers should watch out for weaker swimmers.

Weaker swimmers should also wear U.S. Coast Guard approved life jackets. Swimming in designated swimming areas with trained lifeguards is the safest option for everyone.

Never swim alone. Always enter shallow water with caution, feet first.

Falling, jumping, or diving into the water from a height such as trees, ledges, or bridges is potentially very dangerous and should be avoided.

One thing not always considered is the potential for water-borne illnesses. Many natural bodies of water may be contaminated by animal waste, runoff, or even sewage.

Contact the state or Wakulla health departments to find out if any local water bodies are unsafe. Always avoid swallowing the water while swimming, if possible.

No one is safe from drowning, even strong swimmers. Participation in swimming lessons can strengthen swimming skill, but do not think one lesson (or even one set of lessons) is enough to turn someone into a strong swimmer.

Like anything else, swimming takes practice to master. Just like weightlifting can strengthen muscles, continual practice can strengthen swimming ability. Make sure lessons are age-appropriate and match the swimmer's skill level.

If someone is in trouble in the water, alert the lifeguard, if available. They are fully trained to handle a potential drowning emergency.

Learn when and how to call 9-1-1 if necessary. Keep appropriate equipment such as life jackets, cell phones, first aid kits, and reaching or throwing equipment on hand to aid someone in an emergency.

The best person to make a rescue is a trained professional. If one is not available, be careful in the attempt.

Reach out to the person with something they can grasp firmly, but maintain stability at the other end at all times. If they are beyond reach, try throwing them an object they can use to keep afloat, like a foam cooler or an inner tube.

Only enter the water wearing a life jacket, and only then, remain in the shallow part of the water where footing is more solid. Then reach out to the person with an oar, pole, or tree branch and try to pull them back towards land.

Swimming is a fun and healthy way to enjoy the summer while staying cool in the Florida heat. However, it is important to stay safe in the water. By following a few safety precautions, Wakulla's beautiful water resources can be enjoyed safely by everyone.

## In the garden now: Insects

### Monitor for destructive insects in your garden

Summer is here. The thermometer knows it and the plants are responding with unrestrained growth and production.

The ample moisture adds to the lush growth of both ornamental horticulture specimens along with fruit and vegetable production. As such there is plenty to do in the gardens and landscapes in Wakulla County.

One of the first tasks is to monitor for destructive insects. It is important to remember there are many beneficial insects and just because a creature has six legs it should not automatically be sent to its demise.

Chewing insects are currently active in north Florida along with piercing and sucking insects. Each is highly effective at damage and destruction of a variety of leafy species.

The most common chewing insects are grasshoppers and caterpillars. There are many local species in each group and some can be quite destructive.

The armyworm, really a caterpillar for a bland colored moth, is likely the reigning champion for individual consumption of desirable plant material. This boneless bug has the appearance of an elongated balloon inflated to the point of splitting.

It is not a persnickety eater, so it may be seen on a wide variety of plants, shrubs and even weeds. The evidence of its presence is quickly evident in the vast number of gnawed and missing leaves.

As for the grasshoppers, the lubber species is the prince of pigging out on the landscape. Also known as the Georgia Thumper, this eating machine is happy to dine where ever it lands.

The piercing and sucking insects includes stinkbugs, leaf-footed bugs and aphids. Each use its proboscis, a straw-like structure on the front of its head, to pierce a plants surface and suck its juices.

The openings created at the feeding site can admit plant diseases to the host species. Additionally, each of these pests can introduce fungal and viral diseases to plants.

June is a great time to finish pruning those early blooming shrubs common to the area. Azaleas, spiraea and gardenias should be pruned and shaped before July 4 if the homeowner wants to avoid reducing next years' bloom.

Monitor for nutrient deficiencies or environmental problems with palms and cycads. Identify the condition and correct by using an appropriate treatment.

One common deficiency in both palms and cycads is magnesium. The remedy for this situation is easy to locate, inexpensive and simple to apply – a true rarity.

Epsom salt, a staple in drug stores and pharmacies worldwide for footbaths, is chemically known as magnesium sulfate. Sprinkled in the root zone of palms and cycads can supply their need for this micronutrient which is limited or absent in local soils.

There is still time to plant heat tolerant vegetables. Okra, southern peas, and sweet pota-

toes can all be started now.

Clemson spineless is the standard bearer for local okra production, with plants having the potential to reach eight feet in height by frost. Other varieties are available, but yield will not be as great as Clemson spineless.

Black-eyed peas, pinkeye-purple hull, Crowder and other long-serving southern pea cultivars will produce well in the Wakulla County summer. It is important to remember other area residents like these legumes also.

Deer, rabbits, some

insects and others enjoy this summer garden staple. It is time to enjoy the summer's bounty, but stay on guard. Many others enjoy the buffet, too.

#### SPIDERLILY

There are 14 different species of spiderlily (*Hymenocallis*) that have been documented in Florida, and eight of them grow in the panhandle area of Florida. Although the species of a spiderlily might be difficult to identify by a non-botanist, the general shape of a spiderlily flower is not difficult to recognize and very distinctive. The white flowers have a central white cup (corona) with six long narrow tepals radiating from the top of a green tube below the corona. Six stamens rise from the margin of the corona. They grow in moist and often shady areas.

My pants are tight enough to keep it in place. I wear it around the house.


Metal is cold. Did you know that? A cold lump is not comfortable in the small of your back.

That makes sense. We place the holster above my right pocket. I reach for the gun.

“That shoulder doesn’t go up. I think cross-drawing might work better.”

“Cross-drawing is more dangerous,” he cautions.

“Well, it’s the way that will work for me.”

So we move the holster above the left pocket. I draw the gun. Perfect.

“Now you have to put your shirt over your gun so it doesn’t show,” Joe instructs.

I pull my shirt over and down. There’s a lump at my waistline. I don’t want any more lumps at my waist.

“Joe, this isn’t going to work. It makes me look fat. What about that ankle holster you found?”

We strap on the ankle holster. Whoops. Not a good look with shorts. I find a pair of jeans with wide-ish legs and try walking around.

It’s not comfortable

at all.

“This thing hurts!” I complain.

“Do you want to try one of those bra holsters?” Joe asks. He’s half grinning. He’s having fun at my expense.

Anyway, a few days later, he comes in with a box. Inside is a fabric bag. Within the bag is a buttery-soft leather purse in a lovely shade of fawn brown.

“Very nice!” I exclaim. We fit the Springfield into the special compartment that has a Velcroed holster. I practice whipping it in and out. Perfect.

Several weeks later, Joe asks: “Why aren’t you using your new

carry purse?”

“Well, I’m going to the range.”

“Your point?” “It’ll get dirty at the range. That’s why I’m using this old ratty purse.”

“Use the carry purse I got you.” He sounds a tiny bit impatient.

### Apalachicola Bay oyster changes remain through the summer

Several oyster conservation measures implemented previously will continue in Apalachicola Bay during the summer season, June 1 through Aug. 31.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission began implementing conservation measures in the fall of 2012 in an effort to help the Apalachicola Bay oyster population recover from the effects of low river flow. Changes effective June 1 through Aug. 31 include:

- Commercial and recreational harvest of oysters in areas north of John Gorrie Memorial Bridge is prohibited (this change is new this year).
- Harvest or possession of oysters in or on waters taken from the Hotel Bar Experimental Area is prohibited (this change is new this year).
- Commercial and recreational harvest of oysters in the area commonly known as East Hole is prohibited.
- The daily commercial harvest and possession limit is three bags of oysters in the shell per person (each bag is equivalent to 60 pounds or two 5-gallon buckets).
- The daily recreational harvest per person, vessel and possession limit is 5 gallons of oysters in the shell.
- From June 1 through Aug. 31, commercial and recreational oyster harvest is closed on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

All other harvest regulations remain in effect.

### Red snapper season opened June 11

The recreational red snapper season started June 11 in Gulf state and federal waters and remain open through July 20, closing July 21.

This year and next year are unique compared to previous years in that Florida’s Gulf recreational red snapper season applies to harvest from both state and federal waters.

Anglers fishing from private recreational boats will need to have their recreational salt-water fishing license (unless exempt) and will need to have Gulf Reef Fish Angler on their license (includes those that are exempt) to target red snapper or other certain reef fish in Gulf state and federal waters (excluding Monroe County).

You can get this printed on a license at no cost at GoOutdoors-Florida.com or by visiting any location you can purchase a license.



For-hire operations that do not have a federal reef fish permit may also participate in this 40-day season but are limited to fishing for red snapper in state waters only.

These operations must have State Gulf Reef Fish Charter on their license to target red snapper and other reef fish in Gulf state waters (excluding Monroe County).

This can be done at no cost at a local tax collector’s office.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation

Commission has also partnered with Snook and Gamefish Foundation on a new smartphone app specifically for voluntary reporting of red snapper catch information.

This app will be available soon on your phone’s app store by searching for Angler Gulf Red Snapper for private anglers or iAngler Gulf Red Snapper Charter if you are a charter operation. Using the app is important because it will help us test real-time data collection.

To learn more about the 40-day recreational red snapper season in Gulf state and federal waters, including season size and bag limits, visit MyFWC.com/Snappers.

The federal season for for-hire operations with federal reef fish permits is June 1 through July 21.

Federal fishery managers are in the process of collecting input for a season in Atlantic federal waters. Learn more at sero.nmfs.noaa.gov.s.



## Underwater Wakulla

Every diver rescues their buddy.

I do not believe in the solo diver. I understand the notion that every instructor is solo diving because new dive students are ill equipped to handle complex rescue requirements.

I understand that spearfishing is considered a solo diving activity because fish are more likely to spook with twice the noise, movement and incoming shafts. I understand the most hazardous creature underwater is your buddy.

I always considered my most inexperienced student a viable buddy. On a training dive on Stage II (a tower now gone, but still underwater) in Panama City I was so involved with the project, I suddenly ran out of breathing air. I did not want to panic anyone, so I approached each student and asked to buddy breathe, as though it was a sudden drill.

By the time I made the circuit of eight students, we were on the surface. Everyone said I should pull such drills more often. There is nothing more convincing than the real thing. No, I did not tell them.

Fish do acclimate to the sound of bubbles. I found myself abandoned by a spearfishing group not too long ago and figured I was doing OK.

Near the end of a successful collection of fish, with blood in the water, I turned to face a shark sweeping into my space clearly interested in my catch. I recall thinking of my question on my basic exam: Why use the buddy system?

One answer was, so that the risk of a shark injury would be cut in half. Or I swim faster than my buddy. And suddenly, the shark turned 90 degrees and fled! I looked up to see my buddy grinning as he turned his Shark Shield on. The shock wave chased my aggressor away!

And true to form, most of my challenges underwater have come from my buddy, running out of breathing gas, getting lost, having equipment failure, etc. But they were all educational.

A very long time ago my new diving buddy and I were at 60 FSW in Hanauma Bay, when he suddenly ran out of gas. We had recently been taught buddy breathing (no extra second stage back then). I calmly reached for the regulator in my mouth but could not pull it out!? The neck strap that came with all regulators was firmly attached and would not come free.

My young friend calmly watched, then placed a hand on my chest, another grasping the mouthpiece, and wrenched the regulator out of my mouth. The strap snapped with a loud crack and we made our way up to the surface.

I think I was 17 years old. We then cut all of the straps off of our regulators. Interesting that these widomakers are finding their way back into our inventory.

When I was trained to dive in 1965, the UDT divers out of Pearl Harbor required my father train with me. I was 16. At the time I thought this an intrusive problem. He became my first buddy, but I soon developed more friends that dove in high school. It was soon after that, I began dating.

As a freshman in college my father, my date and I went diving one day. We found a great cavern offshore. But my date ran out of breathing gas at the entrance. My dad rescued her with buddy breathing while I watched.

I'm glad he did, as I soon married her and we have been together for more than 50 years. The next rescue you or your buddy makes, may be your own or that of a loved one.

But it only works when you are both there.

**SANDY SEA SQUIRT**  
(*Molgus occidentalis*)

There are 3000 types of tunicates and this is one of the largest of them. It is a filter feeder. It has a sac-like body with two spouts, one for taking water in and one for expelling it. Sea Squirts have both male and female body parts and release both eggs and sperm. The fertilized egg developed into a swimming larvae with a spine-like notochord. Eventually the larvae settles on the sea bottom and transforms into the adult for of tunicate.

# Politics, pot, and grim numbers

TALLAHASSEE – The Sunshine State was packed with political news this week, along with the perennial twists and turns in Florida's budding marijuana industry.

But even the most politically plugged-in foodies and fashionistas focused their attention elsewhere, after two American icons reportedly took their own lives within days of each other.

Kate Spade, whose handbags, shoes and household goods were adored by prepsters, created “an accessories empire that helped define the look of an era,” according to The New York Times. Spade, 55, was found Tuesday after reportedly hanging herself with a scarf.

While Spade introduced young women to classy style, celebrity chef Anthony Bourdain turned Americans onto plates from around the world and around the corner.

The heavily inked Bourdain – tagged by The Smithsonian as “the ‘Elvis of bad boy chefs’” – was found dead Friday morning in his hotel room in France, according to CNN. The 61-year-old Bourdain, who was in the country working on his popular CNN series, “Parts Unknown,” killed himself, the network sadly announced.

Bourdain wasn't a politician, but he served as an ambassador of sorts, bridging cultural gaps in far-flung places over wine and sea urchin caviar pasta or along dirt roads slurping oysters and beer.

“Food is everything we are. It's an exten-

sion of nationalist feeling, ethnic feeling, your personal history, your province, your region, your tribe, your grandma. It's inseparable from those behind the get-go,” he once said.

Bourdain took his own life a day after the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released a grim report revealing that the suicide rate throughout the nation has jumped by more than a quarter over the past 17 years.

Florida's suicide rate climbed by 10.6 percent, but what's even more alarming is that 25 states saw increases in suicide rates topping 30 percent. Only one state – Nevada – experienced a drop.

With nearly 45,000 suicides across the country in 2016, the report described suicide as a “growing public health problem” and said a variety of factors may contribute to the increase.

“Comprehensive statewide suicide prevention activities are needed to address the full range of factors contributing to suicide,” the report said. “Prevention strategies include strengthening economic supports (e.g., housing stabilization policies, household financial support); teaching coping and problem-solving skills to manage everyday stressors and prevent future relationship problems, especially early in life; promoting social connectedness to increase a sense of belonging and access to informational, tangible, emotional, and social support; and identifying and better supporting persons at risk (e.g., military veterans, persons with physical/mental health condi-

tions).” The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline – 800-273-8255 – and the Florida Suicide Prevention Coalition – florida-suicideprevention.org – are among the many resources available for people or family members seeking help.

Perhaps there's no way of knowing the factors that led to the deaths of Spade, Bourdain or the thousands of others whose lives are mourned every day.

But 13th century Persian poet Saadi of Shiraz offered some advice for people struggling with imperfection: “Have patience. All things are difficult before they become easy.”

## BYE-BYE MURPHY

Much of the political jostling this week took place in the Democratic race for governor.

Here's the short version: Billionaire Jeff Greene's in, and former Congressman Patrick Murphy's out.

After weeks of talking about the possibility of a campaign with former U.S. Rep. David Jolly as his running mate, Murphy decided this week his friendship with Gwen Graham – another former congressional colleague – trumped his gubernatorial ambitions.

Murphy and Jolly, a Pinellas County Republican, made national headlines as they floated the idea of a bipartisan ticket.

But Murphy, who served two terms in Congress before leaving to launch a losing bid for the U.S. Senate in 2016, put an end to the speculation Thursday, saying “you never want to run against a friend.” In a Broward County

press conference with Graham and her father, former U.S. senator and former Gov. Bob Graham, Murphy cited the younger Graham's support for issues that he has backed, including the expansion of health care, environmental protections and support for public schools.

“I have decided not to enter the race for governor because there is one Democratic candidate already demonstrating the leadership Florida needs and fighting for the values we share -- and that Democrat is Gwen Graham,” Murphy said in a statement Thursday.

## HELLO GREENE

Murphy's announcement came days after Palm Beach real-estate investor Jeff Greene filed paperwork to run as a Democrat for governor, joining a crowded field that already includes four major candidates.

Greene, 63, who lives two doors down from President Donald Trump's Mar-a-Lago resort, ran unsuccessfully for the U.S. Senate in 2010. He also ran unsuccessfully in 1982 as a Republican for a congressional seat in California.

With formal qualifying scheduled to start June 18, Greene opened a campaign account in a primary that includes Graham, former Miami Beach Mayor Philip Levine, Orlando-area businessman Chris King and Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum.

Christian Ulvert, a top adviser to Levine's campaign, noted that Greene entered the race just 50 days before the Aug. 28 primary ballots are mailed out. Levine and Graham have been the early leaders, although a large swath of Democratic primary voters remain undecided, public polls indicate.

Levine's campaign has been bolstered by television ads financed by more than \$15 million he had raised through May, including at least \$8 million in personal contributions.

But Greene, who has a net worth of \$3.8

billion according to Forbes, will be able to immediately compete if he decides to self-fund his campaign like he did in 2010, when he spent nearly \$24 million in the Senate bid.

The billionaire won't rely on earned media, at least not yet. Greene has declined to appear with the other four candidates at debates Saturday and Monday, according to the Florida Democratic Party.

## SEEING GREEN FROM THE GREEN STUFF

In another indication of how lucrative Florida's cannabis market is or could be, a California-based company bought one of the state's medical-marijuana operators for \$53 million.

Under the agreement announced Wednesday, the company MedMen will acquire Treadwell Nursery's five-acre cultivation facility, located in Eustis, and the right to operate 25 dispensaries throughout the state, the maximum currently allowed under Florida law.

“Florida is the third most populous state in the country with a medical marijuana market estimated to reach \$1 billion in annual sales by 2020. MedMen has built the best-in-class brand, and we continue to invest in premium assets that solidify our dominant position in the most important cannabis markets in the world,” MedMen co-founder and CEO Adam Bierman said in a prepared statement Wednesday.

MedMen, which runs retail shops in high-end locations such as Beverly Hills and Manhattan's Fifth Avenue, operates 18 facilities in California, Nevada and New York.

Treadwell, which operates as “Remeny Wellness” and is one of the state's 13 licensed medical-marijuana firms, hasn't begun selling products but has been authorized by the state to begin cultivation.

The Treadwell deal is the latest multimillion-dollar transaction in Florida's highly regu-

lated medical-marijuana industry. Lawmakers have restricted the number of licensed operators in the state, which has intensified competition for the licenses and boosted their value.

Investors from around the world have wooed the state's licensed marijuana operators since Florida lawmakers first legalized non-euphoric cannabis for a limited number of patients in 2014.

The courtship has exploded since Florida voters approved a constitutional amendment in 2016 that broadly legalized medical marijuana. State health officials have estimated that at least 500,000 Floridians could be eligible for medical marijuana use, and some industry analysts predict twice as many patients will sign up for the treatment.

And the quest to plant a cannabis footprint in the Sunshine State continues to intensify as businesses like MedMen plan on the eventual legalization of recreational pot.




