

Time for compromise

Obama heads back to divided government; pledges to avert spending cuts and tax increases

WASHINGTON — One day after a bruising, mixed-verdict election, President Barack Obama and Republican House Speaker John Boehner both pledged Wednesday to seek a compromise to avert looming spending cuts and tax increases that threaten to plunge the economy back into recession.

Added Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev. "Of course" an agreement is possible.

While all three men spoke in general terms, Boehner stressed

that Republicans would be willing to accept higher tax revenue under the right conditions as part of a more sweeping attempt to reduce deficits and restore the economy to full health.

While the impending "fiscal cliff" dominates the post-election agenda, the president and Republicans have other concerns, too.

ahead to top-level personnel changes in a second term, involving three powerful Cabinet portfolios at a minimum.

And Republicans are heading into a season of potentially painful reflection after losing the presidency in an economy that might have

proved Obama's political undoing. They also have fallen deeper into the Senate minority after the second election in a row in which they lost potentially winnable races by fielding candidates with views that voters evidently judged too extreme.

One major topic for GOP discussion: the changing face of America.

"We've got to deal with the issue of immigration through good policy. What is the right policy if we want economic growth in America as it relates to immigration?"

said former Republican Party Chairman Haley Barbour. Obama drew support from about 70 percent of all Hispanics.

That far outpaced Romney, who said during the Republican primaries that illegal immigrants should self-deport, then spent the general elec-

tion campaign trying to move toward the political middle on the issue.

The maneuvering on the economy — the dominant issue by far in the campaign — began even before Obama boarded Air Force One to return to the White House from his home town of Chicago.

After securing a second term, the president is committed to bipartisan solutions "to reduce our deficit in a balanced way, cut taxes for middle class families and small businesses and create jobs," and he told congressional leaders as much in phone calls, the White House said.

Boehner, whose anti-tax Republicans renewed their House majority on Tuesday, said GOP legislators were "willing to accept new revenue under the right conditions." That means tax reform and economic growth rather than raising rates, he emphasized, and accompanying steps to rein in the government's big benefit programs.

"The question we should be asking is not 'which taxes should I raise to get more revenue, but rather: which reforms can we agree on that will get our economy

Long lines, confusion reveal flaws in elections

Not enough voting machines to accommodate crowds in Fla.

WASHINGTON — Even as President Barack Obama was about to give his victory speech early Wednesday, dozens of Florida voters waited in line waiting to cast ballots more than five hours after the polls officially closed. Thousands of people in Virginia, Tennessee and elsewhere also had to vote in overtime.

Well into the 21st century, it strikes many people as indefensible that the U.S. can't come up with a more streamlined and less chaotic election system. The president said as much at the very start of his speech.

"I want to thank every American who participated in this election, whether you voted for the

very first time or waited in line for a very long time," Obama said. "By the way, we have to fix that."

Easier said than done.

There's no single entity that sets the rules for voting in this country. Congress and the states enact overall election laws, but in most places it comes down to county or even city officials to actually run them. And those local systems are prone to problems.

"We have 10,000 different systems. I wish there were only 50," said Richard Hasen, a professor of law and political science at the University of California-Irvine and author of "The Voting Wars."


On Election Day there were examples in California of polls not opening on time because election workers overslept. In Ohio,

Florida and elsewhere, there weren't enough voting machines to accommodate large crowds. In other places the devices malfunctioned or jammed.

At least 19 polling places in Hawaii ran out of paper ballots. In Pennsylvania, local poll workers were giving incorrect information to hundreds of voters about whether they needed photo identification (most of them didn't).

Some people think the nation's voting system is getting worse instead of better, and that minorities such as African-Americans and Hispanics tend to bear the greatest brunt of any problems.

"There is no excuse for elections officials in many states to fumble the ball, to be unprepared for large turnouts," said Marc Mo-

rial, president of the National Urban League and former mayor of New Orleans.

That certainly appeared to be the case in Miami-Dade County.

Democrats: Seek reconciliation

CRYSTAL RIVER — Citrus County supporters of President Barack Obama are breathing easier now that their candidate was re-elected to a second four-year term.

But they acknowledge that capturing 50 percent of the popular vote is not a mandate for any particular Obama program.

Citrus County Democratic State Committeeman Mike Gudis said the vote signals the need for Obama to lead the country toward reconciliation.

"If the two parties don't get together, this country is going to be in very deep trouble financially," Gudis said. "It's up to the president to take the leadership role and tell the Republican Party as well as his own party what he wants to do."

Realtor Kevin Cunningham said he believes the fact that voters kept the Senate in Democratic control, the House of Representatives in Republican control while returning Obama to the White House

shows they want compromise.


"It spells the end of the Tea Party influence on political parties, especially on the Republican Party," he said. "The Tea Party influence is very limited now. That leaves open Republicans and Democrats can come to terms on a lot of things they couldn't come to terms before with the Tea Party people looking over their shoulder."

Roz Odell, chairwoman of the Citrus County Democratic Executive Committee, said she thought Mitt Romney's concession speech urged compromise moving forward on such issues as taxes and the deficit.

"I thought he had a very good speech," Odell said of Romney. "That was a good sign. If Republicans listen to what he said, and they should, I think things will go better."

Gudis, who attended the Democratic National Convention in Charlotte, N.C., said he believes the vote indicates that Americans want Obama and Congress to work

Republicans: Time to refocus

CRYSTAL RIVER — Republicans in Citrus County joined GOP faithful throughout the country in wondering Wednesday how their presidential election went so wrong.

Some blamed a fussy electorate; others said the party is headed in

the wrong direction.

Debbie Ressler, a volunteer who supported Mitt Romney in 2008 and again this year, said her candidate won the Republican primary with a strong conservative belief and then shifted his politics toward the center to gain moderate votes.



moving again?" the Ohio Republican said at the Capitol.

While both the president and Boehner sent signals of bipartisanship, there remain wide differences between the two on specifics. At the same time, each man has something of a postelection mandate, given Obama's reelection and the Republicans' successful defense of their House majority.

The reference to a balanced approach to deficit reduction reflected Obama's campaign-long call for higher taxes on incomes above \$200,000 for individuals and \$250,000 for couples.

That was something Boehner made plain he opposes.

Senate Majority Leader

Harry Reid, D-Nev., told reporters that any solution should include higher taxes on "the richest of the rich." That was in keeping with Obama's election platform, which calls for the expiration of tax cuts on higher-income earners.

Barring legislation to avoid the "fiscal cliff" by year's end, taxes are on course to rise by more than \$500 billion in 2013, and spending is to be cut by an additional \$130 billion or so, totals that would increase over a decade. The blend is designed to rein in the federal debt, but officials in both parties warn it poses a grave threat to an economic recovery that has been halting at best.

Obama and congressional leaders in both parties say they want an alternative, but serious compromise talks were non-existent during the fierce campaign season.

That ended Tuesday in an election in which more than 119 million votes were cast, mostly without controversy despite dire predictions of politically charged recounts and lawsuits while the presidency hung in the balance.

Obama won the popular vote narrowly, the electoral vote comfortably, and the battleground states where the campaign was principally waged, in a landslide.

The president carried seven of the nine states where he, Romney and their allies spent nearly \$1 billion on television commercials, winning Ohio, Wisconsin, Iowa, New Hampshire, Nevada, Colorado and Virginia.

The Republican challenger won North Carolina, and Florida remained too close to call.

Obama also turned back late moves by Republicans in Pennsylvania, Michigan

and Minnesota.

Hispanics account for a larger share of the population than the national average in Nevada and Colorado, two of the closely contested battleground states. The president's outsized majority among Hispanics — in the range of 70 percent according to Election Day interviews with voters — helped him against a challenger who called earlier in the year for self-deportation of illegal immigrants.

Other factors in crucial states:

■ In Virginia, the black vote was roughly half again as big in percentage terms as nationally.

■ In Ohio, roughly 60 percent of all voters said they favored the Obama administration's auto bailout, and the president captured nearly three quarters of their votes.

where extremely long lines of voters at the 7 p.m. poll-closing time meant ballots were still being cast well after 1 a.m. Wednesday. Democratic operatives even brought pizza to voters to keep them from giving up. County officials blamed an exceedingly long ballot for the problems.

Voters also endured long lines in several urban Tennessee counties and in South Carolina, where some people waited four hours. In some places in Virginia, the final votes were not cast until after 11 p.m. Long lines were also reported in Rhode Island, Montana and other states.

It was a frustrating experience for Fred Gonda, a 64-year-old retired Memphis teacher. He said his long-time address was incorrectly listed and he was forced to cast a provisional ballot he feared might not count.

"It's such an important election, how hard is it to check addresses and stuff before they send the stuff out, especially for people who have been voting here for 30 years?" Gonda said.

Voting experts say political tampering with elections is a major cause of chaos and ballot problems, particularly this year. Several states tried to enact new photo ID laws, while others wanted to change early voting rules, purge rolls of supposedly ineligible voters or alter the

timing of voter registration.

These and other changes can confuse voters and make elections more difficult to administer. And opponents, including many voting access and civil rights groups, saw the changes as attempts by Republicans to disenfranchise minority groups who overwhelmingly supported Obama and other Democrats.

"Politics should be competitive and it is a team sport. We want that," said Edward Foley, who runs the election law program at Ohio State University. "Partisanship doesn't work if you're fighting over the rules of the game."

Opponents of the new election laws, many of which were blocked or blunted by the courts, said they may have had an oppo-

site effect by boosting enthusiasm among groups who believed their right to vote was being threatened. That in turn could have boosted turnout in many places.

The way America votes is changing, however. Tens of millions of people took advantage of early voting and mail-in absentee ballots — in some states, a third or more ballots were cast well before Election Day. Oregon and Washington use entirely mail-in voting systems.

Some people think email or secure Internet voting may be the wave of the future. But not yet.

"That might be something to dream of down the road," Foley said. "I would hope that a goal will be to come up with a rational set of days and hours and locations."

ney would defeat Barack Obama by a narrow margin. She was happy to see Citrus voters back Romney but disappointed with the Florida showing, which is leaning toward Obama though the race was still too close to call at deadline.

"They need to refocus on what their platform is," Ressler said, referring to the Republican Party. "They need to stick with what is of importance. They pick issues that relate to such a small portion of the electorate. Let's talk about jobs and the economy. Planned Parenthood is important but it shouldn't be one of the top four or five issues."

Ressler felt certain Rom-

ican Executive Committee, said the Republican Party has become so exclusionary that it alienated voters.

"The Republicans have lost sight that Americans are tolerant people," Grant said. "Our first inclination is to love our neighbor, not question them and not have them feel put upon."

Grant said he has two African-American sons who feel on occasion as though the party dismisses their ideals because of their skin color.

"I'm always concerned when any minority feels as though the party I love, the party of Lincoln, doesn't recognize and doesn't appreciate the diversity of their

opinions," he said. "We are not perceived as inclusive."

Dick Windle, also a former county Republican Party chairman, backed Herman Cain and then Newt Gingrich before Romney took the Republican nomination. He said he was surprised by the vote.

"I thought we had a little more sense in this country," he said. "It seems there are a sufficient number of people who want to be part of the hand-out generation."

Gov. Scott says no more tuition hikes

SARASOTA — Florida Gov. Rick Scott is putting the state's universities on notice: He wants to keep tuition rates down and he plans to tie their money to how well they do on helping students get a job.

Scott made that point clear during an hour-long session Wednesday with the panel that oversees the state's 12 public universities. He called tuition a "tax" and noted that a majority of Floridians earn less than \$50,000 a year.

"I'm concerned about tuition, I think it's a positive that our tuition is lower than in other states," Scott said. "I want to make sure we continue to have a state where we have lower taxes and a lower cost of living."

Florida's tuition and fees averages \$6,140 a year for undergraduate residents, which is below the national average.

In recent years universities, which have endured several years of budget cuts, have used tuition hikes to make up the difference.

Street to close for repairs

The city of Crystal River will close a section of County Road 495/Citrus Avenue from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. today. The street will be closed between Crystal Street and U.S. 19 to repair a pedestrian crosswalk. Detours around the repair activities will be posted.

Road improvement project hits 'snag'

At Wednesday's Inverness city council meeting, Tom Dick, assistant city manager, informed the council of a "snag" in the plans for road improvement projects for Forest Drive.

Whereas the project had once qualified for funding through a Florida Department of Transportation grant, it no longer qualifies due to a decision made by the U.S. Congress to discontinue the Federal Transportation Enhancement Program and replace it with the MAP-21 Transportation Alternatives Program.

"The FDOT will still pay us to design the project, but if we accept that, we will have to do the improvements with our own source funding within the next 10 years," Dick said. "Rather than to commit to that, what we decided we would do is to research more into MAP-21 ... we don't wish this project to go away, but we also can't commit to funding that we don't have in the budget."

The Forest Drive project is delayed, but not scrapped.

No action was required of city council.

Residents will soon be reminded the county offers a discount prescription card, as it has a new incentive to get people to use it: \$1 per prescription for county coffers.

"There are two options available with this program as far as increased benefits to prescribers or the money coming back — a dollar per prescription," said Commissioner John "JJ" Kenney at Tuesday's meeting of the Citrus County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC).

Kenney asked Amy Engelken, assistant community services director, to give details.

"Back in 2006 the county did join with NACo (National Association of

Counties) to provide their prescription cards," Engelken said.

At that time, NACo created the program in partnership with Caremark Rx Inc. of Nashville as a benefit for NACo members at no cost to the county, taxpayers or consumers. Caremark negotiated the discount with participating pharmacies and provided the cards at no cost.

In January, NACo started a revenue-sharing program in which the counties that participate can get a dollar for each prescription that's used with the NACo card.

"Not only do the counties get it, but 40 cents also goes to NACo," Engelken said.

If Citrus County did not join the revenue-sharing program, "they say there could be an increase in savings to the citizens of an average of

about 2 percent," Engelken said. "But that's nationwide, so there is no defining mechanism on that."

Last year, just under 12,000 prescriptions were filled through the use of the card.

"That would be \$12,000 in revenue," Engelken said.

With marketing to get more county residents to use the card, the program has the potential to generate between \$12,000 and \$36,000 for the year. Marketing was the reason for the card use not being more popular.

"Our prescriptions using this card have gone down this year as we haven't had staff to go out and market this," Engelken said. "If we decide to go this way, I will allocate staff time."

Since 2006, the discount card program has processed as many as

4,000 prescriptions a month. County residents have saved a total of \$1.7 million in prescriptions since the program's inception. Even last year's figure of less than 12,000 prescriptions represented more than \$200,000 in savings to county residents.

"Our choice is to get the buck on the prescription or the possibility of our residents getting a 2 percent break on prescriptions," Kenney said. "But it's a maybe. The buck is for real, but the 2 percent is a maybe."

Kenney moved approval to "go for the buck," and the board gave unanimous approval.

Vet looks back on life

INVERNESS — At 91, Lloyd General Shelton's gait is still ramrod straight and his mind sharp.

He has a bit of a shuffle as he walks his 3-acre property, pointing to trees that need trimming and an oasis of landscaping that requires a little weeding.

"I do all the mowing, too," Shelton said.

"My knees are not doing too good, but I played ball until I was 45 years old. I guess it caught up with me," he said.

As Citrus County observes Veterans Appreciation Week Oct. 28 to Nov. 12 — with the nation honoring those who served on Veterans Day this Sunday — Shelton, an infantryman during World War II, recalls the gamut of his life.

"My mind is always going and I always keep busy," said Shelton, who will turn 92 in February.

Before being drafted into the U.S. Army in 1942, the Kentucky native was part of a Depression-era program called the Civilian Conservation Corps, planting trees and building roads in far-flung places like Idaho.

Shelton spent the first two years of his military service stateside in Virginia, but in April 1945

he was shipped to the front lines in Europe.

He remembers going through France, which had been liberated, and heading into the central part of Germany. Shortly thereafter, Adolf Hitler committed suicide as the allied Russian forces were closing in on him.

Shelton recalls being treated like royalty after the war and upon the return of troops to the U.S.

One of his three daughters, Faye, was born hours after he boarded his ship for the front lines.

Another daughter, Gaye Stokes, who was born after the war, said she can't imagine the heartache her parents must have gone through at the time.

"They tried to tell him about my sister's birth, but the ship had already left and of course, every-

body was worried about what if something happened to him. He made it back, thankfully," Stokes said.

Shelton and his wife, Virginia, have been married since 1941.

He left the military in December 1945 and he still relishes the framed letter he got from President Harry S. Truman thanking him for his service.

After his return to the U.S., Shelton went to work in Newcastle, Ind., before a friend told him about Citrus County. He moved his family here in 1950.

"There were about 6,000 people in the entire county," he said.

After a number of endeavors including a role in a 1963 Disney movie called "The Wahoo Bobcat," Shelton joined the Citrus County Sheriff's Office as a deputy.

"We had four deputies, and you

were on call all the time," Shelton said.

He recalls being a rookie and getting involved in a shooting during an attempted arrest. The pictures show the side door of his patrol car speckled with buckshot holes.

"I was on the other side of that door," Shelton said.

A few years later, Shelton said he became CCSO's first investigator.

Shelton said he is grateful for all the cases he helped solve.

He remembers helping the Canadian authorities in the Yukon arrest and got a confession from a suspected killer just by talking to him. Last he heard, the man, after serving time in Canada, came back to the U.S. and was later arrested for more deaths out west.

Shelton first retired from CCSO in 1983, but soon re-signed as a part-time investigator until 1993 when he called it a career.

"To this day, I always think about the cases I didn't solve. It just about kills me to know that someone committed a crime, homicide, but the evidence just isn't there to make an arrest. They know and I know they did it, but just couldn't make the case," he said.

Documents shed light on Progress-Duke merger

In another twist to the Duke-Progress Energy saga, on Nov. 5 Duke Energy released nearly 1,000 pages of previously classified documents pertaining to the merger and the ouster of CEO Bill Johnson.

The disclosure had been ordered by the North Carolina Utilities Commission, which is still investigating the merger.

Earlier that day, the Tennessee Valley Authority announced Johnson had been picked to be

come president and CEO of the \$11 billion federal agency, effective Jan. 1.

Also that same day, Duke Energy filed an appeal with a North Carolina court to keep more than 600 pages of additional documents from public disclosure.

The disclosed documents provide a detailed look at internal communications in the run-up to the merger and the anticipation of Progress Energy CEO Johnson becoming Duke Energy's post-merger CEO. And there are emails from upset company leaders when Jim

Rogers emerged as the new CEO.

The Duke board of directors meeting had been called for July 2 to approve the merger. In a note from Johnson circulated by email a day before the meeting, he wrote, "We do not have great visibility into the board and governance processes and practices at Duke; as you know, we have been held at arm's length (or further) in area. ... Today's meeting is largely an organizational meeting."

A Johnson email the following day explained what happened. He was elected CEO as part of the

agenda and the meeting ended.

The lead director then called for an executive session and wanted to see him afterward.

Johnson was told the board concluded he was not the person to be CEO. Instead Rogers would keep that role and Johnson was handed a severance document. "I was quite shocked by the turn of events," he wrote.

"I am shocked and very concerned about the long-term prospects," Progress Energy board member Marie McKee wrote in an email that evening to

other board members.

In a July 5 letter to the Wall Street Journal, Progress board member John H. Mullin III wrote his board accepted the merger with the "explicit agreement that Johnson would become CEO of the combined company."

Duke's merger with Progress Energy was expected to be a topic today as Duke was to release its third quarter earnings, the first since the companies combined.

Armed robbers get long prison terms

INVERNESS — Two men accused in a string of armed robberies in early 2011 have been sentenced to lengthy

federal jail times, according to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office.

Anthony Calderon, 47, homeless, and Abelardo Coimbre, 52, were arrested Feb. 25, 2011, by sheriff's office personnel. The U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives also investigated the case.

Last Friday, U.S. District Court Judge Susan C. Bucklew of Tampa sentenced Calderon and Coimbre to 32 years and 24 years and four months respectively for armed robberies that targeted several Citrus County businesses during a four-week spree.

Calderon pleaded guilty on Aug. 12, 2012, and Coimbre pleaded guilty on Aug. 6, 2012.

According to a release by the U.S. Department of Justice, the two men were prosecuted as a part of the department's "Project Safe Neighborhoods" program—a nationwide, gun-violence reduction strategy led by ATF.

The robberies committed by Coimbre and Calderon included the Jan. 28, 2011, robbery of Inverness Liquor; a Feb. 16, 2011, rob-

bery of Bob's Liquor in Crystal River; the Feb. 23, 2011, robbery of Express Lane Food Store in Floral City; and the robbery of Brad's Food and Gas in Inverness, on Feb. 25, 2011.

According to CCSO, on Feb. 25, 2011, Calderon and Coimbre entered the BP gas station at the corner C.R. 581 and Arbor Street near the Inverness Highlands.

Both men were armed with handguns and had tried to conceal their identities. The clerk was ordered to the floor and the men reportedly took an undisclosed amount of cash, beer and cigarettes. They left the store and fled the scene in a vehicle.

Sheriff's deputies, however, were already out in force looking for the pair and a chase ensued, leading deputies throughout areas of the Highlands until the suspect vehicle crashed into a tree. One suspect was immediately apprehended, while one attempted to flee, according to CCSO.

The second suspect also was immediately arrested.

According to reports, during each of the robberies, both individuals brandished firearms and demanded money from the clerks at gunpoint.



Carmen Basilio, who beat Sugar Ray Robinson, dies*Associated Press*

ROCHESTER, N.Y. —

Carmen Basilio, a genial onion farmer's son who wrested the world middleweight boxing crown from Sugar Ray Robinson in 1957 and lost an equally epic, razor-edge rematch six months later, died Wednesday at age 85.

Edward Brophy, executive director of the Boxing Hall of Fame in upstate New York, said Basilio died at a Rochester hospital where he was being treated for pneumonia.

Basilio lived in the Rochester suburb of Irondequoit and was among the first class of hall of fame inductees in 1990, a group that includes Robinson, Muhammad Ali, Rocky Marciano, Joe Louis and Jake LaMotta.

Basilio's ferocious battles with the likes of Billy Graham and Kid Gavilan riveted a nation during the age of black-and-white television. Hindered on his ascent by a reluctance to deal with mobsters, he took the welterweight title from Tony DeMarco in 1955 and added the middleweight belt near

the close of a 13-year career. In his later years, Basilio still could conjure up dates of championship fights, the size of a purse, the name of a referee he loathed. But his mental agility had eroded, and his recollection of the round-by-round combat he waged in his climb to the top was mostly blank.

Basilio's wife, Josie, traced his decline to heart-bypass surgery in 1992. An MRI scan revealed no brain damage from his prizefighting days, which Basilio acknowledged went on too long.

Former University of Texas coach dies*Associated Press*AUSTIN, Texas — Darrell Royal, the former Texas football coach known as much for his folksy, simplistic approach to life as for his creative wishbone offenses and two national championships, has died.

Royal, who also starred as a defensive back and quarterback for the Oklahoma Sooners, didn't have a single losing season in his

23 years as a head coach at Texas, Mississippi State and Washington. During his 20 years at Texas (1957-1976), his teams boasted a 167-47-5 record — the best mark in the nation during that period. One season ended with an even record.

Texas honored Royal in 1996 by renaming the football stadium in his honor.

RED TO YELLOW

Parkway a blip, but it's on the radar

Suncoast 2 is still idling, but it's just been given a bit more gas.

In an instance of the mundane slog of progress, the West Central Florida Chairs Coordinating Committee recently ranked the parkway extension No. 7 on a list of 10 high-priority regional transportation initiatives. The committee,

comprised of members of smaller regional planning organizations and representatives of state and regional transportation authorities, is tasked with developing the paths the region's roads will take in the future.

In layman's terms, Suncoast 2 just got a seat at a bigger table. Unfortunately, for its advocates, it's got stiff competition. Ranked ahead of the parkway are projects in metropolitan areas to the south and east, including the widening of Interstate 75 from Hernando County to Sarasota, the widening of the I-4/I-275 corridor from Orlando to Pinellas County, and the renovation of U.S. 19 from Pinellas to Pasco counties.

A higher ranking would make the project more visible to regional, state and even federal planners, especially if Congress decides to make a push for nationwide infrastructure improvement. But without coordinated efforts by local planners, the rungs on that ladder might be out of reach.

In the project's favor are years of planning and studies, interest from the state Department of Transportation, increased regional demand for such a route, a foundation

chase by Duke Energy, and the merger hasn't resolved the uncertainties plaguing those projects.

That said, Suncoast 2 "is certainly more ready than some of the projects ahead of it," Citrus County Transportation Planning Organization consultant Bob Clifford recently told the TPO while discussing the committee's rankings. Clifford also urged the TPO to press talks with the Hernando County Metropolitan Planning Organization about efforts to merge the two organizations, which would give the combined entity more clout.

If the TPO wants to see the parkway extension through to fruition, its path is clear: Lobby, lobby, lobby. Its voice has been heard, but it's contending with a chorus. And because we think Suncoast 2 would be a boon to Citrus County, we're lobbying the TPO to do just that.

This horrific procedure is commonly done to dogs used to hunt or to fight in a pit. Colton is a pit bull, sometimes known as a terrier, of various breeds.

After a veterinarian exam, including treatment for worms and necessary puppy shots, Colton was adopted by his rescuer who couldn't resist the pathetic, squirmy little dog. Now neutered and strong, favorite times include rough housing with sister, Kimber, a shepherd mix rescue, especially in the snow. Getting attention is not a treat, but the norm.

Colton still likes to snuggle for warmth against the human who rescued him, even at 60 pounds. He doesn't know he has no ears, that

he is neutered, or that his hips don't always work quite right. He does know to be loyal, loveable, and happy.

More stories could end this way, but it means having your pet spayed or neutered; not letting them breed, not even one time. One dumped, abandoned, forgotten little Colton is absolutely one too many.

Motive unclear in Fresno shooting

FRESNO, Calif. — That Lawrence Jones targeted a handful of his co-workers at a chicken-processing plant, killing two of them execution-style, was evident, authorities said. But why he did it remained unclear.

"He had opportunity to shoot other co-workers that were in the business at this time, but he chose not to," Fresno Police Chief Jerry Dyer said. "He walked around them in order to get very close to the intended targets, place the gun very close and fire a round."

Clattering machinery at the plant provided all the cover he needed for the shooting Tuesday, leaving two dead and wounding two others, authorities said. Jones opened fire at a fifth person but ran out of bullets, police said, although he later reloaded and shot himself in the head.

Calif. backs big tax hike

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — California Gov. Jerry Brown took a big step toward delivering on a campaign promise he made two years ago to fix the state's perpetual budget deficits and to raise taxes to do it only if voters agreed.

Brown said voters put their trust in his plan during Tuesday's election by approving Proposition 30, which raises the statewide sales tax and boosts income taxes on the wealthy.

The changes will provide \$6 billion to balance the state budget.

Brown, a Democrat, said Wednesday that Proposition 30 will put California on a course to fiscal stability after five years of battering by the recession.

Penn State ex-prez Spanier arraigned

HARRISBURG, Pa. — Former Penn State president Graham Spanier was arraigned and released on bail at a brief court appearance Wednesday on charges he lied about and concealed child sex abuse allegations involving former assistant football coach Jerry Sandusky.

Spanier, accompanied by his wife, signed paperwork after his bail was set at \$125,000, but he was not required to post any of that amount. He was ordered to forfeit his passport and be fingerprinted. He didn't enter a plea.

Pharmacy board director fired

BOSTON — The Massachusetts pharmacy board's director has been fired for ignoring a complaint that a company linked to a deadly meningitis outbreak was shipping drugs in bulk, in violation of its state license.

The Colorado pharmacy board complained about the New England Compounding Center in July, before the third of three batches of tainted steroids linked to the outbreak was shipped.

After receiving the report, director James D. Coffey told Colorado officials that the Board of Registration in Pharmacy would "respond as soon as possible following a thorough analysis of the report."

After election, 'fiscal cliff' looms

WASHINGTON — So just what is this "fiscal cliff" that has the financial markets rattled and economists and policymakers alike in a tizzy over the potential for sending the economy into another tailspin?

It's a one-two punch of expiring Bush-era tax cuts and major across-the-board spending cuts to the Pentagon and domestic programs that could total \$800 billion next year, based on Congressional Budget Office estimates.

The cliff is the punishment for previous failures of a bitterly-divided Congress and White House to deal with the government's spi-

raling debt or overhaul its unwieldy tax code.

The largest component of the cliff comes with the expiration of tax cuts enacted in 2001 and 2003 and extended two years ago in the wake of President Barack Obama's drubbing in the 2010 midterm elections.

It also includes sharp spending cuts imposed as a consequence of the failure of last year's deficit-reduction supercommittee to reach agreement. There are other elements, chiefly a 2 percentage point cut in payroll taxes orchestrated by Obama and unemployment benefits for the long-term jobless that would disappear.

Specifically, the fiscal cliff includes:

■ The expiration of Bush-era tax cuts on income, investments, married couples and families with children and inheritances.

■ A \$55 billion, 9 percent cut in defense spending next year and another \$55 billion in cuts to domestic programs, including a 2 percent cut to Medicare providers.

■ The expiration of unemployment benefits for the long-term jobless and a sharp cut in reimbursements for doctors participating in Medicare.

■ The expiration of Obama's temporary 2 percentage point cut in payroll taxes.

■ The imposition of the alternative minimum tax on

some 26 million households, which would raise their taxes by an average of \$3,700.

■ A variety of smaller taxes cuts for both businesses and individuals collectively known as tax "extenders" in Washington-speak. They include a tax credit for research and development and a deduction for sales taxes in states that don't have an income tax.

A Congressional Budget Office study in May estimated that the fiscal cliff would force tax hikes and spending cuts totaling over \$600 billion in the first nine months of next year — or perhaps \$800 billion or so over the entire year if allowed to stay in effect.

Greece passes austerity bill

ATHENS, Greece — Greece's Parliament narrowly passed a crucial austerity bill early Thursday, in a vote that left the coalition government reeling from dissent as it struggles to secure vital bailout funds.

The bill, which will further slash pensions and salaries, passed 153-128 in the 300-member Parliament. It came hours after rioters rampaged outside Parliament during an 80,000-strong anti-austerity demonstration, clashing with riot police who responded with tear gas, stun grenades and water cannon.

Approval of the cuts and tax rises worth \$17 billion over two years was a big step for Greek efforts to secure the next installment of its international rescue funds, and stave off imminent bankruptcy.

Puerto Rico votes for statehood

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Puerto Ricans have supported U.S. statehood in a vote that jubilant members of the pro-statehood party say is the strongest sign yet that the Caribbean island territory is on the road to losing its second-class status.

But Tuesday's vote comes with an asterisk and an imposing political reality: The island remains bitterly divided over its relationship to the United States and many question the validity of this week's referendum.

Nearly a half million voters chose to leave a portion of the ballot blank. And voters also ousted the pro-statehood governor, eliminating one of the main advocates for a cause that would need the approval of the U.S. Congress.

Britain presses allies on Syria

BEIRUT — Britain called on the U.S. and other allies Wednesday to do more to shape the Syrian opposition into a coherent force, saying the re-election of President Barack Obama is an opportunity for the world to take stronger action to end the deadlocked civil war.

Also Wednesday, Turkey said NATO members — including the United States — have discussed using Patriot missiles along the Syrian border. It was unclear whether the purpose was to protect a safe zone inside Syria or to protect Turkey from Syrian regime attacks.

The announcements come as U.S. allies appear to be anticipating a new, bolder approach from Obama now that he has won a second term.

Voters in 2 states back legalization, but what happens now?

DENVER — First came marijuana as medicine. Now comes legal pot for the people.

Those who have argued for decades that legalizing and taxing weed would be better than a costly, failed U.S. drug war have their chance to prove it, as Colorado and Washington became the first states to allow pot for recreational use.

While the measures earned support from broad swaths of the electorate in both states Tuesday, they are likely to face resistance from federal drug warriors. As of Wednesday, authorities did not say whether they would challenge the new laws.

Pot advocates say a fight is exactly what they want.

"I think we are at a tipping point

on marijuana policy," said Brian Vicente, co-author of Colorado's marijuana measure. "We are going to see whether marijuana prohibition survives, or whether we should try a new and more sensible approach."

Soon after the measures passed, cheering people poured out of bars in Denver, the tangy scent of pot filling the air, and others in Seattle lit up in celebration.

Authorities in Colorado, however, urged caution. "Federal law still says marijuana is an illegal drug, so don't break out the Cheetos or Goldfish too quickly," said Democratic Gov. John Hickenlooper, who opposed the measure.

As the initial celebration dies down and the process to implement the laws progresses over the next year, other states and countries will

be watching to see if the measures can both help reduce money going to drug cartels and raise it for governments.

Governments in Latin America where drugs are produced for the U.S. market were largely quiet about the measures, but the main adviser to Mexico's president-elect said the new laws will force the U.S. and his country to reassess how they fight cross-border pot smuggling.

Analysts said that there would likely be an impact on cartels in Mexico that send pot to the U.S., but differed on how soon and how much.

Both measures call for the drug to be heavily taxed, with the profits headed to state coffers. Colorado would devote the potential tax revenue first to school construction, while Washington's sends pot taxes to an array of health programs.

Gay marriage backers snap losing streak

At least two states vote to recognize it; ban rejected in Minnesota

NEW YORK — For years, foes of same-sex marriage had a potent talking point: They'd won every time the issue went to a popular vote. That winning streak has now been shattered in a multi-state electoral sweep by gay marriage supporters — a historic tipping point likely to influence other states and possibly even the Supreme Court.

"It's an astounding day," said Kevin Cathcart of the gay-rights group Lambda Legal, recalling that in 2004 alone the gay-marriage movement went 0-13 in statewide elections and was 0-32 overall since 1998. In Tuesday's voting, however, Maine and Maryland became the first states ever to

approve same-sex marriage by popular vote. Washington state seemed poised to follow suit, although slow ballot-counting there continued Wednesday. And in Minnesota, voters rejected a proposal to place a ban on gay marriage in the state constitution, a step taken in past elections in 30 other states.

"The anti-gay opposition kept moving the goal posts and had as their last talking point that we could not win a popular vote," said Evan Wolfson, president of the advocacy group Freedom to Marry. "Last night, voters in Maine, Maryland, Minnesota, and, all signs suggest, Washington proved them wrong, wrong, wrong and wrong."

Heading into the election, gay marriage was legal in six

states and the District of Columbia, in each case due to legislation or court orders rather than popular vote. Activists said Tuesday's results will likely spur pushes for same-sex marriage in states that already have established civil unions for gay couples — including Illinois, Rhode Island, Hawaii and Delaware.

Democratic takeovers of both legislative chambers in Colorado and Minnesota may also prompt moves there to extend legal recognition to same-sex couples. In each state, the Democratic governors, John Hickenlooper of Colorado and Mark Dayton of Minnesota, would support such efforts. In Minnesota, state Sen. Scott Dibble, who is openly

gay, is among several Democratic lawmakers uncertain if an immediate push for gay marriage makes political sense. But Dibble, who is 47, said of himself and his partner: "We'll be married in Minnesota in our lifetime."

Whatever happens at the statehouse level, the U.S. Supreme Court is also likely to become a pivotal battleground in the next phase of the gay-marriage debate.

The justices are expected to confront same-sex marriage in some form during the current term.

Several pending cases challenge a provision of the 1996 Defense of Marriage Act that deprives same-sex couples of federal benefits available to heterosexual couples.

Rolle, Iwaniec garner FACA all-district honors

Panthers head man named coach of the year

A Citrus County head coach and player are each represented among the 2012 Florida Athletic Coaches Association's (FACA) All-District selections. Second-year Lecanto coach McKinley Rolle was voted the FACA District 8,

Class 6A coach of the year while Seven Rivers Christian senior John Iwaniec was selected as one of the district's two first-team running backs.

Iwaniec wrapped up an extraordinary four years as a Warrior on Friday in his team's 41-0 loss against Master's Academy. The senior rushed for 74 yards to help him surpass the 1,800-yard mark for

the second straight season. Iwaniec carried the ball 203 times for 1,827 yards in 2012 while totaling 16 TDs and eight successful two-point conversion runs. His four-year rushing totals exceeded 5,600 yards.

Rolle's Panthers (5-4) were awarded a fifth win this week due to Vanguard having to forfeit its 48-0 victory over the Panthers for playing an

ineligible player in the team's Oct. 26 meeting. Lecanto has previously twice won five games in a season — in 1987 and 1999 — and looks to match 2001's team-record six wins after its rivalry contest at Crystal River on Friday.

"I give all the credit to the players and coaching staff," Rolle said of the FACA distinction. "They've worked hard, and my success is their success. It's a team, it's a family and it's a program, and I'm proud of that."

spective playoff races last week in district defeats, but both squads have more to play for as the season tumbles toward its end.

BBWAA finalists for baseball awards

NEW YORK — Triple Crown winner Miguel Cabrera is one of five finalists for the AL MVP award in voting by the Baseball Writers Association of America.

The Detroit third baseman is joined by Texas' Adrian Beltre and Josh Hamilton, the New York Yankees' Robinson Cano, and Los Angeles Angels rookie Mike Trout, who also is one of three nominees for AL Rookie of the Year.

For the first time Wednesday, the BBWAA announced finalists for its awards. The winners will be revealed next week live on the MLB Network, beginning Monday with the two rookies of the year and concluding Thursday with the MVPs.

Milwaukee's Ryan Braun has a chance for a repeat as NL MVP. He's pitted against San Diego's Chase Headley, Pittsburgh's Andrew McCutchen, St. Louis' Yadier Molina and San Francisco's Buster Posey.

Mets knuckleballer R.A. Dickey is among the three finalists for the NL Cy Young Award. Washington's Gio Gonzalez and 2011 winner Clayton Kershaw of the Dodgers are also competing.

Swanson scored both goals for the Pirates against the visiting Rattlers, and the senior striker already has six goals on the season. The contest got chippy at times, with one ejection and numerous yellow cards.

"Bellevue is a good team. We're good to come through with this win tonight," Swanson said.

The Rattlers fired 13 shots, 10 of which were on goal, forcing Crystal River sophomore goal keeper Kyle Kidd to make nine saves for Crystal River.

Bellevue's lone goal came on a penalty kick which tied the game at 1-1, after defender Redondo Beauplan was tripped in the Crystal River penalty area in the 8th minute. Kidd guessed right on Beauplan's shot to the right, but the ball went just under his outstretched arms.

For the second straight game, the Pirates scored in the first two minutes of the game, with Swanson breaking toward the goal early on from a nice lead pass by defender Andrew Dyakon, and drilling it left corner past Bellevue keeper Shy Smoker.

Smoker finished with one save on the seven shots he faced.

On a goal kick by Kidd at the 7:30 mark of the first half, forward Cliff Guyett deftly headed the ball at midfield through two defenders to Swanson, who streaked on goal and booted it past Smoker. Perhaps rattled by the second goal, Bellevue players began letting their frustrations boil over, with Rattlers forward Sam Tate red-carded in the second half for language.

Players on both sides were yellow carded for pushing and shoving. Backed by solid defending, midfield play and Kidd's goal keeping, the Pirates held on to the one-goal victory.

This fishing tournament was one of many fundraisers held throughout the community. It has been nothing short of amazing to see how Citrus County and the surrounding areas have taken in one of their own

and offered assistance.

When Paula Holtclaw called me and floated the idea of putting on a tournament to raise money, there wasn't much of a thought given to it. Of course we'll put on a tournament and raise money, I thought.

I've never met Josh, but what better cause could there be? It's a small way to show our appreciation and thanks for a sacrifice most of us will never fully understand.

After making the decision to get involved, the first call I made was to U.S. Marine Paul Pilney of the Marine Corps League Citrus Detachment #819.

I remember exactly what Paul said: "Matt, what can we do to help?"

Not really knowing what to expect when I called, I simply told him what we needed — dollars.

Paul said he'd give me a call back. I took that to mean I'd hear from him later in the week, perhaps the next week.

Thirty minutes later, he called me back with a \$1,000 donation from his detachment. Talk about a great way to get a fundraiser started!

One thing I learned through the weeks of working on this tournament is that Marines get things

done. They did everything exactly when and where they said they would. I have a new-found respect for these warriors.

With a great start to our fundraiser, pleas were made throughout the community and the donations began to come in.

Paula worked tirelessly to garner donations for the fund and coordinate the event. She displayed endless energy and truly was the straw that stirred the drink for the benefit.

The *Chronicle* was supportive in allowing us to spread the word in its pages, too.

Most of these folks have never met this Marine. They simply gave because it meant something special to them. It's a real blessing to live here where so many people are truly kind to one another.

There were other types of donations, not just money.

My buddy Steve Naas arrived at the tournament site 16 hours before the anglers were going to start their day. His plan was to cook all night. He towed his giant smoker to the ramp facility and set up to prepare a hog. Others donated equipment, time and knowhow and every donation was appreciated and all of it was important to the success of the event.

When tournament day arrived, I showed up at the tournament site at 3 a.m. to be greeted by several trucks and trailers waiting to register. As time passed, more and more trucks, boats and anglers arrived.

Fishing clinic for ladies in Crystal River

If you're female and want to learn about fishing,

now's your big chance — and it's free. The Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission will hold its Third Annual Women's Fishing Clinic in Crystal River, at the Fort Island Trail Park, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 17.

Classes will be limited to 20 participants and pre-registration is required. These clinics, held at various venues throughout the state, have

marine ecosystems," according to FWC.

A noble goal, and, along the way, the instructors aim to teach fundamental saltwater fishing skills and provide a positive fishing experience.

You get to learn about Florida's marine ecosystems, learn the basics of saltwater fishing, and enjoy some time away from the hustle and bustle of life while demonstrating to local finfish species you are a force to be reckoned with; and it's all free.

If you have fishing gear, take it along, but FWC will loan gear to those who don't and provide bait. Yeah, that means you'll actually get to fish, if conditions allow, from the adjacent fishing pier. No fish dinner, however, as it's all catch-and-release.

■ ■ ■

This changeable weather, with its swings of temperature, can post a challenge to inshore anglers. Deeper pockets of water will retain overnight much of the heat they absorb during the day, so that's where you'll find them at daybreak; in the

deeper areas that are fringed by shallow grass flats. This last is important, because as the sun climbs and its rays are shining more and more directly into those shallows, the opposite will be true insofar as warmth is concerned; the flats will heat more quickly than those holes, and the snook and trout, especially, will move onto them to feed. This will be seen with reds, as well, but to a lesser degree; redfish are more tolerant of relatively cool waters than either snook or trout.

Knowing this, Captain William Toney has been taking his clients well into the back country and fishing in the deeper troughs and holes. This is just one reason scouting trips in the winter are important; the extreme winter tides will let you mark deeper areas on your charts so you can find them when the tides are more moderate. Be careful about noise and commotion when approaching these areas, as it doesn't take much to spook the fish. Shut down the engine and use your trolling motor well before coming into casting range. If you're using a pushpole, be careful not to drag it over a rocky bottom,

and avoid splashes when sticking it in the water. Talking is fine (contrary to common belief), but avoid any noise that can be transmitted through the water.

Toney said the hot baits in

these holes have been D.O.A. Deadly Combos, MirrOlure plastics and the MirrOdine swimming plug (which is rapidly becoming my "go-to" swimmer). He said in one hole his clients had a slam

with a 30-inch red, a 26-inch snook and a large trout.

No. 8 FSU expects Virginia Tech's best shot

When No. 8 Florida State and Virginia Tech meet Thursday night only the Seminoles will be playing for high stakes.

The Hokies (4-5, 2-3 Atlantic Coast Conference) are in the midst of their worst season in 20 years and fighting just to become bowl eligible.

It's exactly the kind of setup Florida State quarterback E.J. Manuel has warned his teammates about this week — a struggling team putting its best effort forward on a big stage.

"I think I saw that a little bit in the N.C. State game," Manuel said of Florida State's lone loss, 17-16 at N.C. State on Oct. 6. "Not to say that we took them lightly, but they played lights out, they had a good game. ... If they get a chance to knock us off, it will kind of make their season."

The Hokies have three games remaining, and need to win two to qualify for a bowl game for the 20th consecutive season. They still have games against Boston College and Virginia, but beating the Seminoles would be a big boost.

And despite how frustrating the season has been, Hokies cornerback Kyle Fuller knows they have the talent to win.

"I know what we can do," Fuller said. "I'm not feeling sorry for us. We can't settle. We've let a lot of games get away from us this season. We can't settle with that. We

have to improve and gain back those games that we lost. This would be a great one to do it."

The Hokies and Seminoles (8-1, 5-1) have split four meetings since Virginia Tech joined the ACC in 2004, each winning once

when the matchups came in the ACC championship game. The Hokies have never seen a Seminoles team as accomplished as

they will this time.

It starts with Manuel, who hails from Virginia Beach. He's completing 70 percent of his passes this season and has thrown for 16 touchdowns and just four interceptions. He also makes plays with his feet as Clemson learned when he threw for 380 yards and ran for 102 more in a 49-37 victory on Sept. 22.

With the very efficient

Manuel at the controls, the Seminoles rank third nationally with an average of nearly 45 points per game. Making the challenge more daunting, they allow just 227 yards per game, best in the country, and rank in the top four in rushing defense, passing defense and scoring defense (12 ppg).

A stout defense is the last thing the Hokies need to see.

NHL labor talks resume today

NEW YORK — Negotiations between the NHL and the locked-out players' association ended after nearly six hours Wednesday. Just as they did a night earlier, the sides agreed to get right back to the bargaining table.

Representatives for the owners and players will resume talks Thursday, marking the third straight day they will meet face-to-face. NHL deputy commissioner Bill Daly and union special counsel Steve Fehr also met alone Saturday when in-person talks restarted for the first time since Oct. 18.

The sides met for a total of about 13 hours over Tuesday and Wednesday at an undisclosed location in New York. Neither side offered any details of what was discussed on Wednesday.

"The NHLPA and the NHL met today to discuss many of the key issues," NHLPA executive director Donald Fehr said in a statement. "We look forward to resuming talks (Thursday)."

Daly also was reserved after the talks ended for the day.

"Not providing any specifics on today's meetings," Daly said in an email to The Associated Press.

On the 53rd day of the

lockout, the sides discussed revenue sharing between teams and held talks on the "make-whole" provision, which involves the payment of player contracts that are already in effect.

Those hot-button topics are scheduled to be on Thursday's agenda, too.

Eight players were in attendance for Wednesday's talks, but a handful of players — including Pittsburgh Penguins captain Sidney Crosby — who took part Tuesday left New York to try to avoid an impending storm that brought snow to the area, the union said.

There was already common ground before negotiations began Tuesday. The players' union adhered to the league's request to keep the meeting location a secret. With no outside distractions, the sides talked from afternoon until night.

Once they broke for the day, neither side gave any hint of what was discussed or if progress was made, but both pointed to the next round of talks.

Steve Fehr met with Daly on Saturday, and neither provided many details of what was discussed, but both agreed that the meeting was productive.

Time is becoming a bigger factor every day a deal isn't

reached. The lockout, which went into effect Sept. 16 after the previous collective bargaining agreement expired, has already forced the cancellation of 327 regular-season games — including the New Year's Day outdoor Winter Classic in Michigan.

Whether any of the games that have been called off through Nov. 30 can be rescheduled if an agreement is made soon hasn't been determined. But the NHL has already said that a full 82-game season won't be played.

Back in October, the players' association responded to an NHL offer with three of its own, but all of those were quickly dismissed by the league — leading to nearly three weeks without face-to-face discussions. Daly and Steve Fehr kept in regular contact by phone and agreed to meet last weekend.

Both sides have made proposals that included a 50-50 split of hockey-related revenues.

The NHL has moved toward the players' side in the contentious issue of the "make-whole" provision and whose share of the economic pie that money will come from. But work will still need to be done to get an agreement.

Surging Colts show up in prime time

Indianapolis goes to Jacksonville for tonight's NFL game

Andrew Luck quickly is erasing the pain of the divorce with Peyton Manning for Colts fans. Now, he and the suddenly playoff-contending Colts head to Jacksonville, where just about everything with the Jaguars is painful.

The Colts (5-3) have won three straight and four of five to firmly plant themselves in the AFC wild-card picture. Luck comes off one of the great quarterbacking games for any rookie, ever — better, even, than Manning managed with Indianapolis in 1998. He completed 30 of 48 passes for 433 yards and two touchdowns for a 105.6 quarterback rating in the victory over Miami. The 433 yards set an NFL single-game record by a rookie quarterback, and Luck became the only rookie aside from Manning with four 300-yard passing games.

Indianapolis has risen to 12th in the AP Pro32 rankings and is a 3-point favorite against No. 31 Jacksonville (1-7).

It's a nice matchup for Indy, which has been stingy on defense lately and timely on offense. Defensive leader Dwight Freeney wants everyone, especially the younger players — and there are plenty of them on the roster — to take things in stride.

"They're experiencing it for the first time and it's up to the older guys to kind of keep them, 'all right, look, it's about this week, who cares what happened last week, who cares how many games we've won in a row, it doesn't matter,'" Freeney said. "We have to get this victory coming up."

Jacksonville ranks last in total offense, has scored 117 points, 16 fewer than any other team, and has dropped five in a row. But the Jaguars, 6-21 in their last 27 games, have three of those wins against the Colts, including their only victory in 2012, 22-17 in Week 3.

Nearly three dozen Colts shaved their heads in a show of support for coach Chuck Pagano, who is undergoing treatment for leukemia. The best way to show support is to keep winning.

Manziel among freshmen having huge impact in SEC

ST. LOUIS — Cam Newton's Southeastern Conference record for career rushing yards by a quarterback is in danger. It should come as no surprise the player mounting the challenge will be a teenager for only another month.

Precocious, prolific and elusive, Texas A&M redshirt freshman Johnny Manziel is third on the list with 922 yards. With four regular-season games plus a bowl game to go, he's just 85 yards shy of becoming No. 2 overall and is in striking range of the 1,473-yard standard set by Newton, the No. 1 overall NFL draft pick out of Auburn in 2011.

Manziel's far from the only instant contributor in a conference that has produced the past six national champions and has seven of the top 11 schools in this week's AP Top 25. To those in charge of the depth chart, it's simply a sign of the times.

"From the running backs at Georgia to the quarterback at A&M, just so many young guys have come in and played very, very well," Auburn coach Gene Chizik said. "It just goes back to the level of talent that people are recruiting in this league."

"Pretty much every week,

you play somebody that's got a young guy that's contributed and contributed very well."

That includes top-ranked Alabama, which has a number of high-profile freshmen.

Running back T.J. Yeldon caught the game-winning touchdown pass against LSU on a 28-yard screen last week and leads the Tide in rushing while averaging 7 yards per carry. Amari Cooper has a team-leading 32 receptions, 12 more than anyone else, to go with team highs of 472 yards and five TDs.

"More and more guys have the expectation of playing early on," coach Nick Saban said. "Maybe it's just some of the attention they get in high school now in terms of recruiting and playing in all-star games and things like that."

"The players that have the maturity to understand what it takes to learn and grow and try to be a complete player at their position and go about it that way, they obviously have the ability to play."

Yeldon is following in the illustrious footsteps of a pair of first-round NFL draft picks. Mark Ingram, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner, had 728 yards rushing and 12 touchdowns as a freshman, and 2011 Heis-

man finalist Trent Richardson had 751 yards rushing and eight TDs.

Cooper is the most heralded Alabama wide receiver since Julio Jones, and Saban has said fellow freshman Chris Black would have been on the two-deep roster if he hadn't been hurt before the season. Freshman backup Kenyan Drake has a 7.1-yard average and five TDs on 20 carries.

"In a lot of cases, the guys that play have the maturity to play and the guys that don't have a hard time with the consistency part of it, learning what to do and not getting frustrated," Saban said. "I think there are more and more guys that are more ready. I think it's just a sign of their maturity."

It's no surprise that some of the bottom-end schools are immediately plugging in

the youngsters, with six freshmen starting at one-win Kentucky and five at two-win Auburn. The Wildcats have one of the youngest teams in the nation, a scenario that didn't prevent coach Joker Phillips from getting fired.

Yet No. 7 Georgia also leans heavily on the kids. Counting a return man, kicker and punter, the Bulldogs have a league-high seven freshmen starting.

Todd Gurley is second in the conference with 95 yards per game, tied for second in scoring with 66 points and third in all-purpose yardage.

Fellow freshman and roommate Keith Marshall had a career-best 164 yards rushing and two TDs against Tennessee.

Georgia punter Collin Barber and kicker Marshall Morgan are freshmen.

Manziel is among five freshmen starting for 15th-ranked Texas A&M. He's second in the nation in total offensive yards, leads the SEC in rushing and is sec-

ond in yards passing directing a unit that's expanded the complexities as the quarterback gains understanding. He's also among 39 freshmen listed as starters.

"We certainly have more offense at our disposal now," coach Kevin Sumlin said. "It's just growth, No. 1 and No. 2, it's comfort level with Johnny being able to handle it."

"Defenses in this league are pretty complex and it's not necessarily what you think you can handle as a coach, but what you think your players can handle."

No freshman are starting regularly for No. 7 UF, but several have played key roles.

Defensive tackle D.J. Humphries, considered the top offensive line recruit in the country last year, started last week against Missouri and played well in place of Xavier Nixon. Three others have appeared in all nine games on defense, ends Dante Fowler Jr. and Jonathan Bullard, and linebacker Antonio Morrison.

The Twitterverse took quick notice and began cracking wise.

Her name was soon trending with unflattering posts, while a new Twitter handle, Drunk Diane Sawyer, collected hundreds of followers. An ABC spokesman did not comment.

"A bit tipsy," and "hammed" were among the jeering explanations.

Some tweeters joked a more fun-loving Sawyer was a ploy by ABC to boost viewership. Several Twitter followers said they were drawn to the network by word that Sawyer was behaving, by one description, "a bit wacky."

Trump deletes parts of Twitter tirade

LOS ANGELES — Donald Trump has deleted some of the Twitter tirade he posted following President Barack Obama's re-election and added new critiques of NBC's Brian Williams.

Trump began tweeting before the election was called that it was "a total sham and a travesty."

He posted more than 10 angry tweets, declaring "our nation is a once great nation divided" and "the world is laughing at us." He encouraged a "revolution in this country."

Williams showed some of Trump's tweets on air, saying he had "driven well past the last exit to relevance and veered into something closer to irresponsibility."

Trump tweeted a retort on Wednesday saying Williams "knows that I think his newscast has become totally boring so he took a shot at me last night." He added in another tweet, "Wouldn't you love to have my ratings?"

Ruling the Rockettes

Behind New York's famous troupe, a tough choreographer

— NEW YORK

On a recent afternoon at Radio City Music Hall, a group of Rockettes were being examined with critical eyes.

The 36 dancers practiced one of their signature synchronized numbers, their long limbs seemingly in perfect symmetry. They moved like swans, chins up, arms graceful.

Dance captain Karen Keeler drilled them until the last few moments before another group took the stage. "A one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, one, up two, a three and a four," she sang out.

Linda Haberman, director and choreographer of the annual "Radio City Christmas Spectacular," watched from the seats and asked Keeler's opinion of this group of women. It wasn't overly positive.

"They were just kind of taking it easy. Do you want me to continue?"

"We have, I think, six seconds," Haberman replied. "So if you can say it in six seconds, you can do it."

Keeler looked at her charges.

"Do it all better," she told them.

Haberman laughed. "Details," she said.

NEW EYES EVERY YEAR

This year is the 85th anniversary of the "Christmas Spectacular" and Haberman is determined to put on a birthday party appropriate for this grand old lady. When one thinks of Christmas in New York, who doesn't immediately imagine a line of crystal-decked women high-kicking it?

Haberman, who has been choreographing the show at Rockefeller Center since 2006, has managed to pull the 90-minute show into the Wii era, adding digital projections on LED screens, a 3-D section that requires special glasses and even sequence inspired by a computer game.

"I try to look at it with new eyes every year," she said. "It's really important to honor our past. There are things that are part of the Rockettes' rich history that I would never let go of. But I think it's important to keep the Rockettes as entertainment relevant to our changing times."

It was Haberman who added a

new favorite routine — the Rockettes dancing on a double-decker tour bus. But there are some things she won't mess with: the "Nutcracker" minisuite, the woozy fall of the wooden soldiers, the "Living Nativity" and "The 12 Days of Christmas" sequences. Haberman keeps those classics but is always tinkering.

"I never leave anything alone because I can always make it better," she said. "I don't just leave something. Even if it's been in the show for five years."

This year, in a nod to the anniversary, the show will have a costume retrospective featuring Rockettes wearing some costumes they've worn through the decades. "It was kind of a fun way to tie it in and also give little bits of history of where we come from," she said.

The Rockettes have shrugged off Superstorm Sandy. Rehearsals were canceled for three days and vans had to pick up stranded dancers, but there will be no delays. "It's like New York. Everyone's pulling together and working hard and we'll get it done," Haberman said.

THE MAGIC NUMBER 36

Haberman is an exacting task master. Calm, but steely. A graduate of the School of American Ballet, she became the youngest cast member in Bob Fosse's "Dancin'." Precision is in her blood.

"I'm tough with the ladies," she said. "But I think they respect me and I think they respect the work they're doing and that's really the key."

Haberman, who will start work on the next show in January, re-

hearses two casts at the same time — a total of 152 people — who alternate playing the punishing schedule of five shows a day, six days a week. There are 80 Rockettes since each show needs 36 ladies and four standbys.

Why 36? Partly that's all the women who can happily fit shoulder-to-shoulder along the 70-foot stage. And partly it's a number that Haberman has grown to adore.

"As a choreographer, you're always playing with formations, especially with the Rockettes. Thirty-six is a great number because you can divide it by two, you can divide it by three," she said. "Different choreographers like different numbers. I love 36. It becomes a math project."

The Rockettes, some 500 applied last spring, come from different backgrounds — some are Broadway dancers, some are Pilates instructors — but they must stand between 5-foot-5 and 5-foot-10 1/2. That's simply due to Haberman's attempt to arrange her dancers to make a "pleasing effect."

Over the years, Haberman has helped hone the increasing strength and physicality of the Rockettes. The requirement to tap dance is the one that makes most stumble, but they often return the next year having nailed tap.

"I look at the line now compared with when I started in the '90s and they've just changed. These women train like crazy, they are all so strong and so tough and such good dancers — it's great," she said. "Now I can choreograph anything. I'm not limited."

On down the line

Young Joe picks up torch (or spoon) with Café 105

An old, well-worn wooden spoon links the Joe Romano family through four generations — a spoon used to prepare Italian family recipes from 1942 Detroit to 2012 Florida.

"That long wooden spoon was passed down in our family starting with my grandfather," Joe Romano said, referring to the heritage cuisine he and his son, Joe, keep alive in their newest venture, Café 105 on Line Street in Inverness.

The Romano family started with an Italian restaurant in Detroit in 1942 and the tradition was handed down to a Romano son in 1956. Joe Romano and his son, Joe, are third- and fourth-generation Romano restaurateurs.

Romano formerly owned a family restaurant on State Road 44 east of Crystal River and eventually segued into his present job as environmental science department supervisor at Inverness Memorial Hospital, located in the same neighborhood as Café 105.

"One morning I went to the café for a cappuccino and discovered it was closed down," he said.

When his son, Joe, expressed an interest in acquiring the empty restaurant, they did just that. After remodeling it, Café 105 opened for business a couple months ago.

Young Joe, now in his early 20s, said he "grew up in the restaurant business, standing on crates to wash dishes when I was a kid." Over time, he learned all aspects of the business, including replicating the family dishes.

Now in charge of his own kitchen at Café 105, the younger Romano said creativity is a big part of the breakfast and lunch.

"I think people are as stimulated visually as they are by taste," he said, referring to his innovative take on presentation. "A lot of elements here are pulled from the fine dining menu" of the former family restaurant.

The Romanos agreed to keep prices in check — under \$8 — and offer unique interpretations of classic dishes. The Romano-style artisan pizza was mentioned as an example, with eggplant, peppers and Gorgonzola cheese.

Other examples of generous breakfast sandwiches are: The Micheangelo with prosciutto ham, egg and Asiago cheese on grilled and pressed ciabatta bread, a toothsome combination (\$4.29); and the "Nicole" with egg, spinach, Mozzarella and red roasted peppers in a generous wrap (\$4.29).

For \$6.49, diners can get a choice of two from an individual salad, half a panini sandwich and

soup, and there is a fine assortment of pressed paninis, salads and tapas (\$5.99 and \$6.99).

Panini sandwiches range from \$6.99 to \$7.99 and include a California club with smoked turkey, ham, bacon, Swiss cheese, avocado and tomatoes; the Miranda with thinly sliced turkey, apple, Brie cheese and apple butter; the Line Street tuna melt infused with capers, artichokes, melted Swiss cheese and olives; and chicken pesto with broiled chicken with garlic and basil topped with Mozzarella and pesto sauce.

Salads are \$7.49 and \$7.99 and range from chicken tortellini

with grilled chicken, sundried tomatoes and black olives, all tossed in olive oil, basil and garlic; the Kennedy with spring mix greens and walnuts, apples, cranberry, Mandarin oranges and Gorgonzola; and cobb salad with avocado, hard-cooked egg, tomatoes, corn, black beans, red onion, chicken, bacon and Gorgonzola — to name a few.

Bruschetta and stuffed mushroom tapas are \$5.99 each, and baked feta and caprese salad tapas are \$6.99. Chef's special soup du jour is \$3.99. Individual artisan pizzas are: chicken Venetian, eggplant and baby portabellos and shrimp Mediterranean

for \$5.99.

Quiche du jour is served with fresh spinach salad and is a terrific choice at \$5.99. You can ask the server about Romano's signature wraps. If you want a lighter taste, bagels plain or with cream cheese are available singly or in packs of 6, 12 and 18.

For the thirsty, a cappuccino bar has all the favorites along with imported hot teas, coffees, soft drinks, juice and bottled water.

To complete your meal, scope out the tray filled with old-world style desserts made by Romano's daughter, Nicole, including cupcakes, Italian pastries, cakes, pies and cheesecake.

Presently, the charming café in a former residence seats 20 patrons inside and eight on the porch. The Romanos hope to have an outside patio soon to seat 30 more customers.

Café 105, at 105 South Line Avenue, Inverness, is open from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 11 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturday. For information about the menu, catering and carryout, call 352-341-1720.



Serving doughnuts to soldiers

Before we begin celebrating the two big holidays in November and December, we should make time for Veterans Day on Sunday, Nov. 11, to honor all those in the military for their service to God, family and country. Therefore, make time to attend the special Veterans Day events in the area and recognize the men and women in uniform, from World War I through all the wars and conflicts since that time.

Our troops have had our backs, making liberty and freedom possible, and we must have theirs — at home and abroad.

Nov. 11 was declared Armistice Day in 1919 by President Woodrow Wilson to signify the signing of the treaty officially ending World War I on the 11th day of the 11th month at the 11th hour in 1918 by the United States and its allies.

American began paying tribute to soldiers of the first World War in 1919 and the celebratory name was changed to Veterans Day on June 1, 1954, to include and honor veterans of World War II.

Food was an important topic during the first World War, when the government called for measures to reserve food staples such as butter, milk and sugar for the troops. Americans answered the call.

One very popular food item came into its own during the two wars — doughnuts. Serving doughnuts to the troops started with the Salvation Army Lassies in World War I. Then the Donut Dollies of the American Red Cross took up the task during World War II.

Here is an adaptation of the original recipe made by the Salvation Army Lassies in World War I that makes about 15 to 20 doughnuts:

SALVATION ARMY DOUGHNUTS

- 4 cups plain flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon butter
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Put flour in shallow pan, add salt, baking powder and sugar. Rub in butter with fingertips. Add the well-beaten egg and milk and stir thoroughly.


Toss on floured board, roll to one-fourth inch in thickness, shape, fry and drain.

Mix the cinnamon and nutmeg with fine granulated or icing sugar and use to dust the doughnuts after cooking.

Another popular dessert during the "Great War" was applesauce cake, because it could be made with less vital ingredients. There is even a National Applesauce Cake Day, for a type of cake promoted during World War I. Here is a recipe similar to the old-fashioned cake:

Give gift of healthy breakfast

As far as I'm concerned, the best holiday gift is one that's handmade and edible. And if you can make it in big batches on a budget — and have it be healthy — even better.

That's the thinking behind this delicious pancake and waffle mix. Face-to-face with a whiny child on a Sunday morning, too many otherwise accomplished and adventurous home cooks reach for a box of prefab pancake mix. That's a shame, not least because it's easy to make your own mix, using ingredients of your choice, and to do so in — you guessed it — a jiffy.

The food police love to vilify pancakes and waffles as nothing more than carbs and sugar, but these guilty pleasures can be nobler than that. At their base, pancakes and waffles depend on a few key ingredients: flour, salt, sugar and leaveners. If you swap in whole-wheat flour for at least some of the white flour, add a little flaxseed, slash some of the sugar and top off the finished product with fresh fruit, you're suddenly looking at a very respectable breakfast. Heck, you even could drizzle a little Grade B maple syrup (my favorite) on top, and it still would be a healthy choice.

Using whole-wheat flour in the mix should not be terribly objectionable. Though there are some folks who insist their bread be white because "brown bread tastes yucky," no one feels that way about pancakes and waffles. And when you toss in some flaxseed, you really amp the recipe's nutritional value even as you add a subtle but distinctive nuttiness.

Flaxseed is showing up more and more frequently on supermarket shelves these days, and you can always find it online. I often add a tablespoon or two of it to my breakfast cereal in the morning. Just keep in mind flaxseed isn't properly digested unless it is ground. You can buy it pre-ground or grind it yourself in a spice grinder. After you open the package, keep it in the refrigerator or freezer; it tends to go rancid quickly.

At holiday time, you can measure the batch into pretty containers — old canning jars are perfect for this purpose — attach a nice hand-written label and recipe with a ribbon, and consider it done.







- 2 cups sugar
- 1/4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 1/2 teaspoons soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves

Put all ingredients in bowl.

- 1/2 cup oil and 1/2 cup water in same cup
- 1 can applesauce
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup dates
- 1 cup chopped walnuts

Add applesauce and oil mixture and eggs alternately to dry ingredients. Beat well. Add nuts and dates. Bake in 13-by-9-inch pan at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.


The deputies themselves tell us they are grateful for this new insight into dealing with troublesome
