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**NEWS BRIEF****Beverly Hills man killed in I-75 crash**

A 22-year-old Beverly Hills man died Tuesday evening in a vehicle accident on Interstate 75 in Marion County.

According to Florida Highway Patrol officials, the 22-year-old motorist's car was found overturned at about 7 p.m. along the northbound lane of I-75.

The victim's name was being withheld pending notification of next of kin.

According to the FHP crash report, the victim's 2011 Chevrolet van was traveling west on S.E. County Road 42 (S.E. 165th St.) at a high rate of speed and failed to stop at a four-way intersection at County Road 475 (South Magnolia Avenue).

Continuing westbound, the car struck a utility pole and reportedly went through a fence separating I-75 and S.E. County Road 42.

The vehicle entered I-75, where it hit a cement culvert, causing the car to go airborne, according to the report.

Marion County Fire and Rescue pronounced the motorist dead at the scene.

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State House race heating up

Democrat Dostal unsure whether to stay in House race

CRYSTAL RIVER — Nancy Argenziano has a moniker for Lynn Dostal, winner of the Democrat primary for state representative: "the Goocher."

The name comes from Dostal's primary election opponent in the state House District 34 race — Robert Goocher — who both Argenziano and Dostal say was a

Republican prop.

Argenziano, the former state legislator from Citrus County who is running as an Independent, says if Dostal stays in the race they will split the anti-incumbent vote and assure re-election for Republican Jimmie T. Smith.

Dostal, who defeated mystery candidate Robert Goocher in the Democrat primary with 72 percent of the vote, admitted Argen-

ziano is probably correct.

Still Dostal, a Hernando County special education teacher who lives in Homosassa, is not ready to concede and is suggesting Argenziano consider dropping out.

"If she can win by my stepping out, I can win by her stepping out," Dostal said Wednesday.

Argenziano, a former chairwoman of the Public Service Commission, said Dostal has every right to stay in the race.

"He needs to talk to some of his Democrat peers," she said.

"He's a novice at this. He's got to look at the bigger picture. Mr. Dostal has a lot to think about."

And if they both stay in the race, Republicans will get that three-candidate

ballot they were hoping for with Goocher's candidacy, Argenziano claimed.

"What Mr. Dostal has done has played right into the Republican hands," she said. "The same people who put Mr. Goocher in don't care who's on the ballot. They know a 'D' won't win in Citrus County."

Dostal said he would be meeting with leading Democrats to help determine

Slow and idle speeds in effect again on King's Bay

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) has sent out a reminder to boaters in King's Bay — beginning today, the "sport zone" that had been a high-speed area from June 1 to Aug. 15 is once again a slow-speed area. The service staff will be updating the signs and buoys today, according to the release from the USFWS office in Jacksonville.

The release also noted that anchoring prohibitions in the sport zone during the summer season has been lifted.

The prohibitions were part of a larger set of contentious rules adopted March 15 by USFWS designating King's Bay a year-round manatee protection refuge and reconfiguring the parameters of the sport zone.

The speed limit and the dates of summer waterborne activities in the sport zone were altered.

"The high speed went from 35 mph to 25 mph," said Michael Lusk, manager of the Crystal River National Wildlife Refuge Complex.

Lusk said the summer was busy, but everything went without a hitch.

"Everything went well and very smoothly. We spent about \$30,000 for extra enforcement, but ended up issuing mostly warnings to those who violated the new rules," Lusk said.

He said between 200 and 300 contacts were made with visitors to the bay, during which the new rules were explained. Lusk said his office is currently compiling numbers of all contacts and tickets issued. He hopes to release those figures in the near future.

"We have not had one person

complain about the new rules and no manatees or humans were hurt this summer," Lusk added.

He said with regard to the new speed rules, there are no hard and fast rules about how quickly a boater is traveling because, depending on the size of the boat and engine, the actual speed necessary to steer the vessel may vary.

"For slow speed, make sure the boat is off-plane, and the watercraft is completely settled on the water. For idle speed, what we require is to operate at just enough for steering," he said.

According to USFWS, the following waterborne activities continue to be prohibited in King's Bay's manatee refuge area year-round:

- Chasing or pursuing manatee(s).
- Disturbing or touching resting

Kenney blasts 'no-kill' shelter bid

An animal advocate tried again to get a no-kill resolution for the county animal shelter, but was rebuffed by a commissioner, who said volunteer work, not a piece of paper, would save more unwanted pets.

"We submitted a no-kill resolution, which was to save 90 percent of the shelter animals by the end of two years," said Frank Yuelling, Inverness businessman and no-kill advocate.

"We would like to see that put on the agenda and adopted," Yuelling said Tuesday at a meeting of the Citrus County Board of County Commissioners. "We look forward to promoting it once it is adopted by getting community involvement."

Yuelling presented recommendations from No Kill Nation, an Oakland, Calif.-based animal advocacy group that encourages public animal shelters to adopt a no-kill policy through the use of such programs as increasing adoptions, increasing spaying and neutering and promoting the feral cat program of TNR: trap, neuter and release.

Adopting the policy through a resolution would bring more volunteers to the county shelter once people learned the shelter no longer euthanized unwanted pets, Yuelling said.

The argument fell flat with Commissioner John "JJ" Kenney.

"No-kill" is a bunch of B.S. It really is," Kenney said. "We visited two no-kill shelters. And I will tell you, I walked past a hamper loaded with dead cats. Didn't seem to me that was 'no-kill.'"

Kenney said he hated the term no-kill and refused to use it.

"I refuse to go to my fellow commissioners and say, 'Let's declare ourselves a no-kill shelter,'" Kenney said. "I would rather strive for life. Work to keep these animals alive and get them adopted."

Veteran Fla. congressman loses GOP primary

ORLANDO — New district boundaries, low voter turnout and a tactical decision by U.S. Rep. Cliff Stearns to emphasize his Washington experience all contributed to his surprising defeat by a Florida veterinarian with scant political experience.

The 12-term congressman conceded a tight Republican primary Wednesday to Ted Yoho, a tea party supporter who in a stunning upset won by slightly more than 800 votes — about 1 percentage point.

Federal Election Commission records show that Stearns had 16 times more cash on hand than Yoho — \$2 million versus \$129,000 — but Yoho was helped by

an active grassroots campaign and the courting of party executives in District 3's 13 central-north counties, which stretch from the Gulf Coast to suburban Jacksonville. While he had celebrity endorsers such as Lynyrd Skynyrd's Johnny Van Zant, his website emphasized the support of everyday voters, such as a grocery store meat cutter, a tile contractor and a shoe store manager.

"I think Ted Yoho outworked the congressman," said Daniel Smith, a political science professor at the University of Florida.

Stearns had been a national Republican favorite after spearheading criticism of the Obama administration's energy program and its funding of Planned Parenthood.

But Yoho criticized Stearns for being in office too long and pledged that he would leave the House after eight years. He ran a television ad where actors dressed as politicians in suits ate from a trough alongside pigs and threw mud at each other. He championed cutting government spending, simplifying the tax code and repealing the recent health care overhaul legislation.

"It's a humbling feeling, surreal," Yoho said Wednesday. "I think what got the ears of the people of the district was the message that we've had enough."

Stearns acknowledged that there weren't enough provisional ballots to overcome the small lead his opponent had. Yoho held a 34

percent to 33 percent lead over Stearns with only 829 votes separating the candidates.

"It has been an honor, privilege and the high calling of my life to serve the many outstanding citizens of Florida in our nation's capital," Stearns said in a statement.

Yoho's campaign manager, Kat Cammack, attributed the upset to Yoho's anti-incumbent message and to his appeal to voters who work in agriculture. Yoho is a big- and small-animal vet who works on farms.

But Yoho, 57, also was aided by a redistricting process which changed the boundaries of Stearns' district and incorporated new

or feeding manatee(s).

- Diving from the surface on to resting or feeding manatee(s).
- Cornering or surrounding or attempting to corner or surround manatee(s).
- Riding, holding, grabbing, or pinching or attempting to ride, hold, grab, or pinch manatee(s).

- Poking, prodding, or stabbing, or attempting to poke, prod, or stab manatee(s) with anything, including hands and feet.

- Standing on or attempting to stand on manatee(s).

- Separating a mother and calf or attempting to separate a mother and calf.

- Separating manatee(s) from a group or attempting to separate manatee(s) from a group.

- Giving manatee(s) anything to eat or drink or attempting to give manatee(s) anything to eat or drink.

- Actively initiating contact with belted and/or tagged manatee(s) and associated gear, including any belts, harnesses, tracking devices, and antennae.

- Interfering with rescue and research activities.

The new King's Bay rules have been a point of controversy for some elected officials and residents who claim federal government overreach in the affairs of a local resource. They also claimed USFWS did very little consultative groundwork with the stakeholders before suddenly unveiling the proposal in the summer of 2011. The service, however, said

KNOW YOUR SPEED

The King's Bay manatee refuge includes all its tributaries and adjoining water bodies, upstream of the confluence of King's Bay and the Crystal River. The refuge is in place year-round.

■ "Slow" speed is defined as the speed at which the watercraft proceeds fully off plane and is completely settled in the water. Since watercraft of different sizes and configurations may travel at different speeds, a specific speed is not assigned. However, a watercraft is not proceeding at slow speed if it is: (1) on plane, (2) in the process of coming up on or coming off of plane, or (3) is creating an excessive wake. A watercraft is proceeding at slow speed if it is fully off plane and completely settled in the water, not plowing or creating an excessive wake.

■ "Idle" speed is defined as the minimum speed necessary to maintain steerage.

■ Small general: Most uses less than 100,000 gpd.

Exceptions to speed restrictions are contained in the rules and include activities reasonably necessary to prevent the loss of life or property due to weather conditions or other reasonably unforeseen circumstances or to render necessary assistance to persons or property.

it opened the proposal to public input and eventually made adjustments to the final draft to address some of the concerns of the plan's opponents while ensuring

the protection of manatees.

Florida-Georgia border and incorporated voters who were both more rural and had more experience working in agriculture than his previous district.

"No doubt, it helped us," Yoho said. "It's a large, rural, agriculture area."

Low voter turnout also worked in Yoho's favor. Voters who ordinarily would have picked Stearns may have stayed home over the lack of excitement on the

primary ticket.

Stearns also emphasized his experience in Congress.


That was likely a mistake given the low regard with which Congress currently is held, Smith said.

"Highlighting his career in Congress ... certainly didn't help him among the Republican Party faithful," Smith said.

Yoho faces Democrat J.R. Gaillot in November's general election.

Fight over monument sent to lower court

The fight over a 5-foot tall granite monument that prominently displays the Ten Commandments in front of a north Florida courthouse is back before a lower court.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeal in Atlanta refused to take up the squabble Wednesday, instead ordering a U.S. District Court to rule on the standing of the plaintiff in the case. The American Civil Liberties Union sued on behalf of a North Carolina resident who owned property in a neighboring county and was considering buying property in Dixie County but was offended by the monument.

The ACLU sued Dixie County to remove the monument from the front of the building in Cross City. The 6-ton, \$20,000 monument was bought by a local businessman who pays for its upkeep.

New group promoting natural-gas vehicles

Scam targets travel agency, clientele

Clients and associates of a Homosassa travel agency were the targets of a common, albeit convincing, email scam.

Buzz Bernard and his wife, Gwen—owners of The Travel Authority Inc.—discovered their company's email account had been infiltrated and all information seized.

"They hacked into my email and took all the email addresses," Buzz Bernard said.

A few days later, those stolen addresses from Bernard's email received a message, claiming that the Bernards were in Madrid, Spain, robbed of all their money, credit cards and passports.

The forged email requested that money be

wired to a bank account in order to get them back to the United States.

According to Bernard, his clients could understand that he and his wife might be overseas.

"Especially in the travel business, we could have definitely been overseas," Bernard said. "(My associates) would just react emotionally and quickly because they want to help us."

Companies such as travel agencies and real estate agencies, serving large numbers of customers, are generally the subjects of this type of scam.

"There were a lot of people that were willing to send money," Bernard said, noting phone calls he received.

Bernard suggested to some who inquired that they reply to the email in hopes of tracking down the source.

"I told them to take it one step further and reply," Bernard said. "The (sender of the email) is still responding to this day."

Bernard reported this scam to the fraud division of the Citrus County Sheriff's Office earlier this week.

Being aware of these types of scams, Bernard wants his clients to disregard the email and think twice before replying.

GOP convention shines spotlight on Tampa

TAMPA — Tampa is a hot property for the Republicans this year, and that doesn't just mean the 90-degree temperatures in August that will begin to sauté national convention delegates every time they step outdoors.

There's political heat, too.

The site of the Republican National Convention Aug. 27 to 30 is situated at the west end of the Interstate 4 corridor, home to the largest concentration of swing voters in the largest swing state.

It's no coincidence, then,

that the Republicans have placed their convention here; Mitt Romney desperately needs to win Florida if he is going to defeat President Barack Obama. The corridor, 132 miles of bustling highway from Tampa to Daytona Beach, cuts through Orlando and seven diverse Central Florida counties still hurting from a recession that has been slow to loosen its grip.

About a quarter of the state's registered voters are in the Tampa TV market, and local media coverage will be wall-to-wall for at least a week. Add the Orlando TV market, and the area encompasses 44 percent of all Florida voters. The pomp and grand ritual of a political convention in their own backyards could go a long way toward swaying undecided voters.

"Florida is a symbol that is well known to Republicans across the country," said Susan MacManus, a University of South Florida political science professor. "If they can't win Florida, they can't win the White House back. It's plain and simple."

The region commonly referred to as "Tampa Bay" includes St. Petersburg, Clearwater and surrounding sprawl, a metro area of more than 3 million people as diverse as the nation itself. Most everybody here came from someplace else, drawn by the weather, pre-recession opportunities and cheap cost of living.

Cuban and Puerto Rican influences are evident, from the many Cuban coffee and sandwich spots to Hispanic neighborhoods and the many businesses serving them in west Tampa.

MacManus said a Tampa convention will give Republicans an opportunity to showcase the diverse faces of the party here, when typically the GOP is not known as the party of diversity.

"Holding the convention in Tampa allows us to begin organizing earlier and stronger than usual in Florida," national Republican Party spokesman Matt Connelly said. "It gives us an opportunity to organize in the key market of Tampa."

What remains to be seen is whether the steamy conditions will deter protesters who have promised a major presence downtown.

Johnsonville recalls turkey sausage with cheese, glove

SHEBOYGAN FALLS, Wis. — Wisconsin-based Johnsonville Sausage is recalling some packages of turkey sausage with cheddar cheese because the product may include pieces of glove.

The company is recalling select 13.5-ounce vacuum packages of Johnsonville "Turkey Sausage with Cheddar Cheese" with a "Best By" date of Aug. 20, 2012, and the establishment number "EST. P-34224."

Nearly 49,000 pounds of product is being recalled. No injuries have been reported.

The sausage was distributed in Alabama, Arizona, California, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Michigan, Mississippi, Nevada, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon, South Carolina, Tennessee, Utah, Washington and Wisconsin.

Police seeking public's help in case of stolen canaries

MIAMI — Miami-Dade police investigators want to know who took more than 500 canaries from an elderly man.

Police on Wednesday asked the public for help identifying the suspects. They say the men entered home of 87-year-old Manuel Sanchez on May 27 and took the birds, valued at \$30 each. The next day, they sold the birds to three pet shops.

Authorities said images of the suspects were captured by video surveillance cameras.

Police were able to recover about 150 birds.

Regulators order Duke, Progress to disclose deals

RALEIGH, N.C. — North Carolina utilities regulators have ordered Duke Energy and Progress Energy to detail some of the deals they cut with major customers before their merger earlier this year.

The companies had argued the information constitutes trade secrets. But the North Carolina Utilities Commission said

Tuesday the deals have no commercial value. The documents had been sought by several media outlets under public requests.

The companies have until Aug. 24 to file or appeal.

Days after approval by North Carolina regulators, Duke Energy and Progress Energy completed their merger in July, sealing a deal that created America's largest electric company. But hours after the deal was concluded, Duke Energy's board ousted the CEO it promised to keep throughout the 18-month process of combining North Carolina's two Fortune 500 energy companies.

Utilities regulators and North Carolina's attorney general have launched investigations that have included extensive demands of internal documents and communications. The commission, which

is considering whether to alter its approval of the merger, has hired a former federal prosecutor to probe whether regulators were misled ahead of the acquisition.

The investigation could take a while. The last time the commission launched a similar probe, it hired outside auditors who took nine months to comb through Duke's books. They found Duke underreported profits by \$124 million over three years. Duke paid \$25 million in a settlement that included no admission of wrongdoing.

whether his next step is to stay in the race or drop out.

"This may turn into a big game of chicken," he said. "I'll talk to my people and make sure we are giving it the best shot we know how."

Smith, R-Inverness, said he believes Dostal will step aside.

The District 34 race has been anything but routine.

Dostal joined the race against Smith last year but decided to drop out when Argenziano entered. He told Democrats at their annual dinner in March he was suspending his campaign to support Argenziano.

When Goocher, an Inverness auto mechanic, filed

paperwork for the ballot, Dostal and Argenziano both believed he was a Republican "shill" who would draw votes from Argenziano in a three-way November race.

Dostal re-entered the race, but said he was doing so only to make sure Goocher didn't make it to the November ballot. Dostal, in a June interview with the Chronicle, said he planned to drop out after winning the primary to support Argenziano.

But fresh from a Democrat primary victory, albeit one that drew just a 23 percent turnout, Dostal said he has enough name recognition to win against Smith.

"All of a sudden I have some momentum I never dreamed would happen," he said.

Goocher, who works at his father's auto repair shop, was virtually invisible during the campaign. Other

who quickly became frustrated when people doubted the sincerity of his campaign.

"We complain young people don't get involved and when someone shows up, we start calling him names," Smith said. "I'm sorry to see these young kids get chased out of politics. If I was him, I wouldn't run for office again."


Argenziano laughed when told of Smith's comments about Goocher.

TAMPA — A state appeals court has ruled that former middle school teacher and sex offender Debra Lafave should not have been released early from probation.

Lafave pleaded guilty in 2005 to having sex with a 14-year-old boy who was a student at the school where she worked. She

served 2 1/2 years of house arrest and was scheduled to remain on sex-offender probation until November 2015.

Last September, Circuit Judge Wayne S. Timmerman ended her probation four years early. Prosecutors appealed that ruling.

On Wednesday, the 2nd District Court of Appeal reversed Timmerman's decision and ordered that Lafave's probation be reinstated.

Lafave's attorney said he will talk with his client about taking the case to the Florida Supreme Court.

Lafave is now a 32-year-old mother of twins.

Officials encourage lionfish harvests

TALLAHASSEE — State wildlife officials are trying to make it easier to catch lionfish in Florida waters.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission announced Monday that no fishing license is required when bagging lionfish using pole spears, handheld nets, Hawaiian slings or other devices specifically designed for bringing in lionfish.

Also, there's no recreational or commercial bag limit for lionfish for the next year.

Conservation commission of-

ficial Jessica McCawley said the state is hoping to reduce the lionfish's impact on native Florida fish and wildlife.

Lionfish have no natural reef predators and compete for food and habitat against domestic species such as grouper and snapper. The fish belong in the Indian and Pacific oceans.

Lionfish have venomous spines but they are edible.

Newly discovered galaxy strangely prolific, say scientists

WASHINGTON — Scientists have found a cosmic supermom. It's a galaxy that gives birth to more stars in a day than ours does in a year.

Astronomers used NASA's Chandra X-Ray telescope to spot this distant gigantic galaxy creating about 740 new stars a year. By comparison, our Milky Way galaxy spawns just about one new star each year.

The galaxy is about 5.7 billion light years away in the center of a recently discovered cluster of galaxies that give off the brightest X-ray glow astronomers have seen. It is by far the biggest creation of stars that astronomers have seen for this kind of galaxy. Other types, such as colliding galaxies, can produce even more stars, astronomers said.

But this is the size, type and age of galaxy that shouldn't be producing stars at such a rapid pace, said the authors of a study published Wednesday in the journal Nature.

"It's very extreme," said Harvard University astronomer Ryan Foley, co-author of the study. "It pushes the boundaries of what we understand."

The unnamed galaxy is about 3 trillion times the size of our sun, said study lead author Michael McDonald of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

There's another strange thing about this galaxy. It's fairly mature, maybe 6 billion years old. Usually, this kind "don't do anything new... what we call red and dead," McDonald said in an interview. "It seems to have come back to life for some reason."

The galaxy that is producing the stars at a rate of two per day is the biggest and most prominent of many galaxies there.

It's "helping us answer this basic question of how do galaxies form their stars," said Michigan State University astronomer Megan Donahue, who wasn't part of the study but praised it.

There's lots of very hot hydrogen gas between galaxies. When that gas cools to below zero, the gas can form stars, McDonald said. But only 10 percent of the gas in the universe becomes stars, Donahue said.

That's because the energy from black holes in the center of galaxies counteract the cooling.

In this case, the black hole in the central galaxy seems to be unusually quiet.

But this massive burst of star birth is probably only temporary because there's only so much fuel and limits to how big a galaxy can get, Foley said.

"It could be just a very short-lived phase that every galaxy cluster has and we just got lucky here" to see it, Foley said.

Ball layoffs to hit Gainesville

Florida plant employs 125

BROOMFIELD, Colo. — Ball Corp. plans to end production at its metal beverage packaging plants in Columbus, Ohio, and Gainesville, Fla., by the end of the year, affecting about 235 employees.

Carlyle Group to buy Getty Images

WASHINGTON — The Carlyle Group, one of the biggest private equity firms in the world, plans to buy a controlling stake in the photo and video distributor Getty Images in a \$3.3 billion deal that gives the Getty family and management a larger share of the company.

The Carlyle Group said Wednesday it will partner with co-founders Mark Getty and Jonathan Klein and the Getty family in buying the company from another private equity firm, Hellman & Friedman.

Klein said Carlyle will have just over 50 percent control, with the remainder mostly held by the Getty family and a smaller stake for management, including himself. Klein said in an interview it was a good time for the Getty family and management to increase their stake, which is about a third now.

The deal is expected to close later this year.

Getty Images Inc., which is based in Seattle, creates and distributes still images, video and multimedia products for customers to use in brochures, websites and other outlets.

The company is adding 100,000 customers every quarter, and existing customers are using more of its services, Klein said. The company is largely past a difficult transition period as its clients made the switch from print-focused products to ones that incorporate websites and mobile devices. It now has about 1.3 million customers per year.

Carlyle Partners V, a \$13.7 billion U.S. buyout fund, will provide equity financing. Debt financing is coming from J.P. Morgan, Barclays, Credit Suisse, Goldman Sachs and RBC Capital Markets, although the amount of debt was not disclosed.





Data: Recovery worst since World War II

WASHINGTON — The recession that ended three years ago this summer has been followed by the feeblest economic recovery since the Great Depression.

Since World War II, 10 U.S. recessions have been followed by a recovery that lasted at least three years. An Associated Press analysis shows that by just about any measure, the one that began in June 2009 is the weakest.

The ugliness goes well beyond unemployment, which at 8.3 percent is the highest this long after a recession ended.

Economic growth has never been weaker in a postwar recovery. Consumer spending has never been so slack. Only once has job growth been slower.

More than in any other post-World War II recovery, people who have jobs are hurting. Their paychecks have fallen behind inflation.

Many economists say the agonizing recovery from the Great Recession, which began in December 2007 and ended in June 2009, is the predictable consequence of a housing bust and a grave financial crisis.

Credit, the fuel that powers economies, evaporated after Lehman Brothers collapsed in September 2008. And a 30 percent drop in housing prices erased trillions in home equity and brought construction to a near-standstill.


So any recovery was destined to be a slog.

"A housing collapse is very different from a stock market bubble and crash," says Nobel Prize-winning economist Peter Diamond


Worst recovery since the Great Depression

The economy has only slowly come back from the deep recession that ended in June 2009. The Associated Press compared the current economic recovery with eight earlier post-World War II recoveries that lasted at least three years. By nearly every measure, this is the weakest.


GDP GROWTH THREE YEARS INTO RECOVERY

of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. "It affects so many people. It only corrects very slowly."

The U.S. economy has other problems, too. Europe's troubles have undermined consumer and business confidence on both sides of the Atlantic. And the deeply divided U.S. political system has delivered growth-chilling uncertainty.

The AP compared nine economic recoveries since the end of World War II that lasted at least three years. A 10th recovery that ran from 1945 to 1948 was not included because the statistics from that period aren't comprehensive, although the available data show that hiring was robust. There were two short-lived recoveries — 24 months and 12 months — after the recessions of 1957-58 and 1980.

Here is a closer look at how the comeback from the Great Recession stacks up with the others:

America's gross domestic product — the broadest measure of economic output — grew 6.8 percent from the April-June quarter of

2009 through the same quarter this year, the slowest in the first three years of a postwar recovery. GDP grew an average of 15.5 percent in the first three years of the eight other comebacks analyzed.

The engines that usually drive recoveries aren't firing this time.

Investment in housing, which grew an average of nearly 34 percent this far into previous postwar recoveries, is up just 8 percent since the April-June quarter of 2009.

Government spending and investment at the federal, state and local levels was 4.5 percent lower in the second quarter than three years earlier.

Three years into previous postwar recoveries, government spending had risen an average 12.5 percent. In the first three years after the 1981-82 recession, during President Ronald Reagan's first term, the economy got a jolt from a 15 percent increase in government spending and investment.

This time, state and local governments have been slashing spending — and jobs. And since passing

President Barack Obama's \$862 billion stimulus package in 2009, a divided Congress has been reluctant to try to help the economy with federal spending programs.

Trying to contain the \$11.1 trillion federal debt has

\$6.7 trillion early this year.

Others are spending less because they're paying down debt or saving more. Household debt peaked at 126 percent of after-tax income in mid-2007 and has fallen to 107 percent, according to Haver Analytics. The savings rate has risen from 1.1 percent of after-tax income in 2005 to 4.4 percent in June. Consumers have cut credit card debt by 14 percent — to \$865 billion — since it peaked at over \$1 trillion in December 2007.

"We were in a period in which we borrowed too much," says Carl Weinberg, chief economist at High Frequency Economics. "We are now deleveraging. That's a process that slows us down."

The economy shed a staggering 8.8 million jobs during and shortly after the recession. Since employment hit bottom, the economy has created just over 4 million jobs. So the new hiring has replaced 46 percent of the lost jobs, by far the worst performance since World War II. In the previous eight recoveries, the economy had regained more than 350 percent of the jobs lost, on average.

It's no mystery why consumers are being frugal. Many have lost access to credit, which fueled their spending in the 2000s.

Home equity has evaporated and credit cards have been canceled. Falling home prices have slashed home equity 49 percent, from \$13.2 trillion in 2005 to

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

Suncoast survey a good step

There are three key north-south corridors in Citrus County: U.S. 19, U.S. 41 and County Road 491.

Florida's Turnpike Enterprise wants to know if motorists would be willing to shell out tolls to travel on a fourth corridor — the Suncoast Parkway 2.

In a fairly elaborate survey, thousands of county residents have recently been queried about their north-south travels. License

plates of about 10,000 vehicles traveling on the existing corridors were photographed, with the vehicle owners subsequently asked to participate in the survey. Surveys have also been issued to SunPass holders, area business owners and willing participants at local libraries and elsewhere.

Central to the online survey is how much, if anything, motorists would be willing to pay to travel via the Suncoast vs. the existing roads. With the assessment of the survey info, turnpike officials will better be able to ascertain if the toll road could generate enough revenue to be financially viable.

State law requires that toll roads generate enough revenue to cover 50 percent of the bond debt for 12 or more years; then, 100 percent by the 30th year.

Plans to extend the Suncoast 27 miles through Citrus County were shelved in 2008 when the economy began to wane. Interest in the project has reemerged and the estimated

cost from 2008 to present has dipped about \$250 million from the previous \$850 million price tag.

The survey, which concludes Friday, will be a helpful component in gaining practical insight into the desirability of Suncoast 2 — which would extend from the existing terminus at U.S. 98 near the Hernando-Citrus County line to U.S. 19 a few miles north of Crystal River.

The project has received wide support from elected officials, economic development and business concerns. It has drawn scrutiny from some environmental interests.

While debate is healthy, we struggle with the perspective that U.S. 19, in particular, can handle future demand. From an environmental standpoint, petroleum-laden runoff from 19 is largely unmanaged and ends up in our coastal waters. From a growth management standpoint, we look at New Port Richey to our south and cringe at the notion that that could become our future. From an emergency management standpoint, the Suncoast can serve as an evacuation route for the region.

Regardless, those issues are secondary to the main scope of the survey. We're glad the survey is an indication that parkway officials have put consideration of Suncoast 2 back on the front burner and understand that financial viability is essential for a project of such great magnitude.

When, in his speech accepting the 1964 Republican presidential nomination, Barry Goldwater said "extremism in the defense of liberty is no vice" and "moderation in the pursuit of justice is no virtue," a media wit at the convention supposedly exclaimed, "Good God, Goldwater is going to run as Goldwater." When Mitt Romney decided to run with Paul Ryan, many conservatives may have thought, "Thank God, Romney is not going to run as Romney."

Not, that is, as the Romney who 12 months ago, warily eyeing Iowa, refused to say a discouraging word about the ethanol debacle. Rather, he is going to run as the Romney who, less than two weeks before announcing Ryan, told the states — Iowa prominent among them — that he opposes extending the wind energy production tax credit, which expires soon.

This may seem a minor matter, as well as an obvious and easy decision for a conservative. The wind tax credit is, after all, industrial policy, the government picking winners and losers in defiance of market signals — industrial policy always is a refusal to heed the market's rejection of that which the government singles out for favoritism. But ethanol subsidies also are industrial policy. And just a few days after Romney got the wind subsidy right, more than half of the 11 Republican senators on the Finance Committee got it wrong, voting to extend it. So even before choosing Ryan, Romney was siding with what might, with a nod to Howard Dean, be called the Republican wing of the Republican Party. For Romney, conservatism

is a second language, but he speaks it with increasing frequency and fluency.

Romney embraced Ryan after the sociopathic — indifferent to the truth — ad for Barack Obama that is meretricious about every important particular of the death from cancer of the wife of steelworker Joe

Optic. Obama's desperate flailing about to justify four more years has sunk into such unhinged smarminess that Romney may have concluded: There is nothing Obama won't say about me, because he has nothing to say for himself, so I will choose a running mate whose seriousness about large problems and ideas underscores what the president has become — silly and small.

He on whose behalf the Optic ad was made used to dispense bromides deplored "the smallness of our politics" and "our preference for scoring cheap political points." Obama's campaign of avoidance — say anything to avoid the subject of the country's condition — must now reckon with Ryan's mastery of Obama's enormous addition to decades of governmental malpractice.

Obama is, by now, nothing if not predictable, so prepare for pieties deplored Ryan's brand of "extremism" that has supplanted responsible conservatism. Goldwater, quoted above, infuriated the sort of people who, regardless of what flavor of conservatism is in fashion, invariably purse their lips and sorrowfully say: "We think conservatism is a valuable thread in our national fabric, etc., but not this kind of conservatism." Goldwater's despisers did not recognize his echo of

words by Martin Luther King Jr. 15 months earlier.


In his "Letter from Birmingham Jail," King wrote, "You speak of our activity in Birmingham as extreme. ... But though I was initially disappointed at being categorized as an extremist, as I continued to think about the matter I gradually gained a measure of satisfaction from the label. Was not Jesus an extremist for love. ... Was not Amos an extremist for justice. ... Was not Paul an extremist for the Christian gospel. ... Perhaps the South, the nation and the world are in dire need of creative extremists."

Remember this episode when you hear, ad nauseam, that Ryan is directly, and Romney now is derivatively, an extremist for believing (a) that "ending Medicare as we know it" will be done by arithmetic if it is not done by creative reforms of the sort Ryan proposes, and (b) that the entitlement state's crisis cannot be cured, as Obama suggests, by adding 4.6 points to the tax rate paid by less than 3 percent of Americans.

When Ryan said in Norfolk, "We won't replace our Founding principles, we will reapply them," he effectively challenged Obama to say what Obama believes, which is: Madison was an extremist in enunciating the principles of limited government — the enumeration and separation of powers. And Jefferson was an extremist in asserting that government exists not to grant rights but to "secure" natural rights that pre-exist government.

Romney's selection of a running mate was, in method and outcome, presidential. It underscores how little in the last four years merits that adjective.

out. And for people to tell this board: You pass this piece of paper and these volunteers are going to come out of the woodwork — that doesn't float with me. If you sincerely cared about the animals you'd come forward now."

Volunteers should show they care by helping the shelter, raising funds to build a new shelter and getting foster homes for animals, Kenney said.

"Don't wait for a stinking piece of paper," he said. "If you care about the animals, come forward."

Yuelling also said he was upset about a particular dog being euthanized as a decision by County Administrator Brad Thorpe and County Attorney Richard Wesch.

Yuelling said the dog was accused of killing a small dog in its neighborhood and taking the body to its owner, who surrendered the dog to the county. Temperament testing at the county shelter did not determine aggressive behavior, so Dr. Julie Rosenberger, shelter veterinarian and director, asked Cathy Pearson, assistant county administrator, whether to euthanize the animal or offer it for adoption. Pearson sought advice from Thorpe and Wesch.

"I offered to pay the \$30 adoption fee so she would be a free adoption," Yuelling said about the dog.

Instead, according to Yuelling, the dog was euthanized within two days of Thorpe being notified.

"It was a rush to judgment done prior to letting Debi Day from No-Kill Nation and myself know of this decision, as we were both trying to save her," Yuelling said. "I do not believe the county attorney, the assistant county attorney, the county administrator and the assistant county administrator should have involved themselves in this. This should have been the director of the shelter's decision. The county's personnel should not have been

involved unless there was a lawsuit, and there was none."

Thorpe responded that he is responsible to supervise all county staff under his control. He said it was not his responsibility to notify citizen volunteers about staff decisions.

"I think what's happened is over a period of time. Mr. Yuelling thinks that in the chain of command I have to get permission from him and his volunteers to make these decisions,"

Thorpe said. Thorpe said the decision was not a rush to judgment. He took time to discuss information, including statements from other residents in the area where the incident happened, with his staff.

"I realize the importance of the volunteers in trying to save the animals, but I also have a responsibility to the public in general," Thorpe said. "If this dog had been adopted or released and an incident like this occurred


in the future for some other animal, or some other person, the county would have been liable for any judgments I had made, not Mr. Yuelling and his group."

Yuelling said no litigation had been threatened, to which Wesch replied that it was his responsibility not only to defend litigation but, where appropriate, to prevent it.

In addition to the liability was the factor of morality.

"I like to sleep at night with a clean conscience," Wesch said. "The last thing I would want to have is the knowledge that based on a decision that I was involved in, this dog attacked and maimed another animal or, heaven forbid, a human being."

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

Man shoots guard at D.C. lobby


WASHINGTON — A man suspected of shooting and wounding a security guard at the headquarters of a Christian lobbying group on Wednesday made a negative reference about the organization's work before opening fire, a law enforcement official said.

Police said the man entered the front lobby of the Family Research Council in Washington around 10:45 a.m. Wednesday, began arguing with a security guard and then shot him in the arm. The gunman was subdued by the guard and others and taken into custody.

Another law enforcement official identified the suspect as Floyd Corkins II, and authorities were interviewing Corkins' neighbors in Herndon, Va., near Washington.

Syrian warplanes bomb rebel town

AZAZ, Syria — Syrian fighter jets screamed through the sky Wednesday over this rebel-held town, dropping bombs that leveled the better part of a poor neighborhood and wounded scores of people, many of them women and children buried under piles of rubble. Activists said more than 20 people were killed.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said 23 people died in the double airstrike and more than 200 were wounded. Mohammed Nour, a local activist reached by phone, put the death toll at 25. Neither figure could be independently confirmed.

Attacks kill 13 north of Baghdad

BAGHDAD — Three bomb blasts shortly before sunset Wednesday killed 10 people north of Baghdad in the latest spasm of violence to grip Iraq.

The blasts underscored the volatility of the country eight months after the last U.S. troops pulled out. Insurgents, led by the local branch of al-Qaida, are trying to re-establish themselves in their old strongholds and undermine the government.

Police said two civilians and one police officer were killed, and five people were wounded.

New immigration program launches

Controversial initiative applies to younger illegal immigrants

WASHINGTON — Young illegal immigrants are scrambling to get passports and other records in order as the Homeland Security Department starts accepting applications to allow them to avoid deportation and get work permits.

Homeland Security announced the details Tuesday of what documents illegal immigrants would need to prove that they are eligible for the Obama administration's Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals. The announcement came a day before U.S. Citizenship and Im-

migration Services was set to begin letting people apply for the program.

Hundreds of thousands of illegal immigrants potentially could benefit from the program, which President Barack Obama announced in June. The program is beginning just months before what promises to be a tight contest for the White House in which the Hispanic vote may play an important role.

Obama has come under fire from Hispanic voters and others who say he hasn't fulfilled a previous campaign promise to overhaul the nation's immigration laws. The policy

change could stop deportations for more than 1 million young illegal immigrants who would have qualified for the failed DREAM Act, formally the Development, Relief and Education of Alien Minors Act, which Obama has supported in the past.

Republican lawmakers have accused Obama of circumventing Congress with the new program in an effort to boost his political standing and of favoring illegal immigrants over unemployed U.S. citizens.

Some, including House Judiciary Committee Chairman Lamar Smith, R-Texas, have called the policy backdoor amnesty and said they worry about fraud.

"While potentially millions of illegal immigrants will be permitted to compete with American workers

for scarce jobs, there seems to be little if any mechanism in place for vetting fraudulent applications and documentation submitted by illegal immigrants," Smith said Tuesday.

At the Honduran Consulate on Tuesday, a line of people wrapped around the building before it was open for business, and the office was crowded for much of the day.

Evelyn Medina, 23, got in line at about 6:30 a.m., and she wasn't alone. With her passport in hand, Medina was all smiles as she walked out of the building just before 2 p.m., saying "Finally" as she clutched the document.

Medina, a Maryland college student studying social work, said she expected to be ready to apply Wednesday. If she is allowed to stay in the U.S. and work, she hopes eventually to earn a master's degree.

EPA to OK cleaner ethanol

BISMARCK, N.D. — The federal government is on the verge of approving a grain mainly used as livestock feed to make a cleaner version of ethanol, a decision officials say could give farmers a new moneymaking opportunity, boost the biofuels industry and help the environment.

A plant in western Kansas already is gearing up to take advantage, launching a multimillion-dollar renovation so it can be the first to turn sorghum — a plant similar in appearance to corn — into advanced ethanol. Advanced biofuels result in even less lifetime greenhouse gas production than conventional biofuels, measuring from the time a crop is planted to when the fuel is burned in a vehicle.

The only advanced biofuels in the United States now are sugar cane-based ethanol imported from Brazil and domestic biodiesel, a mixture of petroleum diesel and renewable sources such as soybean oil, said Matt Hartwig, spokesman for the Renewable Fuels Association.

Advanced ethanol made from sorghum would give the nation another option as it aims to meet the federal goal of producing 36 billion gallons of renewable fuels per year by 2022.

"We need to continue to expand the base of feedstocks from which we produce biofuel," Hartwig said. "It's a good first step."

Almost all the ethanol produced in the U.S. now is

conventional ethanol made from corn starch. Critics of the ethanol industry complain too much corn is going to energy production, resulting in higher food prices for consumers. Corn affects food prices in multiple ways because it's a widely used ingredient in food manufacturing and it's used to feed livestock.

More grain sorghum going to fuel production is unlikely to spark the same complaints, because it is not the main ingredient in a number of foods. While

it can be used in human food, it's sold mainly to

feed poultry, cattle and other livestock. Sweet sorghum produces edible syrup.

Sorghum also has environmental advantages. It is more tolerant of drought than other crops, including corn, and it produces about the same amount of ethanol per bushel as corn while requiring one-third less water.

It's less often used than corn in conventional ethanol because corn is much more plentiful, Hartwig said — U.S. corn acres this year outnumber sorghum acres about 16 to

one. Also, most ethanol plants are in the Corn Belt focused around Iowa and Illinois, while sorghum is grown primarily in the central and southern Great Plains. Along with Kansas, the top producers are Colorado, Nebraska, Oklahoma, South Dakota and Texas.

The Environmental Protection Agency has concluded that ethanol made from grain sorghum can qualify as an advanced biofuel if it's made at plants with the proper green technology. The agency has taken public comments

and will issue a final determination later. No time frame has been set.

Its approval would make sorghum-based ethanol more attractive because advanced ethanol commands a higher price than conventional, said Chris Cogburn, strategic business director for the National Sorghum Producers.

The question, Hartwig said, is whether ethanol producers are willing to install the equipment needed to produce advanced ethanol from sorghum.

Suspect walks because of 'too much evidence'

IOWA CITY, Iowa — A fugitive doctor charged in the nation's largest prosecution of Internet pharmacies is getting off in part because there's just too much evidence in his case: more than 400,000 documents and two terabytes of electronic data that federal authorities say is expensive to maintain.

Armando Angulo was indicted in 2007 in a multimillion dollar scheme that involved selling prescription drugs to patients who were never examined or even interviewed by a physician. A federal judge in Iowa dismissed the charge last week at the request of prosecutors, who want to throw out the many records collected over their nine-year investigation to free up more space.

The Miami doctor fled to his native Panama after coming under investigation in 2004, and Panamanian authorities said they do not extradite their own citizens. Given the unlikelihood of capturing Angulo and the inconvenience of maintaining so much evidence, prosecutors gave up the long pursuit.

"Continued storage of these materials is difficult and expensive," wrote Stephanie Rose, the U.S. attorney for northern Iowa. She called the task "an economic and practical hardship" for the Drug Enforcement

Administration.

The case started in 2003 with a raid of a small Iowa drugstore and eventually secured the conviction of 26 defendants, including 19 doctors. The investigation dismantled two Internet pharmacies that illegally sold 30 million pills to customers. Investigators also recovered \$7 million, most of which went to Iowa police agencies that helped with the case.

When a major drug suspect flees the country, federal authorities often leave the charges pending in case the fugitive tries to sneak back into the U.S. or a country with a friendly extradition process. But in Angulo's case, the volume of evidence posed a bigger burden.

The evidence took up 5 percent of the DEA's worldwide electronic storage. Agents had also kept several hundred boxes of paper containing 440,000 documents, plus dozens of computers, servers and other bulky items.

Two terabytes is enough to store the text of 2 million novels, or roughly 625,000 copies of "War and Peace."

Two-terabyte memory drives are widely available for \$100, but the DEA's data server must be relatively small and may need replacement, a costly and risky proposition for an agency that must maintain the integrity of documents, said University of Iowa computer scientist Douglas Jones.

Group: Ruling benefits gay parents

Pastor helped woman flee with child of former lesbian partner

MONTPELIER, Vt. — The conviction of a Virginia pastor on charges he helped a woman flee the country rather than share custody of her child with her former lesbian partner did little to answer just where the girl and her mother are.

But one legal expert said Tuesday's conviction did succeed in reinforcing the legal rights of same-sex parents.

Gregory Nevins, an attorney with Lambda Legal, a national group that promotes the civil rights of lesbians, gay men, bisexuals and transgender people, said an acquittal might have sent the message that if "all of a sudden you want to cut off your partner and the other parent completely, go to Alabama,

go to some place that the courts will be hospitable to a claim like that."

Kenneth Miller was convicted of orchestrating the flight of Lisa Miller and her daughter, working with others to find them a new home in Central America. At the time of her 2009 disappearance, Lisa Miller was bound by a Vermont family court order that she give her former partner, Janet Jenkins, visitation with their daughter, Isabella Miller-Jenkins.

As the guilty verdict was being read against Kenneth Miller, of Stuarts Draft, Va., in U.S. District Court in Burlington, Jenkins' attorney filed a civil lawsuit against both Millers and a number of other groups and individuals alleged to have been involved in her flight.



Giants outfielder Cabrera suspended

Positive test for testosterone ends MVP-caliber regular season

SAN FRANCISCO — Melky Cabrera was suspended 50 games Wednesday following a positive test for testosterone, putting an abrupt end to what had been an MVP-caliber regular season and throwing the San Francisco Giants' playoff hopes into doubt.

Cabrera leads the National League with 159 hits, and is second in batting average behind Pittsburgh's

Andrew McCutchen. Cabrera's penalty was the first for a high-profile player since last year's NL MVP, Ryan Braun, had his suspension overturned by an arbitrator last winter.

"My positive test was the result of my use of a substance I should not have used," Cabrera said in a statement released by the union. "I accept my suspension under the Joint Drug Program and I will try to move on with my life. I

am deeply sorry for my mistake and I apologize to my teammates, to the San Francisco Giants organization and to the fans for letting them down."

The suspension would extend into the playoffs if the Giants advance.


Cabrera is batting .346 with 11 home runs and 60 RBIs in his first season with San Francisco and is five hits shy of 1,000 in his big league career. Flashing bright orange spikes, he

singled and hit a two-run homer last month in the National League's 8-0 win in the All-Star game, earning MVP honors for the game and securing home-field advantage for the World Series.

Hernandez tosses perfect game in Mariners' 1-0 win over Tampa Bay Rays

SEATTLE — King Felix now has a crowning achievement.

Felix Hernandez pitched the Seattle Mariners' first perfect game and the 23rd in baseball history, overpowering the Tampa Bay Rays in a brilliant 10-victory Wednesday.

The 2010 AL Cy Young Award winner has long talked of his desire to achieve pitching perfection. He finally accomplished it against the Rays, striking out the side twice and finishing with 12 strikeouts.

It was the third perfect game in baseball this season — a first — joining gems by Chicago's

Philip Humber against the Mariners in April and San Francisco's Matt Cain versus Houston in June. More than half of all perfectos — 12 — have come in the last 25 seasons.

This also was the sixth no-hitter in the majors this season, three of them at Safeco Field. Humber threw his gem in Seattle, then six Mariners pitchers combined to hold the Los Angeles Dodgers hitless at the park on June 8.

For the Rays, it was an all-too-familiar feeling. This was the third time in four seasons they had a perfect game pitched against them, following efforts by Dallas Braden in 2010 and

Mark Buehrle in 2009.

"I don't have any words to explain this," Hernandez said to the crowd, speaking on the field after the final out. "I've been working so hard to throw one and today is for you guys."

Desmond Jennings pinch hit for Jose Lobaton to open the ninth. Hernandez got ahead 1-2 before Jennings fouled off two straight and Hernandez fanned him on a 92 mph fastball down in the zone. Jeff Keppinger batted for Elliot Johnson and grounded out to shortstop on a 1-2 pitch.

With one out to go, Sean Rodriguez got ahead 2-0 in the count. After circling the mound,

Hernandez came back with two straight breaking balls for strikes and ended perfection with a called third strike on his 113th pitch.

"I went 2-0 and I just took a little walk, took a break and he called a slider. I had been following him the whole game, so I threw a slider and he swing," Hernandez said. "It was a good thing I followed this guy."

Hernandez (11-5) threw his arms up to the sky and was mobbed by teammates at the pitcher's mound. He embraced catcher John Jaso for a few seconds and then shared hugs with

Knee injury ends Nadal's US Open bid

NEW YORK — Rafael Nadal's Grand Slam count will stay stuck at 11 for now, sidetracked by another knee problem.

The third-ranked Spaniard withdrew from the U.S. Open on Wednesday. Tendinitis has kept him out of action since his stunning loss at Wimbledon in late June.

The injury already forced him out of the London Olympics, where he was supposed to defend his title and carry Spain's flag in the opening ceremony.

"I am very sad to announce that I am not ready to play the US Open in NY. Thanks to my fans for their support and specially, the new workers," Nadal wrote on his Twitter account.

Nadal is still only 26, but the

withdrawals raise questions about the future of a player who has had recurring knee problems in the past.

Jackson looks to end Bucs' sub-par trends at WR



TAMPA, Fla. — Vincent Jackson's challenge with the Buccaneers seems formidable.

After signing a five-year deal worth more than \$55 million, the 29-year-old Jackson comes in as Tampa Bay's No. 1 receiver — a role that has not been played with much success.

The Bucs (No. 26 in the AP Pro32) have brought in many veteran receivers to be their top guy — Alvin Harper, Keyshawn Johnson, Joey Galloway and Antonio Bryant among them — and only Galloway had more than one good season.

None of those receivers caught as many as 300 passes for the Bucs, while every other NFL franchise except Chicago and Baltimore has at least one receiver with 500 catches or more.

It would take only 65 catches a year for Jackson to overtake Mark Carrier, the Bucs' all-time leading wide receiver, in five years — not that Jackson seems all that interested.



Fishing lost and found

A few years ago I lost a friend — a good one. He was the kind of friend you don't easily replace.

He didn't move far away or pass away like you might think.

Sadly, we just got lost from one another. While it shouldn't, it happens sometimes in life.

Friends can be a funny thing and, if you're anything like me, you have different types of them.

You have the kind of friends that you work with. You have the kind of friends who call you when they need a freezer or couch moved or the kind you see at a restaurant or

He's a go big or go home type of friend — a hardcore, no excuses kind of guy.

Like in all relationships my experience is this type of friendship isn't always pretty.

This type of friend will see the best and worst in you — but he doesn't pass judgment.

He's the guy who should tell you you're being a jerk but he doesn't.

He just understands and knows when to give you your space. When necessary, they'll defend you, even when they may know you're wrong. You have their back and they have yours. They're your bro.

I don't have many of those types of friends in my life. In fact, I can count on one hand how many of those friends I've had in my life.

It's overly simplistic to say, but those types of friends are hard to come by.

Steve and I literally spent hundreds and hundreds of hours fishing in our bass boats together.

We were close, really close.

Steve and I competed across the state catching bass, winning our share of tournaments and having fun on the water.

A few years had past since our relationship had gone awry and epic events had occurred in both our lives. Children and grandchildren born, new homes and career changes had occurred so there was lots of catching up. It felt great to do so.

It had been nearly four years since I'd shared a boat with Steve but I knew the time would come again when we would wet a line. I

knew that was inevitable.

We started planning a low-stress fishing trip out on the Gulf and I looked forward to the day with great anticipation.

That day came a couple of weekends ago.

One of the things Steve impressed upon me over the many years that we fished together is that at the end of the day our memories are what we carry away what we do in the great outdoors.

"It's all about the memories," he used to say.

So when he told me about some large black drum he and his son Jeremiah had been catching he wanted to experience this fishery in our backyard. He wanted me to make a great memory.

When we hit the water shortly after day break, it felt as if there had been no void in our friendship. It seemed as if the prior weekend was the last time we'd shared a boat. That felt good and it was somewhat of a relief.

The fish we caught were big and strong, which was great. I got to experience a new type of fishing

that I had not tried, so learning something new was terrific, too.

But the greatest part of the day was just sitting in the boat with my buddy again —laughing, reliving memories, both good and bad. We talked of big bass caught and lost, tournaments won and lost and crazy happenings from our travels that will forever be etched into our minds' eye. I knew my bro was back.

Our fishing partnership as it relates to tournament fishing, probably won't ever be what it once was but that's okay — although I'm still holding out some hope for that.

Recreational saltwater regulations are available

There's confusion concerning the availability of recreational saltwater regulations brochures, mostly stemming from a problem at the Citrus County Tax Collector's office. Simply put, the brochures are available at the Inverness office, but not at the West Citrus Government Center on Meadowcrest.

The new regulations have not been available at the annex since they took effect on July 1.

The matter escalated from minor inconvenience to major problem when some who asked for the brochure were told it would not be available, as FWC had discontinued printing it. If you wanted a copy of the regulations, you'd have to get it online. (This is not hearsay; Theresa was told this on her second visit, I heard it on two of my trips.) Let's clear that up right now; it isn't true. In response to my query, FWC had this to say: "...they were

all vendors of recreational saltwater licenses. (The) regulations are also (emphasis mine) available in printable format on our Website."

None of the five trips Theresa and I made (she twice, me thrice) were "wasted," in the sense that we did not go to town specifically to get the brochures.

Rather, we stopped in while in that area on other business. I did get tired of the side trips, however, and went to the closest bait and tackle shop to our home, Barnacle Bill's on the west side of U.S. 19 across from the mall, where I

picked up two copies. (I keep one in the chart case on the boat, and I like to have another in my study in case I get a call from a reader about a regulation.) For now, don't waste time going to the West Annex for a brochure. Barnacle Bill's is less crowded, and, besides, the tax office doesn't sell live bait, he does.

I met with Brenda Levack, a Branch Manager with the Tax Collector's office, and here's what we think

happened. I speculated (key word, none of this is certain as of this writing) that, since the Inverness office did have the brochures, perhaps the FWC sent all the brochures to the main tax office, and the annex's portion never left Inverness.

Levack said, yes, that's possibly what happened. If they get some brochures in the West Citrus office and tell me, I'll pass it along.

Scallops remain the number one target off the Nature Coast. You'd think we'd have run out of them by now, but the supply seems endless. As usual, the farther into the season we get, the larger the scallops are, and I've heard from a number of folks who've been around for a while that they don't ever remember seeing scallops this big. Captain "Red" Ed Brennan said at one spot he and his clients worked at low tide, it was simply a matter of wading in waist-deep water and bending over to pick them up. I don't normally pass along vague information like that, with no location, but I want to make the point that they can be harvested in surprisingly shallow water, so don't ignore those areas.

Captain William Toney

said the nearshore rock piles in eight to 14 feet of water are giving up quite a variety, including grunts, mangrove snappers, sea bass, seatrout and Spanish mackerel. Also try working

a three-inch shrimp tail on an eighth-ounce jig right along the sandy bottom around the rocks. Flounders, ambush predators,

will lie buried in the sand, waiting for a jig and tail to

come within reach; bounce the jig slowly.



Even in preseason, a seeming mismatch

Packers take on Browns tonight

Even in the preseason, this one looks like a mismatch.


The Packers, considered by many the most elite of teams heading toward the regular season, host the Browns on Thursday night. While Green Bay does have some defensive issues from last year to solve and is thin at running back right now, Cleveland is seeking answers everywhere.

That search continues as the second week of the exhibition schedule kicks off at Lambeau Field and in Atlanta, where the Bengals visit the Falcons.

The Browns (No. 30 in the AP Pro32) come off a 19-17 loss to Detroit in which first-round pick Brandon Weeden struggled. He fumbled, threw an interception and was 3 for 9 for 62 yards in his debut. But he says it didn't affect his confidence.

Green Bay (No. 1), coming off a 15-1 season, addressed a perceived need this week by signing veteran running back Cedric Benson. The Packers, 21-13 losers to San Diego last weekend, already were without James Starks because of a turf toe injury, and second-year back Alex Green is returning from major knee injury. On Monday, they lost John Kuhn to an ankle sprain.

Benson rushed for more than 1,000 yards in three of the last four

seasons in Cincinnati, which did not re-sign him.

Penske crew chief force in the garage

WATKINS GLEN, N.Y. — When Paul Wolfe decided to give NASCAR a try, he made sure he had a backup plan.

"I became a certified welder," Wolfe said. "I never really thought driving would ever provide me a chance. The opportunity to work on cars was more realistic. I wasn't really thinking about driving when I got into it."

It's good to be a realist.

Since moving from baseball country in upstate New York — Wolfe grew up in Milford, a stone's throw from Cooperstown — to North Carolina in 1996 to give stock car racing a try, Wolfe has put in long hours working for Joe Gibbs, Tommy Baldwin, and Ray Evernham, among others, gaining valuable hands-on experience.

Now, he's crew chief of the No. 2 Dodge driven by Brad Keselowski for Penske Racing in the Sprint Cup series, and a force in the NASCAR garage.

"I tried to learn from everybody," said Wolfe, who did drive in the Camping World East and Nationwide Series from 2000-05, notching eight top-fives but no wins before concentrating on becoming a crew chief. "You can never stop learning in this sport. It's always changing."

After also working for Fitz Racing and CJM Racing, Wolfe signed in November 2009 with Penske, which was starting a new Nationwide team for Keselowski.

"Paul was taking less and

doing a lot more with it at other race teams before he got the opportunity to go to a team like Penske Racing, where they've got good equipment," said Steve Addington, crew chief for reigning Cup champion Tony Stewart and a close friend of Wolfe. "I think he was showing everybody that he kind of knew what he was doing. He's got a good, core group that's been with him through the steps. He's keeping that group together, and that's the smart thing to do. You know they've got your back. That's the cool part of having team chemistry from the bottom to the top."

That chemistry has been magical.

During the 2010 Nationwide season, Keselowski scored six wins, five poles and a series-record 26 top-five finishes on the way to a 445-point victory in the final point standings behind the wheel of Wolfe-prepared cars, giving Roger Penske his first NASCAR championship.

"Paul's very confident in what he does with a race car, and Brad believes in everything he does," Addington said. "That's a pair to watch in this sport for a long time."

Wolfe moved up to the Sprint Cup series last year and Keselowski, despite a broken foot suffered in testing at midseason, posted three victories to qualify for the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship, NASCAR's version of a postseason.

"We had success right away," said Wolfe, now 35, whose dad raced modifieds and put him in a go-kart at age 11. "From there we continued to build our relationship and understand each other more and more. We're still learning. Brad pushes me to be better."

There had been reports Tuesday that the nation's top quarterback recruit in 2011 broke his left, non-throwing shoulder and would be out indefinitely. Muschamp said Wednesday that is not the case.

"I don't know how some of these things get caught like wildfire travel," the coach said.

Muschamp said Driskel

injured his shoulder during practice Sunday, the first day QBs did not wear red, non-contact jerseys. Driskel iced it Sunday night and Monday, and then participated in a walk-through and meetings before going to the team's athletic trainer. Driskel told the trainer his shoulder was still sore and that he thought he should get it checked.

Tests revealed a bruised scapula, Muschamp said.

Driskel is still able to practice and throw, but is being held out of contact drills.

Jaguars running back Murphy has truck, championship rings stolen

JACKSONVILLE — Jacksonville Jaguars running back Richard Murphy is getting to know a few of his teammates really well this week.

Murphy is bumming rides to training camp after his truck and — more importantly — four championship rings from his college days at LSU were stolen from outside his apartment over the weekend.

His 2010 Dodge was stolen between Saturday night and Sunday morning. The truck was found several miles away. Among the items missing were 30-inch rims and tires valued at \$15,000, his 2007 national title ring, his 2007 Southeastern Conference championship ring and his 2006 Sugar Bowl ring.

The fourth was a title ring issued by the school.

"Something you can't replace," Murphy said Wednesday. "It's really frustrating. But it can't really frustrate me now. It's training camp. I've got to make the roster. I've got stuff to pay for."

Murphy had no idea his truck had been stolen when he awoke Sunday. He walked outside, thinking he had parked near his front door, but couldn't see his truck. He hit the alarm button, figuring he may have forgotten where he left it,

but got no response.

When he walked to the spot he remembered parking in, the only thing there was broken glass.

Police found the vehicle a short time later, stripped of just about everything valuable.

Still inside the truck was a 12-gauge pump shotgun with a pistol grip that was in a secure compartment. Murphy thought the rings were secure, too.

"They were locked up," he said. "Under the glove compartment is another drawer that you can't see."

Apparently someone found it.

"The rims, I can get them back," Murphy said. "But the rings are something I worked for, something I take pride in at LSU. It's a real hard feeling for me."

Murphy played in 40 games at LSU. He ran for 527 yards and two touchdowns in four seasons. Nonetheless, the Jaguars saw enough to sign him as an undrafted rookie in 2011. He spent all of last season on injured reserve.

He's trying to land a roster spot this year. It's no easy task considering he's behind Rashad Jennings, Montell Owens and Jalen Parmele on the depth chart.

He's hoping for a big night when he returns to his home state for Friday's preseason game at New Orleans.

New game title will allow matchup of '92, '12 Olympic teams

CHICAGO — Michael and Magic versus Kobe and LeBron?

Sounds like a dream matchup, and it could be coming to a video game console near you.

With USA Basketball and 2K Sports forming a partnership, fans can see what happens when the amazing 1992 Dream Team goes up against this year's Olympic gold medal winner once NBA 2K13 hits the shelves this fall.

Never mind that it's not quite the real thing, more fuel is about to be added to the debate. Not that there really is a debate in Michael Jordan's mind.

"We'll never know, but let's talk about it," Jordan said on a conference call. "I know Kobe (Bryant) said some things early on and I responded to those. The '92 Dream Team, I felt, was a more well-rounded basketball team."

It's hard to argue, considering the 1992 Dream Team had Jordan, Magic Johnson and Larry Bird leading a group that is widely considered the greatest collection of

talent ever assembled. That team included 11 future Hall of Famers, won its six Olympic games by an average of more than 43 points en route to the gold medal and never was challenged the way this year's team was by Spain in the gold medal game, with the Americans squeezing out a 107-100 victory.

Then again, that's a testament to the global growth of the sport that the 1992 team spurred, leading to an influx of foreign talent in the NBA.

The '92 team boasted arguably the greatest player of all time in Jordan and greatest point guard in Magic Johnson, not to mention Larry Bird and dominant centers in Patrick Ewing and David Robinson. If the most recent group had a weakness, it was in the middle,

with Dwight Howard, Chris Bosh and Blake Griffin sitting out with injuries. Throw in the fact that Dwyane Wade and Derrick Rose missed the games, too, and the Americans weren't quite fully loaded.

Still, they brought plenty of ammunition to London, with LeBron

James, Kevin Durant and Bryant leading the way. And even with some stars missing, there still was talk that this year's team could be as good as the one that stormed through Barcelona two decades earlier. Bryant fueled the debate when he told reporters during training in Las Vegas they could take a game from the 1992 team if they met in their primes.

Even though Bryant didn't say the current stars would win a series, the comment drew sharp replies from members of the 1992 team. Jordan told The Associated Press back then that he "absolutely laughed" and said there's "no comparison" which team is better.

This time, he wasn't quite as blunt.

"I just felt like we had enough size that we could contend with the 2012 team," Jordan said. "I think one of the things the 2012 team lacked was size. We probably would have attacked them from inside and outside, and our defense would have been pretty much solidified with the shot-blockers, as well as perimeter defensive players."

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Netflix expands service to Nordic countries

SAN FRANCISCO — Netflix's Internet video service will debut in four Nordic countries before the end of the year, the latest step in an international expansion that has been crimping the company's financial results and stock price.

Wednesday's announcement that Netflix is coming to Norway, Denmark, Sweden and Finland answers a question left hanging since April, when the company

said it would enter another European market, without saying where. The new market includes the setting for one of Netflix's original online video series, "Lillyhammer," which revolves around a New York mobster who moves to Norway.

Netflix Inc. began streaming movies and TV shows over the Internet in the United Kingdom and Ireland in January. Earlier, it had expanded to Canada and dozens of Latin American countries. The company got its start renting

DVDs through the mail in the U.S. during the late 1990s before adding Internet video streaming in 2007.

The Internet video service costs \$8 per month in the U.S. and is priced in the same range internationally. Netflix said it would reveal its prices in the four Nordic countries later this year.

As is the case in other markets outside the U.S., a DVD option won't be available. Netflix has been trying to phase that out in the U.S. because of high postage costs

and a belief that DVD technology will become obsolete.

Although Netflix has been able to eke out a modest profit in Canada, its service outside the U.S. so far has been a financial albatross. The company's international operations lost \$192 million during the first half of this year.

Netflix has been drawing upon the success of its long-established DVD and Internet video services in the U.S. to pay for the international expansion.

A.J. Green and his son amp up flavor in their newest venture in Crystal River

From Bushnell to Suwannee to Citrus County, Florida native A.J. Green is to hometown restaurants what manatees are to Kings Bay.

Green recently opened his latest venture, A.J.'s Café, in the iconic former Jones Restaurant off U.S. 19 in the heart of Crystal River, a building familiar with decades of serving locals and tourists.

The new A.J.'s belongs to Green's son, A.J. Jr., who helped his dad and mom run various restaurants since he was a boy, Green said.

"I was born in Bushnell and later moved to Suwannee County," the older Green said, pointing to an old photo on the wall of A.J.'s depicting a humble home in Suwannee.

The family then moved to Crystal River, where Green has lived most of his life.

Green owned Cockadoodles in Inverness for years and sold it six years ago to Reese McDaniel. He also created Roosters café in an old ABC Pizza site in Brooksville that he said "is still going strong."

Though Green and his wife, Linda, retired three years ago, he admitted they are "workaholics." Now, they are enjoying helping son, A.J., and his wife, Tiffany, run the new café.

A.J.'s Café serves lunch and



breakfast from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. every day. But the menu will expand to include a huge seafood food fest plus all-you-can-eat fish (\$7.99) from 3 to 8 p.m. Fridays. Green noted the "fresh, never frozen," seafood ranges from combination platters to lobster stuffed with crab (\$11.99). Choices will include fish, crab cakes, clams, grilled haddock,

fried shrimp, baked cod, lasagna (for seafood shunners), clam chowder and oyster stew — just to get folks started.


But that's not all. The South rises again with the variety of Dixie sides, including grits (with cheese if you like), fried eggplant, okra, turnip greens, green beans with seasoning, pickled beets, French fries, mashed potatoes and more.

Daily specials at A.J.'s might include stuffed peppers, stuffed cabbage, chicken à la king with biscuits, baked steak with onion gravy and other plate lunches.

"We make our own gravy," Green said. "We make gravy twice a day. It doesn't sit around in a warming pan."

Grow a pindo palm for food and beauty

One of the most beautiful palms to grace landscapes in Citrus County is the pindo palm (*Butia capitata*), also known as the jelly palm. This graceful feather palm has long blue-gray fronds that arch and curve toward the base of the heavy, stocky trunk.

The species name, *capitata*, refers to the dense head formed by the fronds and stalks. In July and Au-

gust, the large-seed stalks droop with the weight of yellow-orange, edible fruits the size of dates.

Pindo palms make excellent landscape plants for a variety of reasons. The first consideration is their cold hardiness. Able to withstand temperatures as low as 5 degrees, pindos grow as far north as South Carolina on the East Coast and all the way to Washington state on the

West Coast. Native to Argentina, Brazil and Uruguay, these palms handle Florida winters with ease.

A case in point, my wife and I and a family friend recently returned to Florida from a visit to Alabama. Traveling south on U.S. 19, as we re-entered Florida from Georgia, I observed a magnificent pindo palm on the roadside.

Pindo palms are very slow growing, but given time can

reach a height of 20 to 25 feet. They grow well in full sun or partial shade. Regular use of specially formulated palm fertilizer enhances growth.

Planted as accent plants or in groupings, pindos require little maintenance other than trimming dead fronds. The large fruit clusters attract insects and drop fruit. Locating the trees away from sidewalks

SPRAY CLEANSER

- 1 16-ounce measuring cup
- Empty spray bottle
- 8 ounces hydrogen peroxide
- Drop of dish washing soap
- 3 tablespoons baking soda

Measure 8 ounces of hydrogen peroxide in the measuring cup. Add 3 tablespoons of baking soda to the hydrogen peroxide and mix until dissolved. Pour the mixture into spray bottle and add a drop of the dish soap. Shake and spray. Allow spray to sit on surface (under a fan if possible) for an hour or two.



Cornbread and biscuits are made and baked on the premises, he noted. All burgers and other sandwiches and soups are made-to-order, too.

All breakfast items are homemade, including sausage gravy "made fresh with whole hog sausage," Green said.

Hash browns also are actually made on site, from fresh potatoes, peeled, shredded and grilled golden brown, plus home fries.

The sausage gravy has plenty of sausage to justify its name and is preferred over biscuits or the breakfast potatoes.

Eggs every which way — from skillets to omelets, with steak and burritos, corned beef hash and filled croissants and cheese blintzes — French toast and pancakes are on the big breakfast menu.

The most you can pay for a morning order is \$10.99 for The Mongo, a hearty helping of six eggs, 1 each of bacon, sausage and ham, two pancakes, gravy, hash browns, home fries or grits, and biscuit or toast.

It costs \$6.39 for the country fried steak and eggs with choice of potatoes and biscuit or toast, and Farmer's Omelet. Or pay \$6.49 for the Mexican omelet with a spicy kick. Most breakfast combos fall into the \$2.50 to \$5 range.

Lunch prices seem just as affordable. Sandwiches range from \$3.19 for a grilled cheese to \$6.39 for pork tenderloin. Other items include salad plates, subs and much more.

A.J.'s "house specials" entrees are a study in old-fashioned prices. Consider baked turkey with dressing, mashed potatoes, veggies and cranberry sauce for \$7.59 — and the fresh turkey breasts are roasted on site. Or try the oven-baked steak, similar to cubed country style, but baked with a savory onion gravy, or classic liver and onions, crab cakes, meat loaf and shrimp and fish baskets.

and driveways is a good idea. Once established, they are drought and salt tolerant.

I grow pindos from the seedlings often found germinating under trees or in the cup formed where the frond meets the trunk. Seedlings look like a coarse blade of grass, and even at this stage, grow slowly.

Pindo palms can be transplanted. Friends of mine and I transplanted an 8-foot specimen without machinery. There was no need for a visit to a gym after that job!

Considering fruit production may not start for eight years, selection of a larger nursery-grown plant may be desired.

You can't pay more than \$8.39 for a house special (the shrimp basket) and most entrees are less than \$8. Sides are less than \$3 a serving, such as turnip greens, fried okra, slaw, potato salad and pickled beets.

Renee's Bread Pudding is a customer favorite, along with various pies for dessert.

Children can pick their feast from a special menu for breakfast and lunch with smaller prices to match.

Green noted when they took possession of what is now A.J.'s, the first order of business was to remodel the interior dining room and kitchen and stock it with new equipment.

A tour of the kitchen revealed a modernized work area, but the dining room attracts immediate attention.

The newly painted light walls and ceiling are brightened with recessed lighting throughout and pendant lights over the booths. A simplified counter makes more space for servers and customers. And a new server station in the second dining room expedites moving meals from kitchen to diners.

The cafe seats 90 guests, employs 19 servers and other workers along with four cooks, most of whom previously worked for the Greens.

The original Jones eatery opened in the 1930s as a truck stop/gas station when U.S. 19 was a dirt road. It morphed into a station and diner as the years passed, becoming a notable meeting place for local movers and shakers. And a place, some would say with a grin and wink, where local elections were decided.

The new restaurant retains a lot of the early ambiance and the good food and hospitality of A.J. Green — both senior and junior — ensure it will be.

A.J.'s Cafe is open from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. seven days a week and 3 to 8 p.m. Fridays at 216 N. U.S. 19 in Crystal River.

Here are some recipes shared by the Green families. NOTE: You can reduce recipes by half or a quarter or

more to suit the number of people you are cooking for.

COUNTRY GRAVY

- 2 1/2 pounds bacon or sausage
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons ground pepper
- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 gallons milk

Using a stockpot, cook the sausage or bacon until well done. Do not drain. Add butter, wait until melted. Gradually add flour until thoroughly blended. Add milk and stir until mixture thickens. Pepper to taste. Turn off heat and let mixture set up. Serve hot. Recipe yields 3 1/2 gallons.

SEAFOOD CHOWDER

- 2 cups onions, diced
- 10 to 12 potatoes, peeled and diced
- 10 pounds haddock
- 3 pounds shrimp, peeled and raw
- 3 pounds scallops
- 5 cups cooked lobster meat, chopped
- 1 gallon heavy cream
- 2 sticks butter
- Salt and pepper to taste

In a large saucepan with water two inches from bottom, bring the onions and potatoes to a boil until potatoes are slightly cooked. Add the haddock and stir until fish starts to flake apart. Turn down heat to medium.

Add shrimp and scallops. Cook on medium until scallops are done. Add lobster meat, heavy cream, butter, salt and pepper.

Cook on low until the butter melts. Do not boil. Serve hot. The recipe yields 20 quarts.

I enjoy the taste of the pindo dates. The flavor is hard to describe, but juicy and tropical sums it up. The juicy flesh is supported by fibers attached to a large seed. Eating a pindo fruit can be compared to chewing sugar cane. Spitting out the excess is part of the fun.

The large clusters of fruit sometimes generate complaints. I chuckled when I read Green Deane's analysis on EatTheWeeds.com.

"Indeed one of the common complaints about the pindo palm is that it produces too much food," Deane wrote. "Think about that: only a nation with yards of decapitated grass and an obesity epidemic would think that a plant produces too much food."

Green Deane goes on to discuss various methods for preparing the fruit and recipes for making pindo palm

jelly and pindo palm wine. The website edibleplantproject.org has several interesting recipes for pindo palm puree and three separate recipes for pindo palm sorbets.

Having moved to Florida from Kentucky, I appreciate the unique beauty that palms lend to our landscape. The pindo palm incorporates cold tolerance, graceful yet sturdy form and delicious fruit. If you already have a pindo palm in your landscape, explore the edible possibilities. If you don't, consider the many advantages of adding them.

Susan and I share a bedroom.



A blueberry dessert, minus the guilt

*Delicious treat
doesn't contain
added calories*

Toward the end of every summer, my family and I abandon New York City for my parents' Massachusetts farmhouse, where the fields out back are lined with blueberry bushes. Some years the crop is tiny. Other years it is so good we are overwhelmed, calling up visions of Lucille Ball wrapping chocolates in the candy factory.

One summer, my uncle Steve — in a noble, but ultimately futile effort to handle the abundance — designed and engineered his own "Blueberry Holding Unit." He hung an empty tennis can on a string around his neck, freeing up both of his hands, which allowed for simultaneous non-stop two-handed picking. Eureka!

This was nice for his picking, but it didn't do much for the problem of what to do with all those blueberries! So I scrambled to dream up recipes such as this one, which is more about the berries than the crust.

And that has an added benefit. Not only does a berry-centric dessert use up a berry abundance, it also produces a healthier dessert. In most pies and baked treats, the bulk of the fat and calories come from

the crust or cake involved. Even when sweetened, the fruity filling tends to be pretty healthy.

The "cake" in this case is minimal — just three layers of baked phyllo dough cut into squares. Phyllo is a paper-thin flour dough used to make pastries. It is extremely low in fat and even comes in whole-wheat varieties. It's widely available at most grocers and typically is found in the freezer section near the fruit and pie crusts.

As for the berries, I love them raw and cooked, which is why this recipe includes the title fruit in both of those states. I wanted to highlight a raw blueberry's greatest charms, its deep

juiciness and the way it explodes in your mouth. To finish it off, I added lemon and cinnamon, both of which always play so nicely with blueberries.

A few recipe notes for you:

■ You will use only three sheets of phyllo in this recipe. What to do with the remaining sheets? Roll them up, wrap them tightly in plastic, then in foil, and put them back in the freezer for another day.

■ I used a pizza wheel to cut the phyllo dough. It is the best tool for the job; it won't pull at and tear the delicate phyllo the way a knife can.

■ I found the best way to make sure the sugar is dis-

tributed evenly was to put it in my hand and sprinkle it over the dough.

■ Keep a close eye on the phyllo squares as they bake; they brown up very quickly.

■ This dessert is scrumptious, but it's a little messy to eat. Serve it with a knife, fork and spoon.

I tested this recipe not with the tart and intensely-flavored wild blueberries from my backyard, but with the cultivated blueberries found at most supermarkets. Cultivated blueberries are larger and less tart than wild ones, and can be quite tasty. I prefer wild, but my testers (the husband and kids) had no complaints.

Heat the oven to 400 degrees.

In a small bowl, combine 1 tablespoon of the sugar with the cinnamon.

Lay 1 phyllo sheet flat on a baking sheet, keeping the remaining phyllo sheets covered with plastic wrap and a damp kitchen towel.

Spray the phyllo sheet lightly with the cooking spray, then sprinkle it with 1 teaspoon of the cinnamon-sugar mixture.

Layer a second sheet of phyllo over the first, coat it with cooking spray and sprinkle with another teaspoon of the cinnamon-sugar mixture.

Repeat with the final sheet of phyllo. Cut the stacked phyllo

into 12 4-inch squares, leaving them on the baking sheet. Bake until crisp and golden brown, about 8 minutes. Transfer to a rack and let cool.

Meanwhile, in a small saucepan stir together the remaining 1/3 cup sugar, the cornstarch and salt. Whisk in the water. Add 1/2 cup of the blueberries and cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until the mixture comes to a full boil, the berries have popped, and the sauce has thickened. Remove from the heat and stir in the lemon juice and zest. In a medium bowl, combine the thickened sauce with the remaining blueberries.

To serve, arrange six of the phyllo crisps on individual serving plates. Divide the blueberry mixture between them, spooning it over each. Top each with a second crisp. Serve topped with a spoonful of vanilla yogurt, if desired. They also can be sprinkled with powdered sugar or additional cinnamon.

From start to finish, it takes 30 minutes and serves six.

Use large-size muffin pans and no-stick aluminum foil. Cut foil and form over upside down muffin pan (about a 6-inch circle). Set aside.

Beat together shortening, butter and sugars in a large bowl; add the egg and vanilla; beat until well mixed. Mix the flour and baking powder and gradually stir them into the batter;

stir in the chocolate chips. Put batter into a large plastic bag and flatten into a disk; chill for at least an hour. Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Spray the foil on muffin pan lightly with vegetable cooking spray. Roll the chilled cookie dough (between two pieces of waxed paper) out to about 1/8 inch. Cut circles and drape over foil, smoothing cracks together and trimming to fit. Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until light brown.

Remove from oven and let

them cool on the pan for 10 minutes. After 10 minutes, gently lift cookie cups off the pan, using the tip of a butter knife to lift one corner first. Don't remove the foil until the cookie bowl is completely cool. Fill just before serving.

Any filling of choice works, such as puddings, scoops of ice cream and fruit.

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Affects of alcohol on brain

Wine makes daily living easier ... with fewer tensions and more tolerance." — Benjamin Franklin

Much has been written regarding the potential links between wine and physical well-being, alluding to a decrease in stroke risk, heart disease and other circulation maladies that may result through a regimen of moderate wine consumption. Let's glance at the relationship, if any such "quid pro quo" exists, between wine use and mental health.

The brain, a 3-pound unit humans carry around on their shoulders, is without doubt the most complex bit of apparatus ever created. It runs the whole show, so to speak, and scientists continue to study what makes it tick.

So how is this incredible organ affected by wine?

Blood alcohol level

All 50 states have specified alcohol-level limits to establish degrees of intoxication. Five use the .08 standard. The rest, Florida included, state when the level of alcohol in an individual's body reaches 0.10 milligrams per 100 cubic centimeters of blood, this person is legally intoxicated.

Scientific charts show blood alcohol concentration depends on such factors as the weight of the person in question compared to the amount of drinks—one drink is defined as a 12-ounce beer, 4 ounces of wine, or 1 1/4 ounces or 80 proof spirits—consumed during a particular time period.

For example, a 100-pound individual who takes three drinks within four hours will flunk the test with a .08 or

more, while someone who weighs 175 will test clean (between .01 and .04).

Many other variables exist. For example, when the drink is consumed with food, then an absorbing affect will occur.

These are legal definitions of intoxication designed to punish tipsy drivers and they should. But notice the variations which depend on such factors as time and body weight. In other words, "moderate" consumption defined as one or two glasses of wine with a meal should not normally impair driving ability.

Exceptions could occur with novice drivers, or those affected by illness, fatigue or disability. Those at risk should never drink Period!

Anxiety

Who has not at some point been tense, nervous or stressed out? They are the natural or normal kinds of feelings we all suffer as youngsters before taking an exam, or maybe before asking that first girl for a date. Other stressful challenges occur with strained relationships, loss of jobs and the passing of loved ones.

When anxiety continues to define people's lives beyond the "norm," some folks seek professional help.

Anxiety relieving drugs throughout the past 40 years also have become widely prescribed to help. Doctors treat "abnormal" anxiety with everything from bromide salts to barbiturates to as Valium and Halcyon.

Few studies have actually been done on the influence wine has on anxiety. One publication suggested "lower

levels of alcohol consumption can reduce stress, promote conviviality ... and decrease tension, anxiety, and self-consciousness."

We all know — those who enjoy wine or anything else — how we are affected by consumption. So if we are anxious, should we drink? Some think this is the worst possible thing to do. Others believe wine clearly fills a tension relieving function when it is not overdone. This, I believe, is the ultimate benchmark.

Thinking ability

Question: If six drinks in the period of one hour imply a person is clearly handicapped in his or her ability to reason clearly, does a single drink in the same time frame mean that individual is one-sixth as impaired?

Most of the evidence says no.

One respected review said low alcohol doses have been found to improve certain types of cognitive performance including problem solving and short-term memory ... there is no consistent evidence (that would suggest an adverse impact of social drinking on cognitive ability.)

Depression, mood

Depression can be anything from a mild downer to a life-threatening disease.

The issue of evaluating the place of wine or drinking either in the onset or continuation of this mental condition is cloudy.

A large body of research has focused on the relationship between booze and depressed mood. Scientists confuse the question of "central nervous system depression" and depressed mood itself.

Much study has been done on the subject of alcohol and depression, but little of it has to do with light social drinking in the company of friends, or

drinking one or two glasses of wine with dinner.

One series of studies, among older institutionalized folks, demonstrated residents of "old age" homes who were given a glass or two of wine in daily social gatherings benefited greatly. People were generally happier, fewer tranquilizers were needed and even incontinence decreased.

Conclusions

For the average person light, regular wine use has no negative effects on mental ability, including general emotional being and reasoning power. Rather, all of the studies, and my personal conclusions, show wine taken in this manner can aid in living a cheerful lifestyle.

Whether a man or woman decides to drink wine or any other alcoholic beverage is a personal choice based on any number of factors, both cultural and spiritual. But from a strict medical perspective, it appears wine taken in the context of a light social occupation can only help and not hinder.

A simple grilled tuna steak with bold flavors

Summer makes us long for the grill. But by the end of the season, even our favorite burgers and dogs can feel a bit tired.

So to keep your grilling interesting, we came up with a speedy grilled tuna dish that packs tons of big, bold flavors. For our recipe, we used tuna steaks, which are thick, meaty pieces cut from the fish in the opposite direction than a fillet. You also could use salmon steaks, which often include the bone (which helps the flesh hold together on the grill). Swordfish also would work in this recipe.

We kept the prep simple with just a light coating of oil and a bit of salt and pepper. We wanted to let the flavor of the tuna shine. But to ensure we also could taste the fresh flavors of summer, we top the tuna with a cross between a fruit salsa and an herby chimichurri. It goes together in about 2 minutes with the help of a food processor.

GRILLED TUNA STEAKS WITH MANGO HERB SALSA

■ 1/2 cup packed fresh parsley leaves

■ 1/4 cup packed fresh oregano leaves

■ 1/4 cup fresh mint leaves

■ 3 tablespoons olive oil, divided

■ 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar

■ 2 cloves garlic

■ 1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes

■ Zest and juice of 1 lemon

■ 2 mangos, peeled, pitted and diced

■ Salt and ground black pepper

■ Four 6-ounce tuna steaks

Heat the grill to high.

In a food processor, combine the parsley, oregano, mint, 2 tablespoons of the olive oil, the red wine vinegar, garlic, red pepper flakes, and the lemon zest and juice. Process until well chopped, scraping down the bowl as needed. Add the mango and pulse once or twice to combine and lightly chop. Season with salt and pepper, then set aside.

Rub the tuna steaks on all sides with the remaining 1 tablespoon olive oil, then season them with salt and pepper. Grill the steaks for 2 to 3 minutes per side for medium-rare. Serve topped with the salsa.

From start to finish, it takes 20 minutes and serves four.
