Judge: 'There are no words'

Sixty-one-year-old man sentenced to 38 years in prison for 'vile, evil and most wicked' child porn

INVERNESS — A Beverly Hills man who worked in law enforcement likely will spend the rest of his natural life behind bars after getting a hefty sentence Thursday in a child-porn case.

John Morgan Ethridge, 61, was sentenced to 38 years in prison by Circuit Judge Ric Howard. Ethridge also received two years' probation and is being tagged a sex offender for life.

Ethridge was arrested last September and charged with one count of promotion of

sexual performance by a child and 39 counts of possession of child pornography.

According to Assistant State Attorney Rich Buxman, Ethridge had a "tremendous" amount of child pornography images and videos of babies between the ages of 1 and 6 years old


being raped and sodomized by adults.

Ethridge also was part of a network of people engaged in peddling and viewing child porn by sharing images and videos online. The practice is called peer-to-peer networking, where by loading a certain type of software,

members of the network can download and share files.

According to Citrus County Sheriff's Office Detective Dodi Pruitt, Ethridge was adept at hiding his files on an external hard drive he kept hidden from his wife.

Craters appear in backyard

Woman fights sinkhole problems

INVERNESS — After a sinkhole claimed the life of a Seffner man in March, Kim McKenzie noticed her pool deck had cracked and dropped.

Her insurance company diagnosed sinkhole activity early last month.

"It was already under my house and pool, and now another one has opened up Tuesday night," McKenzie said.

A work crew regularly has been on site while McKenzie, who is graduating this week from a paramedic to a registered nurse, carried on her busy schedule. Because she leaves early in the morning and returns after dark, she was not aware of the big hole — at least 12 feet across and 6 to 8 feet deep — that appeared in her back yard Wednesday morning until her insurance company told her.

"It started out when my pool deck had cracked," McKenzie said. "It was a drop like one or two inches and then it separated."

McKenzie has lived at her home on East Monica Court, just off East Gospel Island Road, for 25 years. This is the first time she

Bays might be off hospital board

Membership on the Citrus County Hospital Board, reduced to four last week with Gene Davis' resignation, may be down to three by next week.

Mike Bays' CCHB position appears doomed after a Senate committee left his name off the confirmation list of Gov. Rick Scott's appointees.

Bays must wait until the full Senate votes on the Ethics and Elections Committee's slate of appointees sometime before the Legislature adjourns next Friday.

His only hope would come from a reprieve by Senate President Dan Gaetz, who would have to override the committee's recommendation and bring Bays' confirmation to a full Senate vote. Gaetz spokeswoman Katie Betta said Gaetz has no plans to do that but she wouldn't rule it out.

Bays, appointed by Scott in September along with Davis and Krista Joseph, said Thursday he didn't know what to think.

"I haven't officially been told anything," he said.

Davis resigned last week after the Ethics and Elections Committee summoned him to the April 15 confirmation hearing. Davis said he thought his appearance

King's Bay cleanup permit under challenge

Environmental advocates trade accusations over use of mechanical harvesters

Lyngbya cleanup activities in King's Bay are officially on hiatus until a challenge to the permit is cleared up.

Pat Rose, the executive director of Save the Manatee Club, said his group filed an administrative challenge Wednesday to One Rake at a Time's project permit following the failure of talks about how to conduct the cleanup.

Rose had been in talks with cleanup project director Art Jones and an alliance of groups after he and others raised objections to what he said was "egregious" cleanup

has noticed any sinkhole activity on her property. Her insurance company, under the guidance of an engineer, hired a contractor who specializes in sinkhole remediation.

"They drilled a total of 28 holes," McKenzie said.

Drilling has been taking place inside and outside. Pipes were placed inside the drilled holes to access underground voids that will be filled with mortar, McKenzie said.

"In my game room, they had to drill five or six holes," McKenzie said. "So they had to move all my stuff out to get all their big tools and machines in there."

After the mortar is poured into place, it will harden for two months before more work can be done. McKenzie said she anticipated that the contractor would perform an evaluation before the insurance company would do other repairs and replace plants that had to be pulled up.

The latest activity earlier this week happened behind the privacy fence at the residence, when a crater opened in the backyard lawn like a submerged bowl. This bowl, which is bigger than a good-sized spa, just

SINKHOLE FACTS

- Sinkholes are depressions or holes in the land surface that occur throughout Florida. They can be shallow or deep, small or large, but all are a result of the dissolving of the underlying limestone.
- Hydrologic conditions, including lack of rainfall, lowered water levels, or, conversely, excessive rainfall in a short period of time, can all contribute to sinkhole development.

reaches under the fence.

This exposed sinkhole is about 30 feet from East Gospel Island Road and poses no problem to traffic, said Ken Frink, assistant county administrator and Public Works director, who

sent a crew to inspect the effect on county property.

McKenzie said the sinkhole activity was covered by her insurance policy. She had opted to keep sinkhole coverage and has paid for an extra premium

because she was aware of sinkhole anomalies in the neighborhood.

day night. This means Scott must act on the legislation by May 1, which could be before legislators have acted on his priorities.

Scott's top priorities include both a \$2,500 across-the-board pay raise for teachers and a tax break for manufacturers who purchase equipment. Both appear to be in jeopardy with a week left before lawmakers adjourn the session on May 3.

Legislators have agreed to set aside money for the teacher pay raise but have continued to insist the raise be tied to teacher performance instead of giving all teachers the same amount. Scott has responded to this news by pointing out that all teachers deserve a raise because Florida's national education rankings have improved.

Senate President Don Gaetz said that Scott — who was elected in 2010 — has to learn that the legislative process requires "compromise." He said that neither he nor House Speaker Will Weatherford, Wesley Chapel, have gotten everything they want this session.

"I would suspect that another thing the governor will learn is that he will not get everything he wants," Gaetz said.

And to emphasize that point the Senate did not take up several bills on Thursday that are being pushed by the governor's office even though they are not his top priorities.

Designer drugs added to state list

Florida Gov. Rick Scott signed into law a measure that adds 27 new designer drugs to the state's controlled substances list.

The bill (HB 619) was signed on Wednesday. The new law now makes it a third-degree felony for someone to make or sell the drugs, or possess them with intent to sell.

Attorney General Pam Bondi said the drugs have street names such as "incense," "potpourri," "K2," "spice" and "bath salts."

Senate OKs bill to allow wine kegs

Wine kegs would be available in Florida for the first time under a bill that has cleared the Legislature.

The bill (HB 623) won final passage from the Senate on a 36-0 vote Thursday. It now goes to Gov. Rick Scott.

The measure cleared the House on a 116-0 vote last month.

The bill would legalize wine barrels that hold just more than five gallons. Currently wine can't be sold in containers larger than one gallon.

The idea is to help reduce costs for restaurants and bars that serve wine by the glass.

Lawmakers pass bill to protect charities

Florida lawmakers have given final approval to a bill aimed at protecting charities from giving back donations from people later found to be scam artists.

The bill (HB 95) won final passage in the Senate on a 35-2 vote Thursday and now goes to Gov. Rick Scott. The measure already passed the House.

The legislation aims to protect charities from a legal action known as a "clawback," in which trustees in bankruptcy cases try to recover charitable contributions for creditors or other victims.

Man nabbed in child rape case

A man is in custody after his identity was matched to the image and moniker of a man starring in a child sex abuse video found on the Internet, according to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office.

Lyle F. Bennett III, 30, of Crystal River was arrested Tuesday and is facing multiple counts of sexual battery on a person younger than 18, a capital felony; lewd and lascivious molestation; possession to promote photographs or video of sexual conduct by child; and transmission via computer of a minor's informa-

tion.

The alleged victim in this case is a 4-year-old boy.

According to the CCSO, investigators received an Internet tip (via the Central Florida ICAC — Internet Crimes Against Children — Task Force) from the National Center of Missing and Exploited Children.

The tip was about a video showing an adult male performing sex acts on a pre-pubescent child.

According to major crimes Lt. Kevin Purinton, due to the nature of the offense and concerns for the safety and welfare of the victim, detectives from the Polk County and the Citrus County Sheriff's Office each drove halfway to expedite the exchange of the tip.

Purinton said detectives from the Special Victims Unit and ICAC unit of the Citrus County Sheriff's Office were able to confirm the identity and location of the suspect.

"With the assistance of the patrol division, detectives were able to lure the suspect from the residence and effect an arrest," Purinton said.

He said the case is still an ac-

tive investigation because the suspect performing the sex acts on the minor is not the same person who uploaded the video to the Internet.

According to the arrest affidavit, a man fitting Bennett's description could be seen in the video, naked and performing sex acts on a child who appears to be sleeping on a sofa. Once investigators were able to confirm his identity with the help of a witness, Bennett was arrested and transported to Citrus County Detention Center. No bond was allowed.

Former hotel worker's website honors Inverness landmark

INVERNESS — In the midst of historic downtown Inverness rests a quaint, white building that many call home. Just like its residents, the assisted-living facility — once known as the majestic Crown Hotel — has a lifetime of rich stories.

The hotel began as Francis Dampier's general store on Line Street until it was moved to Main Street and became the Orange Hotel. About 20 years later, the hotel was transferred to Seminole Avenue, where it became the Hotel Inverness, until it reverted back to the Orange Hotel.

After a series of owners, name changes and a multimillion-dollar facelift, the hotel reopened as the landmark Crown Hotel in 1980, hosting visitors and locals who wanted to impress and be impressed.

Willing to amaze and pamper the guests was a 16-year-old Inverness boy who began his work life at the Crown Hotel as a front desk clerk.

"There, I gained more of an understanding and appreciation of the hotel business," said the youth, Larry LaFond, now a director and casting director in Los Angeles. "I realized that what a hotel is really selling is not just rooms, food and beverage, but an overall experience."

LaFond took his work experience further and developed a lifelong passion for photographs of the century-old structure.

"One day, while doing a random eBay search, I found an old Orange Hotel postcard for sale," LaFond said. "That started it, really. Since the hotel was gone, I thought it would be interesting to gather and share online as much memorabilia as possible, from any of the hotel's incarnations — the Orange Hotel, the Inverness Colonial Hotel or The Crown Hotel. As my collection grew, so did my research into the build-

ing's history."

He established a Crown Hotel website, which provides historical data and cherished photographs. Updating his collection — provided through many members of Inverness community — is like slowly solving a mystery.

"It's like a giant puzzle for which you don't even have all the pieces," LaFond said. "Eventually, you find another piece and then you ask yourself, 'OK, now how does this fit into the story?' When one clicks into place, you have a real 'a-hah' moment."

"Buildings, like people, have a history, and a story to tell," LaFond said. "And it's only by retracing the history of the building that you uncover the full story."

Senate passes Citizens insurance overhaul

House approves Timely Justice Act

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida House on Thursday passed a bill that would speed up the state's capital punishment process.

The House passed the Timely Justice Act of 2013 (HB 7083) by a vote of 84-34. The bill goes to the Senate, where a similar measure had been on the agenda Thursday. That chamber adjourned for the day without taking action.

The bill, sponsored by Republican Rep. Matt Gaetz of Fort Walton Beach, creates tighter timeframes for appeals, post-conviction motions and imposes reporting requirements on case progress.

It also re-establishes a separate agency for north Florida to provide appellate-level legal representation to inmates sentenced to death, and requires them to "pursue all possible remedies in state court."

Debate on the measure, however, alluded to the moral legitimacy of the death penalty itself. In 1976, the U.S. Supreme Court allowed the states to resume executions after an earlier ban.

Republicans repeated that "justice delayed is justice denied" for victims' survivors. Twenty-eight people now on death row in Florida have been there longer than 30 years.

"We have a responsibility to act," Gaetz said. "Only God can judge, but we can sure set up the meeting."

Democrats were concerned that a speedier process may result in innocent people being wrongly executed. Twenty-four men have been exonerated from Florida's death row since 1973, according to the Death Penalty Information Center.

One Democrat favored the proposal.

"I am a believer that when you kill someone, we kill you back," said Rep. Jared Evan Moskowitz of Coral Springs.

"The innocent life that I look at is the life of the victim," he added. "That innocent life didn't get three meals a day. That innocent life didn't spend 10 or 12 or 15 or 25 additional years on this planet."

Another wasn't so sure. Rep. Larry Lee, a Fort Pierce Democrat, told of how his sister was murdered in St. Petersburg decades ago. The man accused in the death has since died.

Lee said he was torn between his sister's death and seeing television shows on people cleared of murder by DNA evidence. He ultimately voted no.

The photos showed the Duchess of Cambridge relaxing at a private villa in Provence, in southern France, sometimes without her bikini top.

Sumter County officials investigating murder

Sumter County authorities are searching for clues in the murder of an unidentified woman whose body was found Monday in woods about a half mile east of I-75 near Wildwood. The body was behind the business area on the south side of State Road 44.

The woman's decomposed body was discovered near one of the trails in an open area near a swamp. Investigators initially could not determine the sex, race or age of the victim because of the advanced state of decomposition.

The Medical Examiner's Office performed an autopsy Tuesday that determined the woman died as the result of a homicide.

She is described as heavyset, between 5-foot-4 and 5 feet, 9 inches, with brown or auburn hair. She was wearing dark-colored sweatpants and a floral print shirt and authorities

fixed her age between 25 to 55 years old.

The site behind the business area where the body was found is quiet, bordered by a wooded area with trees and dirt paths. Authorities used a dirt road between and behind the Wendy's restaurant and the adult book store to enter and exit the area. Sheriff's tape blocked the path as ATVs sat at the entrance. Only investigators and the medical examiner were allowed in and out.

The dirt road that led to the body was curved and full of mud holes, which made getting to the body difficult, according to Lt. Bobby Caruthers.

A man that had been out in the area last weekend discovered the body while he and a friend were searching for a lost wallet,

according to Caruthers. The man had lost the wallet while he and friends were mud bogging.

The area is known to attract all-terrain vehicles and sport truckers because of its trails. The location is also known to attract transients who set up camps and stay there during the winter months, Caruthers said.

A description of the woman has been sent to law enforcement agencies throughout the country in hopes that the woman will be identified, Caruthers said.

"We have forensic evidence we need to get back but the first thing we're hoping to get is her identification."

Woman, 78, gets 10 years for death

DAYTONA BEACH — A 78-year-old woman has been sentenced to 10 years in prison for a drunk driving crash that killed a North Carolina man during Bike Week.

Judge Leah R. Case noted during a sentencing hearing on Wednesday that Barbara Dunn of Chatham, Mass., had no criminal record. But the judge said Dunn — who had a blood alcohol level more than three times the legal limit — apparently has a drinking problem. The judge revoked Dunn's driver's license for the rest of her life.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reported Dunn struck and killed 64-year-old

Charles Bixler of Concord, N.C., on March 17, 2012. Two other bikers were forced off the road and injured.

Dunn expressed remorse and told the judge she's not had a drink since the crash.

Man killed during police pursuit

MIAMI — A man was fatally shot in South Florida during a police pursuit.

It wasn't immediately clear who shot the man, but Opa-locka officials said police have a second man in custody, and officers were looking for a weapon in a nearby canal. *The Miami Herald* reported that an officer involved in Thursday's pursuit suffered an ankle injury after exiting his car.

Man on trial for daughter's death

BARTOW — A Lakeland man is on trial for first-degree murder, aggravated child abuse and aggravated manslaughter of a child charges after prosecutors say he starved his infant daughter to death in 2009.

The Lakeland Ledger reported that Chauncey Gardner's five-month-old baby was found dead Nov. 1, 2009.

The 30-year-old Gardner has 10 children from several different women, and helped take care of his children when he was able to do so and not in jail or prison.

Pruitt said Ethridge also was cooperative with investigators when they first paid him a visit. He reportedly interrupted officers by admitting his actions and began taking off his jewelry in preparation for a trip to jail as his stunned wife watched.

Buxman said investigators were watching child porn-sharing networks when they traced one to Ethridge's IP, or Internet Protocol address.

Buxman said he didn't see a need for any departure from a recommended 40-year sentence.

Ethridge's attorney Joe Indelicato asked the court for probation, insisting that his client was a low


risk to actually abuse children.

Indelicato said his client accidentally found child porn about eight years ago and became inexplicably hooked on it. He also called two sex offender psychologists to buttress his assertion that Ethridge can live safely in society with treatment to subdue his pedophilic inclinations.

But Howard called Ethridge's actions "vile, evil and most wicked."

"There are no words that describe these images of babies being sodomized and raped by adults..." Howard said.

activity involving mechanical harvesters.

Rose alleges the harvester causes excessive turbidity, or cloudy water. He said the harvesters are dredging and lack an independent monitoring authority and that operation of the harvesters is illegal in areas beyond the purview of the permit issued by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission (FWC).

Meanwhile, Jones voluntarily suspended cleanup activities after the objections were raised and said he and his alliance members — Save Crystal River Inc., and the Rotary Clubs of Kings Bay and Crystal River — would be willing to work with Rose to devise and implement a monitoring authority that includes tracking turbidity levels and the health of aquatic vegetation.

However, those talks stalled, with each side accusing the other of being unreasonable.

In a letter to Rose on Wednesday, Jones wrote: "We are experiencing a harmful algae bloom (HAB) right now in Kings Bay. Lyngbya is floating up to the surface ever since we stopped operations at your request. It is getting worse every day and the floating Lyngbya contains toxins that are harmful. We

director of the One Rake at a Time cleanup project describing Pat Rose, executive director of the Save the Manatee Club. Jones claims Rose and his organization are obstructing further cleanup of lyngbya algae in King's Bay.

need to get our cleanup operations going again soon and are still working on getting everything in place that will hopefully satisfy your concerns."

But he also added this: "However, as far as supporting an extension for you to file a complaint against our permit, it seems like an unreasonable demand."

That letter said Rose demonstrated to him that Jones and SCR were not dealing in good faith and gave the green light to his attorney to file the challenge.

"We were negotiating in good faith, but apparently they didn't share that. Instead they keep telling lies and trying to make me look bad," Rose said on Thursday. "But we are going to pursue each and every avenue to ensure that anyone who has done harm to the bay or is currently doing harm to the bay is held

accountable."

In a reply to Jones, Rose wrote: "Don't you dare blame Lyngbya building up in the bay on our standing up against your egregious violations of water quality and the trust the good people of Crystal River have placed in you.

"I cautioned you repeatedly and personally that you should be more appreciative of the good reputation that you had built with One Rake at a Time and that when you lied about where the harvesters were operating and whether they were digging into the bay bottoms that you were putting all of your good work at risk."

Rose went on to say in his letter that he didn't understand how asking "you (Jones) and SCR support further good faith negotiations in lieu of pursuing our challenge is an unreasonable demand ... (it) only forces a mandatory suspension of harvester operations, something we had hoped to avoid."

Jones said Thursday the whole matter was unfortunate, but said Rose was an obstructionist.

"He is not a regulatory agency. We are confident FWC and other good people will see that we are doing things here. He (Rose) likes to use his mouth. I like to use my rake."

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





STOP PLAYING POLITICS**State legislators stumbling toward Medicaid expansion**

Fadamant in their rejection of federal dollars to expand Medicaid, continue to place politics above doing what's best for the state's uninsured.

To its credit, the Florida Senate's budget panel supports providing health coverage to 1.1 million Floridians by using a mix of federal and state funds. The plan, proposed by Sen. Joe Negron, has diverse support, including that of Gov. Scott. However, with fewer than two weeks left in the session, the House remains steadfast in its refusal to use one single federal dollar if it is tied to Obamacare.

This type of political rhetoric thwarts development of any rational governing policymaking. The rancorous debate between the left and right hurts most those who lawmakers have been elected to protect.

The House plan covers a minimal number of unin-

sured, 115,000 residents, offering them \$2,000 per year to choose a private insurer. State dollars, \$237 million, would fund the plan.

The federal government has offered to fund Medicaid expansion at 100 percent the first three years and at 90 percent thereafter. The Florida House, which is controlled by Republicans, is not interested in accepting federal dollars because they are fundamentally against Obamacare.

Additionally, House members feel the Medicaid system is broken, and they do not want to throw good money after bad. The problem with that thinking is Florida lawmakers have just as much responsibility for fixing the broken system as the feds.

It is time for state lawmakers to put aside their petty political differences and honor their pledge as public servants to take care of their constituents.

'The right thing to do?' Really, governor?

When Rick Scott first broke onto the scene in 2010, he hit the airwaves with brilliant campaign ads that sent the simple but effective message to a weary electorate. Over and over, he stuck to the message "let's get to work."

During a national recession, with Florida's unemployment rate above the national average, the message "let's get to work" appealed to many frustrated Floridians.

As the national economy continues its slow but steady rebound, Florida's economy is following suit. In fact, general revenue flowing into state coffers is allowing the governor and Legislature to craft a \$74 billion budget this year — \$4 billion more than the current budget.

All this promising economic news has led to a catch phrase for the governor, who proudly proclaims, "It's working." He says it in ads, he says it in tweets, and he says it in editorial board interviews. Heck, even the Republican Party of Florida says it for him in email blasts.

But despite sticking to a message that resonates among Scott's shrinking base, not many Floridians seem to be embracing the slogan or willing to give him credit for Florida's improving conditions. In fact, his low polling numbers indicate the opposite.

So with his reelection effort looming and with former Gov. Charlie Crist well ahead in the polls of potential opponents, Scott is trying a new tact. It seems that despite criticizing the former governor, Scott is morphing into him: a kinder, gentler populist.

Recently, a phrase he has used on occasion has become his latest catchphrase. During a meeting of the Florida Cabinet at the Capitol on Tuesday, he said it again. "It's the right thing to do," speaking of the student fee freeze in higher education.

My first reaction was to be flattered by his adoption and slight modification of my campaign theme, "Doing the right thing." But simply saying it does

not make it so. Actions must match words and must truly be what is right for the people we serve.

So let's look at his record:

- When he tried to purge the voting rolls, using extremely suspect lists and kicking legitimate voters off the rolls, it was not the right thing to do.

- When he signed and then defended the 2011 election reform bill that shortened early voting and led to long waits during both

- early voting and Election Day, it was not the right thing to do.

- When he killed a private/public partnership for high-speed rail that required no state dollars for construction or operations but then approved a government-run commuter train that required at least \$1.2 billion in state funds and at least 10 years of state operating funds, it was not the right thing to do.

- When he allowed a \$300 million cut from the state's 11 existing universities while creating a 12th with no accreditation, students or faculty, it was not the right thing to do.

- When he cut \$1.3 billion from K-12 education in the 2011 session, and only replaced \$1 billion in the 2012 session while bragging that he increased education funding by one billion "new" dollars, it was not the right thing to do.

- When he pushed changes to the personal injury protection auto insurance bill, which removed benefits for consumers while failing to reduce premiums as promised, it was not the right thing to do.

- When he signed the bill requiring state employees to contribute 3 percent to their pension plan after they had not received a pay increase in six years, it was not the right thing to do.

- When he pushed prison privatization, effectively putting long-term, low-wage, loyal employees out of work and reducing the level of safety for our citizens, all to make a profit for private prisons with no demonstrable cost savings, it was not the right thing to do.

- When he signed the bill requiring state employees to contribute 3 percent to their pension plan after they had not received a pay increase in six years, it was not the right thing to do.

Former heads of state laud George W. Bush at opening of new library

DALLAS — Presidents past and present lionized one of their own Thursday, putting politics aside as President George W. Bush dedicated the library that documents his place in history. President Barack Obama praised his predecessor's strength and resolve after Sept. 11, calling Bush a "good man" who faced the storm head on.

"My deepest conviction, the

guiding principle of the administration, is that the United States of America must strive to expand the reach of freedom," Bush said. "I believe that freedom is a gift from God and the hope of every human heart."

Obama and Bush spoke along with the three other former presidents in a rare reunion at the dedication of the George W. Bush Presidential Center. "To know President George W. Bush is to like him,"

Obama said.

The presidents lauded Bush's aid to the people of Africa, his effort to reach across the aisle on issues like immigration and education and his leadership in the days after the 2001 terrorist attacks. But they avoided the two wars that dominated much of his time in office — Iraq and Afghanistan.

The presidents — Obama, Bush, Bill Clinton, George H.W. Bush and Jimmy Carter — were

cheered by a crowd of former White House officials and world leaders as they took the stage together to open the dedication. They were joined on stage by their wives — the nation's current and former first ladies — for the outdoor ceremony on a sun-splashed Texas morning. For Bush, 66, the ceremony also marked his unofficial return to the public eye four years after the end of his deeply polarizing presidency.

US: Syria used chemical weapons

WASHINGTON — U.S. intelligence has concluded with "varying degrees of confidence," that the Syrian government has twice used chemical weapons in its fierce civil war, the White House and other top administration officials said Thursday.

However, officials also said more definitive proof was needed and the U.S. was not ready to escalate its involvement in Syria beyond non-lethal aid, despite President Barack Obama's repeated public assertions that Syria's

use of chemical weapons, or the transfer of its stockpiles to a terrorist group, would cross a "red line."

The White House disclosed the new intelligence Thursday in letters to two senators, and Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel, traveling in Abu Dhabi, also discussed it with reporters. The letters were sent in response to questions from members of Congress who are eager for the administration to arm the rebels or get involved militarily.

The Syrian civil war has dragged on for more than two years, with an estimated 70,000 dead. In addition to members of Congress, Leon Panetta and Hillary Rodham Clinton, as secretaries of defense and state, have urged Obama to increase U.S. involvement.

"Our intelligence community does assess, with varying degrees of confidence, that the Syrian regime has used chemical weapons on a small scale in Syria, specifically, the chemical agent sarin," the White House said in its letters, which were signed by Obama's legislative director, Miguel Rodriguez.

Shortly after the letters were made public, Secretary of State John Kerry said on Capitol Hill that there were two instances of chemical weapons use.

Police: Boston suspects planned NY attack

NEW YORK — The Boston Marathon bombers were headed for New York to blow up their remaining explosives in Times Square before they were intercepted by police in a blazing gun battle, officials said Thursday.

New York City Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said Dzhokhar Tsarnaev told interrogators from his hospital bed that he and his older brother had decided spontaneously last Thurs-

day night to drive to New York and launch an attack. In their stolen SUV they had five pipe bombs and a pressure-cooker explosive like the ones that blew up at the marathon, Kelly said.

The plan fell apart when the brothers got into a shootout outside Boston that left Tamerlan Tsarnaev dead, Kelly said.

"We don't know if we would have been able to stop the terrorists had they arrived here from Boston," Mayor Michael Bloomberg said. "We're just

thankful that we didn't have to find out that answer."

Dzhokhar, 19, is charged with carrying out the Boston Marathon bombing that killed three people and wounded more than 260, and he could get the death penalty.

Investigators and lawmakers briefed by the FBI have said the Tsarnaev brothers — ethnic Chechens from Russia who had lived in the U.S. for about a decade — were motivated by anger over the U.S. wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Gay marriage approved in RI

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — Shifting public opinion and a coordinated, aggressive campaign helped propel gay marriage in Rhode Island, now set to become the 10th state to allow gay and lesbian couples to wed.

Gay marriage legislation easily passed the state's Senate on Thursday, ending a push of nearly two decades in the only New England state that hadn't already legalized same-sex marriage.

Following a final procedural vote next week in the House, the bill is expected to be signed into law by Gov. Lincoln Chafee.

Supporters succeeded by forging alliances with organized labor, religious groups and business owners and mounting an aggressive campaign to pressure undecided lawmakers.

Internet sales tax bill up for vote

WASHINGTON — A handful of senators from states without sales taxes are blocking a bill that would tax Internet purchases.

They don't have enough support to kill the bill, but they can delay a final vote until Friday — or even this weekend

Pot smokers can be fired, says court

DENVER — Medical and recreational marijuana may be legal in Colorado, but employers in the state can law-

fully fire workers who test positive for the drug, even if it was used off duty, according to a court ruling Thursday.

The Colorado Court of Appeals decision found there is no employment protection for medical marijuana users in the state since the drug remains barred by the federal government.

"For an activity to be lawful in Colorado, it must be permitted by, and not contrary to, both state and federal law," the appeals court stated in its 2-1 conclusion.

Berlin police spokesman Dirk Stoewhase said the unnamed 25-year-old man could have ended the day in the morgue instead of a jail cell.

Stoewhase said the gun might easily have been mistaken for a real weapon because "it certainly didn't just look like a water pistol."

heart to win."


"I think that really was all it was," Weiand added.

LECANTO — It may vary in its deliverance, but coaches generally say the same things when playoff time beckons, and not making mistakes and playing solid defense are always on their list.

There's a reason for that, of course — it's true.

Lecanto's softball team, inconsistent defensively through much of the regular (or exhibition, as coach Robert Dupler describes it) season, has been near flawless in the state tournament. That performance was on display in Thursday's Region II game against South Lake, when the Panthers dominated through six innings before repelling a seventh-inning rally to claim a 4-2 victory.

How that inning ended was an example of the defense Lecanto has played. When the base runners strayed off base, daring a throw from Panthers catcher Amber Atkinson, Atkinson fired to first baseman Lilly Parrish, who then threw to third to get Mares for the pick off.

Yant, who surrendered two runs on five hits and a hit bats-

man before giving way to Breanna Martin with one out in the seventh, had plenty of help. She recorded just one strikeout in the game, which meant her fielders had to be flawless. And they very nearly were, committing just one error in the game.

"She's pitching perfect and we're making the plays," Lecanto left fielder Paige Richards said. "When she's pitching like that, we have a tough defense."

Richards was particularly strong, making seven putouts in left field, including all three in the fifth inning. She also contributed at the plate, getting a single in the bottom of the sixth and scoring on Amber Russo's double.

Russo — who had a pair of doubles — and Amber Hopkins were the hitting heroes for Lecanto. Russo scored the

The first seven picks were all linemen: four on offense, three on defense.

Not until Florida State's EJ Manuel went to Buffalo at No. 16 was a quarterback taken — the lowest since 2000, when Chad Pennington went 18th to the Jets.

Fisher became the first Mid-American Conference player selected at the top when Kansas City's new regime led by coach Andy Reid chose the 6-foot-7, 306-pound offensive tackle.

"This is so surreal," Fisher said. "I'm ready to get to work right now. I'm ready to start playing some football. I can't process what's going on right now."

Fisher was followed by All-American Joeckel going to Jacksonville, defensive end Dion Jordan of Oregon to Miami, which traded up with Oakland, and Oklahoma tackle Lane Johnson to Philadelphia. Not a skill position player yet in sight — a stark change from the last four drafts, when quarterbacks went first.

The procession of linemen continued with BYU defensive end Ziggy Ansah, born in Ghana, going to Detroit; LSU defensive end Barkevious Mingo to Cleveland; and North Carolina guard Jonathan Cooper to Arizona.

"That's a lot of love for the big

Coming down hard

Kenseth calls harsh penalties 'grossly unfair'

RICHMOND, Va. — Mild-mannered Matt Kenseth is spitting mad at NASCAR.

The driver for Joe Gibbs Racing spoke out Thursday, one day after his team was slapped with some of the harshest penalties in NASCAR history because his race-winning car at Kansas last week failed post-race inspection.

The failure came because one of eight connecting rods in the engine was too light — by 2.7 grams, according to Kenseth, who said the rods collectively weighed more than necessary by about 2.5 grams each.

"I think the penalties are grossly unfair," Kenseth said. "I think it's borderline shameful."

Kenseth was docked 50 driver points in the standings, two more than he earned for the victory. He said he's more upset about the penalties given to car owner Joe Gibbs and his crew chief, Jason Ratcliff.

Gibbs also was docked 50 points and suspended for six weeks during which he will earn no owner points, essentially taking the No. 20 car Kenseth drives out of contention for winning an owner's title.

Ratcliff was suspended for six weeks and fined \$200,000.

The team is appealing the penalties.

Kenseth understands that a rule is a rule, but the part found to be too light was installed by Toyota Racing Development, which builds engines for JGR at a shop in Costa Mesa, Calif., Kenseth said.

"They show up on a truck or an airplane, get taken out and bolted in the car," he said.

TDR president Lee White said Wednesday night the company took full responsibility for the mistake and confirmed that JGR had nothing to do with it. He also

said the lighter part gave Kenseth no competitive advantage.

"There was no intent. It was a mistake. JGR had no control over it," Kenseth said with anger. "Certainly to crush Joe Gibbs like that and say they can't win an owner's championship with the 20 this year ... I just can't wrap my arms around that. It just blows me away. And the same for Jason Ratcliff."

"I don't feel bad for myself at all, but for Jason and Joe, I couldn't feel any worse. There's no more reputable, honest, hard-working guys with good reputations more so than those two. I feel really bad for them."

Kenseth said he doesn't care

that the penalty may affect his reputation as a clean racer. He said anyone with knowledge of the situation knows he and his team had nothing to do with it and gained no advantage. He understands that NASCAR has to police the sport vigilantly, but said "the penalty is way over the top for" the infraction.

He's not alone and not the only driver hoping the appeals panel provides some relief.

Defending Sprint Cup champion Brad Keselowski's team for Penske Racing was punished last week after NASCAR said it found unapproved parts in the rear suspension of Keselowski's and Joey Logano's cars at Texas.





Car enthusiasts generally come in two varieties: those who prefer to keep their cars as they came from the factory, and those (like me) who like to modify them to make them unique. I have modified all three of my show cars with body decals, hood scoops, engine compartment dress-up and some performance enhancements. Since all of my cars are between the years 2006 and 2008, there are many around

very similar to the stock versions. For this reason, I modify them to make them unique to the style that I like, and hopefully others will like.

My friend Mike, who I have written about before, is a real stock guy. He likes to keep all of his classic cars stock, as they were when they left the factory. This approach works for Mike because of the age of his classic cars; most are more than 30 years old and unique in them-

selves. You just don't see too many 1959 Chrysler New Yorkers around, particularly as nice as his. I think this is generally the main criterion for considering modifications — older cars can be fairly rare and unique in their stock condition, while newer cars need some modifications to make them different than the rest in their class.

Taped to a wall at the entrance to the Connecticut Film Center in Stamford is this greeting: "Welcome (back) to Pine Valley."





but the arrogant Commissioner (Danny Huston) is thrilled to have a chance to play hero. One night the monster steps onto the doorstep of singer Lucille (Vanessa Paradis.) At first Lucile is mortified, but the moment she hears the monster's mournful singing (Sean Lennon), she befriends him and names him Francoeur. Lucille, Emile and Raoul band together and protect the sweet, musically inclined Francoeur from the vicious, self-serving Commissioner.

"A Monster in Paris" has a different feel. I think I fell for the movie when Raoul sneezed in the car and splattered the windshield with some nice, clear phlegm. At first I was shocked by this little detail. It's not like I haven't

seen "Shrek's" lurid potty humor, but sneezes are pretty innocuous in most movies. More than being a simple gag, the snot seems to be there just to make the characters feel more human. There are other humanizing aspects, like folks pocked with rosacea, falsetto-voiced waiters with love handles and downright rotund newspapermen. Even Emile, a protagonist, is a young guy but has a receding hairline. "A Monster in Paris" is peopled by characters that can really sneeze and show a little wear and tear without being grotesque. It's a sweet outlook.

The singing is also nice.

The songs are rich and danceable all by themselves, but Paradis' and Sean Lennon's voices really made it for me. Paradis has these swinging, sharp intonations that are fun and unique. If fireflies could speak, they would sound like her. At first,

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

When we take our cars to events and shows, we want the other car owners and spectators to be attracted to them, and most of us want to win awards. If you bring a newer car, such as a Mustang, to a show in stock condition, the tough competition may reduce your chances of winning an award. The recent Mustangs — 2005 and newer — are a good example: There are so many of them around, so owners who want to show their cars and win awards tend to modify them. My 2007 Mustang GT California Special is a limited edition and a bit unique in itself, but still I have added some decals and engine dress-up parts to make it my own.

Another good example is the 2005 and newer Corvettes. There aren't as many of them around as Mustangs but, if you get 50 or 100 of them together at a show, they tend to all look very similar. You see fewer modified Corvettes but, again, I feel you need to make some modifications to make your car stand out from the others. On my 2008 Corvette coupe, I have also added some decal stripes and engine dress-up parts.

I certainly respect those who choose to keep their show cars in stock condition, but I am more of a "modified car" guy, so my cars are a little different from others at cruise-ins and shows.

So will "One Life to Live," another venerable soap cut down by ABC after 44 seasons. It, too, will spring back to life on Monday. (Welcome back to Llanview, everybody!) Returning fan favorites include Erika Slezak, Robert S. Woods, Robin Strasser and Hillary B. Smith, each of whom has logged decades on the show.

Each serial will unveil four daily half-hours per week, plus a recap/behind-the-scenes episode on Fridays, with 42 weeks of original programming promised for the first year.

They will be available for streaming on computers on the Hulu website. Subscribers to Hulu Plus can watch on a variety of other devices. And the episodes will be available for purchase on iTunes.

This resurrection could reverse the doomsday plot that has plagued soaps for decades as their viewership withered and their numbers sank (there are only four left on the broadcast networks; there were a dozen in 1991).

And it is somehow fitting that TV's oldest genre, carried over from radio, should now be making the transition to a 21st-century online platform complete with Agnes Nixon, who created both shows, as a digital pioneer. It's a potentially restorative move that could prove the TV medium failed soaps, not the other way around.

Reflecting a new age of viewing patterns and business strategy, "AMC" and "OLTL" will be the first offerings of The Online Network, an ad-supported outlet for first-run entertainment delivered online.

"What better way to start than with two shows that have been watched by fanatical fans for as much as 40 years?" said Rich Frank, a partner of Prospect Park studios, which owns The Online Network.

He notes that even as ABC pronounced death for these two soaps, "AMC" was averaging 3.2 million viewers a day and "OLTL" had 3.8 million viewers. He sets the threshold of success for his new venture at "a very conservative percentage" of that broadcast audience.

"Being online is going to draw people in," predicts Jennifer Pepperman, "OLTL" executive producer. "You can click on it and watch it any time you like."

Meanwhile, the drama will adapt to its new medium.

"We don't want to totally reinvent the wheel, but we want to make the wheel turn better and turn quicker,"

Pepperman said.

"AMC" executive producer Ginger Smith echoes Pepperman from her office a few steps away at the just-moved-in-looking, bustling headquarters the two shows share.

"We want to keep the core," said Smith, who has risen on "AMC" from production assistant in 1988. "I still want escapism and romance, but we're going to have stories that are sometimes a little darker and edgier than we did on ABC."

As she is speaking, "AMC" is wrapping its first weeks in front of the cameras. Then "OLTL" takes over the 27,000-square-foot soundstage to start production. In this back-and-forth arrangement, each series will tape 210 episodes in the year ahead.

"But these are not webisodes," Frank said. "We are shooting television as everyone knows it."

Frank is a veteran entertainment exec who headed The Walt Disney Studios and served as president of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences. With his Prospect Park partner Jeff Kwatinetz, he produces TV series including USA network's "Royal Pains" and FX's "Wilfred."

But even as their company was doing business with traditional networks, Frank envisioned an online network delivering content to devices not limited to TV, and sidestepping traditional cable delivery.

Then ABC canceled those two soaps.

"They fell into our lap," said Frank, though minimizing the lengthy process of licensing them.

"These two shows come with 40 years of advertiser relationships and a die-hard fan base," said Kwatinetz from across the partners desk he and Frank occupy in their shared corner office.

Kwatinetz's resume includes running The Firm, a talent management company whose clients included the Backstreet Boys, Jennifer Lopez and Kelly Clarkson.

"I saw the digital revolution coming in the music business," he said, "and now, in television, it feels the same. My experience in the entertainment business tells me that what people want more than anything is convenience. Now television, by going online, is so much more convenient."

So everything old is new again, and the fundamentals still apply: These two shows have retained a most profound link with soaps' glorious past: Agnes Nixon.

Now 85, Nixon was mentored by the grande dame of the soap opera genre, Irna Phillips, back in the radio age.

She was writing for a TV soap — "Search for Tomorrow" — as early as 1951.

Then, in the late 1960s, while married, raising a family and serving as head writer for "The Guiding Light," she created "AMC" (as she puts it) "in my free time."

She wrote a "Bible" sourcebook for this prospective new series. But the show was turned down by CBS and the sponsor, Procter & Gamble.

Next she breathed new life into NBC's flagging "Another World," then was approached by ABC to create a new serial. Believing there was something "wrong" with "AMC" — after all, CBS had rejected it — Nixon started over and created "OLTL."

"It its first year, it had good ratings," she recalls during a recent interview at her Manhattan pied-a-terre. "So ABC said to me, 'How about creating another for us?'

"I said to my husband, 'I can't think of another one.' He said, 'How about 'All My Children'?' So I opened the desk drawer and took out the Bible and sent it to ABC. They said, 'Boy, that was fast work!'"

Nixon doesn't write these days, but she's been involved on a daily basis as the series resume life. And she's heading up what's become a grand reunion.

Said "AMC" exec producer Smith, "With every former member of the cast, staff and crew, when I called them they said, 'We want to get in the trenches with you.' When I called Cady McClain, she said, 'Where do you want me and what time do you want me there?'"

The 43-year-old McClain first played the role of Dixie Clooney in 1988 and has since had a stormy history with villainous Pine Valley tycoon Adam Chandler (David Canary).

When Chandler's wife, Brooke, couldn't present him with a male heir, he had an affair with Dixie, which produced his son, "then he got rid of me. He put me in an insane asylum."

"The baby," McClain adds, "was this guy here."

Seated beside her in this rehearsal room is Ryan Bittle, newly cast as Dixie's all-grown-up, soap-operahandsome son JR Chandler. And as McClain spins out more history of her character and his, Bittle listens with great interest: Much of it is news to him.

"I'm not familiar with the show at all," he confesses, "and I'm still trying to piece everything together."

What can Bittle look forward to? More history unfolding, soaked in plenty of emotion.

"I was crying all day yesterday," said McClain. "Crying again today."

But undergirding the essential turmoil, hope springs eternal on daytime dramas — and for the people reviving two venerable soaps.

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
