## County: Message received!

### Following outcry, commissioners abruptly flush proposal to explore privatizing utilities

Commissioner Winn Webb still thought the idea was a good one. But the citizens disagreed, so Webb exchanged his view for theirs.

Led by Webb's change of mind, the Citrus County Commission voted 3-2 Tuesday to stop any movement toward turning over water and sewer operations to a private company.

"It's not my job as an elected official to jam anything down the people's throats,"

Webb said to cheers from about 80 residents in the commission meeting room.

The board met to hear proposals from three companies interested in taking over operation and maintenance of the county's utilities system.

The idea, officials said, was to select one firm that would then compete with the county's own utilities department. Commissioners then would decide in November or December whether to privatize or keep the entire operation in county hands. Three firms were ready for their pre-

sentations, but it never got that far.

Commissioner Dennis Damato and Chairman Gary Bartell were already opposed to privatizing any segments of the utility services.

Commissioner Joe Meek said he wanted to hear the proposals to see if the county operation was the most efficient.

"Competition is a good thing," Meek said. "We're doing what I think is the most responsible thing."

## Boat safely this weekend

### Lawmen to have eyes on for Labor Day

Come Friday, Citrus County waterways will be filled with recreational boaters celebrating the Labor Day weekend.

But with increased traffic comes increased potential for accidents, both alcohol-related and non-alcohol-related.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission officers will start Labor Day weekend patrols on Citrus County waters at 6 p.m. Friday, according to FWC spokeswoman Karen Parker.

Officials hope to avoid boating-related accidents over the holiday weekend and will be watching to make sure boaters adhere to safety regulations and for boaters operating under the influence.

Officers will also be checking for fishing violations and underage drinking, as well as enforcing the manatee zones and limited-access areas, according to Parker.

The U.S. Coast Guard will patrol along the coast and the Citrus County Sheriff's Office will enforce laws on navigable waterways throughout the county.

"In these busier holiday weekends, there is going to be some increased traffic out there, so there are going to be some increased patrols from us," said Petty Officer Robert Simpson, U.S. Coast Guard spokesman.

Simpson said the penalties for boating under the influence are the same as those for driving under the influence. Authorities arrest violators and can impound boats.

"It's just as dangerous, if not more dangerous, as driving a

## Obama: 'Turn the page'

### President says Iraq war finished

WASHINGTON — Claiming no victory, President Barack Obama formally ended the U.S. combat role in Iraq after seven long years of bloodshed, declaring firmly Tuesday night: "It is time to turn the page." Now, he said, the nation's most urgent priority must be fixing its own sickly economy.

From the Oval Office, where George W. Bush first announced the invasion that would come to define his presidency, Obama addressed millions who were divided over the war in his country and around the world. Fiercely opposed to the war from the start, he said the United States "has paid a huge price" to give Iraqis the chance to shape their future — a price that now includes more than 4,400 dead, tens of thousands of troops wounded and hundreds of billions of dollars spent since March 2003.

In a telling sign of the domestic troubles weighing on the United States and his own presidency, Obama turned much of the emphasis in a major war address to the dire state of U.S. joblessness.

In his remarks of slightly less than 20 minutes, only his second address from the Oval Office, Obama looked directly into the TV camera, hands clasped in front of him on his desk, family photos and the U.S. and presidential flags behind him.

## Council mulls taking back redevelopment duties

### Members unhappy with cost of separate agency

Crystal River Council members are poised to do away with the Community Redevelopment Agency structure that they say focuses too much attention on administration and not enough on projects.

The council voted 5-0 Monday night to consider at its next meeting a resolution that would dissolve the CRA board and turn the entire structure over to the city council and city manager.

Councilman Phil Price said the CRA receives \$475,000 annually in tax money and spends about \$100,000 on administrative costs.

He suggested City Manager Andy Houston could hire an assistant to oversee CRA activities at half that cost.

Council members routinely complain about what they view as the lack of progress by the CRA board and its director, Michelle Evans.

"I'm discouraged it hasn't been very effective," Price said. "We are responsible for these monies. Those are tax monies."

Councilwoman Maureen McNiff said she attended a recent meeting where most of the discussion time centered on Evans' salary.

Councilwoman Paula Wheeler said the CRA, by charter, ends in seven years. She said she does not want to spend \$700,000 in administrative costs during that time.

"That \$700,000 to me is an enor-

# Trial begins in Inverness

## Man facing charge of sexual battery

Eyes fixed on the jury, an Inverness woman recalled the dreadful feeling that overcame her when she said her 4-year-old son revealed he had been sexually abused.

"It just didn't sound right," she said from the witness stand.

She asked her son to say it again. He repeated himself.

"I was upset," she said. "I didn't understand why this was happening. I didn't know what to do."

The trial of a 30-year-old Inverness man charged with sexual battery on a child under the age of 12 began Tuesday with the state presenting its case.

The morning began with a Williams Rule hearing, which allows evidence about a person's other offenses to be introduced into court.

During the morning's testimony, it was revealed that Jeramie Eichhorn was investigated in 2005 for a similar incident involving a 4-year-

old Lutz boy, but the case was dismissed after it was determined the boy was giving inconsistent statements. Judge Richard "Ric" Howard ruled the now-10-year-old boy's testimony along with his mother's testimony was admissible in court.

Assistant State Attorney Brian Trehy told the jury they would hear a case about a now-5-year-old who lived with Eichhorn near the end of 2008. Trehy explained the details of the case and stated the boy would testify as to what happened between him and Eichhorn.

"He's going to tell you what happened. He's going to tell you the truth," Trehy said.

He also informed the jury they would hear from another boy who also endured sexual abuse at the hands of Eichhorn under similar circumstances.

However, Eichhorn's attorney, Mark Rodriguez, said all these allegations arose from disputes and are just attempts to exact revenge on Eichhorn. Rodriguez explained

the state has to prove its case beyond a reasonable doubt.

"There's plenty of room for doubt," he said.

The mother and father of the 5-year-old testified as to the events that landed their son, and also their daughter, in Eichhorn's home. The mother stated she was caring for her child when she was arrested and placed in jail for a period of time between April and December of 2008. During that time, the father told the court he couldn't care for his son so he asked his best friend, Eichhorn, to take his son into his home.

Then one day, after she was released from jail and had taken back custody of her son, the mother said she was brushing her teeth in the bathroom when her son mentioned that Eichhorn had performed a sex act on him.

The *Chronicle* is withholding details about the incident because of its graphic nature.

Once making sure she had heard her son correctly, the mother said she called her son's father to come talk to him. The father, during his testimony, confirmed that his son did disclose sexual abuse to him, so the next day he confronted Eich-

horn about it.

"He said he didn't do it," he said.

He went to the police to report what his son told him. However, Rodriguez asked if either one of the parents had an argument with Eichhorn's girlfriend about her claiming their children on her tax return. Both denied there was ever an issue. Rodriguez also asked the father if he remembered telling law enforcement that his son sometimes confuses reality with make-believe. The father said he didn't remember saying that.

The 5-year-old also took the stand and explained to the jury how Eichhorn reportedly took him from his bedroom where he was sleeping and sexually assaulted him in a bathroom in Eichhorn's home.

When asked by Rodriguez if his parents talked to him about what to say today, the boy replied yes. However, Trehy asked the boy if they told him what words to say and he said no.

Testimony from a Lutz woman was also heard. She testified about the period of time she lived with Eichhorn and his girlfriend in 2005. After feeling like Eichhorn didn't want her in his home anymore, the woman said she began

packing up to leave. While packing, the woman said her son told her about sexual batteries that had occurred involving Eichhorn.

"I was really upset," the woman said.

The 10-year-old also testified that Eichhorn sexually assaulted him and described to the jury what happened.

Rodriguez, however, pointed out to the jury how the boy's case was dismissed in 2005 because he kept giving conflicting statements. Even on Tuesday, Rodriguez alluded to the fact that the boy was giving different statements to the jury in the afternoon than what he said early in the morning.

Rodriguez asked the woman if she was asked to leave Eichhorn's home because her son exposed himself to another young girl who was living in the house. Though aware of the incident, the woman said that was not why she left. Rodriguez also asked the boy if he recalled telling authorities back in 2005 that Eichhorn never touched him. The boy said he didn't remember.

The trial is expected to resume Wednesday morning with witnesses for the defense.

## Worker in hospital following incident

### Subcontractor injured at Progress plant

A man working at a Progress Energy facility was hospitalized Tuesday after suffering electrical burns on the company's property on Power Line Street in Crystal River.

The man, whose name was not immediately released, works for SGT, a company that contracts with Progress Energy, said Mike Hughes, Progress Energy spokesman. The man was in a concrete batch plant where concrete is produced for repairs to the containment structure at the nuclear plant in Crystal River.

An electrical arc flash occurred in an electrical panel near the concrete equipment, according to Hughes, and resulted in the worker's injuries. He was taken by helicopter to a hospital in Gainesville.

"Our thoughts and prayers are with him," Hughes said.

The concrete batch plant is not in an enclosed building and it was not clear how many people were nearby when the arc flash happened.

Citrus County Fire Rescue responded with six fire vehicles, but there was no fire when the first unit arrived, said county spokesman Jim Hunter.

Progress Energy is conducting an internal investigation into the incident, according to Hughes.

### Brooksville

#### Man convicted of murdering couple

A man has been convicted of killing an elderly Hernando County couple during a 2006 robbery. A jury convicted 35-year-old Robert Jardin Tuesday of two counts of first-degree murder, one count of robbery, one count of burglary of an occupied dwelling and one count

of grand theft.

Authorities say 84-year-old Patrick DePalma and 79-year-old Evelyn DePalma were found dead in their Masaryk-town home in October 2006. Investigators had no immediate leads, but some of their belongings were found in Jardin's possession in 2008.

The same jury that convicted Jardin of murder will reconvene Wednesday to recommend life in prison or the death penalty.

### Orlando

#### Ban on homeless feedings put on hold

A federal appeals court says the city of Orlando can't enforce its ban on groups feeding the homeless in public parks for the time being.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta said Tuesday that the ban can't be enforced until the court rehears an

appeal on the matter.

The rehearing will be before the full court's 10 members.

### Tallahassee

#### Chiles to drop out of governor's race

Independent candidate for governor Bud Chiles plans to drop out of the governor's race this week, sources said Tuesday. Chiles, who met with Dem-

ocratic candidate Alex Sink this week, was polling more than 10 percent in a three-way race with Sink and Republican Rick Scott, and several Democrats had said they feared he would essentially hand the race to Scott.

Even as he turns control of the war over to the Iraqis — and tries to cap one of the most divisive chapters in recent American history — Obama is escalating the conflict in Afghanistan. He said that winding down Iraq would allow the United States “to apply the resources necessary to go on offense” in Afghanistan, now the nation’s longest war since Vietnam.

In Iraq, for all the finality of Obama’s remarks, the war is not over. More Americans are likely to die. The country is plagued by violence and political instability, and Iraqis struggle with constant shortages of elec-

tricity and water. Obama is keeping up to 50,000 troops in Iraq for support and counterterrorism training, and the last forces are not due to leave until the end of 2011 at the latest.

As the commander in chief over a war he opposed, Obama took pains to thank troops for their sacrifice but made clear he saw the day as more the marking of a mistake ended than a mission accomplished. He spoke of strained relations with allies, anger at home and the heaviest of wartime tolls.

“We have met our responsibility,” Obama said. “Now it is time to turn the page.”

To underscore his point, Obama said he had telephoned Bush, whom he had taunted so often in the 2008

campaign, and he prominently praised the former Republican president in the heart of his speech.

“It’s well known that he and I disagreed about the war from its outset,” Obama said. “Yet no one could doubt President Bush’s support for our troops, or his love of country and commitment to our security.”

In a post-Sept. 11, 2001, world, the Iraq war began with bipartisan congressional backing — based on what turned out to be flawed intelligence — over what Bush called a “grave danger” to the world posed by Saddam Hussein.

Now, Iraq is in political turmoil, its leaders unable to form a new government long after March elections that left no clear winner. The uncertainty has left an opening

for insurgents to pound Iraqi security forces, hardly the conditions the U.S. envisioned for this transition deadline, which Obama announced 18 months ago.

Obama pressed Iraq’s leaders anew, saying it was time to show urgency and be accountable.

Obama sought both to as-

sure his own nation that the war was finally winding down and yet also promise Iraq and those watching across the Middle East that the U.S. was not simply walking away.

“Our combat mission is ending,” he said, “but our commitment to Iraq’s future is not.”

car under the influence,” he said.

Sheriff’s Office Community Resource Officer Andy Cox said the number of Labor Day boating accidents varies from year to year.

“There will be years we have little or no accidents

and there will be years we have multiple accidents,” depending on the weather and other factors, he said.

So far this year, the number of boating fatalities is slightly up from previous years, Parker said. There have been 50 fatalities statewide and one in Citrus County. By this time last year, there had been 45 boating fatalities.

The Citrus County fatality happened on April 17 when

25-year-old Carla Faul of Crystal River fell off the bow of a pontoon boat that was traveling five to 10 miles per hour on the Withlacoochee River, according to Parker. The vessel’s propeller struck Faul and she was pronounced dead at the scene.

Customers of the county system, however, said they feared higher rates and poor customer service if the systems were taken from county control.

Webb then suggested delaying discussion on the issue until mid-November when new commissioners take office. Voters booted both Bartell and Commissioner John Thrumston from office in the Aug. 24 primary; their replacements will be voted in on Nov. 2.

Damato supported that idea.

“I think we need to go ahead and take a deep breath,” he said. “People don’t want us to move forward at this time.”

Thrumston, however, was incredulous that the board delay any vote until after new commissioners come on board.

“If this motion passes, I’ll be very disappointed,” he said. “We get paid until the third week of November to do our jobs.”

Meek said he didn’t see the harm in selecting a company to continue the process.

“I don’t understand the fear of looking at options,” he said.

The county serves about 21,400 water and sewer customers.

Several crowded the board chambers to urge commissioners to keep the system intact.

“I think there’s total confusion what is being privatized,” Henry Locke, of Meadowcrest, said.

Millie Sloan, who lives in Citrus Springs, said her neighbors either didn’t know about the potential outsourcing of utility services or they are against it.

“We’re satisfied with the system the way it is,” she said.

Residents said delaying a vote until after new commissioners take office would not change their minds.

“We do not want this,” Theodora Rusnak, president of the Citrus County Council, said. “We know what is going on and we do not want it.”

Al Grubman, who lives in Inverness, added: “I’m really not in favor of postponement. I’m in favor of killing it.”

Patricia Wade of Inverness said a delay would only make things worse.

“Put us out of our agony,” she told commissioners.

After hearing from residents, Webb changed his motion to stop the process

entirely.

Bartell and Damato voted with Webb’s motion. Meek and Thrumston voted against it.

“I don’t philosophically agree with it,” Webb said, “but this is what the people want.”

County officials are considering relocating offices of the clerk, property appraiser, tax collector and supervisor of elections from the Crystal River Shopping Center on U.S. 19 to a larger building in Meadowcrest.

City Manager Andy Houston said the county is completing its appraisal of the Meadowcrest facility.

Houston suggested that the council develop a proposal for county officials to consider. The proposal could include using community redevelopment district funding to buy land and build offices.

Councilwoman Maureen McNiff suggested city residents pressure county commissioners to keep west Citrus government offices in the city. Council members did not finalize a workshop date but said they wanted to have it soon.

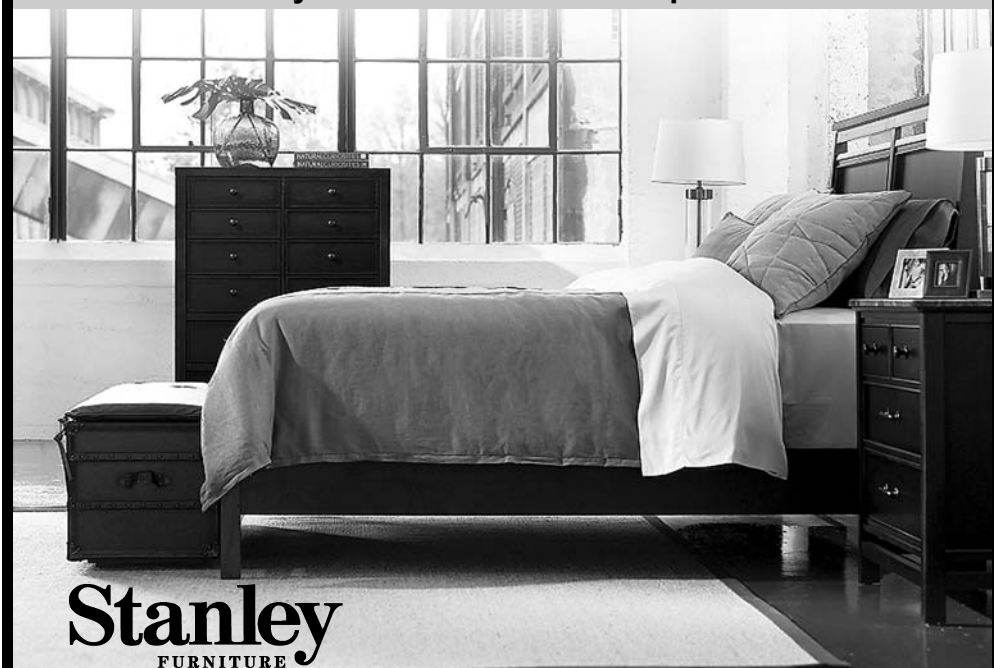
In other business Monday:  
 ■ The council voted 4-1 to sue the owners of Crystal River Village to collect past due utility charges. McNiff voted no.

■ Houston reported that he contacted the Southwest Florida Water Management District about the city donating Yeomans Park for a stormwater runoff area. Houston said the district is considering the offer. The city permanently closed the park earlier this month because of lack of use.

■ Councilman Phil Price offered to conduct a feasibility study to determine if King’s Bay could be dredged to improve water quality.

Dishonorable discharges

We all support our troops, but are we aware that the military is saving money by releasing combat soldiers with "personality disorder" discharges, a decision that denies them disability benefits?

In July 2007, Barack Obama, then a senator, teamed with a Republican in the House to forward a bill halting PD discharges.

The bill was watered down to an amendment requiring the Pentagon to investigate PD dismissals and signed by President Bush in January 2008. Republican Kit Bond of Missouri says the impact was zero and, along with Democrat Barbara Boxer, has been fighting to end the PD discharges.

Joshua Kors, writing in The Nation, cites the plight of Chuck Luther, a sergeant wounded by an IED in Iraq. He was declared mentally ill and coerced into signing paperwork leading to the PD discharge. The officer expediting the procedure said he heard from a commander that Luther's family revealed he had suffered from psychiatric problems before the military and had been treated with medication. But Luther's wife and mother say they never spoke with an Army commander and Sgt. Luther had no psychiatric problems before entering the military. Soldiers who could have vouched for Luther's stability and leadership say they were never asked. One said Luther saved his life.

The Fort Hood discharge specialist told Luther he owed the Army \$1,500, and if he didn't pay they would garnish his wages

and assess interest on the debt.

VA doctors cited traumatic brain damage and PTSD and declared Luther 80 percent disabled, but couldn't alter the Army discharge.

With his health improving, Luther began working with Disposable Warriors, an organization assisting soldiers fighting their discharges. He had a threatening note on his windshield and the home of a fellow organizer was invaded, taking only files of soldiers.

So much for supporting our troops.

Even after two life-threatening visits to hospitals, he refused to quit until his lungs finally did. I miss him and I worry a bit about every one who smokes, and particularly those who feel it will not make a difference in their life and/or the lives of those they say they love.

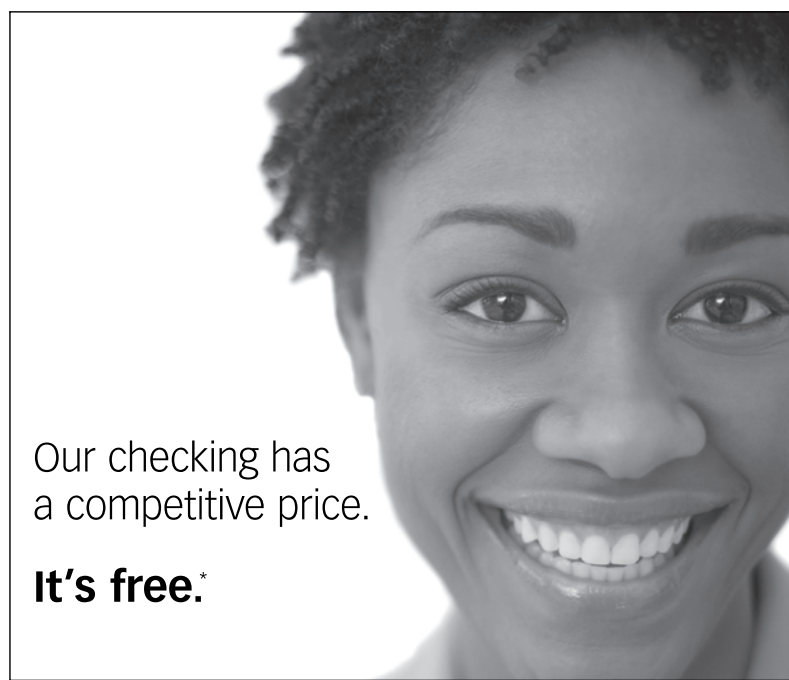

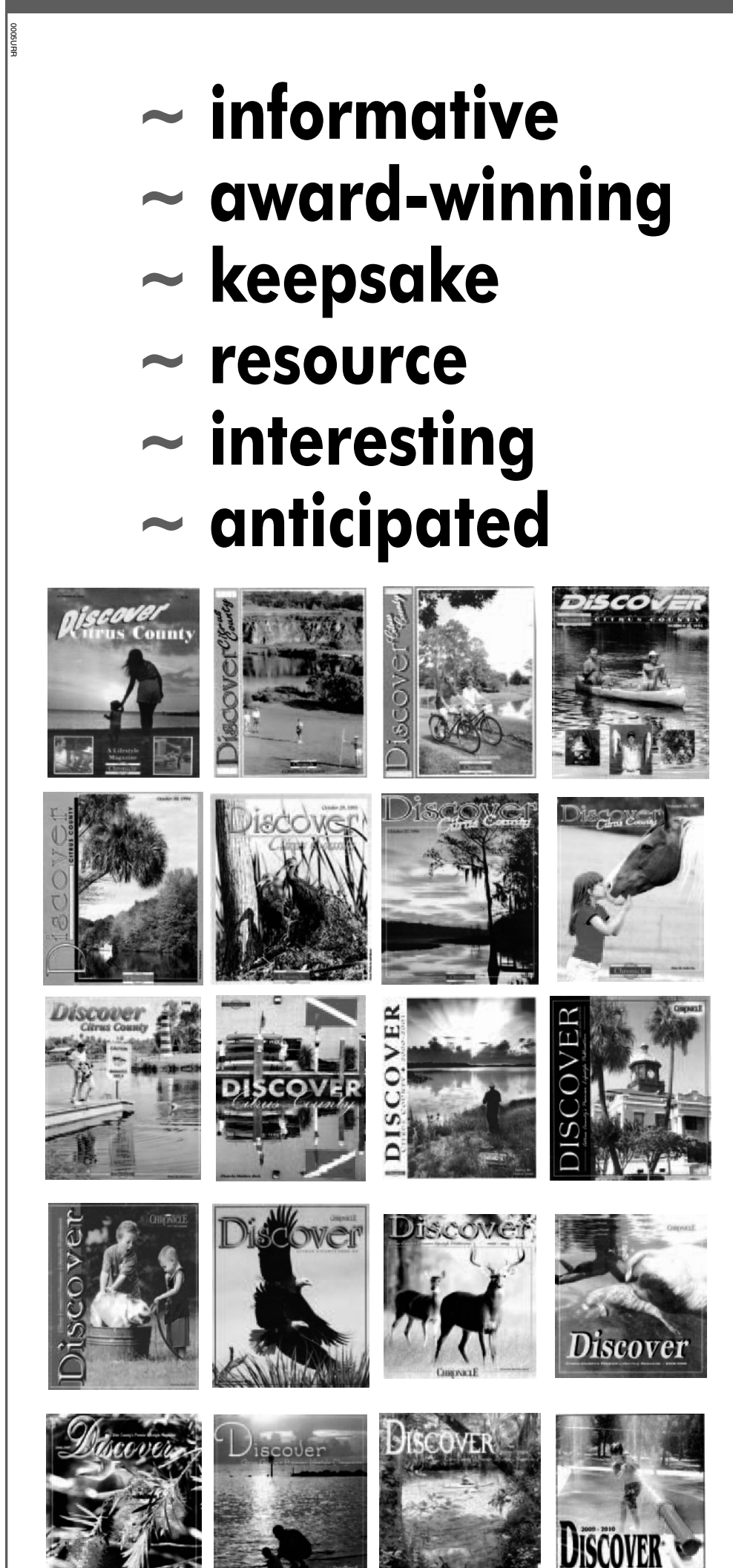

Stocks end a brutal August with meager gains

NEW YORK — The stock market ended its worst August since 2001 with meager gains Tuesday after minutes from the latest Federal Reserve meeting showed officials' increasing concern about the economy.

Market watch

"People are thinking maybe we need more of a downturn before the Fed will jump in," Cook said. Unlike traders, he said, "the Fed moves like a glacier."

The Dow rose 4.99, or 0.05 percent, to close at 10,014.72.

Broader indexes were mixed. The Standard & Poor's 500 index edged up 0.41, or 0.04 percent, to 1,049.33. The Nasdaq composite index fell 5.94, or 0.3 percent, to 2,114.03.

Other market indicators also had dismal performances in August, having surged ahead in July on a series of strong earnings reports.

Rising stocks outpaced falling ones by about 4 to 3 on the New York Stock Exchange, where consolidated volume was low at 4.5 billion shares.

Volume has been very light in recent days, which can exaggerate movements in the market.

"The low volume (is a sign) there's not a lot of belief on either side," said John Merrill, chief investment officer at Tanglewood Wealth Management.

Treasury prices rose, sending their yields lower, as cautious investors put money back into bonds.

The Dow Jones industrial average ended with a gain of 5 points, having been up 64 following a reading on consumer confidence in August that came in stronger than expected. Stocks fell sharply for much of August after a series of reports suggested that the recovery has weakened.

The S&P 500, the measure used most by stock market professionals, finished August with a loss of 4.7 percent. It was the S&P 500's worst showing for the month since August 2001, when it lost 6.4 percent as the dot-com bubble collapsed.

Some traders said there was disappointment that the Fed wasn't pessimistic enough to consider quicker steps to stimulate that economy.

Dan Cook, senior market analyst with the brokerage firm IG Markets, said the minutes gave a picture of a cautious and conservative Fed. While officials acknowledged the economy's problems, they chose to take only small, initial steps.

Traders who have hoped the Fed would be more aggressive to stimulate the economy soon aren't so sure now that the central bank will act.

## Tampa Bay trims roster to 75 players

TAMPA — Derrick Ward's unproductive stint with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers is over.

The seventh-year running back was released Tuesday when the team trimmed the roster to 75 players. Receiver Terrence Nunn was waived, and linebacker Jon Alston was placed on injured reserve to get down to the limit for the final preseason game.

"Just like any other profession, when it's time for you to depart ... you can't say it's a surprise," Bucs coach Raheem Morris said.

"You've got every day to go out there and prove yourself."

Ward signed a four-year, \$17 million contract as an unrestricted free agent in 2009, moving to Tampa Bay after five seasons with the New York Giants. He was a 1,000-yard rusher two years ago with the Giants, but struggled to make the transition to a new offense.

In a limited role as a backup to a revitalized Cadillac Williams, who was coming off major knee surgery, Ward rushed for 409 yards and one touchdown while averaging just 3.6

yards per carry in 2009. He was even less productive in three preseason games this year, gaining 2.6 yards per attempt and finishing with 21 carries for 50 yards.

Morris said the decision was just as much about the "resurgence" of Williams, the performance of young backs such as Kareem Huggins, and the versatility of fullback Earnest Graham as Ward's lack of production. The 30-year-old appeared in 14 games, with one start.

Morris called Ward into his office after practice Tuesday and said he and the running back "shook hands, gave each other a hug and said good luck in our future endeavors."

"He was a consummate pro,"

## Nadal, Sharapova pushed to the limit at U.S. Open

NEW YORK — Down a set in the first round of the U.S. Open, Maria Sharapova sat in her changeover chair, briefly closed her eyes, and took some deep breaths.

"I knew," she would say later, "that it wasn't over."

Whatever problems she encountered Tuesday, whatever the

level of her game, all that mattered to Sharapova was the outcome. Overcoming a deficit and a big-hitting opponent to avoid a significant upset, the 2006 U.S. Open champion put together a 4-6, 6-3, 6-1 victory over 60th-ranked Jarmila Groth of Australia.

"At the end of the day, even though I know I wasn't playing my best tennis, I know I came out with a win. And sometimes it's more important than anything, because you're giving yourself a chance to go out on the practice court tomorrow," the 14th-seeded Sharapova said. "You're giving yourself a chance to play another match and to get better, you know,

maybe work on the things that today weren't working that well for you."

Groth hit 14 double-faults, including on the final point of the second set. She was by far the more aggressive of the two, taking risks that sometimes paid off and sometimes did not. She hit 24 winners to 19 for Sharapova, and made 48 unforced errors to 17 for Sharapova.

"She came out firing; didn't give me many opportunities," Sharapova said. "You just want to hang in there, get through it."

There was a lot of hanging in there on a steamy Day 2 at the U.S. Open, when the temperature

rose into the mid-90s. More than a dozen women's matches went three sets, and a half-dozen men's matches lasted the full five sets, including 2007 runner-up Novak Djokovic's 6-3, 3-6, 2-6, 7-5, 6-3 victory over his friend and Serbian Davis Cup teammate Viktor Troicki.

They played for more than 3½ hours, and the on-court temperature approached 110 degrees. Djokovic was down a break in the fourth set while already down, before righting himself.

"You kind of start panicking a little bit when you don't feel great

## Ingram out for opener Alabama RB to miss game vs. San Jose St.

Mark Ingram's run for a second Heisman Trophy has been put on hold, and possibly even derailed, before the Alabama tailback had a chance to gain a single yard.

Ingram will miss No. 1 Alabama's opener against San Jose State after injuring his left knee late in practice

Monday, coach Nick Saban said Tuesday.

Saban said in a statement the star tailback had an arthroscopic procedure and should make a full recovery in a "relatively short time."

"Mark will definitely be out for this week's game against San Jose State and we will manage this on a week to week basis beyond this week," Saban said.

If the absence proves short-lived, it figures to have more of an impact on Ingram's bid to join Ohio State running back Archie Griffin as the only two-time Heisman winners than it does on Alabama's hopes for a repeat national title.

San Jose State went 2-10 last season, but the Crimson Tide face a much stiffer test in the second week of the season. No. 19 Penn State visits Tuscaloosa on Sept. 11, then Alabama travels to Duke.

Alabama does have a talented backup in sophomore Trent Richardson, who ran for 751 yards and scored eight touchdowns last

# Huge sixth inning propels Blue Jays over Rays

## Bautista hits 43rd HR, Toronto takes 13-5 win over TB

ST. PETERSBURG — Jose Bautista hit his major league-leading 43rd homer during a 10-run sixth inning and the Toronto Blue Jays beat the Tampa Bay Rays 13-5 on Tuesday night.

Tampa Bay lost for only the fifth time in 17 games but fell a game behind the first-place New York Yankees in the AL East. The Rays and Yankees, who beat Oakland 9-3, had been tied atop the division

for the previous eight days.

Bautista capped the sixth-inning outburst with a three-run shot off reliever Lance Cormier that put the Blue Jays up 11-3. It was the most runs scored in one inning by Toronto since an 11-run sixth on July 25, 2007, at Minnesota.

Bautista also had a broken-bat, run-scoring single — giving him 103 RBIs this season — during a two-run eighth that extended the cushion to 13-3.

Ricky Romero (11-8) gave up five runs, three hits and five walks in 7 1-3 innings for the Blue Jays, who can stop a stretch of 10 straight series defeats at Tampa Bay with a win on Wednesday night.

Jeff Niemann (10-5) struggled in his second consecutive start since

returning from a strained right shoulder, giving up seven runs and seven hits in five-plus innings. The Tampa Bay right-hander has allowed 17 runs over 8 2-3 innings in his past two outings.

Niemann allowed only two hits though five innings before Toronto started the sixth with five hits and a batter hit by a pitch. DeWayne Wise had an RBI single, Vernon Wells hit a two-run double, and Adam Lind and John Buck had consecutive RBI doubles as the Blue Jays took a 6-3 lead and ended Niemann's night.

Cormier entered and gave up Aaron Hill's two-run homer that made it 8-3.

Romero held the Rays hitless

# Mooooove!

## How do you walk a cow? Very, very carefully

Last week four cows went for a little stroll around the barnyard.

It wasn't their idea. Walking Bell and Naomi, the heifers, and Lex and Ace, the steers, was an assignment for a group of Debbie Parker's agricultural science students at Lecanto Middle School.

Before the students started taking turns walking the animals — more or less successfully — they had to catch them and halter them, the liveliest part of Parker's Aug. 25 lesson.

Morgan Heckman, a 13-year-old eighth-grader, and some other students went into the pasture to persuade Naomi to move into the corner so Morgan could put the halter on her. Blaze Elliott, a 12-year-old seventh-grader, helped hold the fence panel in place, completing the makeshift pen in the corner of the pasture.

"Don't run. Slowly move your panel to the corner," Parker said. "She hasn't been caught since last year."

When it looked like Naomi was moments away from wearing a halter and lead, she had other ideas.

She found a way out, leaping through a nearby hole in the fence back into the barnyard, perhaps inspired by the football players on a nearby practice field.

Back in the barn by her mother, Fuzzy, Parker and Morgan worked with Naomi, who was much more cooperative this time.

Morgan said she is used to dealing with difficult animals because she has

a friend who has horses, "and they're really mean."

But Morgan said she felt scared when Naomi bolted away from her and through the fence.

Parker, the school's FFA sponsor, said it's an FFA requirement for her ag students to stay after school for one session at the barn to earn the Discovery degree. It's also good practice for showing the school's FFA chapter steer, Lex, at the 2011 Citrus County Fair.

The 28 students in Parker's ag class have the opportunity to stay after school at the barn every Wednesday, feeding the cows and doing other barnyard chores.

Gregory Shoemaker keeps his steer, Ace, at the school barn, and he feeds all the cows each morning. As he tried to get Ace accustomed to wearing the halter and lead, the steer suddenly jerked and tried to get away, leaving Gregory to hang onto the lead, even when he lost his shoe.

The 13-year-old eighth-grader said he felt "kind of scared. But I'm kind of used to it. He just got spooked."

After both heifers and both steers were in their halters, things calmed down a great deal. And from time to time, they stopped entirely as students tried their skills in the mock show ring, discovering walking a cow is not exactly like walking a dog. When a cow

decides to stop, it can be difficult to get it moving again, particularly the ones weighing in at more than 1,000 pounds.

"Don't look at her, Blaze," Parker said. "Just look like you know she's coming."

"When the leader's looking at them they won't walk," she explained.

Parker said the cows were learning to walk on lead, except for 2-year-old Bell, the most experienced and most cooperative.

Laila Khan, a 13-year-old eighth-grader, reluctantly walked Bell.

"I know she's so friendly, but I got scared," she said.

Though Khan said she would like to show an animal at the fair, she wanted to start small.

"I wanted to show a rabbit," she said, "because I don't think I'm ready for a cow yet."

Blaze said he wanted to take Parker's ag class so he would be exposed to more career choices because he doesn't really know what he wants to do.

"I thought it would be easier if I had more options," he said.

Jordan Quintanilla, the FFA chapter secretary, said she hopes to show Lex at the county fair and some day she would like to start her own herd of cattle.

The 13-year-old eighth-grader said she loves everything about raising cattle, including working with them, brushing them and bathing them.

"I just think it's a life experience that everyone should have."

# Going back to work, supermom image intact

At some point during my first pregnancy 12 years ago, I was swept up by the idea that I needed to be the world's perfect mother.

I left a demanding job that I loved to take 14 months of maternity leave for two kids, and then spent the next decade working part-time or not at all.

That demanding job nourished me, and it pained me to stay home. But I didn't want to stay home. My daughter's side and I got used to the novelty of not being at the office at 10 a.m. And I eventually stopped asking myself, "Who are

professor of history and family studies, The Evergreen State College, Olympia, Wash.

all these people in the coffee shop — don't they have jobs?"

Recently, it became clear it was time to go back, but I wondered: Would I leave the Perfect Mom title behind?

Working part-time had been stressful. My schedule-juggling

wrought havoc on my colleagues, and I felt guilty for working less than they did.

But I loved being home with my daughter, and later my son, who arrived 20 months later. I liked carting them around to the grocery store. I liked taking them for

runs in the jogger and singing them to sleep for their naps. I wasn't crazy about story hour at the library, but the joys of being home still far outweighed the pains of being a part-timer at work.

Things went on much this way for a decade. But this past May I

decided to take a full-time job. My daughter was 11; my son, 10. I was tired of the marginal life of the part-timer. My husband wanted to go back to school. And we had to get better health insurance.

But I worried, of course. What effect would this have on the kids?

Stephanie Coontz, an oft-quoted academic who monitors the torrent of national news and commentary on working and parenting, says kids are happiest when parents are leading balanced and satisfying lives, whether that means working outside the home or not.
