'To pursue or not to pursue'

Deputies weigh factors when tracking suspects

The recent death of Hernando County Deputy John Mecklenburg, who was pursuing a suspect when he

died in a car crash over the July 4 holiday weekend, has drawn attention to the long-standing law enforcement issue of when should officers give chase and when should they stand down.

Cmdr. Wayne Burns with the Citrus County Sheriff's Office said when a deputy attempts to initiate a traffic stop, he or she never knows if the person is going to stop or take off.

If a suspect decides to flee, it becomes that deputy's responsibility to notify dispatch and make a decision on the necessity to pursue.

"The authority to initiate emergency operation of an agency vehicle will be at the discretion of the deputy,

based upon available information and the deputy's training and experience," the sheriff's office pursuit policy states.

However, Burns said there are important factors deputies and patrol supervisors, who are in charge of

Privately-run campgrounds delayed after public opposition

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection has decided to pull back on plans to use private corporations to build and operate campgrounds on portions of up to 56 state parks after push-back from the public.

DEP came up with a plan to "expand and add additional family camping facilities to increase recreational opportunities for Florida's citizens and visitors."

The only park on the 56-site list in Citrus County is the Crystal River Preserve State Park. The 25,000-acre park has hiking and birding trails and fishing, but does not offer camping.

However, the department initially identified four state parks to get started on immediately: De Leon Springs State Park in De Leon Springs, Fanning Springs State Park in Fanning Springs, Honeymoon Island State Park in Dunedin and Edward Ball Wakulla Springs State Park in Wakulla Springs.

Public hearings took place last week in all four counties in which the parks are situated, and the public opposition was swift and harsh, especially at Honeymoon Island.

Hundreds packed the hearing and voiced concerns about several

issues, including potential environmental degradation and losing picnic areas to campsites. Several political representatives from the affected areas wrote to the DEP expressing concern.

"After seeing the public's reaction, it is clear that this is not the right time to expand camping at Honeymoon Island State Park," Gov. Rick Scott said in a prepared statement to Department of Environmental Protection.

"These natural treasures belong to all the tax-paying citizens of this state and it would be unfair to proceed with a plan that so many Floridians are so adamantly opposed to."

Late Friday, DEP Secretary Herschel Vinyard Jr. released a statement scrapping the effort at Honeymoon Island and promising to take a different approach for the rest.

In a letter to Sen. Mike Fasano, R-New Port Richey, and copied to 13 other state lawmakers, Vinyard noted that after gathering feedback from the four hearings, the DEP

with "the full support of Gov. Rick Scott, will not recommend going forward with camping at Honeymoon Island State Park and will be evaluating how to proceed at Fanning Springs, DeLeon Springs, Edward Ball Wakulla Springs and any other park that was initially considered for campsite expansions."

"Well, I am relieved they came to their senses on this," said Fasano, whose district includes part of Citrus County.

"But, while I am glad they are no longer moving forward on Honeymoon Island, I am still concerned about the rest of the places on the list," he said.

He said his opposition to the parks plan also stems from his concern for existing RV parks which would now have to compete with these new facilities.

"Now that they are going to evaluate the rest, (this) leaves the door open, and I hope they will listen to the people," Fasano added.

DEP Secretary Vinyard Jr., in his letter, added Florida Park Service offers camping at 53 of the 160 state parks.

"The fact that many of our park campgrounds are often fully occupied tells us that Florida's citizens enjoy being outdoors with their families in a tent, a pop-up trailer

Anger over verdict vented online

ORLANDO — For nearly two months, the murder trial of Casey Anthony was a living entity. It breathed daily across national television airwaves, then was reinforced nightly on cable TV programs that dissected every word uttered in the courtroom and fueled speculation on her fate.

When Anthony was acquitted of murder in the death of her 2-year-old daughter, Caylee, hundreds of thousands of people captivated by the case — and certain of her guilt — poured their rage into postings on Facebook and the micro-blogging site Twitter. Those and other social media sites provided a platform and a large audience for a decibel level of vitriol seldom seen before.

The threats, both veiled and blatant, were disturbing enough to make the judge hold off on releasing jurors' names, and to make it all the more likely that Anthony will be secretly whisked away upon her release next week.

Postings continued to fill one "I hate Casey Anthony" Facebook page on Saturday morning, with nearly 39,000 people having "liked" the page. In reaction to Anthony's July 17 announced release date, one person wrote, "... maybe she won't even make it out of jail

Resident: Bad day to be in pain

Patient's ordeal leads to case study at Citrus Memorial

The kidney stone weighed 18.9 milligrams. It would take 1,500 of them to make an ounce. At 4 millimeters in diameter, it was only twice the size of the head of a pin.

Yet its owner, Janet DeRosa, gave it 10 out of 10 on a pain scale.

"It was more painful than childbirth," said DeRosa, a retired schoolteacher and

mother who lives in Crystal River.

Pain was caused when a 4-millimeter kidney stone tried to move down a 3-millimeter wide ureter, a tube that propels urine from the kidney to the bladder. The nearly impossible mission would be similar to forcing a golf ball through a garden hose.

With intense pain, DeRosa went by ambulance to the emergency department of Citrus

Memorial Health System in Inverness, where she said she waited about nine hours in pain before getting treatment.

DeRosa spoke recently to the Chronicle's editorial board and published a letter to the editor in the June 30 edition. She described how she was sick to her stomach in addition to extreme pain. She felt distressed and humiliated. She was given no water.

"They might have had to do surgery, so they didn't

want anything in my stomach," DeRosa said. "I don't know what's wrong. They have a new 30-bed emergency department. So why would I wait nine hours when I'm in agony? This was just intolerable and I hope hard as I can to have this not happen to anybody

else." DeRosa also spoke to many CMHS staff members, and they listened.

"We are very sorry that she experienced this and

Aging boomers strain cities built for the young

NEW YORK — America's cities are beginning to grapple with a fact of life: People are getting old, fast, and they're doing it in communities designed for the sprightly.

To envision how this silver tsunami will challenge a youth-oriented society, just consider that seniors soon will outnumber schoolchildren in hip, fast-paced New York City.

It will take some creative steps to make New York and other cities age-friendly enough to help the coming crush of older adults stay active and independent in their own homes.

"It's about changing the way we think about the way we're growing old in our community," said New York Deputy Mayor Linda Gibbs. "The phrase 'end of life' does not apply anymore."

With initiatives such as using otherwise idle school buses to take seniors grocery shopping, the World Health Organization recognizes

New York as a leader in this movement.

But it's not alone. Atlanta is creating what it calls "lifelong communities." Philadelphia is testing whether living in a truly walkable community really makes older adults healthier. In Portland, Ore., there's a push to fit senior concerns such as accessible housing into the city's new planning and zoning policies.

Such work is getting a late start considering how long demographers have warned that the population is about to get a lot grayer.

"It's shocking how far behind we are, especially when you think about this fact — that if you make something age-friendly, that means it is going to be friendly for people of all ages, not just older adults," said Margaret Neal of Portland State University's Institute on Aging.

While this fledgling movement is

being driven by nonprofit and government programs, New York aims to get private businesses to ante up, too.

Last year, East Harlem became the city's first "aging improvement district." Sixty stores, identified with window signs, agreed to put out folding chairs to let older customers rest as they do their errands. The stores also try to keep aisles free of tripping hazards and use larger type so signs are easier to read. A community pool set aside senior-only hours so older swimmers could get in their laps without

faster kids and teens in the way.

On one long block, accountant Henry Calderon welcomes older passers-by to rest in his air-conditioned lobby even if they're not customers. They might be, one day.

"It's good for business but it's good for society," too, he said.

The size of the aging boom is staggering. Every day for the next few decades, thousands of baby boomers will turn 65. That's in addition to the oldest-old, the 85- to 90-somethings whose numbers have grown by nearly one-third in the past decade, with no signs of slow-

"monitoring, upgrading or downgrading, and controlling the number of units" that respond to a pursuit, must weigh such as:

- The seriousness of the originating offense and its relationship to community safety.
- Safety of the public in the area of the pursuit.
- Safety of pursuing officer(s).
- Time of day.
- Volume of vehicular traffic.
- Volume of pedestrian traffic.
- Location of pursuit (residential or rural).
- Weather conditions.
- Road conditions.
- Speeds involved.
- Whether the suspect being pursued is readily identifiable or subject to capture at another time or by another means.

In some instances, pursuits can be canceled. According to an annual analysis of pursuits provided by the sheriff's office, of the 19 pursuits last year, one was terminated.

While many law enforcement agencies have adopted no-pursuit policies, the Citrus County Sheriff's Office has opted to keep theirs.

When it comes to public scrutiny, he said it hardly ever is a win-win situation. For example, he explained if a deputy pursues a drunken driver and something bad happens, then people will want to know why wasn't there a pursuit, but if a deputy decides not to pursue a drunken driver and the driver winds up killing a family two miles down the road, then people will question why some-

thing wasn't done to stop him sooner.

"You're going to be judged no matter what," Burns said.

In addition, he added a deputy never knows whom they are attempting to stop. The fleeing suspect may be running because they have a suspended license or because they just murdered five people.

"You never know," he said.

But for John Phillips, assumptions are not strong enough to initiate something that could potentially lead to the loss of a life.

Phillips' 20-year-old sister, Sarah, was killed in December 2001 during a pursuit in Orange County. After the incident, he and his family began PursuitWatch.Org, a website that advocates re-writing law enforcement policies so officers only pursue suspects who have committed violent crimes.

So far, Phillips said he has

helped change policies for both the Orange County Sheriff's Office and the Orlando Police Department. And recently, he said he spent time in Tallahassee reviewing Florida Highway Patrol's pursuit policy.

Phillips said during a telephone interview Friday, leaving the choice to pursue or not to pursue up to a deputy is dangerous because even if a deputy is well-trained, many mitigating factors could hamper his good judgment, like adrenaline and tunnel vision.

Having a clearer definition on when to chase is essential in keeping both unsuspecting civilians and law enforcement officers

safe, he said. And he disagrees with the notion that officers should act because you never know if the person who is fleeing is just a small-time thief or a violent offender.

"We have to go off what we know, not what we assume," he said. "There is a difference between information and intelligence and we need to use intelligence to make better decision."

However, Burns doesn't feel making the decision on whether or not to initiate a pursuit is cookie-cutter enough to say deputies will only chase people with certain types of charges or a certain type of record.

"We can't say we're not

going to chase someone who has had too much to drink," he said.

Ultimately, he said, deputies don't want to get involved in pursuits — but sometimes it's necessary.

"No doubt pursuing increases the danger level," Burns said. "We struggle with it, too. It's always a topic of conversation, to pursue or not to pursue."

To keep safety in mind, part of a deputy's continuous training is to do pursuit training annually. New hires also go through the program.

For the last six years, Burns said the sheriff's office shuts off roads in a remote area of Citrus Springs to do scenario-based train-

ing, which not only focuses on in-pursuit training but also on what force to use once the pursuit has ended.

In addition, Burns said the sheriff's office is always aware of officer fatalities not only in Florida but across the county and uses tragic events, such as Mecklenburg's death, as an opportunity to determine, as an agency, if they are using the best practices and if there is any way to improve current policies.

"We can all learn something from someone else's situation," he said.

Hearse in bomb scare had fake weapons

Miami Gardens police said the hearse in the bomb scare that snarled traffic for hours had fake weapons inside.

Police chief Matthew Boyd told the *Miami Herald* Saturday the abandoned hearse was filled with a fake arsenal of automatic weapons, ammunition and rocket launcher. Boyd said "they were good replicas."

One item, also possibly fake, was turned over to federal authorities. No explosives were found.

Jail records show 28-year-old Lee E. Lewis is being held on \$15,000 bond. Police wanted to question him in connection with Friday's bomb scare when officers reported seeing firearms and other weapons inside the hearse, calling in the bomb squad.

A police flyer said Lewis was wanted on weapons violations. He served time for grand theft auto and drug charges.

Big Pine Key

Divers listen to underwater music

More than 500 divers and snorkelers descended Saturday in the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary for an underwater concert.

The Lower Keys Underwater Music Festival offered an offbeat salute to rock with divers costumed as "Eel-vis Presley," "Bob Marlin," "Joss Stone Crab" and other famed musicians.

Staged by radio station WWUS, the event took place at Looe Key Reef, about six miles south of Big Pine Key. The station's four-hour commercial-free broadcast was piped underwater via speakers suspended beneath boats positioned above the reef. Organizers said the sound quality was clear, with an ethereal effect caused by the sound waves' transmission through water.

"The sound of the music underwater is glorious," Laura Bohdan, of Ithaca, N.Y., said.

The broadcast playlist included ocean-themed offerings such as the Beatles' "Yellow Submarine," Jimmy Buffett's "Fins" and the theme song from Disney's "The Little Mermaid."

"The fish seemed to enjoy the music as much as I did," snorkeler and first-time festival participant Gail Coad of Sarasota said.

"They almost were dancing in unison to the melody, and the music just kind of surrounds you."

Miles, dollars for Alzheimer's

Over six thousand dollars were raised and more than seven thousand miles were traveled along US 50; all for Alzheimer's research.

Three Citrus County locals took the Rallye to Reno challenge sponsored by the MG Club.

Ron Fitch of Hernando drove his 1973 MGB GT; Gay Hiller of Floral City was the designated photographer for the trip; and Bill Emerson, also of Floral City, drove his 2007 Honda.

Their journey started on June 1, when they drove the pair of cars to Ocean City, Md. For the start of the Rallye on June 4.

In all, 150 cars signed up for the Rallye to Reno, but only 26 of them made the full journey along U.S. 50 to the final location in Sacramento, Calif., which they successfully reached on June 18.

On the return trip to Florida, the group traveled through Yosemite, which Emerson said was "a magnificent sight," and one of his favorite parts of the trip.

Each driver donated a penny for each mile their vehicle traveled along US 50.

Overall, the trio raised \$6,000 for Alzheimer's research. Dick Lunny, of Classic MG Magazine, handled setting up the charity part of the Rallye.

Emerson's car had more than 200 pounds of MG parts including a full set of tools, a floor jack, gallons of highest petrol, quarts of oil, pints of brake fluid, and 48 bottles of water.

Along the journey, the two Florida cars would stop to help any other MG vehicle

that was having car troubles and acted as mechanics, handing out parts if needed.

The cars consisted of older models of MG cars, with the oldest being a 1949. "Seeing all the old cars on the road at one time was just a beautiful sight," said Emerson.

After the Rallye ended on June 18, the local group headed for home.

Would they do it again? "Absolutely," all agreed.

Shuttle has nearly perfect day

CAPE CANAVERAL — The space shuttle Atlantis hasn't performed like a ship ready for retirement.

The first full day of the final flight of the aging space shuttle fleet — the most complicated machines ever built — was practically flawless.

NASA officials say the unusually small four-person crew of Atlantis worked through lunch Saturday and finished their tasks in near-record time. After Friday's launch they inspected the shuttle's heat shield for launch damage and prepared for Sunday morning's docking with the International Space Station.

So far Atlantis doesn't even have minor glitches. The worst problem is that the crew could not find an eye chart for a vision test, something that caused a chuckle among ground controllers.

"We couldn't be more happy with what we've seen from the crew and Atlantis," Flight Director Kwatsi Alibaruho said.

Often the first full day in orbit for shuttles has "little nuisance-type" glitches in setting up life in space and is usually one of the most difficult days in a flight, said shuttle mission management team chairman LeRoy Cain. He said hard work and good luck have paid off for Atlantis this time.

And yet when Atlantis lands later this month, it will join sister ships Discovery and Endeavour as museum pieces. The 30-year-old space shuttle program is ending as NASA hands over the task of flying astronauts to the space station to Russia and private U.S. companies. NASA will shift its efforts to deep space missions to an asteroid, and eventually Mars.

"Instead of focusing on the irony, I tend to look at the opportunity on this, the last shuttle mission of the program," Alibaruho said. "I'm very grateful the shuttle is finishing as it is."

Cain said mission managers focused on "finishing strong."

"We wanted the last flight to be the safest flight that we fly. We wanted the performance of the vehicle to be the best it's ever been," Cain said. "I think you're seeing it play out."

The great condition the shuttle is in "helps us enjoy the mission more" because flight controllers don't have to worry as much about little glitches, Alibaruho said Saturday in a press conference.

It also keeps the crew from having to divert from their tasks to fix problems, he said.

Another big factor is that the four astronauts are all space veterans who know what they are doing, Alibaruho said. With four astronauts instead of the normal seven, there "are fewer bodies for the crew to trip over" and there is less heat inside the shuttle, making it more comfortable, he said.

The veteran astronauts felt so good that they canceled their normally scheduled private conferences with mission control's doctors, Cain said.

Rain won't slow ride

Patriot Guard Riders take veteran's ashes to Kentucky

Under a canopy of gray skies Saturday morning, a group of bikers left Williston for Kentucky with the ashes of veteran John Waddy Jr.

The Patriot Guard Riders, a national volunteer group of motorcyclists to honor those who have fought for freedoms, were taking Waddy's remains to his family some 600-plus miles away in London, Ky.

A dozen bikes headed north to meet another group at the "Flying J" at the second exit in Georgia off Interstate 75. Only one bike, ridden by drive captain Sue Sakers and Mike Engles, will make the entire trek from Florida to Kentucky.

Like Waddy, Sakers and Engles are from Gainesville, but never met the man they'll help reunite with his family.

"He was supposed to go home two days before he died, but he never made it. So now we're honored to take him home," Sakers said.

Sakers and Engles have taken part in "hundreds of funerals, welcome homes and sendoffs," for veterans.

Sakers tries to learn as much as she can about each fallen veteran. She learned Waddy, who was 70 when he died in Gainesville, was private about his time in the U.S. Army, but served in a tank division in Germany.

"Mr. Waddy served his country in the '60s," said the Rev. Ernie Hawk during a brief ceremony before the group's departure. "When people were burning draft cards and going

to Canada, he volunteered. "And his family is extremely proud of what we're doing."

Light rain began to fall as Engles tried unsuccessfully to start his black, 2005 Harley Davidson Road Glide to lead the ride.

Engles said he discovered a dead battery at about 3 a.m. Saturday and was "taking a chance" on making it to Kentucky on what will be a two-day drive. Other members gave Engles a push to get his engine to fire.

As for the rain, Engles and none of the black-leather clad group seemed to mind.

"We'll get rained on several times before we get to Kentucky," Engles said. "Mr. Waddy didn't say, 'But wait, it's raining,' when he decided to serve our country."

The Hollands: a nuclear family

Bryant Holland heads a nuclear family.

Holland, his wife, Elaine, and their children have all worked for the Crystal River power plant.

Holland helped build the nuclear unit CR3. His grown children still work there.

"We're power house people," he said.

He retired "seven or eight years ago," but still works as a consultant with his wife.

"Different plants call us," he said.

The couple travels a lot: Utah, Virginia, Arkansas, Louisiana, even Israel. Holland brought back a shofar, a ram's horn used in the Jewish religion.

However, his visits are to power plants. And some are nuclear plants that need Holland's knowledge.

Each plant he's worked on may be just another power plant, but each has its own characteristics, Holland said. He can talk about them with understanding. He's a consultant on re-aligning turbines and machinist work.

"They just want me for what I've got between my ears," Holland said with a laugh. "And I ain't going if they don't hire my wife."

Not bad for someone who calls himself "an eighth-grade educated fool."

Holland started back in the 1960s. He worked on the

Crystal River power plant when it was operated by Florida Power Corporation.

"I built a large machine shop out there," Holland said with pride. "I saved them a lot of money in that machine shop. We took care of our plant."

The nuclear unit was ready Sept. 15, 1976, he said, and was officially brought online in 1977.

"When the concrete slab was poured, concrete came up a quarter mile out in the Gulf running through the underground streams," Holland said.

Florida Power sent him to work on many of their earliest power plants in cities around the state, such as Avon Park, Bartow and Sebring. Holland said the utility had 18 plants at the time.

"I travelled from plant to plant with the turbine crew," Holland said. "That crew had been together since way back in the '30s. We put turbines, everything in place. We did it all. We went from one to the other, building them up, getting them in shape."

That's how he got his training.

"We were schooled on it," Holland said. "Florida Power had G.E., Allis Chalmers and all of them come in and form a school and school us. Every piece of those turbines, what they did, what they were designed to do. Somewhere out of that I became a ma-

chinist. I made parts they couldn't buy."

Now, Progress Energy Florida is applying for a license extension.

"I don't have a problem with them extending the life of that plant 20 years," Holland said. "But these plants have lived their life out and if you replace it with one just like it, you need to replace it with an upgraded one. Should they build plants today, and I think they ought to, they should build plants that are capable of handling hotter fuel than what these old plants handled."

The issue is getting the containment wall repaired. "I'm sure Progress Energy

is trying to do whatever is right to get that wall fixed," Holland said. "And I'm sure NRC wants to get it done. As long as that spent fuel is safe, I don't have a bit of problem with them running that plant another 20 years."

He said that nuclear power was clean and efficient.

"I am committed to power plants and I always have been," Holland said. "I think there's a whole lot of stuff going on here that's even spiritual with these people."

Police wearing video cameras

OAKLAND, Calif. — Before hitting the streets, Oakland police officer Huy Nguyen's routine usually goes something like this:

Gun ready? Check. Bullet-proof vest strapped? Check.

Body camera secured? Check.

Wait, body camera? “It feels uncomfortable when I don't have it,” Nguyen said of the video camera that is smaller than a smartphone and is worn on his chest. “You can never be too safe.”

Oakland and hundreds of other police departments across the country are equipping officers with tiny body cameras to record anything from a traffic stop to a hot vehicle pursuit to an unfolding violent crime. The mini cameras have even spawned a new cable reality TV series, Police POV, which uses police video from Cincinnati, Chattanooga and Fort Smith, Ark.

Whether attached to shirt lapels or small headsets, the cameras are intended to provide more transparency and security to officers on the street and to reduce the number of misconduct complaints and potential lawsuits.

“First and foremost, it protects the officers, it protects the citizens and it can help with an investigation and it shows what happened,” said Steve Tidwell, executive director of the FBI National Academy Associates in Quantico, Va. “It can level the playing field, instead of getting just one or two versions. It's all there in living color, so to speak.”

In Oakland, where the de-

partment is still under federal supervision because of a case in which four officers were caught planting drugs on suspects a decade ago, the cameras are like another set of eyes, said Capt. Ed Tracey.

Last year the department began a pilot program with about a dozen patrol officers wearing the VIEVU (View) body camera, and now officials hope to equip at least 350 officers by the end of summer.

Tracey said the cameras are proving helpful to a budget-strapped police force that has reduced staff while covering what is still one of the country's most dangerous cities, even though overall crime has trended downward.

The cameras, which run about \$125 apiece, were brought instead of purchasing video equipment for squad cars, he said, noting that the smaller devices can also be mounted on a patrol

car dashboard. Officers are required to turn on their cameras for calls including traffic stops and possible searches. They are also required to download their video within a day and they are not allowed to edit or manipulate it. The video can be stored up to five years.

However, Tracey acknowledges some officers have had a hard time adjusting to the cameras.

“I commend the officers for their adaptability and professionalism. If they fight it or resist it, then our jobs become harder,” Tracey said. “It's not an easy sell, and I get some resistance, but others see the value in them and won't go on the street without it.”

Turning on the camera has become second nature, Nguyen said. “If the suspect takes off, the camera is on to capture it,” he said. “You have to train yourself to remember, ‘Lights on, camera on.’”

Camera footage can be handy last year, Nguyen said, after a man complained he and another officer were rude after pulling him over.

“We summoned a supervisor to the scene and took the man's complaint. Internal Affairs reviewed the video,” the officer said. “The complaint was dropped.”

Police officials from Seattle and Queensland, Australia, have recently visited Oakland to check out the cameras, which are used by more than 700 departments in the United States alone, said Heidi Traverso, a business development director for the Seattle-based VIEVU.







or an RV. For example, four of our most popular coastal parks have a combined occupancy rate of 90 percent throughout the entire year — not just during peak camping season,” Vinyard Jr. said in his letter.

He said his regret was that the DEP’s desire to meet the demand and provide this amenity to more Floridians was overshadowed by the timing of the process.

However, Vinyard Jr. said going forward, “we will be taking a different approach and I have asked staff to meet with local communities, state park citizen support organizations and other park stakeholders before formally proposing the addition of amenities or services, including family camping, at any of our state parks.”

Annette Long, who along with husband Mark, belong to a group called Save Our Suwannee, said dozens turned out for the hearing regarding Fanning Springs and many regarded the state plan as flawed.

“Having corporations build and run these places will make it all about profit and not about what is necessarily good for people or the environment,” she said.

“We told them Fanning Springs is too small for what they are proposing. The plan,

for example, will take up more than 10 percent of the park,” Long said.

She said she hopes while the DEP is evaluating its next move, they would respect the wishes of the communities near these parks.

“Because it will bring more traffic and more stress to the environment,” she added.

Fanning Springs is a 198.37-acre park in northwestern Levy County and is part of the lower Suwannee River drainage basin. The proposed facility at Fanning Springs will consist of 30 campsites and will cover 16.5 acres with water, electricity and sanitary sewer connections for a variety of camping equipment ranging from tents to larger self-contained recreational vehicles (RVs). The camping area will also include paved or stabilized roads and camping pads.



alive.” Someone else added a picture of Anthony manipulated to give her horns and included a backdrop of flames.

Dr. Phyllis Chesler, a psychologist who authored “Mothers on Trial,” said the case connected with people by the millions because it taps primitive instincts rejecting the thought of a mother ever doing anything to harm her child.

“Once a mother is merely accused, she stands convicted, because the instinct is to blame the mother,” she said. “She’s an outlaw even though she was found innocent.”

Richard Laermer, a public relations consultant who has written a book on short-lived

celebrity notoriety, said the case filled a void for some viewers.

“People in down times spend their waking hours looking for bright, bushy-tailed distractions,” he said. “Casey and her poor daughter’s sick and sad saga will fit the bill for now.”

Even those who weren’t as enraged said they found a sort of electronic catharsis in boiling down their emotions to 140 characters and posting them in anonymity on Twitter.

Wendy Thompson squealed when she got a text message that the verdict was in, but later was in disbelief as she heard the words “not guilty.”

Thompson, who lives just outside Detroit, read one tweet asking, “Soo is it like too early to ask #CaseyAnthony out on a date? Maybe?” and replied that the young

man should bring condoms.

“I would never say that to someone’s face, but I can say that behind my screen,” she said.

Anthony was sentenced to four years for lying to police but is close to completing that term because of time served and good behavior.

“Sucks for her,” Jillian Barrieu wrote on Facebook in response. “If I was her id (sic) rather stay safely in jail...”

Barrieu, of East Hartford, Conn., said she felt comfortable sharing her outrage with others online.

“It was a convenient place to vent where I knew people would mostly feel the same way as I do,” she told The Associated Press Friday in an interview conducted through Facebook messaging.

There are occasional voices of those that offer the view that prosecutors didn’t

prove their case. “She’s not guilty it’s already been proven get over it...stop wishing someone to be dead” one man wrote on one of the anti-Anthony pages. But those items are few and almost immediately met with ridicule.

On Yahoo!, Casey Anthony was a top search the week of her acquittal. The case was also fueling the popularity of those closely associated with it. Searches were up 1,000 percent for cable host Nancy Grace, who made almost nightly pronouncements insisting that “Tot Mom,” her nickname for Anthony, was guilty.

By Friday morning, nearly 2.6 million people indicated on Facebook that they would keep their porch lights on in honor of Caylee. “Caylee, I know you see this, I know you are hearing the prayers. This is for remembering you,” the organizers wrote on the page.

Also by Friday, more than 700,000 people had signed an online petition at Change.org calling for a federal “Caylee’s Law” making it a felony to not report a missing child in a timely manner.

The strong reaction has left its mark on the courtroom.

During a hearing Thursday, several media groups, including The Associated Press, asked the judge to release the names of jurors in the Anthony trial. Judge Belvin Perry said he normally doesn’t have an issue with releasing names, but he was mulling a delay to allow the anger — some of it pointed at the jury — to dissipate.

“You realize there are folks out there who want to do crazy things, like fillet people open, pour salt on them, and feed their legs to the piranhas,” Perry said.

He said he doesn’t want public reaction to translate into harm for people who “don’t have a choice about serving on a jury.”

Sandy Lisella of Hartland, Conn., said in a Facebook messaging conversation that while many posts she’s seen have simply been rants, others “are more substantial and thought-provoking, trying to make sense of how our legal system could conclude these results.”

“The way the story unfolded was unfathomable to the masses. It was like watching a sick movie!” Lisella said. “Social media, in a roundabout way, allows everyone to get involved in the causes that strike a chord in us.”

- **HCA Oak Hill Hospital** in Spring Hill posts its emergency department wait times to see a qualified medical practitioner on its website at www.oakhillhospital.com. It is updated about every 30 minutes using an average from the previous four hours.
- According to Richard Linkul, spokesman for Oak Hill, in most cases HCA hospitals rank below the national wait time average of one hour.
- **Seven Rivers Regional Medical Center** in Crystal River also posts its emergency wait times on its website at www.sevenriversregional.com.
- “It gives the community some buy-in to decide whether to go immediately or wait until later,” said Dorothy Pernu, spokeswoman for Seven Rivers.
- The time given, four minutes on one weekday afternoon, meant the amount of time a patient would need to wait to receive an initial assessment. The wait time for initial assessment averages between three and 10 minutes, Pernu said. Then, the patient could be directed to an area of the department that treats non-emergency injuries.
- According to Pernu, Seven Rivers has a system called ER Extra, which sets a goal for every emergency department patient to be seen, treated and discharged or admitted to the hospital within two hours. Often, the staff hits that goal. The average for the past month was two hours and 20 minutes.
- Seven Rivers also has a smartphone app to give wait times.

we are working diligently to resolve future issues so that they don’t exist,” said Linda McCarthy, director of nursing at CMHS. “We’re using her case as a study to find a way to treat the next patient who comes in pain so that this doesn’t happen. We’re attempting to resolve that issue.”

McCarthy said making a case study of DeRosa’s experience in the emergency department began as soon as the hospital received her complaint.

“We did not take her complaint lightly,” McCarthy said.

The emergency department was very crowded, DeRosa told the editorial board.

McCarthy said on June 20, 123 patients sought treatment. The usual number is 100 to 115. Between 4 and 8 p.m., 13 ambulances arrived with patients. Another 28 came through the front door. Seventeen patients were in critical need. All the beds were full. For several hours, 37 patients sat in the waiting room. Medical staff attended

DeRosa several times. They took her blood pressure, pulse, temperature and respiration levels at 10:04 p.m., 12:08 a.m., 1:14 a.m., and 2:30 a.m., according to records. All four times her pain scale was recorded as 10/10.

Although DeRosa felt extreme pain, her vital signs were in the normal range. That kept her at Level 3 on a scale of 1 to 5 for urgent need of care.

She was grateful when at last she was moved to a bed in a cubicle and got an intravenous saline solution with pain medication. The pain scale went down to 1/10.

At 5:15 a.m., DeRosa passed the kidney stone. Later, she was discharged.

McCarthy said CMHS offers good care.

“We meet all the safety standards nationally,” McCarthy said. “We are in very good standing with all the regulatory agencies and I would never discourage anyone to use the facility. If you truly have an issue, come here. We are the best in the area.”

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Remembering Betty Ford

Nancy Reagan calls her 'an inspiration'

LOS ANGELES — Former First Lady Nancy Reagan said Friday she was deeply saddened by news of Betty Ford's death, calling her an inspiration to many. Ford died Friday at the age of 93.

In a statement Friday, Reagan praised Ford's efforts to educate women about breast cancer and her work at the Betty Ford Center, a rehabilitation center.

Reagan praised Ford's courage in facing and sharing her personal struggles with Americans. Though talking about addiction was taboo, Ford faced her struggles with drugs and alcohol openly.

Reagan said Ford was former President Gerald Ford's "strength through some very difficult days in our country's history."

Quotes from Ford's 1978 memoir, 'The Times of My Life'

(On hearing her husband take the oath of office in August 1974)

"The words cut through me, pinned me to the floor. I felt as though I were taking the oath with him, promising to dedicate my own life to the service of my country. I was the wife of the President of the United States."

"What an astonishing place for Elizabeth Ann Bloomer to have come to."

(On meeting Ford)

Fall 1947: "Once I'd said marriage was the last thing on my mind, and he'd made it clear it was no part of his program either, we could relax, have a good time, go to all the football games. He wanted a companion, and I filled the bill. As for me, I liked handsome blond men, I found him physically attractive; I enjoyed his company and his friends."

November 1948: "When he first told me he was going to run for Congress, I didn't know what running for Congress meant. I was very unprepared to be a political wife, but I didn't worry because I really didn't think he was going to win. At that time, only old men went to Congress."

(On children and motherhood)

"I was always there at three-thirty when the older ones came home from school and in the days when we still had infants, I was a pretty average mother. If I had a quiet hour, I dived into a historical novel. ... I was a den mother. I was a Sunday-school teacher. I was an interior decorator and a peacemaker and a zoo keeper. We raised every kind of an animal in the world."

(On Ford becoming president)

"I had such belief in my husband. I never doubted he could do it. ... But I wasn't sure what kind of First Lady I would be. There was a great deal of whooping and hollering right at the beginning because I'd said Jerry and I were not going to have separate bedrooms at the White House, and that we were

going to take our own bed with us. ... Even now, after all those years of married life, I like the idea of sleeping with my husband next to me."

"I figured, OK, I'll move to the White House, do the best I can and if they don't like it, they can kick me out, but they can't make me somebody I'm not."

"I think it wasn't so much that the White House altered me in any essential way as that I found the resources with which to respond to a series of challenges. You never know what you can do until you have to do it. In the beginning, it was like going to a party you're terrified of, and finding out to your amazement that you're having a good time."

(On getting breast cancer)

"...I never felt hopelessly mutilated. After all, Jerry and I had been married a good many years and our love had proved itself. I had no reason to doubt my husband. If he'd lost a leg, I wouldn't have deserted him, and I knew he wouldn't desert me because I was unfortunate enough to have had a mastectomy. Neither of us can walk away from the other."

"Lying in the hospital, thinking of all those women going for cancer checkups because of me, I'd come to recognize more clearly the power of the woman in the White House. Not my power, but the power of the position, a power which could be used to help."

streets, the cracks are so bad, you're pushing the shopping cart and almost go flying," Rodriguez said, examining sweet potatoes that she pronounced fresher and cheaper than at her usual store. "This is so much easier."

More than 200 times, school buses have taken older adults from senior centers to supermarkets in different neighborhoods. It's just one of a variety of initiatives begun in 2009 by the New York Academy of Medicine and the city's government to address the needs of older residents. Already, they're showing results.

A city report found the number of crashes has dropped at busy intersections in senior-heavy communities where traffic signals now allow pedestrians a few more seconds to cross the street.

Benches have been placed in nearly 2,700 bus shelters to give waiting seniors a place to rest.

The city's aging taxi fleet is scheduled to be replaced by a boxier model designed to be easier for older riders and people with disabilities to open the doors and slide in and out.

On the Upper West Side, seniors snapped up a report card of grocery stores deemed age-friendly because they offer deliveries, have public bathrooms — a rarity in the city — and sell single portions of fresh meat, poultry or fish, important for people who live alone.

Artists volunteer to teach at senior centers in return for space to work on or display their own creations.

And a "Time Bank" is letting hundreds of people of different ages and with different skills essentially barter services. A retired English teacher may do some tutoring, for example, and use the credit she earns to get computer help from another volunteer.

Aging expert Andrew Scharlach of the University of California, Berkeley, sees a common thread in these changes and the work of other cities. Combat the social isolation that too easily sneaks up on older adults, and it has a huge impact not just on how many years they will live, but how well they live them.

Cities and suburbs were designed for younger people, full of stairs and cars, he explained. As they become increasingly difficult to navigate, older people gradually retreat.

Revamping a lot of infrastructure may not happen in a tough economy. But some communities are building age-friendly changes into planned upgrades or maintenance, such as New York's street crossings, or into requirements for future development.

The WHO's Beard says some changes aren't that costly, noting that seniors around the world say more benches and access to bathrooms will help them get out and about.

Among other cities' work: ■ The Atlanta Regional Commission's Lifelong Communities Initiative is pushing communities that help people age in place. Efforts are under way in six metro areas,

including work to adapt zoning codes to allow more of a walkable mix of housing and retail. The Mableton community of suburban Cobb County is planning that kind of a town square, and has opened a farmers market — on a weekday morning when seniors preferred to shop — and intergenerational community garden. To the east, DeKalb County is building a library near a senior center, planned senior housing and a bus stop. One town pilot-tested a shuttle for seniors to supplement bare-bones public transit.

The Atlanta Housing Authority is working with the commission to retrofit high-rise apartments that house a lot of older residents, with the goal to improve access to the surrounding community. At one site under construction, changes include a ramp entrance, safer sidewalk to the bus stop and more time for pedestrians to cross the street.

The overall move isn't without controversy.

Sometimes younger residents misunderstand and say they don't want to live in a retirement community, said

commission urban planner Laura Keyes.

She said boomers, who are classified as being born from 1946 to 1964, and millennials, the children of baby boomers who came of age in the new millennium, ultimately want the same things: access to shopping, green space, more freedom from the car. The idea is a mix of ages but where older residents don't need to move if their health fails.

Keyes became interested in age-friendly communities when visiting friends in nursing homes built in commercial districts — and saw that they had nowhere to take a walk.

■ Philadelphia is the oldest of the nation's 10 largest cities, with 19 percent of its residents over age 60 — and lots of multi-story rowhouses where seniors are stuck on one floor. "They become prisoners in their homes," said Kate Clark of the nonprofit Philadelphia Corporation for Aging.

In redesigning the city's zoning code, proposals are being debated that would allow seniors to rent out their upper floors, and to require

that a certain amount of new housing be what's called "visible" — with such things as ramp entrances, wide hallways and at least a half-bathroom on the main floor, she said.

With funding from the National Institutes of Health, the aging group's Allen Glickman is studying if seniors who live in a walkable neighborhood really are healthier as a result. He has found that social capital — think friendly neighbors, low crime and good sidewalks that encourage getting out — is as important to older residents as access to supermarkets, public transportation and good housing.

Also, there are calls for age-friendlier parks, with safer steps and places to walk apart from bikers.

To sustain momentum, Clark created GenPhilly, a network of 20- and 30-somethings interested in shaping the city they'll age in by raising senior issues in varying

professions.

■ Portland was part of WHO's initial study of what makes a city age-friendly, an initiative that helped bring about more handicapped-accessible cars for the city's light-rail system, Neal said.

Now, aging experts are among the advisers as the city develops a master plan for the next 25 years. One issue, Neal said, is how to develop more accessible housing when the city's anti-sprawl policy means a lot of narrow, multistory houses are being squeezed into empty city lots — near transportation but still not age-friendly with all the stairs.

Integrating senior-friendly changes into everyday city policies is less visible than, say, a new retirement home but it's ultimately the goal, says Scharlach, the aging expert.

New York also hopes for some economic return.

Consider La Marqueta in East Harlem. Fifty years ago, it was a bustling, five-block market, a weekly gathering spot for families. But economic

downturn left the city-owned building mostly empty for years. Now, as part of a \$1.5 million economic revitalization project, an industrial kitchen in the building will train low-income women to start their own food businesses. It joins the fish and butcher shop, a farmer's market, and a high-end food importer — and busing in the seniors once a month boosts the still thin customer traffic.

But it's more than a shopping day. A quick check from a health department nurse reassured 73-year-old Maria Ibarra that her blood pressure was OK, and she sat to catch up with friends over coffee. In another corner, a crowd listened as a university nutritionist explained how to safely freeze and thaw meat.

Art teacher Piedad Gerena showed off some of the bold landscapes and modern images her students at a nearby senior center learned to paint, and, to her delight, sometimes sell for up to \$200 apiece. "Many of these people have no families," Gerena said. "The art makes them feel happy."



Major shootout erupts in Mexico

MEXICO CITY — Mexican media is reporting a major mass shooting in a strip club in the northern Mexico city of Monterrey. The newspaper *Reforma* said gunmen opened fire on the club's clientele Friday night and killed 20 people. The strip club "Sabino Gordo" is in Monterrey's red-light district. Police would not confirm the death toll with The Associated Press and referred the AP to local prosecutors, who are not giving an official account of the shooting. High-powered weapons used in the shooting indicated it might have been a drug cartel confrontation.

Israel blocks airborne protest

TEL AVIV, Israel — Aided by Facebook, Israel on Friday prevented scores of pro-Palestinian activists from boarding Tel Aviv-bound flights in Europe, questioned dozens more upon arrival at its main airport and denied entry to 69, disrupting their attempts to reach the West Bank on a solidarity mission with the Palestinians. Israel tracked the activists on social media sites, compiled a blacklist of more than 300 names and asked airlines to keep those on the list off flights to Israel.

Panetta: al-Qaida defeat near

KABUL, Afghanistan — The U.S. and its allies are within reach of defeating al-Qaida after killing Osama bin Laden and gaining new insights about the terrorist group's other leading figures, new U.S. Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said Saturday.

The former CIA director offered an upbeat assessment about the prospects for ending al-Qaida's threat as he spoke with reporters the flying with him on his first visit to Afghanistan since taking over as Pentagon chief July 1.

In a separate interview later, Army Gen. David Petraeus, the top U.S. commander in Afghanistan, said he agreed with Panetta's as-

essment.

In the aftermath of the May 2 raid that killed bin Laden in Pakistan, the U.S. has determined that eliminating "somewhere around 10 to 20 key leaders" of al-Qaida would cripple the network, Panetta said. Those leaders are in Pakistan, Yemen, Somalia and North Africa, he added.

"We're within reach of strategically defeating al-Qaida," Panetta said, addressing reporters for the first time since succeeding Robert Gates as defense secretary.

"The key is that, having gotten bin Laden, we've now identified some of the key leadership within al-Qaida, both in Pakistan as well as in Yemen and other areas,"

he said.

"If we can be successful at going after them, I think we can really undermine their ability to do any kind of planning, to be able to conduct any kind of attack" on the United States. "That's why I think it's within reach. Is it going to take some more work? You bet it is. But I think it's within reach," Panetta said.

In an interview at the main U.S. military headquarters in Kabul, Petraeus said al-Qaida is on the run.

"There has been enormous damage done to al-Qaida," beyond the death of bin Laden, in the areas of western Pakistan where the group is believed operating, Petraeus said. "That has very significantly disrupted their efforts and it does hold

the prospect of a strategic defeat, if you will, a strategic dismantling, of al-Qaida."

Asked how he defines a "strategic defeat" for al-Qaida, Petraeus said it means that "they can't carry out strategically important attacks."

Petraeus, who is leaving his post this month and succeeding Panetta at the CIA, said there are small numbers of al-Qaida terrorists in Afghanistan. He said the al-Qaida "brand" is likely to remain a feature of the global terrain, even if the Pakistan-based core of al-Qaida is unable to carry out large attacks against the West.

Panetta said the 10 to 20 top terrorist figures in al-Qaida's hierarchy who are

now the focus of U.S. efforts include Ayman al-Zawahri, the designator successor to bin Laden as al-Qaida's leader.

Panetta said the U.S. believes al-Zawahri is living in the Federally Administered Tribal Areas of western Pakistan.

The only other name he mentioned was Anwar al-Awlaki, the U.S.-born Muslim cleric living in Yemen. The U.S. has put him on a kill-or-capture list.

"Now is the moment, following what happened with bin Laden, to put maximum pressure on them because I do believe that if we continue this effort we can really cripple al-Qaida as a major threat" to America, he said.

Rally for reform

Police fire tear gas at protesters, arrest 1,667

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia — At least 20,000 Malaysians defied government warnings by marching for electoral reforms Saturday, as police fired tear gas and detained more than 1,600 in the country's biggest political rally in four years.

The crackdown on the opposition-backed demonstration in Malaysia's main city, Kuala Lumpur, triggered criticism that Prime Minister Najib Razak's long-ruling coalition was unwilling to allow public dissent or make election laws fairer ahead of national polls widely expected by mid-2012.

Najib's administration declared the rally illegal and warned people repeatedly during the past month to avoid it. Officials insisted it was simply an opposition scheme to spark chaos and stir anti-government sentiment, while activists accused authorities of being afraid of a protest that could undermine their authority.

Authorities blocked roads, shut rail stations and deployed trucks with water cannons near the Independence Stadium in downtown Kuala Lumpur where activists sought to gather. More than 200 activists had been arrested over the past two weeks for promoting the rally.

The large number of demonstrators who showed up despite the threat of arrests and the disruptions in transport links bolstered claims by activists that the government had misjudged public opinion by not allowing what they insisted would have been a peaceful rally.

The crackdown "stirred a sense of outrage against the exhibition of

raw power by our government," said Ambiga Sreenivasan, head of the Bersih coalition of civic groups that organized the rally.

"What is the necessity for a show of might against right? No matter what, right will always prevail," she said.

Police said in a statement they detained 1,667 people Saturday in a clampdown called "Operation Erase Bersih." Those arrested included several senior opposition officials. Some were released after several hours, with police indicating most would not be held overnight.

Thousands tried to reach the stadium from various parts of Kuala Lumpur, chanting "Long live the people" and carrying yellow balloons and flowers as they marched.

Police fired numerous rounds of tear gas and chemical-laced water in repeated attempts to disperse the crowds, causing demonstrators to scatter into nearby buildings and alleys before they regrouped. Police helicopters flew overhead as a brief downpour failed to deter the protesters.

Witnesses said riot police armed with batons charged at some protesters and dragged them into trucks. Some were seen bleeding, but police could not confirm any injuries.

Anwar Ibrahim, Malaysia's top opposition figure, was being treated at a hospital for a "minor injury" he said he received when his group was hit by tear gas. The Malaysiakini news website said he had a knee injury.

"We were attacked from both corners but what was horrifying is that the police shot directly at the protesters, some of them clearly aimed at me personally, so my security assistants had to cover me and one was badly injured because the canister was shot direct, he is badly injured," Anwar told Associated Press Television News. "This is a simple portrayal of the extent of

desperation of brutal action approved by the Prime Minister Najib."

The demonstrators dispersed after a five-hour standoff with police. Only several hundred reached the stadium.

Prime Minister Najib insisted Saturday the protesters only represent a minority, and that most Malaysians support his administration.

"If there are people who want to hold the illegal rally, there are even more who are against their plan," the prime minister was quoted as saying by the national news agency, Bernama.

Organizers said 50,000 took part in the rally, but police claimed there were only up to 6,000. Other observers and participants said the total was between 20,000 and 30,000, noting that it was highly unlikely that police could have arrested a quarter of the demonstrators. An accurate count was impossible because they were scattered in various areas.

The rally has galvanized the opposition and has been credited for a surge in political awareness among the public in recent weeks.

Opposition leaders accuse Najib's National Front coalition of relying on fraud to preserve its 54-year grip on power, which has been eroded in recent years amid mounting complaints about corruption and racial discrimination. The government insists the current electoral policies are evenhanded.

The activists' demands include an overhaul of voter registration lists, tougher measures to curb fraud and fairer opportunities for opposition politicians to campaign in government-linked media. The National Front's mandate expires in mid-2013, but many analysts expect elections to be called by next year.

Supporters of the Bersih coalition were also planning solidarity marches over the weekend in foreign cities.

Chilling effect on women reporting rapes

NEW YORK — When Kristen Bakalar was pulled into a wooded area by a stranger and raped, she didn't think twice about reporting it.

It was only on the witness stand, as the 18-year-old was being quizzed about her sex life and about the precise color and length of her pubic hair, that she fully realized just how brutal the experience of bringing her rapist to justice would be.

Bakalar, now 30, doesn't pretend to know what happened between former International Monetary Fund chief Dominique Strauss-Kahn and the hotel maid accusing him of attempted rape. But she does know what it's like to be the accuser in a rape investigation.

"I can see victims out there contemplating coming forward, and saying, 'What's the point?'" said Bakalar, whose attacker is serving a 20-year sentence for the rape. "If they're on the fence, and they see this, instead of taking a step forward they might take a step back."

Advocacy groups for victims, as well as women's groups like NOW, share that fear.

"This certainly makes it a more challenging environment, both for victims and on the prosecution side," said Scott Berkowitz, president of RAINN, the Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network, of the troubled Strauss-Kahn investigation.

Like Bakalar, Berkowitz doesn't want to make judgments about the case against Strauss-Kahn, which prosecutors had insisted was strong before backtracking.

He said it's important to look at the broader context of sexual assaults in the United States — not the ones involving famous people, but the ones you never hear about — and the startlingly low percentage that ever get prosecuted to begin with.

According to Department of Justice figures compiled by RAINN, six out of 10 assaults are never reported to police. "Of the 40 percent that are reported, roughly half will never will never lead to an arrest — and of the cases remaining, many of those won't lead to prosecution," Berkowitz said.

"So when you boil it down, 15 out of 16 attackers will never spend a day in prison," he said.

**Park rangers:
 No search for bear
 that mauled hiker**

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. — Yellowstone National Park authorities will not try to capture a female grizzly that killed a backcountry hiker because the bruin was trying to defend its cubs when it was surprised by the man, a spokesman said Thursday.

The mauling of Brian Matayoshi, 57, of Torrence, Calif., was a purely defensive act, park spokesman Al Nash said. He added that Yellowstone typically does not try to capture or remove a bear in what he called “a wildlife incident.”

It was the first fatal grizzly attack inside the park in 25 years — but the third in the Yellowstone region in just over a year.

The attack occurred Wednesday, about 1 1/2 miles up a popular backcountry trail and not far from an area that is one of the park’s top attractions. Busloads of tourists normally gather there to take in the view from iconic Artist Point.

A stunning waterfall drops hundreds of feet in the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone, and trails along both canyon rims are normally crawling with tourists. Authorities closed the area but planned to reopen it in a few days, Nash said.

Matayoshi’s wife, Marilyn, escaped serious injury and no longer was at Yellowstone, park officials said. They declined to reveal her whereabouts.

Nash said the couple saw the bear twice on their hike.

The first time, they continued hiking. The second time, the grizzly charged them and Matayoshi told his wife to run. She called 911 on her cell phone, and other hikers in the area responded to her cries for help.

The woman told park officials she didn’t see the bear attack her husband. When the bear went for her, Nash said, she dropped to the ground. The grizzly lifted her off the ground by the day pack she was wearing and then dropped her.

Marilyn Matayoshi may have had scrapes and bruises but didn’t seek medical attention. Her husband died at the scene, Nash said. “We observed both bite marks and claw marks,” he said.

In this case, Nash said, park officials relied on Marilyn Matayoshi’s account of the attack in deciding not to pursue the grizzly. She told rescuers that the couple surprised the sow with her cubs — one of the most dangerous situations possible for humans en-

countering grizzlies.

Based on her account and understanding of grizzly behavior, rangers believe the bear instinctively charged to protect her young. The bear had never been documented before, never been tagged, and there was no reason to believe it had interacted with humans before, Nash said.

If so, the decision may very well have been different, he said.

“All indications are that this was a defensive attack,” Nash said.

Nash said there is no way to definitely know what the bear was

thinking or reacting to. He said the couple were day hikers and that it wasn’t known if they were carrying bear spray, pressurized hot-pepper residue in a can that is effective in stopping aggressive bears.

The decision not to track and kill the bear isn’t unprecedented.

In nearby Grand Teton National Park, officials decided not to intervene with a grizzly that wounded a man there in 2007.

Rangers determined that female was defending its cubs and didn’t pose a general threat to hu-

mans. That attack was considered natural behavior and officials didn’t believe the bear was any more dangerous than any other sow grizzly in the region.

This summer, the same bear and her cubs have drawn crowds of tourists to roadsides in the park.

Yellowstone and surrounding areas are home to at least 600 grizzlies — and some say more than 1,000. Once rare to behold, grizzlies have become an almost routine cause of curious tourists lining up at Yellowstone’s roadsides at the height of summer season.

Barbara and Carl Waxman, Baltimore residents making their first trip to Yellowstone, were dismayed when they found their path to Artist’s Point blocked by barricades in the aftermath of the mauling.

Avid photographers, they had hoped to shoot a lookout where they had read a stunning early-morning rainbow could be seen above the falls.

“It’s like not being able to see the Mona Lisa,” Barbara Waxman said. “If they gave me the option, I’d go to that point in a second, grizzly bear or no.”

Some visitors said they didn’t know about the attack. Tourists staying at a campground in nearby Canyon Village said no rangers or park personnel told them about it.

Nash said park officials didn’t go campsite to campsite to warn visitors of the attack, but they did fly over the area by helicopter to ensure the area was clear.

“If we had any concerns for visitor safety we would take whatever measures would be necessary to protect them,” he said.

While lamenting the death, officials said they didn’t want to overemphasize the danger to visitors.

“This is a wild and natural park,” said Diane Shober, director of the state Wyoming Travel and Tourism agency. “At the same time, the likelihood of this happening again is small.”

It was the park’s first fatal grizzly mauling since 1986, but the third in the Yellowstone region in just over a year amid ever-growing numbers of grizzlies and tourists roaming the same wild landscape of scalding-hot geysers and sweeping mountain vistas.

Tourists have been flooding into Yellowstone in record numbers: 3.6 million last year, up 10 percent from 2009’s 3.3 million, also a record.

In June 2010, a grizzly just released after being tranquilized for study killed an Illinois man hiking outside Yellowstone’s east gate.

Peru celebrates Machu Picchu

LIMA, Peru — Tourists love the enigmatic Inca citadel of Machu Picchu high in Peru’s Andes. They may love it too much.

As the country prepares to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the rediscovery of the “Lost City of the Incas” on Thursday, archaeologists are warning that a heavy flow of visitors and poor administration are

threatening one of the wonders of the world.

The Incas built Machu Picchu atop an Andean peak 7,970 feet (2,430 meters) high, with a breathtaking view across the inhospitable abysses that surround it. Some experts believe it was a refuge for one or more Inca rulers, others that it was a religious sanctuary.



Lawmakers seek new immigration museum

WASHINGTON — Several members of Congress called Thursday for a presidential commission to study the formation of a "melting pot museum" in Washington to tell the history of immigration and migration that formed the nation.

Democratic Virginia Rep. Jim Moran introduced legislation Thursday that calls for studying the creation of a National Museum of the American People without any federal taxpayer funds. The bill had 11 other co-sponsors.

"The people of the United States do not have a comprehensive and accurate picture of all the peoples who created and continue to build the nation," the bill says.

The Smithsonian is developing an African-American history museum that is scheduled to open in 2015. Other groups have proposed museums devoted to the history of women, gays and other groups.

Any well-done museum can draw a broad audience of those interested in history, he said, but cautioned any museum that simply celebrates different groups.

Appomattox officials ask NPS to upgrade park

APPOMATTOX, Va. — Appomattox County officials want the National Park Service to upgrade Appomattox Court House National Historical Park before the 150th anniversary of the end of Civil War.

Media outlets report that the Appomattox County Board of Supervisors made the request in a resolution approved Tuesday.

The resolution calls for a major renovation and restoration of the park before April 2015.

In June, the National Parks Conservation Association released a report that said the Appomattox park needs upgrades in staffing, historic structures and display capabilities.

NH's Hampton Beach rated water 'superstar'

HAMPTON, N.H. — Consistently clean water at New Hampshire's Hampton Beach State Park has helped the beach receive a "superstar" beach ranking from a national group.

The National Resources Defense Council released this year's water quality report and rated Hampton

Beach one of four Superstar beaches because they have a perfect recording of water quality tests over the past three years, indicating good water quality.

Two other beaches are in Delaware. The fourth is in Minnesota.

The council ranked 200 beaches across the country.

The report found that contaminated runoff is the most commonly reported cause of poor beach water quality.

Boeing: India will need 1,320 new planes

NEW DELHI — Boeing has forecast a \$150 billion market for passenger airplanes in India over the next 20 years driven by a booming economy.

Indian airlines will need to buy around 1,320 new airplanes to meet the demand of an expanding aviation sector, Boeing India President Dinesh Keskar said in a statement Wednesday.

"Robust growth with new economic prosperity among a massive Indian population, discretionary incomes, business progress and access to airports will increase airplane demand," Keskar said.

India's burgeoning middle class has switched from traveling by train to flying as an increasing number of private domestic airlines have opened up over the last decade.

Keskar said Indian carriers were becoming profitable and with the economy expected to maintain its upward trend, both air travel and air cargo markets would grow.

This year's outlook is more optimistic than last year's market outlook which had predicted that India would require 1,150 new aircraft worth \$130 billion over the next two decades.

Apart from the private airlines, others including state-owned Air India are looking for replacement airplanes as they retire aging and less-efficient jets.

At present, one in 200 Indians flies just once a year. That figure is expected to grow exponentially, with the domestic market recording the highest growth rate for aviation globally, according to aviation experts.

In January, budget airline Indigo signed a mega \$15.6 billion deal for 180 A320 aircraft from Airbus Industrie, an order the European aircraft manufacturer hailed as the biggest single order in terms of the number of jets in aviation history. Airbus plans to

deliver the jets between 2016 and 2025.

Apart from passenger aircraft, India is also shopping for military planes.

In June, India signed an agreement to purchase 10 Boeing's C-17 Globemaster III cargo and troop-carrying planes, making India the biggest foreign buyer of the aircraft.

The planes are expected to be delivered to India's air force in 2013 and 2014.

Blue Angels to perform at Yankee Air Museum

VAN BUREN TOWNSHIP, Mich. — The Yankee Air Museum says the Blue Angels military demonstration team is coming to southeastern Michigan this month.

The museum says the U.S. Navy's Blue Angels will perform during the "Thunder Over Michigan" air show. It's scheduled for July 23-24.

The Blue Angels uses F/A-18 Hornets. The air show also includes the Air Force's F-16 Viper East Demo Team.

The museum is at Willow Run Airport, near Ypsilanti in Wayne County's Van Buren Township.

The site receives an average of 1,800 visitors a day and the maximum allowed by authorities is 2,500. Already, the former farming village of Aguas Calientes that is used as a jumping-off point for tourists has grown into a town of 4,000 inhabitants with five-star hotels and restaurants.

In some places, authorities have noticed soil erosion and damage to vegetation, Juan Julio Garcia, regional director of Peru's culture ministry, told The Associated Press.

Tourism companies and some local officials constantly pressure authorities to allow even more tourists, arguing it would benefit local communities.

Cultural guardians fear irreparable damages if the tourist flow surges, and they are especially concerned by official plans to build a highway to the remote 15th-century ruin.

Tourists now must reach Machu Picchu by foot or by a scenic, zigzagging narrow-gauge train ride.

"In one way or another, the train controls the flow (of tourists). There is a maximum capacity on the train and this maximum capacity determines how many people can reach the monument. In contrast, with a road, any person or tourism company can reach the site and try to enter the sanctuary," Garcia said.

But rains washed out the rail route in January 2010, trapping 4,000 tourists in the towns of Machu Picchu and Aguas Calientes for five days. Without road access to the area, the government had to airlift tourists out by helicopter. In Aguas Calientes, which serves as a tourist base for Machu Picchu, there were shortages of food.

In September, Peru's Congress approved construction of an access road to Machu Picchu.

That raised a red flag at UNESCO, which inscribed the Inca stronghold on its World Heritage list in 1983, boosting the site's fame and making it eligible for international technical support. The U.N. agency had already expressed concern about management of the site. It said in 2008 that there were "urgent problems with deforestation, the risk of landslides, uncontrolled urban development and illegal ac-

cess to the sanctuary."

The U.N. agency threatened to put it on its list of endangered sites if the road project is not canceled, a move that would be a blow to Peru's prestige.

Peruvian tourism authorities insist they are protecting the monument. Carlos Zuniga, head of the Foreign Trade and Tourism office for the Cuzco region, said that officials have given UNESCO proof of concern for Machu Picchu by completing a plan for use of the sanctuary and by issuing a decree that funds generated by tourism to Machu Picchu be used in maintaining the site. Previously, earnings were sent to the central government in the capital, Lima.

Garcia, of the culture ministry, said local authorities support the highway project because they want to break the monopoly of PeruRail, the train company owned by Chilean and British interests. Aguas Calientes Gov. Antonio Sinchi Roca said the monopoly hurts the local economy. "Many entrepreneurs who could reach the zone don't because the cost of transportation is so high."

Machu Picchu was largely unknown to the outside world, abandoned and covered in highland jungle, until July 7, 1911, when Yale University historian and explorer Hiram Bingham reached Machu Picchu and later announced its existence. He became famous as the site's modern discoverer, though Peruvian Agustin Lizarraga had been there first. He wrote on one of the citadel's stones with a piece of charcoal: "Lizarraga, July 14, 1902, for posterity."

For decades, the site's remoteness, as well as the cost of reaching it, kept foreign tourists at bay. In the 1980s, visitors shunned Peru because of a raging guerrilla conflict that ended in 1999.

In 1991, about 77,000 tourists visited. That number has risen about tenfold over the past decade, reaching more than 800,000 in 2009, the year before the rail line washed away.

The director of Machu Picchu Archaeological Park, Fernando Astete, said the main problem facing the site today is that the area is controlled by rival municipal authorities contending for tourism dollars.

"Local authorities in and around the zone don't know what UNESCO is, they know

nothing about it. They don't know they are in a protected area," Astete told The AP.

Many authorities view the citadel as "a marketing issue" and don't make decisions based on technical criteria about conservation of the site, Garcia said.

An example occurred in 2000, when a beer company was allowed to film a television commercial in Machu Picchu. The heavy arm of a crane used in the filming fell onto and damaged the emblematic Intihuatana Stone, which many believe to be sacred.

Peru's government had planned a big celebration in the ruins themselves for Thursday's anniversary, but called that off when UNESCO objected.

Last July, a grizzly killed a Michigan man and injured two others in a nighttime campground rampage near Cooke City, Mont., northeast of the park.

Grizzlies are an omnivorous species with a diet of berries, elk, fish, moths, ants and even pine nuts. In 2009, a federal judge re-

stored threatened species protections for Yellowstone grizzlies, citing beetle-caused declines in the numbers of whitebark pine trees in the region. The protections had been lifted in 2007.

Officials routinely urge visitors to take precautions: Stay on designated trails, carry bear spray, hike in groups of three or more, and make noise in places where a grizzly could be lurking.

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Tune in, turn off, unplug

Taping TV shows has become a habit for me; I never watch anything live anymore. I use the word "taping," but of course I use a DVR, and I should say I "record" TV shows.

Compared to the bad old days (10 years ago), when I had to program my VCR to the time and the day I wanted to record a show, the DVR makes it so simple. Click on the program you want to record and, presto chango, you're set.

No mess, no fuss. And with the simple press of a button, the DVR jumps ahead 30 seconds so I no longer have to sit through commercials for medicines that will cure diseases I don't have. Yet.

By skipping commercials, I can watch the evening news in 22 minutes — usually less because I also skip through the heartwarming stories at the end of each broadcast. I'm not against heartwarming stories, but that's not why I'm watching the news. If I wanted to watch heartwarming, uplifting, human-interest stories, I would watch a show called "Heartwarming, Uplifting, Human-Interest Stories," not one called "The Evening News."

I used to think I would spend the time I saved watching commercials to clean the house or write the great American novel, but it turns out I really use it to

watch more TV. I can zip through "So You Think You Can Dance" and "The Voice" in half the time it would take to watch them live.

When the DVR came along, I put my VCR in the broom closet, thinking that someday I'd hook it up again and watch all the hand-labeled videotapes I'd never gotten around to watching. It has never happened. It sits in there with the old CD player that iPods made obsolete and the boxes of printer cables and connectors that wi-fi made obsolete and the giant speakers that earbuds and desktop speakers made obsolete.

When I add up all the money spent on electronics that are too old to use but not old enough to sell as antiques, I want to weep. There are boxes of 156KB floppy disks in there and expensive computer backup devices that can hold 20MB of data, or about 10 times less than the tiny card in my digital camera. That camera will end up in the broom closet of broken dreams soon, along with several first-generation cell phones because they are so hopelessly old-fashioned and out of date. It would cost me money to sell them on eBay.

When I finally broke down and bought a big flat-

screen TV, I was shocked by how heavy and awkward the old one was. It was heavier than an air conditioner and twice as clunky. It was, after all, 10 years old. How am I ever going to get rid of all this junk? I should ask the producers of "Hoarders" to come visit my house. I would promise to pretend to be very upset when they volunteered to clean out the place for me.

Now that I'm all modern, miniature and up to date, I figured all my technological problems were a thing of the past.

Then I read in the paper that my little DVR uses 10 percent more electricity than a modern refrigerator. It's an energy hog that's on 24 hours a day, even though it's recording only two or three hours a day. You can't really turn it off without unplugging it.

Even though it doesn't make ice cubes or keep my vegetables crisp, it is adding about \$12 a month to my electric bill. It turns out that my TV is also on when I'm not watching it, and so is my computer.

I went back and looked at the recordings of my evening news shows on TV. None of them mentioned it. I guess they zip through things they don't want to hear about, just like I do.

Sister not carrying her share of financial load

Dear Annie: A year ago, my sister "Lois" left her boyfriend. She had no place to live, so my husband and I offered to let Lois and her four children move in with us. I have three teenagers myself, so our house became very crowded.

At the time, Lois was attending nursing school. She received government assistance and child support, and offered to help buy food for the household. I watched her kids, fed them healthy dinners and got them ready for bed. When Lois later got a part-time job, we asked her to help pay for a portion of the electric and gas bills (about \$125 a month).

Here's the problem: Two months ago, Lois suddenly became interested in the groceries I was buying and how much they cost. She told me that her child support and government assistance were intended only to feed HER family of five. It felt like a slap in the face. I have stopped buying groceries for her kids, but I have watched her buy them junk food and fatty snacks. When I mentioned the unhealthy choices she was making, she told me to mind my own business.

Since Lois is no longer helping to pay for groceries as she promised or contributing anything other than a small portion of the utility bills, I think she should find somewhere else to live. If she can afford to go out with friends every weekend and rent a car to take vacations, she can pay a decent rent.

My parents and siblings say I'm being selfish, but I haven't seen any of them offer to let Lois live with them for \$125 a month. What do you say? — **Feeling Used**

Dear Used: You are understandably angry with Lois, who doesn't seem to appreciate the kindnesses you have extended. You need to talk to her, in a loving, sisterly way, and explain how you feel.

We agree she should find her own place, and perhaps other family members will offer to help her do that. But if she cannot manage it financially and you are still willing to let her stay, discuss a reasonable amount of rent that she can afford and that will not make you feel like a doorman.

Dear Annie: When inviting a couple to celebrate their anniversary at a local restaurant with a group of people, should

the host select the restaurant or ask the honoree if she has a preference? (Please note that the honoree is known to have preferences.) In our case, when the hostess learned that the honoree did not like her choice, she felt insulted and canceled the event.

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

Robbed by his pinstriped pals after the ball sailed into the left-field seats, showered by ovations from his fans, Derek Jeter stood alone — the first New York Yankees player to reach 3,000 hits. His first home run at Yankee Stadium this year, too. A fitting crown for the captain.

With a swift swing of his shiny black bat, Jeter jolted himself into historic company, hitting a solo home run off Tampa Bay ace David Price in the third inning Saturday. He became the 28th major leaguer to hit the milestone and joined former teammate Wade Boggs as the only players to do it with a home run.

“Congratulations, first of all, to Derek Jeter on joining the 3,000 hit club. It is an exclusive honor, achieved by only a select group, that not many people can call their own. It is a monumental achievement,” Boggs said in a statement. “I had the opportunity to play with Derek when he was a rookie in 1996, and I had no doubts

Rivals hold fire at Tour

SUPER-BESSE, France — The attacks never came on the first mountain trek of the Tour de France, as defending champion Alberto Contador and his main rival Andy Schleck both held fire and let others contest victory during the eighth stage.

There was much hype about the possibility of a first hilltop duel following a crash-marred week of nervous racing on flats roads.

But with much harder climbs to follow in the Pyrenees and Alps, three-time Tour winner Contador preferred to save energy on Saturday’s stage in the Massif Central, which Rui Alberto Costa held on to win after a solo breakthrough.

When Costa surged ahead late on the 117-mile trek from Agurande to Super-Besse, the likes of Alexandre Vinokourov of Kazakhstan and Philippe Gilbert of Belgium tried — and failed — to chase the Portuguese rider down.

But, with neither Gilbert nor Vinokourov a real threat for the overall title, Contador was not going to follow them for the sake of it. The Spaniard has bigger battles to win later on, harder mountains to climb.

Agassi: ‘I fell in love with tennis far too late’

Gone was the self-styled, long-haired rebel who rose to the No. 1 ranking in the world but, it now seems, didn’t enjoy a single moment of it. Instead, Agassi turned his speech into a love letter of sorts for tennis and even the father who pushed him — not always gently — to play, commanding him, at the age of 5, to someday win Wimbledon.

“I fell in love with tennis far too late in my life. But the reason I have everything I hold dear is be-

cause tennis has loved me back,” Agassi said. “If we’re lucky in life, we get a few moments where we don’t have to wonder if we made our parents proud. I want to thank tennis for giving me those moments.”

Sprinkling his comments with gratitude for fellow Hall of Famers Billie Jean King, Arthur Ashe and “the woman who still takes my breath away every day, Stefanie Graf,” Agassi also recounted a meeting with Nelson

3 years later, Marta gets another shot at Solo

DRESDEN, Germany — Bent at the waist, her back to the goal, Marta buried her face in her hands.

Her left-footed blast from 6 yards looked certain to be a winner, the goal that would give Brazil's women the Olympic gold medal and their first title at a major tournament. How, Marta would ask afterward, did she not score?

Hope Solo, that's how. "I just remember Marta being point-blank cracking it, and Hope stretching out and getting a hand on it," U.S. captain Christie Rampone said. "Seeing it out of the corner of your eye, yeah, you think it's going in. It gave us that adrenaline going forward."

Fired up by Solo's high-light-reel save, the Americans would go on to claim their second straight Olympic gold medal in Beijing. Brazil, eager to escape the shadow of its brilliant men's team, went home bitterly disappointed, runners-up for the third straight time

at a major tournament.

The Brazil-United States matchup in Sunday's World Cup quarterfinals is their first since that 2008 Olympic final, and Brazil would seem to have the advantage. Marta remains the most dynamic player in the game, the FIFA player of the year for five years running, and Brazil had little trouble winning its group. The Americans, meanwhile, lost for the first time in World Cup group play and are in danger of making their earliest exit ever from the tournament.

But the Americans still have Hope, and both sides are well aware of it. "Of course she's a great player," Marta said after Brazil's practice Friday night. "But I hope I would have the opportunity to score."

Marta hasn't scored yet against Solo in international play — but neither have any of her teammates. Solo has started the last four games against Brazil, with the U.S. winning each 1-0. Ironic, considering it was then-coach Greg Ryan's decision to sit Solo against Brazil in

the semifinals of the 2007 World Cup that sparked such a firestorm.

The U.S. was routed 4-0, its worst loss in history, and Solo ripped Ryan's decision afterward, saying, "It was the wrong decision, and I think anybody that knows anything about the game knows that." Ryan kicked Solo off the team, not even letting her be on the bench for the third-place game. A month later, Ryan was essentially fired.

"We all respect Hope and we all love Hope," Lauren Cheney said. "We know she's a great person and a great soccer player."

Just check out that save in 2008.

Brazil had dominated much of the Olympic final with its dazzling speed and control, forcing Solo to make one save after another. But it looked as if

Brazil would break through in the 72nd minute when Marta made a run down the left side. Kate Markgraf and Heather Mitts caught up to her and took the ball away for a second, but Marta got it back and blasted a shot from just outside the 6-yard box.

Solo, tucked alongside the near post, leaned forward, thrust up her right arm and smacked the ball away.

"Amazing. Amazing," Shannon Boxx said, still in awe three years later. "I just remember thinking, 'Oh my God, that's just going in.' And then knowing Hope saved it. ... I'm just glad she's on our side because teams that face us, they know she's the last person before the ball goes in the net. It gives us confidence, and it probably puts a little bit of extra fear into the other team."

Much has been made about the Americans' recent vulnerability, with the two-time World Cup champions losing four games since November after going unbeaten for more than two years. But Solo was the starter for only one of those

defeats, and even Iker Casillas would have been hard-pressed to stop Lisa Dahlkvist's penalty or Nilla Fischer's deflected free kick in the 2-1 loss to Sweden on Wednesday night.

(Solo did come on for the second half of the 2-1 loss to England in April, her first game back after the shoulder surgery that kept her out of World Cup qualifying, but England had already scored both its goals.)

Including the two goals against Sweden, Solo has allowed just five since the Olympic final.

"We're so confident with her back there," Heather O'Reilly said. "It's also nice to see the frustration on attackers' faces when they think the ball's in the back of net and she's able to get her fingertips on a shot that nobody else might be able to."

Of course, Marta can do things nobody else can, either.

She scored twice against Norway, and had a hand in two of Brazil's three goals against Equatorial Guinea in Wednesday's final group

game. Despite being tightly defended, she made a low pinpoint cross into the center to set up a score by Cristiane, then won a penalty that Cristiane converted.

"There's a rivalry, definitely," Solo said. "We know each other, we respect one another, we've played on All-Star teams together. Yet we don't speak a lot — which is the nature of the mystique of a goalkeeper against one of the top goal scorers in the world."

Marta did get a goal off Solo in the WPS last year.

"So I hope I can score again on Sunday," she said. But there's more to this game than simply a Marta vs. Solo showdown.

Brazil-U.S. has developed into one of the game's great rivalries, with Brazil losing to the United States in the last two Olympic finals but knocking the Americans out of the World Cup in 2007. The U.S. beat Brazil in the 1999 semifinals, then beat China for its second World Cup title.

"It's Brazil-U.S. It's a big game," Marta said. "It's special."

U.S. title 'wide' Open

Miyazato leads major; Stricker ahead at Deere

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — For months now, the battered country of Japan has been looking for a lift.

By using her blossoming golf game as a tool for charity, 21-year-old Mika Miyazato could turn the U.S. Women's Open into the feel-good story her country seeks — and back it with some cold, hard cash.

Miyazato shot 67 to grab the lead at 5-under-par 137 at the halfway point at the Broadmoor on Saturday, where rain once again stopped play early and brought up the prospect of a grueling, 36-hole Sunday.

She had a one-shot lead over Ai Miyazato — who is not related but is from the same city, Okinawa. When the Miyazatos return to the course, they will play in the final group together, each wearing red and white pins they created to raise awareness for the thousands of victims in a country ravaged by an earthquake, tsunami and the resulting nuclear catastrophe.

The pins have Japanese characters that translate to "Never Give Up Japan."

For Mika, it goes beyond mere symbols, though. She is donating all her winnings from the 2011 majors to the Red Cross for the recovery cause in her home country. That has already totaled more than \$100,000 thanks to top-10 finishes at the first two majors. First place at the U.S. Open is worth around \$600,000.

"Winning majors is what I strive for," she said. "And to donate all of my earnings from the majors, I hope to give positive things to the people who are around the disaster area."

What a way to make a name for herself — even though Mika has spent most of her young career being confused with Ai Miyazato. Ai has six LPGA Tour victories to none for Mika and she has spent a longer time on the radar as the next hope to become the best golf superstar in a country that loves the game.

Not that Mika has complained much when people get them mixed up.

"Everybody thinks we're sisters," she said. "That way, everybody can remember me, because Ai is playing great."

For the final 36 holes, the Miyazatos will also be grouped with South Korea's I.K. Kim, who returned early Saturday with the lead, played the last four holes of her second round, then finished the day two shots behind — in third place at 3 under.

In an attempt to bring a Sunday conclusion to a tournament that has fallen behind after three straight afternoons of rain, the

USGA will send threesomes off from the 1 and 10 tees Sunday and will not re-pace the groups after the third round. It brings up the prospect, however slight, of having a victory celebration on the ninth green.

Almost certain, though, is that the final 36 holes will be as much a test of endurance as shot-making. Play is set to resume at 6:45 a.m. local time and if there are no interruptions, tournament director Ben Kimbal said the last putt will drop at 7:07 p.m.

The only other players to reach the halfway point under par were Stacy Lewis and Ryann O'Toole, both at 1 under.

Lewis led for much of the second round before making bogey and double-bogey in the hour after play resumed following a rain delay Friday evening. She played the last two holes of the second round Saturday morning and finished with a 73.

Defending champion Paula Creamer was in a six-way tie at even.

"You're either above it and move on and you just kind of accept that this is what it is," Creamer said, "or you dwell about it and let it get to you, and affect your game out there."

Four-time major winner Yani Tseng, trying to complete the career Grand Slam, was 4 over, nine shots out of the lead. After finishing her frustrating round Saturday morning, she said she was having more trouble dealing with the Broadmoor's hard-to-read greens than the weather.

But make no mistake. The East Course is taking a hunk out of these players. It's a 7,000-yard monster at 6,400 feet in elevation — a long walk on a normal day, let alone a multiple-round grind under major-championship conditions. Rounds averaged about 5 1/2 hours Saturday.

Stricker takes 2-stroke lead in Deere Classic

SILVIS, Ill. — Steve Stricker stood in the bunker left of the first fairway, eyed his ball in the rough on the edge of the trap, then looked at the flag 122 yards away.

If it felt like he'd been in that position before, well, that's because he had.

"I had that same stance in my pro-am," he said. "Same bunker, same exact spot. I was right in the same spot."

All he wanted to do was get the ball on the green, which he did. And then came the shot of the day, a 75-foot putt for birdie that led to an 8-under-par 63 Saturday and a two-stroke lead after three rounds of the John Deere Classic.

"I was just trying to get a two-putt and par and move on," Stricker said. "To make a putt like that, you don't expect to, nor are the odds in your favor to make a putt like that. But it went in with perfect speed and it got me going."

Stricker fashioned his best round of the year while closing in on his third straight victory in the tour-

namment. He's at 20-under 193 following a par on save on 18, where he twice hit into bunkers before drilling a 15-foot putt.

That put Stricker in a good spot because he's won the last four times he held the outright lead going into the final round. Stricker said he often hears stats like that, but insisted he doesn't remember them.

"I don't put a lot of stock in numbers past, present, whatever," he said. "I just try to go out there and do the things that I'm capable of doing. You've just got to stick to your own game and that's what I've been able to do the last four or five years."

Zimbabwean Brendon de Jonge is alone in second at 195 after matching Stricker's 63. Second-round leader Chez Reavie, who started the day two strokes up on Stricker, shot 68 and was 17 under, one ahead of Kyle Stanley (65).

With one more solid round, Stricker would join an elite group. Only 20 times previously on the tour has someone won a tournament three years in a row.

Kyle Busch wins inaugural Cup race at Kentucky

SPARTA, Ky. — Kyle Busch won the inaugural Sprint Cup race at Kentucky Speedway on Saturday night, pulling away from Jimmie Johnson on a restart with three laps to go to collect his 99th NASCAR series victory.

Busch won the Trucks race here on Thursday night and had little trouble finding his way to Victory Lane for the second time in three days at the 1.5-mile oval. He started from the pole and dominated long stretches of the 400-mile race to pick up his third Cup win of the season.

David Reutimann slipped past Johnson to finish second. Ryan Newman was fourth, followed by Carl Edwards and Matt Kenseth.

The first visit by NASCAR's top series provided few fireworks on the track, but plenty off it as traffic issues caused major problems for the crowd of over 100,000.

Those who made it inside watched Busch move into the points lead as the season reached its halfway point. Busch leads Edwards by four points heading into next week's race at New Hampshire with about two months to go before the Chase for the championship begins.

Kevin Harvick began the night with the points lead, but slipped to third in the standings after finishing 16th.

Busch rolled to a win in the Trucks race Thursday despite starting from the back. He was forced to do the same Friday and ended up third in the Nationwide race.

Busch wound up on the pole in Kentucky after rain

Yankees 5, Rays 4

NEW YORK — Derek Jeter homered for his 3,000th hit and raced right past the milestone in a scintillating performance Saturday, going 5 for 5 with a tiebreaking single in the eighth inning that gave the New York Yankees a 5-4 victory over the Tampa Bay Rays.
Jeter doubled and had three singles while starting a pair of Yankees rallies and finishing off their last one. He bounced a single through the left side his first time up to give him No. 2,999, then sent a no-doubt drive into the left-field seats off Rays ace David Price in the third inning.
That made Jeter the 28th major leaguer to reach 3,000 hits, one of baseball's biggest milestones, and the first to do it with the Yankees.
It also set off quite a celebration in the Bronx, with teammates mobbing Jeter at home plate in a pack of pin-stripes before he took a curtain call and saluted the sellout crowd of 48,103.
The home run was Jeter's third of the season and first at home since an inside-the-park shot July 22, 2010, against Kansas City.

Red Sox 4, Orioles 0

BOSTON — John Lackey rebounded from the worst start of his Red Sox career with 6 2-3 shutout innings and Boston extended its winning streak to five games with a 4-0 victory over the Baltimore Orioles on Saturday night.
Lackey, booed last Monday as he left the mound after allowing seven runs in 2 1-3 innings, got a standing ovation as he strode to the dugout with runners at first and second in the seventh. Daniel Bard then retired Nolan Reimold on an inning-ending pop.

Jeter watched the ball fly as he left the batter's box and gave a big clap as he rounded first base. Rays first baseman Casey Kotchman was the first to salute Jeter, doffing his cap as Jeter passed by.

By then, all of Jeter's teammates were already celebrating in the dugout, raising their arms almost in unison. A special time for No. 2—his second hit of the game, and right at 2 p.m.

The ball, one of the specially marked ones put in play for the occasion, disappeared into a cluster of fans a few rows beyond the wall. Christian Lopez of Highland Park, N.Y., sitting in Section 236, emerged with the valuable prize. He gladly gave the ball back to the Yankees so Jeter can have the moment.

"He earned it," the 23-year-old Lopez told the YES Network. "I'm not going to be the person to take that away from him."

Jeter 3K merchandise, meanwhile, began flying off the shelves at the souvenir stands. Hats, pins, shirts and more, all commemorating No. 3,000, hadn't gone on sale until it occurred.

True to his nature of staying focused on the game, Jeter briskly rounded the bases. But there was no way this moment was going to pass without plenty of fanfare.

Good buddy Jorge Posada greeted Jeter with a bear-hug after he touched home plate. Mariano Rivera and the rest of the Yankees were right behind, swallowing up Jeter before he could reach the dugout.

The bullpen gate swung open, too, as New York's relievers came pouring in.

The 37-year-old Jeter, still in the midst of a most difficult season, waved to the crowd several times, then clenched his fist and pointed up to the box where his dad and steady girlfriend, actress Minka Kelly, were sitting. His dad was in attendance on this sunny afternoon—his mom and sister were absent, attending a christening.

"It was tremendous," Jeter's father, Charles, told YES. "I can't describe how I was feeling. We need a victory, first of all. ... Very emotional for me, very happy for him."

Jeter desperately wanted to achieve the mark at home, and the Yankees only had two games left in the Bronx before the All-Star break, with an eight-game road trip looming to start the second half.

Manager Joe Girardi wasn't worried about Jeter trying too hard.

"He's never had a problem with pressure in his life," Girardi said before the game.

After his home run tied the score, Jeter remembered to honor his opponents. He pointed at Price while many of the Rays applauded the accomplishment, some of them coming

As Jeter hits 3,000, Damon eyes milestone, too

NEW YORK — Johnny Damon has his eye on 3,000 hits, too.

With former teammate Derek Jeter now a member of the exclusive club, Damon said he's already started to think about his own chances of reaching one of baseball's biggest milestones.

Tampa Bay's designated hitter went into Saturday's game against Jeter and the New York Yankees with 2,662 career hits. The 37-year-old Damon realizes he probably needs to last at least two seasons beyond this one to get to 3,000, but he said people close to him are encouraging him to play long enough to do it.

"It's something that I never thought about before, but with me climbing up on the charts and all that stuff, I'm hearing from friends and family and former teammates and they're telling me to keep going as long as I can," Damon said. "Now it's within sight, 350 away. And hopefully after this season it'll be 250 out and it'll be two more years. And hopefully in the meantime we can keep winning and I can keep being productive and help out a young team like this."

Jeter homered in the third inning, his second hit of the game, to become the 28th major leaguer to reach the plateau — and first to do it with the Yankees.

Damon stood outside the Tampa Bay dugout and applauded along with other Rays players as Jeter saluted the cheering crowd and his opponents.

"It'd be a great thing to see," Damon said before the game.

"Derek's a class act. He's what a ballplayer should be."

Damon and Jeter are the same age, and both were drafted out of high school in 1992. Damon said that's one reason why Jeter's accomplishments mean so much to him.

The two were teammates in New York from 2006-09, helping the Yankees win the World Series in Damon's final season with the club. He played for Detroit last year, then signed a one-year contract with Tampa Bay in February.

Damon has lost some of his speed, but he's been extremely durable throughout his career and he's still a pest at the plate. He was hitting .279 with nine home runs and 41 RBIs in his first season with the Rays.

He thinks 3,000 hits is definitely an attainable goal.

"Oh, no doubt," he said. "Might as well, if it's there."

Damon was back in Tampa Bay's lineup Saturday, batting leadoff in his first game since getting hit on the left hand by a pitcher from Minnesota's Francisco Liriano on Wednesday.

His hand was still red and sore, but the swelling had gone down after he applied ice all night. Hours before the game, Damon took swings in the indoor cage at Yankee Stadium to test his hand and planned to take a full round of indoor batting practice.

"The strength isn't quite all there yet," Damon said. "The first couple swings were horrible, but just trying to find a way. ... I want to be in there."

Damon began the day exactly 100 hits behind injured Yankees slugger Alex Rodriguez on the career list.

out of the dugout to cheer.

Fans kept chanting and cheering throughout a celebration that lasted 3-4 minutes, and Jeter montages filled the videoboard for the next couple of innings.

Far away, the tributes began. Longtime Yankees great Don Mattingly, now manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers, saw Jeter's shot on a TV in the clubhouse at Dodger Stadium.

"Only Jeet. Everything's like that with him," his former teammate said.

Having grounded a leadoff single to left field in the first inning — much like his first career hit on May 30, 1995, against Seattle's Tim Lincecum at the old Kingdome — Jeter quickly achieved the milestone in his next at-bat.

Jeter casually chatted with Rays catcher John Jaso when he came to the plate, fouled off a couple of full-count deliveries and homered on Price's eighth pitch. Jeter, in fact, homered when the future All-Star lefty made his major league debut in 2008.

Jeter kept going, too. He doubled his next time up in the fifth inning for No. 3,001, breaking a tie with Roberto Clemente, and singled in the sixth for his fourth hit. He was the first big leaguer to get 3,000 since Craig Biggio in 2007, with Rafael Palmeiro, Rickey Henderson

and Cal Ripken the previous players to get there.

There was a time when some wondered whether Jeter would have a chance to break Pete Rose's career record of 4,256 hits. Jeter, in fact, was eight days younger than Rose when he got to 3,000.

But Jeter has been slowing down. He came into the game hitting only .257 with just two home runs, and recently pulled out of his 12th All-Star game to rest the strained right calf that recently landed him on the disabled list.

Jeter hadn't homered at all since May 8, and this was his first homer at Yankee Stadium since last July 22.

All the Yankees greats left their distinct marks. Babe Ruth set the home run record, Lou Gehrig became the Iron Horse, Joe DiMaggio hit in 56 straight games, Yogi Berra won the most championships, Mickey Mantle launched the longest drives. They all won World Series rings, certainly, with Jeter owning five.

The 3,000 hits, that will be Jeter's legacy forever.

About the only people disappointed that Jeter hit 3,000 this day were the thousands of fans who lined up trying to get tickets, many of them having paid whopping amounts to get into Friday night's game that was rained out.

Mandela in which the former South African president told him, "You must live carefully."

"I didn't always live carefully. I didn't always pay tennis the respect it deserved," Agassi admitted. "I didn't know myself, and I didn't realize that my troubles were of my own making."

Also inducted into the tennis shrine was contributor Fern "Peachy" Kellmeyer. The first woman to play on a men's Division I college team, she paved the way for Title IX by fighting the system that prohibited athletic scholarships for women. She played in the U.S. Open at 15 and was the first employee of the WTA, sticking around for 38 years as it grew from a tour with \$309,000 in total purses to one that paid out more than \$89 million.

"Any women who have college scholarships should give thanks to Peachy Kellmeyer," said Stacey Allaster, the ninth person to serve as the CEO of the WTA under Kellmeyer's guidance. "She has been the glue of women's tennis, holding the WTA together as CEOs and players come and go ... never letting us forget

that our past is our future."

But even Kellmeyer knew she was just the opening act.

Next came Simone Rufin, a student at the Andre Agassi College Preparatory Academy from third grade until she graduated as salutatorian in 2009. After a gentle dig at Agassi for "the mullet-wig thing," she called him her "hometown hero" and thanked him for helping at-risk and forgotten children in the adult playground of Las Vegas.

Agassi has helped raise \$150 million for education reform with his foundation. Another of the school's students, A.J. Green sang the national anthem, leaving "America the Beautiful" to blues singer Keb' Mo'.

"He gave more than just money, or material things. He gave us the tools to build our own lives," Rufin said of Agassi. "Because of him, I will never forget to look back and lift up others."

An eight-time Grand Slam champion and 1996 Olympic gold medalist who was No. 1 in the world for 101 straight weeks, Agassi plummeted to No. 141 in the rankings and by '97 was using crystal meth "a lot." (He also admitted in his 2009 book "Open" that he wore a wig to combat premature baldness.)

Deciding to rebuild his career, he turned to tennis' minor league tour and in 1999 he won his second U.S.

Open, finished second at Wimbledon and won his only French Open to complete the career Grand Slam. The women's winner in Paris that year was Graf; they started dating shortly after the winners' ball and married two years later. (Agassi's first marriage, to actress Brooke Shields, lasted less than two years.)

He reached No. 1 again in 2003 at the age of 33 — the oldest player to reach the top ranking — and held it for 12 more weeks.

"Rock bottom's an interesting place. I moved in and spent some time there," Agassi said. "Going from 141 in the world back to No. 1 was not an accomplishment; it was the reflection of an accomplishment. It was a symptom of good choices."

Working on the school has been a second life for Agassi, at the same time providing him with a life's goal and a vehicle to pass it on to others. At the end of his speech, he turned to his own children and the others in the crowd and told them to look at the nurses and teachers "win their own, personal Grand Slams."

PRAGUE — The Israeli movie "Restoration" has won the top prize at the 46th International Film Festival in the western Czech spa town of Karlovy Vary.

The film, directed by **Joseph Madmony**, is a psychological study of characters in the contemporary Israeli society. It examines problems of an owner of an antique furniture restoration shop with his son and business after his business partner dies.

The movie was chosen from 12 contenders for the Crystal Globe by the festival's grand jury, led by Hungarian director **Istvan Szabo**.

Saturday's award also came with a \$30,000 cash prize.

LANSING, Mich. — A historian is set to portray Gen. George Armstrong Custer during a program at the Michigan Historical Museum.

Steve Alexander is to speak Saturday about the general's Civil War experiences.

The museum says Custer was born in Ohio but considered Monroe his home.

Fight for Fawcett portrait

LOS ANGELES — The University of Texas system and Ryan O'Neal are sparring over ownership of an Andy Warhol portrait of the actor's longtime companion, Farrah Fawcett.

The system's board of regents sued O'Neal in federal court in Los Angeles on Friday, asking a judge to order the Oscar-nominated actor to turn over the painting. The portrait is one of two that Warhol made of the "Charlie's Angels" star, and the university claims the actress bequeathed it to their Austin, Texas campus.

O'Neal's spokesman Arnold Robinson blasted the lawsuit in a statement, saying the university has known for more than a year that the actor has the painting. "This is (a) completely ridiculous lawsuit," Robinson wrote.

"Ryan O'Neal's friendship with Andy Warhol began 10 years prior to his meeting Farrah Fawcett," Robinson wrote. "When Ryan introduced Andy to Farrah, Mr. Warhol chose to complete two portraits of her, one for Ms. Fawcett and one for Mr. O'Neal. Mr. O'Neal looks forward to being completely vindicated in the courts."

The university's lawsuit claims O'Neal may be holding onto other pieces from Fawcett's art collection that she wanted the university to have after her June 2009 death. Fawcett attended the University of Texas at Austin in the 1960s, according to the complaint.

"The enduring value and public interest in the Warhol portraits is a testament not only to Mr. Warhol's talent and artistry, but also to Ms. Fawcett's status as a cultural icon," the lawsuit states.

Warhol created the por-

traits in the 1980s and they were only publicly displayed once, the lawsuit states.

The University of Texas wants O'Neal to purchase insurance for the painting

and properly preserve it so that it can be turned over to the university if the lawsuit succeeds. It also seeks undetermined financial damages from O'Neal, but states the Faw-

cett portrait is priceless.

"The Warhol portrait is an irreplaceable piece of art for which legal damages could not fully compensate," the lawsuit states.

Follow-up to 'Push' provokes, disappoints

"The Kid" (The Penguin Press), by Sapphire: At the end of "Push," the heart-breaking 1996 novel that introduced the character of Precious, baby Abdul represents a glimmer of hope amid the grim landscape of the main character's troubled life.

"When the sun shine on him like this, he is an angel child. Brown sunshine," the HIV-positive Precious muses as she holds her son and wonders how much time she will have with him.

In "The Kid," author Sapphire picks up Abdul's story about nine years later. His mother has just died, leaving the young boy confused, angry and alone — a state that will shroud him through the entire novel.

Abdul is quickly thrust into the dark, often cruel, labyrinth of the child welfare system, landing first in a chaotic and violent foster home, then in a Catholic boys' orphanage where he is promised refuge, but is instead subjected to sexual abuse masquerading as

love.

Through a first-person narrative that floats indiscriminately among dream, memory and reality, Abdul — known alternately as J.J., Jamal, Arthur and Crazy Horse — describes his harrowing journey through childhood and his desperate search for identity and salvation.

"I don't get it no matter how I try, how could a kid be normal? Normal!" Abdul cries after being tossed out of the Catholic school and sent to live with a decrepit stranger who turns out to be his great-grandmother: "How could I end up tossed salad? Thirteen?"

Along the way, Abdul pieces together bits of his disturbing family history (much of which should al-

ready be familiar to the readers of "Push" and anyone who saw "Precious," the acclaimed film adaptation of that novel). He also emerges as both victim and victimizer, preying on small boys in the orphanage just as the priests preyed on him, and later attacking men who pick him up for anonymous sex.

If this seems unrelentingly grim, it is. The world in which Abdul resides is filled with dysfunction, violence, sexual predators and pain. Unlike "Push," where Precious finds safe harbor with a caring teacher, there are no saviors in "The Kid."

Even Abdul's one bit of joy — the talent he discovers as a dancer — comes tangled in deception and exploitation.

"My body is not a stranger," he thinks during a dance class. "Here my body is my own, here I am a Crazy Horse dude who never gave up. ... Here in the beat is my life."

In "Push," Sapphire deftly inhabited the mind of Precious, an illiterate 16-year-old girl who had been raped repeatedly by her father (giving birth to two of his children) and brutally abused by her sadistic mother. There, the stream-of-consciousness technique brilliantly captured the protagonist's transformation from ignorance to independence.

But in "The Kid," that technique only muddles the story. Too much of the novel blurs into incoherence, or seems to revel in the pathologies that plague Abdul and the other characters.

Abdul's thoughts slide from truth to lies, from real life to nightmare, from fantasy to veracity. He can no longer distinguish what happened from what he imagined.

The trouble is, neither can the reader.

Condo battleground

Higher homeowner association fees pit neighbor against neighbor

The Inlet House condo complex in Fort Pierce was once the kind of place the 55-and-older set aspired to. It was affordable. The pool and clubhouse were tidy, the lawns freshly snipped. Residents, push-carts in tow, walked to the beach, the bank, the beauty parlor, the cinema and the supermarket. In post-crash America, this was a dreamy little spot, especially on a fixed income.

But that was Inlet House before the rats started chewing through the toilet seats in vacant units and sewage started seeping from the ceiling. Before condos that were worth \$79,000 four years ago sold for as little as \$3,000. And before the homeowners' association levied \$6,000 assessments on everyone — and then foreclosed on seniors who couldn't pay the association bill, even if they didn't owe the bank a dime.

Normally, it's the bankers who go after delinquent homeowners. But in communities governed by the mighty homeowners' association, as the sour economy leaves more people unable to pay their fees, it is neighbor versus neighbor.

"What the board is doing is trying to foreclose on people to force people out the door," said Mike Silvestri, 75, who stopped paying his dues at Inlet House in protest over what he considers unnecessary and unaffordable assessments.

He and others said there were cheaper ways to deal with the rat infestation and leaky sewage that led the board to order up a costly plumbing overhaul.

"They are bamboozling old people. I'm old, but I'm not senile," he said.

In the past, housing associations have gained infamy for dictating everything from the weight of your dog (one mandated a diet for a hound) to whether you can kiss in your driveway (not if you

don't want a fine). Homeowners' associations have served as the behavior police, banning lemonade stands, solar panels and hanging out in the garage. One ordered a war hero to take down his flag because of a "nonconforming" pole. Another demanded residents with brown spots on their lawns dye their grass green.

Now, past the faux regal gates, beyond the clubhouses, many property owners in associations owe more than their homes are worth. Some are struggling to pay their bills after they lose a job. Others have had their pay cut. So they've stopped paying their association dues.

To combat the rise in delinquencies, boards are switching off utilities, garnishing income and axing cable. They are yanking pool passes and banning the billiard room. And, in the most extreme cases, they are foreclosing. "The treacherous part is that

homeowners' associations are acting like a local government without restraints, and they have this extraordinary power," said Marjorie Murray, a lawyer and founder of the Center for California Homeowner Association Law.

Today, one in five U.S. homeowners is subject to the will of the homeowners' association, whose boards oversee 24.4 million homes. More than 80 percent of newly constructed homes in the U.S. are in association communities.

And of the nation's 300,000 homeowners' associations, more than 50 percent now face "serious financial problems," according to a September survey by the Community Association Institute. An October survey found 65 percent of homeowners' associations have delinquency rates higher than 5 percent, up from 19 percent of associations in 2005.

Associations set rules for their communities. They levy monthly dues, typically between \$200 and

\$500, and cover the costs of services that a municipal government usually takes care of: road repair, streetlights, sewage systems. If an association's budget is strained or major repairs need to be done, the board can levy a "special assessment" on top of those dues. And when one homeowner doesn't pay those fees, all the other homeowners have to pick up the cost.

The rise in delinquencies comes as banks are taking over foreclosed homes and then leaving them vacant more often than ever. Taken together, these shortfalls are resulting in higher fees for all of the other homeowners — and massive financial angst for association boards.

Before now, associations rarely, if ever, foreclosed on homeowners. But today, encouraged by a new industry of lawyers and consultants, boards are increasingly foreclosing on people 60 days

Neighbor Marcy is from Massachusetts and she is much more refined. OK, she's somewhat refined.



Environmentalists tell us the extinction of a species is a horrible sin upon the conscience of all mankind. Are they concerned about all species or, as my daughter once asked "just the cute ones?"

In fact, the vast majority of species ever to inhabit the earth are now extinct. Extinctions have occurred as the result of massive climate change on earth and as the result of many other natural causes

such as disease and habitat changes. Humans have been responsible for some notable extinctions, but the numbers are small compared to naturally occurring processes.

Yet, environmentalists assert humans must prevent all extinctions at all costs. I do mean all costs, including monetary costs and loss of personal and property rights. UNPOPULAR PROPOSAL

Radical policy shift needs public vetting

When it comes to the public, Gov. Rick Scott can't win for losing. Once again, he is pushing an unpopular proposal that runs counter to the will of the people. His staff realized that, however, and temporarily at least pulled the plug Friday night.

The proposal is for the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) state lands division to raise revenue by allowing privately designed, built and operated RV campgrounds in state parks. While public-private partnerships can be successful in certain venues, private RV campgrounds in Florida's state parks would be a radical departure from a management policy that has focused for generations on the natural beauty and serenity of the Real Florida.

The success of this policy is validated by Florida's state park system earning the distinction of being America's first two-time recipient of the Gold Medal Award, the highest award a parks and recreation agency can receive from the American Academy for Park and Recreation Administration.

Nonetheless, the state lands division gained approval from DEP's Acquisition and Restoration Council to expeditiously proceed with the planning for private campgrounds in as many as 56 parks, including the Crystal River Preserve.

Given the angry outcry by local residents and officials at the first four parks targeted — Wakulla Springs, DeLeon Springs, Fanning Springs and

Honeymoon Island — more thought and public debate are needed to weigh the consequences of treating our state parks as commodities.

DEP Secretary Herschel T. Vinyard Jr. recognized that. Friday evening, he sent a letter to state Sen. Mike Fasano, R-New Port Richey, saying the department, with Scott's approval, would not move forward on the

Honeymoon Island plan and would evaluate how to proceed on plans for the three other parks.

This is a smart decision on DEP's part. The developmental impact of RV campsites on our state parks is more than just the campsites themselves. Roads, restroom facilities, bathhouses, electrical hookups, playgrounds and other amenities are part and parcel.

The character-changing impact of such a radical shift in policy on Florida's most treasured natural assets and the value Floridians place on them, as demonstrated by the citizen outcry, demand a full public vetting of the proposal. Gov. Scott needs to make his case to the public as to why Florida's unspoiled state parks should be sacrificed in the interest of raising state revenue.

To date, Gov. Scott has behaved more like a chief executive of a for-profit enterprise interested only in the bottom line. As the chief executive of Florida, however, he is urged to respect the will of the people by preserving the Real Florida of the state's award-winning park system.

In search of Alexander Hamilton

WASHINGTON — It appears likely Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner will step down once the current impasse over raising the debt ceiling is resolved. It's hard to understand why he would want to leave with a cloud over his head. Defusing the debt limit crisis is essential, but it doesn't burnish his overall legacy. He will still leave behind an economy that is under-performing.

Geithner has been on the job since before President Obama took office. He was one of the Big Three along with Bush Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson and Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke to stabilize the banking system and put in place the bailouts the American people love to loathe. He may be ready to leave his high-stress post, but it's also possible Obama wants him to leave, and the president has someone else in mind to fill the post.

Maybe Obama has been brushing up on his reading about Depression economics, and realizes anew he needs some heavy-weights on his economic team. Next year's presidential election will turn on the economy and jobs and deficit reduction, and Obama has not communicated well enough on these core issues.

It's not for lack of trying. This week, the president partnered with Twitter, responding to 140-character questions on jobs and the economy in an attempt to reach the millions of people who

no longer get their news from the mainstream media. He's done events on Facebook and YouTube in addition to the standard television networks and print outlets, but breaking through to get the attention of a disheartened electorate remains a challenge.

The president could use someone at the Treasury Department who can explain complex economic issues in simple terms, and who has the charisma and leadership skills to get things done on Capitol Hill. That is a very tall order, and you have to go back to Alexander Hamilton to find a treasury secretary who exerted his influence that directly.

The nation owes a huge debt to Hamilton, who took office in September 1789, appointed by George Washington. Hamilton found a situation direr than what America faces today. The brand-new country had exhausted its resources. The currency was worthless, and states were arguing with each other over who owed what. There was no back pay for the military, and soldiers were on the verge of revolt.


Hamilton turned the economy around by asserting the power of a strong central government. He imposed tariffs on imported goods and taxed whiskey to raise money, and most important, he restored faith in the fledgling federal government by declaring it would stand behind the national debt and the state debts as well. He cited the implied powers of

the Constitution as the authority behind his actions, which included the creation of the government-owned Bank of the United States.

Hamilton removed any doubt the new country would honor its debts, setting a standard that now for the first time in the nation's history might be breached if political leaders can't reach an agreement on raising the debt ceiling. What Obama needs is another Hamilton, someone whose stature and economic genius can rise above partisan politics, someone like New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg, a self-made billionaire whose name has been floated before as a potential Secretary of the Treasury, and whose expertise and ego would be more than a match for Obama.

Geithner's expected departure is an opportunity for Obama to put a new face on his economic agenda going into the 2012 election. There is little the president can do to affect the forces already in place, but he can signal through the appointment of someone energetic and high-profile, like Bloomberg, that he is doing all that is humanly possible to boost the recovery and create jobs. Geithner saved the banks; now it's time to save the economy.

Improper response

Free speech stymied at 'public' hearing

What happened at the Fish and Wildlife's public meeting was so weird it merits exposure.

Of course, we are against the U.S. Fish & Wildlife's austere policies regarding King's Bay and the surrounding community. Because of this, some of us attended to draw attention to the fact that this government agency is really overextending its powers, while using the manatees as an excuse. They do not only want to control the fish and wildlife in this vicinity, they also want to control water usage, the land and the people. With this comes the erosion of private property rights. We attended to create awareness. So, initially, I didn't take offense when a deputy sheriff, using an intimidating, belligerent and authoritative tone and stance, told me that we could not take the signs inside. Intimidation, bullying and belligerence were unnecessary because no one was acting inappropriately.

After repetitive reminders, I politely — and I want to stress the word "politely" — approached them. I wanted to inform them the Supreme Court has agreed the written word is also considered free speech, thereby also protected under the U.S. Constitution. Deputy: "M'am! M'am! M'am! You cannot go inside with the signs! I do not want to argue with you. This is private property, you are lucky they are even letting you stand here. The president of the college, and the Fish & Wildlife do not want signs inside! You cannot go inside with signs!"

They obviously considered our 'Over-the-Hill' gang to also be senile and daft.

My response: "We do not care to go inside with the signs, please hear what I am trying to tell you."

Quite frankly, they were creating a public disturbance. I finally, raised my voice, too. (And) since

Suppressions of speech are not necessarily violations of First Amendment rights unless the state does the suppressing. The state could be either the federal government, or now a state government. In my opinion, the Fish and Wildlife falls under this category and so does the sheriff's office. As such, their practices to suppress free speech, if challenged, could present a serious constitutional issue.

This college is state funded. You would think our constitutional rights would be encouraged and not suppressed, especially in this setting. This was a public meeting, paid for from public revenue. Again, if challenged, this could present another serious issue for this institution.

Controversies about speech protected by the First Amendment seem to arise because the speech at issue is unpopular or controversial or highly offensive for various, or whatever reasons.

Yet a hallmark of the Bill of Rights is protection of minority views. If the First Amendment only protected popular speech, supported by the majority of citizens, then there would be no need for constitutional protection. Instead, we could simply have a referendum with the majority deciding which speech should be allowed. Thankfully, the First Amendment especially prohibits the suppression of free speech by the majority.

Why is all this important? It is important because we cannot allow our First Amendment rights to be trampled on by anyone, especially government agencies. No speech should be silenced for whatever reason, especially, through intimidation or coercion. Its message must be allowed to succeed or fail based on its own merits. If speech can arbitrarily be silenced, then there is risk of a universal silence.

past due on association fees, said Evan McKenzie, a former homeowner association attorney who is now a University of Illinois political science professor and author of the book "Beyond Privatopia: Rethinking Residential Private Government."

The government does not keep statistics on how often homeowners' associations initiate foreclosures. But a nonprofit research group found association-initiated foreclosures in the Houston area jumped from 500 in 1995 to 2,200 in 2007. Most association-related foreclosures in Texas do not go through the judicial process, so the group's analysis represented only a fraction of the foreclosures that housing associations have initiated.

In exchange for adhering to the rules, homeowners got safe communities with clubhouses, pools and tennis courts. But what many didn't realize when they bought their homes was the fine print gave the association the right to foreclose — even over a few hundred dollars in unpaid dues.

All the association board has to do is alert its attorney to place a lien on the property to start the process. The home can then be auctioned by the board until the bank eventually takes ownership. Homeowners typically have no right to a hearing.

"These are banana republics," McKenzie said.

The problems in some communities are resulting in more scrutiny. In Nevada, the FBI is investigating corruption in elections of association boards. In Utah and Arizona, legislators are trying to pass bills that would root out the use of debt-collectors who are alleged to have used thug-like tactics to strongarm residents into paying fees.

State legislatures in California, Arizona, North Carolina, Texas and Florida

have taken up legislation that would clamp down on foreclosures.

Not everyone thinks the tactics are out of line, though.

"When people are not paying their assessments, they're not shortchanging some giant multinational corporation. They are taking money directly out of the pockets of their neighbors," said Andrew Fortin, head of government affairs for the trade group the Community Associations Institute.

So the neighborhood feuds are escalating. At Inlet House, one resident claims her fellow senior citizens have turned into vigilantes, vandalizing her car in retaliation for not paying her dues.

In all, 17 of the 60 units are in various stages of delinquency. Paul Gray, a fastidious budgeter, paid off his mortgage long ago and paid all but \$2,500 of the Inlet House assessment. The association initiated foreclosure proceedings. A few days after he received the foreclosure notice, Gray suffered another stroke, three friends say. Now he is in a nursing home. He has since paid off the \$2,500. His home, worth \$89,000 in 2006, is for sale for \$18,500.

In the meantime, the board, facing \$172,000 in costs from nonpayers, has had no choice but to raise dues by an extra \$50 a month to an average of \$375. Between the assessment and increased dues, some residents complain they pay more than they would to rent a plush oceanfront spread down the street at the posh Fontainebleau condo complex. Association manager Janice Stinnett, who is also an Inlet House resident, said she isn't to blame, the nonpayers are.

"It's unfair that everyone is paying extra to cover these deadbeats," she said.

The board is continuing to make the plumbing repairs that made the assessments necessary to begin with. It will soon issue another special assessment to cover the costs.

Opposition first developed when agency bureaucrats published regulations which took no account of economic consequences or property rights. In response and over the objections of businesses and property owners, a Democratic Congress in 1982 amended the act to formally eliminate any economic considerations. Since that time, both agencies have concerned themselves exclusively with preservation of species — costs and property rights be damned.

That brings us to the endangered manatees and King's Bay madness. Essentially, we have done such a good job of protecting manatees that their numbers have doubled, thereby putting more of them at risk for collision with power boats.

Fish and Wildlife Service, unable to accept the loss of even one manatee per year, proposes restricting powerboat speeds to a level which eliminates use of the bay for many water sports. Quite apparently, manatee rights take precedence over human rights in this instance.

Although humans are not an endangered species, consider this: Boating injuries and drownings in

King's Bay exceed manatee injuries. Shall we just eliminate all boats to save lives?

Pedestrian injuries and deaths in Citrus County exceed manatee deaths. Shall we slow all motor vehicles down to idle speed?

How about cementing over all swimming pools to prevent even one infant drowning?

Legislation which creates bureaucracies not responsible to voters always has unintended consequences. The proposal by FWS is illogical and inconsiderate of the public's rights to enjoy public waterways. It may inflict economic damages on businesses and property owners as well.

The risk of loss of one manatee per year is acceptable, given their numbers are increasing, in order to preserve the current use of King's Bay.

The daughter complied and eventually Granny got aboard, however without a replacement brief (her luggage checked) for the duration of her flight. This senseless search, of course, yielded nothing except the ill effects of a profound incursion on an old and frail woman — now mortified, disheveled and resentful.

Other "extreme" incidents reported have involved toddlers and pre-adolescent girls for pat-downs looking for hidden

explosives — even without probable cause. The TSA offers (to paraphrase) "searches are routine, sensitive and professional."

However, one would question how sensitive? Routine, yes, as the body searchers are "scripted" lower level employees directed by the ironclad manual in their back pockets. If on the queue you are next in line, you will be dressed down.

Unwavering rules do not permit circumstantial discretion, prudence, nor the latitude of using plain common sense.

"Profiling and probative cause," of course, are the solution, but that rankles the "politically correct" fanatics in Washington, D.C.'s draconian agencies. Unlike American airports, "perception-based screenings" in Israel's and other airports are 100 percent effective, thus sparing Granny, little Johnny and teen Missy.

In the meantime, if you must fly, you must expect the TSA to inflict its indignities upon you to make you feel like a terrorist.

Despite Fourth Amendment prohibitions of "unreasonable searches and seizures," rigid security measures necessarily require enhanced safety precautions. However, I would suggest — no demand! — a better TSA model that is equally effective, but far more flyer-friendly.

Obama: Still differences on debt, new talks today

WASHINGTON — Beset by a weak jobs report, President Barack Obama on Friday called for swift action by Congress to raise the nation's borrowing limit, saying the uncertainty over the debt ceiling has hindered hiring in the private sector.

In remarks in the White House Rose Garden, the president linked two of the most high-profile issues facing his presidency — the weak economy and a massive budget deal to meet an Aug. 2 deadline to increase the debt limit.

"The sooner we get this done, the sooner that the markets know that the debt limit ceiling will have been raised and that we have a serious plan to deal with our debt and deficit, the sooner that we give our businesses the certainty that will need in order to make additional investments to grow and hire," Obama said.

He made his remarks just hours after the government reported anemic job growth for June and a new, higher unemployment rate of 9.2 percent.

Obama said uncertainty over raising the debt ceiling — currently capped at \$14.3 trillion — was one of several factors that have contributed to an economic slowdown and weaker job creation. He also listed natural disasters, high gas prices, state and local budget cuts and the fiscal crisis in Greece.

"The economic challenges we face weren't created overnight and they're not going to be solved overnight," he said.

Obama met Thursday with the top eight leaders of Congress and has called them back for a rare weekend meeting on Sunday. He met privately Friday morning with the top House Democrat, Nancy Pelosi, amid Democratic concerns over proposals to cut spending for Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid as part of

the budget deal.

Obama and congressional negotiators are looking at closing some tax loopholes and cutting popular social benefit programs as they struggle to reach an agreement between Republicans and Democrats, but Pelosi and many House Democrats oppose cutting the benefit programs. Pelosi was getting an opportunity to air her views as she met privately with Obama.

"We are not going to balance the budget on the backs of America's seniors," Pelosi said Thursday.

The endgame on the debt talks was approaching as the Labor Department reported hiring slowed to a near-standstill in June. Employers

added the fewest jobs in nine months and the unemployment rate rose for the third month in a row, climbing to its highest point this year.

That gave Republicans fresh ammunition to attack Obama's handling of the economy even as the shape of an agreement remained in doubt. All the while the nation is moving closer to an Aug. 2 deadline to raise the government's debt ceiling or face an unprecedented default on U.S. obligations that the administration warns could add a perilous new crisis on top of the already quavering economy.

Obama was pushing for an ambitious deficit reduction plan of roughly \$4 trillion, the biggest

Time to play hardball with credit companies

DEAR BRUCE: I am trying to help my brother pay off his credit card debt (\$30,000). I think the debt is from two or three cards. He and his wife have separated and he has limited income — Social Security and a 401(k). I do not know the amount of the 401(k). It certainly is not substantial.

He pays his car loan using monthly withdrawals from that account. If he could get a loan from a family member to pay off the cards, he would repay that loan when the bungalow he is living in is sold.

Is there a way he could get the credit card companies to reduce the total due to clear the debt? I would appreciate any suggestions.

— Susan, via email

DEAR SUSAN: You have a serious problem here. Your brother very likely is never going to get out of hock, and he is depleting his modest worth by using the money in the 401(k) to pay off his car. Generally, 401(k) and Social Security accounts can't, under ordinary circumstances, be attacked. He or an attorney representing him can contact the credit card companies. They can try to negotiate a reduction in the amount, the interest rates, or both.

There is a little bit of hardball to play here. The attorney who contacts those companies can explain none of his assets are attachable and, unless something is negotiated, he will

seriously consider bankruptcy, which will wipe out any possibility of the companies recouping some of this money. I hesitate to recommend this, but in many cases, there are few alternatives.

DEAR BRUCE: I recently got myself into trouble with credit cards. I lost my job about a year ago. I haven't been employed since then. I can't afford to pay for all of these cards. What do you think about me going to a debt-settlement company?

— Cindy, via email
DEAR CINDY: With today's bad economy and people suffering, many settlement companies are advertising. The purpose of a debt-settlement company is to try to negotiate a lower bill for the customer.

The settlement companies are depending on people like you, who are trying to avoid being forced into bankruptcy for the next seven years. Many of these

companies do not have good reputations.

I would start by asking a lot of questions. Be even more careful when it comes to laying out money before receiving services.

DEAR BRUCE: My sister and I inherited a condo from our mother. I have been living in the condo for the past six years. I pay the taxes, maintenance fees and repairs while I live here.

Is my sister entitled to rent? The idea is if I didn't live here, we'd rent it for maybe \$800 and split it. My sister thinks in addition to all I pay, I should also pay her \$400. The other issue is I'm not working full-time. I told her if Mom were alive, she wouldn't charge me to live here while I'm not working and can't afford it. That's the beauty of this gift. Any quick thoughts would be appreciated. — Beau, via email

DEAR BEAU: This is another example of what leav-

ing undivided property can do. It causes nothing but problems. Your sister's math is flawed. Assume you rented the condo for \$800 to someone else. You would then have to pay the taxes, maintenance and repairs out of that \$800. That might equal \$200. Then we have \$600 remaining, and that seems a very high estimate. If we were going to continue that logic, then the \$600 would be split two ways, and at the very most you would be responsible to her for half of the \$600.

Given the circumstances, unless your sister is hard-pressed, it would seem she'd be better off requesting you pay her a couple of hundred dollars a month. On the other hand, if your sister is in dire circumstances, such as yours, I understand why she would want something, but \$400 is way too much.

of three options he laid out on the table. It would require sizeable tax revenues, which many Republicans oppose, and spending reductions for entitlement programs, opposed by many Democrats. But the idea of a potentially historic deal was well received by the meeting participants, officials said later, even though the details remained in dispute.

After Thursday's 90-minute session, Obama said Democrats and Republicans should be prepared to show their bottom-line demands when they return to

the bargaining table Sunday. The negotiating stakes are high. Without a deal on deficit reduction, Republican leaders say they don't have enough GOP votes to increase the nation's borrowing authority, raising the danger of the first ever U.S. default on its debts when the current \$14.3 trillion debt ceiling is tapped out.

"Everybody acknowledged that we have to get this done before the hard deadline of Aug. 2 to make sure that America does not default for the first time on its obligations," Obama said. "And everybody acknowledged that there's going to be pain involved politically on all sides."

That leaves little time to

agree on 10-year deficit reductions of \$2 trillion to \$4 trillion.

The major clash centers on how to reduce spending on major entitlement programs such as Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security, all prized by Democrats, and on tax changes that would close loopholes and end certain corporate breaks. Republicans insist that any tax changes be used to lower rates on corporations and individuals; Obama wants them also to generate more tax revenue.

Increasing the debt ceiling through the end of 2012 — a date favored by the White House — would require authorizing about \$2.4 trillion in additional bor-

rowing. House Speaker John Boehner has insisted on a 10-year deficit reduction figure that, at a minimum, matches the amount of additional borrowing. One aide to a lawmaker in Thursday's meeting said Obama made it clear he wouldn't sign a budget and debt agreement that didn't extend the debt ceiling until after the November 2012 presidential election.

In the meeting, Obama told the leaders that they faced three options — a small deficit reduction plan, a medium plan that would reduce deficits by \$2 trillion over 10 years or a big agreement that would shoot for up to \$4 trillion in deficit reductions in the next decade.

Obama indicated he preferred the largest number.

In the meeting, Boehner and Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky backed Obama's bigger, more ambitious goal, said Democratic officials familiar with the talks. Their lieutenants, Senate GOP Whip Jon Kyl of Arizona and House Majority Leader Eric Cantor of Virginia, indicated they believed the medium-size option was more realistic. Both Cantor and Kyl had participated in talks led by Vice President Joe Biden that had already identified about \$2 trillion in deficit reduction.

The negotiations are politically difficult for both parties.

Raising the debt ceiling is unpopular with voters, especially those who vote Republican, increasing concern among GOP lawmakers that they could be challenged by fellow Republicans in primaries across the country.

The big entitlement programs such as Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid have long been protected by Democrats in Congress.

Underscoring the political stakes, the Pew Research Center reported Thursday that in a recent poll it found that six out of 10 of those surveyed believe it is more important to maintain Social Security and Medicare benefits than to reduce the budget deficit.

DEAR BRUCE: My boyfriend has a young son. He signed a piece of paper saying he gives his son's mom temporary guardianship. They got it notarized at a bank, but it was never filed in court. Is there a way he can revoke the temporary guardianship? Does he have to go to court even though it was never filed? — **K.H., via email**

DEAR K.H.: Whether this document has any weight could be seriously challenged. That it was notarized means only that somewhere it is recorded that he did, in fact, sign the document.

The only responsible reply from someone such as myself is that your boyfriend should seek legal counsel immediately. Show the attorney any documents that were signed and representations that were made. It may be necessary to go to court even though the document was never filed. Time very clearly is his enemy. Get moving!

DEAR BRUCE: My house is paid in full and valued at about \$180,000. Our vacation home has a \$45,000 balance, and we have a 2.2-acre lot paid in full up for sale for \$149,000. Our vehicles and credit cards are all paid in full. My 401(k) has \$280,000. My Roth IRA has \$60,000. And my money market savings has \$80,000, earning less than 2 percent.

I am 52, now single and in good health, with no debt besides the vacation home. My salary is \$96,000 a year. I put the maximum amount allowed in both the 401(k) and Roth, along with the catch-up allowed for people older than 50.

I am wondering where I should be putting the money from the money market account and where the money should go after the land gets sold. Am I doing everything I can to secure my retire-

ment? I would love to retire at 60 years old. — **Steven, via email**

DEAR STEVEN: You have done quite well with your life and you are certainly not impoverished. On the other hand, you are not rich, either. There are too many open ends here. For example, \$150,000 is in real estate, which might sell immediately or might not sell for several years. As to where the money should be invested, that question clearly has to be addressed or about to become available.

Regarding the money market, you would be well advised to try and find another home for it. There are many experts who think a lot of our money markets are invested in foreign securities that are not as strong as one might expect.

You mentioned you would like to bail out at 60. That's a possibility, but not a strong one. Social Security will not be available to you until at least age 62. There is some very serious thought that will need to go into this.

I don't understand why folks want to stop working as young as you, but that will be your privilege if you are able to finance it. Taking a good look at things now, everything is liquidated other than your home. I don't see enough income to reach even a third of your current income. That would take a lot of paring.

I would be looking ahead to maybe somewhere in your middle- to late-60s for a reasonable retirement.

DEAR BRUCE: My husband and I acquired some credit card and loan debt during the last 10 years. We worked hard in the past two years to get most of it eliminated. All but \$10,000 is repaid.

We recently sold our home and are awaiting the building of our new home. We now have the more than \$10,000 needed to repay the credit card debt. About two years ago, when we were re-

ally struggling, I contacted the bank directly and asked them to make the three accounts inactive to bring the interest rate down from 25 percent to 6 percent. We had them automatically deduct the monthly payments of up to \$500 a month. This made it possible for us to finally work on minimizing the size of the debt rather than barely pay the interest every month.

These accounts have been inactive, but we have been making our regular timely payments. I am curious about what you would suggest doing with the accounts. If we pay these inactive accounts, will it negatively impact our credit? These three accounts represent our oldest history of credit. The bank said once we pay it off, we may be reconsidered to have them reopened as the original accounts, but I doubt it.

Would you suggest we repay most of it but not all? We were pre-approved for this home loan in March. I do not want to do the wrong things and make our credit rating worse before this deal goes through in September. — **Kathy, via email**

DEAR KATHY: I wouldn't get too upset about some negative effect to your credit, which may possibly be there already. Have you checked your credit score after making this very at-

tractive negotiation from 25 percent to 6 percent?

You mentioned the bank might reconsider opening your accounts. I think there is a very strong possibility they will do that. You have demonstrated you are responsible but got in over your head, and you are meeting the responsibilities.

Further, no matter where you have this money invested, you are not getting anything like the 6 percent you are paying on the loan. Given that circumstance, if you do not need this money to put down on your new home, I would pay off the account.

You can apply to the bank for a new credit card. If it isn't granted, there are lots of folks out there who will be very pleased to open another credit card, even with your somewhat checkered credit history. That business is so highly competitive that many concessions have been and are being made.



Black economic gains reversed in Great Recession

BALTIMORE — Growing up black in the segregated 1960s, Deborah Goldring slept two to a bed, got evicted from apartment after apartment, and watched her stepfather climb utility poles to turn their disconnected lights back on. Yet Goldring pulled herself out of poverty and earned a middle-class life — until the Great Recession.

First, Goldring's husband fell ill, and they drained savings to pay for nursing homes before he died. Then Goldring lost her executive assistant job in the Baltimore hospital where she had worked for 17 years. The cruelest blow was a letter from the bank, intending to foreclose on her home of almost three decades.

Millions of Americans endured similar financial calamities in the recession. But for Goldring and many others in the black community, where unemployment has risen since the end of the recession, job loss has knocked them out of the middle class and back into poverty. Some even see a historic reversal of hard-won economic gains that took black people decades to achieve.

Goldring remembers her mother taping the window shades to the wall so no one could see them stealing electricity. She remembers each time she sat on the curb with her three brothers, surrounded by her family's belongings, waiting for a new place to live. Sitting on those curbs, she promised to always pay her bills on time.

Now, after finding herself poor again, "the only word I can say is devastated," says Goldring, 58.

"For me to live that life we were so comfortable in, we never had to worry about finances, we always had money where I can help my kids and my grandchildren — to go to calling my daughter to borrow \$100 because I can't pay a bill..." Goldring's voice trails off as she struggles to hold back tears.

Economists say the Great Recession lasted from 2007 to 2009. In 2004, the median net worth of white households was \$134,280, compared with \$13,450 for black households, according to an analysis of Federal Reserve data by the Economic Policy Institute. By 2009, the median net worth for white households had fallen 24 percent to \$97,860; the median black net worth had fallen 83 percent to \$2,170, according to the EPI.

Algernon Austin, director of the EPI's Program on Race, Ethnicity and the Economy, described the wealth gap this way: "In 2009, for every dollar of

wealth the average white household had, black households only had two cents."

Since the end of the recession, the overall unemployment rate has fallen from 9.4 to 9.1 percent, while the black unemployment rate has risen from 14.7 to 16.2 percent, according to the Department of Labor.

"I would say the recession is not over for black folks," Austin says. He believes more black people than ever before could fall out of the middle class, because the unemployment rate for college-educated blacks recently peaked and blacks are overrepresented in state and local government jobs that are being eliminated due to massive budget shortfalls.

Maya Wiley, director of the Center for Social Inclusion, says the anti-discrimination laws passed in the 1960s took decades to translate into an increase in black economic security — and that was before the recession.

"History is going to say that the black middle class was decimated" over the past few years, Wiley says. "But we're not done writing history."

Goldring was born and raised in Baltimore, and her mother was single for much of Goldring's childhood. At 16, she dropped out of school and went to work cleaning hotel rooms.

"That's when I first met white people. Some of them would stay a month at the hotel. They would have all their children with them," she remembers. "I thought, one day I'd like to hang out at a hotel."

She didn't know any middle-class people in her all-black neighborhood. "Where we lived, everyone struggled. We just struggled a little harder," she says. "If the lights stayed on for a whole year, if we didn't get put out, I thought we were doing really, really well."

At 21, pregnant with her second child, Goldring decided to get her GED. Then she went to community college, got a degree in secretarial work, and began a career.

She met her husband in 1983. He had a steady job as a heating and air-conditioning installer, and owned a brick two-bedroom home in Morgan Park, a leafy, integrated neighborhood.

With two incomes, money was not a problem. He liked to travel. She had never been out of Maryland.

"I thought, 'Is this how rich people live?'" Goldring remembers. "From where I was to where I ended up, it was way different."

Her husband had been married before. As a condi-

tion of the divorce, his daughter's name was added to the deed of the house. After Goldring's husband died in 2007, Goldring took out a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage, with a 6.5 percent interest rate, to purchase the house outright.

Everything was fine until her hospital "restructured" in 2009. Her boss, a senior vice president, was transferred to the corporate office. Executives were now sharing secretaries. A few months later, they let Goldring go.

No more family vacations. No more trips to the mall. No more filling the grocery cart.

But what Goldring misses the most is her checkbook. Her unemployment payments arrive on a debit card.

"Just being able to pull out my checkbook and pay a bill, even though there might not be much left in there," she says. "I really miss that checkbook with my name on it."

This May, black male employment fell to the lowest level since the government began keeping track in 1972. Only 56.1 percent of black men over age 20 were working, compared with 68.3 percent of white men.

Chris Wilder, a Philadelphia journalist, lost his job in 2008 as the media industry suffered huge losses. Unemployment benefits amounted to about one-third of his salary. Ever since they ran out, his income has been near zero, other than sporadic freelance work.

If not for a policy in his apartment co-op to assist people who lose their jobs, "I might be living with my mother," he says.

College-educated blacks fared worse than their white counterparts in the recession. In 2007, unemployment for college-educated whites was 1.8 percent; for college-educated blacks it was 2.7 percent. Now, the college-educated unemployment rate is 3.9 percent for whites and 7 percent for blacks.

He's not desperate enough to break the law, but "I see why people become drug dealers."

Horace Davis did become a drug dealer. He illustrates another dimension of the recession's impact on blacks: While law-abiding folks are falling out of the middle class, those who got in trouble with the law are further than ever from a second chance.

After serving four years for drug trafficking, Davis walked out of prison into the middle of the recession in 2008. "I thought to myself, I'm older, I need to get a job, move on. The dope game

was dead to me," Davis says, sitting on a concrete porch in an Asheville, N.C., housing project.

In the past few decades of the "War on Drugs," harsh sentencing laws have sent a disproportionate number of black people to prison, even though blacks are not more likely than whites to sell or use drugs, according to a 2008 report by the Sentencing Project. Today, about 280,000 African-Americans emerge from behind bars each year. They are often the last of the last to be hired.

After Davis got out, he spent months applying for dozens of jobs mopping floors or flipping burgers. He carried a letter from the state offering a \$2,500 tax credit for hiring ex-offenders. He got one call back, from a chicken restaurant. "We'll be in touch," Davis remembers them saying. They weren't.

"Nobody wants black felons in their businesses," says Davis, 26.

A 2003 University of Chicago study by Devah Pager sent young white and black "testers" to apply for real low-wage jobs. Some of the testers were randomly assigned felony convictions. The study found that whites with felonies were slightly more likely to get callbacks than black applicants without criminal records.

"The penalty of a criminal record is more disabling for black job seekers than whites," Pager and other researchers wrote in a follow-up study in 2009.

Davis says he learned skills in prison: "How to cook, clean, horticulture, janitorial. I can do it. I've been trained. Tile, carpentry, mortar, edging and trimming, all that. I can operate a backhoe, a roller. Any opportunity to do something that would show my talents, I'd do it. It would be my ticket out the streets."

"I just need someone to give me that chance. A nice construction job, anything. I would hold onto that until I die."

Some economists say the real black unemployment rate is as high as 25 or 30 percent, because government figures don't count "discouraged" workers who have stopped looking for jobs and dropped out of the labor force.

Davis now falls into that category — partly due to societal forces and partly, he knows, because of his own bad decisions.

Recently, police said they caught Davis with a half-ounce of marijuana. His trial date is approaching. As a habitual felon, he could get a 10-year sentence.

Black homeownership hit an all-time high in 2004, with 50 percent of African-Americans owning their homes, according to census data.

Today, the black homeownership rate is 45 percent, compared with 74 percent for whites. Nearly 8 percent of African-Americans who bought homes from 2005-2008 have lost them to foreclosure, compared with 4.5 percent of whites, according to an estimate by the Center for Responsible Lending.

Goldring remembers when she got the foreclosure notice from the bank, "I bawled."

Her son, Chris Fredericks, says she was "vulnerable, more than I have ever seen her, but she still kept moving."

He was incredulous that his mother was in such a position.

"At any point, you can slip back. It's just the way the economy is going," he says. "Once you get into a spiral, there's no telling how far down you could go."

One day, at a counseling session on how to prevent

foreclosure, Goldring learned about a new Maryland program that offered help to people who were behind on their mortgages due to layoffs or medical bills.

She thought it was too good to be true. It wasn't.

The Emergency Mortgage Assistance program, financed by federal money, offered a zero-interest loan of up to \$50,000.

The money would pay off up to a year of back mortgage payments, plus up to two years of regular payments. All Goldring had to do was pay 31 percent of her current gross income, or the full mortgage payment if she got a new job close to her original salary.

And so on a sweltering June day, Goldring stood before a podium in her freshly mulched back yard, flanked by a congressman, the mayor, the lieutenant governor, and other officials.

The sound of chirping birds filled the air. Cameras rolled as the dignitaries told Goldring's story, using her as an example to spread word of the Emergency Mortgage Program to other struggling homeowners.

"I want to thank you for your courage," said the lieutenant governor, Anthony Brown.

"I know you did everything right," Brown said. "You worked hard, you saved diligently, but challenges never overtake our wallets."

Goldring stood in front of the microphone and exhaled.

"After this," she said, "the only good thing would be to be employed, once again."



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Frugal ways to spruce up decor

Old wooden ladders can be found at garage sales, estate sales and flea markets. It might be too old to be used for its intended purpose, but if you see one (folding or straight) marked low or free at the "curbside mall," it can be creatively used in your home and garden. Ladders can be left in a weathered, rustic state, or get a can of clearance paint at your local home improvement store or use up any leftover paint you've been storing to give it a more modern look.

How have you used an old wooden ladder?

Here are a few ideas to put an old secondhand ladder to use rather than pay retail price (which can cost

upward of a couple hundred dollars) on a decorative ladder:

Book shelf: You can take two or more folding ladders and add wood planks between them to make shelving (CDs and DVDs, or even fabric and yarn could be displayed). You could simply hang a folding ladder horizontally on a wall. (Think tall books toward the bottom step and shorter books toward the top step.) Hang a straight ladder or two horizontally to hold framed photos and col-

lectibles.

Plant display: Indoors or outdoors, a folding ladder can hold potted plants. Lay a straight ladder flat on the ground to separate garden plantings such as herbs. Ladders make a great trellis for your garden vine plants. (Clematis would look lovely, but vegetables would work well.) It would be pretty to use for climbing house-

plants (philodendron, ivy and pothos come to mind) on a front porch, too.

Side table: For use in the living room or office, or in the bedroom, a small folding ladder makes a lovely side table or nightstand.

Rack: Lean a straight ladder against a wall and use it to display magazines, artwork, quilts and blankets, vintage tablecloths or bath towels. And speaking of towels, a wooden ladder propped against the house is a whimsical addition at a

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
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In hot weather, lettuce requires special care

But special tricks are needed to pick lettuce from the garden now, when it's hot. This time of year, lettuce tends to bolt — that is, to flower and make seeds. Once a flower stalk starts push-

ing up through the whorl of leaves, those leaves turn bitter and tough.

Actually, flavor plumpets even before the stalk becomes evident. Keep a close eye on your lettuces, and you'll see that the leaves undergo a slight color change from shiny, vibrant green to dull, slightly bluish green.

Like any plant or animal, lettuce has to reach a certain age before it can make seeds and reproduce. So one obvious way to keep your salad bowl filled with tasty lettuce is to keep sowing seeds so you always have young plants to eat.

I plant lettuce about every three weeks all summer. Just a little at a time, though, because three weeks after you start eating one planting you'll be eating the next sowing's harvest.

Lettuce also bolts in response to the combination of long days, dry soil and hot temperatures. Spring and fall lettuce rarely bolt because, although the plants might be old enough to go to seed, the days are just too short.

You cannot do anything about summer's long days, but you can do

Sump pump can stop basement disaster

Q: I hope you can help me decide on a good backup power system for my basement sump pumps. We recently invested a lot of money to finish out our basement, and it's beautiful. We would be devastated should we have a flood due to lack of electrical power to our new sump-pump system.

My plumber has mentioned "battery backup" and I have heard of water-powered pumps that require a constant flow of water from the house system. I have my concerns, and would like other options. What advice

can you give me on protecting my basement from water damage during a power failure? — *Bill, Ohio*

A: I understand the concerns to protect your new basement investment. I've seen many homeowners fix up basements and neglect to invest in a sump-pump system, or electrical backup protection for the pump.

A sump pump is the last line of defense against basement flooding. Without electrical power to the pump, you can really get stuck up a creek without a paddle, as they say.

If you're looking to have your sump pumps automatically operate during a long power outage, install a small standby

Natural defenses help weeds resist eradication

Do you ever wonder why some weeds are easier than others to control? Weeds by nature have defense mechanisms that help them survive predators and weather extremes.

Some of the more difficult-to-control weeds have extremely thick and deep root systems, can produce large amounts of seed, can have seed that can remain viable up to 40 years, or produce thorns or stickers for protection. Many weeds are so hardy that they can out-compete desirable turf and ornamentals. Some of these defense mechanisms also, by chance, provide protection against many of the chemical controls that are applied to them.

Take, for example, Southern Crabgrass. This summer annual weed has a hairy leaf blade (on both sides of the leaf) which makes it difficult for a liquid herbicide to adhere to. When liquid herbicide is applied, some of the liquid can roll off the leaf, not allowing it to get absorbed into the plant, reducing the effectiveness of the application. Fortunately, crabgrass is a

summer annual that can be controlled by applying a pre-emergent herbicide in the early spring to stop the weed seed from getting established.

Another example of a difficult-to-control weed is Nutsedge. Unlike crabgrass, the leaves on nutsedge are not hairy, but waxy and shiny. These "waxy" leaves serve, among other duties, to help preserve moisture during drought conditions.

The waxy leaf also makes it easy for liquid herbicide to roll off the leaf, not adhering to the leaf blade (similar to crabgrass).

Nutsedge is a perennial weed that is also difficult to control because of its root system, producing small tubers that provide it with energy storage for growth and reproduction.

I will be offering a class called "Weed Identification and Management" at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, July 14 at the Citrus County Extension office. Subject matter will include weed life cycles, weed



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

give the cottage (or city apartment) a laid-back spot to hang a jacket. And a crisp cotton pillow is photo-printed with a regal seagull perched atop a sign pointing to — what else? — the beach.

Bring some sea-life elements to a couple of walls with Pottery Barn's mounted faux sea urchin collection, set in a soft white frame. Branches of rosy coral are silkscreened on linen to make an elegant wall hanging. There are also pretty cast-stone terra cotta starfish, and shells, washed white and framed.

A day's beachcombing often yields some lovely finds, such as gently hued, water-washed glass. At Beach Grass Cottage, they've gathered up lots of the

that can be wrapped around tea lights or hurricanes for the patio. Cape Cod sand cloaks little tea-light jars — manna for the city-bound entertainer. And if yachting is a secret wish, order the porthole wall mirror. As realistic as you'll find, and fun for a powder room.

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Bad drainage causes crawlspace foundation water damage

Q: After all the rains, I finally decided to check my foundation to see if there was any water. I was surprised to find several pools of water and even more surprised to see black mold and rot on the floor of my home. When I removed some of the insulation, it was soaking wet. I have a pump in the foundation, but I never noticed it running. My

neighbor said I needed to get the drains from my gutters farther away from the house. What do you suggest?

A: Not only do you need to keep the water away from the foundation, you also need some major repairs. The black mold is where the sub-flooring is decaying and sooner or later there will be a large hole in the floor. When a homeowner sees

this kind of damage, the first thought is to replace the flooring, but unless you do address the water issue, the decay will return.

Homes with a crawlspace foundation should be inspected twice a year for flooding or water entry or for decay. In most areas of the U.S., termite infestation also can be a major problem. A semiannual inspection by a pest-control company or a certified home inspector is a wise investment to ward off the possibilities of

generating system. I'm not talking about a portable-type generator that has to be set up for each use. Those can do the job, but they use extension cords and need to be filled with gasoline. I'm talking about standby generators that operate with self-feeding natural or propane gas and that are permanently installed in your home's electrical system.

A standby generator operates automatically, so even if you're not home, the generator starts and the pumps can get the power they need. In the past, I've mentioned larger standby generating systems sized at 20 kw (kilowatts) for multicircuit home-power protection. But you may want

to tell your professional generator contractor to power up just the sump pumps and maybe one key circuit. For this, an 8 kw standby generator may do the job. This can keep installation costs lower and make efficient use of your natural- or propane-gas supply.

Bottom line: Protect your property by providing your own personal pumping power.

store supplies such as napkins, taper candles, extra sponges and paper towels so they're close by, but not taking valuable cabinet or counter space. You can display your picnic basket, prompting you to use it more often this summer. Also, use the ladder as a makeshift drying rack for clothes or flower/herb bundles.

Organizer: Straight and folding ladders can be used to organize shoes, sweaters, purses, stuffed animals, etc. You can attach wire baskets and use it for extra storage, too. Consider having a wire basket for each family member.

It can be a convenient place to store hats, mittens, scarves, school work, mail, keys, etc.

Holiday display: Use a ladder to display holiday cards and hang stockings, ornaments and lights. As a focal point, place a fresh poinsettia on top or attach a holiday wreath to the front.

Homemade pizza is frugal and delicious. You can add your leftover tidbits of meat and vegetables for toppings, too. Microwaving leftover pizza can sometimes cause it to get rubbery. One reader, Karen from Iowa, shares: "Instead of microwaving leftover pizza, melt a little butter in a frying pan. Place the pizza in the pan on

something about water and heat. Start by always planting lettuce in soil well-enriched with compost, leaves, straw, manure or some other organic material. They all help soil to hold moisture. Also water regularly, which anyway makes lettuce taste better. Lettuce needs the equivalent of 1 inch of water a week.

Yes, you can also do something about the temperature. Just as you cool off by moving out of the sun, so can lettuce. The plants tolerate shade this time of year, so cobble together a temporary wooden or plastic frame for supporting cheesecloth, wooden lathe or some other material that offers about 25 percent shade. Or let your garden space do double duty, and grow lettuce in the dappled shade of cucumbers, squashes, gourds, toma-

atoes or pole beans trained up stakes or an inclined trellis.

Or plant lettuce near the cooler, eastern side of your house or garage. Frilly and red-leafed Lolla Rosa is one of a few lettuce varieties pretty enough to decorate a flower or shrub bed; the dappled shade beneath the other plants will keep Lolla Rosa from bolting, for a while at least.

And speaking of varieties, genetics also plays a role in how fast plants bolt, so plant those that are slower to do so. Among the best for growing in sultry summer weather are Black-seeded Simpson, Buttercrunch, Kagan Summer, Salad Bowl, Red Salad Bowl, Oakleaf, Deertongue, Diamond Gem and Graquerelle du Midi.

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

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
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

major structural damage. We all know it's important to change the oil in our cars every three months or 3,000 miles to prevent damage to the engine, but your home is more valuable than your car, and proper maintenance should not be ignored.

The drains from the roof's rain gutters should be directed at a minimum of 6 feet from the foundation. Homes on a hillside or homes with sloping yards may need to have the drains extended more. Runoff drains lying on the ground are unsightly and it may be necessary to have the drains buried just under the surface of the yard. Before digging to bury the drain, call 811 to have all the buried cables, water lines and gas lines marked so that you can

avoid damage to these vital systems. The marking service is free and is available nationwide.

Improper landscaping also can allow water to enter the foundation. Loose rocks, mulch and topsoils next to the foundation can filter rain and runoff water to the foundation. Water will take the easiest path to the lowest areas of the property and landscaping is a perfect filter. In the past I have tried plastic vapor barriers to ward off the water and the weeds, but over time, the plastic fails, and the protective barrier had to be replaced.

I would recommend a heavy clay soil for the first layer of landscaping, compacted and sloped to drain away from the home. Adding a layer of topsoil for the plants and a bed of mulch for weed control has worked best over the years. If you have a patio, walk or driveway made of concrete

or pavers, make sure they are sloped to drain properly.

If all else fails, a French drain buried around the perimeter of the foundation next to the footing is a sure-fire solution. A French drain is a flexible plastic pipe with drain holes to allow for water entry. The pipes are covered with a fabric called a sediment sock to keep silt out of the system. After digging a trench, crushed stone is placed inside the trench, then the drain tile and then

another layer of stone. Finally, a layer of topsoil is compacted in the trench to grade level and plants (or just grass) top off the project. Now runoff water is directed to the French drain and carried away by gravity before it has chance to enter the crawlspace. If the property is too low for a gravity-drained system, an exterior sump pump is installed to raise the water to where it can be drained by gravity.

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Prevention for pesky mosquitoes

Summer officially arrived June 23 with the summer solstice. It is too hot and humid to work in the garden after noon. I prefer to putter around in the cool of the evening, when butterfly caterpillars come out of hiding to feed on their host plants. Feeding at night lessens their

Occasionally I detect a few adult mosquitoes during my evening prowls. I empty and clean birdbaths and wildlife water dishes. A drop of cooking oil will coat the water surface to prevent mosquito larvae from breathing. Hopefully neighbors keep their birdbaths

chances of being eaten by birds. Foraging bees and wasps return to their nests before dark. Crepuscular screech owls swoop to capture palmetto bugs. Little brown bats dart across the evening sky feeding on a variety of moths and flying insects. Night hawks screech and Chuck-Wills-Widows reply. Barred owls call "Who cooks for you?" to remind me of dinner time.

As the birds fly, my farm is six miles from Hunter Springs in Crystal River and three miles south of Lake Rousseau. Mosquitoes breed in standing water. In the sand hills of the Brooksville Ridge, there is no naturally occurring standing water — hence no mosquitoes.

clean, too.

Look for and pick up litter and large magnolia leaves that may be used as breeding sites. Roadside ditches usually drain quickly in the sandhills. In areas that stay wet for many days, ditches may harbor mosquitoes. Clean up trash that can become breeding sites. If you kill adult mosquitoes, put several in a small container and call the Citrus County Mosquito Control District at (352) 527-7478. Their staff will come to pick them up to accurately identify what species are breeding in the area.

The Mosquito Control District has three board members, each elected for a term of four years. Albert Johnson, Robert

Milan and Brenda Busby currently serve. The director is Joel Johnson. Each district is regulated by Florida state statutes, has separate taxing and is independent of Citrus County Board of County Commissioners. Their next regular public meeting is on July 14 at 3:45 p.m. in the conference room of the MCD building at 968 N. Lecanto Highway, about a mile south of the County Road 486 intersection.

On Wednesday, June 15, a friend and I were outside at dusk. We heard a truck come up the isolated country lane and the sound of another engine running. The small white truck sported a yellow county license plate. The pretty young driver turned off the poison sprayer to talk to me. She wore no protective mask or clothing and was driving with the window open. I could taste the chemicals in the air. Fireflies were dropping dead as we spoke. Bats swooped in to snatch the easy prey.

She handed me a doorknob card from the Mosquito Control District. The card listed five tips to help eliminate breeding mosquitoes around houses:

1. Empty plastic wading pools

and store inside when not in use.

2. Get rid of old tires, tin cans, jars, buckets, drums and other containers, or keep them empty.

3. Clean clogged gutters and drain flat roofs.

4. Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets, and move air conditioner drain hoses frequently.

5. Change water and scrub out birdbaths and vases holding flowers or cuttings twice a week, or grow cuttings in sand.

One call to (352) 527-7478 and the pleasant receptionist Kathy promptly put my little lane on the no-spray list. Hopefully new generations of fireflies, moths and butterfly caterpillars will replace those killed by needless routine spraying. Bats, birds, lizards, toads, frogs and snakes that eat insects will become free of poison now the regular spraying has stopped.

medium heat with the lid on tightly. The steam will melt the cheese, and the butter will make the crust crispy instead of soggy."

Think making pizza dough is too time-consuming? The following tip shares a dough recipe and there's no rising required. This makes for a fantastic pizza dough that doesn't burn on the bottom, either.

No-rise pizza dough:

- 1 egg.
- 3 tablespoons sugar.
- 1 teaspoon salt.
- 2 tablespoons shortening.
- 1 cup milk.
- 1 cup water.
- 2 packages dry yeast.
- 4 1/2 to 5 cups flour.

Beat egg, sugar and salt well. Heat shortening, milk and water to lukewarm, then add yeast. Combine milk mixture with sugar mixture. Add flour until mixture is no longer sticky. Put on greased pizza pans. You have enough dough for two pizzas. — *Tisha, Canada*

Cook bacon: My neighbor cooks her bacon on a cooling rack over a cookie sheet in the oven. It helps make the bacon less greasy and the bacon stays flat! — *Kimmy, Michigan*

Store quilts: I store them in old pillowcases; it allows them to breathe and keeps them clean. — *Nancy L., email*

Beat cabin fever with "shed hunting": Every winter a deer's antlers will become loose and eventually fall off. (Don't worry; they grow back new ones over the summer.)

Usually around the end of January, I will hit the woods and cover miles of ground in search of these precious bones. This is called "shed hunting." A shed is just a deer's antler that has fallen off. And shed hunting is just looking for and collecting them.

This is one of my favorite hobbies because not only does it cost no money, it gives me plenty of exercise. I also like hiking out in nature, so this just adds another component to that. All I need is a pair of boots, some warm clothes and a pair of well-trained eyes. This is just the perfect hobby for a nature freak like me.

I need to give a word of warning though: It's a pretty tough activity, especially if you've never done it before. There are a lot of little tricks you have to learn in order to find antlers consistently. You can't just walk around randomly and hope to find a lot. You need to find out where the deer have been wintering and which areas would be good places for them to drop (for example, bedding, feeding and transition areas).

However, there is also a lot of plain old luck involved. Last year, for example, was a pretty bad year for me. I went out around 20 times (probably averaging five miles of walking each time) and I only found two old ones. But then three years ago I went out about the same number of times and found 17. So luck is a huge part of it.

Most trips I don't find antlers, but I have found up to three in a single trip, so you've just got to have patience. Even if I don't find any, I still enjoy being outside. But seeing those tines sticking out of the snow definitely makes it more enjoyable. — *C.T., Ohio*

Dear Sara: I'm looking for a way to dispose of self-stick address labels without gumming up my shredder. I saw a really simple way of doing it and made the mistake of thinking I would remember how. Guess what? I don't remember what to do. I hope you can help. — *Karen J., e-mail*

Dear Karen: Rub nail polish remover on the labels to remove them prior to shredding or add extra paper that you plan on shredding on both sides of the page that has an address label on it. Another option would be to tear off and save the paper that has the address labels and go somewhere that offers free paper-shredding events. They're typically held a couple times a year at stores such as Lowe's, Office Depot, etc. Public document

shredding events can be found here: www.filestoreshred.com or call (877) 60-SHRED to find a local community shred event. You can call your city office, Better Business Bureau, local credit unions or banks, or AARP and ask if they have any plans to host an event, too.

Dear Sara: Can you please tell me how to clean a cloth Coach purse? — *Janet E., e-mail*

Dear Janet: While I have ideas on what would work, in this case I'm hesitant to offer any frugal suggestions. I would call Coach directly ((800) 444-3611) and ask a customer service representative for the company's recommended method of cleaning. Coach's Signature C Fabric Cleaner runs \$10, which is not badly priced. I'd ask if this is the product that the company would suggest for your purse. And if it isn't, ask what you should use.

Dear Sara: I recently finished a baby quilt that I marked with yellow quilt chalk. We have used Clorox stain remover and color brightener, and sent it through the wash several times. It's still stained. We've also used white vinegar and a Mr. Clean product. Nothing has done the job, and the baby is due next week. Help! — *Bobby F., North Carolina*

Dear Bobby: Quilt chalk marks are a common problem. It seems they either don't mark well enough or they stain fabric. You've tried vinegar, which was my first suggestion to remove it. I would try blotting it with rubbing alcohol or hydrogen peroxide. Wash as usual, but don't use your dryer. If the stain persists, try Shout. I would continue to wash it and see if the stain diminishes with each wash, which it should. Visit www.freepatterns.com/content/content.html?content_id609 for suggestions compiled from fellow quilters. After reading it, I think the backyard pressure wash with a hose sounds like a great suggestion.

Afterward let it dry outside in the sun (natural bleach). I also recommend the Web site's suggestion of marking another piece of fabric and doing tests on it to see what works best before attempting it on your actual baby quilt.

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
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Last round for 'Closer' precedes second one for 'Rizzoli & Isles'

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While one of TNT's female crime-busters is winding down, two others are revving back up.

On Monday, July 11, "The Closer" and "Rizzoli & Isles" both start new seasons, but at different ends of their respective runs. An Emmy winner last year for her title performance, Kyra Sedgwick is beginning her seventh and final season as police-case "Closer" Brenda Leigh Johnson, while Angie Harmon and Sasha Alexander are launching their second round as police detective Jane Rizzoli and medical examiner Maura Isles.

Many of the other "Closer" characters will continue in the TNT spinoff series "Major Crimes" next year, but Brenda is not going gently into that good night. She has to revisit her past, and in essence her entire arc on the show, when she's named in a civil suit against the Los Angeles Police Department. That makes her the focus of an internal investigation by Capt. Sharon Raydor, played again by Mary McDonnell (who will be a cast regular in "Major Crimes").

Sedgwick made the decision to leave "The Closer," and she reasons that even if the suit should end Brenda's career with the

LAPD, "she feels she did the right thing, and I don't think many audience members will feel otherwise."

The outcome has been planned by "Closer" creator and executive producer James Duff for a long time, Sedgwick adds. "He said he knew from the time he wrote the first script how the story would end, even before he was sure he'd be able to end it the way he wanted to," she says. "And I think it's wonderful that he's getting to do it the right way."

So is Sedgwick, alias Mrs. Kevin Bacon, since she's pleased to give Brenda a completely fresh chapter as she makes her exit. "We're always looking for new obstacles for her," she confirms, "and this is a really great, big one. As the season goes on, the pressure just mounts and mounts until it becomes untenable. She loses it a few times, and that's really fun to play."

In the tradition of TNT dividing the seasons of many of its shows, "The Closer" will offer 10 new stories this summer and another five later in the year, then wrap up with six final episodes next summer that will lead directly into "Major Crimes." Knowing that her "Closer" co-stars still will have jobs after she leaves "eases my mind greatly," Sedgwick says. "For sure."

Being succeeded by "Dances With Wolves" alum McDonnell in the spinoff also makes Sedgwick content to depart. "She's a great actress, she's got a lot of power behind her, and she's a lovely person. The guys love her, and I feel good passing the mantle to someone who's gonna take good care of my boys." In the meantime, Sedgwick and McDonnell will share

significant screen time as "The Closer" closes.

Harmon and Alexander surely will do the same as "Rizzoli & Isles" enters its sophomore season, which picks up after Rizzoli was shot during a crisis at her Boston police precinct. She gets a medal and something else: the returns of both an ex-beau (Chris Vance) and her newly paroled older brother (Colin Egglesfield). Maura also sees the reappearance of a family member, her adoptive mother (veteran actress Jacqueline Bisset, whose guest run starts Aug. 1).

"There's such a voraciousness to Jane, I think she's just more comfy about it now," Harmon says of the tough-minded Rizzoli. "Before, it was like she didn't know how much strength she really had or who she really was. After something like (the shooting), you pretty much draw your line in the sand on what you're going to take and not going to take. As an actor, it's such fun to have a heroic moment like that and have people come running up to you in airports and say, 'Are you alive?'"

Alexander says year two of "Rizzoli & Isles" starts out strong. "I feel the writing has taken an interesting direction, really using the core characters," she says. "There's a lot of stuff happening between them, and that's what's

really driving the story lines. Second to that, obviously, is the crime they're working on that week. It doesn't fall into any of those 'procedural traps,' as I call them, where we as actors feel like we have to go to the same place every week."

Also lined up for a "Rizzoli & Isles" guest stint is Bill O'Reilly, a Harmon friend and — of course — the host of Fox News Channel's "The O'Reilly Factor." Harmon reports, "He's been in to visit before, and I've been on his show, and my husband (former New York Giants cornerback Jason Sehorn) has, too. I love talking to him politically, just picking his brain on what he thinks and who he likes."

O'Reilly's turn comes toward the end of the "Rizzoli & Isles" season, but Alexander already has had her experience playing daughter to Bisset. "I was really excited to not only meet her, but to work with her," says Alexander ... who is the daughter-in-law of another international movie star, Sophia Loren.

"(Bisset) is such a beautiful woman, and she is so much Maura's mother. She plays the character sophisticated, cultured, mannered and very worldly. I love that (executive producer) Janet Tamaro writes about the relationships we have with our families and how they affect our lives."

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
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
