Following outcry, commissioners abruptly flush proposal to explore privatizing utilities

Commissioner Winn Webb still thought the idea was a good one.

But the citizens disagreed, so Webb exchanged his view for theirs.

Led by Webb's change of mind, the Citrus County Commission voted 3-2 Tuesday to stop any movement toward turning over water and sewer operations to a private "It's not my job as an elected official to

jam anything down the people's throats,"

Webb said to cheers from about 80 residents in the commission meeting room.

The board met to hear proposals from three companies interested in taking over operation and maintenance of the county's utilities system.

The idea, officials said, was to select one firm that would then compete with the county's own utilities department. Commissioners then would decide in November or December whether to privatize or keep the entire operation in county hands.

Three firms were ready for their pre-

sentations, but it never got that far.

Commissioner Dennis Damato and Chairman Gary Bartell were already opposed to privatizing any segments of the utility services.

Commissioner Joe Meek said he wanted to hear the proposals to see if the county operation was the most efficient.

"Competition is a good thing," Meek said. "We're doing what I think is the most responsible thing.

Boat safely this weekend

Lawmen to have eyes on for Labor Day

Come Friday, Citrus County waterways will be filled with recreational boaters celebrating the Labor Day weekend.

But with increased traffic comes increased potential for accidents, both alcohol-related and non-alcohol-related.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission officers will start Labor Day weekend patrols on Citrus County waters at 6 p.m. Friday, according to FWC spokeswoman Karen Parker. Officials hope to avoid boat-

ing-related accidents over the holiday weekend and will be watching to make sure boaters adhere to safety regulations and for boaters operating under the influence.

Officers will also be checking for fishing violations and underage drinking, as well as enforcing the manatee zones and limited-access areas, according to Parker.

The U.S. Coast Guard will patrol along the coast and the Citrus County Sheriff's Office will enforce laws on navigable waterways throughout the

"In these busier holiday weekends, there is going to be some increased traffic out there, so there are going to be some increased patrols from us," said Petty Officer Robert Simpson, U.S. Coast Guard spokesman.

Simpson said the penalties for boating under the influence are the same as those for driving under the influence. Authorities arrest violators and can impound boats.

"It's just as dangerous, if not more dangerous, as driving a

President says Iraq war finished

WASHINGTON — Claiming no victory, President Barack Obama formally ended the U.S. combat role in Iraq after seven long years of bloodshed, declaring firmly Tuesday night: "It is time to turn the page." Now, he said, the nation's most ur-

gent priority must be fixing its own sickly economy. From the

where George W. Bush first announced the invasion that would come to define his presidency, Obama addressed millions who were divided over the war in his country and around the world. Fiercely opposed to the war from the start, he said the United States "has paid a huge price" to give Iraqis the chance to shape their future — a price that now includes more than 4,400 dead, tens of thousands of troops wounded and hundreds of billions of dollars spent since March

In a telling sign of the domestic troubles weighing on the United States and his own presidency, Obama turned much of the emphasis in a major war address to the dire state of U.S. joblessness.

In his remarks of slightly less than 20 minutes, only his second address from the Oval Office, Obama looked directly into the TV camera, hands clasped in front of him on his desk, family photos and the U.S. and presidential flags behind him.

Council mulls taking back redevelopment duties

Members unhappy with cost of separate agency

Crystal River Council members are poised to do away with the Community Redevelopment Agency structure that they say focuses too much attention on administration and not enough on projects.

The council voted 5-0 Monday night to consider at its next meeting a resolution that would dissolve the CRA board and turn the entire structure over to the city council and city manager.

Councilman Phil Price said the CRA receives \$475,000 annually in tax money and spends about \$100,000 on administrative costs.

He suggested City Manager Andy Houston could hire an assistant to oversee CRA activities at half that cost.

Council members routinely complain about what they view as the lack of progress by the CRA board and its director, Michelle Evans.

"I'm discouraged it hasn't been very effective," Price said. "We are responsible for these monies. Those are tax monies."

Councilwoman Maureen Mc-Niff said she attended a recent meeting where most of the discussion time centered on Evans' salary.

Councilwoman Paula Wheeler said the CRA, by charter, ends in seven years. She said she does not want to spend \$700,000 in administrative costs during that



Trial begins in Inverness

Man facing charge of sexual battery

Eyes fixed on the jury, an Inverness woman recalled the dreadful feeling that overcame her when she said her 4-year-old son revealed he had been sexually abused.

"I was upset," she said. "I didn't understand why this was happening. I didn't know what to do.'

The trial of a 30-year-old Inverness man charged with sexual battery on a child under the age of 12 began Tuesday with the state presenting its case.

The morning began with a Williams Rule hearing, which allows evidence about a person's other offenses to be introduced into court.

old Lutz boy, but the case was dismissed after it was determined the boy was giving inconsistent statements. Judge Richard "Ric' Howard ruled the now-10-year-old boy's testimony along with his mother's testimony was admissible in court.

Assistant State Attorney Brian "It just didn't sound right," she Trehy told the jury they would hear a case about a now-5-year-old She asked her son to say it again. who lived with Eichhorn near the end of 2008. Trehy explained the details of the case and stated the boy would testify as to what happened between him and Eich-

"He's going to tell you what happened. He's going to tell you the truth," Trehy said.

He also informed the jury they would hear from another boy who also endured sexual abuse at the hands of Eichhorn under similar circumstances

However, Eichhorn's attorney, During the morning's testimony, Mark Rodriguez, said all these allegations arose from disputes and on Eichhorn. Rodriguez explained

"There's plenty of room for doubt," he said.

The mother and father of the 5year-old testified as to the events that landed their son, and also Eichhorn's girlfriend about her their daughter, in Eichhorn's home. The mother stated she was caring for her child when she was arrested and placed in jail for a period of time between April and December of 2008. During that time, the father told the court he couldn't care for his son so he asked his best friend, Eichhorn, to take his son into his home.

Then one day, after she was released from jail and had taken back custody of her son, the mother said she was brushing her teeth in the bathroom when her son mentioned that Eichhorn had performed a sex act on him.

The Chronicle is withholding details about the incident because of its graphic nature.

Once making sure she had heard her son correctly, the mother said she called her son's father to come talk to him. The father, during his testimony, confirmed that his son

"He said he didn't do it," he said. He went to the police to report

what his son told him. However, Rodriguez asked if either one of the parents had an argument with claiming their children on her tax return. Both denied there was ever an issue. Rodriguez also asked the father if he remembered telling law enforcement that his son sometimes confuses reality with makebelieve. The father said he didn't remember saying that.

The 5-year-old also took the stand and explained to the jury how Eichhorn reportedly took him from his bedroom where he was sleeping and sexually assaulted him in a bathroom in Eichhorn's home.

When asked by Rodriguez if his parents talked to him about what to say today, the boy replied yes. However, Trehy asked the boy if they told him what words to say and he

The 10-year-old also testified that Eichhorn sexually assaulted him and described to the jury what happened.

Rodriguez, however, pointed out to the jury how the boy's case was dismissed in 2005 because he kept giving conflicting statements. Even on Tuesday, Rodriguez alluded to the fact that the boy was giving different statements to the jury in the afternoon than what he said early in the morning.

Rodriguez asked the woman if she was asked to leave Eichhorn's home because her son exposed himself to another young girl who was living in the house. Though aware of the incident, the woman said that was not why she left. Rodriguez also asked the boy if he recalled telling authorities back in 2005 that Eichhorn never touched him. The boy said he didn't remember

Worker in hospital following incident

Subcontractor injured at Progress plant

A man working at a Progress Energy facility was hospitalized Tuesday after suffering electrical burns on the company's property on Power Line Street in Crystal River

The man, whose name was not immediately released, works for SGT, a company that contracts with Progress Energy, said Mike Hughes, Progress Energy spokesman. The man was in a concrete batch plant where concrete is produced for repairs to the containment structure at the nuclear plant in Crystal River.

An electrical arc flash occurred in an electrical panel near the concrete equipment, according to Hughes, and resulted in the worker's injuries. He was taken by helicopter to a hospital in Gainesville.

"Our thoughts and prayers are with him," Hughes said.

The concrete batch plant is not in an enclosed building and it was not clear how many people were nearby when the arc flash happened.

Citrus County Fire Rescue responded with six fire vehicles, but there was no fire when the first unit arrived, said county spokesman Jim Hunter.

Progress Energy is conducting an internal investigation into the incident, according to Hughes.

NEW YORK — For most of his four decades as a reporter, Jules Edward Loh traveled the United States, reaching every state and using his honeyed Georgia accent to charm his way into the hearts, minds and lives of Americans, famous and ob-

To write "Lords of the Earth," a 1971 book about the Navajo Indians of Arizona, he became so close to tribal elders that they named him Poputiney, meaning "Many Pencils." Back in New York, his irreverent colleagues at The Associated Press dubbed him "Loh, the poor Indian."

New data: Many fewer U.S. kids in foster care

NEW YORK — The number of U.S. children in foster care has dropped 8 percent in just one year, and more than 20 percent in the past decade, according to new federal figures underscoring the impact of widespread reforms.

The drop, hailed by child-welfare advocates, is due largely to a shift in the policies and practices of state and county child welfare agencies. Many have been shortening stays in foster care, speeding up adoptions and expanding preventive support for troubled families so more children avoid being removed from their homes in the first place.

The new figures, released Tuesday by the Department of Health and Human Services, show there were 423,773 children in foster care as of Sept. 30. That's down from 460.416 a vear earlier and from more than 540,000 a decade ago.

California had the biggest one-year drop from 67,703 to 60,198. Just eight years ago, the state had more than 90,000 children in foster care.

Florida, Illinois, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania are among other major states that have lowered their numbers sharply over the decade. "It's extraordinary," said

Terri Braxton, a vice president of the Child Welfare League of America. "There's been a major focus on foster-care awareness, on new legislative policies, and it's heartening to see that these efforts are finally paying off."

Though many of the initiatives are at the state level, Braxton said the trend had been aided by a federal law, the 2008 Fostering Connections Act. It allows use of federal funds to assist children who leave foster care to live with relatives other than their parents an arrangement which in the past was generally not elimonths. gible for federal aid.

youths rose from 19,000 in 1999 to a record high of nearly 30,000 in 2008.

Kathi Crowe, executive director of the National Foster Care Coalition, said a key factor behind the lower foster care numbers was the greater emphasis on preventive services, so fewer children needed to be removed from their homes.

"And in cases where they are removed, there's now a real priority to provide the kids with permanent homes so they don't languish in the system any longer than they need to.' she said. "All those things combined — it's all good news for kids.' Richard Wexler of the

National Coalition for Child Protection Reform, which seeks to reduce the number of children unnecessarily placed in foster care, said he was encouraged by the lower number of children taken from their parents in the first place.

Overall, entries into the system were down 6.5 percent for one year, and down 17 percent since they peaked in 2005, he said.

"This is one more indication that, at long last, the politics of child welfare is catching up with reality,' Wexler said in an e-mail. "The proportion of children deemed 'substantiated' victims of child abuse in this country peaked in 1993 — it's never been as high since. Yet for more than a decade afterward, states kept taking away more and more children."

"Now, finally, it's sinking in that most cases labeled 'neglect' — the single largest category of maltreatment — are really poverty, and it makes more sense to try to deal with the poverty than destroy the family," Wexler wrote. The average length of

Dishonorable discharges

In July 2007, Barack Obama, then a senator, teamed with a Republican in the House to forward a bill halting PD discharges

The bill was watered down to an amendment requiring the Pentagon to investigate PD dismissals and signed by President Bush in January 2008. Republican Kit Bond of Missouri says the impact was zero and, along with Democrat Barbara Boxer, has been fighting to end the PD discharges.

Joshua Kors, writing in The Nation, cites the plight of Chuck Luther, a sergeant wounded by an IED in Iraq. He was declared mentally ill and coerced into signing paperwork leading to the PD discharge. The officer expediting the procedure said he heard from a commander that Luther's family revealed he had suffered from psychiatric problems before the military and had been treated with medication. But Luther's wife and mother say they never spoke with an Army commander and Sgt. Luther had no psychiatric problems before entering the military. Soldiers who could have vouched for Luther's stability and leadership say they were never asked. One said Luther saved his life.

The Fort Hood discharge specialist told Luther he owed the Army \$1,500, and if he didn't pay they would garnish his wages

and assess interest on the debt.

VA doctors cited traumatic brain damage and PTSD and declared Luther 80 percent disabled, but couldn't alter the Army discharge.

With his health improving, Luther began working with Disposable Warriors, an organization assisting soldiers fighting their discharges. He had a threatening note on his windshield and the home of a fellow organizer was invaded, taking only files of soldiers.

So much for supporting our troops.



Storm could force evacs for Labor Day

RALEIGH, N.C. — A powerful Hurricane Earl threatened to sideswipe much of the East Coast just ahead of Labor Day, worrying countvacationers planned to spend the traditional last week of summer at the beach.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency warned people along the Eastern Seaboard to prepare for possible evacuations and islanders in the Turks and Caicos hunkered down in their homes Tuesday as the Category 4 hurricane steamed across the Caribbean with winds of 135

Earl was expected to remain over the open ocean before turning north and running parallel to the East Coast, bringing high winds and heavy rain to North Carolina's Outer Banks by late Thursday or early Friday. From there, forecasters said, it could curve away from the coast somewhat as it makes it way north, perhaps hitting Massachusetts' Cape Cod and the Maine shoreline on Friday night and Saturday.

'My guests are calling and they don't know what to do and I don't know what to tell them," said Dave Dawson, owner of the oceanfront Cape Hatteras Motel in Bux-

Officials at Sumter Electric Cooperative said Tuesday that they have been watching the development of Hurricanes Earl and Fiona all week and, in conjunction with the co-op's weather service, keeping a close eye on any potential deviations from their current projected tracks.

According to Barry Bowman, SECO director of corporate communications, the member-owned electric cooperative is ready to respond to any outages that might be storm-related as these hurricanes make their way up the eastern seaboard. SECO serves more than 170,000 members and their families in Marion, Lake, Sumter, Citrus, Pasco, Levy and Hernando counties.

Bowman said, "Right now it appears that these two storms will have a minor impact on our service territory. However, we've seen storm tracks for hurricanes do some very strange things and we will not let our guard down until Earl and Fiona are well clear of Florida. And, we should keep in mind that September can be a very active month for tropical storms and hurricanes.'

In light of that fact, he suggested that people visit the SECO website at www.secoenergy.com. There they can read SECO's hurricane guide online, as well as view graphics that detail exactly how SECO restores power during major outages, read important information on proper generator use and much, much more. The hurricane guide can also be picked up at any SECO office.

In addition, SECO has a specialty website set up, www.secostormcenter.com — where members can report outages, check on outage status and get an overall picture on power restoration progress throughout the co-op's territory.

On Monday, Earl delivered a glancing blow to several small Caribbean islands, tearing roofs off homes and

tell how close Earl might people in Anguilla, Antigua and St. Maarten. In Puerto Rico, nearly 187,000 people were without power and 60,000 without water, Gov. Luis Fortuno said. Cruise ships were diverted and flights canceled across the region. But there were no reports of deaths or serious injuries.

On Tuesday, gusty winds from Earl's outer fringes whipped palm fronds and whistled through doors in the Turks and Caicos Islands as tied-down boats seesawed on white-crested surf.

Islanders gathered to watch big waves pound a Grand Turk shore as the wind sent sand and salt spray flying.

"We can hear the waves crashing against the reef really seriously," Kirk Graff, owner of the Captain Kirks Flamingo Cove Marina, said by telephone as he watched the darkening skies. "Anybody who hasn't secured their boats by now is going to regret it."

Benefits of ovary removal seen for high-risk women

CHICAGO — Surgery to remove healthy ovaries gives a triple benefit to high-risk women: It lowers their threat of breast and ovarian cancer, and boosts their chances of living longer, new research suggests.

The study is the largest to date to find advantages for preventive surgery for women who carry BRCA gene mutations. Women with the faulty genes have a dramatically higher cancer risk than other women — five times greater for breast cancer and at least 10 times greater for ovarian cancer. ON THE NET

The study, appearing in Wednesday's Journal of the American Medical Association, found benefits for women with two different BRCA gene vari-

ants whether they had previously had turn cancerous. breast cancer or not.

The results offer more tailored evidence for women considering ovary removal, a surgery that ends fertility, fast-forwards them into early menopause and may contribute to osteoporosis or heart problems later in life.

"It's really critical to have the best information when making such a profound decision," said senior author Timothy Rebbeck of the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine.

The researchers followed nearly 2,500 women with BRCA mutations in Austria, England, the Netherlands and the United States. All the women were cancer-free at the start. They were watched for an average of four years. Most of the women were younger than 50 at the start of the study.

They got counseling to help them choose between surgery or increased screening to watch for cancers early.

Ten percent of the women chose mastectomy and 40 percent chose to have their

ovaries removed; some had both. More than half the women had neither surgery.

The women who chose ovary removal had impressive results:

- 1 percent were later diagnosed with ovarian cancer that showed up in cells missed by surgeons, compared to 6 percent of the women who kept their ovaries.
- 11 percent were diagnosed with breast cancer, compared to 19 percent of the women who kept their ovaries.
- 3 percent of those who had surgery died, compared to 10 percent of the others.

The study also found preventive mas-

tectomy lowered the risk of breast cancer. No breast cancers were seen in the women who had their breasts removed. That may seem unsurprising, but mastectomy leave behind breast tissue that can

The study was observational, meaning it can't prove one choice was better than another. Other factors could have caused differences in the women's cancer rates.

But the results will help doctors counsel their patients, said Dr. Virginia Kaklamani of Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine in Chicago, who wrote an accompanying editorial in the journal.

"I'll use it mostly in talking to people considering genetic testing," Kaklamani said. "I can tell them, 'If we know you test positive, there are things to do that will help you live longer." The increased risk for BRCA carriers is

frightening. In the general population, about 12 in 100 women will get breast cancer during their lifetimes, compared to about 60 in 100 women who have faulty BRCA genes, according to the National Cancer Institute. For ovarian cancer, the lifetime risk in the general population is a little more than 1 in 100 compared to 15to-40 in 100 women with BRCA mutations.

Aging vets' costs concern bama's deficit co-chair

RALEIGH, N.C. — The system that automatically awards disability benefits to some veterans because of concerns about Agent Orange seems contrary to efforts to control federal spending, the Republican co-chairman of President Barack Obama's deficit com-

mission said Tuesday. Former Wyoming Sen. Alan Simpson's comments came a day after The Associated Press reported that diabetes has become the most frequently compensated ailment among Vietnam veterans, even though decades of research has failed to find more than a possible link between the defoliant Agent Orange and diabetes

"The irony (is) that the veterans who saved this country are now, in a way, not helping us to save the country in this fiscal mess," said Simpson, an Army veteran who was once chairman of the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee.

The Department of Veterans Affairs has also allowed Vietnam veterans to get money for ailments such as lung cancer and prostate cancer, and the agency finalized a proposal Tuesday to grant payments for heart disease — the nation's leading cause of death.

Simpson declined to say whether the issue would become part of his work on Obama's panel examining the nation's debt. He looked to Congress to make a change.

Daniel Akaka, a Sen. Hawaii Democrat who currently chairs the VA committee, said Tuesday he will address the broader issue of so-called presumptive conditions at a hearing previously set for Sept. 23. The committee will look to "see what changes Congress and

VA may need to make to existing law and policy," Akaka said in an e-mail.

'It is our solemn responsibility to help veterans with disabilities suffered in their service to our country," said Akaka, who served in the Army Corps of Engineers during World War II. "That responsibility also requires us to make sure limited resources are available for those who truly need and

are entitled to them.' Virginia Sen. Jim Webb, a Democrat and Vietnam combat veteran, has also raised questions about the spending. The leading Republican on the committee, North Carolina Sen. Richard Burr, has not responded to several requests for comment on the topic in recent months.

Because of concerns about Agent Orange, Congress set up a system in 1991 to grant automatic benefits to veterans who served in Vietnam at any point during a 13-year period and later got an ailment linked to the defoliant. The VA has done that with a series of ailments with strong indications of an association to Agent Orange, including Hodgkin's disease, soft-tissue cancers and non-Hodgkin's lymphoma.

Other ailments have been added even though and Institute of Medicine review has found they only have a potential association and that they could not rule out other factors. Those maladies include prostate cancer, lung cancer diabetes. The committee has said that, for diabetes, more powerful influences include family history, physical inac-

It can cause some of the same deadly medical problems found in a smoker.

Smoking is the leading cause of preventable death, being involved in 440,000 annual deaths with 46 million smokers, or 18 percent of the population, a causative factor and responsible.

There are 599 ingredients in the manufacture of cigarettes, with 60 of them being known carcinogens causing cancer of the stomach, kidney, esophagus, bladder, lungs and pancreas. If all this is not bad enough, research highly correlates dysfunctional behavior of both children and adults in families where cigarettes and cigars are smoked.

Smoking is extremely addictive, with 75 percent of those who start never quitting. I sadly remember my brother, who was addicted to American Camels, walking around inhaling with an oxygen tank strapped to his chest and a lit Camel in his mouth.

Even after two life-threatening visits to hospitals, he refused to quit until his lungs finally did. I miss him and I worry a bit about every one who smokes, and particularly those who feel it will not make a difference in their life and/or the lives of those they say they love.







Stocks end a brutal August with meager gains

NEW YORK — The stock market ended its worst August since 2001 with meager gains Tuesday after minutes from the latest Federal Reserve meeting showed officials' increasing concern about the economy.

Stock indexes gave up most of their gains in mid-afternoon after the release of minutes from the Fed's Aug. 10 meeting. Fed officials said during their discussions that they recognized that the economy might need further stimulus beyond the purchases of government debt the central bank announced that day. Some of the officials acknowledged that economy had softened more than they had anticipated.

Dan Cook, senior market analyst with the brokerage firm IG Markets, said the minutes gave a picture of a cautious and conservative Fed. While officials acknowledged the economy's problems, they chose to take only small, initial steps. Traders who have hoped the Fed would be more aggressive to stimulate the economy soon aren't so sure now that the central bank will act. money back into bonds.

"People are thinking maybe we need more of a downturn before the Fed will jump in," Cook said. Unlike traders, he said, "the Fed moves like a glacier."

The Dow rose 4.99, or 0.05 percent, to close 10,014.72.

Broader indexes were mixed. The Standard & Poor's 500 index edged up 0.41, or 0.04 percent, to 1,049.33. The Nasdag composite index fell 5.94, or 0.3 percent, to 2,114.03.

Other market indicators also had dismal performances in August, having surged ahead in July on a series of strong earnings reports. The Dow lost 4.3 percent in August, while the Nasdaq lost 6.2 percent.

Rising stocks outpaced falling ones by about 4 to 3 on the New York Stock Exchange, where consolidated volume was low at 4.5 billion

Volume has been very light in recent days, which can exaggerate movements in the market.

"The low volume (is a sign) there's not a lot of belief on either side," said John Merrill, chief investment officer at Tanglewood Wealth Management. The market "is treading water as people are looking for a discernible trend.

Treasury prices rose, sending their yields lower, as cautious investors





The good news is that by swallowing fiscal responsibility, we will all be better off in the end. 4 Israelis killed on eve of peace talks

JERUSALEM — Palestinian gunmen opened fire Tuesday on an Israeli car in the West Bank and killed four passengers on the eve of a new round of Mideast peace talks in Washington. The Islamic militant group Hamas claimed responsibility.

Assailants firing from a passing car riddled the vehicle with bullets as it traveled near Hebron — a volatile city that has been a flash point of violence in the past. Some 500 ultranationalist Jewish settlers live in heavily fortified enclaves in the city amid more than 100,000 Palestinians.

One of the victims was pregnant, said police spokesman Micky Rosenfeld. Israel's national rescue service said the victims were two men and two women, and Israeli media said evervone in the car was killed.

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas was already in Washington meeting with U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton when the attack took place.

Palestinian Prime Minister Salam Fayyad's office issued a statement charging the attack was aimed at undermining his government's effort to build international support for "the Palestinian position and ending the (Israeli) occupa-

U.S.-Afghan relations ruffled

KABUL, Afghanistan — A bribery probe involving a top adviser to President Hamid Karzai has angered the Afghan leader and threatens to damage U.S. relations with Kabul just three months after a White House visit that seemed to smooth ties at a critical stage in the

Instead, tensions have risen over the aide's arrest by a U.S.-advised team, and the U.S. says it is watching the next anti-corruption steps closely.

In the days that followed, Karzai bluntly criticized U.S. war strategy and ordered private security companies in the nation to disband in four months. He also signed off on the forced retirement of a veteran corruption-fighter amid allegations by the ousted prosecutor and others that cases against high-ranking govofficials were being ernment blocked.

U.S. officials have been pressing reinforcements Karzai to step up efforts to root out corruption, and he has pledged to do that. At the same time, he has pushed back, saying the international community needs to do more to eliminate corruption in its own

KABUL, Afghanistan — Five American troops were killed in action in Afghanistan on Tuesday, ending the month with a spike in bloodshed that has claimed the lives of 19 U.S. service members in four days.

The U.S. death toll for August stood at 55 — three-quarters of them in the second half of the month as the Taliban fight back against U.S. pressure in southern and eastern strongholds. American losses accounted for more than 70 percent of the 76 fatalities suffered by the entire NATO-led force.

As the U.S. formally ends its combat role in the Iraq war, NATO and Afghan forces are ramping up operations in Afghanistan, especially in the area around Kandahar City, the Taliban birthplace and their former headquar-

Most of the U.S. deaths occurred in the southern provinces of Helmand and Kandahar, longtime Taliban strongholds that are the focus of the American-led operation against the insurgents.

Drill must go 2,200 feet through solid rock; and then each miner faces a 3-hour ride to freedom

SAN JOSE MINE, Chile he effort to save 33 Chilean men trapped deep in a mine is an unprecedented chalenge, mining satety experts said Tuesday. It means months of drilling, then a harrowing threehour trip in a cage up a narrow hole carved through solid rock.

If all of that is successful, the freed men will emerge from the earth and "feel born again," said an American miner who was part of a group dramatically rescued in 2002 with similar techniques. But that rescue pulled men from a spot

only one-tenth as deep. 'They're facing the most unusual rescue that has ever been dealt with," said Dave Feickert, director of KiaOra, a mine safety consulting firm in New Zealand that has worked to improve China's dangerous mines. "Every one of these rescues presents challenging issues. But this one is

unique. First, engineers must use a 31ton drill to create a "pilot" hole from the floor of the Atacama Desert down 2,200 feet to the area in the San Jose mine where the

Then, the drill must be fitted with a larger bit to carve out a rescue chimney that will be about 26 inches wide — a task that means guiding the drill through solid rock

"Nothing of this magnitude has happened before; it's absolutely unheard of," said Alex Gryska, a mine rescue manager with the Canadian government.

Gryska said he is confident Chile's state-run Codelco mining company would successfully drill the hole out. But he said he is worried about the three to four months

and the key role the miners themselves will play in their own rescue.

Chilean officials said the miners will have to remove upward of 3,000 tons of rock as it falls into the area where they are trapped. There is little danger to the menthe area includes a shelter and about 500 yards of a shaft outside that. But as the rock starts to fall a month from now, the men will work in nonstop shifts to remove it with wheelbarrows and industrial

"The thing that concerns me is welfare of workers, their mental state. That will be real tough," said Gryska. "From a health perspective, it's hot down there. They're

talking about working 24/7 in 85 degrees for two months. Their mental state for that work will be critical.'

Chilean officials met with four "life sciences" specialists from NASA on Tuesday in Santiago.

"These miners showed us tremendous strength in surviving as long as they did without any contact with the surface," he said. "What we want to try to avoid is any kind of situation of hopelessness on the part of the miners.



Bautista hits 43rd HR, Toronto takes 13-5 win over TB

ST. PETERSBURG — Jose Bautista hit his major leagueleading 43rd homer during a 10run sixth inning and the Toronto Blue Jays beat the Tampa Bay Rays 13-5 on Tuesday night.

Tampa Bay lost for only the fifth time in 17 games but fell a game behind the first-place New York Yankees in the AL East. The Rays and Yankees, who beat Oakland 9-

for the previous eight days.

Bautista capped the sixth-inning outburst with a three-run shot off reliever Lance Cormier that put the Blue Jays up 11-3. It was the most runs scored in one inning by Toronto since an 11-run sixth on July 25, 2007, at Minnesota.

Bautista also had a broken-bat, run-scoring single — giving him 103 RBIs this season — during a two-run eighth that extended the cushion to 13-3.

Ricky Romero (11-8) gave up five runs, three hits and five walks in 7 1-3 innings for the Blue Jays, who can stop a stretch of 10 straight series defeats at Tampa Bay with a win on Wednesday night.

Jeff Niemann (10-5) struggled in 3, had been tied atop the division his second consecutive start since

returning from a strained right shoulder, giving up seven runs and seven hits in five-plus innings. The Tampa Bay right-hander has allowed 17 runs over 82-3 innings in his past two outings.

Neimann allowed only two hits though five innings before Toronto started the sixth with five hits and a batter hit by a pitch. DeWayne Wise had an RBI single, Vernon Wells hit a two-run double, and Adam Lind and John Buck had consecutive RBI doubles as the Blue Jays took a 6-3 lead and ended Niemann's night.

Europeans face Ryder Cup choice quandry

PARAMUS, N.J. — If it seems outrageous that the No. 9 player in the world would not be part of the Ryder Cup, then consider the European team that first crushed the United States in this popular exhibition.

highest-ranked The player Europe had in 2004 was No. 9 in the world.

That was Padraig Harrington, who six years and three major championships later became a debated captain's pick Sunday.

Colin Montgomerie called it an "embarrassment of riches" that his three picks did not include Justin Rose and Paul Casey, who was at No. 9 when the choices were made. And that the likes of Henrik Stenson, Robert Karlsson and Sergio Garcia didn't even qualify.

The real embarrassment will be if Europe doesn't take home the cup, last seen on Twitter being meticulously polished by former U.S. captain Paul Azinger as a way to needle Ian Poulter.

Europe is a lot like the United States used to be.

It has the highest-ranked players, with all 12 members inside the top 40 based on Monday's ranking.

Europe won more majors this year, with Graeme Mc-Dowell and Martin Kaymer trumping Phil Mickelson. And it is favored to win the Ryder Cup, once the domain of the USA.

One thing hasn't changed. Winning the Ryder Cup is more meaningful to Europe than the United States, which is not to suggest the Americans don't care about winning or won't cover their ears if they have to listen to the singsong cheering of 'Ole, Ole, Ole.

It's a competition between tours.

What motivated Europe for so many years — and led to so many victories — was





MTV's back — and couldn't have done it without her

LOS ANGELES - MTV is finally getting its mojo back, thanks to the tanned twenty-somethings of "Jersey Shore."

Ever since its December debut. the show's buzz has been huge even making it into one of President Barack Obama's speeches. The July 29 start of the second season, shot in Miami, drew 5.3 million viewers, nearly quadruple the original opener. And audiences have been staying put ever since.

'It's like a train wreck," said Tina Cordova, a Washington, D.C.based contractor, who gathers with her "Jersey"-loving girlfriends to watch every Thursday night. "You just can't look away."

"Jersey Shore" is just one contributor to a ratings rebound that MTV has enjoyed since January. It marks MTV's first consistent gain in three years.

That's a big win for parent company Viacom Inc., as its movie studio Paramount Pictures has been paring down its slate. Higher ratings mean advertisers from fast food chains to clothing retailers are lining up to get on board. Analysts say that should help boost the stock price in the months ahead.

Executives say that it's no fluke that many of its shows including "Jersey Shore" are taking off. The executives credit new programming spending and plenty of research into what young people want to see: more real situations, less fake glamour and fewer competitions.

"The Hills' was definitely a fabricated reality and 'Jersey Shore' and 'Teen Mom' are more harsh, authentic realities. And that is what's resonating much more today," said Van Toffler, president of MTV Networks' Music and Logo Group, which oversees the flagship network and other channels such as CMT.

MTV's ratings had been steadily declining as some of its reality shows such as "Real World," now in its 24th season, were getting old. Sister networks Comedy Central and Nickelodeon have ebbed and flowed for several years.

But since the beginning of July, MTV's ratings are up 22 percent among its core audience of people ages 12 to 34, and ratings are up 15 percent in core demographics across key Viacom channels MTV, Comedy Central, Nickelodeon and TV Land.

A mix of new reality shows, scripted comedies and such upand-coming comedians as Daniel Tosh on "Tosh.0" are all helping.

Toffler said that Millennials young people born roughly since 1980 — are more conservative and family-based than the generation before them. He said they like to learn their life lessons alongside mindless fun.

Edging away from contrived scenarios and extravagant lifestyles and toward regular people and their problems is also striking a chord with audiences during hard economic times.

It's no mistake that "Jersey

Shore's" partyers enjoy their latenight clubbing after stints at a gelato shop, or that Michael "The Situation" Sorrentino's formula for success consists of such mundane tasks as "gym, tan and laundry."

"It's people they can identify with," said Brad Adgate, a senior vice president and director of research at ad agency Horizon Media. "Really, a part of their success has been driven by that.'

Among other MTV winners is "The Hard Times of RJ Berger," a coming-of-age comedy that is a rare foray for MTV into scripted programming. Audiences also have been drawn to "The Buried Life," in which four people chase "100 things to do before you die" while making other people's dreams come true for every task of their own that they accomplish.

Caris & Co. analyst David Miller says MTV's ratings are as "golden" as spray tan and he rates Viacom's widely traded Class B stock "above average" with a target price of \$42, about a third above the current level.

With Viacom set to renew a \$4 billion share buyback program in October, shareholders should see stock prices rise as profits are concentrated among fewer shares.

Viacom's advertising revenue rose 4 percent in the latest quarter compared with last year, marking the second straight period of increase.

Aside from MTV, the Web videoinspired show "Tosh.0" on Comedy Central is attracting more men under 34 than any other television show on Wednesday nights. Usersubmitted clips with such names as "Giant Butt Girl" and "Wedding Vomit" suggest the kind of tawdry humor that is making guys laugh.

Even 88-year-old Betty White is helping grow the company's fan base among a slightly older crowd with the show "Hot in Cleveland" on TV Land, which debuted to a huge audience of 5.8 million in June.

To keep up its momentum, Viacom is prepping a ream of new shows, including a Comedy Central sports news show in partnership with The Onion, and MTV's reboot of the 1980s "Teen Wolf" movies as a TV series.

There's no guarantee either show will succeed. And Adgate said of "Jersey Shore's" success: "It's not going to last forever.'

Toffler acknowledges MTV's success comes in cycles and tends to lull when one generation gives way to the next.

As for "Jersey Shore," season three is shooting in the original location in Seaside Heights, N.J.

Viewers will surely stick around for the episode featuring Nicole "Snooki" Polizzi's arrest last month. A bigger audience and more ad dollars will surely make investors wanna smush.

How do you walk a cow? Very, very carefully

ast week four cows went for a little stroll around the barnyard. It wasn't their idea. Walking Bell and Naomi, the heifers, and Lex and Ace, the steers, was an assignment for a group of Debbie Parker's agricultural science students at Lecanto Middle School.

Before the students started taking turns walking the animals — more or less successfully — they had to catch them and halter them, the liveliest part of Parker's Aug. 25 lesson.

Morgan Heckman, a 13-year-old eighth-grader, and some other students went into the pasture to persuade Naomi to move into the corner so Morgan could put the halter on her. Blaze Elliott, a 12-year-old seventh-grader, helped hold the fence panel in place, completing the makeshift pen in the corner of the pasture.

"Don't run. Slowly move your panel to the corner," Parker said. "She hasn't been caught since last year."

When it looked like Naomi was moments away from wearing a halter and lead, she had other ideas.

She found a way out, leaping through a nearby hole in the fence back into the barnyard, perhaps inspired by the football players on a nearby practice field.

Back in the barn by her mother, Fuzzy, Parker and Morgan worked with Naomi, who was much more cooperative this time.

Morgan said she is used to dealing with difficult animals because she has

a friend who has horses, "and they're really mean."

But Morgan said she felt scared when Naomi bolted away from her and through the fence.

Parker, the school's FFA sponsor, said it's an FFA requirement for her ag students to stay after school for one session at the barn to earn the Discovery degree. It's also good practice for showing the school's FFA chapter steer, Lex, at the 2011 Citrus County Fair.

The 28 students in Parker's ag class have the opportunity to stay after school at the barn every Wednesday, feeding the cows and doing other barnyard chores.

Gregory Shoemaker keeps his steer, Ace, at the school barn, and he feeds all the cows each morning. As he tried to get Ace accustomed to wearing the halter and lead, the steer suddenly jerked and tried to get away, leaving Gregory to hang onto the lead, even when he lost his shoe.

The 13-year-old eighth-grader said he felt "kind of scared. But I'm kind of used to it. He just got spooked."

After both heifers and both steers were in their halters, things calmed down a great deal. And from time to time, they stopped entirely as students tried their skills in the mock show ring, discovering walking a cow is not exactly like walking a dog. When a cow

decides to stop, it can be difficult to get it moving again, particularly the ones weighing in at more than 1,000 pounds.

"Don't look at her, Blaze," Parker said. 'Just look like you know she's

"When the leader's looking at them they won't walk," she explained.

Parker said the cows were learning to walk on lead, except for 2-year-old Bell, the most experienced and most cooperative.

Laila Khan, a 13-year-old eighth-

grader, reluctantly walked Bell. "I know she's so friendly, but I got

scared," she said. Though Khan said she would like to show an animal at the fair, she wanted

to start small. "I wanted to show a rabbit," she said, "because I don't think I'm ready

for a cow yet.' Blaze said he wanted to take Parker's ag class so he would be exposed to more career choices because he doesn't really know what he wants

to do. "I thought it would be easier if I had more options," he said.

Jordan Quintanilla, the FFA chapter secretary, said she hopes to show Lex at the county fair and some day she would like to start her own herd of cattle.

The 13-year-old eighth-grader said she loves everything about raising cattle, including working with them,

brushing them and bathing them. "I just think it's a life experience that everyone should have."

I stopped putting away the laundry and started piling it on the air hockey table. The kids put it away themselves. I'm not home in the morning to help the kids; my husband gets them to school. No one seems to mind.

A few things have made this transition easier. I like the job and have an easy commute, plus I can work 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., enabling me to now," she said. get home when the kids do.

Recently, I asked my daughter what she made of my transition. The conversation surprised both of us. She knew I'd gotten a new job, but she hadn't realized, until I asked her, that I was working full-time. In fact, she hadn't noticed a difference. As far as the kids are concerned, as long as I'm home when they get home, nothing's changed.

The lesson in all this for the working mother? Find a job you enjoy that allows you to work reasonable hours. That's not simple, of course. It comes through planning and good luck.

I asked some newly working mothers what it was like to make the transition.

"It's not smooth and easy," said Christine Beinhacker, an IT worker in Washington, D.C., who returned to work in June when her daughter was 6. 'It was rough at first.''

"I wanted to be home with my girl, and I didn't know if I liked the job or the people or the commute," she said. But after a few weeks, "I realized the people are nice and the job is good. I'm feeling pretty lucky right





Well, you will smile if you get this deal right, taking advantage of the two useful spot-cards you have been given. You are in four spades. West leads the heart 10. How would you plan the play? What do you think of "your" four-spade overcall?

Bidding four spades is reasonable, whether or not partner is a passed hand. It is unlikely that you have a slam, and you might make life much harder for responder. Alternatively, you could sensibly start with a takeout double, planning to rebid four spades if partner shows no signs of positive values.



As often happens, declarer made his fatal error immediately. He should have smiled upon dummy's eight and nine of hearts. Then he should have covered West's opening lead with dummy's queen. East could have taken his ace, but South would have had a finessing position set up through East's heart jack. And to take that finesse, declarer would have had a dummy entry in the spade nine.







Barack and Michelle Obama put their girls off-limits to the news media after they moved to the White House, saying they wanted to keep their daughters' lives as normal as possible. But tidbits about the private doings of the youngest children to live in the White House since the Kennedy family do dribble out. Often they come from a surprising source: Mom and Dad.

It was President Obama who revealed, perhaps to his daughter's utter embarrassment, that Malia had been fitted with braces. He also spilled her plans to go to camp.

"She's my baby," he said of Malia, straying from his script at a political fundraiser of all places. "Even though she's 5-(foot)-9 now, she's still my baby. And she just got braces, which is good, because she looks like a kid and she was getting ... she's starting to look too old for me."

The prospect of spending even part of the summer without his firstborn around also had Obama ently are Malia's favorite creature. waxing sentimental.

Asked about summer vacation plans, Obama told an interviewer that "a month of it's going to be taken up with Malia going away for camp, which she's never done before. And I may shed a tear when she's on the way out.

In a separate interview, Obama said his daughters have savings accounts and they get an allowance, though he didn't say how much they get. He also said the girls are getting old enough where they may be able to start earning money by baby-sitting.

For the most part, Malia and Sasha are kept out of the limelight. The girls have spoken publicly at length just once: They and Bo, the family's Portuguese water dog, joined the first lady last year for a Christmastime reading of stories at Children's National Medical Center in Washington. They took turns reading a story and helped Mom answer questions afterward.

Once, though, the president got into trouble by talking about Malia and ended up apologizing to her.
