

Small springs play big role in nuke plant hearing

Challengers question plan's impact on wetlands, floodplains

BRONSON — Two little-known Levy County springs played a big role as judges grilled the parties involved during a hearing on a challenge to the application for a nuclear power plant in Levy County.

Progress Energy Florida has applied to the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission to build and operate two nuclear power reactors on a site off of U.S. 19, north of the Cross Florida Barge Canal, about 10 miles from Crystal River.

The project has an estimated cost between \$19 billion and \$24 billion and a tentative in-service date of 2024 for the first unit, with the second unit following 18 months later.

The hearing by the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board started Wednesday at the Levy County Courthouse in Bronson. The board is an independent three-judge panel selected by the NRC to review challenges to applications for reactors.

Chairman Alex S. Karlin made it clear the panel is independent and does not even communicate with NRC commissioners or staff on any aspects of the case. "Any communications that do occur are public documents or in open courtroom settings," he said.

Progress submitted its application to build in July 2008. Challengers -- currently the Ecology Party of Florida and the Nuclear Information and Resource Service — joined the action in 2009.

They argue the NRC's Final Environmental Impact Statement for the proposed reactors fails to adequately analyze and discuss impacts on wetlands, floodplains, special aquatic sites and other waters associated with the site.

The hearing was limited to these contentions. "We are here to decide if the contention is valid," Karlin said.

In her opening statement, attorney Diane Curran, representing the interveners, charged the Environmental Statement fails to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). She said it does not address the impact of groundwater withdrawal — 1.58 million gallons every day — and salt drift.

She said NRC staff failed to take a hard look at where impacts could occur and has no factual basis to reach any conclusions. "We would urge the board to require staff to do a more extensive study of impact or look at alternatives that do not involve use of ground water.'

She also brought up the issue of using tracer dyes — a technique previously used in Levy County to determine the connected underground movement of water

INVERNESS — As a child playing football, the Rev. Donnie Seagle said he would listen to his father, Cecil, call the play-by-play during his Pop Warner games on Saturdays. Today, like father, like son, the younger Seagle has made his way into the press box, calling the varsity football games for Citrus High School.

As the senior pastor at the First Baptist Church of Inverness for the past eight years, Seagle is used to being in front of large crowds; his church's total membership is about 800.

But during football season at Citrus High School, Friday night finds him tending a different flock — football fanatics.

"Last year (2011 to 2012) they asked me to do some of the junior varsity football games and I said, 'Sure." Seagle said from his church office last Friday. "I've always enjoyed listening to guys call games and thought I would

Group looks to lure big store near new Wal-Mart

The first step was taken Thursday for the possible eventual building of a large retail store on County Road 486, across the road and northwest of the new Wal-Mart.

'With the commencement of construction of the new Wal-Mart shopping center immediately adjacent to our site to the southeast. it is our belief that interest has increased in this area for additional retail development," said Kevin Mineer, a certified planner with the applicant Genesis Group. "We believe that this location would be a viable and attractive site to a va-

riety of retailers, including many national developers," he said at the county Planning and Development Commission (PDC) meeting.

Genesis Group for C.R. 486 LLC requested a land use change from residential to commercial use on the county's comprehensive plan for 53.5 acres of a 61.75-acre parcel at 3499 W. Norvell Bryant Highway (the north side of County Road 486). The parcel is between the YMCA site on the west and an existing commercial site on the east. On the north side is the Black Diamond golf course community.





Heading to retirement home

Atlantis to move into visitor complex

CAPE CANAVERAL — Space shuttle Atlantis isn't going far to its retirement home at Kennedy Space Center's main tourist stop. But it might as well be a world away for the workers who spent decades doting on Atlantis and NASA's other shuttles.

Those who agreed to stay until the end — and help with the shuttles' transition from round-the-world flying marvels to museum showpieces - now face unemployment, like so many of their colleagues in the last few years.

NASA's 30-year shuttle program ended more than a year ago with Atlantis the last shuttle to orbit the Earth. Now, it's the last of three shuttles to leave the coop. Friday's one-way road trip over a mere 10 miles represents the closing chapter of what once was a passionate endeavor for so many. The latest wave of layoff notices

struck the same day last month that a small group of journalists toured Atlantis' stripped-down crew compartment. The hangar was hushed, compared with decades past. Despite pleas from management to put on smiles, many of the technicians and engineers were in no mood for happy talk as reporters bustled about.

The way many workers see it, they're being put out to pasture, too. Joe Walsh's walking papers are effective Dec. 7.

Letitia Baldrige known for her etiquette

WASHINGTON — Letitia Baldrige, the White House social secretary during the Kennedy administration who came to be regarded as an authority on etiquette, has died.

Baldrige, 86, died Monday in Bethesda, Md., friend Mary M. Mitchell confirmed Thursday.

At the White House, Baldrige also served as chief of staff for first lady Jacqueline Kennedy from 1961 to 1963. Turnout huge for early voting

surpass 50 percent

And the winner is -Precinct 307!

As of Oct. 31, nearly 55 percent of registered voters in the Sugarmill Woods area precinct have already cast their ballots either through early voting or absentee voting. Precinct 203 in Beverly Hills is a close second at 52 percent.

"Early voting has been huge," said Eileen Ronk, the early voting coordinator for the Citrus County Supervisor of Elections Office. "So far, we've had a total of 15,941 ballots cast — and we're not even finished."

The last day of early voting in Citrus County is Saturday.

Ronk said the lines at times have been incredible. In the past people have had to wait up to 15 minutes, but this time she's gotten reports of people waiting as long as an hour and a half.

"I'm beyond in awe that so election. many people have come out to vote, because so few did for the primary," she said.

Ronk explained that once a person casts a ballot, the computer updates the information within secwalks out the door, every

> Another safeguard: Let's say you fill out an absentee ballot and drop it in the mail and two days later stop at an early voting site to vote.

If the supervisor's office has already received your ballot, it's counted as being cast and you won't be able to vote at an early voting site, nor on Election Day. But if your ballot hasn't been received, you can vote at an early site, then once your mail-in ballot arrives it goes before a canvassing board.

"That way we can document and show that you've already early voted," Ronk

As for keeping track of how many early and absentee ballots are cast prior to Election Day, Ronk said the information helps them better prepare for this coming Tuesday.

"We know that 52 percent of registered voters in Precinct 203 are not going to show up Tuesday to vote," she said.

Ronk added that they're hoping for a 75 to 80 percent voter turnout for this







It's only been a day, but

November on Wall Street is already looking a lot better than October. Strong economic data and

corporate news converged Thursday to give U.S. stocks their best day since mid-September. Positive signs about the job market and higher auto and retail sales reports pushed stock futures up before the market opened. The Dow Jones industrial average rose 100 points the first half hour of trading. At 10, two more strong reports came out and pushed the Dow up as much as 177 points. It fell back some, but held a steady gain for the rest of the day.

The Dow closed up 136.16 points, or 1 percent, at 13,232.62. It was the best day since Sept. 13.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 15.43 points, or 1.1 percent, to 1,427.59. The Nasdaq composite index added 42.83, or 1.4 percent, to 3,020.06.


All three indexes fell in October, their first monthly losses since May. The 10 a.m. surge came

after the Institute for Supply Management said factories are seeing more orders and increased production. The index has shown growth for the first two months of this quarter, an encouraging sign about the health of corporate America. Before that, manufacturing had decreased for three straight months. The Conference Board

said Americans' confidence in the economy surged last month to the highest level in nearly five years. Many were encouraged by an improving job market, the group said. Traders watch manufac-

dence because factories and broad consumers are crucial players in the economic recovery. Manufacturing lifted America out of recession, and the resurgent car industry has supported the economy during recent periods of weakness. Consumers, meanwhile, account for about 70 percent of economic activity. If they're not confident enough to spend, no one else has the buying power to take up the slack. Manufacturing growth

tends to signal higher corporate earnings, said Doug Cote, chief market strategist at ING Investment Management. U.S. companies are midway through reporting their third-quarter earnings, which have been relatively weak. If factories keep boosting their output, Cote said, earnings are more likely to bounce back this quarter.

"What you want to see is

turing and consumer confi- advancing corporate profits, manufacturing growth and strong consumer spending," Cote said. Cote said those factors set the tone for the market.

Before trading began, the government said applications for unemployment benefits fell 9,000 last week to a seasonally adjusted 363,000, a level consistent with modest hiring. Separately, payroll provider ADP said businesses added 158,000 jobs in October, more than economists had expected. Another major piece of

economic news comes out at 8:30 a.m. Friday, the Labor Department's October jobs report. That report will be watched closely by traders to see how well the U.S. economy is recovering. If the number is especially good or bad, it also could influence the outcome of next week's presidential election.

Retailers fret October gains could hurt holidays

NEW YORK — Americans spent briskly in October before superstorm Sandy hit the Northeast on the tail end of the month. But Maine and caused stores to close due to the question is whether they're still willing to buy an iPhone for Christmas if they plunked down hundreds on a generator for Sandy. Twenty-one retailers from club operator

Costco to department store Macy's reported that sales in October through last Saturday were up 5 percent compared with the yearago period, according to the International Council of Shopping Centers. That beat the trade group's estimated growth of 3.5 percent to 4.5 percent. Results were not hurt by the storm because it hit the East Coast on Monday, two days after the period for which retailers were reporting sales ended. But analysts worry that the strong sales

in October could spell trouble for the upcoming holiday shopping season in November and December, a time when many retailers make up to 40 percent of their annual revenue. They fear that many Americans in some of the nation's biggest cities who bought generators, bottled water and other emergency and cleanup supplies before and after the storm will be less inclined to spend over the holidays.

For example, Kathleen Nicholson, a Yardley, Pa. resident, said Thursday that because of Sandy, she's likely to spend a little less than the \$900 she dished out for holiday gifts last year for her children who are ages 12, 13 and 17. The reason? She and her husband have to foot a \$1,500 bill for removing two large pine trees that fell in her backyard because of the storm. "We didn't plan for it," said Nicholson, a

college journalism instructor whose husband is a consultant. "I think we're going to have to have a pretty frugal Christmas. At a time when Americans already are

dealing with a slow economic recovery and uncertainties related to the presidential election on Tuesday, Sandy just gives some of them another reason to cut their spend-

on how their sales were affected by Sandy. But the storm, which for days disrupted business activity from North Carolina to power outages, flooding and other issues, is expected to cost retailers billions in lost sales. October's sales reports don't offer a com-

ing. Few retailers offered details Thursday

plete picture of the storm's impact. Not only does it exclude sales for the period after Sandy hit the East Coast. It also only includes a handful of retailers representing about 13 percent of the \$2.4 trillion U.S. retail industry report monthly results, which are based on revenue at stores opened at least a year. Home improvement chains like Home Depot, the world's biggest retailer Wal-Mart Stores Inc. and other stores that might have been impacted by the storm didn't report sales. But so far, the effects of Sandy mostly are

expected to be a wash. Home improvement chains and food stores are expected to benefit, while sales at department stores, clothing retailers and others that sell discretionary items likely will suffer. But with many closed stores just starting to reopen, analysts said that the full effects of the storm could spill over into November.

Burt Flickinger III of retail consultancy Strategic Resource Group, estimates that retailers, excluding restaurants, could lose at least \$25 billion in sales during the week of the storm. He also downgraded his projection for holiday sales because of the storm, forecasting that they will rise 2.1 percent over last year instead of the 3.2 percent that he had originally predicted. Wal-Mart, based in Bentonville, Ark., de-

clined to discuss monthly sales, but the retailer said it's been rushing deliveries of emergency supplies like generators and nonperishable foods that don't need to be refrigerated to its stores. Currently, 12 of its namesake stores, distribution centers, Sam's Clubs and other facilities remain closed. That's down from a peak of 300 that were closed on Monday.

Hydrocodone, a pain medication (generic for Lortab) is going from Tier 2 to Tier 3 (refer to 2013 Abridged Formulary AARP Medicare RX Preferred PDP, page 9-Tier 3) which means what used to cost \$8 per month copay this year is now going to cost either \$16.80 or \$40 copay per script a month in 2013.

I just came back from seeing my pain management doctor in Beverly Hills and he said that will affect millions of people. How many more dollars for United Healthcare insurance that bragged about only going up 57 cents a month for premiums? Just for one medication, I see an increase of \$32 a month, and that's just for one of my medications.

Talk about a rip-off.



Officials offer new Libya details

WASHINGTON — U.S. intelligence officials are offering a new timeline detailing the attack on the U.S. Consulate in Libya, saying CIA security officers went to the aid of State Department staff less than 25 minutes after they got the first call for help.

They said the team tried to get heavy weapons and other assistance from the Libyans, but when none was available left anyway. They said at no point was the team told to delay or stand down.

The timeline was offered to rebut news reports U.S. officials told rescuers to wait.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity to provide intelligence information.

The officials said early information that the attackers had ties to al-Qaida linked groups was not made public immediately because it was based on classified intelligence.

Bombing suspect caught in Montana

HELENA, Mont. — A man wanted on charges of detonating pipe bombs in Virginia led police on a chase across the Montana plains Thursday during which he threw about a half-dozen bombs at his pursuers before he was captured, authorities said.

The chase began after a trooper with the Montana Highway Patrol pulled over Laurence Alan Stewart II for speeding, said Bradley Beyersdorf, a spokesman for the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

Stewart stopped at first, then sped off. Deputies from the Cascade County sheriff's office and a helicopter joined in the pursuit, which began in Judith Basin County and then headed toward Great Falls on U.S. Highway 87.

Along the way, Stewart threw approximately six pipe bombs at the officers behind him, Beyersdorf said. Some of the bombs detonated, but there were no injuries during the pursuit.

The chase went on for about 40 miles before the officers disabled the car, but Beyersdorf did not know how. Stewart fled the vehicle with a handgun but was taken into custody.

Soldier guilty in murder case

EL PASO, Texas — A U.S. soldier has been convicted in a murder-for-hire scheme in which prosecutors said he agreed to kill a man for undercover agents posing as drug cartel members.

A federal jury in Texas on Thursday found 29-year-old Samuel Walker, a soldier from Colorado Springs Colo., guilty of conspiracy to commit murder-for-hire.

An accomplice, 28-year-old Calvin Epps of Hopkins, S.C., was found guilty of conspiracy to distribute cocaine and marijuana in the same plot. Both were also convicted of firearms charges.

Derailed tanker burns in Kentucky

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The blaze that authorities initially said would end in a couple of hours instead spewed flames and smoke from a derailed tanker car for a second day Thursday with no end in sight, as crews scrambled to prevent it from igniting railcars loaded with toxic chemicals nearby.

Hundreds of people have had to evacuate, including the entire town of West Point and some people from the outskirts of Louisville. The burning butadiene, a chemical commonly found in rubber used to make tires, can damage the central nervous and reproductive systems. Workers were hosing down other railcars nearby filled with another corrosive chemical, hydrogen fluoride, which can cause severe respiratory damage.

Ex-Penn St. president charged

Spanier accused of helping cover up Sandusky allegations

HARRISBURG, Pa. — The "conspiracy of silence" that protected Jerry Sandusky extended all the way to the top at Penn State, prosecutors said Thursday as they charged former university President Graham Spanier with hushing up child sexual abuse allegations against the former assistant football coach.

Prosecutors also added counts against two of Spanier's former underlings, Tim Curley and Gary Schultz, who were already charged with lying to a grand jury.

"This was not a mistake by these men. This was not an oversight. It was not misjudgment on their part," said state Attorney General Linda Kelly. "This was a conspiracy of silence by top officials to actively conceal the

Spanier's lawyers issued a statement that asserted his innocence and described the new charges as an attempt by Gov. Tom Corbett to divert at-information and evidence."

tention from the three-year investigation that began under his watch as attorney general.

"These charges are the work of a vindictive and politically motivated governor working through an unelected attorney general ... whom he appointed to do his bidding," the four defense lawyers wrote.

Corbett spokesman Kevin Harley said the defense statement "sounds like the ranting of a desperate man who just got indicted.

Curley's lawyer Caroline Roberto said he was innocent of all charges, as he has asserted in the past. She said the new documents were being reviewed and would have a more comprehensive comment later. Schultz also has maintained his innocence; his lawyer did not return a message seeking comment.

At a Capitol news conference, Kelly said all three men "knowingly testified falsely and failed to provide important



Spanier was charged with perjury, obstruction, endangering the welfare of children, failure to properly report suspected abuse and conspiracy. Curley and Schultz face new charges of endangering the welfare of children, obstruction and conspiracy.

The charges were filed with a suburban Harrisburg district judge, whose office said Curley and Schultz were expected to be arraigned Friday afternoon and Spanier tentatively scheduled to appear Wednesday. They came nearly a year to the day that Sandusky was arrested.

Sandusky, who spent decades on the Penn State staff and was defensive coordinator during two national championship seasons, was convicted in June of sexually abusing 10 boys over 15 years. He has maintained he is innocent and was transferred to a maximum security prison on Wednesday, where he is serving a 30- to 60-year sentence.

Syrians wary of US influence

BEIRUT - Members of Syria's opposition-in-exile bristled Thursday at the Obama administration's suggestion that Washington will handpick more representative leaders at a crucial conference in Qatar next week.

The new U.S. push appears aimed at creating a unified leadership that could work more closely with the West. But there are signs of resistance among deeply fractured opposition groups wary of attempts by foreign backers to dictate strategy in the civil war against President Bashar Assad.

"This direct tutelage and these dictates are not acceptable to the Syrian people anymore," said Zuhair Salem, the London-based spokesman for Syria's banned Muslim Brotherhood opposition group. The Brotherhood is part of the main political opposition group, the Syrian National Council, which is dominated by exiles.

Mexico sees big drop in remittances

MEXICO CITY — The Bank of Mexico said the amount of money sent home by Mexicans working abroad plunged 20 percent in September. That was the biggest drop since October 2009, when migrants were struggling to find jobs amid the worldwide economic crisis.

Mexico's central bank said Thursday that remittances in September fell to \$1.66 billion from the \$1.88 billion sent home from abroad during the same month in 2011.

The biggest drop in remittances was registered in October 2009 when they fell nearly 36 percent.

Nearly all remittances to Mexico come from the United States, where an estimated 12 million Mexican citizens

US college student stabbed in Rome

ROME — A U.S. student at an American university in Rome was stabbed about 25 times by a fellow student as he slept following Halloween night partying at a club and is hospitalized in serious condition, police said Thursday.

The alleged assailant, an American-born student with both U.S. and Italian citizenship, was arrested early Thursday in a Rome apartment near the Colosseum and will likely face a court appearance on Friday, police said. The motive for the attack, which apparently followed a night of alcohol use, wasn't clear.

Police did not immediately release the name of the wounded student, who they said is about 20 years old. San Giovanni hospital, where he was taken, declined to give any details about his condition.

Both young men attend John Cabot University in Rome, university president Franco Pavoncello told The Associated Press.

"It's dirty, and it's getting a little crazy down there," said Michael Tomeo, who boarded a bus to Philadelphia with his 4-year-old son. "It just feels like you wouldn't want to be out at night. Everything's pitch dark. I'm tired of it, big-time."

Rima Finzi-Strauss decided to take bus to Washington. When the power went out Monday night in her apartment building on the Lower East Side of Manhattan, it also disabled the electric locks on the front door, she said.

The IOC says it will "immediately" look into the Olympic involvement of Armstrong, other riders and officials implicated in the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency report describing systematic doping in cycling.

Cycling's governing body last week formally stripped Armstrong of his seven Tour de France titles.

Armstrong won bronze in the time trial at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

Also under scrutiny is Levi Leipheimer, who won the time-trial bronze at the 2008 Beijing Games and has admitted to doping.

Perez, who last played in the majors for the New York Yankees in 1991, was found with a severe head wound in a town west of the capital, Santo Domingo, and there was evidence at the scene to suggest that whoever killed him had been searching for money, said Joel Valdemiro, a prosecutor who is involved in the investigation.

Perez's brother Carlos, a former pitcher for the Dodgers, confirmed his death.

Woods: Reclaiming No. 1 will take time

SINGAPORE — On the two-year anniversary of losing his No. 1 ranking, Tiger Woods said Thursday that winning was the best way for him to get back to the top.

And that could take some time.

Woods won three times this year on the U.S. tour, though it took time for his trademark consistency to develop. He did not have back-to-back finishes in the top 10 until the British Open and the Bridgestone Invitational. He hasn't finished out of the top 10 since The Barclays in August, a streak of four tournaments. Woods ends his 2012 season at his World Challenge in California in the last week of November.

Cardinals organist Havs dies at 77

ST. LOUIS - Ernie Hays, an organist who was a fixture at St. Louis sporting events and provided the soundtrack of Cardinals baseball for four decades, has died, the team said Thursday.

The St. Louis native. who spent 40 seasons as the baseball team's organist, died Wednesday night at age 77. A cause of death was not disclosed.

A classically trained pianist, Hays also worked as organist for the St. Louis Blues hockey team, college sports teams and for professional soccer in St. Louis.

In addition to thousands of regular-season games, his music was played at five World Series.

Hays retired from the Cardinals in 2010. By then, pre-recorded pop music and video had replaced much of Hays' performance.

Hays was born in St. Louis and began playing piano at age 7, the Cardinals said in a news release.

He served in the Navy for four years before returning to St. Louis and earning an engineering degree from Washington University. He worked for many years as an engineering supervisor for the Bell Telephone System, much of that time while he was performing at sporting events at night.

Andy Murray stunned in Paris

PARIS — Andy Murray wasted a match point against a qualifier ranked 69th and quickly lost his composure.

Not a recipe for victory. Jerzy Janowicz of Poland rallied to stun the U.S Open and Olympic champion 5-7, 7-6 (4), 6-2 Thursday in the third round of the Paris Masters.

A day after secondseeded Novak Djokovic lost to big-serving American Sam Querrey in the second round, the third-seeded Murray lost to a player who opened the year taking part in Futures tournaments.

"This was the most unbelievable day in my life. I beat Olympic champion, U.S. Open champion. Unbelievable feeling for me," Janowicz said.

With Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal not playing in Paris, none of the Big Four are left. However, fourthseeded David Ferrer, fifthseeded Tomas Berdych, No. 6 Jo-Wilfried Tsonga and No. 8 Janko Tipsarevic of Serbia reached the last eight.

Wozniacki gets third win from three

SOFIA, Bulgaria — Already qualified for the semifinals, top-seeded Caroline Wozniacki beat Slovakia's Daniela Hantuchova 3-6, 7-6 (4), 6-4 on Thursday to make it three wins from three at the season-ending Tournament of Champions

Italy's Roberta Vinci earned her second victory of the group stage by defeating Hsieh Su-Wei of Taiwan 6-1, 6-2, and also advances to the semifinals from Group Serdika.

In the other group, Nadia Petrova beat doubles partner Maria Kirilenko 3-6, 7-6 (4), 6-3.

NFL hopes to deter players from faking injuries

When Pittsburgh Steelers receiver Emmanuel Sanders suddenly dropped to the turf late in the fourth quarter, was helped to the sideline, returned after missing one play, then managed to be the first player down the field on punt coverage, announcers Al Michaels and Cris Collinsworth let NBC's audience know their feelings.

"Man," Michaels said, his voice dripping with sarcasm, "I'm sure glad Sanders is OK.'

In a similar tone, Collinsworth chimed in: "It's a miracle."

Both chuckled. More guffaws and hearty mocking of Sanders came from ESPN's talking heads on a "C'mon Man!" segment a couple of days later.

Safe to say the NFL doesn't consider this a laughing matter: The league told Sanders it wants to chat about what happened in that Sunday night game against the Cincinnati Bengals. When a reporter asked Sanders this week whether he really had a cramp against the Bengals, he didn't answer directly, saying: "We're going to speak on it when we get to New York.

At least one of the Bengals, safety Chris Crocker, was hardly bothered by the tactic.

"If you're not cheating, you're not trying,' I guess, is the old saying," Crocker said. "So if you can

slow the game down, why not?'

Bengals coach Marvin Lewis fenses have players pretend to be hurt. didn't really want to touch the topic, other than to say he thinks 'it's generally a rare occasion."

All 32 teams' general managers and head coaches were sent a memo back in September by Ray Anderson, the NFL's executive vice president of football operations, reminding them, "The Competition Committee deprecates feigning injuries, with subsequent withdrawal, to obtain a timeout without penalty. Coaches are urged to cooperate in discouraging this practice.'

The league could fine coaches, players or clubs — or it could decide to take away draft picks. No one has been punished yet for faking an injury.

According to the memo, the Competition Committee has reviewed this issue several times. but has been reluctant to propose a specific rule, since assessing a charged timeout for every injury timeout would deprive a team of timeouts for strategic purposes. It also could encourage injured players to remain in the game at risk to themselves to avoid incurring a charged team timeout.'

It's a football strategy that's been around for years: A player fakes an injury, stopping the clock - maybe it saves a timeout; maybe it slows an opponent's offense.

As a receiver with the Bengals in the 1980s, Collinsworth grew ac-

customed to seeing opposing de-

"It would almost get to where you would laugh about it. It was ridiculous," he said in a telephone interview. "Everybody on the field including the referees — knew what they were doing."

There doesn't really appear a

way to prevent it. "Referees certainly don't want that burden of having to determine who's healthy and who's not. They're having a hard enough time with the concussion issue right now. And really, on almost any play, when you get right down to it, you could lie on the ground and say you have a concussion, and who the heck is going to say anything to that? So as long as teams are willing to do it, there's nothing really that I know of that can stop them," Collinsworth said.

"The only way you're ever going to get around it is in cases that appear to be fairly obvious," he said. You fine the teams an escalating amount of money and find out just how valuable those timeouts really are. You get a \$100,000 fine for faking an injury, you're probably not going to take any more of those fake timeouts.

Whether or not Sanders really was dealing with debilitating cramps,

he caught the league's attention. "It was fairly obvious what was going on," Collinsworth said. 'Every team has a signal: 'Time to fake an injury.' And why not?"

Jordan talks Bobcats' past & his future

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Michael Jordan could no longer hide his frustration midway through the Bobcats' dismal season last year. Not wanting anyone to see how angry he was, Charlotte's owner moved from his seat at the end of the team's bench to his more secluded luxury suite high above the court.

Still, he didn't give up on his club then and he isn't now.

The ultra-competitive Jordan said despite watching his club "hit rock bottom" during the most miserable season in NBA history that he's "in it for the long haul" when it comes to seeing his struggling franchise transformed into a consistent winner.

He knows it won't be quick.

"Are we a playoff team? C'mon, we can't expect that," Jordan said Thursday. "But we need to get the ball rolling in the right direction. I'm not real happy about the record-book scenario

last year. It's very, very frustrating." Charlotte finished 7-59 and with the worst winning percentage (.106) in NBA history.

Jordan, who won six NBA titles with the Chiciago Bulls, believes he has the right man to turn things around in new coach Mike Dunlap.

Jordan said the challenge has been getting players to buy in, particularly when it comes to Dunlap's grueling three- to four-hour marathon practices.

But he's there to make sure they do. Jordan saw what he perceived as "resistance" from some players to Dunlap's ways earlier this week. pulled them aside after practice and dressed them down. He told them that he fully supports Dunlap's philosophies and if they don't agree with it

they won't be around for long. That seemed to get the players' attention.

Jordan said the next day he saw a change in attitude.

"I want to establish a culture within in this organization so that when you plug a guy in, the culture is sitting there and no one guy is bigger than that culture," Jordan said. "You either fit in or you don't fit in. When you look at organizations that are established

they have a winning culture.' Jordan said once the Bobcats establish that culture more big-name free agents will want to come to

Charlotte. Jordan would love to have a marquee player.

And if that player does comes available in free agency or via trade — and if he wants to play in Charlotte -Jordan said he's willing to go to great lengths to get him.

"I'll spend money, that that's not even a question, if a person fits what we want to do and it makes sense,' Jordan said. "But I don't think it makes sense for us to be in a luxury tax situation and fighting for the eighth spot in the playoffs. That doesn't make any sense. You have to spend money wisely.' Jordan won't say when he expects

the Bobcats to make the playoffs or even how many wins it would take for him to consider this a successful season. Any way you look at it, Jordan and

the Bobcats have a long road to hoe. But Jordan wants to see it through.

"I don't anticipate getting out of this business," Jordan said. "My competitive nature is I want to succeed. It's always been said that when I can't find a way to do anything, I will find a way to do it.'



NEW YORK — Martha Stewart Living Omnimedia Inc. is downsizing its magazines and will cut publishing jobs as it increasingly focuses on online video and other digital content.

The lifestyle, media and merchandising company said Thursday that the move could save it \$33 to \$35 million per year. It did not say how many employees are being eliminated, and a message was not immediately returned.

Martha Stewart will stop publishing its monthly Everyday Food magazine as a standalone publication, instead periodically wrapping it into the company's flagship Martha Stewart Living magazine. It will make Everyday Food con-

pany's website, a YouTube channel and through a daily video newsletter.

The company will also seek to sell its Whole Living health and lifestyle magazine. If the magazine cannot be sold, its content may also be incorporated into other company products.

Print magazines are the company's largest business division, accounting for 64 percent of total sales in 2011. The cutbacks announced Thursday will leave the company with its flagship magazine and the quarterly publication, Martha Stewart Weddings.

Company executives previously highlighted the weakness of the company's publishing segment. Revenue from print publications fell





John Steinbeck said: "Ideas are like rabbits. You get a couple and learn how to handle them, and pretty soon you have a dozen.'

You have become the declarer. It is good to have some idea of how you will play the contract. Count your winners and losers, get another idea of how lucky you need to be, and proceed.


In this deal, you have two problems. How do you play to win a dozen tricks in six spades, and how do you play to win a baker's dozen in seven spades? West leads the heart queen.

The bidding had a modern theme. Four hearts was a Texas transfer. North then used Roman Key Card Blackwood, the five-heart reply showing two aces and denying the spade queen. North signed off in six spades. And, yes, perhaps North should have bid six no-trump. There might have been a dozen winners, two spades and 10 others, if South had a five-card minor. Then a bad spade break would not have been fatal.

In seven spades, you must play the trump suit without loss. That requires finding West with Q-J or Q-J-x in spades. Immediately lead a trump and, unless West plays an honor, call for dummy's nine. Your chance of success is just under 14 percent.

In six spades, though, you can afford one spade loser. The right idea is to cash dummy's ace, return to your hand in another suit, and lead your second trump, covering West's card as cheaply as possible. Your chances have risen to nearly 88 percent.

Note finally that West should not split his spade honors — he should not help declarer.







The 0.53-of-an-acre of adverse wetlands impacts authorized under this permit were previously mitigated for under the Holcim permit, which approved land donation, wetland creation, and wetland restoration to offset proposed mining impacts to 20.492 acres of wetlands. The Holcim permit included one proposed quarry lake (Lake "J") which extends into the parcel that was later acquired by U.S. Gypsum. The total area served by the surface water management system will be 5.43 acres, consisting of an access road with swales, a truck turn-about, a stormwater basin, and a concrete storage and loading pad. A total of 2.53 acres of impervious area (mostly concrete pad road surfaces) will be created by the construction. Stormwater up to the 100 year, 24 hour storm will be contained within the surface water management system. Construction dewatering will be limited to a temporary draw-down to allow the construction of the support piers for an elevated conveyor system.

Groundwater quality monitoring will be provided from a network of four shallow monitoring wells located around the perimeter of the stormwater management system. Semi-annual samples will be collected from these locations and tested for chloride, sulfate, radionuclides, and a variety of other chemical constituents. 


