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## Publix donates \$40K to help homeless

*Funds to help with construction of two Citrus County food banks*

HOMOSASSA — Publix Super Markets Charities has stepped up to the plate with a donation of a \$40,000 grant to aid in the construction of the We Care Food Pantry and the Citrus Community Food Bank, (formerly Feed Citrus County) distribution centers being built next to each other in Homosassa.

“Publix, they’ve really jumped on board,” said Francesca Paar, secretary for the pantry’s board of directors. “Progress on the food pantry site is advancing by leaps and bounds.”

She said the donation would be allocated to pave both parking lots.

At the check presentation

ceremony at the new construction site, four Citrus County Publix managers were present: Rich Bradmuller from Homosassa, Lori Corbin from Crystal River, Janet Ferguson from Inverness and Ray Parrish from Citrus Hills. Board members, volunteers and friends of both centers were also on hand for the occasion.

In November 2011, Herb and Mary Stenger donated \$50,000 for the pantries’ building fund and challenged any person, group or business to match them. The United Way of Citrus County met that challenge and donated \$50,000.

In January 2012, the Stengers made the pot larger and have agreed to donate an additional

\$75,000 with the same challenge.

“People you’ve got to step up and help me match this,” said Diane Toto, president of the pantry.

Part of the latter challenge has been met thanks to charitable community donations. An anonymous donor gave \$10,000, and the Sugarmill Woods Civic Association donated \$6,500.

“A lot of money has come in this week,” Toto said. “Good things are coming.”

Publix’s \$40,000 grant was not included in the challenge because Toto applied it for in 2011.

Steve and Jewel Lamb, owners of Crystal Motor Car Company Inc., have donated a 2012 Dodge Ram Hemi quad cab pickup truck to raise funds for the centers through a drawing. Tickets are \$50, and only 2,000 will be sold. The drawing is scheduled for April 21. The lucky winner will receive 1,000 gallons of fuel provid-

ing the ticket holder registers their ticket with Crystal Motors before the drawing.

“We’re having trouble selling these gorgeous truck tickets,” Paar said. “It’s a worthy donation to a cause that benefits our residents of Citrus County.”

Paar said at the present time the pantry feeds 2,600 people a month and shares food with 34 other county agencies and churches.

“With the construction of these two buildings, we’ll be able to feed them all better and cheaper,” she said.

## Project watches osprey’s journey

*Global residents track sea bird’s oceanic trek*

The Center for Conservation Biology has launched Project Osprey-Watch, a project created to engage a global community to collect data on breeding osprey. Linked by an interest in osprey and a concern for the health of the aquatic environments on which they rely, this community will for the first time provide a global perspective on this charismatic species.

The mission of Project OspreyWatch is to bring citizen scientists together to collect information on a large enough spatial scale to be useful in addressing three of the most pressing issues facing aquatic ecosystems including global climate change, depletion of fish stocks and environmental contaminants.

Osprey are one of very few truly global sentinels for aquatic health. They feed almost exclusively on live fish throughout their entire life cycle. They are a top consumer within aquatic ecosystems and are very sensitive to overfishing and environmental contaminants. Nearly all populations breed in the northern latitudes and winter in the southern latitudes, effectively linking the aquatic health of the hemispheres. Their breeding season in the north is highly seasonal, making them an effective barometer of climate change.

OspreyWatch is a user-friendly, Internet platform that allows observers across the globe to map their nests, log observations, upload photos and interact within an observer forum. Information entered into the platform will be immediately accessible to users and summarized following the breeding season. To join a growing community of global citizens, visit [osprey-watch.org](http://osprey-watch.org).

The Center for Conservation Biology is a research group shared by the College of William and Mary and the Virginia Commonwealth University. Our primary focus is to conduct research that solves conservation problems.

Key votes for the week ending: March 9

■ **Financial Deregulation:** Members voted, 390-23, to ease regulation of small and mid-sized firms that seek to rapidly enter capital markets and create jobs. A yes vote was to pass a bill (HR 3606) exempting these firms from some of the rules set by the Dodd-Frank and Sarbanes-Oxley financial-regulation laws. **Rich Nugent, Yes.**

■ **Shareholders’ “Say on Pay”:** Members refused, 169-244, to retain “say on pay” rules for companies that would benefit from regulatory relief under HR 3606 (above). A yes vote was to keep rules for non-binding shareholders’ votes on golden-parachute packages and CEO compensation. **Nugent, No.**

■ **XHydropower, Environmental Rules:** Members voted, 265-154, to ease environmental rules so as to speed placement of small hydropower generators in Bureau of Reclamation conduits such as canals and pipelines. A yes vote backed a bill (HR 2842) to open up new electricity sources in 17 western states. **Nugent, Yes.**


■ **Keystone XL Pipeline:** Senators failed, 56-42, to reach 60 votes for empowering Congress, under the commerce clause of the Constitution, to approve the planned Keystone XL oil pipeline from Canada to Texas. A yes vote was to remove the White House as the Keystone decision-maker. (S 1813) **Bill Nelson, No; Marco Rubio, Yes.**

■ **Keystone Export Ban:** Senators refused, 33-65, to require refined oil from crude shipped in the Keystone XL pipeline to be kept in the United States. A yes vote backed an amendment to S 1813 (above) also requiring that U.S. workers, iron and steel be used to build the pipeline. **Nelson, Yes; Rubio, No.**


■ **Clean-Air Rule Delay:** Senators failed 52-46, to reach 60 votes for delaying the Environmental Protection Agency’ “Boiler MACT” rule for curbing emissions such as mercury and arsenic from industrial, commercial and institutional boilers. A yes vote backed delay and a rewriting of the rule. (S 1813) **Nelson, No; Rubio, Yes.**

■ **Key votes ahead:** In the week of March 12, the Senate will seek to pass a \$106 billion transportation bill and may take up a House-passed bill making it easier for companies with revenue under \$1 billion to enter capital markets.

**FHP: 26 cars involved in crashes on Interstate 75**

LAKE PANASOFFKEE — The Florida Highway Patrol reported a series of crashes Sunday on Interstate 75 involving 26 vehicles.

Sgt. Steve Gaskins said troopers responded to 11 crashes along I-75 in Sumter County on Sunday afternoon.

The crashes involved more than two dozen vehicles that were reportedly driving in rainy conditions. Seven people were transported to area hospitals with minor injuries.

The northbound lanes of the highway were closed for about two hours.

**Family in neighborhood watch death wants answers**

MIAMI — The family of a teen fatally shot in an encounter with a neighborhood watch leader is renewing its calls for answers.

Tracy Martin and Sybrina Fulton spoke out Sunday at the Miami church where their son’s funeral was held.

Seventeen-year-old Trayvon Martin was visiting his father’s fiancée’s gated community near Orlando and had gone out to buy Skittles. Police said neighborhood watch leader George Zimmerman called 911 and reported the teen as a suspicious person.

When police arrived, they found Martin dead.

Zimmerman said he shot him and is claiming self-defense.

Ben Crump, the Martin family’s attorney, said Zimmerman should be arrested.

Zimmerman has a previous arrest for resisting an officer with violence and battery on a law enforcement officer. WFTV reported those charges were dismissed.

**1 dead in personal watercraft accident near Clearwater**

INDIAN ROCKS BEACH — A Florida man is dead after being ejected from a personal watercraft that hit an object in the water.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission said Victor Vasquez and Robert Turnbull were riding the watercraft in the Intracoastal Waterway, south of Clearwater, at about 8:30 p.m. Saturday. The vessel reportedly hit an object, ejecting both men into the water.

Turnbull sustained minor injuries but Vasquez was left unconscious. Authorities say Turnbull pulled him from the water and brought him ashore.

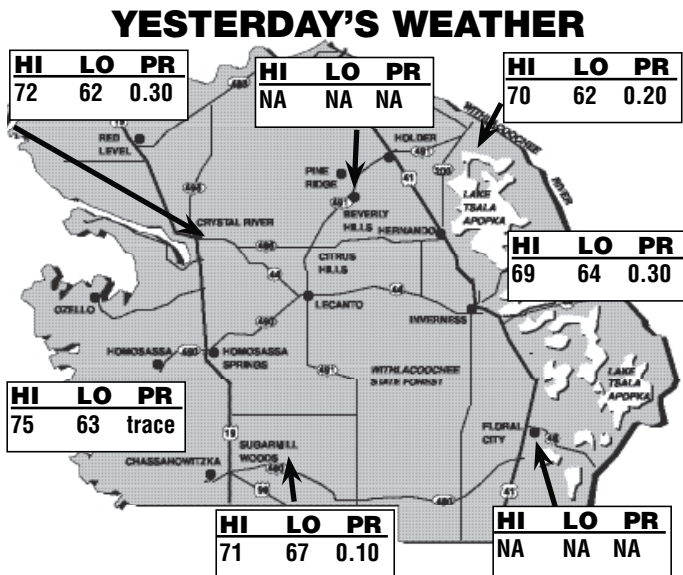
Vasquez, of Indian Rocks Beach, could not be resuscitated.



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**CRICKET TERMS**

- **Cricket** — a bat-and-ball game played between two teams of 11 players on a field, at the center of which is a rectangular pitch. One team bats, trying to score as many runs as possible, while the other team bowls and fields, trying to dismiss the batsmen and thus limit the runs scored by the batting team. A run is scored by the striking batsman hitting the ball with his bat, running to the opposite end of the pitch and touching the crease there without being dismissed. The teams switch between batting and fielding at the end of an inning.
- **Wicket** — one of the two sets of three stumps and two bails at either end of the pitch. The overall width of each wicket is 9 inches. The wicket is put down if a bail is completely removed from the top of the stumps, or a stump is struck out of the ground by the ball, the striker's bat, the striker's person (or by any part of his clothing or equipment becoming detached from his person), a fielder (with his hand or arm, and provided that the ball is held in the hand or hands so used, or in the hand of the arm so used).
- **Stumps** — three vertical posts that support two bails. The stumps and bails are usually made of wood.
- **Bails** — one of the two smaller sticks placed on top of the three stumps to form a wicket. The bails are used to determine when the wicket is broken, which in turn is one of the critical factors in determining whether a batsman is out bowled, stumped, run out or hit wicket.
- **Pitch** — the central strip of the cricket field between the wickets — 22 yards long and 10 feet wide.
- **Bowler** — team member propelling the ball toward the wicket defended by a batsman.
- **Batsman** — team member hitting the cricket ball with a cricket bat to score runs or prevent the loss of one's wicket
- **Googly** — a deceptive spinning delivery by a leg-spin bowler.
- **Slog** — a powerful shot, usually hit in the air in an attempt to score a six, often without too much concern for proper technique.

**CRICKET EQUIPMENT**

- **Ball** — A red or white ball with a cork base, wrapped in twine covered with leather. The ball should have a circumference of 9.1 inches.
- **Bat** — A wooden bat is used. The wood used is from the Kashmir or English willow tree. The bat cannot be more than 38 inches long and 4.25 inches wide. The bat has a long handle and one side has a smooth face.
- **Stumps** — 3 wooden poles.
- **Bails** — Two crosspieces for the poles
- **Sight screen** — A screen placed at the boundary, aligned exactly parallel to the width of the pitch and behind both pairs of wickets.
- **Boundary** — A rope demarcating the perimeter of the field known as the boundary.

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# Gov. Scott has successful legislative session

TALLAHASSEE — As the final hours of the annual legislative session dwindled, Gov. Rick Scott sat at his desk eating a sandwich. Next to him was a list of lawmakers to call and talk to about auto insurance.

While others in the Capitol were predicting defeat for one of Scott's top three priorities — a bill to help lower the cost of personal injury protection required in auto insurance policies and to reduce fraudulent claims — the governor looked up from his lunch and predicted success.

"We'll get a PIP bill," he said with confidence. "You're going to vote against a bill that's going to crack down on that fraud? Give me a break. This is not a Republi-

can or Democratic issue."

And when the bill narrowly passed in the Senate later that night, it wrapped up a very good legislative session for the governor: Just a year ago, Scott came to Tallahassee as an outsider and at first appeared to awkwardly wade into the annual lawmaking process. This year Scott had a less ambitious, more narrowly focused agenda and pretty much got everything he wanted.

"We had a good session last year, and we had a great session this year," Scott said. "This year I just know more people, so I just end up talking to people more."

Before the session started, Scott named three main goals: increasing school funding by \$1 billion, passing a "jobs package" and a corporate tax cut, and a bill that

would make major changes to the mandatory no-fault auto insurance personal injury protection coverage. He got those done.

He also had a second tier of priorities and got nearly the entire list passed. That included getting rid of some state boards and commissions; creating tougher penalties for human trafficking; drug testing for state workers; and a ballot question that will let voters decide whether to give businesses a tax break on machinery, equipment and other tangible personal property.

Last year, Scott took office as a former hospital chain CEO who spent tens of millions of dollars of his own fortune to win the job. He had never run for office before and came to Tallahassee looking to shake things up. At first, even

fellow Republicans were politely skeptical of the governor's agenda and his approach to achieving it. But by the end of the legislative session, Scott and the Republican-dominated Legislature began working more in sync.

And that's how Scott began this

session. He laid out more modest, achievable goals and worked within the system to get them done.

"He's a lot more reasonable to work with. I think he now understands better the scope of his authority versus the Legislature. He had a good session," said House Democratic Leader Ron Saunders. "He's more realistic now."

Getting lawmakers to agree to his school budget recommendation and a corporate tax cut were achieved with little problem. The personal injury protection bill was a lot more difficult and was still in jeopardy hours before session ended. Eric Eikenberg, a lobbyist who previously served as Gov. Charlie Crist's chief of staff, noted changes to the no-fault auto insurance program have been attempted before.

They have so much to give and often, we prevent them from giving."

Cathy Jackson, program director at the Center for Independent Living in Lecanto, said she feels people often stereotype people with disabilities and tend to treat them as outcasts.

"They don't get the re-

spect they deserve," she said.

Just recently, Jackson stated she received a phone call from a person who severely stutters. He wanted help finding a job and explained how people make fun of him because of his disability so he went to live in the woods.

"They're shunned by society. Nobody understands them," she said.

And Jackson feels all that needs to change. Many peo-

ple have disabilities and don't know it because they don't think of something like having to wear glasses or having to change one's diet for medical reasons as having a disability, she said.

"Anytime you have to change your life because you now have limitations, you have a disability," she said. "There are people with hidden disabilities. Just because you hop out of a car with a disability tag doesn't mean you're not disabled

because it's not visible."

Last year, Jackson said their office served more than 700 people.

"It's not the hidden population anymore," she added.

One way the Key Training Center works to raise awareness in the community is by having clients volunteer, work and live in the community and participate in community events. They also make education a part of many of the Key's fundraising efforts such as

the annual Run for the Money campaign.

"You're never too young or too old to learn," Whitaker said.

That's exactly what Jackson said she wants people to realize: education is important. It helps dispel the myths and stigmas associated with disabilities. She also wants people who are disabled to make themselves known so they no longer feel like they have to hide in the shadows.

"I want Citrus County to know we are here," Jackson said. "They don't have to be isolated anymore."

the importance of child restraints, including facts such as car crashes are the leading cause of death for children. In addition, car crashes kill four children and injure another 490 each day.

And the sad part, Littnan revealed, many of the deaths and injuries are preventable.

Therefore, if the funds became available to reinstate the program, there would be four main services provided: car seat safety inspections, car seat distribution, car seat safety education for the community and national child passenger safety technician certification classes.

The inspection, which

would be by appointment, would be free and allow for car and booster seats to be checked for appropriate seat choice, correct use and installation, damage or expiration dates and manufacturer recalls.

Littnan said four out five car seats checked are not installed properly.

"People don't read the instructions," she said.

With the distribution part of the program, Littnan and other certified technicians could provide car seats with education to those who qualify financially for car seats at a reduced price. During the course of the program, Littnan said she provided 4,000 car and booster seats to people.

"Which is a lot of kids," she said.

One of the continuing problems with child restraint safety is though it's

mandatory by law that children must be restrained while in a vehicle, many families who can't afford proper car seats or don't know the safety issues are riding around with their children unrestrained and in used, possibly expired seats. In addition, families are buckling up toddlers without the proper booster seat and children younger than 13 years are riding in the front seat when they should not.

In addition, Littnan would also be able to continue child passenger safety awareness in the community by being available for parents and other caregivers at hospital childbirth classes, health fairs,

preschools and other places where increasing awareness is necessary. She would also be able to continue to provide certified technician training for those in the county who hold positions that involve the frequent transportation of children.

During the program's 10 years, 5,800 parents and/or caregivers participated and the misuse rate declined from 92 percent to 84 percent.

"Who's serving those people now?" she said.

And Littnan fears many are buying secondhand seats that are old and expired because that's all there is.

Ellis said while they were able to stow away about 40

car seats when the health department scrapped the program, about half of them are already gone and now only a few select people who have a dire need are being given seats.

At about \$60 a car seat with an average of about 30 to 35 seats being provided a month, the need for a funding source is imperative.

Littnan is hoping something will happen soon so she can continue the pro-

gram for the benefit of the community.

"We're working a little but not a lot," she said.

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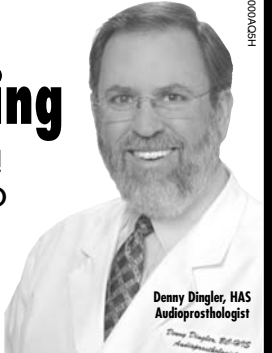

Our out-of-control debt will bring riots to our streets.

The debt levels of people older than 62 have been rising for two decades. The average mortgage for this group is \$71,000, four times larger than in 1987. According to *USA Today*, lower-

and middle-income Americans 65 and older now carry, on average, more than \$10,000 in credit card debt, up 26 percent since 2005.

Proposal raises valid concerns

Concerned that a proposed development on Citrus County's coast at the end of North Ozello Trail would alter the face of their community, Ozello residents are organizing to protest it.

As presented to residents at a Feb. 13 meeting convened by developer George Decker, the old Pirates' Cove restaurant site would become the location for a five-story condominium with vehicle parking on the first level and a restaurant on the top level. Additionally, Decker proposed improving a nearby county park with restrooms in exchange for parking space.

Although residents are appreciative Decker has acted as a good neighbor by cleaning up the property and apprising them of his development plan, they are adamant the county's comprehensive plan not be changed due to the concerns raised by the proposal.

Foremost is the proposed five-story condominium's 61-foot height. Residents correctly argue a zoning change allowing a multi-tier structure could alter Ozello's "old Florida" character and set a precedent that could open the door for other developers to follow suit.

The project's remote location in a coastal high-hazard zone also raises valid concerns related to fire flow, sewage disposal, timely evacuation and construction costs.

Fire flow would certainly present a risk given the condominium's height and Ozello's available water pressure. The size of the condominium, in all probability, would require a package plant since no sewer lines extend to the site. Increased density along the two-lane, winding road would make timely evacuation precarious. And the site's location in high-hazard and -velocity zones would have significant construction costs, making completion uncertain in today's economy.

While Decker has the right to develop his property, development should be compatible with the local environment and adhere to the requirements of the county's comprehensive plan, which were in place when he acquired the property.

Accordingly, the Citrus County Planning and Development Review Board, as well as county commissioners, are urged to closely scrutinize the project's feasibility and compatibility. Also, they should put the burden on Mr. Decker to demonstrate he has the means to fully address the financial, physical and environmental concerns associated with his project.

Ozello's rural and serene ambience of days gone by is too precious to do otherwise.

'All-American Muslim' show a lost opportunity

A few words on what American Muslims need.

We were discussing this, an olive-skinned Muslim man and I, at a banquet last year, when he said a wistful, poignant thing that has stayed with me ever since.

"We thought we were white," he said.

Not "white" in the sense of race, whatever that unscientific word means. Rather, white in the sense of assimilation and admission, white in the sense of people from Ireland, Armenia, Cuba, Hungary, southern Italy and other places who, upon arriving here, were regarded as threatening, nonwhite outsiders and required to earn their whiteness, their acceptance, over several generations. When the man said American Muslims thought they were white, he meant they thought they had successfully navigated the trail blazed by all those other people from all those other places.

Then came Sept. 11, 2001. All that progress — and 3,000 human lives — went up in smoke, and Islamophobia stormed America.

What American Muslims need, I told him, were cultural ambassadors, Muslim actors, singers and joke-tellers who could change American consciousness through American televisions, multiplexes and iPods.

Which is why I was pleased last year when the TLC network premiered "All-American Muslim," a

reality show about five Islamic families. And it's why I was disappointed when it was canceled last week, an apparent victim of low ratings.

Between the debut and the cancellation came the controversy, as the conservative Florida Family Association pushed advertisers to abandon a show it saw as too "Muslim-tolerant," and too silent about sharia law. The group found it "troubling" a Muslim cop was shown saying, "I really am American."

"All-American Muslim," said the FFA, was "propaganda that riskily hides the Islamic agenda's clear and present danger to American liberties and traditional values."

Translated from the original extremist, that means "All-American Muslim" committed the sin of treating Muslims as if they were, well ... normal people. Soon afterward, Lowe's, the giant home improvement chain, pulled its advertising from the show in a display of corporate gutlessness that still makes my left eye twitch as I drive past my local Lowe's on the way to Home Depot.

Obviously, the FFA is one of those cartoonish bands of cranks and paranoids who see danger beneath every hijab. Still, it is right in thinking "All-American Muslim" might have made it harder for Americans to sustain a blanket fear of all things Islamic. Popular culture has historically

played a role in normalizing, individualizing and humanizing that which seemed frightening and new.

This is what Bill Cosby, Sidney Poitier, Diahann Carroll and Motown did for black Americans. It is what Mary Tyler Moore and "Cagney and Lacey" did for feminist women. It is what Ellen DeGeneres, "Will and Grace" and "Queer Eye for the Straight Guy" did for gays.

And, it is why no less an authority than Bill Cosby himself has said he thinks the time is ripe for a Muslim "Cosby Show." It is easy to hate "the blacks" as an abstract, but it becomes more difficult once you've been in Cliff Huxtable's home and he's made you laugh and you have recognized your family in his. No, that recognition is not a panacea for cultural animus. But it is a building block toward the recognition of common humanity, and that is no small thing.

So if "All-American Muslim" was a failure, it was a noble one. With luck, it will not be long before someone else picks up the baton it has dropped. As the Florida Family Association experience makes clear, success will not be easy. But the hateful paranoia that makes such a thing difficult also makes it necessary.

"We thought we were white," the man said.

They know better now.

A proposal has been put forth to increase Tri Care Fees by Oct. 1, 2012. Tri Care Prime, which is currently \$520, would rise to \$820 on Oct. 1, 2012, and in five years would rise to \$2,018 per annum.

Tri Care for Life, which currently does not cost anything, would start at \$135 per person and in 5 years rise to \$475 per person annually.

Co-pay for non-formulary, which is now \$25, would rise to \$51 on Oct. 1. In five years time the cost would go to \$34 and \$64, respectively.

I am aware that Congress never guaranteed that by serving 20 years in the military we and our families would have free health care for the rest of our lives. I, and I'm certain many of you, were told from day one of military service by your recruiter and continuously by your officers and retention NCO's that if you honorably retired that this would be the case.

What benefits we have, or did have, are slowly being eroded. There are more proposals to the above. For verification and what other suggestions are being made, three sites to refer to are: The Veterans Voice, VAWatchdog today.org and Military.com.

Let your legislators know that we realize our nation has a terrific deficit, but not to try to solve it on the backs of our mili-

Bad vet treatment

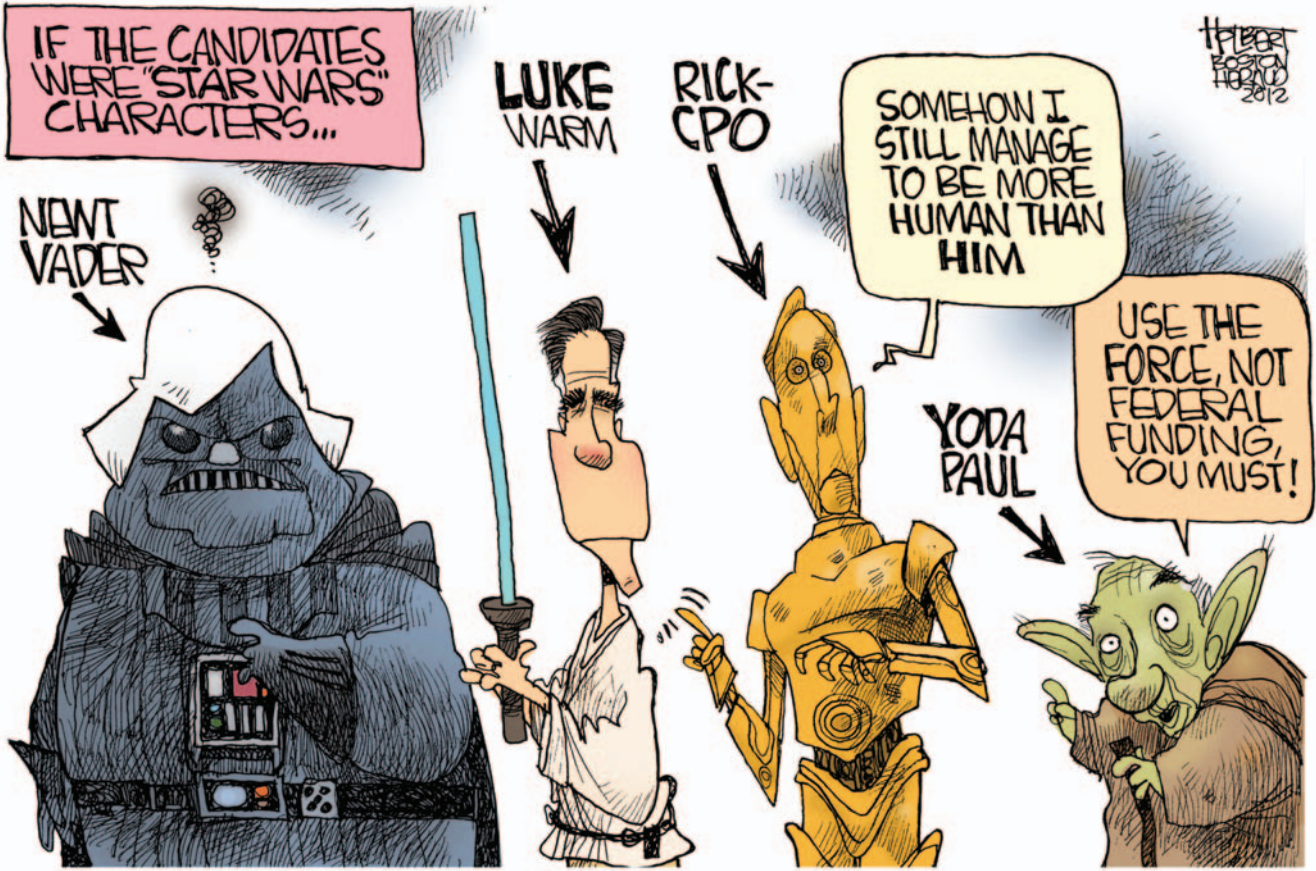

3 killed in 3rd day of Gaza-Israel fight

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip — Cross-border fighting between Gaza and Israel, touched off by Israel's killing of a top militant leader, showed no signs of letting up on its third day Sunday. Gaza militants fired dozens of rockets at Israeli towns, hitting an empty school, and Israeli airstrikes killed three Gazans, including a boy and a farm guard.

Egypt tried to mediate but failed to end the worst violence in more than a year that has killed 18 Gazans, all but two of them militants, and disrupted the lives of some 1 million Israelis living in Gaza rocket range.

Even so, Israel and Gaza's Hamas rulers seemed eager to avoid a full-scale conflict. A three-week war in three years ago left both sides badly bruised, Israel in the diplomatic arena and Hamas on the battlefield.

In the current round, Hamas has pointedly kept its large rocket arsenal and thousands of fighters out of the confrontation, even though it has not tried to stop two smaller Gaza groups, Islamic Jihad and the Popular Resistance Committees, from launching rockets and mortars.

Israeli Defense Minister Ehud Barak acknowledged Hamas did not take part in the rocket salvos. Up to now Israel has blamed Hamas for all violence from Gaza because it rules the territory.

Push to end Syria crisis stalls

BEIRUT — An international push to end Syria's conflict stalled Saturday as U.N. envoy Kofi Annan left Damascus without a cease-fire and President Bashar Assad's forces pounded opposition areas and clashed with rebels throughout the country.

Western and Arab powers are struggling for ways to stem the bloodshed in the year-old conflict while both the regime and the opposition reject dialogue. Former U.N. Secretary General Kofi Annan appeared to make little progress during two visits with Assad during his first trip to Syria as the joint U.N.-Arab League envoy.

American soldier kills 16 Afghans

Nine children, three women among dead

BALANDI, Afghanistan — Moving from house to house, a U.S. Army sergeant opened fire Sunday on Afghan villagers as they slept, killing 16 people — mostly women and children — in an attack that reignited fury at the U.S. presence following a wave of deadly protests over Americans burning Qurans.

The attack threatened the deepest breach yet in U.S.-Afghan relations, raising questions in Washington and Kabul about why American troops are still fighting in Afghanistan after 10 years of conflict and the killing of Osama bin Laden.

The slayings, the worst atrocity committed by U.S. forces during the Afghan war, came amid deepening public outrage spurred by last month's Quran burnings and an earlier video purportedly showing American Marines urinating on dead Taliban militants.

The Quran burnings sparked weeks of violent protests and attacks that left some 30 Afghans dead, despite an apology from President Barack Obama. Six U.S. service members were also killed by their fellow Afghan soldiers, although tensions had just started to calm down.

According to U.S. and Afghan officials, Sunday's attack began around 3 a.m. in two villages in Panjwai district, a rural region outside Kandahar that is the cradle of the Taliban and where coalition forces have

fought for control for years. The villages are about 500 yards from a U.S. base in a region that was the focus of Obama's military surge strategy in the south starting in 2009.

Villagers described cowering in fear as gunshots rang out as a soldier roamed from house to house firing on those inside. They said he entered three homes in all and set fire to some of the bodies. Eleven of the dead were from a single family, and nine of the victims were children.

U.S. officials said the shooter, identified as an Army staff sergeant, acted alone, leaving his base in southern Afghanistan and opening fire on sleeping families in two villages. Initial reports indicated he returned to the base after the shooting and turned himself in. He was in custody at a NATO base in Afghanistan.

Japan marks year anniversary since quake, tsunami disaster

RIKUZENTAKATA, Japan — For 70-year-old Toshiko Murakami, memories of the terrifying earthquake and tsunami that destroyed much of her seaside town and swept away her sister brought fresh tears Sunday, exactly a year after the disaster.

"My sister is still missing, so I can't find peace within myself," she said before attending a ceremony in a tent in Rikuzentakata marking the anniversary of the March 11, 2011, disaster that killed more than 19,000 people and unleashed the world's worst nuclear crisis in a quarter century.

Across Japan, people paused at 2:46 p.m. — the moment the magnitude-9.0 quake struck a year ago — for moments of silence, prayer and reflection about the enormous losses suffered and monumental tasks ahead.

Japan must rebuild dozens of ravaged coastal communities, shut down the crippled Fukushima Dai-ichi nuclear power plant and decontaminate radiated land so it is inhabitable again.

These are enormous burdens on

a country already straining under the weight of an aging, shrinking population, bulging national debt and an economy that's been stagnant for two decades.

Prime Minister Yoshihiko Noda reminded the Japanese people they have overcome many disasters and difficulties in the past and pledged to rebuild the nation so it will be "reborn as an even better place."

"Our predecessors who brought prosperity to Japan have repeatedly risen up from crises, every time becoming stronger," Noda said at a ceremony at the National Theater attended by the emperor and empress.

Later, he told a news conference he hoped to see the disaster-hit areas fully rebuilt when "babies born on the day of the disasters turn 10 years old."

The earthquake was the strongest recorded in Japan's history, and set off a tsunami that swelled to more than 65 feet in some spots along the northeastern coast, destroying tens of thousands of homes and causing widespread destruction.

All told, some 325,000 people are still in temporary housing. While much of the debris along the tsunami-ravaged coast has been gathered into massive piles, only 6 percent has been disposed of

through incineration.

Very little rebuilding has begun. Many towns are still finalizing reconstruction plans, some of which involve moving residential areas to higher, safer ground — ambitious, costly projects. Bureaucratic delays in coordination between the central government and local officials have also slowed rebuilding efforts.

In Rikuzentakata, which lost 1,691 residents out of its pre-quake population of 24,246, a siren sounded at 2:46 p.m. and a Buddhist priest in a purple robe rang a huge bell at a temple overlooking a barren area where houses once stood.

At the same moment in the seaside town of Onagawa, people facing the ocean pressed their hands together in silent prayer.

Memorial services continued into the night. In Ishinomaki, survivors lit some 2,000 candles to mourn for the victims. The memories of last March 11 are still raw for Naomi Fujino, a 42-year-old Rikuzentakata resident who lost her father in the tsunami. She escaped with her mother to a nearby hill, where they watched the enormous wave wash away their home. They waited all night, but her father never came as he had promised. Two months later, his body was found.

GOP hopefuls look at South

Candidates spar before two state primaries

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — Republican presidential hopeful Rick Santorum on Sunday nudged rival Newt Gingrich to step aside, arguing a head-to-head contest between himself and Mitt Romney should "occur sooner rather than later." A defiant Gingrich predicted victories in Tuesday's primaries in Alabama and Mississippi and called Romney the weakest Republican front-runner in nearly a century.

Santorum and Gingrich were campaigning hard two days before what has become a potentially decisive Southern showdown for the GOP field.

Losing Alabama and Mississippi would effectively spell the end for Gingrich, who has banked his waning prospects on an all-Southern strategy. The former House speaker's lone primary wins have been in South Carolina and Georgia.

A win for Romney in Alabama, where polling shows a tight contest between Romney, Gingrich and Santorum, could all but bring the GOP nominating contest to a close. The former Massachusetts governor has built a substantial delegate lead against his rivals but has failed so far to win a state in the deep South, home to the Republican Party's most conservative voters.

Santorum, who has battled to be Romney's chief conservative foe, burnished his standing with a decisive win in Saturday's caucuses in Kansas. The former Pennsylvania senator also carried contests last week in Oklahoma and Tennessee, giving him a foothold in the South.

On NBC's "Meet the Press," Santorum said Gingrich's recent stretch of weak showings suggests he has few options left in the race. Gingrich placed third in Kansas and dead last in Wyoming.

"The speaker can stay in as long as he wants, but I think the better opportunity to make sure that we nominate a conservative is to give us an opportunity to go head-to-head with Gov. Romney at some point and hopefully that will occur sooner rather than later," Santorum said.

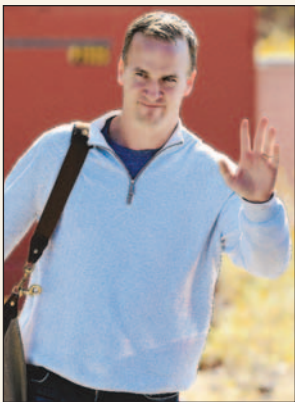

**Adams determined to get Manning**

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Titans owner Bud Adams wants to sign Peyton Manning and said he will do whatever necessary to convince the four-time NFL MVP to come to Tennessee, even offering up a job in the front office once his playing career ends.

Adams told *The Tennessean* on Sunday that he has contacted Manning's agent, Tom Condon, to express his interest and ask for the quarterback to visit the Titans. Manning visited Denver on Friday and spent more than six hours in Arizona on Sunday.

The 89-year-old owner said he wants Manning as the guy to get the Titans into the playoffs. Adams said he'd love to see Manning in Titan blue after watching him the past 14 seasons with the Colts and will be upset if he doesn't get the quarterback.

**McNeill rallies to win Puerto Rico Open**

RIO GRANDE, Puerto Rico — George McNeill birdied his last three holes for a 3-under 69 to rally past Japanese star Ryo Ishikawa and win the Puerto Rico Open.

DORAL, Fla. — On a day of endless drama at Doral, Justin Rose won his first World Golf Championship standing on the practice range.

Rose had to make up a three-shot deficit against Bubba Watson, and then a two-shot deficit against Keegan Bradley. Rose was steady down the stretch, even with a bogey from the bunker on the 18th hole, and closed with a 2-under 70 to win the Cadillac Championship.

Watson, as always, made it interesting. He hit a bullet of

a 4-iron out of the palm trees to just inside 10 feet for a chance to force a playoff. His birdie putt missed on the low side, ending a wild day even by his standards. He closed with a 74.

If that wasn't enough, Tiger Woods muddled his Masters future when he left after 11 holes with soreness in his left Achilles tendon, wincing badly on his final shot — a 321-yard drive down the middle of the 12th fairway.

Woods said he would have it evaluated to determine the scope of the injury.

NBC Sports showed images

of Woods behind the wheel in a black sedan as he drove away from Doral. It returned to golf just as Rory McIlroy, who started the final round eight shots behind, holed a bunker shot for eagle on the 12th hole.

McIlroy pulled within one shot of the lead with a birdie on the 16th hole, but he closed with a bogey and a 67 to finish alone in third.

Through it all, Rose worked his way to the top of the leaderboard with a nifty up-and-down behind the green

# Stewart's gamble pays off in Vegas

LAS VEGAS — Defending Sprint Cup champion Tony Stewart made a bold move to take the lead on a late restart and held off Jimmie Johnson for a redemptive win at Las Vegas Motor Speedway on Sunday.

Frustrated by a pit mishap at Las Vegas a year ago, Stewart dipped below the two leaders from the second row to take the lead with about 30 laps left in the 400-mile race. He pulled away from Johnson on three more restarts over the final 17 laps for his first win on the 1.5-mile tri-oval in the desert.

Johnson made a run at Stewart with four laps left, but couldn't get around him or get close again. Johnson finished second after starting at the back of the field in a backup car.

Greg Biffle finished third, Ryan Newman fourth and defending Las Vegas winner Carl Edwards was fifth.

Stewart had the dominant car a year ago at Las Vegas, only to be tripped up in the pits.

He was penalized for leaving his pit stall with an air hose still attached and the team opted to take two tires on a later stop to get him back to the front.

Stewart did get to the front, but the rest of the teams saw that taking two tires would work and switched tactics. Forced to take four tires late in the race, he dropped to 22nd and ran out of time to catch Edwards, finishing second.

Stewart also had a good finish ruined last week at Phoenix after he turned off his car to save on fuel and couldn't get it to re-fire, a problem believed to be linked to NASCAR's new electronic fuel injection system. He was well back in the pack after a lengthy pit stop and finished 22nd after a 16th at the Daytona 500.

Stewart qualified seventh at Las Vegas and took his first lead on lap 135, beating Johnson on a restart. He lost the lead briefly on a cycle of green-flag pit stops and quickly regained it.

He turned back a challenge by Brad Keselowski

LOS ANGELES — Kobe Bryant scored 10 of his 26 points in the fourth quarter and hit a go-ahead jumper with 41.7 seconds to play, leading the Los Angeles Lakers to a 97-94 victory over the Boston Celtics on Sunday.

Andrew Bynum had 20 points and 14 rebounds for the Lakers, who rallied from a five-point deficit in the final 2½ minutes. The All-Star center hit a short hook shot over Kevin Garnett with 15.5 seconds left, and Boston couldn't get a good look at a tying 3-pointer.

The Lakers scored the final eight points in their 18th victory in 19 home games, stylishly finishing their third straight victory over Boston.

Rajon Rondo had 24 points and 10 assists for the Celtics, who opened an eight-game road trip by blowing a late lead. On Boston's final possession, Ray Allen failed to get free for a 3-pointer before Rondo badly missed a tying attempt.

## 76ers 106, Knicks 94

NEW YORK — Lou Williams scored 12 of his 28 points in a dazzling third-quarter flurry, Evan Turner had 24 points and

15 rebounds, and the Philadelphia 76ers handed the New York Knicks their fifth straight loss.

Williams tossed in a long jumper to beat the halftime buzzer, then had a dozen points in the final 3:28 of the third quarter, when the 76ers seized control for their third straight victory.

Andre Iguodala had 19 points, eight assists and seven rebounds for the 76ers, who turned a competitive game into a rout to end a three-game losing streak to the Knicks.

## Cherry, Sheridan lawsuit nears end Jury to begin deliberations this week

LOS ANGELES — For eight seasons, Marc Cherry has woven conflict, mystery and death into the story lines of ABC's "Desperate Housewives," but soon 12 jurors will be the ones supplying suspense for the veteran television writer.

Deliberations in actress Nicollette Sheridan's wrongful termination lawsuit begin this week, with the panel deciding whether they believe the actress was fired after complaining Cherry, the series' creator and show-runner, struck her on the set. He denies walloping her and contends her demise from the hit series was a long-planned plot point.

Seven days of testimony have revealed conflicting stories that could easily have been scripted in the "Housewives" writers' room, providing a fascinating look behind the scenes of a hit prime-time series, complete with financial pressures, cast conflicts and secret meetings all on display.

Jurors have watched montages and outtakes from the show, including the 48 — and counting — deaths aired since the series began in 2004. Much of the case has centered on the events in 2008, but moments after actor James Denton finished testifying, jurors heard an inadvertent spoiler about his character.

Cherry has portrayed Sheridan as a polarizing figure on set, bickering with Teri Hatcher during the first season, not unlike the plot line at the time. He also testified that Eva Longoria and Felicity Huffman were "relieved" to learn in December 2008 that Sheridan's role as Edie Britt was being eliminated. Yet he praised Sheridan as an actress who performed so well in the show's pilot that he lobbied to make her a series regular and share the show's profits.

Jurors won't hear directly from Longoria or Huffman after a judge deemed their testimony unnecessary.

Sheridan attorney Mark Baute has noted none of Cherry's allegations of bad behavior were never documented, and Cherry himself maintains he opted to kill off Edie in the fifth season primarily for creative reasons.

## 'Lorax' still on top

Dr. Seuss film trumps action flick 'John Carter'

LOS ANGELES — "Dr. Seuss' the Lorax" has easily beaten Edgar Rice Burroughs' "John Carter" at the weekend box office.

Studio estimates Sunday put Universal Pictures' "The Lorax" at No. 1 for the second-straight weekend as the animated adventure based on the children's book took in \$39.1 million. That raised its 10-day domestic total to \$122 million, making "The Lorax" the top-grossing movie released this year.

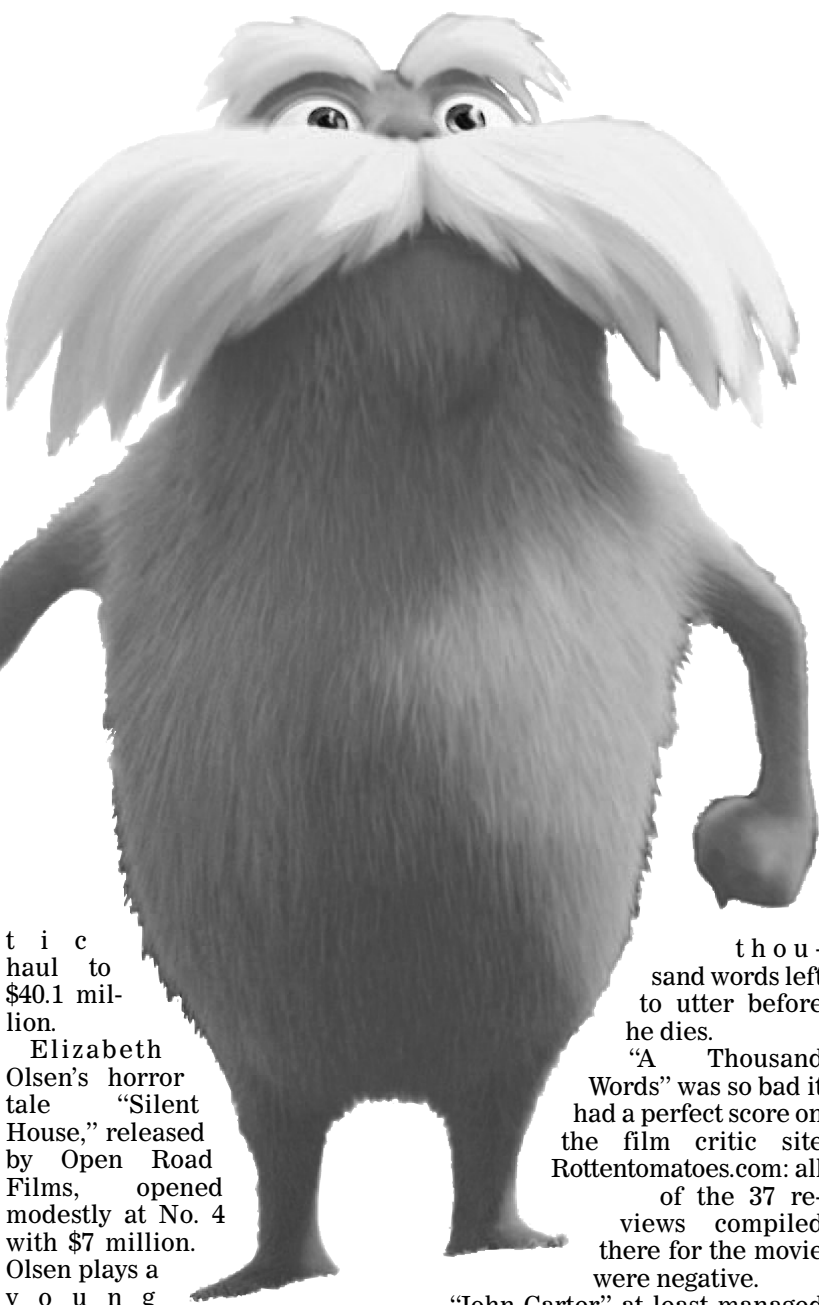
"John Carter," based on "Tarzan" creator Burroughs' tales of the interplanetary adventurer, opened in second-place with \$30.6 million. That's an awful start given the whopping \$250 million that Disney reportedly spent to make "John Carter," which also earned generally poor reviews that will hurt its long-term prospects.

The movie's salvation could come overseas, where "John Carter" opened in 55 markets with \$70.6 million, giving it a worldwide total of \$101.2 million.

The stronger international business helps, but that worldwide total still pales compared to global debuts of \$200 million and up for many modern blockbusters.

"We would have hoped for more considering the larger economics of the film but are still encouraged with how it's been received by audiences that have seen it and hope to see that generate positive word of mouth for the balance of the run," said Dave Hollis, Disney's head of distribution.

The Warner Bros. teen comedy "Project X" held up well in its second weekend with \$11.6 million to finish at No. 3 and raise its domes-



tic haul to \$40.1 million.

Elizabeth Olsen's horror tale "Silent House," released by Open Road Films, opened modestly at No. 4 with \$7 million. Olsen plays a young woman terrorized inside her family's spooky summer home.

Eddie Murphy's comedy "A Thousand Words," a leftover shot in 2008 and finally dumped into theaters by distributor Paramount, was a dud at No. 6 with \$6.4 million.

The movie features Murphy as a fast-talking literary agent and neglectful family man who gets a lesson on the important things in life after discovering he has only a

thousand words left to utter before he dies.

"A Thousand Words" was so bad it had a perfect score on the film critic site Rottentomatoes.com: all of the 37 reviews compiled there for the movie were negative.

"John Carter" at least managed 49 percent favorable notices of the 170 reviews compiled there. That's still not a recipe for staying power at the box office, particularly with such a bad opening in the United States.

"If you just take the domestic number, it's not a very pretty picture," said Paul Dergarabedian, analyst for box-office tracker Hollywood.com. "But if you look at the worldwide opening weekend of a hundred million dollars, that's pretty solid."

"John Carter" casts "Friday Night Lights" co-star Taylor Kitsch in the title role as a 19th century Civil War veteran whisked away to Mars, where he falls for a beautiful princess and becomes a hero in the red planet's own civil war.

Disney executives noted the movie had a 25 percent uptick in domestic business from opening day Friday to Saturday, saying it was a sign that audiences were talking up "John Carter" to friends.

But the movie drew only 41 percent of its viewers from the under-25 crowd, indicating that Hollywood's key audience of young action fans was not interested.

Overall domestic business rose again as studios continued their 2012 box-office roll. Revenues totaled \$140.5 million, up 8.7 percent from the same weekend last year, according to Hollywood.com.

## Whedon brings 'Cabin' to festival

AUSTIN, Texas — After several years of studio purgatory, Joss Whedon's long-shelved, much-anticipated horror film "The Cabin in the Woods" finally arrived before audiences at the South By Southwest Film Festival.

Nobody complained about the delay.

"It really holds up," deadpanned Whedon after the Friday evening premiere before a rapturous, hooting crowd at Austin's Para-

mount Theatre. "I would say, timeless classic."

"The Cabin in the Woods," which Whedon produced and co-wrote with director Drew Goddard, had been stuck in limbo after its studio, MGM, went bankrupt in 2010. It is being released by Lionsgate, opening on April 13.

The film couldn't have played better as the opener of SXSW, a festival known for its warm receptions to

Along Blog," is beloved for his witty genre inventions.

Hundreds of fans packed a Whedon question-and-answer panel Saturday, as many more swarmed outside watching on a TV.

"I have a lot of ideas," said the prodigious Whedon in a career-ranging talk.

Talking about "The Cabin in the Woods," which co-stars Richard Jenkins and Bradley Whitford, has proved challenging, since any discussion quickly leads to giving away its unpredictable plot.
