Animal shelter challenges

Wakulla County Animal Shelter gets flak on social media after euthanizing six dogs

The Wakulla County Animal Shelter had to put six dogs down last week. Afterwards, they received quite a bit of backlash on social media about it.

The animal shelter was over capacity.

In addition to the six dogs being euthanized, a few others were sent to rescue shelters, which provided a temporary fix to an ongoing problem.

Ivanhoe Carroll, Wakulla County's animal services director, said the shelter wouldn't have to euthanize animals if more pet owners were responsible and spayed and neutered their animals, and if more people would adopt or foster

some of the animals in the shelter.

Carroll said spaying and neutering one male and one female cat can prevent more than 2 million unwanted births in an 8 year period.

There are three ways animals come into the shelter – owner surrender, animal seizure, or as strays.

Strays are held for five days to give their owners a chance to claim them. After the hold, they become property of the county.

The animals are adopted out, sent to rescue or, as a last resort, put to sleep.

Bonnie Brinson, animal control officer and founder of Cauzican Care Animal Rescue, said as some animals go out as adoptions or rescues, just as many come in. It's a never-ending cycle.

Sometimes rescue shelters like Fat Cat Café, Big Dog Rescue and Great Dane Rescue step in and save some of the animals, but they're usually looking for a specific breed.

"We would be really stuck if we didn't have all these rescue networks," said Brinson.

Volunteers transport the animals to other shelters. Some are as close as Tallahassee, and others are as far away as Maine and California.

Carroll said it's all about putting the animals in a different market so they have a better chance of being adopted. She said they do everything they can to save the dogs, but sometimes their hands are tied.

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Cleaning the coast

Appraiser's office wins sex harassment lawsuit

Federal judge grants summary judgment and costs; employee had claimed discrimination, retaliation

The Wakulla County Property Appraiser's office won summary judgment in federal court in a lawsuit filed by an employee claiming gender discrimination and retaliation for reporting sexual harassment.

Senior U.S. District Judge William Stafford issued a 16-page order granting summary judgment to the property appraiser's office in January and ordering the employee to pay costs.

The case was filed by Debra Russell in 2016 claiming she had been sexually harassed by then-Deputy Property Appraiser Brad Harvey.

Harvey, who was elected to the post of property appraiser in 2016, reportedly had a consensual extramarital relationship with Russell several years before that had ended.

Russell is still an employee of the property appraiser's office.

In 2014, Russell went to then-Property Appraiser Donnie Sparkman and claimed sexual harassment by Harvey over a period of years. Sparkman removed Harvey from Russell's chain of command, and told her she would report directly to Sparkman as her supervisor.

A year and a half after reporting the matter to Sparkman, Russell filed a charge of discrimination with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission claiming she had taken medical

Questions arise over concession at Wakulla Springs

Guest Services holds open house to tout planned improvements to Lodge even as the Florida Park Service advertises for a new operator

The Florida Park Service issued a Call for Business Plans for Wakulla Springs State Park recently, indicating that the concession to operate the Lodge, restaurant and soda fountain are open.

There is a mandatory onsite meeting set for interested parties on Thursday, Sept. 20 at 9:30 a.m. at the Lodge. The deadline for proposals is Oct. 4.

Guest Services Management currently has a 15-year agreement that was just approved in February.

Joe Pereira, sales and marketing manager for Guest Services, said this week that the call for bids was issued in error and had been recalled – and that Guest Services is not giving up concessions at Wakulla Springs.

Guest Services held an Open House at the Lodge on Thursday, Sept. 13, with food and tours of the hotel. Pereira announced that Guest Services

would be doing some renovations to the Lodge: doing some re-painting, getting new bedding and furniture for the rooms, and new rugs in the hallways.

About 100 people attended the open house.

Pereira and Lodge manager Michelle Laxton encouraged people to visit and use the Lodge.

Both stressed that the company was “not going anywhere,” but would continue to manage the Lodge.

Guest Services’ agreement with the state calls for the company to manage concessions at the Lodge until 2033.

In a conversation with The News, Pereira expressed frustration that the Call for Business Plans is still up on the Florida Park Service website.

An official with the park service’s concessions said the advertisement was not issued in error.

Cape Leisure oper-

ated the concession at Wakulla Springs from 2011 to 2014, when it was taken over by a group of Tallahassee businessmen under a non-profit Limited Liability Company that lost the concession in 2018 when it sought to renegotiate the terms of its deal.

The 27-room Lodge at Wakulla Springs was built in 1937 and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

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County Briefs

• Wakulla County, St. Marks retain Community Rating System scores

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) recently completed its National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS) five-year cycle review for Wakulla County and the City of St. Marks.

Through its review, FEMA determined that Wakulla County will be able to maintain its Class 7 CRS rating and the City of St. Marks will keep its Class 8 CRS rating.

The CRS is a voluntary program which provides insurance premium discounts to communities that participate in floodplain activities that go above and beyond the minimum required by the NFIP.

The Class 7 rating for Wakulla County makes its property owners eligible for a 15 percent discount on flood insurance premiums for properties in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) and a 5 percent discount for properties outside of that area. The SFHA includes flood zones A, AE and VE.

The Class 8 rating for the City of St. Marks makes its property owners eligible for a 10 percent discount on flood insurance premiums for lots within the SFHA and a five percent discount for parcels outside of the SFHA.

Examples of activities that are completed as part of the CRS program include direct mailings of property protection information to homeowners in repeatedly flooded areas and prohibiting dumping of debris in streams, canals and ditches. These and many other flood mitigation activities are implemented to protect lives, reduce property damage and aid residents with insurance coverage.

“Wakulla County is proud to continue its participation in the NFIP and CRS programs to help the environment and its citizens,” said County Administrator David Edwards.

• Wakulla County announces an excellent EMS Inspection

Wakulla County Fire Rescue has recently undergone an Emergency Medical Services State Inspection which resulted in an achievement of No Deficiencies, the highest rating available.

On Aug. 24, the Florida Department of Health, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services, conducted a thorough review of the Service Records and Personnel Records of WCFR, as well as Basic Life Support and Advanced Life Support Inspections of Ambulances and Medical Equipment Test Results. This review is conducted every two years on all EMS Providers in Florida.

“This Excellent Inspection shows the dedication of our Board of County Commissioners and the Wakulla County Fire Rescue’s service to provide high quality Emergency Medical Services to our citizens and visitors,” said County Administrator David Edwards.

WCFR is a combination of Emergency Medical Services and Fire Services that is responsible for providing advance life support emergency patient transport, fire suppression, rescue, and vehicle extrication throughout Wakulla County.

In the past 12 months, WCFR responded to 4,161 calls for service.

County OKs oyster hatchery

An oyster hatchery and nursery will soon be opening in Panacea.

Wakulla commissioners voted 5-0 to rezone property on Alison Avenue in Panacea so the business can be built, and operated.

Plans for the hatchery include a 50-foot setback from wetlands, leaving some of the already existing vegetation and installing a water intake and return pipe.

One of the owners, Bob Danzy, said he will only sell oysters wholesale, and he does not want to compete with

the seafood houses that are already there.

In other matters, two public hearings during the planning and zoning portion of the meeting were pulled at the applicant’s request.

Last week, dozens of citizens showed up to the Planning Commission meeting to voice their objections to two new subdivisions being built on East Ivan and Wakulla-Arran roads.

The planning commission also voted unanimously against making a recommendation that the county commission approve the comp plan changes.

The subdivisions would require a change

in density.

Current zoning allows for one home per 20 acres.

Planning and Zoning Director Somer Pell said the applicant, Gene Cutchin, did not give a reason for postponing going before county commissioners.

Pell said if the application had been denied by the BOCC, the applicant would not have been able to move forward. However, there is nothing prohibiting them for submitting another application, Pell said.

There is no minimum time frame for comp plan change applications, Pell noted.



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

'Grand Reveal' planned for St. Marks Lighthouse

For 176 years the present St. Marks Lighthouse has stood majestically as the "Crown Jewel," first of the territory of Florida, then of Leon County, and finally, since 1843, Wakulla County.

The beautiful tower now standing, was the third one, built in 1842, three years before Florida became a state in 1845. It has been ravaged by numerous hurricanes as well as the Civil War, but she has withstood every challenge.

The lighthouse was manned by numerous keepers over the years, first from the U.S. Lighthouse Board, then in 1910, the U.S. Lighthouse Service, and finally, in 1939, the U.S. Coast Guard. Those keepers not only took care of making sure the light was exhibited after sundown and extinguished at sunrise, but they were vigilant to lending aid to mariners who needed it. They also were responsible not only for the pristine condition of the lighthouse, but also for monitoring and repairing aids to navigation in the St. Marks River. No doubt over the years, many lives were saved by those keepers. Fifty-eight years ago, in 1960, the Coast Guard closed the lighthouse and placed an "automatic" light in the tower that came on at dark and off at dawn. Because of neglect, deterioration slowly began to threaten the very existence of the lighthouse.

Because the lighthouse is situated on the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge, on

March 28, 2014, the Coast Guard formally relinquished control of the lighthouse and transferred it to the Department of Interior, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

What a godsend that became! The lighthouse now belongs to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service at St. Marks, and those wonderful folks took it upon themselves to do all they could to restore that beautiful lighthouse to its former glory. What a debt of gratitude we owe each and every one of them! They were able to obtain grants from the state of Florida, and donations from the Florida Lighthouse Association, Friends of the St. Marks Wildlife Refuge, as well as generous private businesses, and citizens.

Now, details relative to our "Grand Reveal" to the public! On Sept. 29, the grounds and keeper's quarters will be opened to the citizens of Wakulla County and elsewhere. We are so proud of the restoration we can't wait to show it off to everyone. We have made plans that we hope will make the event run smoothly. Guests may purchase their tickets at the Visitors Center beginning at 9 a.m. The Visitors Center is on the right hand side of the road just past the entrance to the Refuge. We will have 180 tickets on sale for \$2 per person. The first tour will begin at 10 a.m. Each tour group will consist of 15 people, adults and children, every half hour from 10 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. Each ticket may only be used at the assigned time printed on the ticket and if a guest misses the assigned time, they will not be permitted to join a later tour group. Each ticket holder will be asked to arrive at the lighthouse check in station 15 minutes prior to the tour time printed on their ticket. They will be briefed on the layout of the ex-

hibits in the keeper's quarters.

Guests need to be aware that because of safety concerns, no one will be permitted to climb the tower steps on the tour.

They will be allowed to enter the room at the base of the tower and take photographs. Tour guests will be required to wear shoes and a shirt. Wet bathing suits will not be permitted to tour the inside of the building.

No food, beverages, or pets will be permitted inside of the building. The interior of the keeper's quarters and the Tower Room are very small and we want our visitors to have a pleasant experience on the tour. Hence the small groups of 15 people every half hour. That way no one will be crowded and everyone will have time to enjoy a relaxed and informative tour of the Keeper's Quarters and Tower Room. Interpreters will be there to tell people about the lighthouse and answer any questions.

For those of you who will not be able to attend the Grand Reveal, we are happy to announce that henceforth, Lighthouse tours will continue to be offered on the first Friday and Saturday of every month hereafter. October tours will be available on the 5th and 6th of the month. Tickets will always be available for \$2 at the Visitors Center on the days the lighthouse is open. Also, be aware that the entrance fee for vehicles to the Wildlife Refuge is \$5 paid as you enter.

Please note that tickets will be sold "first come- first serve," and we may sell out very quickly for this first event. For more information please call the refuge office at (850) 925-6122.

leave and was harassed about taking time off, and that her job duties were removed and she had been targeted for termination. (The EEOC made no findings for Russell in the case.)

But in granting summary judgment, the court found that Russell offered no direct evidence of gender discrimination nor any adverse employment action.

The court noted, for example, Russell’s claim that other employees received cost of living pay increases while she did not. When asked in her deposition which employees received pay raises, she answered: “I don’t know for a fact, just hearsay.”

Sparkman and Harvey provided affidavits that no employees received pay raises during the time period.

Of the retaliation claim, the court found no evidence of job duties being taken from her. The court noted in the order that other employees in the office said that they often had to help out with her work because she didn’t do the work she was responsible for or was not physically in the office to do the work.

It was noted that she had received a \$7,000 pay increase in 2009 for taking on bookkeeping duties several years earlier, yet even when she was relieved of bookkeeping duties in 2011 at her request, to this day she continues to receive the salary increase for duties she no longer performs, according to the court.

In March, some \$3,700 in attorney’s fees for the property appraiser were assessed against Russell. Those costs were reportedly paid by her attorney, Marie Mattox.

The other costs were covered by the property appraiser’s insurance company. Wakulla County did not pay any costs associated with the lawsuit.

When death is sudden, unexpected

My husband and I go to a movie and out to dinner every Tuesday.

Unlike most couples, our weekends are almost always filled with funerals and Mondays are insanely backlogged with paperwork.

That makes Tuesday our weekend. It is the slowest day of the week for us and it is the senior discount day for many businesses.

The movie theatre near our home offers a wonderful discount every Tuesday so it makes our evening out very affordable.

Last Tuesday, a movie that we were excited to see finally came to the theatre. As soon as I caught up my workload, we jumped in our vehicle and headed off to the cinema.

About three-quarters of the way through the movie, my phone rang. Someone was at the funeral home needing burial arrangements.

I informed my husband that we needed to leave, so off we went back to the funeral home.

The death was a sudden one, completely unexpected.

The decedent, a champion basketball player, died from an apparent heart attack on the court during practice.

The family's photographs showed a physically fit man in his prime. He was thirty-something with a muscular physique. Not at all someone you would expect to

die at such an early age.

Sudden death carries with it difficulties for recovery.

NO WARNING (SUDDEN DEATH)

Sudden deaths are those that occur without warning.

These types of deaths require special understanding and intervention.

Sudden deaths are more difficult to grieve and recover from other deaths that give some warning.

Advanced warning that death is coming allows family and friends time to prepare for their imminent loss.

A family learns after a thirty-something's sudden death that the young man had found a young woman whom he intended to marry. The family had never even heard of her before, but they include her in the obituary.

Survivors of sudden death may find it beneficial to consult with a counselor, especially in the case of violence.

The decedent's mother and relatives were very distraught at his services. They had unexpectedly lost their loved one and did not understand what had happened or why.

As I worked with the decedent's sisters on details for his services, an uncle came forward and asked that we insert a certain young woman's name into the obituary.

He explained that he had had a conversation with the decedent about this young woman. Without his family's knowledge, the decedent had

found a woman with whom he had connected. He had told his uncle that should he ever marry, this young woman would be his choice.

He also indicated that the event might happen sooner rather than later as she was definitely his soul mate.

As the decedent's sisters and I worked on the obituary, I was unsure whether they would include the young woman or not. They said that they had never even heard of the young woman before.

Their decision was to observe their uncle's inside knowledge and include the young



The newly formed Wakulla 4-H STEM Club kicked off the 2018-19 program year on Saturday, Sept. 8 at Wakulla High School. Approximately 20 students, many accompanied by parents, enjoyed two hours of hands-on science learning led by 4-H Club leaders Chris Stearns and Jo Ann Daniels.

Wakulla County School District Superintendent Bobby Pearce expressed his appreciation and support for the partnership with Wakulla 4-H, "I am thankful to our 4-H program for providing a pathway for our students to continue to access challenging STEM opportu-

“I was a long term substitute for six years in Wakulla. I then decided to teach full time and was hired at Shadeville Elementary School in 2012.”

A Louisiana native, Paris earned a bachelor's degree from Louisiana Tech University, and earned a post-baccalaureate degree from Louisiana State University.

Paris has a mission to help students gain confidence in their math skills, and thereby gain confidence in themselves.

HOME ON THE RANGE

I like the Sig Sauer P365

Recently, at an indoor range in Maine, I saw several nice displays of Sig Sauer handguns. One of them included a P365.

It's a striker-fired gun, which I like, and is more compact than the P320 subcompact. So, naturally, I want to try it out.

"You don't have one of these guys to rent, do you?" I ask Mike, not really believing the store would have one of these newer guns available for rent. One can hope, anyway.

"Sure do," he says. "Want to try one? It's ladies' day, so the range fee is waived. Got your eyes and ears?"

Well, naturally, Joe saw to it that we lugged our big black range bags on this trip, but also naturally, the bags weren't in the car. Don't you hate it when this happens?

So I get to purchase eye protection and tar-

gets. (We did have ear protection in the car.) Add these to the rental fee and \$40 flies off the shooting bench. But, I really really want to shoot the P365, so here goes.

Loading the magazine is rough because an Uplula makes loading so much easier. Naturally, the Uplula is in the big range bag which is not in the car. Loading by thumb is not fun. The magazine spring is tight. This magazine holds 10 rounds and is not the extended mag.

Jacking the slide is pretty easy. Not as easy as most .380s, but this is a 9mm handgun.

The grip is smallish and fits nicely in my palm. Lots of stippling all around and a good, deep beavertail where you can get a firm grasp.

Aiming is also very nice, with what Sig calls "XRAY3 day/night sights." To me, they look like regular tritium sights. They are very easy to see with the front sight bigger and bright green.

Now, I ease the trigger back. It has a smooth, medium-long trigger pull. Medium easy too. It's not a light pull, but it's easy for a carry gun that has no safety. It feels like a 5-pound pull. Not bad.

Bang!

Huh. Not a bad kick.



Not bad at all.

I shoot five rounds with my right hand, then five more with my left. Now, I'm not a fine shooter, but all 10 rounds hit the target

nicely. The P365 is a very accurate gun.

By this time, however, my palms are getting pink. The kick is pushing the stippling on the backstrap into the

palms with each shot. I upgrade the kick in my mind. It's too much stippling for my liking and makes the recoil seem firmer.

Joe says this can be

cured with some sanding. I'm wondering, too, if using the extended magazine instead gives more control and makes the stippling less of a problem. Probably, but I'd still sand down the peaks of the stippling.

John Boch, author of the blog The Truth About Guns, sums up his experience with the P365 by saying that the P365 eats all the different kinds of ammunition he puts into it, and has no failures to feed or failures to fire.

"The P365 embodies everything concealed carriers want most. It's smaller than most single-stack 9mm pistols, specifically the Glock 43, S&W's Shield, Springfield XD9 and the Ruger LC9. I've shot all four of those, too, and the P365 has a better trigger and is more comfortable to shoot."

OK, I've shot these, too. The price of this gun is competitive with these four handguns. The only part that is disturbing is he's listing my favorite Springfield XD9 with these other guns. Dang. He might be right, but guns are personal. That Springfield sure is a great little gun.

But the P365 is even more compact and the grip sure fits my small hand.

Would Santa think I need another carry gun?

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FWC Law Enforcement report

Some of the cases handled by the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Law Enforcement during Aug. 17 to Aug. 23.

WAKULLA COUNTY: Officers Swindell, Hughes and Korade were on water patrol near St. Marks when they saw a vessel returning from fishing offshore. They stopped the vessel and the operator stated they had caught a lot of fish and pointed out the compartment where they were located. An inspection of the compartment revealed a total of 50 black sea bass, 46 of which were undersized. The officers also located two undersized gag grouper and one undersized red grouper in the compartment. Officer Hughes also located a bucket near the back of the vessel which contained

a shark that had been filleted to be used as bait. All the undersized fish and the shark were seized, and the occupants of the vessel were issued citations for the violations.

- Officer Carr was dispatched to Wakulla Springs State Park regarding a vehicle burglary at the Cherokee Sink parking lot. The complainant was the state park ranger, who noticed a window was smashed on an SUV parked in the lot and glass was still falling on the ground beside the vehicle. Officer Carr contacted the only two people still at the park. He investigated the vehicle burglary and documented the information provided by the victims in an incident report.

- Officer Hofheinz saw a vessel traveling

towards Wakulla Beach from the east. He contacted the operator and upon inspection of the commercially registered vessel, he saw four nets that were wet in the rear of the vessel. Three of the nets had a stretch mesh of 2 3/4 inches, and one had a stretch mesh of 3 inches. Officers Morales and Carr arrived on scene to assist. Upon further inspection, one of the nets was not legibly marked on both ends and one had two different numbers on both ends. The nets were measured by Officers Carr and Morales for square footage. All the nets measured greater than the allowable limit. The operator was issued citations accordingly and the nets were seized as evidence.

- Officer Morales was patrolling the Gulf of Mexico in the waters south of Carrabelle with

Officer Carr. As they approached an anchored vessel to conduct a resource inspection, they were advised by the person on board that he had a diver in the water. Neither officer saw a dive flag displayed on the vessel. While Officer Carr maneuvered the patrol vessel alongside the subject's vessel, Officer Morales asked the subject if he had any fish on board. The subject advised the officers that he had two gag grouper on board. The officers continued with their resource inspection, which concluded with Officer Morales issuing one subject a notice to appear citation for harvesting a gag grouper under the minimum size limit of 24 inches and Officer Carr issuing a warning for not having a dive flag displayed. The undersized gag grouper was seized as evidence.



area are relatively narrow and the waters around them shallow. When an aide to navigation is damaged, dragged by a barge or displaced in a storm it can lead to problems for both commercial and recreational boaters.

Having auxiliaries trained as ATON Verifiers helps the Coast Guard in maintaining our channels.

Station Panama City is about 120 miles from our area, making it difficult to send a team over to

verify ATONs following a storm or when a problem is reported. Trained auxiliaries are able to respond to issues and report back to the Coast Guard when more attention is needed.

Bravo Zulu to all members who participated and passed, earning the qualification of an Aids Verifier. Thanks to Sherrie, we will always remember safe boating is no accident – utilizing the aids to navigation properly can help you return to port safely.

Past September and the summer hiatus is over. Kids are back in school and the seas get increasingly rough as winter moves in. Spear fishermen exchange their underwater guns for bow and arrow, in search of deer. And our dive shop slows way down. Coming months will make reaching payroll difficult, unless we find a different path. We have known this for a while now.

Fortunately our summer employees have departed for better jobs, leaving Travis and I to hold down the fort.

The opportunity to go into the dry suit repair business was snatched from us by someone with a lot more money than we had.

Expanding into a pool remains viable. I have observed a store here in Hilo, Hawaii that has used a large plastic pool (identical to the one we have) to train children to swim and doubled their dive store revenue!

But the dive store is small and very limited. Still, a worthy option I must get on. Building a much bigger pool remains an elusive option for investment funds.

I have been working with a store on Oahu since June, helping with their rebreather training, after a fatality resulted in the loss of their rebreather instructor. Just a few days ago, I finally finished that training, even while I was on vacation with my wife.

While here I studied their Veteran Affairs job training program and was asked by many participants to start one at Wakulla Diving Center. Then a few days ago this program here collapsed and scattered their students, now looking for a new program to transfer over to.

Necessity is the invention of opportunity. We will pursue the Wakulla Diving Academy when I return in October, a VA (not exclusive) academy for job training in Wakulla County.

We have identified four job pathways, some of which we are uniquely qualified to provide under our current setup. Others will require new instructors and investments.

At least this undertaking will fill in our winters with revenue generation activity worthy of our potential.

After all, if we are not growing, then we are dying.

State looks to bolster redfish amid red tide fight

Carroll said the shelter can house about 100 animals. Sometimes when they're at capacity, they have to put two and three animals in a cage meant for one.

"When we get to that number, that's when we issue a Code Red," Carroll said.

She said they start the Code Red way before the have to euthanize animals. They alert people on Facebook, and beg them to come adopt or foster.

"We're the ones that hurt the worst," Carroll said. "We take care of them."

Carroll said many times, the shelter is the best home that most of the animals have ever had.

They get a clean cage, plenty of food and fresh water, and love and attention. Each day they get to go outside to play.

"A lot of times (the dogs) beat us back in to the kennel because they know there is going to be cookies on their bed."

Carroll said although the animals are healthy and safe there, living at the shelter can't be good for them.

Carroll said some people contact them wanting to drop their pets off thinking they are a no-kill shelter.

She said some bring in their dogs because they are out of control, but it can be prevented by correcting the dogs actions, and telling them no.

"Dogs look for discipline and perimeters," Carroll said.

Pet owners can hire dog trainers to come to their homes, or send the dog to doggy day care, or they can get an older dog that already has manners.

"It's not bad dogs," Carroll said. "It's bad owners. Period."

She said the animals think their life is good, compared to what they've had, but they don't know how great it could be if they were adopted into a loving home.

Carroll said she is proud of how much their euthanasia rate has decreased over the years.

"When we started, almost eight out of 10 didn't make it out," said Carroll.

Now, after factoring in owner requested euthanasia, Carroll said the rate is about 8 percent.

The last time they euthanized for space was June 2017.

The dogs that are euthanized are chosen based on adoptability, health and behavior.

Black dogs and gray cats are less likely to be adopted, Carroll said. She said black and gray are strong traits, so there are more of them than any other color.

She said a few months back, a litter of kittens came in. There were two Siamese cats and their two sisters that were gray. The two Siamese kittens were adopted almost immediately. Carroll said a man and a woman got into a bidding war over the Siamese kittens. They both ended up taking one home.

Meanwhile the two grey sisters, Sheba and Sylvia, are still at the shelter. Due to the lack of space, they are grow-

ing up in kennels in JoAnn Sanders' office. She takes very good care of them, and Carroll joked that the kittens think Sanders is their mom.

Sanders tries to let the kittens out of their cage for a couple of hours each day, if she has time.

Although the kittens are content with living in her office, Sanders said it doesn't compare to the feeling of growing up in a loving home.

FINDING FOREVER HOMES

Carroll tracks each of the animal's length of stay at the shelter.

"I want to find out all I can," Carroll said. "The more information I have, the easier it is to find a home."

Anyone looking to adopt a pet is encouraged to come in and fill out an application.

There is a \$150 fee for dogs, and a \$100 fee for cats.

Once they find the dog or cat they want, and the animal is spayed or neutered, it can go home with its new humans. The \$50 to spay or neuter the animal is deducted from the application fee.

If the animal is too young to be spayed or neutered, \$50 of the application fee is held as a deposit.

Once the animal is old enough, and the adopter takes it to get spayed or neutered and a rabies shot, the adopter can go back to the shelter with proof and get the \$50 deposit back.

The application fee is used to cover microchipping, shelter shots, fecal exams and heartworm tests.

"If an animal tests positive for heartworms, Cauzican and Dr. Norman Griggs at Shepherd Animal Hospital work together to cover the treatment. The adopter doesn't have to pay for it.

Dr. Griggs provides many services for the shelter at little or no cost.

"We wouldn't be where we are without Dr. Griggs," Brinson said.

Griggs sometimes stays at work late to spay or neuter some of the animals in the shelter.

He also hosts Bingo night at the Seineyard

Want to help?

The No. 1 way people can help is by getting their pets spayed or neutered.

Carroll and Brinson said male dogs can smell female dogs in heat from 3 to 5 miles away. The male dogs become aggressive and do whatever they can to get to the female dog.

Another way to stop the stray epidemic is by not feeding stray cats.

"One lady brought in 31 cats that her aunt had been feeding over the years," Carroll said.

Carroll said stray cats will not stay where there is no food, and they also aren't as likely to reproduce if they're not healthy.

She said people worry about letting strays starve, but it is a part of nature.

Carroll said having microchips in pets also helps. She said they sometimes get pets from other areas of the county like Panacea and St. Marks, and the owner doesn't think to look at the shelter.

The City of Tallahassee offers offer

several low-cost microchip and rabies vaccination clinics on the first Tuesday of each month, from 3 to 5 p.m., at the Tallahassee Animal Shelter, located at 1125 Easterwood Dr. People from Wakulla County are welcome. For more information call (850) 891-2950.

The shelter also has traps that people can borrow to catch strays. They make a deposit in the form of a check, and they get the check back when they return the trap. However, the shelter doesn't accept feral cats.

Donations are always welcome. People can donate food for the animals, blankets, treats, kennels and money.

The shelter also needs volunteers. Volunteers must be at least 18, unless accompanied by an adult.

The shelter is open to the public Tuesdays through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Saturdays and Sundays from 8 a.m. until noon. The shelter is closed on Mondays.

at Wildwood every Tuesday at 7 p.m. Half of the money goes to fund the heartworm treatments for animals at the shelter.

Brinson said many shelters won't even take dogs that have tested positive for heartworms, but Griggs believes heartworms don't have to be a death sentence.

Griggs said working to save animals is a challenge.

"We can never fix the problem," said Griggs. "As soon as you get them a forever home – you can work, and work and work – and soon as you come back there is a mama and 12 puppies."

Although the never-ending work can some-

times be discouraging, the employees and volunteers at the shelter work relentlessly.

Someone has to be there everyday to make sure the animals are taken care of. They also have Wakulla County Jail inmates who work there as trustees.

Brinson said the inmates save the shelter \$60,000 a year in labor.

Every single day, the cleaning procedures have to be done. A disease like distemper can wipe out the entire shelter.

Carroll said there is always work needing to be done.

"If we get a call in the middle of the night that someone has died who has dogs, we have to go

in and get them," Brinson said.

CAUZICAN CARE

People ask Brinson why she works so hard

to save animals. She responds, "Because I can."

That's where she got the name for her nonprofit organization, Cauzican Care Animal Rescue.

She didn't always believe in euthanizing animals, but when she started working at the shelter, she saw the shape some of them were in.

Brinson is usually the one who has to put the animals to sleep

"Bonnie is the hardest working woman you will ever meet," Carroll said. "She's helped thousands over the years, even before becoming an animal control officer."

Cauzican networks with rescue groups all over the country, and transports the animals to them.

Brinson said before sending the animals to a rescue group, she has to line up vet care.

Stormy political weather

TALLAHASSEE – Hurricane Florence may have spared the Sunshine State, but political squalls continue to churn throughout Florida, and the worst is yet to come.

President Donald Trump whipped up a tempest after accusing Democrats of dramatically inflating the number of deaths in Puerto Rico caused by Hurricane Maria.

But it wasn't just Trump who stirred the political pot this week.

Gov. Rick Scott, who's vying to oust Democratic U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson, kicked into motion the process to appoint replacements for three Florida Supreme Court justices who will retire in January. The replacements could create a significant shift in the court's shaping of public policy for decades.

Meanwhile, the state's gubernatorial candidates and their supporters took to the airwaves to kick off the barrage of television ads that will inundate Floridians over the next two months.

A spot launched by the Republican Governors Association accused Democratic nominee Andrew Gillum of being so "far out" he's "on another planet." The somewhat-odd piece --- which includes an image of Gillum superimposed over a moon --- is even more curious, since onetime astronaut Nelson's

been mocked by Scott and other Republicans about the senator's actual space trip.

The Republican Party of Florida, meanwhile, unleashed a promo of GOP gubernatorial candidate Ron DeSantis that opens with a homage to the former congressman's Dunedin team making a trip to the 1991 Little League World Series.

"We were only 12 when we learned to dream big, work hard and swing away," the grown-up DeSantis says in the spot.

Gillum, too, released an upbeat ad that focused on his childhood, echoing his campaign's #BringItHome mantra in which the Tallahassee mayor invokes the lessons he learned from his grandmother.

"She'd say, go to school. Mind your teachers. Get your lesson. And one day bring that education home," Gillum says in the voiceover.

Although it's doubtful, the two candidates' positive messages could set the stage for the general election battle.

As they load their political cannons, they might consider heeding the guidance of a certain granny: "You can catch more flies with honey than with vinegar."

TRUMP'S MARIA TWEETSTORM

The president's position on the death count in Puerto Rico drew rebukes from the two Republicans at

the top of the Florida ticket: Scott and DeSantis.

Both parties in Florida are looking to draw support from Puerto Rican voters in the November elections, and Trump's tweets Thursday brought bipartisan criticism --- and came as Hurricane Florence barreled down on the Carolinas.

"3000 people did not die in the two hurricanes that hit Puerto Rico," Trump tweeted a little before 9 a.m. Thursday. "When I left the Island, AFTER the storm had hit, they had anywhere from 6 to 18 deaths. As time went by it did not go up by much. Then, a long time later, they started to report really large numbers, like 3000..."

".....This was done by the Democrats in order to make me look as bad as possible when I was successfully raising Billions of Dollars to help rebuild Puerto Rico," Trump followed in a tweet. "If a person died for any reason, like old age, just add them onto the list. Bad politics. I love Puerto Rico!"

In the November elections, Republican and Democratic politicians are courting Puerto Rican voters who are longtime residents of Florida, as well as those who relocated to the state after Maria caused devastating damage to the U.S. territory last September.

"I disagree with @POTUS-- an independent study said thousands were lost and

Gov. (Ricardo) Rosselló agreed," Scott tweeted. "I've been to Puerto Rico 7 times & saw devastation firsthand. The loss of any life is tragic; the extent of lives lost as a result of Maria is heart wrenching. I'll continue to help PR."

Nelson called Trump's comments "shameful."

"We deserve and expect more from someone who holds the highest office in our country," Nelson said in statement.

DeSantis and Gillum, though with different tones, also separated themselves from Trump's comments.

DeSantis, who resigned his congressional seat this week to focus on the governor's race, is typically one of Trump's most-ardent supporters, and Trump's endorsement was a cornerstone of DeSantis' primary election win last month.

DeSantis' campaign issued a statement Thursday that said he is "committed to standing with the Puerto Rican community, especially after such a tragic loss of life" and that he "doesn't believe any loss of life has been inflated."

Gillum was harsher, saying "no death is partisan and our brothers and sisters in Puerto Rico deserved better from @realDonaldTrump before, during and after the hurricane."

GAVELING IN COURT CHANGES

Scott on Tuesday said he asked the Supreme Court Judicial Nominating Commission to begin a process that includes accepting and reviewing applications, interviewing candidates and making nominations for appointment. The process will lead to replacements for long-time justices Barbara Pariente, R. Fred Lewis and Peggy Quince, who are required to leave the court in January because of reaching a mandatory retirement age.

Appointments of Supreme Court justices are always important, but Pariente, Lewis and Quince -- along with Justice Jorge Labarga -- are widely considered a left-leaning majority on the seven-member court. That has led to the possibility that their replacements could spur a rightward shift of the court.

As a sign of that, a legal debate emerged last year about whether Scott, who will also leave office in January, should have the authority to appoint the new justices or whether that power should go to his successor. Scott has appointed one justice, Alan Lawson, who is generally aligned with what is viewed as the conservative minority on the court.

Scott has argued that he has the authority to appoint the new justices, but the League of Women Voters of Florida and Common Cause filed a case last year arguing

that Scott's successor should make the picks. The Supreme Court dismissed the case in December, saying the issue wasn't "ripe" for consideration because Scott had not acted on the appointments.

But the dismissal of the case does not preclude another challenge to Scott's position that he has the authority to make the appointments.

In the announcement Tuesday, Scott's office said he would invite the governor-elect to interview the court nominees after the general election. The governor's office pointed to an "expectation" that Scott and his successor would be able to agree on appointments.

But Gillum's campaign issued a terse rejection of Scott's position: "In our understanding of the Constitution, the next governor will appoint the next three Supreme Court justices."

A new way to enjoy juicy pork

Roasting pork requires a watchful eye. If roasted just a few minutes too long, pork can quickly dry out. But in his book "Cooking Slow: Recipes for Slowing Down and Cooking More" (Chronicle Foods), author, teacher and food industry consultant Andrew Schloss notes that immersing pork loin in an oil bath protects it from drying out, resulting in a juicy, delicious meal. Those who want to try this method can whip up Schloss's recipe for "Slow-Fried Pork Loin in Mustard Oil."

Slow-Fried Pork Loin in Mustard Oil	1	tablespoon coarse sea salt
Makes 6 servings	1	teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
1	4	1
pork loin, about 3 lbs., trimmed of fat and silver skin	4 cups canola oil	1 cup brown mustard seed

Rub the pork with the salt and pepper. Set on a rack on a baking sheet and refrigerate for at least 12 hours and up to 24 hours. Preheat the oven to 175 F. Combine the oil and mustard seed in a Dutch oven and place over medium heat until the oil reaches 350 F on a deep-frying thermometer. A wooden chopstick or the end of a wooden spoon inserted into the oil will emit bubbles when the oil is at the right temperature.

While the oil is heating, remove the pork from the refrigerator. Pat dry. When the oil is up to temperature, turn off the heat. Using tongs, carefully submerge the meat in the hot oil. Cover the pot, transfer to the oven and cook until the pork is 150 F, about 2 hours. Lift the pork from the oil onto a baking sheet to catch any oil drips. Carve the pork across the grain on the diagonal into thin slices. Drizzle with some of the mustard-scented oil and serve.
