Pacemaker finds its way home

The mysterious disappearance of a pacemaker and defibrillator from a table at the Citrus Hills Information Fiesta last week has been solved — sort of.

Citrus Memorial hospital received the devices by mail on Monday, said Millie King, president of Mended Hearts of Citrus County Chapter 367. The package was sent anonymously, King said.

The pacemaker and defibrillator were on display at the Mended Hearts table during the information fiesta at Citrus Hills Golf and Country Club. Someone took the devices, either thinking they were free or with another intention in mind.

Mended Hearts volunteers said the display devices were donated by the manufacturer and worthless as they did not include the required equipment to function.

"On behalf of Mended Hearts of Citrus County, we want you to know how very thankful we are for this good deed and it also gives us a renewed faith in humanity," King wrote in an email to the *Chronicle*. "We hope the person(s) returning them will visit us for one of our meetings, which (are) held on the second Friday of each month in the old brick historic Citrus High School, Gulf room, at 10 a.m."

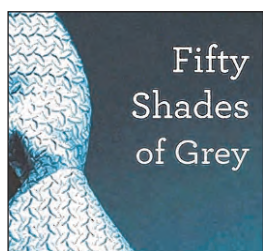

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Brain cancer doesn't deter dreams

Artist's spirit to create remains alive despite debilitating disease

FLORAL CITY — If brain cancer hadn't made speaking so difficult, Jamie Stemler would tell you that his dream is to go to Costa Rica and draw.

He would love nothing more than to work six months out of the year and then spend the next six months in the sun, on the beach, just him and a set of

colored pencils. He would capture the sun as it sets or rises; draw to perfection the face and curves of a beautiful woman.

For most of his 43 years, Stemler has lived for art. It's who he is, what he was created to do.

Even as brain cancer — glioblastoma multiforme — has taken away his skills and continues to erode his life, it hasn't taken away his

dreams or his identity. He's an artist. Jamie Stemler is an artist.

Stemler grew up in Bolton Landing, in upstate New York, and came to Citrus County in 1985. He graduated from Citrus High School in 1987 and then went to St. John's Community College in Palatka for a year.

But he wanted to experience life, said his stepfather

Bob Logan, so he returned to Bolton Landing, where his father lives, and started his first T-shirt business —

Faces up to 60 years in prison if tagged a habitual offender

INVERNESS — A man accused of being a drug dealer and toting a "pharmacy" was convicted by a jury Wednesday in Circuit Judge Richard "Ric" Howard's courtroom.

In a protracted case that seems to have turned on the propriety of a black lunchbox or mobile pharmacy of a drug pusher, Travis Jack McCourt, 46, of N. Arkansas Terrace, Hernando, was found guilty on seven of eight drug charges by an all-female jury.

McCourt was arrested and charged Sept. 18, 2009, with felony possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), possession of a controlled substance (oxycodone, Oxycontin, Soma, methadone, alprazolam and hydrocodone), selling/manufacturing/dealing/possessing a controlled substance with intent to sell/manufacture/deliver and possession of drug paraphernalia. For the most serious felony of trafficking in oxycodone, McCourt faces up to 60 years in prison because he has 22 previ-

ous felony convictions, and the prosecution is seeking to tag him as a habitual offender. Without the tag, McCourt would still face up to 30 years in prison.

Sentencing is set for June 13.

The prosecution came out of the gates resolute in its assertion that the chronology of events and evidence would land in the lap of Mc-

Court as the possessor and distributor of the drugs.

Prosecutor Paul Norville laid out the events of that September night before jurors and ended his case by asking jurors who goes to a convenience store at night to pick up a wad of cash for remodeling work?

Meanwhile, defense attorney Eric Evilsizer tried to cast doubt on ownership of the drug-laden black bag and even suggested it was a lunchbox with sandwich bags in it. Evilsizer also had to bat down a confession reportedly made by McCourt within earshot of another officer to the main prosecution witness and author of the bust, Citrus County Sheriff's Office Detective Juan Santiago.

During testimony, Santiago told jurors he was sitting in an unmarked vehicle in front Cumberland Farms store in Citrus Springs when McCourt drove up in an Intrepid and parked on one side of him, then another vehicle driven by Shelly Carbonara pulled up on the other side of him. In the passenger seat of Carbonara's vehicle

Gun range hits target

Commission approves sport-shooting recreation area

Dozen of shooting enthusiasts turned out Tuesday for the final public hearing to approve a gun and archery range in Lecanto.

"I have never seen an application receive as much public support as this one," Clark Stillwell told the Citrus County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC).

Stillwell represented Ron and Michele Goodenow, who will build the \$1.1 million project comprising an indoor archery range, a trap and skeet field, a pistol range and a rifle range on a 30-acre site off County Road 490 opposite the junction with South Rock Crusher Road in Lecanto. Approval of the plan would change zoning of the property from low density residential with mobile homes allowed to industrial. The site is in two connected sections, one part having been a mine and another for timber.

After a discussion, the BOCC unanimously approved the project.

Only one person remained discontent. Linda Boutwell spoke again, as she had at the previous public hearing in January, to say her home is in the firing line of the proposed shooting range. She said the project was 6 feet from her property.

"Fifteen of the (range) positions are shooting directly at my property," Boutwell said. "I am worried about the safety and well-being of my family."

Ron Goodenow presented the project to show that he had taken training in gun range safety and gone to extra lengths in design safety. Goodenow said the project not only followed National Rifle Association and state of Florida standards but went above and beyond them with height of berms and netting.

Supporters of the project said the county needed a gun range. Bud High of the Citrus County Shooting Club said his shooters have to drive to Leesburg or Brooksville to shoot.

Two other residents applauded the safety features,

Bus driver quits after alcohol test

INVERNESS — A Citrus County school bus driver resigned Monday after being tested Friday morning on suspicions that he was under the influence of alcohol, Superintendent of Schools Sandra "Sam" Himmel said.

The man, who did not drive his bus route Friday, resigned in lieu of being fired, Himmel said Wednesday.

The driver had been on the job about a year, trans-

porting middle and high school students. The *Chronicle* is withholding his name because he is not being charged with a crime.

Human Resources Director Jeff Davis said the district's transportation office received an anonymous call Friday morning saying a driver who was reporting to work "had had a long night" of drinking.

The district may test drivers for alcohol and drugs with cause or after accidents. Drivers are also tested randomly.

A supervisor met with the driver and told him she wanted him to undergo an alcohol screening. A company contracted with the county conducted two onsite alcohol tests and the driver failed both, Himmel said.

She declined to release the man's blood-alcohol content.

A driver is considered drunk on Florida roads with a .08 percent blood-alcohol content. The maximum level for anyone with a commercial driver's license, such as a bus driver, is .04 percent.

District officials immediately suspended the driver without pay and were to begin termination proceedings when he resigned, Himmel said.

Officials also conducted an alcohol screening on another school bus driver who the man said had been drinking with him Thursday night. That test, however, showed no alcohol in the driver's system, Davis said.

wearable original artwork.

"He drove all around the Adirondacks selling his stuff — he's one heck of a salesperson, so likeable," Logan said. "People just bought from him, and he built himself a nice business there."

For the next 10 years, Stemler lived the life of a free spirit, going wherever his muse led him. He went to Utah to work at a ski resort in exchange for ski passes. After Hurricane Andrew, he went to South Florida and worked on boats.

Wherever he went, he would draw. That's what an artist does — that's who an artist is.

He returned to Citrus County in 1998 and opened Wild Images, his T-shirt business, working from his home. Stemler was never one for a 9-to-5 job. He preferred being able to go into his studio at 2 a.m. if he felt like it and working until dawn.

In 2001, while delivering T-shirts, Stemler was involved in an auto accident, which caused serious bodily

injury to two people. Because alcohol was involved, Stemler was sentenced to 10 years in prison. He served eight and a half.

As tragic as that was, Stemler's indomitable optimism was never quenched. Instead, during his incarceration, he honed his artistic skills by doing portraits for other inmates of their families. At his best, Stemler could take a photo and reproduce it by hand.

"He learned so much," Logan said. "When he was on floor detail, he took floor wax and mixed it with his colored pencils, which made it shiny, like paint. He'd layer it and made it look 3-D."

Released in March 2011, Stemler returned to Crystal River and opened another T-shirt business, T-Shirt Express.

"Everything was perfect," Logan said.

A few months later, Stemler got an electrical shock, and a few weeks after that he noticed he had to think about how to put his right leg down; he felt tingling in his right hand. When he couldn't get out of bed, Logan and Stemler's mom,

Trudy Logan, told him to get himself to Shands hospital immediately.

The doctors there thought he had suffered bleeding in his head, Logan said. They treated him, sent him to rehab and then home.

"Things got very bad very quickly," Logan said.

By Sept. 7, Stemler was back at Shands for a brain biopsy and was told he had Stage 4 brain cancer and was treated with six weeks of radiation. He was also given six months to live, which he

refuses to accept even now.

For the past seven months, Stemler has lived with his mom and stepfather in Floral City. Most of that time has been spent out on the porch with his colored pencils and paper, country music on the radio filling the air as he draws.

When his right side became paralyzed, he taught himself to use his left hand. When he could no longer use a pencil, he switched to watercolors and a brush. His pictures have digressed

from realistic reproductions to abstract-looking simple brush strokes, but the spirit to create has stayed intact.

Recently, Stemler has started spending more and more time in bed, but he hasn't given up his dream of Costa Rica, even though he will most likely only visit there in his dreams.

One dream, however, will come true as his sister Julie arrives this weekend from Pennsylvania. This year will be the first time in about 30 years that brother and sis-

ter will be together with their mother for Mother's Day.

"Jamie's always been an optimist — sometimes unrealistically optimistic. Maybe that's part of being an artist," Mrs. Logan said. "When he was told about the brain cancer, the first thing he said was, 'Don't worry, I'm OK, Mom.' He believes that."

was a man called Thomas Kuzbar.

Santiago said he observed McCourt exit his vehicle carrying a black bag. He then headed to Carbonara's vehicle, opened the back door behind passenger Kuzbar and got into the Chrysler. Santiago said he also saw Kuzbar hand McCourt money.

Carbonara at this point had gone into the store and Santiago said he exited his vehicle and went to first talk to Kuzbar then McCourt.

He said McCourt told him he was there because Kuzbar wanted to buy drugs and that he had thrown some marijuana into the woods next to the store's dumpster.

When Carbonara returned to the vehicle, Santiago said he asked if he could search her car and Carbonara reportedly immediately told Santiago that the

black bag belonged to McCourt.

A search of the bag revealed a cache of drugs — 13 prescription bottles or 864 pills — and paraphernalia. Also in the bag were dozens of clear bags which the officer said are usually used for drug storage and sale. On McCourt's person, they found \$3,950 in cash and an assortment of EBT and hardware store cards.

Santiago said later at the jail, McCourt admitted to him that everything belonged to him, but Evilsizer challenged that confession.

"The jail has recording devices, right?" Evilsizer asked Santiago.

"Then why didn't you record the confession?" he pressed. Santiago said he wrote everything down in his report.

Detective Bob Greatrex said in his testimony he heard McCourt tell Santiago

the black bag belonged to him.

Deputy Ken Lakatis, of the CCSO's Tactical Impact Unit testified about the inventory of pills he took into evidence. Lakatis also told jurors about the street value of the various drugs. Oxycodone, he said can fetch up to \$25 per pill because the new pill mill laws are putting a squeeze on availability.

Evilsizer called McCourt's wife, Amy Parker, to the stand and she said the pills and the black bag belonged to her. She said she had been injured before her husband's arrest and had to take nine of those pills a day.

But, Norville challenged Parker's credibility pointing to previous convictions relating to dishonesty and that she said the opposite in previous depositions about the case.

The jury took about an hour before returning the guilty verdicts.

Judge Howard thanked jurors for their work and made it a point to note their uniqueness.

"In my career as a judge, I think this is only the third time I had an all-female jury," he said.

Howard added that in vast areas of the world, women are not even be allowed to raise their hands to testify against a man, but these jurors served with distinction in the trial of a man. After the verdict, Evilsizer said he was disappointed and vowed to appeal the case.

Norville said he was happy.

"Justice, finally," he said. McCourt has had three other attorneys before Evilsizer and several motion hearings before Wednesday's verdict.

State may purge ineligible voters

TALLAHASSEE — Florida officials said they may have found thousands of non-U.S. citizens on the state's voter rolls.

The Department of State said Wednesday that it has identified more than 2,600 people on the voter rolls who are in Florida legally but may not be eligible to vote.

County election officials have been sent the list. A Miami-Dade elections official

said that the list sent to that county had more than 1,700 names. Some people on the list have given documentation that they are citizens.

Only U.S. citizens are eligible to vote.

The state has been responsible for helping screen voters since 2006. But for several years, the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles was not telling state election officials whether someone with a driver's license was a U.S. citizen.

Young bear travels through town

A 250-pound black bear is back in the wild after trekking through metro Orlando last weekend. There, wildlife officers tranquilized the bear just two blocks from the Amway Center, home of the Orlando Magic. The bear was then relocated several hours later to the Ocala National Forest.

The bear was first spotted by Orlando residents Friday night. Orlando police officers kept an eye on the bear as it moved around town. At one point, police officers even closed off the busy East-West Expressway for a short time in the middle of the night so the bear could cross the highway.

Suspect fatally shot during traffic stop

A Jacksonville police officer shot and killed a motorist during a traffic stop.

Police said Officer Jeff Edwards spotted the vehicle around 2 a.m. in an area of known drug activity.

The Florida Times-Union reported the suspect saw the officer and ran through several stop signs trying to evade him. Police said that in the process of making the traffic stop, Edwards became "alarmed and felt threatened." He fired his gun at least seven times.

The newspaper reported this is the seventh shooting involving a Jacksonville officer this year.

Bradenton

Detectives charge 50 in food-stamp scheme

Manatee County detectives have charged more than 50 people as part of a food-stamp fraud investigation.

The Bradenton Herald reported 53 people face a total of 78 charges related to misuse of electronic benefit transfer cards.

According to officials, an undercover detective sold EBT cards to several people, including store owners and clerks in Manatee County. Sometimes the cards were sold for 50 cents on the dollar and in some cases, cards were traded for drugs.

Local Sertoma clubs changing lives

Citrus County Sertomans get special visit from organization's international president

LECANTO — Gathered in the waiting room of the All Children's Sertoma Outpatient Care center at the Allen Ridge medical complex, Sertoma International President John Kerr learned Wednesday about how cooperation between the local Sertoma clubs and the center help change lives in the community.

Patra Bates, director of outpatient centers in Pasco and Citrus counties, said the Citrus facility provides rehabilitation and audiologic services to about 700 children a month.

"And we don't turn anyone away," she said. It was Kerr's first time in

his official capacity visiting Citrus County. He arrived Monday and so far, he said, he remained impressed with the number of phenomenal people who support Sertoma and what they do to improve the quality of children's lives locally.

"They serve their community well," he said. "They do great work."

He also enjoyed taking a tour of the outpatient care center and seeing the various pieces of equipment donated by local Sertoma clubs. During his visit, Citrus Sertoma donated \$2,290 to sponsor a new piece of infant hearing testing equipment.

Rainer Jakob, Sertoma past international director and a charter member of the

local Sertoma clubs, called Kerr's visit a "big deal" since it was the first time an international president has come to Citrus County. And the visit was even more momentous since last month, Sertoma Inc. celebrated its 100-year anniversary.

Jakob said the three clubs — Inverness, Citrus and Wahoo — do a lot of fundraising in the community and a portion of the money always goes back to speech and hearing health.

Though Jakob admits there are a number of community-service organizations in the county people can join, what is unique about Sertoma is it has the ability to show people what it does with the outpa-

Tourism bureau seeks to launch magazine

LECANTO — An enthusiastic buzz filled the room Wednesday morning during the regular Citrus County Tourism Development Council (TDC) meeting after Marla Chancey, director of the Citrus County Visitors and Convention Bureau, presented the bureau's newest product development recommendation: the creation of an 80-page visitors guide magazine to be distributed to those interested in making a trip to Citrus County.

Chancey laid out several details about the twice-a-year publication, including the desire to hire a new employee who would be instrumental in designing the overall look of the magazine.

Chancey suggested the hiring of Jennifer Worthington, who currently works as a recreation program specialist for the county. Worthington, a homegrown Citrus County resident, has extensive experience with graphic design and illustration, Chancey said. She also is a graduate of Ringling

College of Art and Design in Sarasota.

When calculating Worthington's annual salary plus network upgrades, Chancey said the initial budget impact for the first year would appear to be \$38,000. However, because it is projected the publication will generate \$40,000 in revenue thanks to advertising sales, it would be "revenue-neutral."

"It should pay for itself," Cathy Pearson, assistant county administrator, said.

Commissioner Rebecca Bays, TDC chairwoman, said everything would be done locally and the magazine is something she has wanted to see come to fruition for quite a while.

"I'm so excited about this I can hardly sit in my seat," she said.

The council voted unanimously to move forward with the project. However, Pearson advised the board the matter still has to go before the county commission at its next board meeting.

In other business: ■ Dr. Walter Klages with Research Data Services gave an update to the board

on the visitors profile study. After administering questionnaires to nearly 20,000 people who made inquiries for tourism or travel information about Citrus County, Klages shared some of the rough data he has already collected: The most inquiries originated from the Tampa Bay area, while a few came from places as far as Laredo, Texas, and Flagstaff, Ariz.

In addition, many people indicated they wanted to come to Citrus County for a variety of reasons such as fishing, boat trips, the scenery and, of course, manatees.

Klages also discovered most people tend to stay about two and half days in the county and spend roughly \$500.

And of those who have already visited the county, 96 percent indicated they were satisfied with their stay and 70 percent said they would come back.

The next phase of the study is to conduct face-to-face interviews with tourists at a number of lodging locations and to find out the economic impact of tourism locally.

■ City Managers Andy Houston and Frank DiGiovanni, of Crystal River and Inverness respectively, gave state-of-the-city addresses to update the board on projects that could impact tourism in their communities.

■ After reviewing and scoring the requests for proposals from firms that would handle technology marketing services for the tourism bureau, Chancey suggested to board members that they vote to hire Collinson Media and Events, a Georgia-based company. Chancey said Collinson scored the highest out of the proposals reviewed and had the lowest quote. Collinson would be in charge of redesigning the department's website, creating a mobile website and handling other technologically based marketing services.

The board unanimously approved the recommendation. It must go before the county commission for final approval.

Board OKs revised job posting

INVERNESS — Citrus County School board members approved a revised student health specialist position over strenuous objections from board Chairwoman Linda Powers, who contended the job wasn't high enough on the administrative ladder.

Current health specialist Cathy Reckenwald is retiring. District officials said they wanted to revise some of the job's criteria before posting for her replacement.

The job pays \$42,854, roughly the same salary as a teacher with 15 years' experience. The specialist is geared toward a registered nurse with management experience. Powers said the position should be supervisory, with a salary more than \$60,000. She said the specialist should have the knowledge to direct health workers to administer assistance to children when necessary.

Board member Bill Murray said he didn't necessarily disagree with Powers, but didn't think it was a good time to hire an administrator and the salary that goes with it.

"We are not in a position to raise anybody's salary," Murray said.

Powers responded: "Have you thought about it being the life of a student?"

Board member Pat Deutschman said she agreed with Murray, noting that the position isn't new.

Murray said the board cannot afford an administrative position.

"We are pinching every penny possible," he said. "Our financial picture is not that good right now."

The current job requires five years' management experience. District officials, in setting the new job description, had recommended requiring three years' management experience.

Deutschman said the requirement of five years should stick and the board approved the change.

Both Powers and Murray voted against the new job description. Murray said he supports the position, but voted no because he didn't want to change the three years' experience to five years.

In other business Tuesday, the board:

■ Heard from board attorney Wes Bradshaw that county commissioners voted 5-0 Tuesday to place a school district property tax referendum on the November ballot. The referendum technically seeks a quarter-mill increase for operation and capital projects; however, the district now collects that same quarter-mill for capital projects.

Swan eggs stolen from parks

LAKELAND — City officials want to know who is stealing swan eggs from Lakeland parks.

The Ledger of Lakeland reported city workers who feed and monitor the swans first noticed eggs missing from Lake Morton and Lake Mirror

last week. Director of Parks and Recreation Bob Donahay said the swans were moved to Lake Morton so officials could keep tabs on the eggs. He said up to 20 eggs are missing.

Donahay said the eggs — worth up to \$150 each — were about to hatch.

The newspaper reported Lakeland officials often find a

broken swan egg or two around the parks. But this time they don't believe the eggs fell victim to vandalism. Instead, Donahay believes the thief took the eggs to hatch and sell.

PSC keeps phone service charge

TALLAHASSEE — The monthly surcharge Florida telephone users pay to support a

special service for deaf and other hearing impaired customers will remain unchanged at 11 cents.

The Florida Public Service Commission on Tuesday approved the fee for the budget year beginning July 1.

It will be the fifth straight year the surcharge has been the same.

Three accused in meth bust

Routine traffic stop led to arrests

A routine traffic stop reportedly led to the arrest of three Citrus County residents on a raft of drug charges and child-neglect charges.

Scott Anthony Goldsmith, 41, and Douglas Hales Naylor, 40, both of Homosassa, and Casey Byers, 35, of Beverly Hills were arrested Tuesday on charges that included possession of a listed chemical, the sale and manufacture of a controlled substance and trafficking in methamphetamines. At the residence shared by Naylor and Goldsmith, four children were reportedly present in a house allegedly used for the endeavors for

which they were charged.

According to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, a deputy pulled over Goldsmith for a bad tail light lens and routinely asked if he had anything illegal in his truck. Goldsmith reportedly gave permission to the deputy to search his vehicle and his person. Several PH test strips were found in Goldsmith's pocket, but he said he used them to check water quality in a hot tub.

However, the deputy also knew test strips are used in the production of meth. He proceeded with his search and noticed a pipe cutter in a toolbox, which can be used in dismantling lithium batteries — a cog in the meth production machine. The deputy soon found a mason jar allegedly contain-

ing a clear fluid and coffee filters. When he opened the jar he was reportedly hit with a noxious smell consistent with the production of meth. Goldsmith and Byers, who was a passenger in the vehicle, were read their rights, but decided to speak with investigators.

Byers allegedly told investigators he helped Goldsmith earlier that evening to clean up meth garbage after cooking and that he burned the garbage. He, however, thought his fingerprints may be on the jar the deputy found in the tool box. The jar reportedly weighed more than 200 grams.

Goldsmith also reportedly told authorities about his meth activities and said investigators will also find marijuana plants at his res-

idence — inside and outside.

It was at Goldsmith's residence officers reportedly encountered Naylor, who said he had recently moved into the home.

He reportedly produced syringes from his pocket when asked if he had anything on him. Naylor also had a pill container on him with several different pills, reports state.

According to investigators, the house was awash in supplies used in the manufacture and sale of meth.

All three were arrested and Goldsmith's bond was \$625,500. Naylor's bond was \$520,500 and Byers' bond \$620,500.

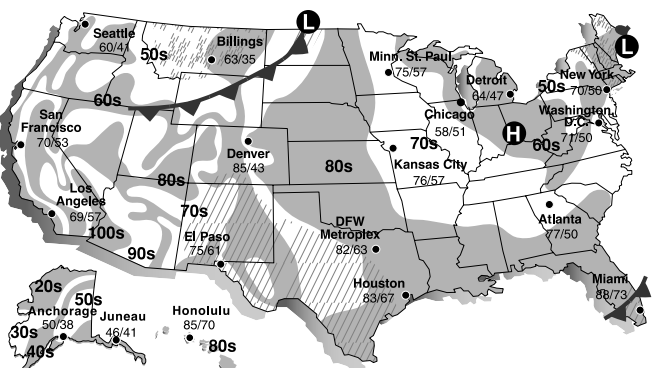

State Supreme Court hears class action argument

TALLAHASSEE — A pay day loan company's lawyer argued Wednesday that the Florida Supreme Court must uphold a contract provision prohibiting customers from banding together in class action arbitration cases against the firm because of a 2011 U.S. Supreme Court decision.

The state justices' decision will affect similar clauses widely used to require customers to sign away their right to sue in exchange for case-by-case arbitration to resolve potential allegations that businesses have violated usury, decep-

tive practices or other consumer protection laws. The clauses are designed to avoid costly lawsuits and often include confidentiality provisions to keep the results from becoming public.

The state's 4th District Court of Appeal affirmed a trial judge's invalidation of the class action ban that's in McKenzie Check Advance's loan contracts. The appellate court ruled borrowers in Palm Beach County were unable to seek justice because they couldn't find lawyers willing to pursue individual claims for relatively small amounts of money in cases involving complex legal issues.

Circuit Judge Elizabeth Maass ruled the clause was "unconscionable."

The appellate court also certified a question of great public importance to the Supreme Court: Whether the class action waivers violate public policy by preventing consumers from obtaining competent counsel.

The U.S. Supreme Court, though, subsequently struck down a California law that outlawed arbitration clauses with similar class action bans.

The 5-4 opinion in the case of AT&T Mobility LLC v. Concepcion said the state statute conflicted with a federal law that encourages arbitration.

such as shooting through a tunnel and beneath a roofed "eyebrow" to stop wild shots.

John Siefert, executive director of the Citrus County Economic Development Council, said the applicants were proven business people in Citrus County. The Goodenows also own and operate American Pro Diving Center in Crystal River. The shooting range would add about 40 full and part-time jobs. In addition, Siefert said, the shooting range would attract other businesses to

Citrus County.

Howard Potts, who said his home is adjacent to the proposed shooting range, described the former mining site as "derelict and misused pits," and said a shooting range would be a good use for it.

Commissioner Dennis Damato called the application "outstanding" in its detail and acknowledged the large support.

"We don't realize how many people sport shoot," Damato said.

It was not the first time the county had made good use of a hole in the ground, Damato continued, giving examples of such former mining sites as Rock Crusher Canyon, a

recreational vehicle park and concert venue in Crystal River; and Black Diamond, a golf course community in Lecanto.

Commissioner John "JJ" Kenney said the plan presented "the most safety-aware range I've ever seen." He also requested Goodenow to reach out to Boutwell and work with her concerns about safety.

In its approval, the BOCC agreed the hours of operation would be from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. for the shooting range and 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. for the retail store.

Suspected kidnapper apprehended

The suspect in a possible mother-and-child kidnapping case has been apprehended in South Carolina, according to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office.

David Duncan Jr., 52, was taken into custody in South Carolina on Wednesday afternoon with the assistance of the U.S. Marshals and the Orangeburg County Sheriff's Office.

Duncan ran once he was confronted, and when he was arrested, he was armed with both a gun and a knife,

officials reported.

The defendant will have to waive extradition before being transported from the Orangeburg County Jail back to Citrus County on an active warrant.

It was shortly after 10 p.m. Thursday, May 3, when a call to 9-1-1 reported the possible kidnapping in Flo-

ral City. Residents on E. Gobbler Drive reported hearing a gunshot followed by screams for help and witnessed a vehicle leaving the neighborhood at a high rate of speed.

Authorities say a 29-year-old female and a 2-year-old child were taken by the suspect to the home of an acquaintance in Marion County, and were dropped off nearby. The woman, who had reportedly been beaten, was transported to Munroe Regional Medical Center, treated and released. The toddler was unharmed.

Rattlesnakes may go on endangered species list

TALLAHASSEE — Federal officials are considering whether the eastern diamondback rattlesnake should be declared an endangered species.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service on Wednesday announced it will review the snake's status. The review is in response to a petition by three environmental groups and snake expert Bruce Means. They say the snake is being endangered by loss of habitat and human predation for their meat and skins in the Southeast.

There are no bag limits on the snakes in South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Mississippi, Alabama and Louisiana. The reptiles also are targeted by "rattlesnake roundups" in Alabama and Georgia that offer prizes for their capture.

Means said the loss of longleaf pine habitats is threatening rattlesnakes and other species including the gopher tortoise, red-cockaded woodpecker and indigo snake.

Jury convicts man in Nova professor's slaying

FORT LAUDERDALE — A South Florida man is facing the death penalty after a jury convicted him of killing a Nova Southeastern University professor.

Jurors in Fort Lauderdale deliberated a little over five hours before returning guilty verdicts Wednesday against 45-year-old Randy Tundidor Sr. in the killing of professor Joseph Morrissey in April 2010. Morrissey was Tundidor's landlord and was stabbed to death after a break-in at his home.

The *South Florida Sun Sentinel* reported that Tundidor was also convicted of attempted murder, armed burglary, armed robbery, kidnapping and arson.

Tundidor's two sons and Morrissey's widow testified against him. One of Tundidor's sons pleaded guilty to taking part in the crime in exchange for a maximum life sentence.

Jurors will decide later whether to send Tundidor to Florida's death row.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Kings Bay Manatee Protection Area Speed Restrictions Implementation Notice

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) formally implemented the boat speed restriction provisions of the recently designated Kings Bay Manatee Refuge (refuge) effective May 1, 2012. The Service recently updated existing signs and markers to reflect the new regulations.

The refuge encompasses all waters of Kings Bay (Citrus County), including its tributaries and adjoining water bodies, upstream of the confluence of Kings Bay and Crystal River. The refuge is in place year-round.

The year-round boat speed restrictions are now enforceable. These include slow or idle speed as marked and an exception for the seasonal high-speed area.

The seasonal high-speed area, in place from June 1 to August 15, allows watercraft to operate at speeds up to 25 miles per hour, during daylight hours (sunrise to sunset), in a portion of the refuge generally northeast, north, and northwest of Buzzard Island, as marked, and exclusive of slow speed shoreline buffer areas. Slow-speed operation is required in this area from sunset to sunrise.

The Service will mark the seasonal shoreline buffers later this month ahead of the June 1 opening day.

Owners of boats anchored in this area are being given advance notification that they must remove their boats from the seasonal high-speed area from June 1 through August 15. Anchorage in the seasonal high-speed area during this period is prohibited, except for emergencies.

"Slow" speed is defined as the speed at which the watercraft proceeds fully off plane and is completely settled in the water. Since watercraft of different sizes and configurations may travel at different speeds, a specific speed is not assigned. However, a watercraft is NOT proceeding at slow speed if it is: (1) on plane, (2) in the process of coming up on or coming off of plane, or (3) is creating an excessive wake. A watercraft IS proceeding at slow speed if it is fully off plane and completely settled in the water, not plowing or creating an excessive wake.

"Idle" speed is defined as the minimum speed necessary to maintain steerage.

Exceptions to speed restrictions are contained in 50 CFR 17.105 and include activities "...reasonably necessary to prevent the loss of life or property due to weather conditions or other reasonably unforeseen circumstances, or to render necessary assistance to persons or property."

As a reminder, the following waterborne activities are now prohibited year-round throughout the Kings Bay Manatee Refuge:

- Chasing or pursuing manatee(s).
- Disturbing or touching resting or feeding manatee(s).
- Diving from the surface on to resting or feeding manatee(s).
- Cornering or surrounding or attempting to corner or surround manatee(s).
- Riding, holding, grabbing, or pinching or attempting to ride, hold, grab, or pinch manatee(s).
- Poking, prodding, or stabbing, or attempting to poke, prod, or stab manatee(s) with anything, including hands and feet.
- Standing on or attempting to stand on manatee(s).
- Separating a mother and calf or attempting to separate a mother and calf.
- Separating manatee(s) from a group or attempting to separate manatee(s) from a group.
- Giving manatee(s) anything to eat or drink or attempting to give manatee(s) anything to eat or drink.
- Actively initiating contact with belted and/or tagged manatee(s) and associated gear, including any belts, harnesses, tracking devices, and antennae.
- Interfering with rescue and research activities.

US stocks fall; doubts resurface in Europe

Fear of European debt is once again playing havoc with Wall Street.

Stocks pitched down Wednesday in the United States as borrowing rates climbed for Spain and Italy, a sign that investors are losing confidence in those countries' finances.

Spain's 10-year borrowing rate leapt to 6.06 percent from 5.70 percent early Tuesday. Many fear Spain, strangled by high unemployment and a real-estate collapse, could be the next nation to require financial rescue.

The Dow Jones industrial average was down as much as 184 points before recovering about half of the loss. Still, the average has fallen for six consecutive days, its longest losing streak since last summer.

The Dow soared 2,624 points, or 25 percent, from Oct. 3 through May 1 as European leaders appeared to get a handle on the debt crisis. Last fall, the nations that use the euro agreed to enforce budget discipline across the region.

Since May 1, when the Dow closed at a four-year high, worries about Europe have resurfaced. In elections on Sunday, Greek and French voters ousted leaders who had imposed tough spending cuts to soothe investors.

In the six losing days that ended Wednesday, the Dow gave back 444 points — one-sixth of the points it gained

The market today is tame compared with last summer, when the Dow routinely swung by hundreds of points a day.

But the atmosphere is starting to resemble last year's as traders sell anything deemed risky based on the latest headlines from Europe, said Peter Tchir, who trades a range of investments for his hedge fund TF Market Advisors.

"The concern in Spain is at such a high level that people trade the indexes or big futures contracts and are less discriminating about what risk they're taking on," he said.

On Wednesday, prices fell for commodities such as energy, copper and silver that are needed to sustain broad economic growth but are less valuable when the economy is weaker and demand wanes.

Benchmark crude oil, which sold for about \$110 per barrel earlier this year, fell below \$100 last week and kept sliding. It closed below \$97 Wednesday on the New York Mercantile Exchange, continuing its longest decline since last July.

Commodity prices also were under pressure because the dollar rose against the euro, sending the euro down as low as \$1.2910, its lowest point since Jan. 23. Commodities are traded in dollars, so a strong dollar makes them appear more expensive to investors who hold foreign currencies.

The spring decline has become a motif on Wall Street. In 2010 and 2011, the Dow climbed in the first three months of the year, then flat-lined or lost ground as events overseas overshadowed modest economic growth in the U.S.

Put fairness first with vendor policy

Mixed emotions greeted a proposal to regulate mobile vendors in the city of Crystal River.

Unable to reach a consensus, the city council recently sent the proposal back to the drawing board, with the request that city staff strike a balance that's generally acceptable to the board.

That could be difficult, given that the mayor and one council member voiced a leave-them-alone view of the situation, referring to mobile vendors.

The proposal would have banned mobile vendors from setting up on vacant lots and required logistical specifications to address traffic flow and related matters.

Those officials opposed to the proposal pointed to the poor economy and indicated the desire not to make things tougher on entrepreneurs who already are struggling.

At the opposite end of the spectrum, proponents of the measure noted that merchants and restaurateurs with brick-and-mortar operations pay taxes, overhead expenses and operate under a smorgasbord of bureaucratic regulations.

While banning vendors from working on vacant lots seems a bit too rigid, it is the taxpaying businesses that should get first consideration. They're no less impacted by the lousy economy than anyone else — and more so in many cases.

As to traffic flow and parking regulations, if that's deemed necessary and an agreeable plan can be reached, have at it.

If the heart of the issue is the economy, city leaders should base policies on what's best for those with the most skin in the game — that is, those businesses that contribute to the city's tax base.

One thing led to another, as things have a way of doing when the government stays out of the way, and although Cook died last year, Cook Medical, with its subsidiaries, is the world's largest family-owned medical devices company.

In 2010, however, Congress, ravenous for revenues to fund Obamacare, included in the legislation a 2.3 percent tax on gross revenues — which generally amounts to about a 15 percent tax on most manufacturers' profits — from U.S. sales of medical devices beginning in 2013. This will be piled on top of the 35 percent federal corporate tax, and state and local taxes. The 2.3 percent tax will be a \$20 billion blow to an industry that employs more than 400,000, and \$20 billion is almost double the industry's annual investment in research and development.

An axiom of scarcity is understood by people not warped by working for the federal government, which can print money when it wears out of borrowing it. The axiom is: A unit of something — time, energy, money — spent on this cannot be spent on that.

So the 2.3 percent tax, unless repealed, will mean not only fewer jobs but also fewer pain-reducing and life-extending inventions — stents, implantable defibrillators, etc. — which have reduced health care costs.

The tax might, however, be repealed. The medical device industry is widely dispersed across the country, so numerous members of Congress have constituencies affected by developments such as these:

Cook Medical is no longer planning to open a U.S. factory a year. Boston Scientific, planning for a more than \$100 million charge against earnings in 2013, recently built a \$35 million research and development facility in Ireland and is building a \$150 million factory in China. (Capital goes where it is welcome and stays where it is well-treated.) Stryker Corp., based in Michigan, blames the tax for 1,000 layoffs. Zimmer, based in Indiana, is laying off 450 and taking a \$50 million charge against earnings. Medtronic expects an annual charge against earnings of \$175 million. Covidien, now based in Ireland, has cited the tax in explaining 200 layoffs and a decision to move some production to Costa Rica and Mexico.

Already 235 members of the House of Representatives — 227 Republicans and eight Democrats — are co-sponsors of a bill to repeal the tax. Twenty-three Republican senators but no Democratic senators favor repeal. The Democrats who imposed this tax on a single manufacturing sector justified this discrimination by saying Obamacare would be a boon to the medical devices industry because, by expanding insurance coverage, it would

stimulate demand for devices. But those insured because of Obamacare will be disproportionately young and not needing, say, artificial knees. And well before Obamacare, the law had long required hospitals to provide devices to the needy who are uninsured.

Unsurprisingly, Sen. Scott Brown, R-Mass., supports repeal of the tax. Surprisingly, so does his opponent, Elizabeth Warren, an impeccably liberal Obamacare enthusiast who notes that in Massachusetts the medical devices industry has 24,000 employees and accounts for 13 percent of the state's exports. Warren is experiencing another episode of New England remorse: "When Congress taxes the sale of a specific product through an excise tax ... it too often disproportionately impacts the small companies with the narrowest financial margins and the broadest innovative potential."

Well, yes. In 1990, when President George H.W. Bush's recanted his "no new taxes" pledge, he enabled the Democratic-controlled Congress, with a legion of New England liberals in the lead, to impose a 10 percent tax on yachts costing more than \$100,000. Yacht sales plunged 70 percent in six months, a third of all yacht building companies — many in New England — stopped production and more than 20,000 workers lost their jobs. In 1993, the tax, although not the damage, was repealed.

Given humanity's fallen condition, almost everyone's tax policy is: "Don't tax you, don't tax me, tax that fellow behind the tree." There are, however, vulnerable wealth-and-job creating businesses behind most trees.

Testimony resumes in Edwards trial

GREENSBORO, N.C. — A former campaign spokeswoman for John Edwards testified Wednesday that his wife angrily confronted a key donor about his support for the presidential candidate's pregnant mistress in 2007 at a hotel in Iowa.

Jennifer Palmieri also said she eventually distanced herself from the former candidate after he acknowledged the affair in an August 2008 television interview but wasn't truthful about the baby he had with his mistress. The former aide later began crying while discussing her friendship with Elizabeth Edwards from the stand at Edwards' corruption trial.

Prosecutors indicated they'll wrap up their case Thursday without calling the mistress, Rielle Hunter, to testify.

Russian plane on test flight vanishes

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Rescuers were searching rugged, forested terrain Friday for a new Russian-made passenger plane lost over mountains in western Indonesia during a demonstration flight for potential buyers. Fifty people were on board, including diplomats, businesspeople and journalists.

Search and rescue teams were deployed to the area just south of the capital, Jakarta, said Bambang Ervan, a spokesman for the Ministry of Transportation. He said more than 100 people were still searching as darkness fell Wednesday. Bad weather, however, forced at least two helicopters to turn back.

The Sukhoi Superjet-100, Russia's first new passenger jet since the fall of the Soviet Union, took off from the Halim Perdanakusuma Airport at 2:21 p.m. Wednesday for what should have been a quick test flight — the second of the day.

It dropped off the radar just 21 minutes later, shortly after the crew asked air traffic control for permission to drop from 10,000 feet to 6,000 feet, said Daryatmo, chief of the national search and rescue agency.

Obama voices gay-marriage support

WASHINGTON — Equivocal no longer, President Barack Obama declared his support for gay marriage on Wednesday in a historic announcement that instantly gave the polarizing social issue a more prominent role in the 2012 race for the White House.

The announcement was the first by a sitting president, and Republican challenger Mitt Romney swiftly disagreed with it. "I believe that marriage is between a man and a woman," he said while campaigning in Oklahoma.

Gay rights advocates cheered Obama's declaration, which they had long urged him to make. Beyond

the words, one man who married his gay partner in Washington, D.C., was stirred to send a \$25 contribution to the president's campaign. "Making a contribution is the best way to say thank you," said Stuart Koperman.

Obama announced his shift — he once opposed gay marriage but more recently has said his views were "evolving" — in an interview with ABC in which he cited a blend of the personal and the presidential.

He said "it wouldn't dawn" on his daughters,

Sasha and Malia, that some of their friends' parents would be treated differently than others, and added that he had thought of aides "who are in incredibly committed monogamous same-sex relationships who are raising kids together."

He said he also thought about "those soldiers or airmen or Marines or sailors who are out there fighting on my behalf, and yet feel constrained even though now that 'Don't Ask, Don't Tell' is gone because they're not able to commit themselves in a marriage."

The president said he was taking a personal position, and aides said he continues to believe that marriage is an issue best decided by states.

He spoke on the heels of a pair of events that underscored the sensitivity of an issue that has long divided the nation.

Vice President Joe Biden said in an interview on Sunday that he is completely comfortable with gays marrying, a pronouncement that instantly raised the profile of the issue. White House aides insisted the

vice president hadn't said anything particularly newsworthy, but gay rights groups cited Biden's comments in urging the president to announce his support.

On Tuesday, voters in North Carolina — a potential battleground in the fall election — approved an amendment to the state constitution affirming that marriage may only be a union of a man and a woman.

Senior administration officials said Obama came to the conclusion that gay couples should have the right to legally marry earlier this year and had planned to make his views known publicly before the Democratic National Convention in early September.

Saudis emerge as ally against terrorists

WASHINGTON — A decade after hijackers mostly from Saudi Arabia attacked the United States with passenger jets, the Saudis have emerged as the principal ally of the U.S. against al-Qaida's spinoff group in Yemen and at least twice have disrupted plots to explode sophisticated bombs aboard airlines.

Details emerging about the latest unraveled plot revealed that a Saudi double agent fooled the terror group, known as al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula, passing himself off as an eager would-be suicide bomber. Instead, he secretly turned over the group's most up-to-date underwear bomb to Saudi Arabia, which gave it to the CIA. Before he was whisked to safety, the spy provided intelligence that helped the CIA kill al-Qaida's senior operations leader, Foad al-Quso, who died in a drone strike last weekend.

The role of Saudi Arabia disrupting the plot follows warnings in 2010 from the oil-rich kingdom about a plot to

blow up cargo planes inside the U.S., either on runways or over American cities. That plot involved a frantic chase across five countries of two packages containing bombs powerful enough to down an airplane. Twice, a bomb was aboard a passenger plane. Once, authorities were just minutes too late to stop a cargo jet with a bomb from departing for its next destination. Ultimately, no one died and the packages never exploded.

It hasn't always been this way. Saudi Arabia, the one-time home of Osama bin Laden, failed to spot and stop the 15 Saudi-born hijackers of the 19 who carried out the September 2001 terror attacks. Questions remain whether two Saudi citizens who had at least indirect links with two of the hijackers were reporting to Saudi government officials. U.S. law enforcement officials accused the Saudi government of failing to help adequately in investigations of the al-Qaida attack on the USS Cole in Yemen in 2000 and Hezbollah's bombing of the Khobar Towers housing complex, which killed 19 U.S. servicemen in 1996.

But a series of devastating al-Qaida strikes against Saudi targets in 2003 and, more recently, fears al-Qaida could try to trigger Arab Spring-style revolts in the kingdom, have energized the Saudi government in its war against al-Qaida's spinoff in Yemen, which is composed mostly of ex-Saudi militants. Saudi Arabia and the U.S. — with help from Yemen's government — have joined forces to penetrate the terror group at the highest levels. Drone strikes have killed U.S.-born Anwar al-Awlaki last summer and al-Quso, his successor, more recently.

Al-Quso personally briefed the Saudi double agent, giving him open-ended instructions to pick a U.S.-bound plane on a day of his choosing. Al-Quso was hit in part due to information gleaned from the double agent, according to two former officials, speaking on condition of anonymity.

FBI Director Robert Mueller said Wednesday the FBI is examining the new al-Qaida bomb and urged Congress to renew wide-ranging surveillance authority to thwart similar terrorism plots.

USPS to keep rural post offices open

WASHINGTON — Bending to strong public opposition, the nearly bankrupt U.S. Postal Service on Wednesday backed off a plan to close thousands of rural post offices after May 15 and proposed keeping them open, but with shorter operating hours.

The move to halt the shuttering of 3,700 low-revenue post offices followed months of dissent from rural states and their lawmakers, who said the cost-cutting would hurt their communities the most. In recent weeks, rising opposition had led Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe to visit some rural areas in a bid to ease fears about cuts that could slow delivery of prescription drugs, newspapers and other services.

In an election year, the angst over postal closings also extended to nearly half the senators, who in letters last week urged Donahoe to postpone closing any mail facility until Congress approves final postal overhaul legislation.

Blast near UN car shows fragility of truce

DARAA, Syria — A roadside bomb hit a Syrian military truck Wednesday just seconds after the head of the U.N. observer team drove by in a convoy, demonstrating the fragility of the international plan to end the country's bloodshed.

In Washington, meanwhile, President Barack Obama took steps to extend sanctions against the government of President Bashar Assad, saying Syria poses an "unusual and extraordinary threat" to U.S. national security and diplomatic goals.

The attack, which the regime said wounded 10 Syrian soldiers, emphasized the limits of the international community's plan to use unarmed observers to promote a cease-fire between government troops and rebels trying to topple Assad.

The team of 70 U.N. military observers now in Syria should grow to more than 100 in the coming days. It is unclear when the full team of 300 will arrive to oversee a U.N.-brokered cease-fire.

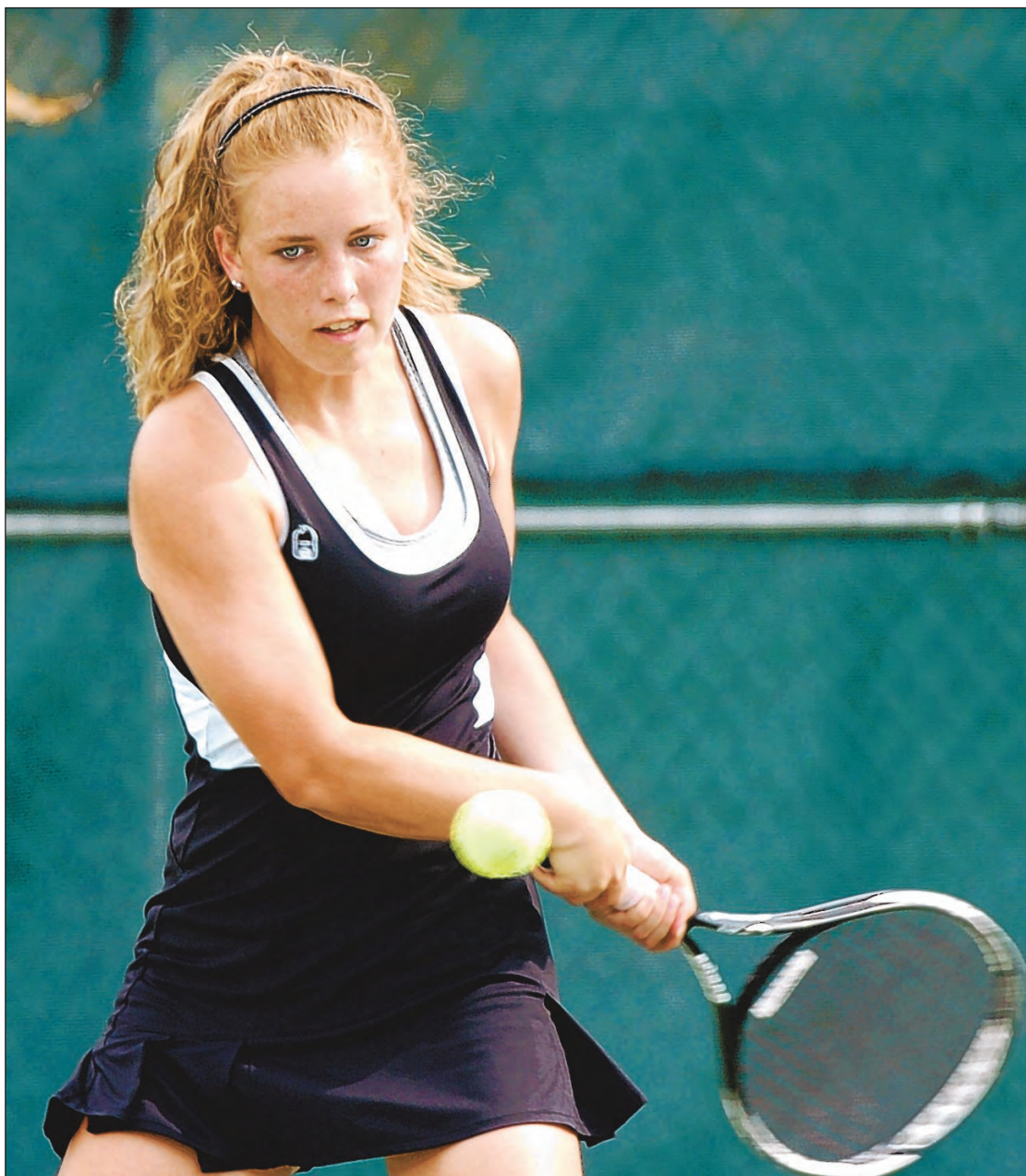
This was a banner year for girls tennis within the county. Every team had a winning record, and every team competed in postseason play.

Peterson lawyer fighting failed test

LAS VEGAS — With a May 19 bout in Las Vegas on the line, boxer Lamont Peterson's lawyer is telling Nevada boxing regulators the champion fighter's failed doping test in March stemmed

from an "inadvertent" failure to disclose medical treatment last November for low testosterone levels.

In a letter obtained late Tuesday by The Associated Press, Washington, D.C.-based attorney Jeff Fried told the Nevada Athletic Commission that Peterson's doctor determined that a one-time "therapeutic" treatment "would not produce a significant enhancement of athletic performance."

Peterson, of Washington, defeated Amir Khan in a disputed split decision in December in the nation's capital to become the WBA and IBF junior welterweight champion.

Peterson's scheduled rematch next week with Khan in Las Vegas was in doubt after a urine test in March found unacceptably high levels of synthetic testosterone in Peterson's system.

Yankees' Rivera has blood clot in calf

NEW YORK — Mariano Rivera has a blood clot in his right calf, the latest health problem for the longtime New York Yankees closer who tore a knee ligament last week while shagging fly balls during batting practice.

Rivera is on blood-thinning medication intended to dissolve the clot and says he is OK, though

he was scared when he received the diagnosis. He needs to spend at least a week or two strengthening his knee before he has surgery to repair his torn anterior cruciate ligament — but he says that would have been the case regardless of the blood clot.

In his first chance since taking over for injured star Mariano Rivera, Robertson escaped a bases-loaded jam to save Tuesday night's 5-3 victory over the Rays.

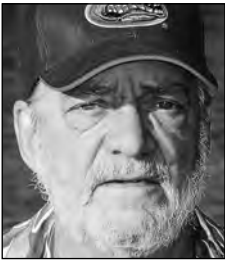

Cure for the summertime blues

Classes can introduce youngsters to world of outdoor recreation

Summer will be here soon, and for many parents that's a good news/bad news deal. The good news is the kids will be home from school. The bad news is the kids will be home from school. Many parents, and more than a few grandparents, will be suffering, seldom in silence, from TNTDS (There's Nothing To Do Syndrome), which can bring on headaches, stress and the age-old question, "Whose idea was it to have kids, anyway?"

Fishing is a great summertime activity, but many parents who don't fish can't teach kids the skills they need in order to fish effectively and safely. With that in mind, I'm planning some "Learn to Fish" classes, provided there are enough students to make up a meaningful class. The classes will be held in the meeting room at Crystal River Preserve State Park, but I won't establish dates and times until I know how many parents are interested in enrolling the kids. The fee will be \$20 per child, but multiple children from the same household will get a discount. Students will be limited to ages 10 through 18, but — and this is a big "but" — any child under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult (no charge) who can supplement the class lessons. For example, I won't hold up an entire room full of students while one ten-year-old struggles to master a knot the others have already learned. Send an email to the address at the end of the column if you're interested.

■ ■ ■
 For something of longer duration, consider the weekly day camp sessions being held this summer for kids age 10 to 15 who are interested in hunting and re-

lated outdoor activities. Participants in these Hunt Camps will learn skills such as wildlife identification, survival, first aid and tree stand safety. Tree stand accidents are a major source of outdoors-related injuries to both adults and children, and learning to avoid them makes the camp worthwhile almost by itself. They'll also learn conservation, land stewardship and hunting laws and ethics. Considerable time will be dedicated to gun ranges, using muzzleloaders, rifles and shotguns, and those who choose to do so can earn their Hunting Safety Certificate, required for a hunting license. The camps run five days per week from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., the weeks of June 4, 11, 18 and 25. Cost is \$175 per week, and you can register your children at BTYCC.org. For more infor-

 As the saying has it, when one door closes, another opens. Harvest of stone crabs closes on May 16, the beginning of peak spawning season, and will reopen October 15, after the critters have had a chance to make more. Stone crab traps must be gone from the water five days after the closure date. The recreational red snapper season in state Gulf waters will run from June 1 through July 10, the same dates as the recently-announced federal season, but the FWC also voted to keep the 40-day season even if the feds later shorten the season in federal waters.

 If the results of last weekend's Citrus County Builders Association Family Tournament are any indication, there should be no problem finding fish inshore, with one exception: only one cobia was brought to the weighing station. I talked with a number of contestants, and while some lamented not being able to find big fish, no one said reds or trout were scarce, and catches included a number of trout in excess of 20 inches. Issues abound

Magic begin offseason, likely with change

ORLANDO — The Magic found themselves at the center of the NBA universe several times this season.

The only problem was that it was for reasons everyone in the Orlando organization not only loathed, but never wants to duplicate again.

After four months of soap opera-caliber drama that included a preseason trade demand by Dwight Howard, a word war over whether the all-star center asked coach Stan Van Gundy to be fired and a rash of late-season injuries that culminated in a second straight first-round playoff exit, change is likely on tap for the Magic.

That could not only mean a new head coach or general manager, but even major changes to Orlando's current roster.

"We're going to start a full evaluation process of our entire organization," Magic CEO Alex Martins said Wednesday, a day after the Magic's 4-1 first-round playoff series loss to Indiana. "That's what we do at the end of each season ... and everything will be evaluated."

"Everything that we've done over the years is about getting to win a championship, and unfortunately just getting to the playoffs is just not good enough."

Howard rescinded his trade request in mid-March, and later gave up the opt-out clause for this summer, which will keep him under contract for the final year of his current deal next season.

But with the Magic still facing the possibility of Howard playing out next year and then leaving them with no compensation by signing with another team free agency, they must either get him to commit long-term or possibly trade him

before then.

Howard is currently in Los Angeles recovering from late-season back surgery that caused him to miss the Magic's final 17 games of the season, including the playoff loss to Indiana. Orlando went 5-12 without him.

Martins said he, president of basketball operations Otis Smith and members of ownership have spoken to Howard, but not specifically yet about signing a long-term contract extension.

He also said there hasn't been a timetable on making a decision on Howard's situation, or on retaining the services of Van Gundy or Smith.

Howard has previously noted issues with both at

times, but has repeatedly maintained that he never asked management to fire Van Gundy, though the coach said he has been told by team officials that it's happened.

"I think everyone deserves and needs some time to cool off after a very trying season," Martins said. "But nobody deserves to be left in limbo...It's not a tricky position (evaluating everyone). It's what we do."

Van Gundy expressed a desire Wednesday to return next season, but Smith said he is actually "50-50" in his mind on whether he still has the desire to return. Smith and Van Gundy each have a season remaining on their current contracts.

Heat eliminate Knicks in 5

James nets 29 as Miami wins 106-94

MIAMI — LeBron James decided not to play in New York two summers ago. He won't be playing there any more this season, either.

The Knicks have been put away, and the Miami Heat are headed to the second round of the NBA playoffs.

James had 29 points, eight rebounds and seven assists, Chris Bosh and Dwyane Wade both scored 19 points and the Heat ousted the Knicks 106-94 in Game 5 of the Eastern Conference first-round series

Wednesday night. Miami won the series 4-1, and will meet Indiana in the East semifinals starting Sunday in Miami.

"We will savor this win tonight," James said. "And then we get to work tomorrow and get ready for Indiana."

Carmelo Anthony scored 35 points for the Knicks, including a spinning jumper over James at the end of the third quarter that pulled New York within 81-67.

It wasn't enough to stave off an all-too-familiar playoff result for Anthony, who was chosen two spots behind James and immediately ahead of Bosh and Wade in the 2003 NBA draft. Anthony has been in 11 postseason series, winning just two, the won-lost record of his teams in those games a mere 17-37.

WACO, Texas — Brittney Griner has a broken right wrist sustained in a longboard accident. Coach Kim Mulkey told The Associated Press that the 6-foot-8 All-American center will be in a cast for four weeks.

The school released no other details Wednesday about the injury. Mulkey first revealed Griner's injury while attending an awards banquet in New York City on Tuesday night.

Griner helped lead undefeated Baylor to the first 40-win season in NCAA history, capped when the Lady Bears won their second national championship last month. She averaged 23.2 points, 9.5 rebounds and 5.2 blocks per game, and was the AP women's college basketball player of the year.

Griner withdrew from consideration to play for the U.S. women's basketball team at the London Olympics this summer.

Crean defends decision to end Kentucky series

INDIANAPOLIS — Indiana coach Tom Crean said the Kentucky series will end because the Hoosiers didn't want to play another game in Indianapolis.

On Wednesday, Crean told reporters that the decision was made because the Hoosiers already play one game in Indianapolis and hoped to keep as many games on campus as possible.

Crean would not say whether the Hoosiers would look to add Louisville or Kansas to the schedule. He says adding another big name to a non-conference schedule that is already marred with strong opponents is not a necessity.

Hargrove disappointed NFL discussed case

NEW ORLEANS — Suspended former Saints defensive lineman Anthony Hargrove said he's disappointed his sworn statement regarding the NFL's bounty investigation was leaked.

Hargrove said in a statement emailed to The Associated Press Wednesday by his agent Phil Williams that he hoped the NFL would not discuss the signed declaration publicly.

Hargrove said the NFL "grossly mischaracterized" his words, which made the declaration a "hot item" that was subsequently leaked to media.

Hargrove's sworn declaration explains how ex-Saints defensive coordinator Gregg Williams and current assistant head coach Joe Vitt told him to deny the existence of a bounty program in New Orleans when he was interviewed by NFL investigators in March of 2010.

Hargrove's statement Wednesday was also given to ESPN.

Lawmakers add \$50M to Vikings' stadium tab

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Minnesota lawmakers working out the final version of a bill for a new Vikings stadium have raised the amount the team would pay by \$50 million.

The Vikings originally committed to paying \$427 million, or about 44 percent of the construction costs of the \$975 million stadium.

But both the House and Senate demanded this week that the Vikings pay more. If both chambers approve the new bill and Gov. Mark Dayton signs it, it'll be up to the team whether to accept the new terms.

The Vikings have been pushing to replace the 30-year-old Metrodome, saying they can't make enough money in it to compete.

Antitrust suit accuses MLB of video monopoly

NEW YORK — A small group of baseball fans is suing Major League Baseball, its clubs and some television broadcast entities, claiming they collude to eliminate competition in the showing of games on the Internet and television.

The antitrust lawsuit filed Wednesday in federal court in Manhattan seeks a court declaration that the defendants engage in antitrust behavior and appropriate remedies, including unspecified damages. The lawsuit said the defendants possess monopoly power over the market for video presentations of major league games and have used the power to exclude or limit competition.

The plaintiffs, several fans, said in the lawsuit that they are blocked from obtaining Internet-delivered videos of local games without paying a costly subscription fee.

MLB spokesman Pat Courtney said the league does not comment on pending litigation.

Major League Baseball to help tornado victims

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Major League Baseball and a charitable foundation run by players announced Wednesday that they are working with Habitat for Humanity to build nine homes for the tornado-ravaged communities of Joplin, Mo., and Tuscaloosa, Ala., with more than half of the funding coming from State Farm Insurance.

It was the 1,500th major-league victory for Reds manager Dusty Baker. Axford (0-2) took the loss.

Mets 10, Phillies 6

PHILADELPHIA — Ike Davis hit a three-run homer, Andres Torres also connected and the New York Mets beat the Phillies to complete their first three-game sweep in Philadelphia in six years.

The Mets rallied to win all three against slumping Philadelphia. They trailed after five innings against Roy Halladay on Monday, after six against Joe Blanton on Tuesday and after six against Cliff Lee in the series finale.

The five-time defending NL East champions are a season-worst four games under .500 at 14-18. The Mets (18-13) are five games above .500 for the first time since July 19, 2010.

Making his first start since straining his left oblique in the 10th inning of a gem against San Francisco on April 18, Lee allowed two runs and five hits, striking out six.

Ex-Miss USA gets probation for DUI

HIGHLAND PARK, Mich. — **Rima Fakih**, the first Arab-American to be crowned Miss USA, avoided jail during sentencing Wednesday in her Michigan drunken driving case, an experience she described as "very humbling."

Judge **William McConico** put Fakih on six months of probation, ordered the former beauty queen to perform 20 hours of community service and said she must pay \$600 in fines and costs. Fakih also must attend an alcohol safety class.

The 26-year-old pleaded no contest last month to driving while visibly impaired in Highland Park, an enclave of Detroit. A no contest plea isn't an admission of guilt but is treated as such for sentencing. Fakih faced a maximum penalty of 93 days in jail.

Jury deliberates in Hudson killings

CHICAGO — Jurors in the case of the man accused of killing relatives of **Jennifer Hudson** began deliberations late Wednesday afternoon after prosecutors trying to counter defense claims of a weak case insisted that "a tsunami of evidence" linked him to the crime.

The defense told jurors during closing arguments that prosecutors had failed to prove that Hudson's former brother-in-law, **William Balfour**, was the killer. Hudson has attended every day of testimony in the murder trial and was there for closing arguments as well.

The actress and singer bent forward, her head on her knee, and sobbed as prosecutor **Jennifer Bagby** described what she called "the execution" of the Oscar winner's mother, brother and 7-year-old nephew in October 2008.

Bagby showed jurors photos of the victims' bloody bodies juxtaposed with pictures of them alive.

"This defendant is the one that made (them) into these images," Bagby said.

Closing arguments lasted for about four hours, and the jury didn't begin deliberations until shortly before 5 p.m.

Prosecutors contend Balfour killed Hudson's relatives in an act of vengeance against Hudson's sister, **Julia Hudson**, his estranged wife at the time. Julia Hudson fiddled nervously with a piece of string as Bagby described how her ex-husband allegedly shot her son, **Julian King**, whom she called Juice Box, through the head.

Santigold discusses dance music, new CD

NEW YORK — You may love dance and electronic music, but Santigold hates it.

The singer-rapper, who has collaborated with Jay-Z, the Beastie Boys and Mark Ronson, says she wishes the sound wasn't so popular. "I really don't like that music, that sort of Euro-dance music, Ibiza-style. I've never liked it, even when it was kind of new and underground," she said.

The electronic and dance genre has taken over U.S. radio in the last few years, with acts from Rihanna to Britney Spears to Usher to Katy Perry adopting the sound, and churning out No. 1 hits.

Santigold says today's pop hits are formulaic, where artists "hire one of three producers, one of a couple songwriters, and you pretty much get the exact same song every time."

"It's created a dismal landscape for music, but it's a sure bottom line for the record company," she said. "It's really become about the economy of the music industry, and it's shaping the music that we're getting in a really unfortunate way."

Philadelphia-born Santigold has written songs for Christina Aguilera, Lily Allen and Ashlee Simpson. She used to work as an A&R for Epic Records, and almost signed rapper-actor Mos Def.

"I brought Mos Def and I was like, 'You guys got to sign him.' And they're like, 'Is he down with Puffy?'" she recalled with a laugh. "Like, everything at that time was Diddy."

Santigold said the job was frustrating, and she decided to leave to pursue her own musical efforts. She blends elements of rock, pop, hip-hop and dance to create a sound

that is as distinct as her album's unusual beats.

"I would describe it as genre-less music," said Santigold, who released her sophomore album, "Master of My Make-Believe," last week. It's the follow-up to her critically-acclaimed 2008 debut "Santogold," her former stage name before changing it in 2009.

"I always call it collage music because really that's what it is," she continued. "It's taking bits and pieces of all these different influences and sounds and piecing them together in a way that's special and unique to myself."

Santigold says making "Master" — which features collaborations with Q-Tip, Diplo, John Hill, Greg Kurstin, David Sitek of TV on the Radio and Nick Zinner of the Yeah Yeah Yeahs — was "intense" and transcendental meditation helped ease some of her exhaustion.

Book gets 50 shades of nay

Bestseller considered too steamy for some libraries

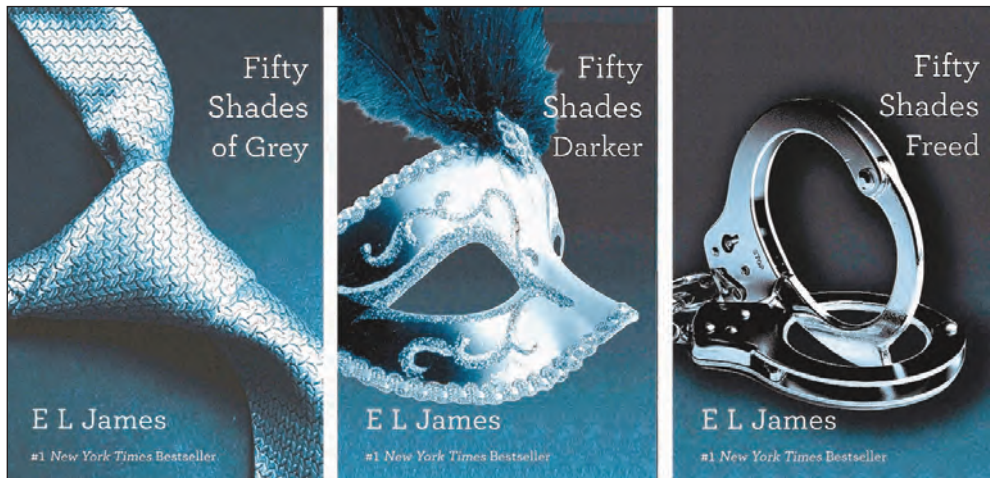

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Public libraries in several states are pulling the racy romance trilogy "Fifty Shades of Grey" from shelves or deciding not to order the best-seller at all, saying it's too steamy or too poorly written.

Even in the age of e-books and tablets, banning a book from a public library still carries weight because libraries still play such a vital role in providing people access to books.

"When a book is removed from the shelf, folks who can't afford a Nook or a Kindle, the book is no longer available to them," said Deborah Caldwell Stone, the deputy director of the American Library Association's office for intellectual freedom.

"Fifty Shades of Grey," a novel about bondage, wild sex and yes, love, has been called "mommy porn" because of its popularity among middle-aged women. It has become so well-known that "Saturday Night Live" performed a skit

about it, joking that a Kindle with "Fifty Shades" uploaded on it was the perfect Mother's Day gift.

This week, the steamy books hold the top three spots on the New York Times best-seller list.

Libraries in Wisconsin, Georgia and Florida have all either declined to order

the book or pulled it from shelves. Other states may soon follow.

"It's semi-pornographic," said Don Walker, a spokesman for Brevard County, Fla., where the library put 19 copies of the book on the shelves then pulled the novel after reading reviews about it. Some

200 notices had to go out to people on a waiting list to read it.

Librarians in at least four Florida counties have declined to buy the book — even though hundreds of people have requested it. Reasons range from not having the money to poor reviews.

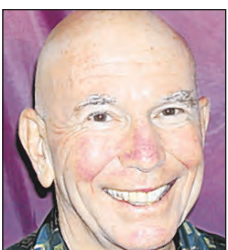

Turning wine labels into chemical ingredients lists

The craft of winemaking has advanced by leaps and bounds from the era of pre-history, when cave people first discovered the unprecedented and striking flavors of fermented grapes. No additives in those days were needed. Just the grapes and natural yeast present on the skins were enough. And the same chemical reaction works just as well today.

Currently, commercial

winemakers bottling millions of gallons of juice require laboratories filled with every chemical available to ensure good drinkable wine. But that may change.

Have gentle readers recently noticed the detail of FDA-required food labels? There is a litany of ingredients such as: disodium EDTA, potassium sorbate, calcium chloride, citric acid, animal fat, yellow 5, ascorbic acid and

the list goes on. There is enough stuff listed to make a chemistry professor blink.

In fact, food manufacturers are informing the public what's been added to ensure freshness and to boost flavor. But does anyone actually care about what the government says we need to know regarding the additives in baked beans, potato chips and marmalade?

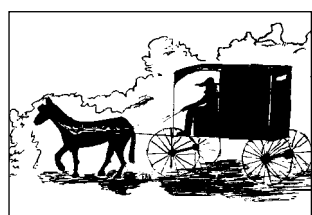
Some advocacy groups — there is no end to them —

would like the same long lists put on wine labels. I wish I had a nickel for every time I was asked about the bottle warning "contains sulfites," a ridiculous bit of legislation enacted by Congress to caution the small percent of asthmatic people to be alert, needlessly alarming the 99.9 percent of the rest of us who are not affected by sulfites in wine.

Honor Julia Child with French chicken

It may not be exactly as Julia intended, but it certainly brings her spirit into my home every time I make it, and I hope it will bring her into your home, as well.

"FRENCH CHICKEN" WITH DIJON MUSTARD AND SCALLIONS

- 2 small whole chickens (about 3 to 4 pounds each)
- Olive oil, for brushing, plus 1/4 cup
- Kosher salt
- Grains of paradise (optional) or ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons white wine
- 1/3 cup strong Dijon mustard (such as Amora or Maille)
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- Pinch of cayenne pepper
- 3 scallions, chopped
- 1 cup panko or fresh white breadcrumbs, plus extra for the tomatoes

Heat the grill and prepare it for indirect cooking over medium heat.

Use paper towels to pat dry both chickens. Using poultry shears or a very sharp knife, one at a time cut down the length of each chicken's backbone on both sides to remove it. Overturn the chickens to be breast side up, then break the breastbone by striking it sharply with a blunt object,

such as can of beans (wash the can after use).

Spread the chickens open and lay them flat. Tuck the wing tips under the upper wings, then brush all over with olive oil.

Season with salt and grains of paradise or black pepper. Place the chickens in the center of the grill skin side up. Cover the grill and cook for 20 minutes.

Meanwhile, assemble the mustard sauce. In a small bowl, whisk together the

white wine and mustard. Slowly drizzle the 1/4 cup of olive oil and the butter in the mixture to blend. Add the thyme, cayenne and scallions, then mix to combine. Reserve 8 teaspoons of the mustard mixture for the tomatoes (if making).

After the chickens have cooked for 20 minutes, turn them over and spread mustard sauce on backs of the chickens. Grill, covered, for 10 minutes. Turn over to breast side up and spread mustard on the skin, then grill, covered, for another 10 minutes. Sprinkle the breast-sides of the chickens with breadcrumbs and grill, covered, for another 10 to 15 more minutes, or until juices run clear and the thickest part of the thigh registers 180 F. Remove the chickens from the heat and let them rest for 10 minutes before carving.

During the final 10 minutes of cooking time — or while the chicken rests — spread each tomato half with some of the reserved mustard sauce, then sprinkle them with breadcrumbs. Grill for 10 minutes, or until the tops are crunchy and the tomatoes are warmed through. Serve hot.

SQUASH FRITTERS

- Vegetable oil for frying
- 1 2/2 cups self-rising cornmeal mix*
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup whole buttermilk

- 2 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 3/4 cup grated zucchini squash
- 3/4 cup grated yellow squash
- 1/4 cup finely chopped green onion
- 1 recipe Chive-Horseradish Cream

Chive-Horseradish Cream: (Mix following together and chill)

- 3/4 cup sour cream
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh

- chives
- 2 tablespoons prepared horseradish
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

For fritters: In a large Dutch oven, heat 3 inches of oil to 350 degrees. In a large mixing bowl, combine cornmeal mix, flour and salt.

In a separate bowl, combine buttermilk and eggs. Add buttermilk mixture to cornmeal mixture, stirring to combine. Add cheese, squashes and green onion, stirring to combine. Drop batter by ta-

blespoonfuls into hot oil. Fry for 2 to 3 minutes, or until golden brown.

Remove from oil and drain on paper towels. Serve with chive-horseradish cream.

NOTE: If self-rising cornmeal mix is not available, place 1 tablespoon baking powder and 3/4 teaspoon salt in a 2-cup measuring cup. Fill with corn meal to the 1 1/2-cup mark.

Why not post warnings about the other chemical ingredients that go into commercial winemaking?

Should wine labels contain the same notations as foods? For example, fining agents are used to assure clarity; they include ingredients such as chicken egg whites, isinglass made from fish bladders and animal hoof gelatins.

Does anyone think winemakers must further note the product was made using "saccaromyces ellipsoidum" (a natural yeast), tartaric acid, Bentonite and ammonium sulphate to nurture the yeast? This is nasty sounding stuff to heap

on to helpless consumers. Isn't it enough to clarify things by telling folks the varietal grape name such as Merlot and Pinot Grigio?

Does the American public really want confusing labels? Some advocacy groups seem to think it's a good idea.

In Europe, a few producers are warning vegetarians about eggs and fish products present. My own view is consumers are not interested in reading a long list of chemical additives while sipping their favorite bottle of Chardonnay.

Folks are much more appreciative, I suggest, with a short account of how the wine may taste to assist consumers with selection.

"This wine made from home-grown old vines watered by rain from our own

pure wells, is clean, crisp and dry, with currant berry fruit flavors and hints of oak," reads a lot better in my view than a catalog of unpronounceable chemical compounds.

So to the advocates of so-called "honest labels," I say, buzz off! It's confusing enough to be told my potato pancake mix actually contains "disodium diphosphate" as well as "potassium metabisulfate" to "protect flavor."

Wine Shop III in Crystal River is hosting the inaugural Crystal River Wine Festival from 2 to 6 p.m. Saturday, May 12. The event will be on Citrus Avenue. Cost it \$35 in advance or \$40 at the gate.

Wine Shop III also will have a four-course dinner created by the Executive

Chef paired with Rodney Strong wines at 6:30 p.m. Friday, May 11, at Plantation Inn. Cost is \$75 per person, all inclusive.

About 150 different wines will be available for tasting. I promise it will be an extraordinary event. See you there.

Band Train makes tracks in wine world

Musicians collaborate on new drink

SAN FRANCISCO — Backstage with the rock band Train before a performance at San Francisco's hallowed Great American Music Hall may not be quite what you expect from a Grammy-winning, multi-platinum group.

What's missing from the dressing room — groupies, bling and that we're-about-to-trash-this-place vibe. What you get instead — a small table set with a few glasses and a bottle of the band's Save Me San Francisco wine which they are making in concert with ACME Wine Movers, a newly formed division of The Wine Group.

It's a pretty refined scene, but one that shouldn't come as such a surprise considering Train started out in San Francisco, just a microphone stand's throw from Napa Valley and its many wineries, said lead singer Pat Monahan.

"A couple of years ago, we decided that we wanted to start bringing San Francisco to the rest of the world and we decided that we would start by bringing one of the best things that we know about San Francisco, which is the wine," he said.

In collaboration with ACME, the band started the Save Me, San Francisco Wine Co., named after their 2009 album which included the hit "Hey, Soul Sister."

Their first bottling was a red named after another hit, "Drops of Jupiter (Tell Me)." A second wine, Calling All Angels chardonnay, followed and the latest release is California 37 cabernet sauvignon, named after the band's newly released album.

The wine is made in the Livermore Valley wine region east of San Francisco and sells for a suggested retail of \$9.99.

Band members visited the winery before finalizing the collaboration and work with the winemaker in approving the final blend.

"They're regular guys," said Damon Musha, marketing director at ACME Wine

Movers. "Moreover, they're people who are really passionate about the project. It certainly made our lives a lot easier. This is something that's genuine to them, rather than something they're trying to do to make a quick dollar."

Train's Save Me, San Francisco wines are available online and have made restaurant lists around the country, including the Hard Rock Cafe chain, appropriately enough. A portion of the proceeds from sales of the wines goes to support Family House, a San Francisco-based nonprofit providing temporary housing to families of seriously ill children.

In another foray into wine country, the band shot the video for their new single "Drive-By" at Shafer Vineyards in the Napa Valley. And if you were hoping for some shoot stories of wild excess, dream on. "We could not have asked for a nicer group of people to show up," said winery president Doug Shafer.

So, not quite as exciting as throwing a TV off a hotel balcony (Rolling Stones' Keith Richards) or being banned from Holiday Inns for life (The Who, but especially Keith Moon), but memorable in its own way.

"Our philosophy about all things from wine to records and downloads and T-shirts is, you know, we're not trying to get the most out of everybody," said Monahan.

The vast majority of respondents (81 percent) acknowledged they will enjoy at least one alcoholic beverage to celebrate Mom.

And when it comes to pampering moms, gifts are another great way to show appreciation and make this day extra special on top of a marvelous meal.

Interestingly, when making the decision on where to dine, ensuring the restaurant is kid-friendly doesn't appear to be a big priority for survey respondents as more than half (51 percent) said no children will be in their dining party.

Here are some desserts to make ahead for a Mother's Day sweet finale:

HUMMINGBIRD COFFEE CAKE

For Cake:

- 8 tablespoons (1/2 cup or 1 stick) unsalted butter, at room temperature, plus more for preparing the pan
- 1 cup all-purpose flour, plus more for preparing the pan
- 1 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon coconut extract (optional)
- 1 cup low-fat plain Greek yogurt
- 2 mashed bananas (about a scant 1 cup)
- 2/3 cup shredded coconut
- 1 cup finely chopped pineapple

For glaze:

- 2 ounces cream cheese, softened
 - 2 tablespoons milk
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 3/4 cup confectioners' sugar, plus more as needed
- To finish:**
- 1/3 cup shredded coconut
 - 1/3 cup coarsely chopped walnuts, macadamia nuts, or pecans

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Thoroughly butter a bundt pan. Coat the inside with flour, tapping out the excess.

In a small bowl, combine all-purpose flour, whole wheat flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt and cinnamon. Whisk to blend; set aside.

In the bowl of an electric mixer, combine the butter and sugar. Beat on medium-high speed until light and fluffy, about 2 to 3 minutes. Mix in the eggs one at a time, blending well after each addition. Blend in the vanilla and coconut extracts. Beat in the yogurt until well incorporated. With the mixer on low speed, beat in half of the dry ingredients, mixing until incorporated. Beat in the mashed bananas and then the remaining dry ingredients, again mixing just until incorporated. With a silicone spatula, gently fold in the coconut and chopped pineapple.

Transfer the batter to the prepared bundt pan and smooth into an even layer. Bake, rotating halfway through baking until a toothpick inserted in the cake comes out clean, about 50 to 55 minutes.

Let cool 20 to 30 minutes in the pan placed on a wire rack. Gently loosen the cake from the sides of the pan with a knife, and carefully turn out onto the cooling rack. Allow to cool completely.

To make the glaze, whisk together all ingredients in a small bowl. If the glaze is too thin, whisk in more confectioners' sugar. If the glaze is too thick, whisk in additional milk 1 teaspoon at a time. Drizzle the glaze over the top of the cooled cake. Sprinkle with shredded coconut and chopped nuts for garnish. Let glaze set before slicing and serving.

MUCHO MANGO BREAD PUDDING

- 6 slices bread or pound cake, torn into small pieces
 - 2 mangos, peeled, seeded and diced into medium-sized pieces
 - 1/4 cup natural sugar
 - 3 eggs, lightly beaten
 - 2 cups low-fat milk
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons natural vanilla extract
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cardamom
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 1/4 cup natural sugar
- Rum sauce:**
- 2 tablespoons butter
 - 1 tablespoon cornstarch
 - 1/2 cup natural sugar
 - 1 cup low-fat milk
 - 3 tablespoons rum

pudding: Preheat the oven to 350

degrees. Lightly butter a 9-by-11-inch glass baking dish. Toss together the pieces of bread and mango; pour into buttered baking dish.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the sugar, eggs, milk, vanilla and cardamom. Pour over the bread and mango mixture. Place small dollops of butter on top of the pudding (approximately 1/4 stick of butter total). Bake for 45 to 50 minutes in the preheated oven, or until slightly puffed and golden brown. Serve warm with ice cream and fresh, sliced mangoes. Drizzle rum sauce over the top.

Rum sauce: Melt butter in a small saucepan over medium heat. Mix together the sugar and cornstarch; stir into the melted butter. Slowly pour in milk, stirring frequently until the mixture begins to lightly boil. Continue cooking until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in rum. Serve warm. It makes 8 servings.

FLORIDA LIME CHEESECAKES

Filling:

- 3 8-ounce packages of cream cheese, softened
- 5 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 6 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 2 lime rinds, grated
- 2 ready-made graham cracker crusts

Topping:

- 2 cups light sour cream, 16 ounces
- 2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1/2 cup sugar

In a large mixing bowl, beat cream cheese until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add sugar very slowly, then add lime juice, grated lime rind and vanilla; mix well. Pour filling into two crusts. Bake at 300 degrees for 1 hour.

While cakes are baking, combine sour cream, lime juice and sugar; mix well. After cakes have cooked for 1 hour, remove and carefully spread topping on both cakes while still hot. Return cakes to hot oven for 10 minutes with no interruptions; do not open oven door. After 10 minutes, turn oven off and leave cakes in oven for an additional hour. This prevents the topping from cracking.

Let cakes cool and then chill for at least 2 hours before serving. It makes 8 servings for each cake.
