Nationally recognized local quilter finds way to combine both her loves in latest project

Every quilt tells a story. And the story behind Diane McClure's latest award-winning quilt is just as important to her as the craft itself. McClure has won 15 national quilting contests, and each of her creations is a masterpiece. She's a self-taught artist who uses a sewing needle as a paintbrush and fabric as her paint. The mostly 30-by-30 inch keepsake quilts aren't meant for use as blankets — as she puts it, her creations are meant for warming walls instead of beds.

The retired tailor has an entire room inside her Citrus Springs home dedicated to quilting, and she spends hours each day working on her projects. But there's something else she's equally passionate about: rescuing greyhounds. In McClure's latest award-winning quilt, she ties both passions together in a scene depicting her beloved 6-year-old greyhound Jasmine, who would have been euthanized four years ago if McClure had not adopted her. Fortunately for Jasmine, McClure rescued her, and McClure's parents adopted Jasmine's sister Penny. McClure and her husband, Ralph, use every opportunity they can to pro-

mote rescuing pets. "We've been using Jasmine as an ambassador for adopting greyhounds. She goes so many places with us," McClure said. In the quilt, Jasmine is shown from behind with her face and backside facing the front. The words "I'm a little behind," are stitched in underneath Jasmine. The words allude to the dog's racing days, when she was deemed too slow to actually compete in races. It's also a tribute to the Since Keepsake Quilters magazine keeps the first-place quilts for its collection, Diane McClure will be making another to keep for herself.



CMHS trustees' lawyer rattles Sunshine Law saber

Many invoice statements blacked out

Totaling how much money Citrus Memorial Health System has spent on attorneys in the long-running dispute between its two gov-

erning boards could lead one side to make a case for Sunshine Law violations by the other side. The issue came to a head when Bill Grant, general counsel for the Citrus County Hospital Board of Trustees, was asked May 24 at the

trustees' meeting how much had been spent in the conflict about who should have oversight of hospital operations and spending: the trustees, or the Citrus Memorial Health Foundation Board of Directors, which leases the hospital from the trustees.

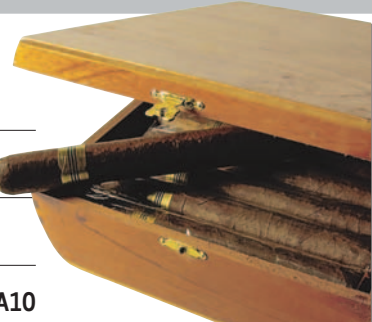
Grant answered that the trustees had spent \$261,000 and the foundation had spent \$859,000 — figures he said were based on information he had received through a public records request. The invoices Grant requested and ultimately received from the Foundation did

add up to \$859,000, but the detail about how that money was spent was blacked out on every invoice. David Langer, chairman of the Foundation, challenged Grant's figure for the foundation in a guest column published June 2. "The hospital's Foundation See HOSPITAL/Page A2

June 18, at the new conference room of the College of Central Florida (formerly the Central Florida Community College) Lecanto campus. The workshop will address the present status of the oil spill, local preparations, and responses to the economic impacts of the spill. For information about the workshop, call 795-3149.

Several local agencies are sponsoring the workshop, including the county commission, sheriff's office, Citrus County Chamber of Commerce, Economic Development Council, Tourism Development Council and Workforce Connection.

On Wednesday, oil from the spill remained more than 150 miles away from the coast of Citrus County and no tarballs, tar patties or sheen have been found here.

Officials aren't expecting an oil slick along the Citrus County coast, Lt. Bob Wesch, assistant director of Citrus County Emergency Management, wrote in an e-mail Wednesday. "I would say that based on conversation with (Citrus County Emergency Management Director Capt. Joe Eckstein) and information gathered from the daily conference calls, Citrus County shouldn't get any oil slick along our coast. If we do experience anything related to Deepwater Horizon, it will be in the form of tar balls or patties," Wesch wrote.

A contingency plan is in place for Citrus County in case an oil slick reaches the area. The plan identifies sensitive areas like estuaries and marshes to be protected.

"We routinely update the ACP (Area Contingency Plan) to ensure that we have all sensitive areas identified," Eckstein said in a press release Wednesday.

He said in the event the oil sheen approaches the county shoreline, BP's authorized contractors will use a process called "skimming" to collect the oil before it impacts Citrus County shores, according to the press release. If tarballs or tar patties are headed this way, booms will be used to protect Citrus County's sensitive areas.

Board has not spent anywhere near \$859,000 on legal fees for issues with the Trustees," Langer wrote. "That dollar figure represents our total year-to-date legal fees for the current fiscal year."

As Langer did not provide the sum spent by the foundation on its dispute with the trustees, the *Chronicle* asked CMHS for the figure.

According to CMHS spokeswoman Katie Myers, who issued the figure from administrative staff, the foundation has spent \$577,722.82 on the dispute with the trustees, covering a period from October 2009 to April 2010.

Grant told the *Chronicle* he gave the answer of \$859,000 by totaling the schedule of legal expenses he received after making several public records requests of the foundation. All the records Grant received were blacked out where the reason for the expense would have been explained.

Grant's requests go back for many months. In a letter to Ryan Beatty, CMHS chief executive officer, dated Dec. 22, 2009, Grant writes: "Please provide the detail and explanation for each entry illustrating the work completed by the firm of Clark A. Stillwell, LLC, as is highlighted and attached hereto as Exhibit A."

"In addition, please provide each and every detail for the law firm of Buchanan, Ingersoll & Rooney, PC, since Jan. 1, 2009. Please absolutely be sure to include the detail and explanation of the work completed for the funds to be paid."

On March 5, 2010, Grant requested for a second time a copy of any and all lobbyist retainer agreements, signed or unsigned, since Jan. 1, 2009, to the present (March 5).

"Please be advised that this request is made pursuant to Florida Statute 119," Grant wrote.

Still, Grant said, his requests were not met.

Grant responded to a letter of May 5 from Emery Hensley, the Foundation's chief financial officer: "I am requesting immediately a copy of any and all lobbyist agreements, of which Citrus Memorial Health Foundation has engaged, regardless of where they are housed.

WHAT THE LAW SAYS

From Florida's Government-In-The-Sunshine Manual:

Attorney bills and payments — Only those records which reflect a "mental impression, conclusion, litigation strategy or legal theory" are included within the parameters of the work product exemption. The Attorney General's Office concluded that a contract between a county and a private law firm for legal counsel and documentation for invoices submitted by such firm to the county do not fall within the work product exemption.

If the bills and invoices contain some exempt work product, the exempt material may be deleted and the remainder disclosed.

Thus, an agency which "blocked out" most notations on invoices prepared in connection with services rendered by and fees paid to attorneys representing the agency improperly withheld nonexempt material when it failed to limit its redactions to those items "genuinely reflecting its 'mental impression, conclusion, litigation strategy or legal theory.'"

What are the consequences if a public board or commission fails to comply with the Sunshine Law?

Any member of a board or commission or of any state agency or authority of a county, municipal corporation or political subdivision who knowingly violates the Sunshine Law is guilty of a misdemeanor of the second degree. A person convicted of a second-degree misdemeanor may be sentenced to a term of imprisonment not to exceed 60 days and/or fined up to \$500. The criminal penalties apply to members of advisory councils subject to the Sunshine Law, as well as to members of elected or appointed boards.

This item has been requested twice before this third and final request. I suggest you retrieve the documents and provide them immediately."

Grant wrote to Hensley that he was ready to file suit if his request was not met.

"If the document is not received on or before Friday, May 14, 2010, we will avail ourselves of the remedy available under Florida Chapter 119 for a failure to provide and release a public record in a timely and reasonable fashion," Grant wrote to Hensley.

"I regret the tone of this letter, but we are left with no alternative due to Citrus Memorial Health Foundation's continual refusal to release requested public records," Grant wrote to Hensley. "A copy of any and all checks paid to lobbyists and lawyers and/or law firms have also not been produced but requested multiple times. I

suggest these records be immediately provided to avoid the same action."

In a letter dated May 19, Hensley responded to each of 13 items that Grant had been requesting. Among those was the request for legal fees.

"Enclosed is each and every invoice received from any attorney and/or law firm," Hensley wrote.

However, the detail and explanation of the work completed had been blacked out on each invoice, Grant showed the *Chronicle*.

"There is no narrative anywhere," Grant said. "They have redacted it because they say it is the subject of imminent litigation. There is no pending litigation because nothing is before the court. How can everything be the subject of imminent litigation?"

To be compliant with the Sunshine Law, Grant said the Foundation should not have

work in the dispute, \$859,000, was substantially higher than the figure the Foundation confirmed, \$577,722.82.

"They are within their rights to redact anything that reflects attorney-client work product," Kennedy said. "Their better posture would be to call me up and work it out directly," Kennedy said when asked for a response to Grant's threat of a lawsuit. "He's never called me about it. They try to use the legal process rather than talk to us. I would welcome a phone call from them."

Grant said Kennedy has not returned his phone calls.

"They know the issues," Grant said. "We are not playing games. They need to do their due diligence and respond to public records requests appropriately. They are breaking the law. At our June 30 meeting, I am going to request the trustees to allow me to bring suit against them under the Sunshine Law."

Grant said he did not want to file a Sunshine Law violation lawsuit against the Foundation, but said he feels it could be necessary because of the difficulty of getting information. Grant also has asked for copies of the change orders on the construction of the Citrus Memorial Healthcare Center at Sugarmill Woods and copies of the checks paid as bonuses to managers, among other requests.

"This is not like a divorce," Grant said about the dispute, which in the past has been compared to a failed marriage. "With a divorce, you break up and move on. But with this, you're going to be doing this forever."

redacted details about its expenditure of \$577,722.82 on its dispute with the Trustees, and a letter of exemption would be required to cover the rest of the invoices. Grant said he received no letter of exemption.

Grant said the Foundation had paid \$155,000 to Stillwell and \$501,000 to Buchanan Ingersoll & Rooney, based on the invoices provided.

"But they won't say what they spent it on," Grant said.

Hensley also wrote to Grant that his request for the lobbyist contract had been referred to Beatty. Grant said the lobbyist's fee would add to the \$859,000 overall sum for legal work.

In the same letter of May 19, Hensley responded to another request: "The hospital is not in possession of any retainer agreements and has not issued any checks to Gray-Robinson law firm."

Grant said the Foundation engaged the Gray-Robinson law firm to address the local bill that would have changed the relationship between the two boards, had it not failed in the last session of the state Legislature.

"In response to H.B.1475, Gray-Robinson wrote a 12-page memo of law to try to make the case that the bill was unconstitutional," Grant said. "How can they say there is no invoice? What law firm works for free?"

The *Chronicle* asked Jim Kennedy, with Buchanan, Ingersoll & Rooney, why the invoices sent to Grant were blacked out. Kennedy said they redacted all narrative related to the dispute that involves attorneys' mental impressions and litigation strategy, although he said the cost Grant gave for the legal

Homosassa man dies in single-car crash

A Homosassa man died in a single-car crash Wednesday afternoon in Citrus Hills, according to Florida Highway Patrol. Preliminary information released by FHP stated David William Crosby, 71, was driving his 1995 Ford pickup truck east on County Road 486 when he lost control of the vehicle. Crosby reportedly swerved onto the south shoulder of C.R. 486, then traveled east into the southbound lanes of North Citrus Hills Boulevard before hitting a palm tree in the median. Medical staff pronounced him dead at Citrus Memorial hospital in Inverness.

According to FHP, the crash remains under investigation and details are subject to change.

Former Citrus High principal resigns

Citrus County School Board members voted unanimously to accept the resignation of former Citrus High School principal Leigh Ann Bradshaw during a regular meeting Tuesday.

Following an investigation, Bradshaw was removed from her position at the school and had been on paid leave since April 21. Bradshaw was the district's first female high school principal.

Board members accepted the resignation in a vote approving a number of personnel changes.

Sheriff's office investigates 2 deaths

18-year-old shot in Hernando; 66-year-old man dead in Homosassa

Citrus County detectives are conducting two unrelated death investigations, officials said Wednesday afternoon.

Preliminary information released by the sheriff's office said dispatchers received a call around 1 a.m. Wednesday about the death of a teenage boy.

Austin Porter, 18, of Inverness, reportedly was at a friend's house at 7089 N. Palmer Way in Hernando. Officials stated Porter and some ac-

quaintances were passing around a shotgun when, at some point, the gun fired. Porter suffered a fatal head wound, according to the sheriff's office.

Porter's autopsy is scheduled for today in Leesburg, where the medical examiner's office will be determining the cause and manner of his death.

On the other side of the county, authorities are continuing to look into the death of a Homosassa man that occurred last week.

According to the sheriff's office,

dispatchers received a call at 12:30 a.m. Thursday, June 3, about a man in distress lying on the ground under a tree near 7696 W. Homosassa Trail.

When deputies arrived at the scene, they found Norman Ohrstrom, 66, who was reportedly suffering from labored breathing and difficulty speaking. Emergency medical service personnel transported Ohrstrom to Seven Rivers Regional Medical Center in Crystal River for treatment.

However, officials stated when Ohrstrom failed to respond to any

treatment, he was transferred to a hospice facility in Beverly Hills.

Ohrstrom died just after 11 p.m. Monday.

His body was transported to the medical examiner's office, where officials said an autopsy investigation is still being performed.

Sheriff's detectives have classified these cases as death investigations, but sheriff's spokeswoman Gail Tierney said they are still conducting interviews and processing evidence should the cases turn criminal.

SCORE honors new businesses

A coffee roaster and a craft shop got off to good starts this past year, and were recognized as the SCORE Clients of the Year.

"This client came to me and said she wanted to open a teaching craft store," said Chuck Haffenden, a counselor for SCORE, "Counselors to America's small businesses." "She didn't need stimulus money. She didn't need bailout money. She didn't need bank money. She opened her business with her own \$900."

Haffenden presented an award to his client, Marianne Vincelli, owner of The Crafty Lady in Colonial Plaza, 2032 State Road 44 West, Inverness. He said she has 13 instructors to teach many types of arts and crafts.

"Last year, she offered 480 classes," Haffenden said. "Her business is growing."

Vincelli said she opened her busi-

ness a year and a half ago. She teaches the one-stroke painting technique by Donna Dewberry and other types of oil painting, watercolor, pen and ink and pencil on wood. She also offers metal work, quilting, sewing, jewelry, floral design and scrap booking, among other crafts.

This summer, the store will offer a summer program for children.

"We hope to fill in the gap for schools not having extensive art programs for children any more," Vincelli said.

An artist from Fort Lauderdale would start a program to teach oil painting to severely handicapped people, Vincelli said, just as volunteers work with teaching painting to people in a senior community.

Norman Mangano, chairman of the Citrus County Chapter of SCORE, counseled the second winner of the Client of the Year award, Cattle Dog Coffee Roasters owners James and Heather Cook, who took

over the business from Steve Dorst, who died two days after he started the business.

"They've carried on Steve's dream," Mangano said about the business at Heritage Hills Plaza, 2416 N. Heritage Oaks Path, Hernando.

In accepting the award, James Cook said he felt moved by the honor.

County Administrator Brad Thorpe was the guest speaker. He said he has been trying to change the culture in county government to make it more streamlined to help businesses, especially considering the weak economy.

"Other counties are in deep trouble, but I think we will work this out together and come out of this together," Thorpe said.

Skip Honigstein, district director of SCORE, said that Mangano would become an assistant district director for North Florida chapters of SCORE.

Tourism brochure riddled with errors

Tampa Bay area officials are fuming over glaring errors in a Florida tourism brochure that went out in newspapers last Sunday.

The color brochures stuffed into 1.7 million Florida newspapers put Clearwater Beach in north Florida, the Salvador Dali Museum in Tampa instead of St. Petersburg, and incorrectly refers to the baseball team as the Tampa Devil Rays.

The brochure, intended to persuade Florida residents to vacation in the state, was produced under the auspices of Florida's tourism bureau by a Georgia company, which took responsibility.

The gaffe comes at a time when local hotels are already facing problems attracting customers spooked by the Gulf oil spill.

Crist pushes for July session on oil drilling ban

Gov. Charlie Crist may call a special session in July for lawmakers to discuss a constitutional amendment that would ban offshore drilling.

Crist toured a new command post in downtown Miami on Wednesday where Coast Guard, state and federal officials and BP representatives will strategize over how to protect Florida's beaches if the oil hits South Florida. While there's no imminent threat, Crist said estimates change daily. He said it will be crucial to have the most accurate information about how much

2 Walmart workers accused of stealing hydrocodone

Two employees at a north Florida Walmart pharmacy have been charged with trafficking a controlled substance after allegedly stealing thousands of hydrocodone pills.

The Jackson County Sheriff's Office says pharmacist Tresha Davis and Priscilla Ann Noble, a pharmacy technician, stole several hundred pain pills each week and then sold them to others.

Investigators say more arrests are expected. A Walmart spokeswoman says the company is working with authorities.

Video provides details on deadly restaurant shootings

A South Florida man was inside a restaurant for about 20 seconds before going on a shooting rampage that killed three women and his wife, according to surveillance video released Wednesday by Hialeah police.

The shooting began Sunday night in the parking lot outside the Yoyito Restaurant north of Miami. Gerardo Regalado, 38, was seen arguing with his wife, Liazan Molina, 24, before she was fatally shot. Regalado then entered the restaurant, firing on six women.

Video from inside shows several women mopping the floor or washing down the counter when another woman alerts them of

something happening outside. Seconds later, the women are seen taking cover and running away from the front door.

Regalado walks inside with a gun in his hand, pointing it at an unidentified man before running toward the back of the restaurant. The video picks up with several women running out of the frame when Regalado takes aim at them. The video does not show the victims being shot, although it is clear Regalado points the gun several times before firing.

Regalado, the half brother of former baseball star Orlando "El Duque" Hernandez, was found dead a few blocks away in an apparent suicide.

Ex-lawyer gets 50 years for Ponzi scheme

Disbarred attorney Scott Rothstein has been sentenced to 50 years in prison by a Florida judge for operating a \$1.2 billion Ponzi scheme.

U.S. District Judge James I. Cohn imposed the sentence Wednesday on Rothstein, who turns 48 today. Rothstein could have been sentenced to the maximum 100 years for five felony convictions.

Rothstein wanted a lower 30-year sentence because of his extensive cooperation with investigators.

Before it collapsed last fall, Rothstein's scheme was built on supposedly lucrative investments in faked confidential legal settlements. The scam enabled Rothstein to buy at least two dozen homes and numerous exotic cars and contribute hundreds of thousands of dollars to politicians.

Crist has small lead in Senate; Scott is rising fast

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Charlie Crist holds a slim lead in a three-way race for the U.S. Senate while political newcomer Rick Scott opened a double-digit bulge over Democratic front-runner Alex Sink in the governor's race, a new poll showed Wednesday.

Scott, who has spent millions of his own dollars to saturate the airways with ads introducing himself to voters, is preferred by 42 percent compared to Democratic front-runner Alex Sink's 32 percent in a head-to-head matchup in the November general election, a Quinnipiac (Conn.) University poll showed.

"He has gone from someone who almost no one has every heard of to someone who is doing very, very well," pollster Peter Brown said Wednesday.

"Rick's conservative outsider message of fiscal responsibility, smaller government and accountability to taxpayers is really resonating," Scott campaign spokeswoman Jen Baker said.

Since entering the race in April, Scott has become better known to Florida voters than Sink, who has been the state's chief financial officer since January 2007 and a gubernatorial candidate for 13 months. Fifty-six percent of those questioned said they don't know enough about Sink compared to 46 percent who had a similar response about Scott.

The latest entry in the governor's race, Lawton "Bud" Chiles, announced his intentions to run as an independent after the survey, taken June 1-7, had started, but polled surprisingly strong among a smaller sample taken in the final days of the poll. Chiles, son of Florida's late governor with the same name, was preferred by 13 percent in a three-way matchup against Scott and Sink. He received 19 percent if Attorney General Bill McCollum were the Republican nominee.

If McCollum prevails over Scott in the Republican primary, he would defeat Sink 42 percent to 34 percent if the race were held now, the poll showed.

In the Senate matchup, Crist received 37 percent as an independent candidate to Republican Marco Rubio's 33 percent and Democrat Kendrick Meek's 17 percent in a survey of 1,133 registered Florida voters. Crist also prevailed in a separate three-way comparison with 40 percent to Rubio's 33 percent and political novice Jeff Greene's 14 percent. Greene is also spending some of his own fortune to try and wrest the Democratic nomination from Congressman Meek.

the first meeting of Florida's Oil Spill Economic Recovery Task Force, some members said they feared the Deepwater Horizon disaster could cripple the company, jeopardizing cash flowing to damaged Gulf states.

'I believe this company is in serious economic trouble,' said Steve Uhlfelder, a Tallahassee lawyer and task force member.

'I think we need to get that money, in our hands, a very large amount, as soon as possible,' he added. 'We haven't even begun to see the impact of June, July and August on the Panhandle.'

Rep. Mike Horner, R-Kissimmee, also said BP's approach of offering payments to Florida in \$25 million increments — the latest announced Tuesday — 'isn't cutting it.'

'We're putting them in the driver's seat to determine what is a legitimate claim or not — I don't

Pennsylvania who looked her up after seeing the newsletter that was just published.

think that's a position we want to be in,' Horner said. 'I'd rather see the state be more aggressive ... Let's get the dollars up front before they find another shield to hide behind.'

Horner said the anticipated damage to Florida's tourism and fisheries industries warranted the state to demand that when BP makes payments to Florida, 'they put a few more zeroes on it.' Other task force members, including Gov. Charlie Crist's budget director, Jerry McDaniel, said the spill's cost will further drain government services already besieged by the state's still-fragile economy.

'School budgets are going to take a hit, along with all of the state budget,' McDaniel said, citing a likely decline in property-tax dollars and sales-tax revenue.

While frustration with BP was evident among task force members, not all agreed with the push for a major lump-sum payment. Bill Stewart, Attorney General Bill McCollum's deputy chief of staff, said BP has acknowledged it has

not set aside reserves to cover payments stemming from the spill.

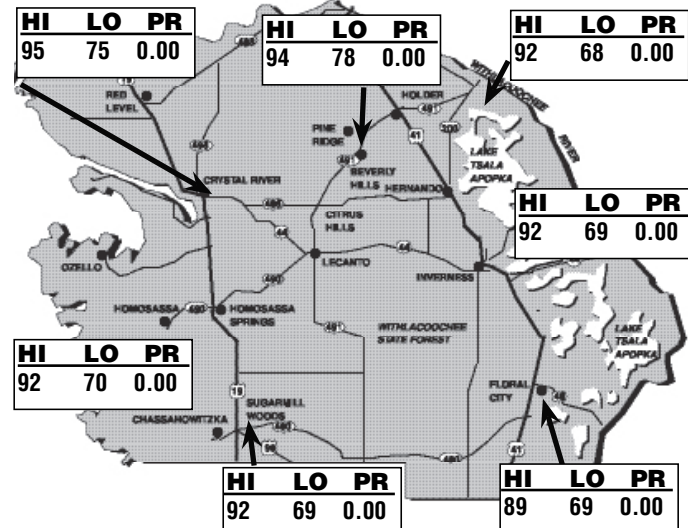
BP, however, last week reported that it had generated \$30 billion in cash flow over the last four quarters and insisted it can cover all claims.

Stewart's boss McCollum, the leading Republican candidate for governor, on Tuesday directed the bulk of his criticism at the Obama administration for a poor cleanup response in the Gulf region. Stewart also cautioned Florida officials against seeking to take on settling claims for those whose livelihoods have been hurt by the spill — saying that, like BP the state would have to outsource such work.

'We should at least give BP the opportunity to succeed with what they are doing,' Stewart said.

BP has opened 10 claims offices along Panhandle counties and Monroe County and has received 9,119 claims from Florida businesses and workers seeking to recover money lost because of the spill. The company has paid \$6.6 million so far, officials said.

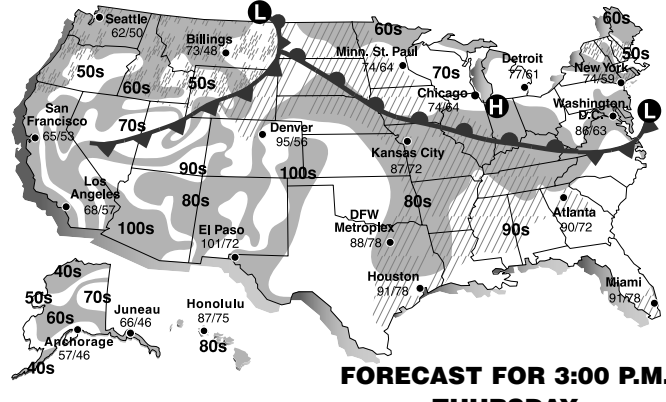

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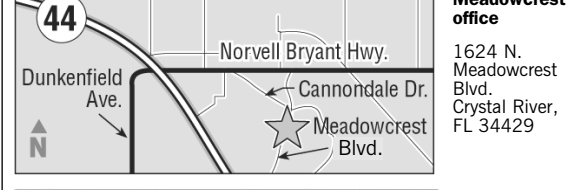

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Fed survey finds a modest recovery is spreading

WASHINGTON — For the first time since the beginning of the recession, economic growth — modest and fragile, but growth nonetheless — has spread to every corner of the country.

A survey released Wednesday found economic activity was improving across all 12 regions of the nation tracked by the Federal Reserve.

Metal producers in Chicago and St. Louis cranked out more steel. Makers of drugs and medical

equipment in the Northeast did better business. And sales of summer clothes were strong in fashion-conscious New York.

Still, the pace of growth in most parts of the country was described as modest. That's a sign that companies probably won't starting hir-

ing again anytime soon in great enough numbers to bring down the unemployment rate.

"It's kind of like having more people sign up to run in the Boston Marathon but no one is running very fast," said Brian Bethune, economist at IHS Global Insight.

"You have more people in the race, but they are all running slowly."

Economists predict it will take at least until the middle of this decade to recoup the more than 8 million jobs wiped out by the recession and bring unemployment down to a more normal 5.5 percent to 6 percent.

County's tax rolls continue to plummet

Recently, county property appraisers throughout Florida released their estimated taxable property values for the period Jan. 2, 2009, to Jan. 1, 2010. Plagued by a stagnant economy of several years, real estate prices have continued to tumble. Accordingly, the estimates, as indicated by a sampling of Florida counties and municipalities, were not good news for many local governments across the state.

Flagler County's estimated taxable value plummeted 19.6 percent. Hernando County dropped 13.7 percent. Miami-Dade County dived 13.4 percent. Manatee County fell 13.3 percent. Volusia County decreased 13.2 percent. Broward County slumped 12.1 percent. Marion County dipped 12 percent. And Hillsborough County declined 10.5 percent. Many municipalities fared no better, with Homestead dropping 30 percent; North Lauderdale, 24 percent; Palmetto, 18.8 percent; Cape Coral, 16.3 percent, and Bradenton 13.4 percent.

In comparison with other Florida counties, Citrus County fared better than most, with Property Appraiser Geoffrey Greene projecting a 4.52 percent drop in taxable property value. While any decline in taxable property value is bad news for local government revenue, the news could have been worse if it were not for two mitigating factors.

First, Progress Energy's assessment was increased \$239

million due to investments in pollution abatement equipment at its Crystal River coal burning units. This has translated to an additional \$4 million for the county's tax roll. Secondly, the county will reap a slight property tax increase from about 24,000 homeowners who continue to benefit from the Save Our Homes cap since a recapture provision allows the assessment on capped

property to rise by the lesser of 3 percent or the annual Consumer Price Index (2.7 percent for 2010) until just value equals assessed value.

While these mitigating factors have limited the impact of the county's down market, the continuing slide in the county's tax roll presents county commissioners with the undesirable options of either raising the millage rate or further curtailing spending. Given that many of the county's homeowners are struggling to stay afloat, the best option remains a leaner county government with spending priority directed toward sustaining essential services.

Pending certification of the tax roll on July 1, the estimated taxable value will serve county commissioners as the basis for the next fiscal year budget that begins Oct. 1. While the estimate could have been worse, its message is clear — local government officials, as the stewards of public monies, need to spend taxpayer dollars judiciously during both bad and good economic times.

The rebirth of Bobby Jindal

Don't count Bobby Jindal out. The Louisiana governor, who was touted as "the Republican Obama" before his first big national speech flopped, is rising again, strong enough this time to go toe-to-toe with the real President Obama.

At a time when his party's strongest voices seem to be coming from angry conservative radio pundits and cable TV hosts, Jindal presents a powerfully authentic image of rolled-up-shirtsleeves populist indignation over the gooey threat that BP's oil disaster in the Gulf of Mexico poses to his state's "way of life."

That's a far cry from Jindal's first appearance on the national stage. His excruciatingly folksy response on behalf of his party to the president's first congressional address brought comparisons to "Kenneth the page," a gleeful bumpkin character on NBC's "30 Rock."

Until then Piyush "Bobby" Jindal, who will be 39 on June 10, was often called the "Republican Obama" for his similarities to the original. The Ivy League and Oxford-educated former congressman and son of Indian-American immigrants also belongs to a once-plentiful but now sadly endangered political species, a Republican of color.

Today the former "Kenneth" looks more like Super Bobby, in the news almost daily, at threatened beaches and marshland, talking to constituents and lecturing reporters on the finer points of levees, currents, wind, sand berms and Washington sluggishness.

"In his public remarks, Jindal has gotten as worked up as a circuit-riding preacher," writes

Gary Reese in the Southern Political Report. "Is this righteous indignation or political pantomime? It depends on who you ask."

Either way, his passion resonates well with the traditions of colorful Louisiana legends like Huey Long — in sharp contrast to Obama's professorial impatience with BP and its failure to stop the big gushing leak, despite assistance from the best scientific minds that the White House can pull together.

"I would love to just spend a lot of my time venting and yelling at people," Obama told Larry King in a CNN interview that aired Thursday, "but that's not the job I was hired to do. My job is to solve this problem, and ultimately this isn't about me and how angry I am."

Indeed, even libertarian Republican Rep. Ron Paul of Texas said on Don Imus' show on Fox Business News that Obama and, in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, President George W. Bush both deserve a break from the "overkill" of those who mistakenly believe "that the president is everything to everybody, that he can fix an oil leak."

Yet, as an example of how statercraft is largely stagecraft in this media age, Jindal's dispute with the White House over sand berms offers an excellent example of his effectiveness.

At first the White House resisted his request for federal approval that would force BP to pay the cost of building sand berms inside barrier islands to protect the mainland and wetlands — and their huge fisheries industries — from the oil. But after six weeks and despite considerable evidence that the berms might

not work, the Obama administration gave in.

The administration's cave-in on sand berms calls to mind the National Guard troops that Obama recently approved for our Mexican border. For weeks the White House maintained that troops would do too little to solve the immigration or drug smuggling problems. But sometimes it's better to switch than fight, especially when nothing else seems to be working.

Lately Jindal also has been receiving praise from liberal-leaners, as reporter Jesse Zwick writes in a recent *The New Republic*, for "the kind of smarts and ideological flexibility that we should applaud in our leaders, no matter the party." The headline: "Kenneth the Page Becomes a Man."

Yet, praise from the left for "ideological flexibility" brings scorn from the right for flip-flopping. Some conservatives are miffed that Jindal threatened to reject federal economic stimulus funds, then took them anyway, just because his state needed the money.

They're similarly upset that he seeks federal help against the oil spill. Welcome to the life of a governor, where the ideology that helped you to get your job can get in the way of your ability to do the job.

No, don't count Bobby Jindal out. I think he'll do just fine, if his fellow conservatives don't get in his way.

Abramoff released from prison early

HAGERSTOWN, Md. — Disgraced Washington lobbyist Jack Abramoff has been released from prison to a halfway house in the mid-Atlantic region, the Federal Bureau of Prisons said Wednesday.

Abramoff, 51, was released Tuesday from the minimum-security federal prison camp in western Maryland where he had been confined since November 2006 for fraud, corruption and conspiracy convictions, spokesman Edmond Ross said.

Abramoff's scheduled release date is Dec. 4, Ross said. He said Abramoff could spend the last two to three weeks of his sentence in home confinement.

Abramoff was sentenced in 2006 to nearly six years for a fraudulent Florida casino deal. He got a four-year sentence in 2008 for conspiring to defraud the U.S., corrupting public officials and defrauding his clients in a separate case.

Because the judge ordered the sentences to run concurrently, the shorter sentence was subsumed by the longer one.

New sanctions levied against Iran

UNITED NATIONS — The U.S. and its allies scored a long-sought victory Wednesday by pushing through new U.N. sanctions over Iran's nuclear program, punishments Tehran dismissed as "annoying flies, like a used tissue."

The sanctions target Iran's powerful Revolutionary Guard, ballistic missiles and nuclear-related investments. Oil exports, the lifeblood of Iran's economy, are not affected because targeting them would have cost the U.S. essential support from Russia and China. Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad dismissed the new sanctions as "annoying flies, like a used tissue."

"We do not recognize sanctions," he said in Tajikistan, where he is on an official visit.

The new resolution bans Iran from pursuing "any activity related to ballistic missiles capable of delivering nuclear weapons," bars Iranian investment in activities such as uranium mining and prohibits Iran from buying several categories of heavy weapons including attack helicopters and missiles.

The resolution was approved by a vote of 12-2 with Lebanon abstaining and Brazil and Turkey voting "no." Turkey and Brazil, both non-permanent council members, brokered a fuel-swap agreement with Iran as an alternative solution to concerns Tehran may be enriching uranium for nuclear weapons.

After primaries, parties launch fall campaigns

WASHINGTON — With fresh November match-ups set, Democrats are wasting little time propping up three of their most vulnerable Senate incumbents while criticizing their newly minted GOP opponents as too extreme for the country. Republicans returned the criticism as general election campaigns got under way across the country.

A battered Arkansas Sen. Blanche Lincoln, a two-term senator fresh from a narrow victory over a liberal Democrat in a primary

runoff, quickly is pivoting to taking on Republican Rep. John Boozman. The unpopular Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid now is squaring off against a tea party-backed Republican, Sharron Angle, and the vulnerable California Sen. Barbara Boxer is facing a GOP businesswoman with deep pockets in Carly Fiorina.

In a populist model Democrats are using nationwide, Sen. Bob Menendez of New Jersey, the head of the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee, cast Lincoln as an independent voice seeking to hold Wall Street account-

able and accused Boozman of "putting political interests first in order to defend the big corporate interests."

Countering, Texas Sen. John Cornyn, Menendez's GOP counterpart, claimed that the moderate Lincoln was guilty of "fully embracing her liberal Washington record" while Boozman "is a proven leader" who will "stand up to the Obama administration."

The primaries, spread across a dozen states from coast to coast, took place against a backdrop of the worst recession in decades, stubbornly high unemploy-

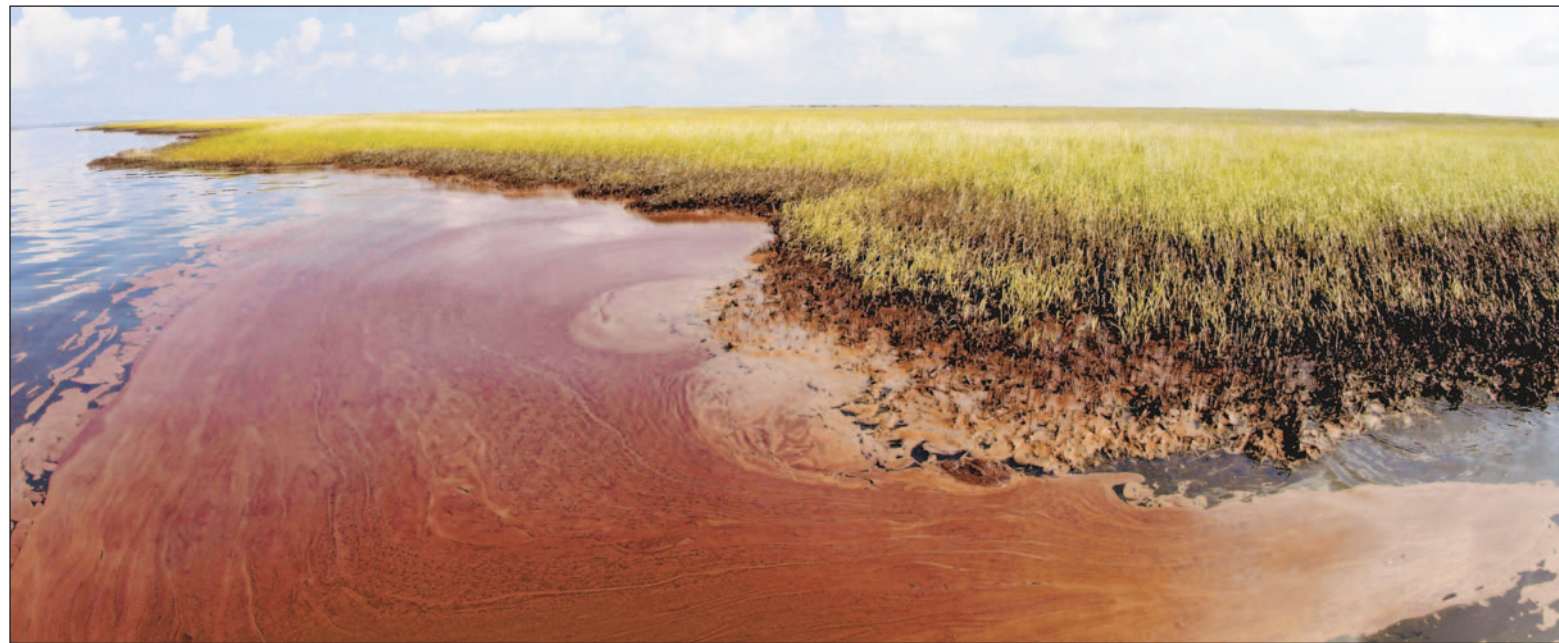
ment, dispiriting day-by-day images of the damage caused by an offshore oil rig disaster and poll after poll that reported the voters angry and eager for a change.

In governors' races, former eBay CEO Meg Whitman won the GOP's nomination for California governor and will face former Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr., seeking a return to the office he left in 1983. They are seeking to succeed the retiring Republican Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger.

And hundreds of miles to the east, South Carolina state Rep. Nikki Haley sur-

vived a bitter battle to face Rep. Gresham Barrett in a June 22 runoff for the GOP nomination in a solidly Republican state. She overcame allegations of marital infidelity, which she denied, to outpace three male rivals but was shy of the majority vote needed to claim the nomination outright.

Elsewhere, Republican Gov. Jim Gibbons of Nevada fell to Brian Sandoval, a former federal judge, after a term marked by a messy public divorce and allegations of infidelity. Rory Reid, son of the Senate majority leader, won the Democratic nomination.

Investigation finds BP spill plan full of omissions, glaring errors

VENICE, La. — Professor Peter Lutz is listed in BP's 2009 response plan for a Gulf of Mexico oil spill as a national wildlife expert. He died in 2005.

Under the heading "sensitive biological resources," the plan lists marine mammals including walruses, sea otters, sea lions and seals. None lives anywhere near the Gulf.

The names and phone numbers of several Texas A&M University marine life specialists are wrong. So are the numbers for marine mammal stranding network offices in Louisiana and Florida, which are no longer in service.

BP PLC's 582-page regional spill plan for the Gulf, and its 52-page, site-specific plan for the Deepwater Horizon rig are riddled with omissions and glaring errors, according to an Associated Press analysis that details how BP officials have pretty much been making it up as they go along. The lengthy plans approved by the federal government last year before BP drilled its ill-fated well vastly understate the dangers posed by an uncontrolled leak and vastly overstate the company's preparedness to deal with one.

Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal, reacting to the AP story, said Wednesday he was angry and frustrated.

"Look, it's obvious to everybody in south Louisiana that they didn't have a plan, they didn't have an adequate plan to deal with this spill," Jindal said. "They didn't anticipate the BOP (blowout preventer) failure. They didn't anticipate this much oil hitting our coast. From the very first days, they kept telling us, 'Don't worry, the oil's not going to make it to your coast.'"

BP's OMISSIONS

In its Deepwater Horizon plan, the British oil giant stated: "BP Exploration and Production Inc. has the capability to respond, to the maximum extent practicable, to a worst case discharge, or a substantial threat of such a discharge, resulting from the activities proposed in our Exploration Plan."

In the spill scenarios detailed in the documents, fish, marine mammals and birds escape serious harm; beaches remain pristine; water quality is only a temporary problem. And those are the projections for a leak about 10 times worse than what has been calculated for the ongoing disaster.

There are other wildly false assumptions in the documents. BP's proposed method to calculate spill

volume judging by the darkness of the oil sheen is way off. The internationally accepted formula would produce estimates 100 times higher.

The Gulf's loop current, which is projected to help eventually send oil hundreds of miles around Florida's southern tip and up the Atlantic coast, isn't mentioned in either plan.

The website listed for Marine Spill Response Corp. — one of two firms that BP relies on for equipment to clean a spill — links to a defunct Japanese-language page.

FALSE STARTS

In early May, at least 80 Louisiana state prisoners were trained to clean birds by listening to a presentation and watching a video. It was a work force never envisioned in the plans, which contain no detailed references to how birds would be cleansed of oil.

And while BP officials and the federal government have insisted they have attacked the problem as if it were a much larger spill, that isn't apparent from the constantly evolving nature of the response.

Sen. Bill Nelson, a Florida Democrat, said in an e-mail Wednesday to the AP that he and Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-California, have asked for a criminal investigation of some of the company's claims.

This week, after BP reported the seemingly good news that a containment cap installed on the wellhead was funneling some of the gushing crude to a tanker on the surface, BP introduced a whole new set of plans mostly aimed at capturing more oil.

The latest incarnation calls for building a larger cap, using a special incinerator to burn off some of the recaptured oil and bringing in a floating platform to process the oil being sucked from the well.

In other words, the on-the-fly planning continues.

FALLING SHORT

Some examples of how BP's plans have fallen short:

■ Beaches where oil washed up within weeks of a spill were supposed to be safe from contamination because BP promised it could marshal more than enough boats to scoop up all the oil before any deepwater spill could reach shore — a claim that in retrospect seems absurd.

BP asserts that the combined response could skim, suck up or otherwise remove 20 million gallons of oil each day from the water. But that is about how much has leaked in the past six weeks — and the slick now covers about 3,300

square miles, according to Hans Graber, director of the University of Miami's satellite sensing facility. Only a small fraction of the spill has been successfully skimmed. Plus, an undetermined portion of the spill has sunk to the bottom or is suspended somewhere in between.

The plan uses computer modeling to project a 21 percent chance of oil reaching the Louisiana coast within a month of a spill. In reality, an oily sheen reached the Mississippi River delta just nine days after the April 20 explosion. Heavy globs soon followed. Other locales where oil washed up within weeks of the explosion were characterized in BP's regional plan as safely out of the way of any oil danger.

■ BP's site plan regarding birds, sea turtles or endangered marine mammals ("no adverse impacts") also have proved far too optimistic.

While the exact toll on the Gulf's wildlife may never be known, the effects clearly have been devastating. More than 400 oiled birds have been treated, while dozens have been found dead and covered in crude, mainly in Louisiana but also in Mississippi, Alabama and Florida. On remote islands teeming with birds, a visible patina of oil taints pelicans, gulls, terns and herons, as captured in AP photos. The response plans anticipate nothing on this scale.

In Louisiana's Barataria Bay, a dead sea turtle caked in reddish-brown oil lay splayed out with dragonflies buzzing by. More than 200 lifeless turtles and several dolphins also have washed ashore. So have countless fish.

There weren't supposed to be any coastline problems because the site was far offshore. "Due to the distance to shore (48 miles) and the response capabilities that would be implemented, no significant adverse impacts are expected," the site plan says.

■ Perhaps the starkest example of BP's planning failures: The company has insisted that the size of the leak doesn't matter because it has been reacting to a worst-case scenario all along.

Yet each step of the way, as the estimated size of the daily leak has grown from 42,000 gallons to 210,000 gallons to perhaps 1.8 million gallons, BP has been forced to scramble — to create potential solutions on the fly, to add more boats, more boom, more skimmers, more workers, containment domes, top kills, top hats.

NO ANSWERS

While a disaster as devastating as a major oil spill will create some

problems that can't be solved in advance, or even foreseen, BP's plans do not anticipate even the most obvious issues, and use mountains of words to dismiss problems that have proven overwhelming.

In responses to lengthy lists of questions from AP officials for BP and the Interior Department, which oversees oil rig regulator Minerals Management Service, appear to concede there were problems with the two oil spill response plans.

"Many of the questions you raise are exactly those questions that will be examined and answered by the presidential commission as well as other investigations into BP's oil spill," said Kendra Barkoff, spokeswoman for Salazar. She added that Salazar has undertaken transformational reforms of MMS.

Said BP spokesman Daren Beaudou from Robert, La.: "We expect that a complete review of the regional response plans and planning process will take place as part of the overall incident investigation so that we can determine what worked well and what needs improvement. Thus far we have implemented the largest spill response in history and many, many elements of it have worked well. However, we are greatly disappointed that oil has made landfall and impacted shorelines and marshes. The situation we are dealing with is clearly complex, unprecedented and will offer us much to learn from."

But perhaps the most glaring error in BP's plans involves Lutz, the professor, one of several dozen experts recommended as resources to be contacted in the event of a spill.

Lutz is listed as a go-to wildlife specialist at the University of Miami. But Lutz, an eminent sea turtle expert, left Miami almost 20 years ago to chair the marine biology department at Florida Atlantic University in Boca Raton. He died four years before the plan was published.

Molly Lutcavage, a research professor at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst who worked closely with Lutz for years on a groundbreaking report on the effects of oil and sea turtles, was dismayed to hear that Lutz was still listed as an expert in the response plan.

"It's horribly depressing and shocking that so little attention is paid to a bona fide contingency plan," she said. "What would Peter think? Oh, boy. I think he would think it was typical of bureaucracy."

Gatorade selects Tigers' star pitcher as best in Florida for second time

And the hits just keep on coming — at least they do for the Dunnellon Tigers stand-out pitching ace Kasey Fagan.

On Wednesday afternoon, from its headquarters in downtown Chicago, The Gatorade Company, in collaboration with ESPN RISE, announced Fagan as its 2009-10 Gatorade Florida Softball Player of the Year.

For the Dunnellon senior, it's the second consecutive

year she has garnered the award which recognizes not only outstanding athletic excellence but also high standards of academic achievement, along with exemplary character demonstrated both on and off the field.

With this achievement Fagan is now a finalist for the prestigious Gatorade National Player of the Year award which will be announced later this month. She now joins an elite alumni association of past state award-winners in 12 sports,

including such recognizable names as Derek Jeter (1991-92, Kalamazoo H.S., Mich.), Candace Parker (2001-02, Naperville Central H.S., Ill.), Abby Wambach (1997-98, Our Lady of Mercy, N.Y.) and Mark Sanchez (2004-05, Mission Viejo H.S., Calif.).

The thousands of high school sports fans around the area are well aware of Fagan's dominance on the softball diamond. But it's worth noting some of the eye-popping numbers that she posted in this, her swan song season.

This year alone the 5-foot-11 senior pitcher and third baseman helped lead the Lady Tigers (33-1) to their second straight state title by posting a 26-1 record with a 0.57 ERA and 239 strikeouts. Among her other on-field pitching achievements were three no hitters and holding opponents to a 0.95 batting average in 147 innings of work.

Then there was her offense. At the plate she batted .574 with eight home runs, 53 runs scored and 61 RBIs

South Africans celebrate arrival of soccer stars, revel in shining moment

JOHANNESBURG — Soccer's stars have converged on South Africa from across the globe, but on the eve of the World Cup it is the host nation — with all its flaws and all its wonders — that has seized the spotlight.

Crime is rampant, in shantytowns and posh suburbs. An HIV-AIDS epidemic rages. Yet the welcome for the world — from Cape Town to Soweto — couldn't be warmer, or more proud.

Blaring their plastic trumpets, or "vuvuzelas," and displaying their multicolored flag on their cars and their homes and themselves, South Africans are embracing this historic moment. It's by far their boldest foray onto the world stage since Nelson Mandela formally ended the apartheid era by winning the presidency in 1994.

"It has unified all South Africa," said Irvin Khoza, chairman of the local organizing committee. "It doesn't matter if you're black or white, or if you're close to the sport or not. Everybody in this country is wearing the flag."

The four-week, 32-team tournament opens Friday with South

Africa's national squad — a longshot to bookmakers but a favorite to adoring local fans who call it Bafana Bafana — taking on Mexico at Soccer City, the 94,700-seat stadium rising amid old gold mines between Johannesburg and Soweto.

It will be the first time the world's most-watched sporting

event is held anywhere in Africa, where soccer fever runs deep, and it takes place in a country that for decades was an international sports outpost, boycotted because of its racist policies.

Brazil and Spain are the favorites to win the title. Other popular teams, according to a worldwide survey released this week by Nielsen Media Research, include former champions Argentina, England and Germany — along with the United States, which was picked to win by 46 percent of North Americans.

Even enigmatic North Korea is here, its unheralded and long-shot team qualifying for a World Cup for the first time since 1966 amid a flare-up of tension with its neighbor and fellow tournament entry, South Korea.

Effects of lightning strikes

As I was driving to Jacksonville this weekend for a meeting, my 5-year-old daughter drew my attention to the great fireworks display of lightning all around us.

I recalled a few years ago, my wife and I were running on our favorite path near the continental divide in Colorado. We became trapped in a lightning storm at 12,000 feet pretty much in the open, pouring rain, with thunder and lightning around us.

I knew all the things not to do. The few things I knew how to do seemed absurd, like squatting in a ditch in the actual torrential rain and lightning.

Typically, lightning kills more people in the United States than any other natural disaster except for flash floods including tornadoes. More than a third of lightning-strike injuries occur during recreational or sports activities. Many lightning casualties occur as the storm approaches or within 30 minutes after the storm has passed.

Florida leads the nation in the number of days with lightning activity. The state also represented

Blackhawks victorious

Chicago takes home Stanley Cup after winning 4-3 in OT

PHILADELPHIA — Chicago's wait is over. The Blackhawks won the Stanley Cup in overtime Wednesday night, ending a 49-year drought on the ice. Patrick Kane scored the winning goal 4:10 into overtime Wednesday night, and the Blackhawks became the first team to win on the road this series.

The Blackhawks completed their

revival from the bottom of the NHL to holding the silver trophy on the strength of rising stars Kane and Jonathan Toews.

Annti Niemi was solid in goal to help the Blackhawks wrap up their most successful season since Bobby Hull and Stan Mikita led the way 49 years ago.

It ends the longest active championship drought in the NHL.

The Flyers are still looking for their first Stanley Cup title since 1975.

Scott Hartnell scored his second goal of the game for the Flyers with 3:59 left in regulation and Philadelphia and the

NBA most diverse of pros

Only sport to receive 'A' for race, gender

ORLANDO — The NBA still leads the way in sports diversity.

The NBA was again the only men's professional sports league to receive a combined "A" for race and gender in the annual report released Wednesday by the University of Central Florida's Institute for Diversity and Ethics in Sport.

The league had slight decreases for blacks in front-office positions from last year but is still the best among men's pro sports, according to the study.

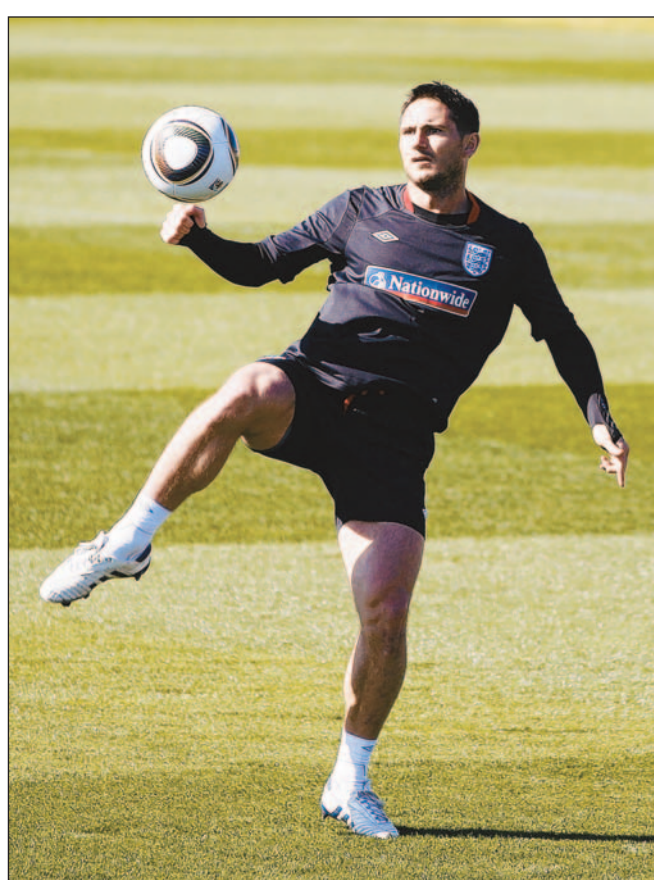
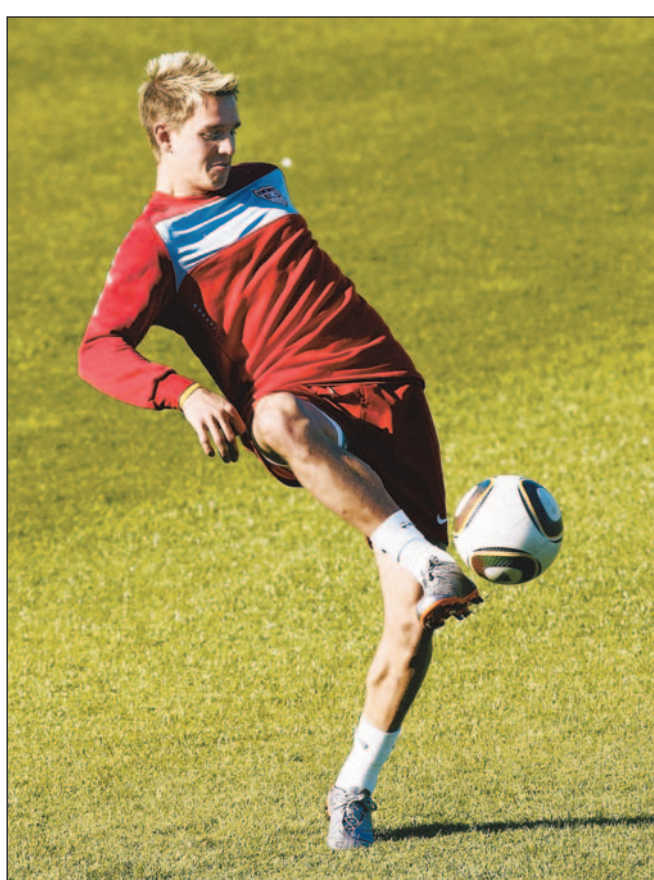
"I think that our teams go for the best talent and it's a fact that if you don't have the widest possible pool, including women and minorities, then you're not going to have the best talent. And so for us it's quite natural and we're very proud of our teams and their talent search," NBA commissioner David Stern said.

The study shows 77 percent of the NBA players were black, 18 percent white, 3 percent Latino, 1 percent Asian and 1 percent "other." International players, after a steady rise in recent years, stayed steady at 18 percent.

Richard Lapchick, author of the study, said the percentage of international players might deviate slightly in the next few years but has "probably peaked" for now.

Women made up 44 percent of professional employees at the league offices. That increased by one percent from last year, higher than any other men's professional league in any previous study but still below the NBA's high of 49 percent in the 1995-96 season.

There also were 34 women in vice president positions in the league office, an increase of three. And while the league received high marks for gender again, Lapchick said that might be the area the NBA can make the biggest strides.

First-round hype

England, U.S. face off for first time since 1950 World Cup

IRENE, South Africa — American soccer players have been on magazine covers and the nightly news shows in ever increasing numbers. The World Cup is receiving unprecedented promotion in the United States.

"For the last six months all we've seen is U.S.-England," Landon Donovan said Wednesday. "And so, if you were a casual sports fan at home, you might think that this was the World Cup final, U.S. vs. England."

But it's not. Saturday's much-hyped game is just the beginning.

It's the first competitive meeting between the nations since the 1-0 American upset in the first round of the 1950 World Cup. Fans in both nations seem to be fascinated with the opposing team.

Well, that's natural given how much the U.S. and England are alike. As Winston Churchill said: "Two nations divided by a common language."

"It's an unprecedented moment, partly because of who we're playing, partly because of where the game is in the United States. Frankly, partly because of the promotion on television in Spanish and English," U.S. Soccer Federation president Sunil Gulati said. "So there will be a lot of

people watching this game on Saturday, and it's one of those opportunities that we don't get very often."

England's stars are known from Broadway to Brighton. Wayne Rooney, Steven Gerrard, Frank Lampard and John Terry and other Premier League stars are seen even more on U.S. television than they are on British TV.

And top American players such as Donovan, Clint Dempsey and Tim Howard have become well known in the Premier League, as familiar in the colors of Everton and Fulham as they are in the red, white and blue.

While all the buzz may be about Saturday's game in Rustenberg, U.S. players say are giving equal emphasis to their other two first-round games, against Slovenia on June 18 and vs. Algeria on June 23. The England game is primary only because it comes first.

"I think we have a good understanding about the way it works in the first round, with three matches determining who moves on," U.S. coach Bob Bradley said. "Our ability to move through those games and those situations is something that we have experience with."

Four years ago, the U.S. was routed 3-0 by the Czech Republic in its opener. Even with a 1-1 draw against Italy, the Americans still had a

chance to advance. Only with a 2-1 defeat to the Ghana was the United States eliminated.

Players know that a team has a good chance to reach the knockout phase with four points and almost surely will with five. Players say they won't get too high or too low after the opener.

They think back to last year's Confederations Cup, when the U.S. started with a 3-1 loss to Italy and a 3-0 defeat against Brazil. To reach the semifinals, the Americans needed to beat Egypt by at least three goals while the world champion Italians lost to Brazil by at least three. The U.S. responded with a 3-0 victory, and Brazil won by the same score.

Then came one of the great upsets in American soccer history. Jozy Altidore and Clint Dempsey got goals in 2-0 victory over Spain, ending streaks of 15 wins and 35 unbeaten games for the European champion.

"Obviously there's a lot of talk about this first game, but, you know, we've proved last year that it is about the three games, that really matters as a collective," defender Jay DeMerit said. "These next two games are probably even more important for us. If we can get points from those two games, then we'll probably be through."

Last June, the U.S. took a 2-0 halftime lead over Brazil in the Confederations Cup final only to lose 3-2. While players were disappointed, Saturday's match is far more significant. And back

home, more people are likely to be watching the U.S. team than in any game since at least the 1994 second-round World Cup loss to Brazil. That was at Stanford, Calif., when the Americans were the host.

"This game is about where the sport is in the U.S.," Gulati said. "It's water cooler talk. People are clearly talking about the U.S.-England game. You know, whether it's former students of mine that are writing to me or people that aren't normally involved in the game. They'll be doing it that day. They'll be doing it the next day. The question is what's happening on July 15? And so that's the opportunity we have. To get a whole bunch of people that might be casual observers, to get turned on by it, to get turned on by the hype."

"And I don't think there's any doubt that Americans are now more part of the World Cup and the international scene that they've been. And ticket buying and ratings will show that."

Donovan prefers to concentrate on the big picture.

"We have to be ready to react no matter what happens on Saturday," he said.

The 1950 win at Belo Horizonte, Brazil, on Joe Gaetjens' goal, was celebrated in the 2005 movie "The Game of Their Lives." Donovan didn't want to imagine what would happen if the U.S. wins again.

"I don't know who the hell would play me in a movie," he said. "I like Johnny Depp, though."

Accuser: Steelers QB had temper

Police release 50 recordings of statement

MILLEDGEVILLE, Ga. — The college student who accused Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger of sexually assaulting her said she didn't try to fight him off because he appeared to anger easily.

"I noticed throughout the night he kind of had like a

short temper, like he would get really, like, defensive," she told police

in her second interview with them on March 5, about 12 hours after she said the assault took place. She didn't elaborate further on what made her think the quarterback had a short temper.

The accuser's interview is among more than 50 audio and video recordings released Wednesday by the Georgia Bureau of Investigation. The prosecutor determined there wasn't enough evidence to warrant criminal charges after the investigation concluded, and he said the woman ultimately asked him not to prosecute the quarterback.

One of the new videos shows Roethlisberger smiling, giving people high-fives and pumping his fist at the club where the woman said she was assaulted.

The 20-year-old accuser was interviewed twice by police — the first time shortly after she made the accusation early March 5 in the small college town of Milledgeville, about 80 miles southeast of Atlanta. The second interview was about 12 hours later at the Milledgeville police station.

The woman sounded intoxicated when she spoke with Milledgeville officer Jason Lopez in the first interview. Her words were slurred and she even says at one point, "Obviously, I'm drunk." An audio recording of that interview was made.

During the first interview, she said she repeatedly told Roethlisberger, "I really don't think this is OK," but couldn't stop him from having sex with her in the bathroom of a bar.

"I don't know what I can do," she said. "I'm a little girl and he's a big boy."

The victim told police she is 5-foot-4 and weighs 145 pounds. Roethlisberger is listed at 6-5 and 241 pounds.

Lopez asked the woman if she knew of any reason why Roethlisberger would feel "it was OK to do this to you."

While the accuser acknowledged wearing an explicit name tag, which was left over from a friend's birthday party earlier in the night, she denied leading him on.

"I wasn't forward in any way," she said. "I wasn't like, 'Oh my gosh, have sex with me because you're an NFL superstar.' I really don't know why (it happened)."

Two BCS schools will lose basketball scholarships

Seven teams face penalties

INDIANAPOLIS — The NCAA's big boys have figured out how to beat up the little guys in the classroom, too.

Spend more money. The newest Academic Progress Rate, released Wednesday, showed seven of the 137 teams facing penalties come from BCS conferences and only two power conference schools — Colorado and Syracuse — were sanctioned in football, men's basketball or women's basketball. Both schools said they have already taken the scholarship losses and won't be affected next season.

And there's little doubt about the reasons for the disparity between big and small schools.

"It is clear resources make a difference and the schools that do have resources can make more timely adjustments," NCAA vice president Kevin Lennon said. "We clearly have examples of low-resource institutions that were very successful academically, it's not just money, but we're trying to help."

Assistance didn't come quickly enough for Portland State, which lost an appeal to avoid a postseason ban in men's basketball. Nine other schools, none from BCS conferences, all received waivers. A year ago, football teams at Jacksonville State and Tennessee-Chattanooga and the men's basketball team at Centenary were the first schools to be banned from postseason play because of sub-par academic scores.

The APR measures the classroom performance of every Division I team and this year's data was collected from 2005-06 through 2008-09. Syracuse and Colorado defied the trend.

Colorado was penalized one scholarship in men's basketball and four in football, while Syracuse lost two in men's basketball for falling below the NCAA's 925 outline. Officials at both schools said they took away the scholarships last season after academically ineligible players left school.

Syracuse was one of only four NCAA tournament teams from last season to get hit with a penalty. The others were Houston, Morgan State and UTEP Orange coach Jim Boeheim, the reigning national coach of the year, had an explanation for his team's

912 score.

"We had three students leave school early to pursue professional basketball careers last spring and that is difficult to overcome," he said. "We anticipate being back above the APR standard when the next report is compiled."

The APR is billed as a real-time academic measure of every Division I team. Each athlete receives one point per semester for remaining academically eligible and another point each semester for remaining at that school or graduating.

A mathematical formula is then used to calculate a final team score with 1,000 points being perfect. Teams falling below 925 can face conditional scholarship losses. Teams consistently falling below 900 can be penalized more harshly.

So when Jonny Flynn, Eric Devendorf, and Paul Harris all left for the NBA, Boeheim's team could have lost as much as six points.

Lennon and Walt Harrison, chairman of the Committee on Academic Performance, didn't buy it.

"I've learned a lot from Jim Boeheim. I understand his frustrations, but in the end, I'm not persuaded by his arguments," Harrison said.

A few top stars are absent due to injury, but England's Wayne Rooney is here, as is Portugal's Cristiano Ronaldo. Argentina has arguably the world's best player, Lionel Messi, and the most flamboyant coach, Diego Maradona.

Estimates vary as to how many foreign visitors will come — perhaps 350,000 or 400,000. When ticket sales lagged last month, organizers made more of them available to South Africans, and now nearly all have been purchased.

First-time visitors, if they venture beyond the hotels and stadiums, will see a land of dramatic contrasts: first-world luxury and infrastructure

coexisting with squalid shacks, a dazzlingly varied landscape of jagged mountains and unspoiled beaches, deserts and vineyards and wildlife preserves. There are 10 stadiums in nine cities across South Africa, with two of them — Soccer City and the long-established 62,500-seat Ellis Park — in Johannesburg.

Racial reconciliation remains a work in progress, yet is remarkable given the white minority's harsh oppression of blacks under apartheid's web of segregation policies.

The end of apartheid was no panacea for the nation's

many problems. More than 40 percent of South Africans live below the government-defined poverty line, a quarter of the work force is unemployed. The huge security force mobilized for the World Cup will have its hands full keeping visitors safe, restraining hooligans, monitoring possible terrorist threats and maintaining crowd control to prevent any stadium stampedes.

The government and private businesses spent huge sums renovating airports and building roads, transportation systems and stadiums. Traffic jams are expected, but a new high-speed train linking Johannesburg and its airport opened Tuesday, and a new bus line serves the downtown business district, Soccer City and Soweto.

Newspaper columnist Oupa Ngwenya of *The Sowetan*, a black-oriented daily, marveled in a column this week at how the projects were completed on time despite widespread doubt.

"Enjoy the games by laughing and doubting Thomases out of your lives," he wrote.

In an interview, Ngwenya said a successful World Cup could be a morale booster for the many South Africans struggling with poverty.

"People always talk about how we are part of the global village, but it's never been this close," he said. "You're feeling part of the world. The sense of anticipation is electric." k

while amassing a .989 slugging percentage. The ESPN RISE first-team All-American selection finished with a .549 career batting average including 25 home runs and 227 RBIs. Fagan also strung together a 59-game hitting streak, which ranks as the nation's third longest, after her sister Sami, one year her junior, eclipsed the mark in May.

But that's just her on-field prowess. This award is highly coveted for its three-pronged diamond-like features that include both character and academics.

"When we got the call (Wednesday) morning the guy that called from Gatorade told me that was the one thing that really stood out, was Kasey's character," said her father and head coach Kevin Fagan. "And that's what makes me most proud as a father is that people can see that. He told me that everyone they talked to just kept going back to Kasey's character. He said the things they were saying just blew him away. And that's what makes me feel great. Her mother and I are just so proud of her."

In addition to her high marks for character, Kasey more than got it done in the classroom maintaining a weighted 4.74 GPA and never received any grade lower than an "A" in her four years of high school. She is a member of the National Honor Society and the area's Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter. Fagan, who will attend the University of Florida this fall on a full athletic scholarship, even earned high praise from opposing coaches.

"Kasey Fagan is a stud. She's afraid of nothing," said Mark Griggs, head coach of the Wichita (Kan.) Mustangs Amateur Athletics Union club program that played against Fagan's Team North Florida at the Amateur Softball Association Nationals last summer. "She'll play in your face, hit for power, hit for average. As a third baseman, she's the real deal. If we punt on Team Florida, we're bunting away from her. She can really play."

Being recognized for the award is something Kasey admits means a lot to her. But she is quick to give credit to her parents who she feels have taught her, along with her brothers and sisters, several valuable life lessons.

"I can think of two right off the bat. The first one is to 'always be humble,'" Kasey said. "Bad things happen when you're not humble. It's good to let others talk about your accomplishments. If you're really that good, you don't need to talk about yourself. It means more coming from

others. "The second one is to have good work ethic," said the Dunnellon Class 4A state champion. "If you work hard at something, you will succeed. In Little League I was always the No. 3 pitcher on the team. I just kept working and it felt good when I got to that level where my coach wanted me to pitch the state championship game.

"There's no 'Easy Button' in life. If you want it, you have to go for it hard. The only way you'll ever attain real success is through hard work."

And that industriousness is seen in everything Fagan does. While playing softball and hitting the books are both things which Kasey takes very seriously, she also finds time to volunteer locally as a peer tutor and a Dunnellon Little League clinic instructor as well as in association with her First Methodist Church community. She even most recently served as a keynote speaker at a Mid-West Florida FCA fundraising event.

That public speaking experience will certainly come in handy tonight when Fagan addresses her graduating class as this year's salutatorian at Dunnellon High School. While she seemed completely unfazed as the Tigers starting pitcher in back-to-back title games, Fagan admits this is giving her a few butterflies. "I don't know what to say, honestly, I'm definitely a little bit nervous because I want to say the right thing," Kasey said. "These are my friends. I know I want to talk about our futures and college and doing the right thing when we get there, because we're definitely going to get bombarded with bad things and we need to stay the course."

Fagan said she got a chance at a dry run last week when she addressed a group of fifth graders. "I was nervous for that too but I figured if I just wore 4-inch heels that would make me like 6-3 and they would have to listen to me," the Gatorade award winner said with a laugh. "It worked. They definitely paid attention. The only problem is we're not allowed to wear heels in high school so I can't do that Thursday night."

Somehow there's little doubt that anyone will ignore this two-time softball state player of the year who this year led her team to what amounted to a national championship with their heart-stopping victory over Naples in the state championship game.

Avery Johnson to coach Nets

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Avery Johnson says he has agreed to become the coach of the New Jersey Nets, the NBA's worst team.

In a text message to The Associated Press on Wednesday, Johnson said he thinks the Nets will announce the deal Thursday.

Nets president and general manager Rod Thorn did not immediately respond when asked to comment on Johnson's text. In an earlier e-mail to the AP, he said he "will have something to say" Thursday.

The current ESPN analyst coached Dallas for three-plus seasons, going 194-70 in the regular season and 23-24 in the playoffs. He guided the Mavs to the NBA finals in 2006, but was fired after a first-round playoff series loss to New Orleans in 2008.

Johnson will take over a team that posted a league worst 12-70 record and set a league-record opening the season with 18 straight losses.

The miserable start led to the firing of coach Lawrence Frank after 16 games. Outgoing general manager Kiki Vandeweghe

served as the interim coach for the majority of the franchise's worst season and only the fifth 70-loss season in NBA history.

The Nets threatened to break the Philadelphia 76ers' league record for fewest wins in a season — nine — until a late run got them over the hump. The 76ers set the record in 1972-73.

Johnson is a proven winner, and his arrival in New Jersey will reunite him with point guard Devin Harris, who was shipped to New Jersey in the deal that sent Jason Kidd to the Mavericks.

Some of his ex-players and a former assistant coach — along with Michigan State fans — have been riveted to developments about a possible departure.

"I have mixed emotions," former Michigan State star Mateen Cleaves said. "Selfishly, I want him to stay at Michigan State because he's good for the school, the state and college basketball as a whole.

"But it's a great opportunity if LeBron comes back. There's the rub.

The Cavs may not want to wait until July, the earliest James could re-sign, to hire a coach.

Cavs owner Dan Gilbert said James will not be consulted during the coaching search, which began when he fired Mike Brown following the team's second straight early exit in the playoffs.

Cleveland general manager Chris Grant has confirmed that the team has been in contact with Izzo and other candidates, but declined further comment other than to say the team

didn't have a timetable. The team has also had contact with former New Orleans coach Byron Scott and Milwaukee assistant Kelvin Sampson.

James said in an interview last week Cleveland has "an edge" in re-signing him.

"Whether LeBron stays or not is the million dollar question, I'm sure, for Tom," said South Florida coach Stan Heath, one of five former Izzo assistants currently leading Division I teams. "I remember how much Tom wrestled with the opportunity the Atlanta Hawks gave him. But that wasn't a great situation like Cleveland has with a Michigan State guy as the owner and one of the top players in the game potentially on the team, so I can only imagine how hard he's thinking about this."

Like Cleaves, former Spartans Morris Peterson and Charlie Bell, who were also key players on the 2000 national championship, are struggling to envision Izzo leaving the school that has employed him for nearly three decades.

Unless he knows James would be one of his players. "It would take the best player in the world to get

Izzo away from Michigan State, where he is so rooted," said Peterson, who plays for the New Orleans Hornets. "I can't see Izzo going if LeBron doesn't stay. If you look at the college coaches who tried to break into the NBA and couldn't do it, they've been on bad teams.

"But still, I can't imagine him leaving. When you think of Michigan State, you think of Tom Izzo."

Michigan State pays Izzo more than \$3 million a season and has him under contract through 2016. He has to pay the school \$500,000 within 30 days of terminating his employment if he takes a job in pro or college basketball.

That wouldn't be much of a deterrent.

A person familiar with Cleveland's pursuit of Izzo told the AP on Tuesday that Gilbert and the coach have discussed terms of a possible contract that would pay Izzo up to \$6 million a year for four or five seasons. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the discussions were supposed to be confidential.

"That would be a lot of money to turn down," Bell said.

33 percent of all boating claims due to lightning strikes. Lightning kills or injures those in open boats — the highest structure in the area — because it is more likely to strike crewmembers when there is no mast.

There are several types of lightning strikes that determine the type of injury and necessity for medical treatment.

The types of strikes are direct, contact, side-splash and blunt injury.

Direct is lightning striking a person straight on. Contact strikes happen when a person touches an object that is struck such as a tree, rock, fishing pole or golf club.

Side-splash occurs when lightning jumps from the primary object struck to the person on its way to the ground. Blunt injury is the result of being thrown violently from the strike or from the explosive force nearby due to air being superheated and then rapidly cooled.

If you don't die on the spot from heart stoppage, known as cardiac arrest, you can even die several days later from an arrhythmia. A lightning strike has many other long term ramifications if a person survives.

A frequent consequence with cardiac arrest is irreversible brain damage. But the most immediate symptoms are severe persistent headaches, ringing in the ears, nausea, vomiting, dizziness and concussion-type symptoms.

A lightning-strike victim, often 'wakes up' and is unaware of their problems. They may have severe concentration problems as well

as personality disorders.

Often ear-drum ruptures are the cause of many symptoms.

High-voltage electrical injuries can cause severe internal tissue burns and damage. Lightning, however, usually does not cause severe burns. In fact, burns from lightning strikes are superficial and caused by other objects such as rainwater, sweat, metal coins and necklaces. These are heated, causing the burn rather than the lightning.

Back injuries result from spine compression fractures and disc protrusions when the body reacts to intense muscle contractions from the jolt that may throw a person several yards at the time of the injury. A fracture of an extremity occurs in this manner.

Pain syndromes result because the smaller nerve fibers that transmit pain are usually affected. These pain syndromes are difficult to diagnose, let alone treat. Specific to lightning injury is a temporary paralysis-'keraunoparalysis'. While usually temporary, hospital supportive care is usually best.

When the brain is affected, difficulty may arise with a person's short-term memory. He or she may have trouble organizing new information or recalling old information.

Personality alterations that commonly occur are associated with being easily distracted as well as severe irritability.

Seizures, a common consequence, originate in the deeper regions of the brain and are frequently missed on testing.

Some people may lose consciousness. Some may seem confused and not remember what happened. In others, no outward signs of

injury are apparent.

Lightning may even flash over the outside of a person, blow off their clothes, and leave few obvious signs of injury.

Any person suspected of being injured by lightning should be evaluated in an emergency room even if obvious injuries are not present.

Simple rules of prevention are easy to write about but difficult to follow in reality.

The best rule is if you hear thunder, you are in range of a lightning strike. Lightning travels 10-12 miles ahead of a storm.

Lightning strikes may happen while boating, fishing, golfing or playing baseball. Put down any golf club, fishing pole, tennis racket or baseball bat. Remove metal objects such as a baseball helmet. Do not touch anything metal.

In my humble opinion, park the boat, get off the wake board, stow the kayak paddle, duck and seek shelter.

Shelter is not under metal bleachers, in a golf cart, on a bicycle or motorcycle or in swimming pool.

In outdoor sports activity such as soccer, T-ball, fishing, water skiing or camping, adults are responsible for children in the face of lightning activity.

The simple safety slogan of the National Lightning Safety Institute. If you can hear it, clear it (stop your activities)."

In the worst case, use the "lightning crouch" by putting your feet together, squatting down, tucking your head and covering your ears. DO NOT LIE DOWN!

Angling for biggest Cobia

Local fisherman takes home top prize at tourney

HOMOSASSA — Nothing, not even the looming threat of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill disaster, could stop thousands of fishing enthusiasts from showing up at MacRae's Fishing Resort for the final weigh-in of the 26th annual Big Fish Cobia Tournament on Sunday.

"We have 195 boats and close to 800 anglers," Gator MacRae said. "They are catching fish and we've got

a tournament." Local angler Jerry McKinney took home the top prize in the cobia category with a 34.32-pound bruiser.

"That was the first cobia weighed in on Saturday," MacRae said about McKinney's winning fish.

McKinney didn't do it alone.

"We had a two-foot chop in eight foot of clean water and we were using live pinfish for bait," McKinney said.

When asked what other conditions he faced, McKinney jokingly replied, "I had my partners to contend with."

Bill Hartman and Randy Harbin were McKinney's boat mates. And the trio was glad local anglers finally took home the top prize.

"I grew up fishing here,"

McKinney said. "We support and give back to the local community. That's what it's all about."

Eddie Keller came in second place in the cobia division with a 25.82-pound fish while Robert Peralta took home third with a fish weighing 24.54. He just edged out David Snook, who weighed in a 24.20-pound cobia.

In other divisions, Don Chancey caught the largest grouper with a 15.74-pound fish while Michael Roberts took home the second-place prize money with a 13.10-pound grouper. In the trout division, Dennis Cisek edged out Darlene Flynn for the top prize with a 4.04-pound papermouth. Flynn's fish weighed 3.78 pounds.

All funds raised were not only distributed to anglers. Charitable organizations were also the beneficiaries of the tournament.

"We gave \$10,000 to charities last year, and we'll do it again this year," said tournament organizer Capt. Jeff Beeler of DayJammer Cruises. "We fund a scholarship at Central Florida College which started five years ago. We awarded it last year, and now it's perpetual."

MacRae explained the entry fee, however, has remained at \$125 for the past 26 years.

"You get a lot for that," he said. "This generates tremendous business for the locals and thousands of people are impacted. It's a great event."

Ease mind with safety checks

The weather isn't the only thing heating up around the Nature Coast.

Capt. Mike Byron reports clients Maryann and Richard Bing from New Jersey had a good time fishing out at the Bombing Range for grunts, sharks, the snapper, Spanish mackerel and trout. Byron said the trick was a chum block and free-lined shrimp.

Capt. William Toney also hit the Range with some of his clients, reporting good catches of trout there and at the Bird Rack. Water

depth is about 5 to 7 feet. Look for the hard reef, which will show up as yellow bottom.

Toney's been using the D.O.A. Deadly Combo, with a plastic shrimp about 2 feet below the large oval cork. The best colors have been new penny, glow and root beer.

Closer in, there are reports of good Spanish mackerel and silver trout around the Spoil Banks, with The Humps (located south of the Banks) as the hottest spot. Toney also suggests anchoring and using a chum block and live shrimp on a long-shank 1/0 hook to pull the fish closer. The long shank will keep sharp mackerel teeth away from your leader.

While snook are catch-and-release only until September because of heavy losses during last winter's freezes, they're still fun to catch. They are my favorite quarry, in fact.

Reports are snook are thick at every bait house dock from Crystal River to Chassahowitzka. Most of the snook caught have hit artificial baits intended for redfish, which means the snook are up in the mangroves. Work those shorelines with topwater lures such as the ima Skimmer, Epping Rex spoons, or the MirrOlure MirrOdine in chartreuse and white. High tide won't be until midday this weekend. So if you're out early, work docks, seawalls and other structure until there's enough water to get back into the mangroves.

The Ocala Gander Mountain store is having another of its popular fishing workshops either later this month or in early July. I'll let you know the date as soon as I have it.

In the meantime, check out a safety seminar the store is having this weekend. While the children admire the rescue truck on hand, you can get a free vessel safety check from the U.S. Coast Guard. The safety event will be Saturday with Ocala fire and rescue personnel answering questions.

While on the subject of safety, BoatUS is encouraging boaters to make a six-

point check before their next trip. Taking it a step farther, the group has links available on its website, www.boatus.com, with information on all items involved such as help selecting an anchor and a tutorial on VHF radio use. In no particular order, the six items are as follows:

- Life jackets. While most boaters know they must have one PFD aboard for every passenger, many don't realize inflatable vests do not count unless they are being worn. Unlike other vests, they don't count if depth is about 5 to 7 feet. (And how long has it been since you checked your inflatable vest?). The BoatUS site has a page with all the requirements.

- VHF radio. Although cell phone coverage has improved considerably in recent years, there are still places they don't work. They won't help you reach the people closest to you such as other boaters and anglers in the area. Radios can be had for less than \$100. Check out the VHF tutorial link on the BoatUS website.

- Anchors are an essential piece of equipment on vessels of any size, but do you have the right size and type? Even if you don't normally anchor while fishing, you don't want to be drifting helplessly while trying to solve a problem.

- Safety gear should be inventoried and reviewed from time to time to be sure you have not only the required equipment aboard, but optional items that might not apply to others. Be certain to brief guests as to the location of life vests and other safety devices and how to operation of the radio. You'll find a link to trip planning information on the Web site.

- Take advantage of that free safety check at Gander Mountain, or contact the local Power Squadron or Coast Guard auxiliary to schedule one. Even if you're sure you have what you need, it's reassuring to have an expert agree. You can also check at www.safetyseal.net to find an examiner near you or to take a virtual vessel safety check.

- Float plans will cut drastically into the time it takes help to arrive in the event it's needed. The BoatUS website has details on what the plan should include, and a sample float plan.

Nowhere is the old adage "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" more applicable than at sea.

Panel extends red snapper ban in Atlantic

Off-limits area extends from North Carolina to Florida Keys

ORLANDO — Fishermen will be prohibited indefinitely from catching red snapper in federal waters from North Carolina down to the Florida Keys under a measure passed by a federal fisheries management council Wednesday.

The ban passed 9-4 by the South Atlantic Fishery Management Council also prohibits the fishing of other snapper and grouper species in a nearly 5,000-square-mile zone off the coasts of Georgia and Florida.

Supporters of the ban

hope it will eventually restore the red snapper's population over the next three decades.

Opponents, though, doubt studies showing that the population is overfished and said Florida fishermen already have been squeezed by restrictions in the Gulf of Mexico due to the BP oil spill.

Wednesday's vote extends for an undetermined time an interim red snapper ban that was to expire in December.

Opponents said the council at least should have waited to pass the measure until December, when there

will be a new red snapper population count. The new survey will help the council determine how long the new ban should last. Terms of the new ban also could be tweaked once the new population survey is released, a scenario that creates uncertainty for fisherman who are now planning how to adjust.

"It's hard to have a business plan and decide how you're going to work, how you're going to make your boat payments, how you're going to make your house payments when the rules keep changing," said Charles Phillips, a seafood wholesaler from Georgia who also is a council member. "It's hard on everybody."

The ban prohibits fishing red snapper in an area of

the Atlantic stretching from North Carolina to Florida. Fishing other snapper-grouper species also would be banned in depths of 98 to 240 feet in a nearly 5,000-square-mile zone of ocean stretching from an area in Georgia about 15 miles north of Fernandina Beach down to around Melbourne.

Supporters of the ban said fishermen often catch red snapper accidentally in this area when fishing for the other species. Council members reduced the size of this zone by about 1,300-square-miles before the vote.

The ban will take effect later in the year after it is reviewed by the National Marine Fisheries Service and then U.S. Commerce Secretary Gary Locke.

— NASHVILLE, Tenn. The fans love Carrie Underwood and they proved it again during the CMT Music Awards. The former "American Idol" champ won Wednesday night's top honor, video of the year for "Cowboy Casanova," and CMT performance of the year for "Temporary Home" two months after making history by winning her second Academy of Country Music Awards entertainer of the year. Both awards are chosen by fans tuned into the live shows.

She was the night's only multiple winner.

"They were there before I had anything, an album, a record deal, a tour or anything like that," Underwood said after the show. "They built me from the ground up."

The CMT Awards, which are chosen exclusively by fan voting, were another salute to some of country music's top young stars. Lady Antebellum continued its scorching run by winning group video of the year for the trio's crossover hit "Need You Now" and Miranda Lambert taking female video of the year for "White Liar," her first No.1 song.

"Tonight's all about the fans," trio member Dave Haywood said after receiving the belt buckle trophy given to winners. "Thank you fans!"

Lambert followed up three wins at the ACM Awards with yet another win. She jumped up and pumped her fists as she made her way

through the crowd and shouted, "My first buckle! This rocks!" when she reached the stage.

Lambert's "White Liar" video features the red-hot singer ditching her dishonest husband-to-be at the altar for his cheating ways. It was the first time she put on a wedding dress. The second time will come when she weds fiance Blake Shelton.

"Let's just hope that my next wedding doesn't end up like that video," she told the crowd.

Keith Urban won male video of the year for "Til Summer Comes Around." After sending a shoutout to his wife, actress Nicole Kidman, who attended the awards, he turned serious and talked of the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

"I want to send my deepest love to all the families around the Gulf, who are going for an insane time right now," Urban said.

A few minutes later Urban lit up the stage with a scorching guitar duel with John Mayer as the two played "Hit The Ground Runnin'."

"John Mayer and Keith Urban making love on guitars," the show's host, Kid Rock, said.

It was one of the hottest performances in a night full of them.

The CMT Music Awards usually skew lighthearted and with the rowdy Kid Rock hosting, things quickly got interesting.

The good times started immediately when he was joined on stage by surprise guest Hank Williams Jr., who rarely attends awards shows,

Trace Adkins, Zac Brown, Jamey Johnson, Randy Houser, Martina McBride and Kellie Pickler for a medley of "Cowboy," "Bawitdaba" and "Good Ol' Boys."

Kid Rock called Williams, "My rockin' rebel father Bocephus," before saying: "Does anybody realize how hard it is to get Bocephus out of the house? I don't think you understand this. The party has just begun."

The surprises continued later when "Saturday Night Live" star Kenan Thompson showed up in a green dress and red wig doing his Reba McEntire impersonation. He sang a few lines of a Reba song, then was joined on stage by McEntire.

Kid Rock smoked a cigar on stage and told a few bawdy jokes, including one aimed at Lady A, "the hill-billy Fleetwood Mac."

"But I don't suspect they do drugs or sleep with each other," he said.

Lady A was one of four hot young acts who led all nominees with three apiece on the fan-voted awards show. Also nominated for three awards were Carrie Underwood, who took CMT performance of the year, Taylor Swift and Jason Aldean.

Indiana native recalls growing up Amish on 100-acre family farm

When Ada Miller Fox of Inverness was just a toddler, she rode in her parents' horse and buggy to visit friends and attend church services and always abided the daily rules of Amish life near the small town of Bristol in northern Indiana.

The oldest of five children with two brothers and two sisters, Fox began hard work on the family farm at age 5, just a year after her folks "went modern," as the Amish say, to the extent they decided to have a telephone, electricity and a tractor to make farming a bit easier

and more profitable.

Not abandoned was the strict adherence to Amish-style clothing, moral values and living off the land. Fox noted, "My father's suits were made by an Amish lady and my mother made a lot of the clothing."

"I drove that tractor when I was 5 years old," Fox recalls, saying her work was always very difficult: cutting wood for the heating stove,

daily field work and milking cows by hand, among other duties. "The hardest thing I remember was when we had to shuck corn in the field in the winter until my hands were about frozen."

"We did a lot of canning in those days. We would pack a picnic lunch and go to Michigan and pick cherries for canning. We also put up peas, beans, meats and many other foods," she said.

At her grandfather's Old Order Amish farm near Millersburg, they tapped maple trees for syrup.

Schooling was not easy, either: "If I didn't get my morning chores done, I missed the bus and couldn't go to school."

On their 100-acre farm, the Millers grew corn, soybeans and wheat, hay, vegetables and raised hogs, cows and chickens.

All of the good, healthy homegrown foods were compensation for the daily drudgery. Fox said she especially remembers her mother's fried tomato gravy and fried cornmeal mush, a staple in Pennsylvania Dutch homes. And, she said, "There

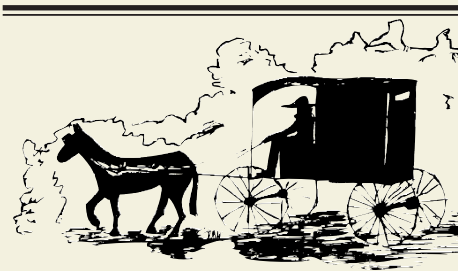

lacked attention and we all adored her, as did everyone in the church. It was almost dark before they quit playing basketball. I served ice cream to everyone outside. Jacob then left for home with some of the children having a small argument as to whose turn it was to carry Baby Marilyn out to the buggy.

Monday morning was nice and sunny so I decided to try to finish planting my garden. Little did I realize that God had other plans for my day. Sister Emma thought Baby Marilyn was sleeping a little later than usual so she went in to check on her. After several attempts to wake her, she went to a phone to call an ambulance. My neighbor lady took Emma and me to the hospital while Elizabeth stayed behind with the younger children and Jacob was called at work.

Emma and I arrived at the hospital to

Interview rekindles Hoosier lineage

It was a special treat to spend a couple of hours recently with Ada Fox in Inverness, talking about our homes in northern Indiana. We shared memories of many familiar names and places, as well as her recollections of growing up on an Amish farm. We discovered our mutual roots about a month ago.

She uses the term "Pennsylvania Dutch" quite often and it should be noted that early Amish and Mennonite settlers were not actually Dutch as some think. The word is simply a corruption of the word "Deutsch," which means "German," the principle ancestry of the plain people.

Our talk evoked so many wonderful memories of good, farm-raised food prepared by some of my family and our friends, who counted Amish and Mennonite in their backgrounds but eventually decided to go "English," the name often used for the non-Amish.

Anecdotes were plentiful, including past visits to such places as the small towns of Millersburg, Shipshewana and Nappanee, and the Das Dutchman Essenhaus buffet in Middlebury where the menu tempted diners with many authentic Amish and Mennonite dishes.

Here are a few favorites I recall from my Hoosier youth:

RIVEL SOUP

- 8 cups of chicken broth
- 1 onion, diced
- 2 tablespoons dried parsley
- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 2 cans corn
- 2 cups chicken, cooked and diced (optional)

Bring the broth, onion and parsley to a boil. In a bowl, mix flour, salt and eggs until it is a crumbly mixture. Rub mixture between your fingers over the broth, dropping small amounts into the broth. These are called rivels. They should be about pea size. Add corn and chicken and cook about 10 to 15 minutes.

APPLE STREUSEL CREAM PIE

- Pie shell, unbaked
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 cups finely chopped apples
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

AIRWAY HEIGHTS, Wash. — Want a drink with that stogie? Stick to cognac, bourbon and scotch, but avoid milk and soda.

And if you want to delve even deeper into the finer points of pairing cigars with drinks, consider attending one of the growing number of smoking symposiums popping up around the country.

During a recent

gathering at the Legends of Fire cigar bar here, for example, 100 people sampled a variety of cigars and spent the evening pairing them with different varieties of alcohol while noshing hors d'oeuvres. "Without the smoke,

it would look virtually identical to a wine tasting," said Gordon Mott, executive editor of Cigar Aficionado magazine, which began organizing similar gatherings during the early 1990s, but was not involved in this event.

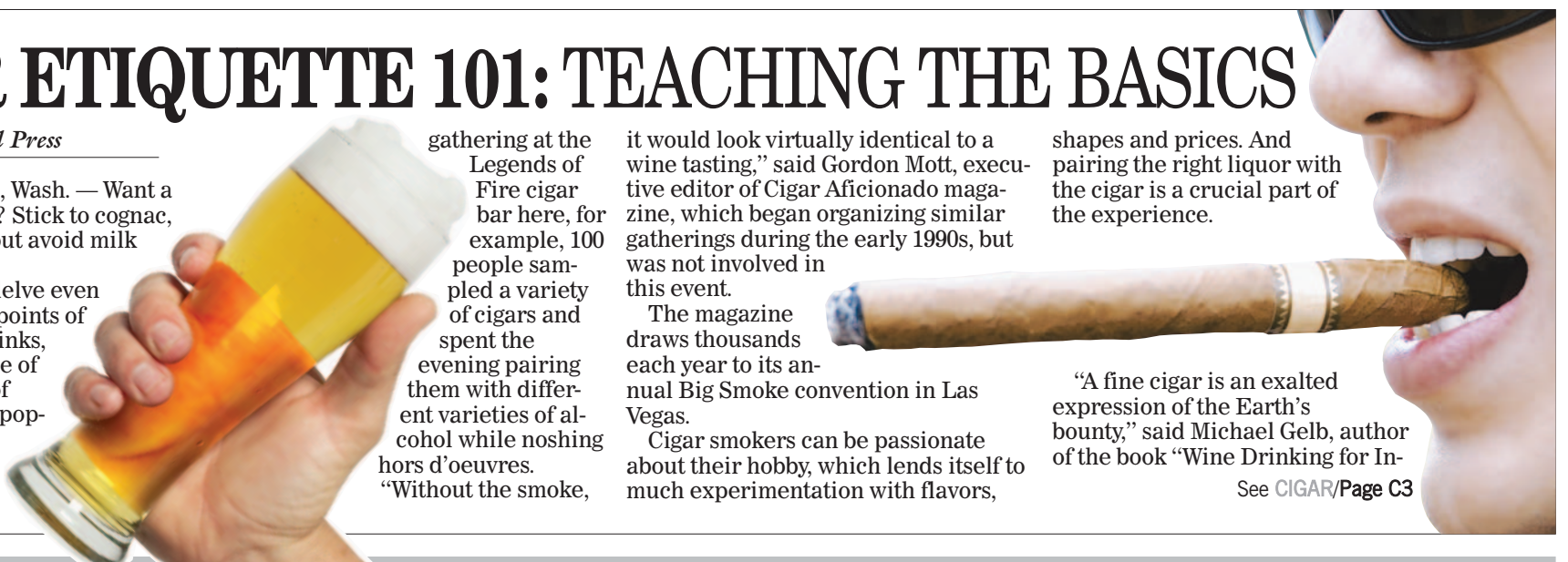
The magazine draws thousands each year to its annual Big Smoke convention in Las Vegas.

Cigar smokers can be passionate about their hobby, which lends itself to much experimentation with flavors,

shapes and prices. And pairing the right liquor with the cigar is a crucial part of the experience.

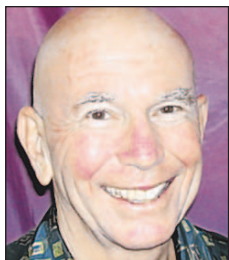
"A fine cigar is an exalted expression of the Earth's bounty," said Michael Gelb, author of the book "Wine Drinking for In-

Diet worthy of a toast

I promise you I am not making this up. Reading through some archived health stories, the prestigious British Medical Journal (Dec. 18 to 25, 2004) describes a groundbreaking diet for the prevention of heart disease dubbed the "Polymeal." It consists of fish, dark chocolate, almonds, fruits and vegetables, and garlic, all accompanied by a glass of — you guessed it — red wine.

It is reported these foods, eaten on a daily basis, plus fish at least four times a week, "significantly increases the life expectancy of people over 50 and reduces heart events by more than two-thirds."

If you happen to be a non-drinker and pass on wine, the impact of this regimen will be reduced by 10 percent. It seems men benefit the most. Those who followed the plan increased their total lifespan by some six and a half years compared with those not on the "Polymeal" diet. Heart diseases were delayed by some nine years compared to the general population. While women "would live about five years longer than women not eating it." And they kept heart disease at bay by eight years over their non-regimen sisters.

As an aside, it seems a team of scientists back in 2003 developed a kind of "Polypill" combining common medications used against different risk factors for heart disease. The pill they demonstrated reduced cardiovascular disease by more than 80 percent.

In the Netherlands a group of experimenters wanted to do the same thing without resorting to prescription medications. A panel led by Oscar Franco wanted to invent a non-pharmacological alternative. The news report went on to say: "Following the 'Polymeal' diet promises to be an effective (drug free), safe, and tasty means to reduce heart disease across the populations."

As Mel Allen used to say:

"How about that!"

You may ask about the negatives. It seems there are none reported so far. The researchers state, "No adverse effects ...except in people who are allergic to the components." They say further, "ingredients can be taken combined as a meal or individually at different times of the day." And go on to add, "the regime would be enhanced by specific recipes using the Polymeal ingredi-

ents." So knowing what we know now after reading the above, how about sitting down to a dinner of fresh grilled grouper or catfish or tilapia slathered in garlic butter sauce, along with tiny roast potatoes and fresh garden spinach, all washed down by two glasses of nice red wine? And for dessert, some nice dark chocolate-covered almonds.

Wines of the week: To accompany your fresh and yummy fish feasts, try recently sampled Blackstone 2008 Merlot (about \$10) with flavors of plum and black cherries, or try also Blackstone 2008 Zinfandel (about \$11) richly loaded with ripe berry fruits. For readers who prefer white wine, not to worry. Two really nice whites tasted recently are highly recommended. Benziger Family Winery Sauvignon Blanc 2009 is crisp and lush with overtones of ripe citrus fruits, while the equally pleasant chardonnay reminded me of true French Chablis with atypical minerality (think wet rocks), both at about \$15.

"The benefits of wine are many if taken in the proper amount as it keeps the body in a healthy condition and cures many illnesses." Maimonides, 1135-1200.

TOPPING

- 1/3 cup flour
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 cup butter

Combine sugar, flour and salt. Add sour cream, egg and vanilla and beat until smooth. Add chopped apples and pour into unbaked pie shell. For topping: Combine flour, sugar, cinnamon, and cut in butter until crumbly. Sprinkle over top of pie. Bake at 425 degrees for about 25 minutes.

PICKLED EGGS AND BEETS.

- 1 16-ounce can red beets
- 2 tablespoons pickling spice
- 1 medium onion (sliced into rings)
- 1 dozen hard-cooked eggs
- 2 cups vinegar
- 4 cups water

Put hard-cooked eggs in with rest of ingredients and refrigerate overnight so flavors can mingle.

were always lots of desserts, desserts every day."

Fox said she still enjoys many traditional Pennsylvania Dutch dishes and loves to dine out at Yoder's Restaurant in Sarasota, a landmark eatery owned by a Mennonite family. Due to multiple health problems, Fox said she doesn't cook at home as much these days, but did prepare a couple of typical desserts for this story: a tapioca and fruit pudding and a cherry angel food cake.

Her family helped build the Fairhaven Amish-Mennonite Church on U.S. 4 in Indiana, she said, after they "left the horse and buggy Amish church." Before acquiring the farm near Bristol, the family lived near Goshen in Elkhart County.

Fox had to quit school at the age of 15 to take care of her mother, who was in a coma for a long time after suffering a reaction to new medication. "After that, I did housework for people, worked at Murphy's Five and Dime in Goshen and gave all my earnings to my family until I was 20 years old," she said.

About that time in her young adult life, she said she met her husband, Paul, and they were married, causing much concern among her family members. "I was the first one in my family to leave the church," she explained, "though all but one of my sisters later left, too."

"Going fancy" when you've lived and looked Amish all of your life wasn't easy, Fox said, pointing out that adapting to new hairstyles and wearing makeup was totally foreign to the 20-year-old. "I just learned by watching people around me."

Paul Fox is Catholic and Ada eventually converted to his faith. She said she avoided the Amish practice of "shunning" the unfaithful by simply not visiting relatives who would have seated them apart from the rest of the family. She regularly visits her widowed mother who now resides in a care center in Indiana.

"Values and family ties" are things Fox said she is grateful for in her upbringing among the Amish and her husband concurs: "She is a good person. She doesn't know what 'no' means. She does anything for anyone. Her morals are the highest," he said, describing his wife.

Ada Fox has dealt with a number of health issues over the years, including knee replacements, two strokes and decades of painful fibromyalgia, some of which she attributes to her early childhood of hard work in all types of weather.

We know God doesn't make mistakes and he needed another angel in Heaven. We miss her so much that I cannot grasp the feeling Emma and Jacob must be having during this period.

Friends and our church families have been so supportive and helpful. The visitation was held at our house on May 25 and 26. A lot of people came to help clean and lots of food was brought in. Marilyn's funeral was held at our local community center and burial was at the local Amish cemetery.

In the days after Marilyn's passing, Emma and Steven

were coming here every day while her children were in school and Jacob went back to work. We busied ourselves preparing for church services to be at our house Sunday, June 6.

But misfortune struck again on Wednesday evening, June 2. The children were throwing a football back and forth when it hit my daughter Verena, 12, in the head. It knocked her off balance, causing her to fall and lose consciousness. We took her to the hospital and she was kept overnight.

After some tests, doctors said she had a bad brain concussion, so I stayed with her for the night. The next morning she was transferred to a bigger children's hospital. She was dismissed on Friday evening, June 4, but will have weeks and maybe months of recovery ahead.

She lost a lot of her memory and as of today she still cannot walk unassisted. Doc-

tors say we can expect a 100 percent recovery, but it looks like a long road ahead. She will need physical and occupational therapy.

Church services were here yesterday and it did stress her out more than I thought it would. We need your prayers and God bless you for your past support.

Break up cake in small pieces and place in a 9- X 13-inch baking dish. Make vanilla pudding according to directions and spread over cake pieces. Mix together whipped topping and sour cream and spread over vanilla pudding. Drizzle cherry pie filling over top of mixtures. Chill for 3 hours or longer.

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Bayless: A chorizo-chipotle burger

Celebrity chef Rick Bayless combines best of U.S., Mexico in dish

Editor's Note: Celebrate the delicious diversity of the great American hamburger. Each week for 20 weeks the AP will feature a new burger created by the biggest names in the food world. An interactive featuring the 20 burgers of summer showcasing photos, enticing recipes with downloadable pdfs and a history of the hamburger is available. The interactive will be updated weekly.

Rick Bayless' goal was simple — the best of Mexico and the U.S. in one delicious burger.

To get from dream to dinner plate, the man famous for showing Americans just how good — and even upscale — Mexican food can be, drew inspiration from queso fundido, an appetizer of melted cheese, onions, chilies and sometimes meat.

"I love cheeseburgers and I love Mexican queso fundido, so my concept was to bring the two things together," he said via e-mail. "My favorite queso fundido involves melted cheese with chorizo sausage, roasted poblano chilies and caramelized onions."

So Bayless — whose restaurants include Frontera Grill and Topolobampo in Chicago — decided to deconstruct the queso fundido a bit, adding the chorizo to the burger itself and using the melted cheese, roasted peppers and caramelized onions as toppings.

"For me, it needs to be grilled and

have a nice balance between bun and meat," said Bayless, who recently prepared President Barack Obama's second state dinner. "Too much of either isn't good, nor is too many add-ons. Balance is key, both in ingredients and flavors."

QUESO FUNDIDO BURGER

Start to finish: 45 minutes
Servings: 4

- 2 fresh medium poblano chilies
- 2 teaspoons canola or vegetable oil
- 1 medium yellow onion, sliced into 1/4-inch slices
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- Salt
- 1 1/2 pounds ground chuck
- 8 ounces chorizo, crumbled and cooked (browned in a skillet)
- 1 to 2 canned chipotle chilies in adobo, finely minced (seeded if desired)
- 8 thick slices Monterey Jack cheese
- 4 hamburger buns, lightly toasted

One at a time, use tongs to hold the chilies over a gas burner, turning until well charred, about 5 minutes. You also can set the chilies under a broiler for about 10 minutes, turning regularly. Place the chilies in a bowl, cover with a kitchen towel and let cool. Rub off the

blackened skin and pull out and discard the stems and seed pods. Cut the chilies into 1/4-inch strips.

In a medium skillet over medium, heat the oil. Add the onion and saute until it begins to brown, 7 to 8 minutes. Stir in the garlic and poblanos and cook for 2 minutes. Season with salt, usually about 1/2 teaspoon. Transfer the mixture to a bowl and cover to keep warm.

In a large bowl, combine the ground chuck, cooked chorizo, chipotles and 1 1/2 teaspoons of salt. Mix until well combined. Divide the mixture into 4 equal portions and form into patties.

Heat a gas grill to medium-high, or light a charcoal fire and let it burn until the charcoal is covered with white ash (about medium hot); bank the coals to one side.

Place the hamburger patties on the grill and cook for a total of 4 to 5 minutes for medium rare. Lay one piece of cheese on top of each burger, top with the warm onions and chilies, then another piece of cheese. Close the lid of the grill and continue cooking until the cheese has melted, about 1 minute. Remove from the grill and slide onto a toasted bun.

Report: FDA struggles to keep food safe

Independent group critical of gov't agency

WASHINGTON — A new report says the Food and Drug Administration is stretched thin and needs to reorganize to better keep the nation's food safe.

The report released by the Institute of Medicine and the National Research Council Tuesday says the agency needs to be-

come more efficient and better target its limited dollars to prevent foodborne illness outbreaks. The 500-page report says the FDA lacks the vision necessary to protect consumers.

Robert Wallace, chairman of the committee that authored the report, said the FDA is too often reactive and not focused enough on prevention. The report recommends the agency focus on preventing outbreaks in the riskiest foods rather than tackling problems on a case-by-case basis.

"As recent illnesses traced to produce underscore, foodborne diseases cause significant suffering, so it's imperative that our food safety system functions effectively at all levels," said Wallace, who is a professor at the University of Iowa's College of Public Health.

Many of the report's recommendations would be met under food safety legislation passed by the House last year. That includes giving the agency greater authority in many areas, such as the ability to force a company to recall a tainted product. Under current law, the agency must negotiate with businesses when they believe a recall is necessary.

Senate leaders have said they hope to consider a similar bill this summer. Food safety advocates have been pushing the legislation for the last year as outbreaks in peanuts and raw cookie dough sickened many last year and the recent discovery of salmo-

nella in alfalfa sprouts and E. coli in lettuce have caused new illnesses.

FDA commissioner Margaret Hamburg said in a statement that the agency is still reviewing the report, but noted the FDA is engaged in a "long-term, strategic transformation of our foods program," including the newly-created position of a deputy commissioner for foods.

"The report clearly highlights the need for enactment of pending legislation that provides much needed authorities and resources to assist in our efforts to ensure the safety of our nation's food supply," she said.

The FDA is responsible for ensuring the safety of about 80 percent of the nation's food supply, including seafood, dairy products and fruits and vegetables. It is responsible for more than 150,000 food facilities, more than a million restaurants and food establishments and more than two million farms, according to the report.

The Agriculture Department oversees the safety of meat, poultry and some egg products. At least 15 government agencies have a hand in making sure food is safe under at least 30 different laws, some of which date back to the early 1900s.

The report recommends that the government improve coordination with state food safety agencies and move toward creating a single food safety agency to combine all of those efforts. In the meantime, the committee recommended a centralized, independent "risk-based analysis and data management center" free from political forces that could conduct rapid assessments of food safety risks and make policy recommendations.

The Institute of Medicine and the National Research Council are part of the National Academies, an independent organization chartered by Congress to advise the government on scientific matters. They were directed by Congress in 2008 to study gaps in the FDA's food safety system.

spired Thinking."

Cigars tend to overwhelm most wines. Fortified varieties, such as ports, usually can stand up to cigars, Gelb said. And if you don't do alcohol, espresso and hot cocoa work well.

"This is a question of individual taste, but most individuals prefer cognac, armagnac, Port, bourbon, scotch or fine aged rum," he said.

"It's best to match the quality of the libation with the quality of the cigar," Gelb said. "You don't want to sully your 60-year-old armagnac with a cheap stogie and you wouldn't insult your Cohiba Esplendido by pairing it with firewater."

Things to avoid? Don't mix a cigar with milk, eggnog, gin, soda, cranberry or grapefruit juice, Gelb said.

As for eating, it may be best to hold off on the cigar until after, Gelb said.

"No one has yet, to my
