Tropical storm forms in Gulf

Andrea to bring torrential rains

The young hurricane season's first named storm formed Wednesday evening in the Gulf of Mexico, promising a wet and windy Thursday in Citrus County and across the Florida west coast. Tropical Storm Andrea was expected to make landfall sometime today in the Big Bend area. Fore-

casters did not expect it to strengthen to a hurricane. Forecasters issued a tropical storm warning for a swath of Florida's west coast starting at Boca Grande, an island to the northwest of Fort Myers, and ending in the Big Bend area of the state. Citrus County is under a flood watch and tropical storm warning, and should expect 2 to 5 inches of

rain, said Capt. Joe Eckstein, who heads the county's Emergency Operations Center. Eckstein said forecasters expect to issue a tornado watch this morning that could last much of the day. "It's pretty much a bad day to-

morrow," Eckstein said Wednesday night. "Hope nobody had any outdoor plans." Eckstein said some flooding could be expected in areas prone for high water, such as Ozello, parts of Homosassa and Crystal River. Eckstein also said residents should keep an eye on the 3:21 p.m. high tide in King's Bay. The county is not opening sandbag locations, though that could change if Andrea's conditions

Complex, costly process ahead

The lengthy, complex, costly process of closing the Crystal River nuclear plant is under way. While decommissioning will not officially begin until Nuclear Regulatory Commission requirements are met, Duke Energy Florida has a transition organization in place led by director Terry Hobbs. It also has a trust fund to finance the process and redeployment plans for some of the affected workers. Though the decision to retire the plant, known as CR3, came Feb. 5, the fund for financing decommissioning dates back to 1982 and involves the nine minority co-owners. Duke owns 91.8 percent of the plant and the other owners have separate decommissioning trust funds relating to their percentage of ownership. Co-owners include the city utilities of Alachua, Bushnell, Gainesville, Kissimmee, Leesburg, Ocala and New Smyrna Beach, along with Orlando Utilities Commission and Seminole Electric Cooperative. According to PSC filings, Progress Energy Florida and the other co-owners certified to NRC funds would be available to

Proposed Levy nuclear plant could have joint owners

When its retirement came, the Crystal River nuclear plant had 10 owners, with Duke Energy the majority holder. A similar arrangement could be used for the planned Levy County nuclear plant. Having a share of the Crystal River nuclear plant, even as small as the .04 percent owned by the city of Bushnell,

carried an obligation to maintain a decommissioning trust fund, according to the participation agreement. Just as multiple smaller partners were included in the ownership of CR3, as the now-closed nuclear plant is known, a similar joint ownership has been considered for the Levy plant. That project has an estimated cost of between \$19 billion and \$24 billion and has a tentative in-service date

of 2024 for the first unit, with the second unit following 18 months later. Early in planning for the proposed Levy plant, Progress Energy Florida estimated decommissioning costs at \$747 million. In April 2011, Progress Energy provided an update to entities that had expressed continued interest in joint

Floral City man has vivid memories of D-Day

Allies hit Normandy 69 years ago today

FLORAL CITY — On June 6, 1944, despite the rough sea and terrible weather conditions, 160,000 Allied troops, supported by more than 5,000 ships and 13,000 aircraft, landed along a 50-mile stretch of the coastline at Normandy, France, to fight

Nazi Germany. It was D-Day, and by day's end the Allies got a foothold, but in the process lost more than 9,000 men. However, more than 100,000 soldiers began the march across Europe to defeat Hitler. Floral City resident and Tampa native Earl Potter was in the second wave of troops that came to Normandy to help liberate France.

Although 69 years have passed, the memories of that time are still vivid. "We came on the second day," Potter said. "The Germans were all in a cliff, and the Navy concentrated their fire on that cliff until we could get through with supplies." Potter, now 90, said it kept raining and they had to dig foxholes deep enough to make a shelf to sleep on. "The Germans dropped one of

their blockbusters up the road that made a crater 15 feet deep and 75 feet wide," he said. "They were trying to hit a bridge to block our supplies. There was a paratrooper hanging in a tree —

LECANTO — Citrus County SCORE is partnering with the Crystal River Mall to provide opportunities for both new and growing businesses.

The chapter, which dates back to 1994, had its annual awards luncheon Wednesday.

"We feel it's better to have someone in a mall than a mall that's just empty," said Bob Braatz, president and chapter chairman in announcing the partnership.

Millie Bresnahan, general manager of the mall, was the guest speaker. She said they have 80,000 square feet of mixed use space — the former Sears store — available.

decommission the plant. Orlando Utilities Commission, for example, a 1.6 percent owner, has a CR3 decommissioning fund of \$13.2 million. Commission spokesperson Timothy Trudell said the money was provided out of rates and placed in a trust fund which retains the interest earned.

"Though Duke Energy had the exclusive discretion to make the decision to decommission the plant, we have worked to ensure that the joint-owners have been informed and engaged throughout the process as they have been through the life of the plant," explained Duke spokesperson Heather Danenhower.

Construction started on CR3 in 1968 and it began operation in 1977. It went off line in 2009 with the discovery of cracks in the containment dome.

Cost estimates for decommissioning range from \$842.6 million to \$978 million depending on the source. Last month Duke Energy leaders stated the \$600 million the company has set aside will be adequate. The actual fund balance on Dec. 31, 2012, was \$629 million, meeting NRC guidelines.

In 2010, the Florida Public Service Commission approved a study estimating the decommissioning cost at \$842.6 million. The higher estimate is from Duke's 2012 filing with the Security and Exchange Commission. That same study estimated reduced future property taxes on CR3.

Within two years after certifying permanent closure of CR3, Duke must submit an NRC report.

By comparison, in planning the proposed Levy County nuclear plant, Progress Energy estimated decommissioning costs at \$747 million.

Danenhower said Duke Energy Florida customers contributed to the fund during the life of the plant until PSC action in 2002. The fund now has sufficient money based on investment growth without the need for customer contributions.

She said the company is now in the process of updating the site-specific cost estimate for decommissioning CR3 and validating the sufficiency of the trust fund.

When the decision to retire CR3 was announced, Jim Rogers, Duke chairman, president and CEO, said repairing the plant would have cost \$1.49 billion to \$3.49 billion and held significant risks. By late February, Duke notified NRC it had permanently ceased operation of CR3 and removed the fuel from the reactor.

According to NRC, when a company decides to permanently close a nuclear plant, the facility must be decommissioned by removing it from service and reducing radioactivity to a level that permits release of the property and termi-

nation of the operating license.

Within two years after certifying permanent closure of CR3, Duke must submit an NRC report. It provides a description of planned decommissioning activities, a schedule for accomplishing them and an estimate of expected costs. Up to 3 percent of the fund can be used for decommissioning planning.

NRC spokesperson Neil Sheenhan said after receiving the report, the NRC will make it available for public comment, and hold a public meeting to discuss the company's plans.

When the decision to retire CR3 came, the plant was being upgraded for additional capacity, putting an additional 20 workers in the mix of positions to be affected by the process.

Danenhower said, as of

June, approximately 350 employees have been identified to remain onsite to work on the transition. Over time, that number will become smaller. Nearly 200 employees have either already redeployed to other positions within the company (locally, St. Petersburg, the Carolinas, etc.) or have one or more job offers pending within the company.

She said 97 employees are leaving the company. They have been given 60 days notice and are eligible for severance benefits. Release dates were either May 31 or are at the end of June and July.

While all decommissioning must be completed within 60 years of shutdown, the process has been completed quicker in other locations, according to the NRC.

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Experts: Duke undervalues assets

CRYSTAL RIVER — This time they're prepared.

Citrus County Property Appraiser's Office officials, who say they were caught off guard late last year when Duke Energy's tax payment came in \$16 million short of expected, now say they have the experts on hand and are ready to do battle if necessary.

Property Appraiser Geoff Greene announced last week that a first-time appraisal of the local Duke Energy assets and

property netted a \$1.15 billion increase in taxable value for 2013. If the company agreed to the new assessment, which Greene doesn't expect, its tax bill would jump from \$36 million in 2012 to \$54.6 million this year.

In the fallout from Duke's \$19.4 million tax payment in November, including the company suing Greene over the assessments, Greene hired a pair of appraisers for \$330,000 to conduct an on-site appraisal of the Duke Energy complex, plus its other assets in Citrus County.

The appraisers, Gerald Hartman of Orlando and Lawrence

John Golicz of Lecanto, concluded that the company had significantly undervalued its intangible property at the energy complex north of Crystal River.

They told the *Chronicle* Editorial Board on Tuesday that the Public Service Commission guarantees a return on investment, and that Duke's tangible and personal property has significant value.

Hartman said Duke retrieves costs from its customers whether equipment, such as that purchased for the nuclear power plant that is now being decommissioned, is ever actually in use.

The reason, he said, is a regulated business cannot fail.

“You must stay in business,” Hartman said. “The electric company has to turn on the lights. How many properties can you buy that are guaranteed to make money?”

Even the nuclear plant, shut down since 2009 and permanently shut down in February, continues to draw a return on the company's investment.

Hartman said the PSC has approved \$1.7 billion in payments to Duke from its customers beginning in 2017 and spanning 20 years. Greene's attorney, Thomas

Cloud, said Greene can use information from the 2013 appraisal to defend the 2012 lawsuit. A hearing for that case is set for Sept. 9, and a trial is tentatively scheduled for some time in April.

Meanwhile, Greene sent a letter Monday to Duke requesting a meeting to discuss his office's appraisal and the company's tax return.

“Let me extend an invitation to you that we begin this year on better terms,” he wrote to David Wright, director of Duke's property tax department. “Communication between us can only help to avoid misunderstandings.”

Popular Homosassa eatery burned down nearly two years ago

HOMOSSASSA — Something's finally up on Halls River Road where the Marguerita Grill dissolved in flames nearly two years ago.

“The steel structure is up and the interlocking floors are now in place,” said Carl Flanagan, executive vice president at Nature Coast Bank, Hernando, the lender for the restaurant-rebuilding project. “The next schedule would be to receive a shipment of more material to start putting sides on the building.”

Just getting the building started has taken more time than expected, with an eye on reopening the popular waterfront restaurant in the fall.

“They are going to do the best that they can under the circumstances to open up by September,” Flanagan said

about the structure construction starting at the beginning of hurricane season. “It will be an outstanding facility and Tommy cannot wait to open.”

Tommy Piliouras, the restaurant owner, confirmed his eagerness to start serving again and his excitement about the new facility.

“It's beyond my expectations,” Piliouras said. “You have to see it to appreciate what's going to be there. It will be the only structure in Citrus County that I know of where the water will go back to the river nice and clean because of going through all the different stages. We spent a lot more extra money to do it because we care about it and it's actually going to filter before going back to the river.”

The site work had to meet stringent standards before construction of the restaurant building could start. Flanagan explained underwater stormwa-

ter drainage requirements had to be met first. That construction was not obvious to passersby.

“It was like absolutely nothing was going on, but there was a lot of work underground,” Flanagan said. “The pilings — they were very sensitive with that area. The water table there is very close in certain areas to the surface, so that took some time to get them installed properly.”

The new restaurant will be a two-story structure to replace the single-story building that burned down, but will be in the same footprint and have the same seating capacity, according to Inverness attorney Larry Haag, who presented the application in November to the Citrus County Planning and Development Commission. Although two stories, the restaurant seating would not be twice as large because construction would follow new codes for bathroom size and access, it would have a much

larger kitchen, include a dance floor, and the top floor would not be as large in floor space as the ground floor.

“The zoning board did acknowledge that as far as parking places, there are sufficient parking places for the restaurant patrons and they did take into consideration the usage of some of the boat slips to meet the requirements of that,” Flanagan said.

Piliouras is bouncing back from the fire.

“I was real depressed,” Piliouras said.

Now, everywhere he goes he said people ask him when he's going to reopen, which cheers him up.

“Almost everybody is eager to come back to work with us,” Piliouras said. “We hope to employ more than 60 people.”

Free health, dental clinic looking for volunteers

Facility will provide care for county's needy

HOMOSSASSA — The anticipated free dental and medical clinic in Homosassa is approaching its grand opening.

Nature Coast Ministries and Catholic Charities have been working to transition the old, donated Knights of Columbus building into offices, meeting rooms and a free dental and medical clinic.

The Catholic Charities Citrus Community Outreach Center, 9020 W. Atlas Drive, Homosassa, is a location that will provide part-time facilities for the We Care

Food Pantry, Pregnancy and Family Life Center, Citrus Abuse Shelter Association and the Samaritan Dental and Medical Clinic.

Several of organizations are already operating; however, the Samaritan Dental and Medical Clinic is scheduled to open in July.

“We are nearing our grand opening as we apply paint to the walls and install the medical and dental equipment,” said Joe Papp, director of the Samaritan Dental and Medical Clinic.

Papp and Bonnie McMullin, public relations correspondent, said the free clinic is prepared to begin seeing patients;

however, they require more dentists, physicians, nurses and dental and medical assistants.

“Dentists and doctors are not going to come in without an experienced qualified assistant,” McMullin said. “A dentist can't do anything without a dental assistant.”

Homosassa dentist Dr. Frank Vascimini and 20 other dental and medical personnel are volunteering their time and have received sovereign immunity — through the Florida Volunteer Health Services Department — to provide dental and medical services free to needy Citrus County elderly, veterans, homeless

and low-income adults.

“It is such a blessing because these people couldn't afford to have this care,” McMullin said. “Some people in this community have never been to a dentist — adults. This will be such a boon for people's self-esteem.”

The Nature Coast Ministries board recognizes Citrus County is a giving community.

“People want to help but don't know how,” McMullin said. “We need dental and medical personnel, volunteers and donations. We need the community to come together with us to help those that need us. Together we can do so much more than we can separately.”

Wayne Newton moving out of estate

LAS VEGAS — "Mr. Las Vegas" Wayne Newton is moving out of his sprawling estate of 45 years.

The crooner's family members and a spokesman confirmed Wednesday that the downsizing to another mansion involving Newton, family members and a menagerie of exotic animals is taking place this week.

Property records show the move is to a \$3 million mansion about a mile from Newton's beloved "Casa de Shenandoah."

Newton family members said the new property also involves five surrounding homes.

The relocation comes as part of a Chapter 11 bankruptcy reorganization involving a partnership that bought Newton's nearly 40-acre estate for \$19.5 million in June 2010.

Plans to develop a tourist attraction collapsed amid bitter infighting.

A federal bankruptcy judge is due June 21 to review and approve sealed agreements in the case.

Chimp's pics sell for \$76,000 at auction

NEW YORK — Lindsey Vonn took an unexpected detour during her evening at an awards show — off the red carpet and into the women's bathroom for drug testing.





TALLAHASSEE — An 84-year-old Florida woman who bought her Powerball ticket after another customer let her get ahead in line came forward Wednesday to claim the biggest undivided lottery jackpot in history: \$590 million.

Gloria C. MacKenzie, who lives in a modest, tin-roof house in Zephyrhills, where the sole

winning ticket in the May 18 drawing was bought, took her prize in a lump sum of just over \$370 million. After federal taxes, she is taking home about \$270 million, lottery officials said.

She did not speak to a crowd of reporters outside lottery headquarters, leaving quickly in a silver Ford Focus with her son and family friends. She was accompanied at the lottery offices by two unidentified attorneys.

ORLANDO — The identities of potential jurors in the trial of the former neighborhood watch volunteer charged with killing an unarmed teenager in central Florida will be kept confidential, a Florida judge ruled Wednesday.

man's trial won't be sequestered, as requested by defense attorneys.

During jury selection beginning next week, potential jurors will be referred to only by their jury numbers. Attorneys need to pick six jurors and four alternates.

the Germans had shot him. Some FFI (French fighters) tried to help him and the Germans hung them up and cut their tongues out. It was horrible."

Potter recalled the seemingly never-ending shelling, the sights of burned bodies, of one man who "went berserk."

"I remember everything," he said. "It's burned into my memory and I can't forget any of it."

He served with the 610th Engineers, 2nd Armored Division, U.S.

Army. He had been drafted, as had all of his friends in Tampa.

After the war ended he returned to Tampa and stayed there until he moved to Floral City 12 years ago.

Last month, he was one of the World War II veterans to take a one-day Honor Flight trip from Orlando to Washington D.C. to visit the World War II Memorial and other war memorials and monuments.

"When we got to Baltimore, I'd never seen so many people in my life," he said. "As we got off the plane and headed to the buses, they applauded us

"Soldiers, Sailors and Airmen of the Allied Expeditionary Force! You are about to embark upon a great crusade, toward which we have striven these many months. The eyes of the world are upon you. The hopes and prayers of liberty-loving people everywhere march with you. In company with our brave Allies and brothers in arms on other fronts, you will bring about the destruction of the German war machine, the elimination of Nazi tyranny over the oppressed peoples of Europe, and security for ourselves in a free world.

"Your task will not be an easy one. Your enemy is well trained, well equipped and battle hardened, he will fight savagely.

"But this is the year 1944! Much has happened since the Nazi triumphs of 1940-41. The United Nations have inflicted upon the Germans great defeats, in open battle, man to man. Our air offensive has seriously reduced their strength in the air and their capacity to wage war on the ground. Our home fronts have given us an overwhelming superiority in weapons and munitions of war, and placed at our disposal great reserves of trained fighting men. The tide has turned! The free men of the world are marching together to victory!

"I have full confidence in your courage, devotion to duty and skill in battle. We will accept nothing less than full victory!

"Good Luck! And let us all beseech the blessings of Almighty God upon this great and noble undertaking."

"While Duke Energy has pursued joint ownership opportunities, the shift in the project schedule has delayed significant talks with potential joint owners until later in 2014," she said. "Until those more detailed discussions occur, Duke Energy cannot speculate on whether potential joint-

owners would have similar decommissioning funding responsibilities."



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Lautenberg remembered for tenacious rise to the top

NEW YORK — Tenacity marked U.S. Sen. Frank Lautenberg's journey from poor child to multimillionaire who served for decades in the Senate, leaving his mark along the way on aspects of American life including public transportation and the environment, relatives and dignitaries said Wednesday at his funeral at a New York City synagogue. "He never quit anything. He never gave up. He never gave in," Vice President Joe Biden told the 1,100 mourners, including

former Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie and several former governors, and many of Lautenberg's Senate colleagues.

Lautenberg, a liberal Democrat from New Jersey, died Monday after suffering complications from viral pneumonia. At 89, he was the oldest member of the Senate and the last of 115 World War II veterans to serve there. In a service that spanned two and a half hours, admirers including Clinton and several of Lautenberg's children

and grandchildren remembered the causes he championed and his drive to fight for what he believed, whether on the Senate floor or around the dinner table. They also recalled him as someone who never forgot the roots from which he rose or lost sight of others still striving to achieve.

Lautenberg was "the living definition of what it means to be a successful man," said Biden, who counted Lautenberg as one of his closest friends in the Senate during the more than a quarter-century they served together.

Civil rights leader Will Campbell dead at age 88

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Rev. Will Campbell, a white minister who drew acclaim for his involvement in the civil rights movement, has died at the age of 88.

John Egerton, a close friend of Campbell's for nearly 50 years, told The Associated Press on Tuesday that Campbell died Monday night from complications following a stroke he had about two years ago. Egerton said he was contacted by Campbell's son, who was at the minister's bedside in Nashville when he died.

"He never really recovered from it," Egerton said of the stroke.

The *Tennessean* quoted former President Jimmy Carter as saying of Campbell, "He used the force of his words and the witness of his deeds to convey a healing message of reconciliation to any and all who heard him."

Campbell was born in 1924 in Amite County, Miss.

After a stint in the military, he attended Yale, where he got a divinity degree in 1952 and then headed to Taylor, La., to preach at Taylor Southern Baptist Church.

He later came to Nashville, where he was described as a staunch leader for civil rights, and was well respected by others in the movement.

While he supported integration, Campbell preached to those against it. He was known for saying: "If you're gonna love one, you've got to love 'em all."

Campbell was the Nashville representative of a pro-integration operation called the National Council of Churches. Because he was white, he was allowed entry into rooms unapproachable by some of those at the forefront of the movement.

"When we had the sit-ins, Will would show up," Bernard Lafayette, a civil rights leader in Nashville and close friend of Campbell's, told *The Tennessean*.

"We knew there was somebody who cared and was concerned about what happened to us. He was reminding us that there were some white people who believed in what we were doing."

While he supported integration, Campbell preached to those against it. "I always say that Will became the civil rights chaplain for the Ku Klux Klan," Lafayette said.

Campbell was known for saying: "If you're gonna love one, you've got to love 'em all."

A memorial service for Campbell is planned in Nashville.

Alixia Naff, scholar of early Arab-Americans, dies at 93

McLEAN, Va. — Alixia Naff, an early and pioneering historian who documented the lives of the first wave of Arab-American immigrants a century ago, has died after a brief illness. She was 93.

Naff died Saturday at her home in Mitchellville, Md., according to two of her friends who were with her that day.

Naff, who immigrated from what is now Lebanon when she was a toddler, is perhaps best known for a collection of oral histories and artifacts she donated to the Smithsonian which are still available for scholarly research at the National Museum of American History.

"Through her research, Alixia Naff greatly contributed to the understanding of the early Arab immigrant experience in the United States from 1880 through the 1950s," the Smithsonian said in a statement Wednesday.

The collection, named for her parents Faris and Yamna Naff, contains more than 2,000 photos, 450 oral histories and 500 artifacts such as personal and household goods.

Naff traveled the country in a blue Volkswagen Beetle nicknamed "the camel," to collect the histories, and used her powers of persuasion to convince people to give up treasured family items to be included in the collection, said friend and colleague Rosemarie Esber.

Items in the collection include musical instruments, clothing and even a kibbe pounder, a large stone used to make a traditional Middle Eastern dish, Esber said.

"Her greatest legacy is saving all this material for all the others who came after her," Esber said.

Her work documented the diversity in a community that was often overlooked by scholars, focusing on the first wave of Arab immigrants, mostly Christian, who came to America in

the years surrounding the turn of the century.

"Her ability to tell their story was important in understanding the diversity of the Arab American experience," said Helen Samhan, a friend and former executive director of the Arab American Institute in Washington. "Even in scholarly circles, the history of the Arab-American experience was often skewed in favor of hot political issues."

Naff grew up in Spring Valley, Ill.; Fort Wayne, Ind.; and Detroit. Before moving to Mitchellville, she lived for a number of years in Falls Church, Va.

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

Markets stumble on downbeat data

NEW YORK — A series of weak economic reports sent the stock market plunging to its lowest level in a month on Wednesday. Companies like miners, banks and chemical makers, whose fortunes are most closely tied to the prospects for growth, led the market lower.

The troubling data included weak hiring at private companies, a plunge in mortgage applications and sluggish orders to U.S. factories.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 217 points and finished at 14,960, a drop of 1.4 percent. It was the first close below 15,000 since May 6 and the biggest decline in seven weeks.

Stocks started lower and declined steadily throughout the day. After rising every month this year and climbing to record levels this spring, some investors said a significant pullback was overdue.

“The rally is tired and people are taking some profits,” said Brad Reynolds, at investment adviser LJPR.

Investors were also unnerved by a sharp 11.5 per-

cent drop in mortgage applications last week. That was a disappointment because the rebound in housing has been one of the key factors supporting the stock market's record-breaking rally this year.

Housing stocks slumped in response. Beazer Homes fell 60 cents, or 3.1 percent, to \$18.78. D.R. Horton dropped 27 cents, or 1.2 percent, to \$22.65.

The fall in applications came as mortgage rates rose to the highest point since April 2012. The increase is being driven by higher yields in the bond market. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note climbed as high as 2.2 percent last week, the highest in more than two years.

There was also disappointing news on hiring, another one of the key supports for the market's rally this year. A measure of employment in the service sector fell to the lowest level since last July. That was a troubling sign because service companies, a broad category that includes entertainment, transportation and health care, have been the main source of job gains.

Earlier Wednesday, pay-

roll provider ADP said U.S. businesses added just 135,000 jobs in May, the second straight month of weak gains. Both increases are much lower than those reported by ADP over the winter, which averaged more than 200,000 a month from November through February.

The stock market's recent bout of volatility began May 22 as traders parsed comments from Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke and minutes from the last meeting of the Fed's policy committee for clues about when the bank would pull back on its \$85 billion in monthly bond purchases.

Since then investors have become increasingly sensitive to economic reports as they try to anticipate when the Fed will act. The bank's bond-buying program, which is intended to keep interest rates low and encourage lending, has supported markets this year. On some days stocks have rallied after poor economic reports led traders to anticipate that the Fed would keep the stimulus going.

On Wednesday, though, the stock market's decline was unambiguous.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index ended down 22.48 points, or 1.4 percent, at 1,608.90. The index is 3.6 percent below its record close of 1,669 reached May 21. It's still up 12.8 percent this year.

The Nasdaq composite dropped 43.78 points, or 1.3 percent, to 3,401.48. The index closed at its lowest level in a month.

Intel fell the most in the Dow, dropping 66 cents, or 2.6 percent, to \$24.70. Aluminum maker Alcoa was close behind. It declined 18 cents, or 2.2 percent, to \$8.20. All 30 members of the index dropped.

NEED FOR BALANCE

Larger issues plague court system

The Florida Supreme Court's ruling that public defenders can refuse cases might alleviate stress on the public defenders' office, but it does not solve the problems with the imbalance in the justice system.

The issue first arose in 2008, when the Miami-Dade County public defender asked a circuit judge for the right to refuse third-degree felony cases. The judge agreed, but the state attorney's office appealed and won. Fast-forward to May 2013 and the state's high court has overturned the original appeal.

At the time of the request, lawyers working for the Miami-Dade public defender's office might be asked to handle up to 50 cases in a week. The court wrote: "Attorneys are routinely unable to interview clients, conduct investigations, take depositions, prepare mitigation, or counsel clients about pleas offered at arraignment... a damning indictment of the poor quality of trial representation that is being afforded indigent defendants."

The ruling is a temporary fix. The state will pay a higher rate for the agency that handles the overflow of cases. The only thing the judiciary, in its role as a check to legislators, has accomplished is to put a bandage on the larger issue of a malfunctioning judicial system.

The state is funded at a much greater level than the public defenders' office and often receives other perks, such as tuition forgiveness. Granted, the state handles more cases, but the level of funding is not commensurate with the amount of work, or else you would not have public defenders handling 50 cases per week.

The unfairness of the system seemingly violates one's Constitutional right to a speedy trial and our country's ethical responsibility to provide fair representation in court. Public defenders often decry the practice of meet-and-greet pleas where defendants meet their public defender for the first time on the way to court and then are expected to counsel them on whether to accept a plea deal. It is an impossible task.

In some cases, public defenders are so overworked that only those sitting in jail get attention while the ones who've bonded out wait months for their case to move forward.

The answer is for legislators to revisit funding for the state attorney and public defender offices and at least attempt to maintain a level of balance. The present system does not work, and the State Supreme Court ruling will not fix the problems created by the Legislature.

Seven-term Democrat Pat Leahy's 38 Senate years have made him Judiciary Committee chairman. Republican Rand Paul is in his third Senate year. They hope to reduce the cruelty, irrationality and cost of the current regime of mandatory minimum sentences for federal crimes.

Such crimes are multiplying at a rate of more than 500 a decade, even though the Constitution explicitly authorizes Congress to criminalize only a few activities that are national in nature (e.g., counterfeiting, treason, crimes on the high seas). The federal government, having failed at core functions, such as fairly administering a rational revenue system, acts like a sheriff with attention-deficit disorder, haphazardly criminalizing this and that behavior in order to express righteous alarm about various wrongs that excite attention.

Approximately 80,000 persons are sentenced in federal courts each year. There are an estimated 4,500 federal criminal statutes, and tens of thousands of regulations backed by criminal penalties, including incarceration. There can be felony penalties for violating arcane regulations that do not give clear notice of behavior

that is prescribed or proscribed. This violates the mens rea requirement — people deserve criminal punishment only if they intentionally engage in conduct that is inherently wrong or that they know to be illegal. No wonder the federal prison population — currently approximately 219,000, about half serving drug sentences — has expanded 51 percent since 2000 and federal prisons are at 138 percent of their supposed capacity.

The Leahy-Paul measure would expand to all federal crimes the discretion federal judges have in many drug cases to impose sentences less than the mandatory minimums. This would, as Leahy says, allow judges — most of whom oppose mandatory minimums — to judge. Paul says mandatory minimum sentences, in the context of the proliferation of federal crimes, undermine federalism, the separation of powers and "the bedrock principle that people should be treated as individuals."

Almost everyone who enters the desensitizing world of American prisons is going to return to society, and many will have been socially handicapped by the experience. Until the 1970s, about 100 per 100,000 Americans were in prison. Today 700 per 100,000 are. America has nearly 5 percent of the world's population but almost 25 percent of its prisoners. African-Americans are 13 percent of the nation's population but 37 percent of the prison population, and one in three African-American men may spend time incarcerated. All this takes a staggering toll on shattered families and disordered neighborhoods.

The House Judiciary Committee has created an Over-Criminalization Task Force. Its members should read "Three

Felonies a Day: How the Feds Target the Innocent" (2009), by Harvey Silverglate, a libertarian lawyer whose book argues that prosecutors could indict most of us for three felonies a day. And the task force should read the short essay "Ham Sandwich Nation: Due Process When Everything Is a Crime" by Glenn Harlan Reynolds, professor of law at the University of Tennessee. Given the axiom that a competent prosecutor can persuade a grand jury to indict a ham sandwich, and given the reality of prosecutorial abuse particularly, compelling plea bargains by overcharging with "kitchen sink" indictments — Reynolds believes "the decision to charge a person criminally should itself undergo some degree of due process scrutiny." He also suggests banning plea bargains:

"An understanding that every criminal charge filed would have to be either backed up in open court or ignominiously dropped would significantly reduce the incentive to overcharge. ... Our criminal justice system, as presently practiced, is basically a plea-bargain system with actual trials of guilt or innocence a bit of showy froth floating on top."

U.S. prosecutors win more than 90 percent of their cases, 97 percent of those without complete trials. British and Canadian prosecutors win significantly less, and for many offenses, the sentences in those nations are less severe.

Making mandatory minimums less severe would lessen the power of prosecutors to pressure defendants by overcharging them in order to expose them to draconian penalties. The Leahy-Paul measure is a way to begin reforming a criminal justice system in which justice is a diminishing component.

Associated Press: The administration (Department of Justice) got tele-


phone and email records from a large number of AP reporters without telling the AP about it. No warrants were issued and the government did not ask for this information — this is illegal and unconstitutional.

Mayor: One dead in Philadelphia building collapse

PHILADELPHIA — A building that was being torn down collapsed with a thunderous boom Wednesday, raining bricks on a neighboring thrift store, killing a woman and injuring at least 13 other people in an accident that witnesses said was bound to happen.

The woman who died was 35 years old, the mayor said, but no other information about her was released.

Rescuers pulled another woman, trapped amid the rubble of a Salvation Army thrift store, after they heard her voice.

Survivors were taken to hospitals with minor injuries.

Parole denied for Manson follower Van Houten

CHINO, Calif. — Former Charles Manson follower and convicted murderer Leslie Van Houten has been denied parole once again.

A California panel rejected Van Houten's bid for release from state prison Wednesday at her 20th parole hearing.

The 63-year-old was convicted of murder and conspiracy for her role in the August 1969 slayings of a wealthy Los Angeles couple, Leno and Rosemary LaBianca. They were stabbed to death the night after Manson's followers killed actress Sharon Tate and four others.

Big mako shark caught off Calif. could be record

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif. — A huge mako shark caught off the coast of Southern California could set a record, but a critic said it should have been released because sharks are threatened worldwide.

Jason Johnston of Texas caught the 1,323-pound shark off Huntington Beach on Monday after a 2 1/2-hour battle, the Orange County Register reported.

If the catch is confirmed and meets conditions, it would exceed the 1,221-pound record mako catch made in July 2001 off the coast of Chatham, Mass., said Jack Vitek, world records coordinator for the Florida-based International Game Fish Association.

Bill passed to address sexual assaults

WASHINGTON — A House committee is responding to the growing number of sexual assaults in the armed forces by stripping military commanders of their authority to reverse convictions in rape and assault cases.

The measure approved Wednesday by the House Armed Services Committee also requires that anyone found guilty of rape or sexual assault receive a punishment that includes, at a minimum, a dismissal from military service or a dishonorable discharge.

Shakeup in US security team

Obama names Rice national security adviser

WASHINGTON — Shaking up his national security team, President Barack Obama tapped diplomat Susan Rice as his national security adviser, defying Republicans who have vigorously criticized her faulty explanation about the attack on Americans in Benghazi, Libya.

"Susan is the consummate public servant — a patriot who puts her country first," Obama said while announcing Rice's appointment Wednesday during a Rose Garden ceremony.

Rice will take over the top national security post from Tom Donilon, who is resigning after four years in the White House. Obama lauded the 58-year-old Donilon for having "shaped every single national security policy of my presi-

deney," including the renewed U.S. focus on ties with Asia.

The president also announced the nomination of former White House aide Samantha Power to replace Rice as U.S. ambassador to the United Nations. Power is a human rights advocate and expert on genocide.

It's unclear whether the changes signal a significant shift in Obama's foreign policy, particularly in Syria,

where the U.S. is being pressured to act against President Bashar Assad.

Power is seen as a proponent of American intervention on humanitarian grounds and Rice backed greater U.S. involvement in Libya, though administration officials have made clear they don't draw direct comparisons between the current situation in Syria and the 2011 push to oust Libyan leader Moammar

Gadhafi. In that situation, the U.S., Britain and France maintained a no-fly zone to allow rebels to fight back against Gadhafi.

For Rice — a longtime Obama ally and close confidante of the president — the appointment is a bit of redemption after she was forced to withdraw from consideration as Obama's second-term secretary of state amid criticism of her handling of the Benghazi attacks. Rice said at the time that she did not want her confirmation hearing to become a distraction for the White House. The national security post does not require Senate confirmation.

Rice's selection was greeted by a muted response from some Republicans who had earlier accused her of being part of an administration cover-up in the Benghazi attacks.

Arizona Sen. John McCain, one of Rice's harshest critics, wrote on Twitter Wednesday that he disagreed with her appointment but would "make every effort" to work with her on important matters.

Syrian army captures key town of Qusair

DAMASCUS, Syria — The Syrian army captured a strategic town near the Lebanese border on Wednesday after a grueling three-week battle, handing a heavy defeat to rebels and solidifying a shift in the country's civil war in favor of President Bashar Assad's regime.

Both sides had dug in for an all-out battle for Qusair, which rebels seized last year, a sign of its importance for both as a key crossroads of supply lines between Damascus and western and northern Syria. The regime assault also marked another key turning point in the conflict: the most overt involvement yet by its Lebanese Hezbollah allies, whose fighters boosted the military's firepower in overcoming the rebels.

The town's fall could boost the momentum for Syrian troops in rolling back rebel gains in central Syria in past months. The blow to the rebel movement could also further discourage it from entering peace negotiations with the regime, which the United States and Russia have been trying to put together in Geneva.

In a rare statement read on state TV Wednesday, the Syrian military triumphantly declared that it had "cleansed" Qusair of rebels. It said the town's capture was a "clear message to all those participating in the aggression against Syria" — a sign clearly directed at the rebels' regional backers that the regime believes the tide is turning in the war.

Gunmen in Iraq ambush, kill 14 travelers

BAGHDAD — Gunmen ambushed a group of travelers at a fake checkpoint at a remote desert site in western Iraq on Wednesday and killed at least 14 of them, according to Iraqi officials, in what appeared to be the latest blow in sectarian violence gripping the country.

The gunmen, apparently looking for Shiites to kill, struck near the town of Nukhaib. The town, near the site of a deadly 2011 ambush, sits at a desert crossroads west of the Shiite holy city of Karbala, but is in the Sunni-dominated Anbar province.

The assailants manning the fake highway checkpoint checked the identities of travelers, presumably to identify their sect based on their names, according to officials. Police said they found blood-stained IDs on the ground identifying some of the dead as coming from Karbala, 60 miles south of Baghdad.

Officials said the 14 victims of Wednesday's attack were shot in the head. They said the dead included police and soldiers, as well as civilian residents of the overwhelmingly Shiite Karbala.

US soldier pleads guilty to murders

Bales describes killing Afghan civilians



JOINT BASE LEWIS-MCCHORD, Wash. — The American soldier charged with killing 16 Afghan civilians during nighttime raids on two villages last year pleaded guilty Wednesday then described shooting each victim, telling a military judge there is "not a good reason in this world" for what he did.

To avoid the death penalty, Staff Sgt. Robert Bales pleaded guilty to multiple counts of murder at the hearing at Joint Base Lewis-McChord south of Seattle. He then read from a statement in a clear and steady voice, describing his actions for each killing in the same terms.

Bales, 39, said he left the remote base where he was posted in southern Afghanistan in March 2012, and went to the nearby villages of mud-walled compounds. Once inside, he said he "formed the intent" of killing the victims, then shot each one.

"This act was without legal justification, sir,"

Bales told the judge while seated at a defense table, his hands folded in front of him.

Most of the victims were women and children, and some of the bodies were burned. Relatives have told The Associated Press they are irate at the notion Bales will escape execution for one of the worst atrocities of the Afghanistan war.

The judge, Col. Jeffery Nance, still must decide whether to accept Bales' plea.

Lt. Col. Jay Morse, one of the prosecutors, raised concerns during the hearing that the soldier's testimony contradicted what he earlier acknowledged in a signed "stipulation of facts" from that night.

Morse noted Bales testified that he made the decision to kill each victim when he raised his gun and pointed it at them. But in the stipulation, Bales said he struggled with one of the women before killing her, and that "after the tussle"

he decided to "murder anyone that he saw."

The judge questioned Bales about it, and Bales confirmed that he had decided to kill everyone after struggling with the woman.

At one point, Nance asked Bales why he committed the slayings.

Bales responded: "Sir, as far as why — I've asked that question a million times since then. There's not a good reason in this world for why I did the horrible things I did."

Nadal, Djokovic to meet in French semis

PARIS — The ease with which Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic swept aside their quarterfinal opponents at the French Open was remarkably similar.

Both men won in straight sets Wednesday, hardly challenged. Both earned 12 break points, Nadal converting seven, Djokovic five. Nadal's serve was broken only once, Djokovic's twice.

In what amounted to heavy-duty practice sessions for the real test that lies ahead, Nadal needed 1 hour, 56 minutes to beat No. 9-seeded Stanislas Wawrinka 6-2, 6-3, 6-1 in Court Philippe Chatrier, while a short walk away, Djokovic's 6-3, 7-6 (5), 7-5 victory over No. 12 Tommy Haas in Court Suzanne Lenglen lasted just 17 minutes longer.

Now comes the showdown everyone's been anticipating since the field was set nearly two weeks ago: A Djokovic vs. Nadal semifinal Friday that will have the feel of a final, and not only because they met for the championship at Roland Garros a year ago.

"A lot of people in the tennis world are looking to the matchup coming up with Rafa and Novak," said Haas, who at 35 was the oldest French Open quarterfinalist since 1971. "I'll definitely be watching."

Who wouldn't?

Djokovic, ranked and seeded No. 1, against Nadal, owner of a record seven French Open titles, including three in a row.

Djokovic, trying to become the eighth man to complete a career Grand Slam, against Nadal, trying

to become the only man to win eight trophies at one major tournament.

Djokovic owns six major titles, Nadal 11.

"I would prefer an easier opponent," Nadal said.

Djokovic is 33-4 this season and reached his 12th consecutive major semifinal, the second-longest streak in history.

Nadal is 41-2 since returning in February after missing seven months because of a left knee injury he declined to discuss Wednesday.

That absence is why Nadal's ranking slid and he was seeded No. 3, so was drawn to play Djokovic in the semifinals; their previous 11 matchups came in tournament finals.

Revenge or repeat?

LeBron seeks payback against Spurs after sweep in 2007 Finals

MIAMI — Before reaching the top of basketball, LeBron James was run over by the San Antonio Spurs.

The Spurs swept James' Cleveland Cavaliers in the 2007 NBA Finals, so long ago that the winning game plan focused on exploiting James' weaknesses. Those are nearly impossible to find now, and James essentially warned the Spurs that they shouldn't bother looking.

The Spurs already know.

"He'll be a lot more of a problem than he was in '07, that's for sure," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said Wednesday.

Tim Duncan told the beaten James minutes after that series that the league would someday belong to him, and he

was right. The NBA's MVP guided Miami to last year's championship and the league's best record this season.



Now the Spurs will try to take it back.

But James is now the best player in the game, is surrounded by more talent in Miami than he ever had in Cleveland, and still carries the memory of the beating the Spurs laid on him six years ago.

"I have something in me that they took in '07. Beat us on our home floor, celebrated on our home floor. I won't forget that. You shouldn't as a competitor. You should never forget that," James said.

He joined the Heat in 2010, experienced more finals failure a year later; then was finals MVP last year when Miami beat Oklahoma City in five games. Another title now would put him halfway to the four that Duncan and Popovich have won together.

"That's what I'm here for," James said. "I'm here to win championships, and you're not always going to

be on the successful side. I've seen it twice, not being on the successful side."

He was just 22 at the end of his fourth year in the league when he carried to the Cavs to their first finals appearance. But there were holes in his game, from an unreliable jump shot to an undeveloped post game, and the Spurs took advantage of every one of them.

James shot 36 percent in the series, including a ghastly 10 for 30 in Game 4, and committed 23 turnovers.

Taylor struggles early in qualifer

It didn't take long for Robert Taylor to realize this just wasn't going to be his day.

Playing in the U.S. Open Sectional Qualifier on Monday at the Ritz Carlton in Bradenton, Taylor — a Citrus High School graduate — got off to a bad start and didn't get it turned around until his hopes for earning one of three U.S. Open berths that were up for grabs were dashed.

"I struggled in the first round," Taylor said. "I just didn't get off to a great start. I wasn't doing anything particularly well."

"It was one of my worst rounds in a long time."

For Taylor, the 36-hole sectional qualifying tournament was a story of contrasts. His first 18 holes could not have been much worse, reflected in his score — an 8-over par 80. But his second 18-hole round was just the opposite, as he started hitting better shots in posting a 3-under par 69.

His 5-over par 149 total left him well out of the running for one of the top three spots, which went to Kevin Phelan of Ireland (9-under par), John Hahn of Hudson, Ohio (8-under) and John Nieporte of Boca Raton (7-under).

"I knew going in an 8-under would probably be needed to get in," Taylor said.

Asked if there was anything he could pinpoint in his game that wasn't clicking in the early going, Taylor couldn't narrow it down.

"Sometimes that just happens," he said. "I mean, if I could say it was nerves or something, I would, but I can't. It wasn't anything in particular; it was just that nothing was going right."

And yet, as bad as it went over those first 18 holes, it turned around in the second.

"In the second round, I started hitting it better," Taylor said. "I just kept after it and didn't quit."

"I wanted to take something from it, I wanted to do the best I could do."

Fernando Rodney pitched the ninth for his 12th save in 17 chances.



Florida State president: Randy Spetman out as AD

TALLAHASSEE — Florida State's Randy Spetman is out as athletics director and the university will soon begin a search for his replacement.

FSU President Eric Barron made the announcement Wednesday, one day before Spetman is scheduled to unveil a strategic plan to the university's Board of Trustees designed to shape the future of Seminole athletics.

Spetman, 59, will remain at the school for the next eight months as a senior adviser to the department until his contract expires in February 2014.

Barron said senior associate athletic director Vanessa Fuchs would serve as the interim until Spetman's successor is found.

Spetman came to Florida State in 2008 when the university was on NCAA probation following an academic cheating scandal and also when pressure was mounting on longtime coach Bobby Bowden to retire.

Strasburg placed on DL with back strain

WASHINGTON — Stephen Strasburg is getting a different type of shutdown, a stint on the disabled list because of a strained muscle in his back.

The Washington Nationals placed their top-of-rotation pitcher on the 15-day DL on Wednesday after he was unable to make a scheduled bullpen session.

"There's still some tenderness and discomfort there," manager Davey Johnson said. "So we're going to keep him off the mound for a few more days."

Strasburg was removed after two innings in his last start, Friday against the Atlanta Braves, because he was grimacing and flexing his shoulder. He said after the game that his back had been bothering him while warming up for his previous few starts but would feel fine once the game started.

The Nationals said on Sunday that Strasburg has a "slight strain" to the lat muscle. Johnson was hoping the right-

hander would not miss a start, although Strasburg's next turn in the rotation was moved back two days to Saturday.

After Strasburg played catch instead of throwing the bullpen session Wednesday, the Nationals put him on the DL, retroactive to Sunday.

Roethlisberger undergoes minor knee surgery

PITTSBURGH — Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger is out until training camp after minor knee surgery.

Coach Mike Tomlin said Wednesday's procedure will have no "long-term effects" on Roethlisberger's health. Roethlisberger has been dealing with discomfort in the knee, and the team recommended Roethlisberger undergo the surgery so he's ready when camp opens next month.

The 31-year-old Roethlisberger had been a full participant during organized team activities but has dealt with a series of health issues throughout his career. He underwent a similar procedure in 2005 and recovered to lead the Steelers to the Super Bowl. Roethlisberger missed one game and was limited in several others with a right ankle injury in 2011 and sat out three games in 2012 after fracturing a rib.

Derby winner Orb 3-1 favorite for Belmont

NEW YORK — Kentucky Derby winner Orb has been made the morning-line favorite in a field of 14 horses entered for the Belmont Stakes.

Preakness winner Oxbow is the third choice in the largest Belmont field since 1996. Orb is the 3-1 favorite and drew the No. 5 post for trainer Shug McGaughey. Oxbow is 5-1 after drawing the No. 7 post for trainer D. Wayne Lukas.

Todd Pletcher has a record five 3-year-olds in the 1 1/2-mile race. Among them is Unlimited Budget, who will attempt to become the fourth filly to win the final leg of the Triple Crown.

Anatomy of a fish kill

All across the Nature Coast, lakes, ponds and rivers have been receding due to a lack of rainfall through the winter and spring. An infusion of water is forecast to help the situation as tropical storms are expected to drop inches of rain over the region. That's the good news.

However, a sudden increase of water can have negative impacts on fish populations residing in those waters.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission provides some timely information in a news release about a recent fish kill in a northwest Florida lake.

If you witness a fish kill in the coming days, make sure to contact FWC using the information at the bottom of this story.

Recently, anglers and Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) fishery biologists were heartbroken to see the white bellies of numerous fish floating in Lake Victor. Lake Victor is a popular, 130-acre FWC-managed impoundment in Holmes County. Since the impoundment was constructed, the FWC has stocked fish, managed vegetation, provided boating access, created fish attractors and spawning beds and otherwise strove to create quality fishing.

So, what happened, and could it happen to a lake near you? Unfortunately, it seems like a case of nature taking its course and, yes, it happens throughout the state each summer. In this case, it appears heavy rainfalls flushed organic matter into the lake and the organic matter began to decompose, resulting in a low dissolved-oxygen (DO) fish kill. As in most such cases, the die-off did not kill all of the fish, and when the water cleared and the sun came out, oxygen levels recovered and biologists observed numerous surviving fish.

This type of fish kill is pretty much a natural occurrence. They are espe-

cially prevalent in summer, when a number of factors can come together to deplete the oxygen that is dissolved in the water. Fish absorb this oxygen from the water using their gills.

A healthy lake or river normally has approximately 7 to 9 parts per million (ppm) of oxygen, which is an ideal level for most fish. When the water temperature is lower, more oxygen dissolves into it. When temperatures rise, DO levels naturally drop due to reduced solubility. If the level drops below 5 ppm, many fish start showing adverse impacts, and below 2 ppm it can be lethal, if it lasts very long. Some species of fish are better adapted to low DO conditions, such as bowfin or gar, but most of our freshwater sunfishes (bass, bream and crappie) are less tolerant.

Aquatic plants produce most of the oxygen in lakes through photosynthesis, which occurs when green (chlorophyll) cells convert light into energy.

However, at night or when there is inadequate light, plants use oxygen and give off carbon dioxide. Additional oxygen enters the water from the atmosphere by diffusion. In addition to fish using oxygen and plants removing it at night, a major demand on oxygen comes from decomposition of dead plant and animal tissue (organic matter).

Area residents first contacted the FWC about the fish kill in Lake Victor on April 17, after seeing dying fish floating. Fisheries biologists responded immediately and determined the DO level in much of the lake with pea-green water was 0.0 to 2.0 ppm, enough to cause the kill. Often, descriptions of lakes being pea-green relate to algal blooms, which are another insidious response to nutrients (decaying plant material, or organic fertilizers flushed from yards or crops by rain). These blooms block light to rooted plants so

they do not produce as much oxygen. When algae die, they further increase the bacterial bloom.

Biologists visited daily for several weeks, documenting the number of dead fish and concluded that few adult game fish survived. However, they observed some schools of fingerling bass and bream from the spring spawn and a few bass on beds.

"We know there was over 19 inches of rain in the area from January to April, and the lake got its share of rain and runoff," said Chris Paxton, the FWC's freshwater fisheries administrator for northwest Florida. He said the FWC was in constant contact with the Florida Department of Health and the Department of Environmental Protection and that FWC staff accompanied investigators from the Department of Agriculture to inspect the lake during the fish kill. There was no visual evidence of chemical pollution, toxic algal blooms or signs of disease among the dead fish.

"This is something all of us, including the residents around the lake and our own fisheries management staff, wish never happened but in time the lake will recover," Paxton said.

Once oxygen levels build back up, the FWC will restock the lake with fingerling sport fish.

Bream and crappie populations can respond within one to two years but it may take three to four years for significant bass populations to rebuild. FWC biologists will monitor the lake and consider all fisheries management tools that may quicken the lake's recovery.

The good news is there is no evidence of any form of contamination that would prevent the lake from recovering. In addition, reduced competition often allows young sport fish to grow rapidly after kills of this type.



Fuji Asian Bistro brings taste of Far East to Southeast

Do you yen for Japanese cuisine? Or maybe Chinese or Thai? If so, Fuji Asian Bistro in Homosassa has you covered, and creative sushi for every taste is also available from the kitchen of chef Qu “Charlie” Teng.

The spacious restaurant in a shopping plaza in the heart of Homosassa Springs, not far from Ellie Schiller Homosassa Springs Wildlife State Park on U.S. 19, is the go-to place in Citrus County for a wide variety of Asian dishes prepared by Teng and his wife, Cindy.

The ambiance is inviting, too, with soothing, bubbling sounds from the koi fountain in the central dining room. It’s a relaxing backdrop for a tempting menu usually only found in major cities. The open kitchen, trees and plants add to the welcoming decor.

The owners/chefs are natives of Shandong province in Northern China near Beijing. They began their tenure at the bistro about four years ago and became owners in 2008. The couple has restaurant backgrounds in California and Orlando.

The Tengs are especially genial and affable hosts, taking a personal interest in patrons and almost always visiting each table and

PRINGLES SHRIMP OR SCALLOPS

- Desired amount of jumbo shrimp or jumbo scallops
- Desired amount of Pringles chips
- Chinese cooking wine
- Sugar to taste
- Salt to taste
- Sesame oil
- Pepper to taste


least 6 hours. Cut into squares and serve. Delicious!

booth to ensure all needs are met.

Presentation is a top priority at Fuji Asian Bistro, and you won't be disappointed with the eye appeal and friendly service.

The artistry of Teng is apparent in his sushi creations, with such specialties as the new and very popular slammer roll, smoked salmon, tuna, eel, avocado, cucumber and cream cheese wrapped in sticky rice and seaweed. Spicy mayonnaise lightly drizzled over the top adds an addictive kick to the large roll.

Other sushi specials include the in-demand, main dish-size super Mexican roll (\$9.95), comprised of shrimp tempura, cream cheese and avocado. It is also spicy, and the tempura batter adds a delicious crunch.

The king dragon (\$19.95) is another roll large enough for at least two diners, with tempura lobster, scallions, salmon, tuna, shrimp and avocado. The southern-style gator roll (\$12.95) features tempura-fried gator meat, cream cheese, avocado with spicy sauce and is topped with crabmeat

and a sweet/spicy sauce.

The list of sushi and sashimi choices is long, starting at \$3 for a cucumber five-roll dish, up to \$9.95 for an eight-roll volcano with conch, scallion, crabmeat and mayonnaise baked on top of a California roll.

Teng creates sushi rolls that are both cooked and raw, so if you are unable to eat raw seafood, be assured there are plenty of items lightly fried or baked.

You can also make sushi a part of your bento box lunch at Fuji, which includes a variety ranging from \$6.50 for general's chicken to \$7.50 for yakisoba noodles with chicken, beef or shrimp. All bento box lunches are served with jasmine rice, house salad, vegetables and California roll.

You have a choice of miso, won ton, velvet corn or hot-and-sour soup if you choose the Tokyo bento or daily bento (chef's choice) for \$9.95.

Among other popular items are the new Homosassa chicken, a small mountain of spicy, thin-sliced white-meat chicken lightly stir fried (recipe on Page C1, complements of Chef Teng).

Orange beef, scallops tempura, plus braised whitefish with white wine

and black bean sauce (\$24.95); Peking duck (\$14.95); walnut shrimp (\$13.95); pineapple fried rice with shrimp, egg and scallions served in a pineapple half (9.95); and Fuji beef tender in rich brown sauce with scallions and onion (\$10.95) are more samples of the lengthy dinner menu.

At many Asian restaurants, Peking duck is only available by calling ahead a day or two, but not so at the bistro, where the dish is available anytime, Teng said.

The Pacific Rim Grill offers such choices as satay chicken with Indonesian peanut sauce and nikumaki (ribeye steak in teriyaki sauce) for under \$8.

The Fuji Asian Bistro at 4522 S. Suncoast Blvd. (U.S. 19), in the Sweetbay Plaza, is open six days a week. Hours are 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday; 11:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Friday and Saturday; and noon to 9 p.m. Sunday. The restaurant is closed Mondays. For reservations and information, call 352-628-1888.

Don't drink domestics? You're only depriving yourself

At a recent wine tasting, my pours consisted of eight American wines, six from California and two from North Carolina. Now, I am not making this up: A woman eyeing this selection said, "Oh, I see your wines are all domestic, I don't drink domestic labels."

Before Prohibition became the law of the land in 1919, this observation may have had some validity, but today it is clearly ludicrous. Back in the age of the dinosaurs when I started a wine career, "domestic" was a turnoff. It implied gulping cheap, ultra-sweet wine stashed in a brown bag a la a Bowery bum. As I have revealed often in these ramblings, France was where I began my journey, at a time when you could buy a nice Pommard for about \$1.98.

Since the 1970s, a wine revolution has been taking place across America, as folks regularly began to enjoy a glass of wine during a meal (perhaps after a Manhattan or a martini), visiting wineries in home states or making the pilgrimage to California, and generally acquiring terms such as cabernet and chardonnay to define a variety of grape.

There are more than 7,000 bonded wineries in the United States, up from just about 400 in the 1970s, and the boom is ongoing. Though the United States is still an infant as a wine-drinking nation, hitting its early teens perhaps in the 1990s, Europe has been at it for several millennia.

Actually, people were making wine here as early as the 1500s, when French Huguenots built habitations in Florida and made wine from the native scuppernong grape. Around 1607, the pilgrims landed on the Eastern Seaboard pleasantly surprised to discover grapevines growing wild. And while the fermented products tasted musky and foxy, unlike those of France, they were better than having no wine at all. Yes, contrary to folklore, the Puritans loved a nip now and then.

The first makings tasted pretty awful, so the early settlers sent for cuttings from Europe of the "Vitis vinifera" family, proven varieties such as Riesling and cabernet sauvignon. Sadly, these noble European grapes were ill suited to the climates of the early colonies, and most died within a few years of planting.

Thomas Jefferson, who knew a lot about a lot, is the prime example of a frustrated early winemaker — even despite sending overseas for professional oenologists. The first commercially successful winery was established in Cincinnati, Ohio, by business tycoon Nicholas Longworth, who made enjoyable sparkling wine from the hardy, native Catawba grape, but this effort failed within 10 years due to disease.

It was not until the 1850s, when the California gold rush brought a flood of Italian and German immigrants to the area, that winemaking began to take off. Wine prospered in parts of the state, but national interest was almost nil, and the advent of Prohibition put an end to it all. The entire industry was stopped dead. When Franklin D. Roosevelt became president in 1933 and anti-alcohol laws were repealed, pioneers such as the Gallo brothers, Paul Masson, and Almadén Vineyards began aggressively marketing wines nationally.

The quality was generally mediocre, but pioneers such as Beringer, Inglenook and Beaulieu vineyard started creating decent-tasting products. A monumental event put American wines on the world map in 1976 when a competition in Bordeaux between top-shelf

Californian and French wines was won by the United States in a clean sweep, surviving even the judgment of biased French connoisseurs. The enormous publicity gave California growers great confidence in their abilities to make products every bit as good as the huffy French, who had their clocks cleaned in this double-blind tasting.

One other event deserves mention when it comes to popularizing American wine: Quite by accident, in the 1970s the Sutter Home winery created a slightly sweet pink zinfandel that was

quickly embraced by Americans turned off by long-established dry red wines. White Zin remains a big seller today.

Follow along for some up-to-date factoids: All 50 states have at least one bonded winery, including North Dakota (1) and Hawaii (2). California

is No. 1 with 3,365 wineries, followed by Washington state with 700 and Oregon at 438. Nine states boast more than 100 wineries, including New York with 320 and Texas with 220. Florida, by the way, has just 18, but none of these are able to make product from the major grape species "vinifera;" it is simply too warm.

Wine-growing areas called AVAs (American viticultural areas) have become plentiful, similar to the French system of AOCs (appellation d'origine contrôlée) recognizing specific growing regions for their climate, soil, elevation and historical significance. The AVA system is rather loose when compared with European certifications, but it is a start.

Here are a few more details regarding America's love affair with wine:

■ In 2011 we became the No. 1 wine-consuming country by purchasing 311.3 million 12-bottle cases.

■ We are the fourth-largest wine producer, trailing only France, Italy and Spain.

■ Wine festivals draw millions of people throughout the States, and wine sightseeing is booming. California hosts hundreds of thousands of visitors every year. Wine use as an American practice is here to stay.

To the gentle lady who "doesn't drink domestic products," I say you are sadly deluded about American wine. Wake up and smell what's happening right under your nose.

business due to departing "snowbirds" and winter vacationers. This is a great time to visit your favorite eatery and show your support. Be sure to try some places you haven't yet visited, too. You might find some new favorites.

Sometimes you just want a small taste of something divinely delicious, but don't want to bake a whole cake or pie or other dessert that will languish in your cupboard or fridge after a few bites are taken. So what better way to satisfy that craving than with this creative recipe for one?

Chocolate mug cake

4 tablespoons flour
4 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons cocoa

OVER EASY

1 egg
3 tablespoons milk
3 tablespoons cooking oil
A small splash of vanilla extract
1 large coffee mug
3 tablespoons chocolate chips (optional)

Add dry ingredients to mug and mix well. Add the egg and mix thoroughly. Pour in the milk and oil and mix well. Add the chocolate chips (if using)

and vanilla extract and mix again.

Put the mug in the microwave and cook for 3 minutes on high. The cake will rise over the top of the mug, but that's OK. Allow to cool a little, and tip out onto a plate if desired or simply dig in with a spoon.

From friend in a thread on the Hillbilly Recipes Facebook page comes this interesting recipe for flaky biscuits. We like our biscuits with honey, cane syrup or red currant jelly:

7UP biscuits

2 cups baking mix (such as Bisquick)
1/2 cup sour cream
1/2 cup 7UP or other clear carbonated soda
1/4 cup melted butter

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Cut sour cream into baking mix just enough to incorporate it into a wet/dry mixture. Stir in 7UP; the dough will be very soft and sticky.

Sprinkle baking mix on counter. Knead and fold until coated with mix. Pat dough out; no need to roll. Cut with a biscuit cutter, glass or whatever you choose.

Melt butter in 9-inch square pan (1 stick butter) and put in oven. Just melt; watch it so it doesn't burn. Place biscuits on top of melted butter and bake for 12 to 15 minutes or until brown.

At last: a salad even Dad can get behind

My approach to food is pretty simple. I firmly believe that if you can eat it, you can grill it.

When I wrote my first cookbook, I compiled my favorite grilled foods. Some were familiar, but some seemed pretty crazy back in 2005! Of those crazy foods, grilled romaine lettuce remains one of my favorites. And I'm not alone. Today, it is so popular it's on restaurant menus all over the place, a sure sign that Americans have embraced the idea that a salad can be grilled.

I paired my grilled romaine classically, with a homemade blue cheese dressing and crispy apple wood smoked bacon. It's the ultimate steakhouse wedge salad. And it's perfect for Dad on Father's Day.

The real beauty of this recipe is how the heat of the grill wilts and caramelizes the lettuce, intensifying the flavor and adding a wisp of smoke. The texture becomes crispy on the edges and silky inside. Mix that with the rich and slightly pungent blue cheese and the salty, smoky bacon, and you've got a salad that eats like a main course. Meaty, rich and delicious!

I usually make the blue cheese dressing the day before because it benefits from sitting overnight in the refrigerator. The flavors truly blend and blossom during this extra time. It also makes this salad that much easier to grill and serve. The bacon can be fried in advance, as well. But if you do that, just before serving place it in a paper towel and microwave it for 15 to 20 seconds, or until the fat begins to sizzle. I dice the meatiest bacon I can find

into 1/4-inch pieces before frying so that they fry up into bits and don't need crumbling. You also could use pancetta.

The grilled salad works best with hearts of romaine and they must be washed and very dry before cooking. I usually purchase the already cleaned hearts to make this step foolproof. Slice the hearts in half lengthwise and make sure to leave the stem attached (this prevents the leaves from falling apart during grilling).

The whole grilling process takes just a few minutes because you want the inside of the lettuce to be raw and crunchy and barely warmed. The key is to cut across the grilled heart of romaine and mix the crispy pieces with the fully cooked soft and silky pieces and the crunchy interior pieces. It's literally an explosion of textures and big bold flavors.

Grilled hearts of romaine with blue cheese dressing

1/4 cup mayonnaise
2 tablespoons sour cream
2 ounces crumbled blue cheese (more or less to taste)
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/2 tablespoon grated shallot
1 clove garlic, grated
Kosher salt and ground black pepper
2 hearts of romaine lettuce, halved lengthwise
Olive oil
4 slices apple wood smoked bacon, diced and cooked until crisp

To make the dressing, in a medium bowl combine the mayonnaise, sour cream, blue cheese, lemon juice, shallot and garlic. Mix well, then season lightly with salt and pepper. Cover and refrigerate for at least 3 hours to allow the flavors to develop. The dressing keeps for up to 2 weeks in the refrigerator.

When ready to prepare

the salads, heat the grill to medium-low.

Lightly brush all 4 romaine halves on all sides with olive oil. Season with a bit of salt and pepper. Using a pair of tongs, place the lettuce directly on the cooking grates cut side down. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes. Do not grill longer; the lettuce should be slightly raw and crunchy at the center. Remove to a clean platter and let rest for 5 minutes.

Place each half on a serving plate, then drizzle with blue cheese dressing and top with the diced bacon. Serve immediately.

Not sold on salad? Here's a lighter take on a classic steak

My family has been weaning itself from red meat for years. We still love it, but the portions and frequency are less than they used to be. Still, when I started planning a Father's Day menu for my husband and my dad, I thought it might be nice to bow to tradition by turning to the Batman and Robin of manly fare — steak and potatoes.

Happily, there are many ways these days to have your steak and eat it, too. For this menu, I was able to lower the fat and calorie count not only of the steak and potatoes, but of the equally sinful sauce — béarnaise. And, as ever, the flavor stays large.

Father's Day steakhouse dinner

4 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided
2 medium russet potatoes, peeled and coarsely grated, preferably using the grating disk of a food processor
Kosher salt and ground black pepper
1 medium shallot, minced
1 tablespoon white wine vinegar
2 tablespoons dry white wine
2 teaspoons dried tarragon
6 ounces 1/3-less fat cream cheese (Neufchâtel)
1 1/2 pounds flank steak, trimmed of any visible fat
1 1/2 pounds baby spinach leaves
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 teaspoons chopped fresh tarragon

Heat the oven to 350 degrees. In a large nonstick skillet over medium-high, heat 1 tablespoon of the oil. Add the grated potatoes, pressing them down with a spatula, then reduce the heat to medium and cook until golden brown on the bottom, 10 to 12 minutes. Remove the skillet from the heat. Set a large dinner plate over the skillet, then invert to transfer the potatoes, browned side up, onto the plate.

Return the skillet to the heat and add another 1/2 tablespoon of oil. Slide the potatoes back into the skillet, browned side up. Cook until golden brown on the sec-

ond side, about another 10 minutes. Season with salt and pepper; then transfer to a sheet pan and place in the oven to keep warm.

Meanwhile, in a small saucepan over medium-high, combine the shallot, vinegar, white wine, tarragon, a hefty pinch of salt and a few grinds of pepper. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to simmer. Cook gently until reduced to about 1 tablespoon. Add the cream cheese, 1 tablespoon at a time, whisking each until incorporated. Whisk in 2 tablespoons water; then set aside.

Wipe out the skillet, add 1 tablespoon of the remaining oil and heat it over medium-high. Pat the steak dry, sprinkle it on both sides with salt and pepper; then add it to the skillet. Cook the steak to desired doneness, 4 to 5 minutes per side for medium rare, then transfer it to a platter, cover it loosely with foil and let it rest for 5 minutes.

While the steak is resting, add a tablespoon of the oil to the skillet and reduce the heat to medium. Add the spinach in 4 batches, adding more as each batch cooks down slightly. Add the remaining 1/2 tablespoon of oil after the first 2 batches of spinach. Cook until the spinach is just wilted, then add the garlic and salt and pepper to taste. Cook for another minute, then keep warm on low heat.

Remove the potato pancake from the oven and cut it into 6 wedges. Slice the steak thinly at an angle against the grain. Add the juices from the resting steak to the sauce along with the fresh tarragon, and additional water, if necessary, to reach the desired consistency. Warm the sauce over medium heat just until hot.

Transfer a potato wedge, a mound of spinach and some of the steak to each of 6 serving plates. Drizzle the sauce over each portion of steak and serve immediately.
