Fire put out in Dunnellon

Five fire engines responded to a house fire Wednesday night in Dunnellon.

When firefighters arrived at the house on 8301 N. Tiny Lilly Drive, smoke was billowing from the garage.

According to Citrus County Fire Chief Larry Morabito, fire crews immediately went to work on the garage area and successfully put down the fire within five minutes.

Except for minor smoke damage in the rest of the home, most of the damage was confined to the garage, Morabito said.

Damage was estimated at \$25,000 to the building and \$12,500 to contents. The cause of the fire is undetermined and the investigation continues.

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Dawsey details fire service transition

Law enforcement academy to evolve for new mission

Keeping an eye on the county's transfer of fire services to the sheriff's office, a commissioner on Tuesday questioned whether the county was paying twice for firefighters' physical examinations.

Commission vice chairman Winn

Webb, who serves District 5, raised a concern about an item on the consent agenda, which approved budget transfers for EMS Grant and Fire Rescue. Webb said \$12,000 would be spent for background checks and physicals for firemen who had already gone through physicals and background checks.

"And now that that's been transferred to the sheriff's office, they have to go through this again," said Webb, an announced candidate for sheriff in 2012. "As the sheriff said, we weren't going to save any money,

but he didn't tell us we were going to pay twice for the same product."

As the expense was already in the budget, Webb moved approval, seconded by Commissioner Joe Meek, and the motion carried. By a 3-2 vote in June, the commission endorsed a plan by Dawsey for his agency to take over the county's fire services.

Speaking Wednesday to the *Chronicle* editorial board, Sheriff Jeff Dawsey raised Webb's question and said the commissioner would receive a letter of explanation.

The sheriff's workman's compen-

sation insurer would not accept the current results of the physical examinations.

"We have to redo it because there is great liability when you look at the hypertension issue," Dawsey said.

The rest of the transfer was going well. Dawsey expected the firehouses in Sugarmill Woods and Floral City to be operational by Oct. 1.

The DeRosa firehouse would need work. A contractor would be hired with the idea of future expansion for emergency management services.

"After we talk with the architect,

Boardwalk nearly complete; officials eye official ribbon-cutting in October

The final construction stage of the 1,300-foot boardwalk that meanders around Three Sisters Springs inside the Crystal River National Wildlife Complex is about to begin.

"The boardwalk is 99 percent complete, but we have some key safety features that need to be installed," Assistant Refuge Manager Boyd Blihovde said Wednesday.

Those safety features include handrails on all four of the ramps that lead up to the boardwalk and

The big difference is that the change, mandated by a new state law, sets up specific punishments ranging from

'I deserved to get shot'

Female sibling hit after pointing gun at police

PUEBLO, Colo. — A woman caught with her two brothers after a nationwide manhunt told Colorado authorities she "deserved to get shot" after pointing a gun at a police chief at the end of the siblings' run from the law, according to a court document.

Lee Grace Dougherty, 29, Dylan Dougherty Stanley, 26, and Ryan Edward Dough-

erty, 21, are being held in Pueblo County, Colo., on bonds of \$1.25 million each. The three made their first court appearance Thursday by video from jail, and none made any statement during the brief hearing.

They face charges of attempted murder of a peace officer and assault on a peace officer. The charges stem from allegations that

Y-town loses bid to stop mine

Second lawsuit still pending

Yankeetown has lost its challenge of Levy County's approval of the Tarmac King Road mining operation.

In a 287-word order, 8th Circuit Court Judge Robert E. Rountree Jr. dismissed the petition for a writ of certiorari — a judicial review — of the Levy County Commission's May 3 decision to approve the mine on a 4,750-acre site near Inglis. The company expects to mine at the rate of 25 acres per year for 110 years.

"Yankeetown argues that County's decision to grant Applicant's special exception departed from the essential requirements of law because Applicant has not obtained all federal permits before filing its application for special exception as required," Roundtree said in the order.

"Yankeetown further argues that approval of the special exception violates Levy County Code §50-719(II)(c)(4) and §50-186 because the subject mining operation is located in an area designated as 'Environmentally Sensitive Lands.'"

Both sides argued the case on Monday.

"The Court finds that the Petition for Certiorari should be denied on the merits."

Levy County Attorney Anne Bast Brown said, "I am very pleased with the order." She said she was especially pleased that the ruling was "on the merits."

This is not the end of litigation on the special exception permit approved by Levy County commissioners. Withlacoochee Area Residents Inc. has filed a civil suit challenging the approval as violating the county's own land use plans, including the section on mining on environmentally sensitive lands. The first hearings in that suit will be in September.

Gov. Scott in Keys to promote tourism

KEY WEST — Gov. Rick Scott cast a fishing line into the calm ocean waters off the Florida Keys on Thursday in an attempt to promote a state tourism industry reeling from a bad economy and last year's Gulf oil spill.

The Republican governor went fishing for tarpon along with Kathy Barco, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's chairwoman, and executive director Nick Wiley.

Wearing a life jacket and a baseball cap against the sun, Scott fished off a 35-foot

charter boat in waters about one mile and five miles off Key West, at the very end of the Florida Keys. He hooked one tarpon, but it snapped the line and got away.

He did reel in a large gag grouper, which he released back into the water after posing for pictures.

Fort Island beach open to swimming

The Citrus County Environmental Health Department said on Thursday bacterial samples at Fort Island Gulf Beach remained at a good level in the most recent test. That means the beach is open. More water sampling will be done next week. The water is tested each week on Wednesday morning, and if the samples are too high in contaminants, the health department issues an advisory against swimming. Deputies collect school supplies

Community generosity puts man on road

Donations help man buy van

CRYSTAL RIVER — For David Gregory, his "new" 1999 eggplant-purple Plymouth Voyager van is like driving a sports car.

"I used to say my other one was the 'Starship Enterprise' — whenever I took off in it, it was an adventure," he said. "I never knew if I'd make it to my destination. With this one, I like the whole concept of it because it's compact. It's a lot easier than my other one.

Born with osteogenesis imperfecta ("brittle bone disease"), Gregory had had more than 80 broken bones, has spent weeks in traction and has undergone surgeries to have steel rods implanted in his legs. He spends most of his days in a motorized chair.

Five years ago, he got a van, a 1993 Ford E-150, with a lift. Last month, the Chronicle reported how the van kept breaking down and that the lift had broken.

Traveling back and forth to his job at the county Property Appraiser's Office in Crystal River had become dangerous. The list of what was wrong with his van was seemingly longer than what worked.

Not one to give up, he called it his "McGuyver van" and kept a roll of duct tape, nylon string and tool kit handy, just in case.

That's when local businesswoman Renee Christopher-McPheeters started the ball rolling by opening an account at TD Bank and putting out a plea to help Gregory.

"A lot of people know David and I knew the best way to help him was with community effort," she said.

In less than a month, including a single donation of \$1,000, Gregory not only received enough money to purchase the van, but someone also gave him a new (to him) motorized chair. His old one was in as bad a shape as his old van.



"The gentleman in Floral City who sold the van to me gave me a really good deal," he said, dropping the price from \$2,500 to \$2,000. "It still needs a few things fixed — I think the A/C needs work and the headliner, but it's a lot better than my old one.

"The one donation of \$1,000 — I almost fell over backward," he said. "You don't expect anything like that."

Gregory said he plans to write personal thank you letters to everyone who gave a donation.

"I sure couldn't have done this without the support from the community," he said. "It's easy to become cynical today because of what's going on in the world. The one great thing is that there are so many people in this county who care."

Grill fire still a mystery

HOMOSASSA — The landscape along Halls River Road has a much different look these days.

On the spot where the Marguerita Grill once stood now sits an empty lot, devoid of the reminders of a fire that swept through the popular riverside eatery on July 25.

As of Thursday, the Florida State Fire Marshal's Office in Tallahassee still had not received the results of a sample it sent away for testing.

The investigation remains open, said Deborah Cox, spokeswoman for the Fire Marshal's Office.

"There is nothing to indicate it is arson," she said Thursday.

What hasn't changed in the days following the fire is the affection owner Tommy Piliouras feels for his community — and the love many feel for him.

Throughout the day, people stop by to offer support, both emotional and physical, in the form of help when he rebuilds.

"I still go there every day," he said. "It is hard to believe it is gone."

The early morning fire completely destroyed the restaurant, its patriotic memorabilia and sparked the community to rally around the Piliouras family and the 60 employees who worked there.

On Saturday, a fundraiser was held for the employees at Colonel Frogs on U.S. 19 in Homosassa and brought out more

than 750 community friends, raising around \$10,000.

"It was incredible," Piliouras said Thursday. "So many showed up and gave so much. It brings tears to my eyes."

Gary Bartell, a former county commissioner, has agreed to oversee the employee fund and



to make sure it gets to the employees who need the help the most.

For now, Piliouras said he dreams of the day he can open his restaurant once again — on the same spot.

"It is all I think about," he said. "We will be back."

Regional partnership sees future for tech industries

LECANTO — The future of economic development in the Tampa Bay region took center stage during the Citrus County Economic Development Council's board of directors meeting Thursday morning.

Stuart Rogel, CEO and president of Tampa Bay Partnership, gave an hour-long presentation on the Tampa Bay Regional business plan, which identifies the region's economic strengths and weaknesses while also highlighting where the opportunities for job creation and economic growth and diversification lie.

The Tampa Bay Partnership consists of eight counties: Citrus, Hernando, Hillsborough, Manatee, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk and Sarasota. Combined, the organization represents an area that comprises 6,515 square miles, 4.2 million residents, a labor force of 1.9 million and the country's 14th-largest media market.

The Tampa Bay Regional Business Plan originates from research gathered by SRI In-

ternational. From the series of analyses, Rogel stated four target industries of the future for the region were identified: Applied medicine and human performance; high-tech electronics and instruments; business, financial and data services; and marine and environmental activities.

The plan also presented a strategy for developing these industries and providing support to improve workforce availability and skills.

Rogel said he has been traveling the eight-county area presenting the plan to EDCs and county commissions. Now the next step, he said, is implementation.

Also at the meeting: ■ Rusty Skinner with Workforce Connection talked about recent changes made so Workforce Connection can be more supportive of economic development. The changes will allow the organization to set aside money to support initiatives that will promote job growth in the county.

■ Joe Meek, board president and Citrus County commissioner, stated that at the next meeting there will be a

presentation on Port Citrus and its progress.

■ John Siefert, executive director of the EDC, called the recent trip he and Josh Wooten, president and CEO of the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce, took to Oshkosh, Wis., a success. They handed out several brochures about the Inverness Airport Business Park at the 2011 AirVenture, an event that draws more than 500,000 people from more than 60 countries to the Wittman Regional Airport. The goal was to interest some of those people in the business park and Siefert said there has been a "positive response" so far from businesses and there will be follow-up with direct mail.

■ The business incubator in Homosassa is still on track to be finished in the next few weeks. So far, more than \$17,000 has been raised for the project. The goal was to raise \$20,000 so a little more than \$2,000 is still needed to reach that objective.

DCF: Anthony failed to protect daughter

ORLANDO — A report by Florida's child welfare agency says Casey Anthony failed to protect her 2-year-old daughter, Caylee, which ultimately resulted in the child's death. But Anthony will not face additional charges as a result of Thursday's report.

The Department of Children and Families closed out its investigations of Caylee's death, noting Anthony failed to protect Caylee by not reporting her disappearance in 2008 for more than a month, and that failure interfered with the law enforcement investigation and efforts to find the child.

The agency also concluded that Caylee died as a result of abuse or neglect, but the report said the agency was unable to substantiate that the toddler had died from asphyxiation.

"The inactions by the mother were clearly

failure to protect. As the child was found dead, obviously the failure to protect led to the death," DCF spokesman Joe Follick said.

A jury last month acquitted Anthony in Caylee's death. She was released from jail and has dropped from public sight. A judge last week ordered her to return to Florida to serve probation on unrelated check fraud charges, but her lawyers appealed and another judge is expected to rule this week whether Anthony must follow that order.

The child welfare agency's investigation was independent of the criminal investigation and the agency made no determination of who killed Caylee.

The agency investigates every child death when there are allegations of abuse or neglect. The report is also on record in case families come back in the system.

Florida sues bank over pension

TALLAHASSEE — Florida filed a lawsuit on Thursday that accused the Bank of New York Mellon of overcharging the state pension fund by millions of dollars.

The lawsuit was filed by Attorney General Pam Bondi in a state court in Tallahassee.

Bank of New York Mellon serves as the main custodian of Florida's massive retirement fund, currently valued at nearly \$120 billion.

The lawsuit contends that bank overcharged the state for foreign currency exchanges by

trading them in such a way that the state either paid too much or got paid too little. The lawsuit does not give an exact amount of how much the state was overcharged. Instead the state says the transactions cost Florida "millions."

"Every penny that state and local employees entrust to Florida's pension fund is hard-earned, and we will not allow Floridians money to be lost due to fraudulent activity," Bondi said. "Overcharging for foreign exchange transactions is essentially stealing, and any company that does do will be held accountable."

we will be able to change some things around because there is a lot of open space there for sleeping and living," Dawsy said. "We have to tear out some carpeting, put some tile in and move some walls to make it better, but nothing huge. We'll do that starting Oct. 1."

Dawsy said he had met with volunteers. He will hire a volunteer coordinator, and is seeking an individual who has been both a volunteer and a paid firefighter to "be able to take any bumps in the road from the paid guys to the volunteer guys and be able to grow the support end of the volunteer group."

A training coordinator's position also is in the works.

"We'll be making a pitch to the school board within the next two weeks about this evolution of the academy," Dawsy said. "I don't have the exact name yet, but

it's going to be going from a law enforcement academy to a public safety academy."

A key problem with the training program was that it hadn't been flexible.

"With our own training coordinator, our own training site, we can make it extremely flexible," Dawsy said.

About half of the 200 hours of training could be done online. Then, practical exams are done on Monday nights.

"There is some other classroom stuff, but it is not as tough as I think we are making it," Dawsy said.

With the training coordinator in place by Oct. 1, Dawsy said 40 hours of training could be completed within the first five weeks.

He said he expected to have 50 or 60 volunteer firefighters taken through Level 1 training, the first phase, within the first year of operation.

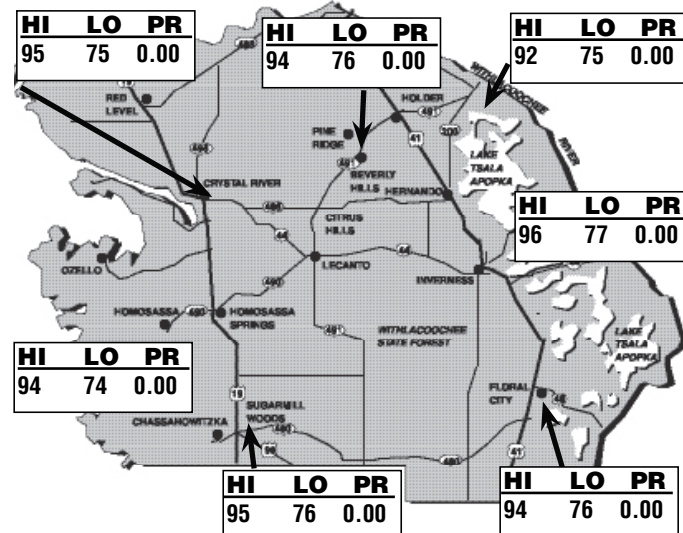

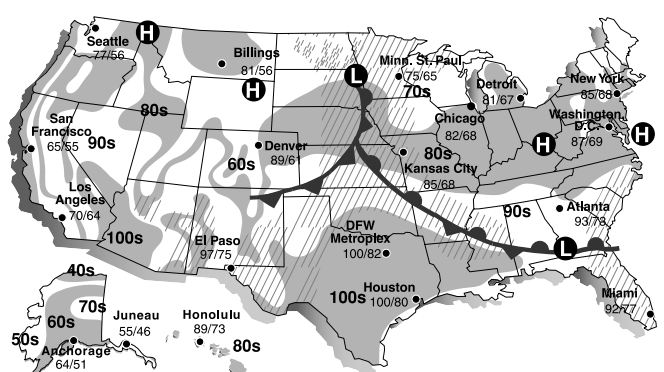

they shot rounds from an AK-47 at four patrol cars during a chase Wednesday on Interstate 25 in Colorado. The chase ended when troopers deployed spike strips to puncture the tires of the trio's Subaru, and the vehicle rolled and crashed into a guardrail.

According to an arrest affidavit, Lee Dougherty ran from the crash and was shot in the leg by Walsenburg Police Chief James Chamblain after she pointed a "machine pistol" at him. The document says she later told police, "I deserved to get shot."

Investigators said that when they asked her about gunfire during the chase, Lee Dougherty said she thought authorities were firing at them. Authorities said they didn't fire at the fugitives' car and believe she might have mistaken the sound of the spike strips for gunshots.

"We weren't trying to hurt anyone; we just wanted them to get back. They were way back and we could barely see them," she said, according to the affidavit. Separate affidavits for the three don't include statements from the brothers.

The trio's mother, Barbara Bell of East Palatka, Fla., spoke briefly Thursday to The Associated Press but declined to discuss their ordeal, saying she didn't think it would help them in the long run.

"Thank God they're not tried by the media," she said. "They're tried in a court of law and their story will come out at that time."

Bell hung up the phone shortly after a reporter called, saying she needed to keep the line open for concerned family members to reach her.

"I'm devastated and I'm trying to be strong for other family members," Bell said. "Throughout all of this, I think everybody just wanted it to stop. And now it's over."

The public defender appointed to represent the siblings, William Martinez, didn't immediately return a phone message.

The siblings also have no-bond warrants in Georgia and Florida on charges they robbed a bank in Georgia and shot at a police officer in Florida on Aug. 2.

"These three have a big legal mess in front of them, and at some point they'll face charges in all those jurisdictions," FBI Special Agent Phil Niedringhaus said.

Dylan Stanley and Ryan Dougherty are from Lacochee, Fla. Lee Dougherty had been living with

a boyfriend in Orlando, Fla., according to the Pasco County Sheriff's office.

Although another court hearing has been scheduled for the siblings in Pueblo on Monday, it's not clear whether they will ultimately be tried in court in Colorado, another state or federal court.

"State and federal agents and prosecutors continue to coordinate to determine what the appropriate next step is," said Jeff Dorschner, a spokesman for Colorado's U.S. attorney, John Walsh.

Pueblo County District Attorney Bill Thiebaut won't file charges until he can review reports from five state and local agencies involved in the Colorado chase. He said he hasn't been in contact with prosecutors from other states.

"My inclination is that if we can ethically charge these people with a serious crime here out of our office in Pueblo, it's likely we will be doing that," he said. "If we have probable cause, we will do that."

Attempted murder, the more serious of the preliminary Colorado charges, carries a sentence of up to 12 years in prison, but that could be increased to 48 years if it's found to be a crime of violence under Colorado law, he said.

The hunt for the siblings moved to Colorado on Tuesday after a sighting in Colorado Springs, where they reportedly bought camping gear. After images of the trio were broadcast on television, someone tipped Colorado state troopers and the Pueblo County sheriff Wednesday that the suspects might be at a campground in the remote San Isabel National Forest in southern Colorado.

A Pueblo County sheriff's detective spotted the car near an interstate highway that day and followed it discreetly until state troopers joined him. Then the chase was on.

Jenny Neal, a clerk who was working when the siblings went to the Sinclair gas station in Colorado City, said she had not been paying attention to the news so she didn't know who they were. After a detective came to the store to review video footage, Neal learned it was Dylan Stanley who went into the store by himself and bought vitamin water, sunflower seeds and gas.

"He was perfectly polite and friendly and, you know, completely calm and courteous, and I really didn't think anything about it," said Neal, 38.

"It's probably better that I didn't know anything, you know. I mean, it could've been different had I recognized them and been nervous or anything. It's a scary thought," she said.

Feds pledge more money for Everglades

\$100 million to be used to acquire more easements

WEST PALM BEACH — More money is coming to help with restoration of the Florida Everglades, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack and state officials announced Thursday during a tour of land that feeds into the vast sub-tropical wilderness reserve known as the "River of Grass."

The U.S. Department of Agriculture said it will use \$100 million to acquire permanent easements from eligible landowners and help restore wetlands on nearly 24,000 acres of agricultural land in the Northern Everglades Watershed.

"This is an important day. It's an important day for the United States. It's an important day for Florida," Vilsack said of the ef-

fort to reduce the amount of surface water leaving the land. The goal is to slow water runoff and the concentration of nutrients entering the public water management system and ultimately Lake Okeechobee and the Everglades.

USDA plans to purchase these permanent easements from eligible private landowners, and assist with wetland restoration, in Glades, Hendry, Highlands and Okeechobee counties.

Vilsack called the land owners key partners in the effort. "After all, their livelihood is dependent on the environment," he said as he prepared for a swamp buggy tour at the Winding Waters Natural Area in West Palm Beach.

There are roughly 4 million acres in the northern Everglades.

Including the money announced Thursday, USDA said it will have provided a total of \$189 million in Wetlands Reserve Program funding during the past two fiscal years to help farmers acquire easements and restore wetlands in the Northern Everglades. The total amount of land covered by the funding is roughly 50,000 acres.

According to the agency, under the voluntary program, landowners essentially sell their development rights to land and place their land in a conservation easement that permanently maintains that land as agriculture and open space. To be eligible, landowners must have had ownership of the land for the last seven years, be in compliance with wetland conservation provisions and meet income limitations.

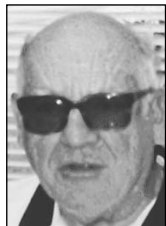

Ancient sea reptile gave birth, scientists say

Giant plesiosaurs didn't lay eggs

WASHINGTON — The remains of a giant sea creature are providing the first proof that these prehistoric reptiles gave birth to their young rather than laying eggs.

Plesiosaurs, which lived at the time of dinosaurs, were large carnivorous sea animals with broad bodies and two pairs of flippers. Researchers have long questioned whether they would have been able to crawl onto land and lay eggs like other reptiles or gave birth in the water like whales.

"This is the first evidence of live birth in plesiosaurs — an exciting find," said geology professor Judy A. Massare of the State University of New York, Brockport, who was not part of the research team.

The newly unveiled fossil was originally discovered in 1987 in Logan County in Kansas. Encased in rock, it had been stored in the basement of the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County until resources were available to separate the bones for display at

the museum.

F. Robin O'Keefe of Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., and the museum's Luis Chiappe uncovered the bones of an adult plesiosaur (PLEE'-see-uh-sawr) and the remains of a fetus inside her. The museum dated the fossil, which is more than 15 feet long, to between 72 million and 78 million years ago.

The researchers report on their analysis of the pregnant plesiosaur in Friday's edition of the journal Science.

O'Keefe said he had seen photos of the fossil, but was still surprised when he first saw it.

"I wasn't prepared for the emotional response I had," he said in a telephone interview. "You don't very often walk up to one and say: 'That is a really cool fossil.'"

"I walked around it for about a half hour, it excited me the way I used to get excited as a kid," he said.

There had been evidence of live births in an

ancestor of plesiosaurs. But the lack of proof for plesiosaur birth has been puzzling, said R. Ewan Fordyce, head of the geology department at the University of Otago, New Zealand, who was not involved in the research.

Fordyce said the researchers do a good job showing "that this is a fetus and not a young animal that has been eaten." He said it was the right size for a fetus and in the right place, and there's no sign that it had been eaten and digested.

Anthony Russell of the biological science department at the University of Calgary, Canada, called the find "significant."

"It would be hard to imagine these animals coming out onto land laying eggs somewhere," he added, so arguing that all plesiosaurs were doing this is a reasonable hypothesis.

In their paper, O'Keefe and Chiappe suggest a parallel between plesiosaurs and modern whales, also large animals that give birth to relatively big offspring. Like whales, they said, plesiosaurs may have formed social groups and tended their young.

weeks of training on the island fortress of Kungsholmen near Karlskrona, Sweden. In addition to the cultural components of touring Stockholm and Karlskrona, they also did

field operations in nearby forests, and toured Navy and Coast Guard ships and bases. The training group integrated with the Swedish cadets for military drill, boating, water survival and

sporting activities. International and Swedish cadets could often be seen sitting around during their free time talking about music, movies, TV, families, future dreams, hometowns and

home life — the very things any young person would talk about.

Although they learned a lot about Swedish culture and military, "I realized that the most valuable lesson was learning about the other international cadets and officers and working as a team, even though we had very diverse training," said Dunn. "We all made new friends and formed an effective unit in a unique training environment."

safety screening that will attach to the walkway from bottom to top. The finishing touches are scheduled to begin next week and are expected to be complete by Oct. 1.

The preserve surrounding Three Sisters Springs is a 57.8-acre parcel located in Crystal River and is now jointly owned by the city of Crystal River and the Southwest Florida Water Management District. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service manages the preserve.

Since the acquisition of the property in July 2010, plans have been in the works to add eco-friendly facilities to the property.

"Ultimately, our goal is to have the site fully functional, meaning a visitor could drive into the facility, park their vehicle get out and utilize walking trails or the boardwalk, stop into a visitor-contact station where they could go in," Blihoide said. "There would be a gift store and individuals could get information on manatees, the refuge and King's Bay."

Those plans, which could include constructing a roadway into the property and a visitor center, will be delayed for some time, he said. A water-reclamation project being conducted on the property by the Southwest Florida Water Management District must first be com-

plete. He also said funding uncertainty for additional work could add to construction delays on the property.

Refuge managers hope to have completed all of the boardwalk work, as well as a hiking trail around parts of the property before Oct. 22. That date marks Refuge Day. Managers are hoping for a community-wide celebration to formally recognize the completion of the boardwalk and hiking-trail projects that day. Those plans are still being finalized.

Lace Blue-McLean, president of the Friends of the Chassahowitzka National Wildlife Refuge Complex, said she and others with the all-volunteer group have been intimately involved with the project since 2008, when their vision for the preservation of the springs property began.

"It's very exciting to see our vision come together," she said. "We want this wonderful place to be accessible to the public so people can see the beauty of it."

"We're taking the whole

vision we have of the property and putting it into small, manageable pieces. This boardwalk is one of those pieces," she added.

While the site will be accessible to the public, she said that accessibility would most likely be limited for the foreseeable future.

"Most likely the property will be open on a limited basis, perhaps on weekends," she said. "But that

may depend on the amount of volunteers we have to work with."

being barred from participating in sports or clubs.

"Why do we have a law that tells our principals they have to do their jobs?" board member Pat Deutschman said. "I'm not going to vote for it because I think it's stupid."

The new law requires school districts to adopt regulations to stop students from exposing underwear or body parts in an "indecent or vulgar manner." It also specifies punishment based on number of offenses.

The school dress code, part of the Student Code of Conduct, had already said that clothing should not be sexually suggestive; it should cover and conceal body parts, should cover all undergarments and be worn at natural waistlines, student services coordinator Cherise Cernich said.

Punishment, however, was left up to principals for that and other dress-code violations.

Deutschman and school board members said principals best know students and circumstances, and they were not happy that the Leg-

islature had taken away that discretion.

"It is appalling," board member Thomas Kennedy said. "This was decided largely by people who would call themselves conservative. They are legislating common sense."

Deutschman also said that including the phrase "indecent and vulgar" opens the door to interpretation.

School board attorney Wes Bradshaw said the board had little choice but to approve the new language in the dress code, since it was required by state law. Deutschman voted no; board member Linda Powers was absent.

Cernich said Wednesday she will update principals on the new law and that schools will make sure students know as well.

She said most principals still believe they will be able to handle many dress-code violations without resorting to the mandated punishment.

"They feel they'll have few cases rise to that level," Cernich said. "We don't anticipate having large numbers rise to indecent or vulgar."

TRIPPED UP BY THE WEB

Forcing jobless to go online short-sighted

We keep saying we want more efficient government. But sometimes changes that seem more efficient turn out to be more burdensome for those the program is supposed to be helping.

Take, for example, the new Florida law changing jobless benefit processes.

As of Aug. 1, all initial and continued claims must be filed over the Internet — which the state says will save \$4.7 million annually in administrative costs.

Claimants must contact five potential employers weekly, and provide this information over the Internet during bi-weekly certification for benefits.

And those newly unemployed who want to receive benefits must first complete a skills review over the Internet.

An estimated 40 percent of Florida's unemployed have not, up to now, used computers to access their benefits. However, the popular telephone reporting system now is no longer available.

There are good arguments for putting everything online: it cuts administrative costs and makes use of computer skills that many employers require.

There are also strong arguments against it. Many job-seekers don't have computer skills; their employment fields

may not require them. Some of these folks undoubtedly are among Citrus County's illiterate or functionally illiterate, 24 percent of our population.

Then there's the question of access. Not everyone owns a computer or has Internet access.

Free Internet computer time is available at our public libraries, but the library system just saw a staff reduction due to budget cuts. Fewer staff members may mean reduced availability to help patrons who are not computer-savvy.

Computers are available at the Workforce Connection office in Inverness, where job-seekers are encouraged to take advantage of training and assistance to become comfortable with computer use. Workforce staff also help job-seekers with resumes and letters — on the computer.

Finally, transportation is a challenge for many who must use public-access computers.

Many unemployed depend on jobless benefits just to get by each week. Making it harder to meet reporting obligations while scrambling to find work is simply not useful.

It would have been better to offer the efficiency of a computer-based system for those having skills and accessibility, and to keep the telephone system for others.

No more telephone reporting — it's all online.

Customer service

I'm sure there are cranky customers in Citrus County. But in all fairness, there are some very cranky and nasty shopkeepers. I've been treated poorly by some and would not even consider going back into their store. So it works both ways. And remember, we do help you pay your bills.

Bring home troops

We need to bring home all troops from all foreign countries. Use them here to guard our borders, help rebuild areas hit by natural disasters and even take over airport security. Perry not the man for GOP

Republicans are waiting to see if Texas Gov. Rick Perry enters the presidential race. He's been meeting with donors and assessing his chances, and everyone seems to agree there's room in the current field among voters looking for an alternative to frontrunner Mitt Romney. But is it Perry?

The late columnist Mollie Ivins called him Governor "Goodhair," which was not meant as a compliment, but he's plenty popular in Texas, where his nationalist instincts on behalf of his state prompted him to publicly flirt with secession in the spring of 2009 at a Tea Party rally in Austin. It's hard to imagine a public figure that invoked secession as a good thing putting himself forward as someone who could lead the country, but stranger things have happened in American politics.

Perry could do well in Iowa if he makes up his mind to compete there, but the next state on the calendar, New Hampshire, is Romney territory, and unlikely to welcome another Texas governor. Come to think of it, Perry is no George W. Bush, but that also is not a compliment. Love him or loath him, Bush had real appeal in 2000. He was the "compassionate conservative" with a progressive education agenda, and he ran on the promise that he would be "a uniter, not a divider."

Perry's boast is that the Texas economy is doing better than the rest of the country, but that doesn't mean he has any magic policies he could transfer to the federal level.

Bush also had real outreach in the Hispanic community, winning a large share of that vote in 2000 and 2004. Perry has the most tolerant views toward immigration of anyone in the current GOP field, except perhaps Jon Huntsman, but it's not the bedrock of his potential campaign the way it was for Bush.

So what's with the excitement over Perry? He's hardly new and different, and he's not likely to do well anywhere else other than South Carolina. That's where John McCain lost his campaign in 2000, and it's become the make-or-break state for Republicans. But even if Perry wins South Carolina, where does he go from there? He would have little appeal in the Midwest battleground states, or even in Florida, with its increasingly cosmopolitan electorate.

If Perry is thinking of himself as a credible alternative to Romney, he better think again. Perry's best two states are Iowa, where he's skipping next month's straw poll, and South Carolina, where he could be a one-state wonder.

The days are over when each of the two major parties almost had to have a Texan on the ticket.

Lyndon Johnson was crucial to John F. Kennedy's win in 1960, bringing along Texas' electoral votes and giving the young Massachusetts senator credibility with Southern Democrats. Both President Bushes were Texans of course, and the first Bush, a seasoned political servant, ran with Ronald Reagan in 1976 and 1980.

The allure is gone, thanks in part to what many people, conservatives too, see as George W. Bush's disastrous presidency. Texas has become a solidly red state. There is no need to secure the state for the GOP, and it's so far out of reach for Democrats, they don't even try.

It's understandable that Perry would look at the race today, see an opening and conclude he might be the one to fill it. With 9.2 percent unemployment, any politician would see opportunity. But as an alternative to Romney, a weak frontrunner but still best in the show, Perry doesn't offer much. He's another diversion for a party that can't bring itself to be satisfied with the available candidates, and is justifiably fearful that a historic opportunity to defeat an incumbent president might be lost.

Got Coin? It might be just the time to cash in. This week, starting Tuesday and continuing through Saturday, the International Collectors Association in conjunction with the Ohio Valley Gold & Silver Refinery will be purchasing all types of silver and gold coins direct from the public. All types are welcome and the event is free.

Collectors will be on hand to identify and sort your coins. Then the quality or grade will be determined. The better the grade the more they are worth, according to collectors I talked to. With the silver and gold markets high, prices of older coins are too. Any coins minted before 1970 in the U.S. are 90% silver, except nickels and pennies.

The coin's worth is determined by the rarity and the grade. Old silver dollars are worth a great premium right now, even well worn heavily circulated ones are bringing good premiums. Franklin and Kennedy half dollars, Washington quarters, Mercury and Roosevelt dimes are all worth many times the face value. While older types like Seated Liberty, Standing Liberties, and Barber coins are worth even more.

Gold coins are really worth a lot right now, according to Brian Eades of the International Collectors Association. "This country didn't start minting coins until 1792" says Eades. He explained, "Before that, people would trade goods using gold dust and nuggets. Some

shop keepers would take more gold than needed to pay for items purchased. There was no uniform system of making change."

The government opened the first mints and began distributing the coins in 1792. By the beginning of the 19th century, coins and paper currency were wide spread and our monetary system was here to stay. In 1933 Roosevelt required all banking institutions to turn in all gold coins. Once all banks turned in this gold, the president raised the gold standard from \$20.00 per ounce to \$33.00 per ounce. This was his way of stimulating the economy during the great depression. However, gold coins were never redistributed after the recall. But not all gold coins were turned in. "Many folks during that time didn't completely trust the government and chose to keep their gold" said Eades.

These gold coins are sought after by collectors today and bring many times the face value. Any gold coins with the mint marks of CC, D or O will bring nice premiums. Collectors at the event will be glad to show you where to look. Other types of coins will also be purchased including foreign coins, Indian cents, two cent pieces, half dimes, three cent pieces and buffalo nickels to name a few.

Collectors warn people against trying to clean their coins, as significant damage can be done and the coin's value lessened.

On strike

Talks continued between Verizon and striking workers Thursday as the company enlisted the help of the FBI to look into alleged incidents of sabotage at some of its network facilities.

Ban sought on gene-altered crops

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Three environmental groups are suing to block planting of genetically-engineered crops on U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service land in eight Southern states.

The lawsuit filed Thursday claims federal officials didn't properly assess the potential impact of growing the crops on protected lands. The groups want a federal judge in Washington, D.C., to order an injunction to halt planting.

But the Fish and Wildlife Service says the 44,000 acres of plantings are in strategic areas to feed waterfowl and other birds along migration routes. Farmers have to leave a quarter of the crop on the ground.

The suit claims the farming encourages weed growth and harms wildlife.

The refugees targeted in the suit are in Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee.

Remains found in Alps after 54 years

VIENNA — An Austrian news agency has reported police have found the remains of a man they believe went missing in the Alps 54 years ago.

Police told the Austria Press Agency they located the partial skeleton Thursday after an alpinist gave them human bones and a hiking boot that he found near a glacier.

They say the find was made in the Tyrolean Alps, at a height of 2,500 meters — more than 8,200 feet.

Police believe the man is likely a climber from the town of Matri, close to the foot of the peaks and near the border with Italy who was reported missing while hiking 54 years ago.

A tortured choice: Which child lives?

DADAAB, Kenya — Wardo Mohamad Yusuf walked for two weeks with her 1-year-old daughter on her back and her 4-year-old son at her side to flee Somalia's drought and famine. When the boy collapsed near the end of the journey, she poured some of the little water she had on his head to cool him, but he was unconscious and could not drink.

She asked other families traveling with them for help, but none stopped, fearful for their own survival.

Then the 29-year-old mother had to make a choice that no parent should have to make.

"Finally, I decided to leave him behind to his God on the road," Yusuf said days later in an interview at a teeming refugee camp in Dadaab, Kenya. "I am sure that he was alive, and that is my heartbreak."

Parents fleeing the devastating famine on foot — sometimes with as many as seven children in tow — are having to make unimaginably cruel choices: Which children have the best chance to survive when food

and water run low? Who should be left behind?

"I have never faced such a dilemma in my life," Yusuf told The Associated Press. "Now I'm reliving the pain of abandoning my child. I wake up at night to think about him. I feel terrified whenever I see a son of his age."

Dr. John Kivelenge, a mental health officer for the International Rescue Committee at Dadaab emphasizes the extreme duress Somali mothers and fathers are facing.

"It is a normal reaction to an abnormal situation. They can't sit down and wait to die

together," he said. "But after a month, they will suffer post-traumatic stress disorder, which means they will have flashbacks and nightmares."

"The picture of the children they abandoned behind will come back to them and haunt them," he said. "They will also have poor sleep and social problems."

The United States estimates that more than 29,000 Somali children under age 5 have died in the famine in the last three months. An unknown number too weak to walk farther have been abandoned

on the sandy trek to help after food and water supplies ran out.

Faduma Sakow Abdullahi, a 29-year-old widow, attempted the journey to Dadaab with her baby and other children ages 5, 4, 3 and 2. A day before she reached the refugee camp, her 4-year-old daughter and 5-year-old son wouldn't wake up after a brief rest.

Abdullahi said she did not want to "waste" the little water she had in a 5-liter container on dying children when the little ones needed it.

Chinook ablaze when it crashed

KABUL, Afghanistan — Afghan children retrieved souvenir-sized pieces of a helicopter shot down by the Taliban in eastern Afghanistan where witnesses on Thursday described seeing the chopper burst into flames and break apart before falling from the sky, killing 30 U.S. troops and eight Afghans.

Coalition forces finished recovering the victims' remains and big sections of the wreckage. Yet small, twisted pieces of the Chinook CH-47 remain scattered on both sides of a slow-flowing river in Wardak province where it crashed before dawn Saturday.

Farhad, a local resident, told Associated Press Television News that the helicopter was shot down by a rocket-propelled grenade fired from a nearby knoll as it was preparing to land.

"As soon as it was hit, it started burning," he said, standing in a field still littered with small pieces of the chopper, including a part of a scorched rifle stamped "Made in Germany" and a piece of charred paper with typewritten first-aid instructions.

"After it started burning, it crashed. It came down in three pieces," he added. "We could see it burning from our homes."

Many of the victims' bodies were badly mangled and burned, said Farhad, who, like many Afghans, uses only one name.

The crash about 60 miles southwest of Kabul was the deadliest single loss for U.S. forces in the nearly 10-year Afghan war.

The crash comes amid fears that the country is far from stable even though U.S. and NATO forces have begun to leave Afghanistan. U.S. military officials have tried to counter those fears, saying that while the downing of the Chinook was a tragic setback, one crash will not determine the course of the war.

The victims included 17 members of the elite Navy SEALs, five Naval Special Warfare personnel who support the SEALs, three Air Force Special Operations personnel, an Army helicopter crew of five, seven Afghan commandos and an Afghan interpreter.

Gul Agha, another resident of Tangi Valley, also said that after the helicopter crashed, parts were burning on either side of the Tangi River. Some of the debris also ended up on a nearby hillside, he said.

"When the helicopter came at night, the Taliban were hiding in the bushes around the area," he said.

He said coalition forces worked several days to remove victims' remains. Then they blew up sections of the helicopter into smaller pieces, loaded them on trucks and took them from the site, he said.

Marine Corps Gen. John Allen, the top commander of U.S. and NATO forces in Afghanistan, said Wednesday that F-16 fighter jets killed the insurgents responsible for the crash. But the military provided few details to back up the claim.

The U.S.-led coalition has also said the helicopter was apparently shot down by a rocket-propelled grenade. But Allen said the military will investigate whether other

causes contributed to the crash.

Alam Gul, chief of the local council in Sayd Abad district where the crash occurred, said many villagers were up at the time because it is the holy month of Ramadan when Muslims fast during the day, break fast in the evening and then get up and eat again around 2 a.m. for sustenance to make it through the day.

He said people in the Tangi Valley worry that the U.S. will take revenge and bomb their villages. He insisted that no major Taliban figures were living or hiding out in the area, where many locals don't side with the U.S.-led coalition or the Afghan government.

"The foreigners are guests, but what has changed in 10 years?" Gul said residents ask. "Yes, you are our guests, but you have done a lot of bad things."

He said frequent night raids in and around his district have angered local residents, who are offended by knocks on their doors in the middle of the night when families are sleeping.

Coalition forces left a combat outpost in Tangi, less than a mile from the crash site, in the spring. They took their expensive equipment, but left other items, like freezers, Gul said. The Taliban retrieved the items and had a yard sale, he said. Afghans from the surrounding area came to shop. Then, instead of occupying the outpost, Gul said the Taliban booby-trapped it with bombs.

In Washington, the Pentagon on Thursday released the list of the 30 killed in the Chinook shootdown, along with their ages, hometowns and states.

Also Thursday, five U.S. troops were killed by a roadside bomb in southern Afghanistan.

On Wednesday, a NATO service member died in a roadside bomb blast and five Afghan policemen were killed when their checkpoint was attacked by Taliban insurgents, the coalition and Afghan police said.

The latest deaths, which raised to 374 the number of international forces killed so far this year, underscored the tenuous nature of the war.

Authorities use facial recognition after riots

LONDON — Facial recognition technology being considered for London's 2012 Games is getting a workout in the wake of Britain's riots, a senior police chief told The Associated Press on Thursday, with officers feeding photographs of suspects through Scotland Yard's newly updated face-matching program.

Chief Constable Andy Trotter of the British Transport Police said the sophisticated software was being used to help find those suspected of being involved in the worst unrest London has seen in a generation.

But he cautioned that facial recognition makes up

only a fraction of the police force's efforts, saying tips have mostly come from traditional sources, such as still images captured from closed circuit cameras, pictures gathered by officers, footage shot by police helicopters or images snapped by members of the public. One department was driving around a large video screen displaying images of suspects.

"There's a mass of evidence out there," Trotter said in a telephone interview. "The public are so engaged that people who wouldn't normally come forward are helping us — especially when they see their neighbors are coming back with brand new TVs."

Prime Minister David

Cameron acknowledged Thursday that police were overwhelmed by rioting that began over the weekend in London and spread across the country over four days. Mobs of youths looted stores, set buildings aflame and attacked police officers and other people — a chaotic and humbling scene for a city a year away from hosting the Olympic Games.

At an emergency session of Parliament summoned to discuss the riots, Cameron said authorities were considering new powers, including allowing police to order thugs to remove masks or hoods, evicting troublemakers from subsidized housing and temporarily disabling cell

phone instant messaging services. He said the 16,000 police deployed on London's streets to deter rioters and reassure residents would remain through the weekend.

A press officer with Scotland Yard — who also spoke anonymously, in line with force policy — confirmed that facial recognition technology was at the police's disposal, although he gave few other details. He said that generally the technology would only be used to help identify those suspected of serious crimes, such as assault, and that in most cases disseminating photographs to the general public remains a far cheaper and more effective

way of finding suspects.

The facial-recognition technology used by police treats the human face like a grid, measuring the distance between a person's nose, eyes, lips and other features. It has recently been upgraded, according to an article published last year in Scotland Yard's bimonthly magazine, "The Job."

The March 2010 article said that the new program has been shown to work far better than older versions of the technology, with one expert quoted as saying that it had shown promise in identifying people from high-quality, face-on shots taken off of surveillance photographs, mobile phones, passports or the Internet.

JOHNS CREEK, Ga. — Steve Stricker had a shot at history and Tiger Woods made some of his own.

Just not the kind he wanted. What a wild first day at the PGA Championship.

Stricker missed a 10-foot birdie putt at his final hole Thursday, just

a hair away from becoming the first player to shoot 62 in a major championship. He had no complaints, though, about settling for a 7-under score and the opening-round lead at Atlanta Athletic Club.

"I realized it was for 62 but didn't realize it was for history," Stricker said. "I hit a good putt. It just didn't go in. All in all, a good day."

For Woods, a miserable one.

Seemingly spending as much time in water and sand as he did on the green stuff, Woods returned to the major scene with a major thud — a 77 that was his worst round ever at the PGA.

A 15th major title? Forget about it. Woods will need a major turn-

around just to make the cut.

Beyond Stricker and Woods, there was Rory McIlroy banging his hand on an ill-advised shot off a tree root, Ryo Ishikawa spending so much time in the water he needed a snorkel, and two patched-up greens caused by mowers gone wild.

Stricker showed it was possible to go low by keeping the ball in the

Bucs set to take on Chiefs

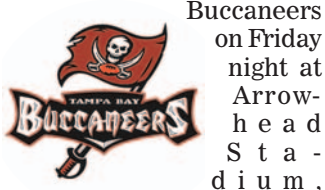
Today is both teams' opener of preseason

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The Kansas City Chiefs have barely worked out in pads. They haven't scrimmaged at all during training camp. Their full-speed, 11-on-11 contact portion of practice Wednesday night lasted all of six plays, and the starters took off their shoulder pads before it even began.

Ready or not — and there's a likelihood of not — preseason football has arrived.

The Chiefs open their four-game exhibition schedule against the Tampa Bay



Buccaneers on Friday night at Arrowhead Stadium, after just two weeks of a most unusual camp, and nobody is quite sure what to expect.

"Our No. 1 goal always is to be ready for the opening of the season," Kansas City coach Todd Haley said. "These preseason games are part of the process, from the evaluation to getting the players ready to all those things."

Tampa Bay coach Raheem Morris expects to give the Tampa Bay starters between 15 and 20 plays, which he thinks will be a little more than a quarter. But he stressed that a number of factors could change that plan, and the starting offensive line will be in the game as long as third-year quarterback Josh Freeman is under center.

Craig Anderson rubbed elbows with some of the greats in his major league career. Being taken by the New York Mets in the expansion draft of 1962, though, was when he became a permanent fixture in baseball history.

One of the "Original Mets," Anderson talked about his professional career with the St. Louis Cardinals and New York.

Anderson is now a Dunnellon resident, along with his wife, Judy, originally from Benton, Ill. Anderson met Judy McCarty, a 1959 Benton High School graduate, over Labor Day weekend in 1961, while he was a relief pitcher for the Cardinals.

"I met her at the ballpark over Labor Day weekend when her family came up for the series," he said. "One thing led to another and we started dating."

Heat of the moment

With the lasting hot weather across the country, schools are starting their football programs in the heat and humidity. At the same time in California, the Navy Seal recruits are starting their program in the heat. The similarity between a football team and a Navy Seal team is the extreme pressure of trying to make it. Trying to make the Navy Seal team or the high school football team and not appear to be weak while still taking in fluids and trying to maintain a reasonable body temperature is a common hurdle in both.

These factors can lead to heat-related disasters. As one of my sons finished Hell week and Phase 1 at Basic Underwater Demolition School, BUDS, last Friday, he commented on the number of guys who had quit or were dropped because of the inability of their bodies to deal with heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Here in Citrus County, as well as the rest of the country, there are going to be reports of kids going back to start high school and college football involved in heat-related illness, heat stroke and death. The medical emergency starts now.

Heat-related illnesses occur in every sport played in environments with elevated temperatures that have high humidity. Heat-related illness is the result of abnormally high body temperature resulting from exposure to elevated temperatures, high humidity and heavy exertion. Heat-related injuries are more common currently due to heightened levels of exertion in football gear. In the extreme, elevated body temperatures can result in heat stroke that can lead to death if not treated properly and promptly.

There is a spectrum of

Rays earn four-game sweep of Royals

ST. PETERSBURG — The Tampa Bay Rays have momentum heading into a week of important division games.

Jeff Niemann won his sixth consecutive decision, Ben Zobrist had a two-run triple and the Rays completed a four-game sweep with a 4-1 victory over the Kansas City Royals on Thursday.

Tampa Bay starts a key six-game road trip against New York and Boston on

Friday night at Yankee Stadium. The Rays started the day 8½ games behind the AL wild-card leading Yankees and trail AL East-leading Boston by 9½ games.

"Playing in our division is always a gas, and going up there to do it makes it even more fun," Rays manager Joe Maddon said. "Another good test for us. We're trying to climb back in this thing one step at a time. It's up to us."

Rays left-hander David Price (9-10) will face Yankees' ace CC Sabathia (16-6) in a matchup of All-Stars in

the opener of a three-game series.

"Everybody here still has that playoff mindset," Price said.

Niemann (7-4) allowed one run and nine hits over 6 1-3 innings. The right-hander is 6-0 in nine starts since returning from a strained lower back.

"Things weren't coming as easily as they have been the past few games," Niemann said. "You're going to have starts when you're not as sharp."

The Rays' first four-game

home sweep since July 28-31, 2005 — also against Kansas City — included an 8-7 win Wednesday night in which Tampa Bay scored five times in the ninth.

After Joel Peralta threw 1 2-3 scoreless innings for Tampa Bay, Kyle Farnsworth pitched the ninth for his 21st save.

Rookie left-hander Danny Duffy (3-6) gave up three runs and five hits over seven innings.

The Royals had 11 hits,

Police blow up writer's screenplay

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — A writer desperate to get a movie script read suffered the ultimate rejection Thursday when police blew up a briefcase he said contained the screenplay after an agent refused to read it, police said.

The bizarre story was set in Beverly Hills, where a man visited the office of the literary agent and left behind a briefcase that he said contained a computer, police Sgt. Brad Cornelius said.

The man left instructions for it to be delivered to someone at the business, who told another person in the office, "This guy's been kind of pestering me to read his stuff" and said he neither asked for nor wanted the briefcase, Cornelius said.

A security guard took the case into an alley, and a Los Angeles County sheriff's bomb squad was sent to investigate the suspicious package.

Officials sealed off one square block and evacuated dozens of people from a handful of businesses on nearby Rodeo Drive and Santa Monica Boulevard before blowing open the briefcase, which contained no explosives.

Police detained the man suspected of leaving the briefcase and questioned him before he was released, Cornelius said. His name and other details were not immediately released.

Barefoot Bandit signs movie deal

EVERETT, Wash. — The young Washington state man dubbed the Barefoot Bandit after a cross-country crime spree brought him folk outlaw status has reportedly signed a movie deal worth as much as \$1.3 million with 20th Century Fox.

The *Daily Herald* reports the money will be used to help pay the minimum \$1.4 million 20-year-old Colton Harris-Moore owes in restitution to the victims of his two-year-long crime spree.

Harris-Moore pleaded guilty in June to seven federal felony charges. Sentencing is set for October. He still faces state court charges.

'Twilight' actor bails out of jail

MESA, Arizona — One of the actors who plays a werewolf in the "Twilight" movie series has been released from jail after he was picked up by Tempe, Ariz., police on warrants for failing to appear on a misdemeanor drunken driving and drug charge.

The *Arizona Republic* reported 21-year-old Kiowa Gordon posted \$1,000 bail to get out of a Maricopa County jail Wednesday morning. He was arrested Monday for failing to appear in other Phoenix area courts for previous drug and alcohol arrests.

G.I.s of Comedy serving America one joke at a time

LOS ANGELES — When comic Will C. recalls his duty as a combat-tested ex-Marine — then gazes upon the fairly substantial gut he carries in place of an M-16 rifle these days — he likes to say the old warrior in him has gone MIA.

"And by that I mean McDonald's, In-N-Out and Arby's," C. tells audiences.

But he and four other well-traveled comedians will tell you they are still serving their country. Only these days they're doing it a joke at a time.

They are the G.I.s of Comedy, veterans of every major branch of the U.S. military, a couple of Gulf wars and a countless number of nights in the comedy trenches of nightclubs and college campuses from L.A. to New York.

It was, in fact, on the comedy circuit that they crossed paths, although that's not how Thom Tran, the former Army staff sergeant who put the G.I.s of Comedy together, remembers it.

"Here's how we met," he says of himself and C. "I was at the Taco Bell and he was taking my order."

"He wasn't behind the register," chimes in G. Reilly, who was aboard the Navy's USS Denver during the first Gulf War. "He was TAKING his order."

This is the point where the drummer would give us a rim shot. But these guys aren't on stage at the moment. They're ensconced in a window booth at Jerry's Famous Deli, a popular hangout with Hollywood industry types.

Not at the table this day is Jose Sarduy, who is still in the Air Force reserve and currently teaching young aviators to fly jets at a base in Texas. But not to be left out, he dials into Tran's iPad via Skype.

Sarduy, who came to the U.S. with his family in the 1980 Mariel boat lift, likes to say that when people learn he's a Cuban refugee they have trouble believing he's also an Air Force major.

"Everybody always says, 'They let the Cubans fly the plane? Shouldn't they be in the Coast Guard?'"

"You don't want a Cuban in the Coast Guard," he continues, adding that such a guardsman would let every other Cuban who could get a hold of a boat into the country.

Political correctness is clearly not this group's stock in trade. But Tran, who traded a career in the Army for comedy (he's also a part-time radio traffic reporter) after being shot in the head in Iraq seven years ago, believes all five have earned the right to say whatever they want on stage.

"These are people who have seen a little more high stakes part of the world. It's a life experience that results in something a little more than just jokes about airplane food," says Thomas Lennon, one of the creators of television's now-ended "Reno 911," who with his partner, Robert Ben Garant, is producing the group's shows.

The group, ranging in age from 32 to 52, is as multicultural as the military, with one black member, one Asian, one Hispanic and two white guys.

"When we put this tour together it shocked me that, you know, a black guy in the Navy, a Cuban in the Air Force, an Asian in the Army and a white guy in the Corps," Tran said. "I was like, 'All I need is a Muslim in the Coast Guard.'"

That is a joke he does need to watch. But not for reasons of political correctness.

He says he once told it in front a group of military recruiters and the next day one of them sent out a mass emailing looking for a funny Muslim.

"I'm still waiting for a funny Muslim in the Coast Guard to contact me," Tran adds, laughing. "But one day it will happen."

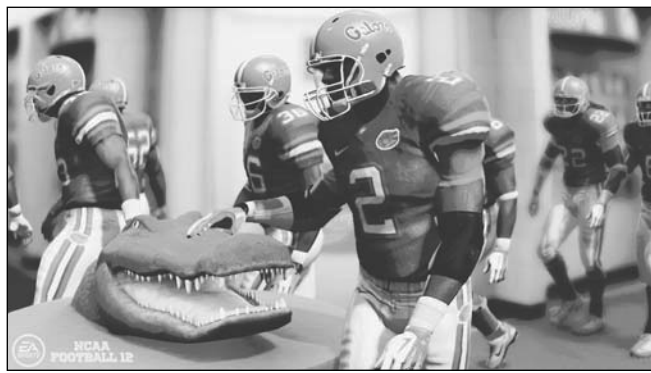
'NCAA 12' does what a sequel should

Saturdays in the fall just wouldn't be Saturdays without college football on TV, but fortunately for us video-game system owners there's an alternative to watching a Tuesday-night battle between a pair of unranked teams.

EA Sports is back with "NCAA Football 12" (\$59.99, Xbox 360 and PlayStation 3), which keeps last year's improved core game play intact while improving the presentation, animations and its Road to Glory and Dynasty modes.

EA's NCAA titles have for years admirably captured the atmosphere of Saturday afternoons with loud crowds, mascots and fight songs, but the series has lagged behind its John Madden big brother in terms of graphics, lighting and textures.

"NCAA Football 12" changes that.

The game introduces team-specific pregame festivities, improves the look of stadiums' tens of thousands of fans and finally gives fans Madden-style textured field surfaces.

Hits, tackles and catches have been thoroughly revamped and are now better timed, fluid and more realistic.

Penalties in games are few and far between, which doesn't seem to be the case in the college contests I watch on TV.

Perhaps it's odd that the biggest draw of a college football game is playing high school games, but the revamped Road to Glory is the game's most enjoyable mode.

Create a character, pick a position and set out to gain the attention of college scouts.

As your character performs well, he'll earn the interest of some modest colleges. Keep it up and more numerous and higher profile schools will develop an interest.

Once you land a spot on a college roster, you'll have to earn your new coach's trust. Running backs doing their job will get put in for more crucial situations. Quarterbacks who impress the coach will get a little more flexibility to call audibles or select a receiver hot route.

One neat thing about this mode is that you'll be able to import your character into EA's upcoming "Madden NFL 12," meaning a career can now span high school, college and the pros.

"NCAA Football 12" does what an annual sports title should do: It keeps the good and sprinkles in enough improvements to make it a worthwhile purchase. Three-and-a-half stars out of four.

Yankees 6, Angels 5

NEW YORK — Mariano Rivera stunned a raucous crowd still buzzing after Robinson Cano's grand slam. Mr. Automatic faltered for the third straight game, the rarest of slumps for the dominant closer.

Russell Branyan's three-run homer on the first pitch Rivera threw in the ninth inning was not enough to wipe out the lead, though, and the New York Yankees beat the Los Angeles Angels 6-5 Thursday, giving Rivera his 30th save for the 14th season.

"As much as we want to think that he's about as close to the perfect closer as we have seen, he's not perfect," Yankees manager Joe Girardi said.

After earning 29 saves this season with relative ease in his 15th year of shutting down teams with a buzz-saw cut fastball, Rivera gave up a run in a third straight appearance for the first time since last September against Baltimore, Tampa Bay and Boston.

The blip began on Sunday in Boston, when he blew his fourth save opportunity this season. On Tuesday, he gave up a two-run drive to Bobby Abreu in a tie game, his first homer allowed at Yankee Stadium this season.

"The saves and the stuff is OK but it won't make me or break me," Rivera said. "Games like this get me upset because I'm not doing what I'm supposed to be doing."

There's nothing wrong, Rivera said. He's just missing with one pitch.

"It's not that I've been missing and missing and missing and missing," he said. "Just one pitch, you get on one of those streaks. It happens."

Branyan was aware of Rivera's recent struggles and was prepared when he came to bat.

"For a three-game stretch, I've never seen him get hit this way," Branyan said. "I was just aggressive because he always come after me.... I've gotten that same pitch before and pulled it foul."

Rivera retired the next two batters to preserve the victory.

Cano had given the Yankees a 6-2 lead with his fifth career grand slam off Scott Downs two pitches after Maicer Izturis made a two-out error to load the bases.

CLEVELAND — Justin Verlander gave Detroit exactly what it needed, becoming baseball's first 17-game winner as the division-leading Tigers avoided being swept by Cleveland and opened a three-game lead in the AL Central with a 4-3 win over the second-place Indians on Thursday night.

Verlander (17-5) allowed three hits and struck out 10 in seven dominant innings to earn career win No. 100 as the Tigers ended a 13-game losing streak in Cleveland. He was also on the mound for Detroit's previous win at Progressive Field on May 8, 2010.

In taking the series finale, the Tigers kept some distance over the Indians, who did trim one game off Detroit's lead over the past three days. The teams will play 10 more times this season, including a season-ending three-game series at Comerica Park from Sept. 26-28.

Fausto Carmona (5-12) gave the Indians a solid outing, but they couldn't do enough against Verlander, who was in control once again in what has been a Cy Young Award-caliber season.

Joaquin Benoit pitched a 1-2-3 eighth and flawless closer Jose Valverde worked the ninth for his 33rd consecutive save, breaking the single-season club record he shared with Guillermo Hernandez, who did it in 1984.

BALTIMORE — Mark Buehrle pitched eight innings to earn his 10th win, Alexei Ramirez homered in a four-run first inning, and the Chicago White Sox cruised past the Baltimore Orioles 6-3 Thursday night.

Juan Pierre had three hits and two RBIs for the White Sox, who scored four runs before making an out. Chicago took three of four from the Orioles to complete a 6-1 road trip.

Buehrle (10-5) gave up three runs and six hits, struck out six and walked none. The left-hander has allowed three runs or fewer in 18 straight starts, matching the club record set by Frank Smith in 1909, according to research by the Elias Sports Bureau.

Buehrle is 4-0 in his last five starts, and his run of 11 straight seasons with at least 10 wins is a franchise record.

Sergio Santos worked a perfect ninth for his 25th save. Santos set a major league record by starting the season with 25 straight scoreless appearances on the road, breaking the mark set by Mariano Rivera in 2005. He has a 30-game scoreless run on the road over two seasons.

He let the 7-iron fall from his hands as soon as he struck the ball, and flexed his wrist in obvious pain. He walked to the next hole holding an ice compress on his arm. Finally, at the fifth, he was checked out by PGA Tour physical therapist Jeff Hendra.

Apparently reassured that he couldn't hurt it any worse, McIlroy played on. He had the wrist taped up to provide extra support and managed to grind out an even-par 70.

Stricker has never won one of golf's biggest championships — he's 0-for-52 — and the Americans are mired in their longest major drought of the modern era.

It's early, but maybe he'll take care of both in the same week. Stricker amazingly made birdies at both the 15th — the longest par-3 on the course — and the 18th, a lengthy par-4 that has water hugging the left side of the fairway and guarding the front of the green.

heat illnesses starting with overheating, heat cramps, then heat exhaustion and finally heat stroke. This is the result of the body's inability to sweat and properly cool itself. The normal evaporation of sweat is not possible in high temperature and, more importantly, high humidity.

Athletes have the ability to acclimate. But this does not always work and can not always be counted upon.

The heat-related symptoms are caused by the body being overwhelmed and inability to cool itself. The resulting symptoms are weakness, nausea, vomiting, headaches, being lightheaded or dizzy, muscle cramps and increased sweating resulting in further dehydration.

If not caught early further increase in the core body temperature above 98.6 degrees F, the athlete, golfer, tennis player, runner or kayaker may become confused, lethargic and may experience a seizure. The skin's blood

vessels constrict and sweating stops in order to retain fluid and keep blood pressure normal. This elevates body temperature even further and may exceed 106 degrees F becoming life-threatening.

In the athlete or sports person who is on medications that impair the ability to sweat, the risk is higher. These medications include antidepressants and tranquilizers, but there are others, including alcohol.

Other situations that provoke this are going to work out or participate in sports after sitting in an air-conditioned office, school or car for an extended period.

Acclimating to conditions allows the body to eventually perform in elevated heat and humidity that would otherwise be difficult. The body will make physical changes allowing it to cool more efficiently. There is a difference, however, between acclimation i.e. that is gradually getting used to a condition and torture.

There is no confusion on the treatment: body temperature must be lowered immediately. If you are

aware of exercising, playing a sport or exerting yourself in a hot and humid environment you must be aware. Changes in urine output or heavy sweating for extended period, mental status change with confusion, seizure or coma is late in the game.

There are many ways to lower body temperature ranging from wrapping in wet towels to cold showers to immersion in ice-baths. None of the methods matter except for the need to get the athlete into a colder environment and lower body temperature. Use what is available to cool down body temperature and call for paramedics. There is nothing worse than the death of an athlete from a perfectly preventable injury.

When ice-water immersion is not possible, continual dousing with water combined with fanning is an alternative method until more advanced cooling means are available.

Remember if in doubt, douse!!

returned, he reported to the Mets.

The 1962 Mets ended their inaugural season with a dismal 40-120 record, despite several "name" players and Casey Stengel managing, but Anderson had his moments.

"It was a big deal," he said. "Here I was with a new team in the Big Apple and we were bringing National League baseball back to the East Coast." Anderson's first appearance for the Mets came on April 14, 1962 against the Pirates at the Polo Grounds. He relieved Al Jackson and allowed no runs on two hits and two walks in two innings of work.

"My best moment was winning both games of a doubleheader against the Milwaukee Braves on May 12, 1962," Anderson said. He recalled the Polo Grounds as an "old stadium that was tough to pitch in."

"We lost a lot of games; in retrospect, I don't know how that affected my career," he explained. "I'm sure it had a lot to do with it; the Mets were constantly trading people, building up their farm system. Anderson was surprised that the Mets lost so many games.

the Polo Grounds and eventually retired from baseball in the middle of the 1966 season.

Along the way, Anderson pitched against some of the greats.

"Aaron hit No. 280 off me and Mays hit a homer off me, too, but I didn't feel bad about it," he said. "I got them out, too."

In fact, Mays was the last batter Anderson retired in his major league career.

"He hit a grounder to third and the third baseman fielded it and threw him out at first," Anderson said.

After baseball, Anderson, a Washington, D.C. native and graduate of Lehigh University, worked for 34 years at his alma mater. He now lives in Rainbow Springs, where he is a substitute teacher at Dannelton High School, where he helped coach the baseball team from 2003 to 2006.

"It keeps me young, being around the young people," Anderson said. "I was able to stay in baseball as a pitching coach at Lehigh and my son played three years of pro ball, which was nice."

Anderson said the original Mets team has had three reunions at signing shows and he hopes the team is invited back for the 50th anniversary of the Mets.

"Maybe in 2012," he said.

Gordon at 40

No slowing down driver on or off the track

LONG POND, Pa. — Jeff Gordon was struck by how the children of the Congo had their hands out looking for food or money. Gordon didn't make his fact-finding mission to Africa for a quick fix. He was there for an education on what the children needed and how he could make a difference in their futures.

So he talked to the kids. Learned their special handshakes. He forged a bond over a three-day trip with the people that stretched deeper than a quick photo-op or a pithy feel-good sentence on a press release.

Back home, Gordon is the four-time NASCAR champion. To some kids, he's the voice of Jeff Gorvette from "Cars 2."

In a country where some grow up with lifelong hardships, Gordon was simply a friendly face trying to help.

"As soon as you make a connection with them, they light up," Gordon said.

Gordon made his name as one of the greatest race car drivers on the planet. Now, he's traveling the globe, on behalf of his own foundation and the Clinton Global

Initiative, dedicated to charity work ranging from eradicating cancer to ending hunger. He does more than sign checks and call it a day. Gordon is visiting the poorest countries abroad, and touring food banks not far from the tracks that serve as his weekend office, to spotlight the causes that mean the most to him.

"I wish I had time to do more," Gordon said.

This is Gordon at 40: Mixing life in the pits with philanthropy; juggling marriage, fatherhood and other business interests. He's doing it all while enjoying a rebirth on the track, winning more races this season (two) than the previous three combined. Gordon's first-year partnership with crew chief Alan Gustafson is an instant smash, and that Sprint Cup

trophy that's been anchored to Jimmie Johnson's side at Hendrick Motorsports just might find a new address.

"I don't think we're the best team out there right now, but we're knocking on the door of being there," Gordon said. "I'm hoping by the time the Chase comes around, we truly are. I definitely think we're a threat to win the championship. I wouldn't put us as the favorite yet."

Gordon was once NASCAR's hotshot phenom, whose fiery competitive spirit zipped him to the top of the sport and ignited stock car racing's popularity from Madison Avenue to mainstream America. He steamrolled the competition, married a Victory Lane model, divorced her, and enjoyed all the perks of single life, before settling down again.

All of that has been etched in his bio for years.

His second act holds so much more.

On the morning of his 40th birthday last Thursday, Gordon awoke to his daughter, Ella, singing "Happy Birthday." He had no blowout party plans for the milestone. His son, Leo, turned 1 this week and the Gordons planned a private gathering with family and friends. Gordon lives in the moment, and has little time for reflection when there's always so much to do.

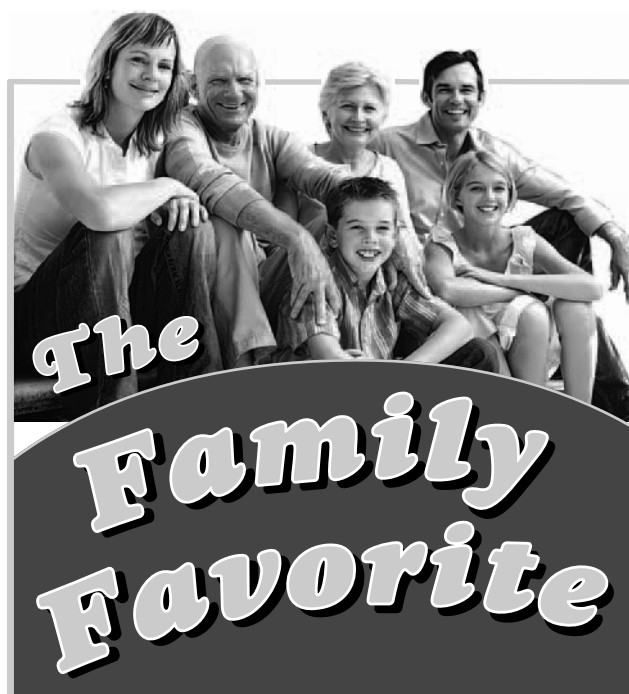

One of these chimps is named Caesar (Andy Serkis), who inherits this intelligence from his mother. Will raises Caesar in his home, teaches him sign language and treats him like a son. But fate cannot let Caesar live a human life forever.

The Help

Novel-turned-Hollywood film features 'superb' ensemble cast in end-of-summer flick

Female cast could appear among Oscar nominations

A class act such as "The Help" is rare enough in Hollywood. Coming at the tail end of summer blockbuster season, it's almost unheard of.

"The Help" is the sort of film studios typically save for the holiday prestige season in November or December, when Academy Awards voters start thinking ahead to the films they want to anoint.

Come awards time, many of them likely will be thinking of "The Help," whose remarkable ensemble of women offers enough great performances to practically fill the actress categories at the Oscars.

From its roots as a collaboration between lifelong friends Kathryn Stockett, who wrote the best-selling novel, and Tate Taylor, the film's writer-director, through the pitch-perfect casting of Emma Stone, Viola Davis, Octavia Spencer and their co-stars, "The Help" simply seems to be blessed.

It's hard to imagine a better movie coming out of the screen adaptation of Stockett's tale of friendship and common cause among black maids and an aspiring white writer in Jackson, Miss., in 1963.

The film maybe is a bit longer than it needs to be, but that's quibbling. There's not a moment of it that isn't worth watching, and fans of the novel will be thrilled so much of it

made it onto the screen.

This is popular big-screen entertainment at its best. Provocative without turning preachy, tender without tumbling into sentimentality, "The Help" is above all enormously enjoyable.

That's thanks to the rich characters Stockett created, to the marvelous empathy among the actresses portraying them, and to the previously untested talent of filmmaker Taylor. He and Stockett grew up in Jackson, met in preschool at age 5 and have been friends ever since (another longtime friend from Jackson, Brunson Green, is one of the producers).

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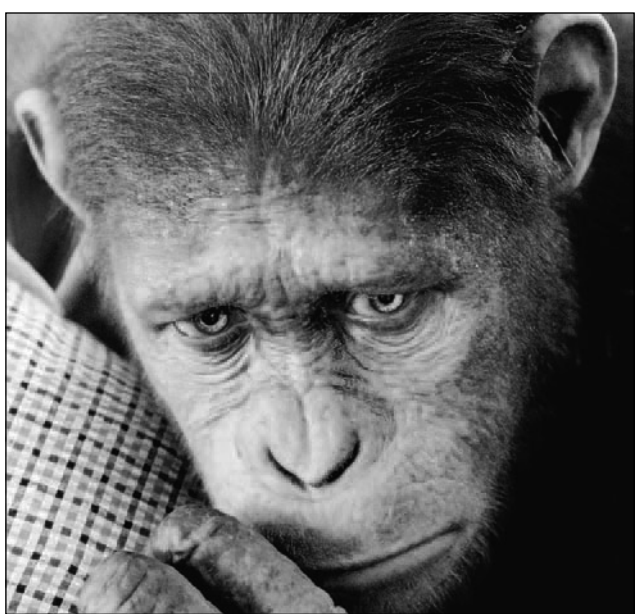

After a violent incident, Caesar is forced to live in primate facility operated by John Landon (Brian Cox) and his son Dodge (Harry Potter's Tom Felton). Seeing for the first time how his fellow species is treated, Caesar develops a plan to make the rest of the chimps like him and free them all from their prison.

Back when the original "Planet of the Apes" was released in 1968, it was OK the actors wore costumes to play the apes. But in 2011, that would never work. Good thing modern-day film making has the magic known as CGI to make apes look like more than a man in a mask. And when talking about this, there is really only one critical question to ask: does the CGI impress the eyes of the viewer...yes it does, moving on.

Another great achievement of modern film is the art of motion capture in which an actor plays his part in a funny suit and then the CGI is added to the scene afterwards. Examples of this can be seen in characters such as Gollum from the "Lord of the Rings" series, King Kong, and the apes in this film (such as Caesar). Another thing in common with these characters is the actor who plays them, Andy Serkis, who has proved he is one of the best is the motion capture act-

ing business. The wonderful thing about Serkis's performance is none of it includes dialogue. Instead he portrays a wide range of emotions, such as anger, with just body language. And it's not hard to say Serkis gives the best performance of the cast, making Caesar one of the most interesting characters of all the summer movies this year.

But "Rise" also features a touching narrative, filled with emotional scenes and a heart-filled climax. But some of the scenes are not only emotional, but have a very classic feel to them. In fact, the best scene in the film I would consider to be among the top three scenes of all the films this summer, because of the sheer iconic feel it has to it (hint...don't mess with a super intelligent ape). The narrative along with the stunning motion capture and Serkis's great performance makes "Rise" a great opportunity for the franchise to live on. I give it three stars out of four.

"Rise of the Planet of the Apes" has a running time of two hours and is rated PG-13 for intense and frightening sequence of action and violence.

decade or so after the novel's events, but the deep sense of time and place Stockett presented on the page is preserved in the film. Taylor combines grandly detailed sets, costumes and hairdos with well-chosen music and a keen understanding of Deep South mindsets to create an authentic time capsule of an intransigent way of life eroding amid the civil-rights movement.

Characters don't fully realize the impact of the changes swirling around them, allowing viewers with half a century's cultural hindsight to live the events through these women's eyes in a fresh and even profound way.

With frizzy hair, formless, unpolished fashion sense, and an earnestness that feels born out of decency and large-mindedness, Stone is ideal as Eugenia "Skeeter" Phelan, the Ole Miss graduate who comes home to Jackson dreaming of a writing career in New York.

Advised by a Manhattan publisher to try something daring, Skeeter convinces Aibileen Clark (Davis) to share stories of her life as a black maid cleaning up after white people and raising their children.

Soon Aibileen's friend, the outspoken Minny (Spencer), is confiding her experiences to Skeeter. As racial tension and violence erupts throughout the South, more maids step forward to join the writing circle and tell of the hardships, humiliations and occasional subversive triumphs they have experienced under their white employers.

Stone, Davis and Spencer forge something quite beautiful, a sense of sisterhood and equality that unfolds with ease and grace, never feeling forced or untrue to their era and circumstances.

Davis, a past Oscar nominee for "Doubt," gives a master class in quiet fortitude, Aibileen's pain, anger and compassion visible in every subtle glimpse from her eyes. Stone, the female lead in next summer's "The

Amazing Spider-Man," continues to show why she's one of the best young performers in Hollywood; intelligence, energy and charm just pour out of her as Skeeter.

Spencer's the great breakout here, another example of the movie gods smiling on "The Help." A former roommate of Taylor, Spencer also became friends with Stockett, who used some of the actress' traits as a model for Minny while writing the book. The sass and biting comedy Howard is truly scary, playing against her usual sweet type. Howard's Hilly and some of her squealing, cloying cronies at times seem like caricatures of '60s young wives and mothers.

Yet Howard really goes for it, reveling in her character's self-righteousness and "separate but equal" cruelty. The cast is superbly filled out by Allison Janney as Skeeter's ailing, conflicted mother; Jessica Chastain as Minny's lonely, needy new



boss; Cicely Tyson as Skeeter's beloved maid; Ahna O'Reilly as Aibileen's employer; and Sissy Spacek in a small, scene-stealing role as Hilly's mother.

There are some menfolk in "The Help," too, led by Chris Lowell as Skeeter's suitor. But this is a grand Hollywood rarity that's all about women.

If there's a male star here, it's filmmaker Taylor. Before "The Help," Taylor was an actor-director with a handful of on-screen credits and a directing resume of only one short film and one low-budget indie feature.

The idea that Taylor would have a chance to write and direct a property as hot as "The Help" was absurd. Yet without him, the book might never have been published. Stockett's manuscript had been rejected by publishers more than 60 times, and she was ready to quit, but Taylor urged her on, saying the story was too

good to abandon. Taylor had secured the film rights and began writing the screenplay before the novel came out. Filmmaker Chris Columbus, who signed on as a producer, landed it at Steven Spielberg's DreamWorks Pictures, with Taylor directing, despite his inexperience.

Even considering Columbus directed the first two "Harry Potter" movies and made a string of other hits, producing "The Help" may be the best thing he ever did for Hollywood. It's a far better film than anything Columbus has worked on before.

And it's a far better film than Hollywood normally churns out this time of year, one that deserves to linger well into awards season.

"The Help," a DreamWorks release distributed by Disney, is rated PG-13 for thematic material. Running time: 146 minutes. Three and a half stars out of four.

The tiny troop winds up in New York with make-up advertiser, Patrick (Neil Patrick Harris), and his expecting wife, Grace (Jayma Mays). With the couple's help, the Smurfs scramble to get home before Gargamel can extract their essence.

Why filmmakers employed celebs as big as Katy Perry, George Lopez and Fred Armisen to voice the characters baffles me. If it were not for the closing credits, the star-studded ensemble would be unrecognizable.

Meanwhile, the not-so-famous flesh and blood actors are generally OK. Neil Patrick Harris slinks into his role in begrudging, sugar-coated fashion while Jayma Mays delivers cutesy, wide-eyed expressions. But while the leading pair is pretty tepid, Hank Azaria charges into humiliating villainy with admirable abandon.

I thought the CGI Smurf's hyper-realistic eyes, porous blue skin and other life-like upgrades (their four, cartoonish fingers have nail beds) would creep me out, but they grow on you. Despite their kooky proportions, the Smurfs look great in real environments. Apart from blending in, they look warm, weighty, and dare I say it, cute. The setting, both the fantastic mushroomed Smurf land and New York, which highlights Times Square and Central Park, are lush and lively.

All in all, "The Smurfs" isn't half bad. I give it a B-

With a running time of 103 minutes, "The Smurfs" was rated PG for some mild rude humor and action.
