

State releases 'Obamacare' rates

Residents making less than \$48,000 will get federal voucher to offset insurance premium cost

MIAMI — Florida residents are finally getting to see what so-called "Obamacare" means for them as state insurance officials released rate details late Wednesday showing how much

some health plans may cost under the new federal health law and how many providers will be participating in the state exchange.

The details come one day after Florida Health Commissioner Kevin McCarty said rates

will rise an average of 5 to 20 percent for small businesses and 30 to 40 percent in the individual market. But he countered that those increases are partly due to the fact that consumers will receive more benefits, and the higher costs will be

offset by federal subsidies in many cases.

Most of the state's roughly 3.5 million uninsured residents will not see extreme price hikes, McCarty said.

Officials said the new insurance plans will be more com-

prehensive, making direct comparisons to existing plans impossible, but the Florida Office of Insurance Regulation based its comparison on the average cost of premiums for midlevel

Sales tax holiday returns

Starts Friday

Whether you need an iPad, baseball cap or new underwear, this is the weekend to shop.

The 2013 Florida Tax Free Holiday runs from 12:01 a.m. Friday, Aug. 2, to 11:59 p.m., Sunday, Aug. 4.

During this window, no sales tax (6 percent) will be collected on clothing, shoes, school supplies and, for first



the time, personal computers and computer accessories.

There are some restrictions and limitations. The tax break does not apply to any item of clothing selling for more than \$75 or any school supply item costing more than \$15.

Computers and related accessories are limited to \$750. According to the Department of Revenue, it covers any electronic book reader, laptop, desktop, handheld, tablet or tower computer. It does not include cellphones, video games, consoles or devices not primarily designed to process data.

The exemption also covers wallets, backpacks, fanny packs and diaper bags, caps and hats, and a host of other accessories.

Will Wilson, owner of Citrus Sports and Apparel, is expecting a busy weekend at their new location.

SALES TAX HOLIDAY AUG. 2 to 4.

- No tax is due on certain clothing, footwear and accessories selling for \$75 or less.
- No tax is due on certain school supplies selling for \$15 or less.
- Books are not tax exempt.
- No tax is due on computers and certain related accessories selling for \$750 or less per item, when purchased for noncommercial home or personal use.

His family business is a longtime local fixture, but has only been located in the Crystal River Mall since May.

Wilson said he is really happy with the mall location and said retail sales have been strong coming off their best month ever. The new location provides a large retail sales and display area with plenty of back shop space for custom silk screening, embroidery and graphic design.

With a wide variety of "wearables," he views the tax holiday as a good opportunity for customers to save. On top of the tax break, he

is offering various in-house 10 percent discounts.

The store carries all kinds of school-themed apparel for the three area high schools and is branching out to middle schools. It also carries the popular local clothing line, Crazy On Outdoors, which they manufacture. Wilson said it has become one of their biggest sellers.

"I've got a lot of people wanting to come in and buy things this weekend, so they can save that," he said. "I think people are waiting on the higher ticket items — such as lettermen jackets — for the tax holiday so

they can save a lot."

"It's for adults and kids," he said. "It doesn't have to be back-to-school clothes for your kids, you can save money on things for yourself."

The store is open 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and closed on Sundays.

With personal computers, tablets and related computer accessories on the list, Radio Shack at the Crystal River Mall is poised for a busy weekend.

"People can save a lot of money," store manager Jacob Leave said. "We have iPads and the Nexus tablets, e-readers and all the accessories."

He said no one had inquired about the tax holiday yet, but he was sure they will see some customers because of it.

Belk has posted reminder signs about the holiday. Mall manager Millie Bresnahan said there are plenty of opportunities in the mall for shoppers to take advantage of the sales tax break.

PINELLAS PARK — A man is dead following a police standoff at a Pinellas Park house.

Police said the standoff began following a domestic disturbance Tuesday evening. The woman left the home, but three male relatives arrived a short time later to confront 43-year-old Paul Adjutor Doyon Jr. Police say Doyon pulled a gun and all four men began to fight. The gun fired at some point, prompting the call to police.

Witnesses reported that Doyon had retreated into the house with the gun. SWAT responded and made several attempts to contact Doyon. SWAT eventually sent a surveillance camera into the home and saw Doyon was not moving. After SWAT entered the home, paramedics confirmed he was dead.

A medical examiner

Wednesday morning determined the preliminary cause of death to be loss of blood from cuts, not a gunshot wound.

Inmate goes for deputy's gun court

TAMPA — An inmate faces more charges after authorities said he tried to grab a deputy's gun while waiting for a hearing to start in a Hillsborough County courtroom.

Hillsborough County Sheriff's officials said 24-year-old Robert Lewis Bridges was clad in shackles, handcuffs and a waist chain as he waited for his case to be called on Tuesday morning. They said Bridges lunged forward and grabbed Sgt. Tracey Wallace's holstered gun.

Wallace kept Bridges from taking the gun and as the two struggled, two other deputies restrained the inmate and took him out of the courtroom. No one was injured.

Woman bilked out of \$105,660 in scam

An 86-year-old north Florida woman lost \$105,660 in a lottery scam.

The Marion County Sheriff's Office has received multiple reports this year from people — most of them senior citizens — who've fallen victim to similar scams.

The Ocala Star-Banner reported the woman was told a year ago that she won \$1.8 million in the lottery. She told deputies that a man she identified as Kevin Thomas told her she needed to send him money to cover taxes on the prize before she could collect her winnings.

The sheriff's office learned about the situation when someone from the woman's bank contacted a Sumter County Sheriff's deputy about the case.

According to deputies, the woman sent wire transfers to Canada beginning in mid-June 2012, but she never collected her earnings. Instead she kept getting calls for more money from Thomas.

Deputies need help to nab suspect

Deputies are looking for a man they said robbed a convenience store clerk at knife-point.

The Citrus County Sheriff's Office said at 11:51 p.m. on Monday, the suspect entered the Circle K convenience store at 1224 N. U.S. 41 in Inverness, threatened the clerk with a knife and demanded he open the cash register.

The suspect reportedly took an undisclosed sum of money and then fled the store on foot.

He's described as a white male, 5-foot-8 to 6-foot-2 in height, with a medium build, shaved head and a goatee. He was also wearing glasses.

At the time of the incident he was dressed in a long-sleeved grey shirt and tan or khaki shorts, according to the CCSO. The store clerk was not injured.

The sheriff's office is asking the public to review the surveillance photos of the man and to call Crime Stoppers of Citrus County immediately if having any information. Callers can remain anonymous and be eligible for a cash reward.

Man being held in forgery case

Allegedly swindled elderly man

A Hernando man is being held on claims he repaid an elderly man's kindness by using the man's checkbook as his own.

Shawn Kile Mattox, 26, of N.

Megan Point, is charged with uttering forged checks, exploitation of the elderly and violation of probation for a felony case in Volusia County. Mattox, who also is currently in jail on other charges, is being denied bond.

According to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, Mattox was homeless and sleeping in his car when the apparent victim allowed him to move in with him.

Soon after moving in, Mattox reportedly proceeded to use the man's checkbook, writing checks to himself in amounts ranging from \$50 to a \$1,000.

When investigators contacted Mattox, he admitted in a sworn, taped testimony that he indeed cashed the checks.

Bond was set at \$1,000.

District office stuffed with much-needed school supplies

LECANTO — School supplies were requested, and the community responded.

Residents were invited to stuff the bus last weekend during the Citrus County School District's annual "Stuff the Bus" campaign. This campaign affords local residents the opportunity to make a difference in a needy child's life by donating new school supplies.

Five yellow district school buses were parked Saturday at Publix stores in Inverness, Citrus Hills, Homosassa and Crystal River and at Walmart in Homosassa, where numerous shoppers provided contributions.

Unloading the supplies at the district office in Inverness on Wednesday revealed that good Samaritans heard the plea and donated hundreds of packages of school supplies for students who will benefit from the contributions.

"This is always an exciting time of year going back to school," said Superintendent of Schools Sandra "Sam" Himmel.

School supplies needed

- Pencils, pens, spiral notebooks, rulers, book bags, loose-leaf three-hole paper, lunch boxes, crayons, markers, three-ring binders (1-inch and 2-inch), glue sticks and small assignment notebooks.

"When they do our 'Stuff the Bus' program, it's amazing the amount of items that we receive. We have an amazing and giving community."

Supplies will be sorted and divided based on school enrollment and requests before school begins on Aug. 7. Guidance counselors will then disperse items based on the specific needs of disadvantaged students.

"It means a lot to these kids who don't have anything and their parents can't afford school supplies," she said. "It is one less thing that they have to worry about the first day of school when they know that they are going to get things they need."

"It makes our hearts so happy to know that these children are

going to have their books and pencils and just fit in with everyone else," added Bernadette Salmaggi, educational services district secretary. "They are so worried that they don't have books or binders. We make it happen for them."

While the "Stuff the Bus" campaign has ended, Sheffield said donations are needed throughout the school year. He praised seniors for their over-the-top response.

"We are getting a lot of donations from people who don't even have children anymore," Sheffield said. "Our retirement population has stepped up and donated quite a bit. They know what it was like when their kids were in school. They are stepping up to make donations to those in need and are making a difference."

Four badly injured in two-car crash

Four people were badly hurt last Friday night in a two-car crash on Independence Highway in Inverness, according to a preliminary report from the Florida Highway Patrol.

And, because of the severity

of the crash, officials performed a blood draw on one of the drivers for further investigation.

According to the FHP, for an

unexplained reason Wilber veered into the path of the second vehicle, struck the front of the vehicle and pushed it back

some 15 feet from the point of impact. Wilber, who was driving a Ford F-150 pickup, was reportedly going 45 mph, the speed limit. The teens were in a Jeep Wrangler.

Wilber was not wearing her seat belt, but all the teens were belted. No one was ejected from the vehicles.

Wilber suffered incapacitating injuries and was transported to Ocala Regional

hospital.

The teen driver also suffered incapacitating injuries and was transported to Shands Hospital. The injuries of the passengers also were characterized as incapacitating and they were transported for hospitalization in Ocala.

The results of Wilber's blood

draw are pending and investigation of the case continues, according to FHP.

Rihanna wins case against UK retailer

LONDON — Pop singer

Rihanna has won a court case in Britain against retailer Topshop, which was selling T-shirts bearing her image without permission.

High Court Justice Colin

Birss ruled in favor of the singer on Wednesday, saying buyers were likely deceived by believing Rihanna had authorized its sale.

"I am quite satisfied that many fans of Rihanna regard her endorsement as important," the judge said in his ruling. "She is their style icon. Many will buy a product because they think she has approved of it. Others will wish to buy it because of the value of the perceived authorization itself. In both cases they will have been deceived."

Birss also said the sales caused a loss of control over Rihanna's reputation in the fashion realm, where the singer has been trying to carve out a name as a designer. She has a clothing line in her name at a rival store.

The shirts were first sold as the "Rihanna Tank." After her complaints, they were sold as being the "Headscarf Girl Tank" and the "Icon Tank."

Topshop's owner, Arcadia Group Brands Ltd., had argued that Rihanna was seeking legal recognition for a flawed assumption that only a celebrity could market a product bearing his or her image.

The judge did not make an assessment of damages in his ruling.

NEW YORK — Tens of thousands of black-and-white and color negatives by celebrity photographer Milton Greene have sold at auction for \$1.8 million.


The archive includes 3,700 negatives and slides of Marilyn Monroe. All the material was sold with copyright.

Profiles in History auction house said the highlights included a collection of color transparencies of the Hollywood siren with Laurence Olivier from the movie "The Prince and the Showgirl." It sold for \$42,000.







Not a car or bike, but a blend**'ELF bike' traveling from Canada to Key West**

RESTON, Va. — Mark Stewart turns quite a few heads as he zips through the streets on his neon green ELF bike. With each pedal, his feet take turns sticking out from the bottom while a gentle motor hums in the background.

What he's driving looks like a cross between a bicycle and a car, the closest thing yet to Fred Flintstone's footmobile, only with solar panels and a futuristic shape.

It's a "green" option for today's commuters.

Stewart, a 65-year-old family therapist and school psychologist from Cambridge, Mass., took the summer off in order to drive his new ELF bike more than 1,200 miles on trails and roads using the East Coast Greenway, a bike and pedestrian trail that

runs from Canada to Key West.

He began his journey by flying down to Durham, N.C., on July 15, and estimates that the entire trip will take about a month. He covered the first leg, from Durham, N.C. to Reston, Va., over roughly five days, 60 miles at a time.

Needless to say, he's getting lots of questions along the way.

"It reminds me of when I saw a Smart car the first time," said Joanne Bury as she emerged from her Reston condominium building to take a look at the vehicle. "This is incredible. What is it?"

The ELF, or "Organic Transit Vehicle," can go for 1,800 miles on the energy equivalent of a gallon of gasoline. It does not require the insurance, repair and car maintenance costs of the average vehicle.

Besides the cost of the occasional new tire, the ELF runs completely off what it costs to charge its battery.

Stewart bought the ELF from Durham-based Organic Transit, which sells them for a base price of \$5,000. He said he wanted to avoid the almost \$1,000 delivery charge, so he decided to fly down to pick up

the bike in person and learn how to operate it before taking the long trip back home.

"I spent three days in the shop hanging with the guys there and learning the vehicle," Stewart said. "This is just an unsupported solo trip up here in a vehicle that nobody else really knows."

Stewart's ELF is only about the 40th to come off the production line. While few bike shop workers have seen the contraption, the materials, such as the tires and pedals, are items on your average bicycle.

Organic Transit CEO Rob Cotter took technology from aircrafts, boats and bicycles and incorporated them into a "green" 130-pound vehicle.

He was consulting on bike-sharing technologies being considered for New York City's proposed program when he saw a market for his vehicle.

"A combination of environmental catastrophes, high fuel costs, climate change and a migration of people moving to the cities all combined for a trend of people looking for an automotive alternative. But not everyone can fit a bicycle into their daily life," Cotter said.

Scott demands apology from Jackson

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Gov. Rick Scott on Wednesday demanded an apology from longtime civil rights activist Jesse Jackson for comparing the state's struggle with the Trayvon Martin case to the civil rights clashes with police during the 1960s in Selma, Ala.

Jackson spent the night with protesters upset that George Zimmerman was found not guilty of second-degree murder in the shooting death of Martin. They've refused to leave the Capitol until Scott calls a special session to have legislators overhaul the state's self-defense laws.

Jackson called Florida the "Selma of our time" and even compared Scott to former Alabama Gov. George Wallace. While he was governor, Wallace famously stood in the door at the University of Alabama to try to block the entry of two black students.

Scott so far has refused the request and the protest has dragged on for more than two weeks. The protesters have gotten national media attention and won support from celebrities such as entertainer Harry Belafonte and others who have urged people to boycott Florida.

Scott in a release blasted Jackson's comments as "reckless" and "divisive" and said that he should apologize to residents.

Little restraint in military giveaways

MORVEN, Ga. — Small-town police departments across the country have been gobbling up tons of equipment discarded by a downsizing military — bicycles, bed sheets, bowling pins, French horns, dog collars, even a colonoscopy machine — regardless of whether the items are needed or will ever be used.

In the tiny farming community of Morven, Ga., the police chief has grabbed three boats, scuba gear, rescue rafts and a couple of dozen life preservers. The town's deepest body of water: an ankle-deep creek. An Associated Press investigation of the Defense Department program, originally aimed at helping local law enforcement fight terrorism and drug trafficking, found that a disproportionate share of the \$4.2 billion worth of property distributed since 1990 has been obtained by police departments and sheriff's offices in rural areas with few officers and little crime.

Program officials often have to trust recipients to follow the rules and take only what they can utilize; requests for equipment are reviewed, but the process hasn't stopped many overly aggressive departments from grabbing property that could be better used by other communi-

ties with a greater need. For many, the opportunity to amass a vast array of gear with few strings attached has proven to be too tempting to pass up, leading to a belly-up-to-the-open-bar mentality.

plans from 11 insurers.

The smallest increase was an HMO plan from Humana that bumped up 7 percent from \$293 to \$315.

The largest was 59 percent from a Sunshine State Health plan that jumped from \$293 to \$464.

Some of the state's largest health insurers, including Florida Blue, Cigna, Humana and Aetna, will be among 11 plans competing through the state's new health exchange in the individual market in all 67 counties. Many counties will be able to choose from six or seven carriers.

But Bay, Franklin, Glades, Jefferson and Madison were among the 20 counties where consumers will only have one option.

Lack of competition from insurers under the health care law has raised concerns in some states. President Barack Obama told Democrats administration is working to fix the problem.

Residents in Miami-Dade and Broward counties will be able to choose from nine plans. Aside from where a person lives, insurers are limited in their ability to charge consumers different prices for health care.

leases the hospital from the CCHB, to end a three year legal dispute. He then made that offer public to the county commission against the wishes of trustees Krista Joseph and Chairwoman Debbie Ressler.

Both trustees were unsuccessful in having Nemzoff fired during the same July 10 meeting when bidders made their presentations.

A week later, the board then voted 3-1, with new trustee Dr. Mark Fallows joining the majority, to fire Nemzoff on the grounds of him refusing to comply

it was cool," Yates said of his bayonets. "Then, after you get it, you're like, 'What the hell am I going to do with this?'"

Morven isn't the only example of a giveaway program gone wild: Before his firing earlier this year for an unrelated matter, the police chief in Rising Star, Texas — the only full-time officer in the town of 835 residents — acquired more than \$3.2 million worth of property within 14 months. According to an inventory obtained by the AP, the hundreds of items included nine televisions, 11 computers, three deep-fat fryers, two meat slicers, 22 large space heaters valued at \$55,000 when new, a pool table, 25 sleeping bags and playground equipment.

Federal officials suspended Rising Star from the program in March after investigators discovered that many items — including 12 pairs of binoculars — were missing from police department facilities.

"He was getting any kind of equipment he wanted," Rising Star city attorney Pat Chesser said. "I don't

understand why any one city would get that amount."

Nearly 13,000 agencies in all 50 states and four U.S. territories participate in what's commonly called the 1033 Program, after a section of the National Defense Authorization Act that permits the transfer to law enforcement agencies of military property no longer needed. The program has grown drastically in recent years, due in large part to the scaling down of the military from two wars, tight local-government operating budgets and eligibility expansion in 1996 to include all state and local law enforcement work. In fiscal year 2012, a record \$546 million worth of property was transferred.





QUALITY CHALLENGE**Group resolves to protect county's water resources**

Some important community issues suffer from being so wrapped in regulatory doublespeak and arcane science that only a handful of citizens actively focus on them.

Water quality is one of them. Fortunately, several local citizen groups work hard to inform the rest of us about critical water quality issues and the regulatory initiatives that affect them.

There's a new coalition of water-interest groups, called Save Our Springs — NOW. The coalition includes the Save the Homosassa River Alliance, the Chassahowitzka River Restoration Committee, the Rainbow River Conservation, Inc., the Withlacoochee Area Residents, and the Save the Manatee Club.

This coalition is mounting a legal challenge to Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD). Here's the issue, according to a coalition member: "(T)he Homosassa, Chassahowitzka, Crystal and Withlacoochee rivers are designated as Outstanding Florida Waters (OFW) by law and as such have special restrictions on any activities that lower water quality or otherwise degrade the body of water. But SWFWMD set the OFW law aside in the Minimum Flows and Levels Program in order to maximize the consumptive withdrawal target."

This is a new kind of water war, and we need to pay attention.

State-designated Outstanding Florida Waters are worthy of special protection according to the law. They are of exceptional recreational or ecological significance and provide environmental, social and economic benefits, the law states. Their water quality

are the limits at which further water withdrawals would be significantly harmful to the water resources or ecology of the area.

Here's the flash point: SWFWMD says that a certain additional amount of degradation of our river waters is acceptable; the citizen group says absolutely not; it's gone too far already. Save Our Springs — NOW contends that the OFW law should prevail, which will support the goal of recovery and restoration of the local rivers and springs.

What's next?

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection has set a hearing for Sept. 10 at the water district office in Brooksville to consider this legal challenge. The full-day session begins at 8:30 a.m. The citizen group gets two hours, the water district gets two hours, and after lunch, public presentations are accepted.

Can't make it to the full-day session? You still can be involved. The comment period will remain open for two weeks. Send comments to ChassHomosassaMFL@dep.state.fl.us.

This is important. Make your voice heard to support the protection and restoration of our most precious natural resource, our waters.

Morally right and good economics

A little more than six months into his second term, President Obama returned to the theme of his presidency and perhaps his entire political career: carrying out the promise made in the preamble to the Constitution. The president wants to refocus our attention on the economy and helping middle-class families because that's the moral imperative of our founders: to promote the general welfare.

From the day he took office, Obama's goal has been economic restoration, the foundation of social stability. But certain segments of Congress don't understand that the equation "We the people" means policies that strengthen opportunity for the most people and support those most in need. "We the people" does not refer to an oligarchy of the increasingly super-rich amassing more and more of the country's wealth for themselves.

Despite some media whining, Obama's ideas are not new ideas. He is proposing well-thought-out programs to restore economic progress for the working and middle classes, based on fundamental principles.

"This country offered you a basic bargain," he said this week at Knox College. It offered "a sense that your hard work would be rewarded with fair wages and benefits, the chance to buy a home, to save for retirement and, above all, to hand down a better life for your kids."

Unfortunately, we've come to expect congressional Republicans to obstruct progress and undermine efforts "to provide for the general welfare." Thus it was not surprising that Republican leaders announced their intention to stonewall the president's plans to better the economy, and also to reverse all the public benefits from laws already enacted.

The Republican chairman of House Appropriations, Rep.

Harold Rogers, announced bills to shoot down Obama's major economic initiatives. They slash the budgets for various departments from 30 to 50 percent.

"These are tough bills," Rogers said. "His priorities are going nowhere."

Republicans have pledged to shut down the government come October, unless Obama agrees to completely defund Obamacare.

"This is as serious a challenge on fiscal matters as I've ever seen," Democratic House Whip Steny Hoyer said.

But what we are seeing is that we haven't expected support for what may be called privatized financial oligarchy at the local level.

For example, Obama wants to increase the minimum wage, which hasn't been touched for four years (making him the first president in decades in whose term there's been no increase). This disregard — even disdain — for the working poor reflects what Obama calls a "winner-take-all economy where a few do better and better, while everybody else just treads water."

The nation's single largest employer, Walmart has courted the Washington, D.C. city council for months, helped by a prestigious local lobbyist, David W. Wilmot, who receives a retainer of \$10,000 a month. Walmart wants to build six stores in the District, which major retailers, preferring the wealthier suburbs, have shunned for years.

That would seem to be good news. Except Walmart underpays its employees. A study by the state of Ohio found that 15,484 Walmart workers and dependents received Medicaid benefits in June 2009, and 12,872 Walmart workers and dependents got food stamps. The state representative who commissioned the study, Youngstown Democrat Robert Hagan, extrapolated that Ohio taxpayers shelled out \$67 million for Walmart employees.

It gets worse. Walmart publicly supported Obamacare,

then this year kicked thousands of its employees off its health plans by demoting them to part-time employees. All employees hired after January 2012 who work less than 30 hours a week, will lose Walmart's health plan. For many, that means the state will pick up the tab.

Enter the D.C. Council, which saw a need to provide for its citizens who have no union representation. The council passed a "living wage" bill that will apply to large corporations without unions, like Walmart. Businesses with more than \$1 billion in income yearly, and more than 75,000 square feet of retail space, must pay their employees \$12.50 per hour.

Walmart threatened to cancel three of its planned stores not yet in development, and might pull the other three under construction, if the living wage bill passes. The council refused to be intimidated, and passed the bill 8 to 5.

But the bill is opposed by Mayor Vincent C. Gray. To override a veto — if Gray vetoes the bill — requires nine votes. Two of the council members who opposed the bill are running for mayor, and likely have no desire to alienate the big corporations and developers who bankroll campaigns. It's going to be a tough sell to convert one of the other three.

Obama said at Knox College: "This growing inequality isn't just morally wrong; it's bad economics. When middle-class families have less to spend, businesses have fewer customers. When wealth concentrates at the very top, it can inflate unstable bubbles that threaten the economy. When the rungs on the ladder of opportunity grow farther apart, it undermines the very essence of this country."

Unfortunately, it seems that for now Washington's mayor is not sure what side he might end up fighting for.

Senate approves nominee for ATF

WASHINGTON — The Senate has voted in dramatic fashion to approve one of President Barack Obama's nominees. It took one senator to switch her vote, another to fly back from North Dakota and an afternoon roll call that stretched into the evening.

Five hours after the vote started, the Senate voted Wednesday to end Republican delaying tactics against B. Todd Jones, Obama's pick to head the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

To win that crucial showdown, Democrats had to persuade Alaska Republican Sen. Lisa Murkowski to switch her vote. They also had to wait for Democratic North Dakota Sen. Heidi Heitkamp to fly back to Washington.

Senators then gave final approval to Jones' nomination on a 53 to 42 vote.

O.J. Simpson wins small victory

CARSON CITY, Nev. — O.J. Simpson won a small victory Wednesday in his bid for freedom as Nevada granted him parole on some of his 2008 convictions for kidnapping and armed robbery involving the holdup of two sports memorabilia dealers at a Las Vegas hotel room.

But the decision doesn't mean Simpson will be leaving prison anytime soon. The former NFL star was convicted on multiple charges and still faces at least four more years behind bars on sentences that were ordered to run consecutively.

The Nevada Board of Parole Commissioners released its decision Wednesday.

The parole becomes effective Oct. 2. Then, Simpson will begin serving the minimum term on four concurrent sentences imposed for using a weapon during the 2007 robbery. He will have another parole hearing on those sentences.

Man pleads not guilty to killings

CLEVELAND — A man pleaded not guilty Wednesday to kidnapping and killing three women whose bodies were found wrapped in trash bags earlier this month.

Michael Madison, 35, appeared via a video feed from jail for his arraignment, for which he was handcuffed and wearing orange jail scrubs. When the judge asked him how he was, Madison answered, "I've been better."

The judge continued his \$6 million bond and said she would appoint two attorneys to represent him. A pretrial hearing was set for Tuesday morning.

Madison is facing six charges of aggravated murder, two for each victim under different killing theories. He's also charged with three counts of kidnapping, three counts of gross abuse of a corpse, one count of rape and one count of weapon possession by an ex-convict.

Washington — President Barack Obama's national security team argued Wednesday to keep its sweeping domestic surveillance powers intact, even as it acknowledged some limitations appear inevitable.

Facing unexpectedly harsh opposition from both parties over a once-secret program that sweeps up the phone records of every American, the Obama administration said it wanted to work with lawmakers who seemed intent on putting limits on that authority.

"We are open to re-evaluating this program in ways that can perhaps provide greater confidence and public trust that this is in fact a program that achieves both privacy protections and national security," Robert Litt, counsel to the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, told

that change was coming. This newest privacy-vs.-security debate was touched off when former

government contract systems analyst Edward Snowden leaked classified documents exposing National Security Agency programs that store years of phone records on every American. That revelation prompted the most significant reconsideration yet of the vast surveillance powers Congress granted the president after 9/11.

The administration intended to keep the telephone program a secret forever and, for more than a decade, few in Congress showed any interest in reining in the surveillance. Snowden's leaks abruptly changed the calculus on Capitol Hill.

"We have a lot of good information out there that helps the American public understand these programs, but it all came out late," Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse, D-R.I., said in a rebuke of government secrecy. "It all came out in

response to a leaker. There was no organized plan for how we rationally declassify this so that the American people can participate in the debate."

The telephone program is authorized under a provision of the USA Patriot Act, which Congress hurriedly passed after 9/11.

On Wednesday, the national security establishment sought to reassure Congress that its surveillance powers were rigorously monitored and narrowly crafted while simultaneously leaving open the possibility of some new limitations.

To that end, the administration declassified documents about the telephone program. But the documents revealed no legal analysis that underpinned the widespread surveillance. And the redacted documents show only in broad strokes how NSA officials use the data.

Raiders of 'Hitler's gas station' reunite

CINCINNATI — All these years later, some surviving veterans still think the raid on "Hitler's gas station" was a great plan. However, not all worked out as expected, and the result was a fierce World War II battle marked by bravery and sacrifice.

The 70th anniversary Ploesti Raid reunion this week at the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force commemorates an Aug. 1, 1943, assault by waves of B-24 bombers on oil refineries in Romania that provided much of the fuel for the Nazi war machine. Five Medals of Honor were among the many awards given for what U.S. military histories call the most decorated action of the war.

U.S. commanders "emphasized the importance of completing the mission; in their estimate, it would shorten the war in Europe by six months," Dale Hulsey, 91, of Fort Worth, Texas, recalled Wednesday, after reunion participants viewed a restored B-24 at the museum near Dayton.

"They tried to knock the thing out in one mission, but everything went wrong," said Bob Rans, a Chicago native who lives near Tampa at age 92, with vivid memories of being bathed in gasoline as a wall of flame roared toward him.

The raid inflicted heavy but not devastating damage, and nearly a third of the 177 planes and their 1,726 men failed to make it back to their North Africa bases more than 1,000 miles away.

The Allies had tried bombing the oil fields before from high levels; Operation Tidal Wave was to be a surprise assault by a

flying armada coming in under radar and methodically knocking out assigned targets. But navigational problems disrupted plans, and defenders on the ground were ready for them.

Sweeping in just above cornstalks — "we were so close to the ground it was like driving at high speed in an automobile," Hulsey said — the bombers were met with a barrage of fire.

Hulsey, a radio operator, remembers a continuous line of bright flashes from gunfire on the ground. Rans said anti-aircraft guns mounted on rail cars provided mobile defense against the bombers.

An auxiliary fuel tank near Rans was hit, showering him with gasoline. Fire engulfing his plane, he parachuted out. He was captured, treated in a hos-

pital for burns, then put in a prison camp. Hulsey said his plane knocked out its target and was headed home when shot down by fighter planes. The crew was found and protected by Yugoslav resistance fighters until a British rescue operation got them out nearly a year later.

Rans and Hulsey were among 11 raid veterans at the reunion, with nearly 100 family members and friends. Air Force history enthusiasts Mark Copeland of Lakeville, Minn., and Blaine Duxbury of Indianapolis helped organize it. Copeland said after a 60th anniversary reunion in Salt Lake City, there

was interest in coming together again for what likely will be the last reunion. About 70 of the mission participants are still alive, he said.

Scott Stewart came from Lincoln, Neb., to pay tribute to the mission his late father, Carroll Stewart, wrote about in a 1962 book co-authored with James Dugan. Stewart said his father spent years chronicling the stories of veterans of the battle, including Germans and Romanians.

Rans said the reunion, which will include a public memorial service today, brought back memories, some tears and a sense of pride for the veterans about their place in military annals.

"When you stop to think about it, you were part of an action that nobody else could ever be in again, the most highly decorated action of the war," Rans said. "History is history."

7 dead drinking methyl alcohol

HAVANA — Cuban state television said at least seven people have died of poisoning after consuming methyl alcohol and 41 others remain hospitalized.

A Health Ministry report read out on the afternoon news said numerous people began showing up at Havana emergency rooms Monday exhibiting symptoms of "serious poisoning."

It was determined they had consumed illegal methyl alcohol, also called methanol or "wood alcohol," which is used in labs and research centers. Methanol is highly toxic for humans and can result in death

MLB's trade deadline mostly quiet

Houston sends Norris to Orioles

In the playoff mix for a second straight year, the Baltimore Orioles made the biggest move on a quiet trade-deadline day, acquiring Bud Norris from Houston to keep pace with the Boston Red Sox.

Hoping to catch the NL West-leading Dodgers, the Arizona Diamondbacks filled a hole in their bullpen Wednesday by sending struggling 20-game winner Ian Kennedy to San Diego for lefty reliever Joe

Thatcher.

Boston put the pressure on Baltimore by picking up 2007 NL Cy Young Award winner Jake Peavy from the Chicago White Sox less than 24 hours earlier in a three-team trade. The deal was finalized quickly in part because the Detroit Tigers were eager to protect themselves in case shortstop Jhonny Peralta is suspended for his involvement in the Biogenesis performance-enhancing drugs scandal.

"The frank reality is that I do not know what is going to happen with Jhonny, but with this move, we now feel well protected if there is a long suspension," Tigers general manager David Dombrowski said.

With all eyes on the Yankees because of Alex Rodriguez's likely suspension by Major League Baseball for his role in the wide-ranging drug case, New York never could work out a deal with the Phillies for corner infielder Michael Young, who is staying—for now—with Philadelphia.

San Francisco also held onto left-hander Javier Lopez and the Los Angeles Angels kept second baseman Howie Kendrick after sending Alberto Callaspo to Oakland late Monday.



Tampa Bay can't get anything going in 7-0 setback to Diamondbacks

ST. PETERSBURG — Wade Miley pitched two-hit ball into the seventh inning and Eric Chavez drove in three runs Wednesday night, leading the Arizona Diamondbacks to a 7-0 victory over the Tampa Bay Rays.

Paul Goldschmidt hit his 24th homer, scored three runs and reached base four times. Cody Ross had three straight hits and drove in two runs as Arizona broke a three-game losing streak.

Arizona outhit the Rays 14-3. Ben Zobrist got two hits for the Tampa Bay, which despite the loss finished its best month ever at 21-5.

Miley (8-8) won for the fourth time in five starts. He struck out eight in 6 1-3 innings and walked five.

Miley has made 11 straight starts of giving up three earned runs or fewer.

Jeremy Hellickson (10-4) gave up four runs and seven hits in 4 1-3 innings, the shortest Rays start since Alex Colome also went 4 1/3 innings on June 22.

Chavez homered for the second straight day, a two-run shot that gave the Diamondbacks a 4-0 lead in the second.

Hits by Martin Prado, Aaron Hill and Ross had produced two runs in the first.

Arizona added single runs in the seventh, eighth and ninth against three different reliefers.

AP Source: MLB threatening A-Rod with lifetime ban

NEW YORK — Major League Baseball is threatening to kick Alex Rodriguez out of the

game for life unless the New York Yankees star agrees not to fight a lengthy suspension for his role in baseball's latest drug scandal, according to a person familiar with the discussions.

The person spoke to The Associated Press on Wednesday on condition of anonymity because no statements were authorized as the investigation pushes to a conclusion.

Whether Commissioner Bud Selig would actually issue a lifetime ban was unclear, and baseball officials know a permanent ban could be shortened by arbitrator Fredric Horowitz, the person said.

Based on past cases, people involved believe Horowitz might cut a lifetime ban to about 200 games.

The Yankees expected Rodriguez to be accused of recruiting other athletes for the clinic, attempting to obstruct MLB's investigation, and not being truthful with MLB in the past.

Even if he is banned from baseball, there is precedent for a shortened penalty: When pitcher Steve Howe was given a lifetime ban in 1992 in his seventh suspension for drug or alcohol use, an arbitrator reduced the penalty to 119 days.

Eagles' Cooper apologizes for racial slur

PHILADELPHIA — Saying he was "ashamed and disgusted" with himself, Eagles and former University of Florida wide receiver Riley Cooper apologized repeatedly for making a racial slur at a Kenny Chesney concert that was caught on video and led to him getting fined.

The video of Cooper using the N-word surfaced Wednesday on the Internet. Cooper issued a statement of apology then met with reporters outside the team's practice facility.

"This is the lowest of lows," Cooper said. "This is not the type of person I want to be portrayed as. This isn't the type of person I am. I'm extremely sorry."

Cooper said he was drinking when he directed the slur at an African-American security guard at the concert in June.

"That's no excuse for what I said. I don't use that term," he said. "I was raised better than that. I have a great mom and dad and they're disgusted with my actions."

Cooper said he was fined a significant amount of money by the Eagles.

"We are shocked and appalled by Riley Cooper's words," Eagles owner Jeffrey Lurie said. "This sort of behavior or attitude from anyone has no role in a civil society. He has accepted responsibility for his words and his actions. He has been fined for this incident."

Buccaneers sign 3, waive 2 others in roster moves

TAMPA — The Tampa Bay Buccaneers have signed offensive linemen Roger Allen and Howard Barbieri, as well as linebacker Dom DeCicco.

To make room on the roster, cornerback Mason Robinson and tackle Jason Weaver were waived Wednesday.

Allen and Barbieri are guards. Allen appeared in four games with the Bucs last season, while Barbieri entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent in 2011 and spent the 2012 offseason with the Baltimore Ravens.

DeCicco appeared in 20 games over the past two seasons with the Chicago Bears.

ST. PETERSBURG — Matt Moore's changeup has caused a lot of trouble for hitters this season.

Now it's even a problem for Moore, Tampa Bay's All-Star pitcher who was put on the 15-day disabled list Wednesday with a sore left elbow.

Moore will miss one or two starts. The Rays are calling the move precautionary.

Moore is 14-3 with a 3.41 ERA in 21 starts. The Rays made the move while leading the AL East,

and called up infielder Ryan Roberts from Triple-A Durham.

"If this was the playoffs or some situation that called for me to be out there, I think without doubt that I could do it," Moore said. "But there's just no reason for us to push things right now."

Manager Joe Maddon said the injury "wasn't anything awful, certainly a little more sore than he's accustomed to."

Moore left Sunday's start against the New York Yankees after just five innings.

"I think the second inning is when I started to feel it. But only on changeups, which is part of the reason why I stayed in the game as long as I did, just mostly with fastballs and curve-

balls," he said.

Said Maddon: "That'll happen where guys will get sore on a certain pitch, and then if they don't throw it they stop being sore."

"But the changeup's a big pitch for him, so we wanted him to get that back," he said.

The 24-year-old left-hander is tied for second in the American League in wins and winning percentage (.824) and third in opposing batting average (.212).

"Anytime you're dealing with a pitcher and his arm, you're going to have some degree of concern, but everyone feels really good about it. So does Matt," Rays executive vice president of baseball operations Andrew Friedman said.

Tampa Bay Rays starting pitcher Matt Moore was placed on the 15-day disabled list Wednesday with a sore left (pitching) elbow.

A wake-up call for a skeptic


Captain "Red Ed" Brennan has been too busy with scallops clients to go after grouper lately, but said they're being taken in water between 26 and 36 feet deep. So if you want gags, that's your starting point.

He told me of one trip that yielded not only limits of gags, but a nice 26-inch red grouper. As for

the scallops, he said they have indeed moved into deeper water, as expected, but added, "...with an extreme low tide, we had no problem getting our limit in just over an hour in three feet of water outside of St. Martins Keys."

Doesn't get any easier than three feet of water.

Redfish are still widely scattered (more on this in an upcoming column), but the trout have been coop-

erating in water six to 10 feet deep, and the Barge Canal is currently on fire. Mike O'Feild, who fishes the Canal regularly, has been kept ashore lately by the nasty weather, but got out last

Monday, and the catching was good once he figured out what the trout wanted and where the catfish were not.

Normally, the best way to fish the Canal for sand and silver trout is to drift, bouncing a small jig head tipped with a piece of shrimp along the bottom, but, he reported, "... for some reason the sugars (sand trout) didn't want the bait moving laterally along the bottom on a drift. What worked instead was anchoring and bouncing the jig off the bottom in place."

O'Feild started at Marker 32, but the bottom was paved with catfish,

mostly gafftopsails, with a few hardheads thrown in. Water temperature was 82 degrees, with about the usual stain to the water for the Canal. The tide was going out, but so weakly he could barely make out water movement around the channel markers.

Total catch for the day was 35 fish, including a few whiting and one exceptionally large sand trout O'Feild estimated at about 16 or 17 inches before a shark ate nearly a foot of it.

There were plenty of sharks around, and they landed eight of them; two bonnetheads, four black tips and two spinners. Most ran just under two feet or so in length, but a two-foot shark will definitely test your trout tackle. Most of the fish came after they anchored at Marker 28, where the trout were plentiful and the catfish missing in action.

Jordan may see special teams time

Miami's top pick set to debut Sunday

DAVIE — The Miami Dolphins are so eager to see rookie Dion Jordan in Sunday's exhibition opener that they might put him in the game on the first play.

The kickoff, that is.

Jordan wants to play special teams, and the Dolphins are inclined to let him, although they must weigh risk versus reward in using the No. 3 overall draft pick on kick coverage.

The spectacle of the speedy, 6-foot-6, 260-pound Jordan running downfield under kicks could be breathtaking, and the Dolphins would be holding their breath. But Jordan's not worried about getting hurt, even though he's recovering from shoulder surgery in February.

"Every play is dangerous in football," he said. "You've just got to play the right way."

Miami has an enormous investment in Jordan, who played special teams at Oregon but was drafted primarily for his pass-rushing skills. The Dolphins traded up nine spots to select him, then gave him a \$20.6 million, four-year contract that included a \$13.3 million signing bonus.


Coach Joe Philbin said his contract does not make him too valuable for special teams.

"That's a huge part of our team," Philbin said. "We have the potential to be very, very good on special teams this year. Dion's had an outstanding attitude toward special teams. To say he's too valuable, absolutely not."

Withlacoochee, Lake Rousseau fun for fishing, but caution must be exercised

From time to time, I receive emails asking questions about outdoor-related items. Since Fishtales is primarily a fishing column most of these questions involve that topic.

Recently, a handful of the emails I've received involve Lake Rousseau and the Withlacoochee River. This week, Fishtales will cover an overview of the river and lake and — in two weeks — we will discuss some boating and fishing options for the areas.

The Withlacoochee River is a primary source for most of the freshwater that flows through our county via the Tsala Apopka Chain of Lakes. As the Withlacoochee goes, so do our chain of lakes.

Water that isn't temporarily diverted through the chain makes its way along the river, eventually creating Lake Rousseau, a.k.a. The Backwaters.

The Withlacoochee begins in northern Polk County's Green Swamp and flows generally northwest more than 155 miles before discharging into the Gulf of Mexico in the Yankeetown area.

The Withlacoochee enters Citrus County on the southern

bank of the county south of Floral City. As it flows northwest it carves out the county's eastern boundary separating Citrus

from Sumter, Marion and Levy

counties from south to north respectively.

From this southern portion of the river northwest, almost to the community of Dunnellon, the

river is primarily shallow with

ample aquatic vegetation and a rock bottom better suited for a

parking lot. Caution is strongly advised for boaters here. Small jon

boats and airboats are the norm on this

stretch.

Traveling westward past Inverness and Hernando in the direction of Dunnellon, the Withlacoochee narrows and deepens significantly making navigation much less

hazardous, although you're never

completely in the clear on this

river.

Soon one of the Withlacoochee's tributaries, the Rainbow River, appears.

The Department of Environ-

mental Protection says the Rain-

bowl River is Florida's fourth

largest freshwater spring and the

10th largest freshwater spring in

the world. The 5.7 mile river, a sys-

tem of 18 springs, is exceptionally

clear. If you've never visited the

Rainbow, make sure to — it

should be on your bucket list.

Once the Rainbow's gin-clear

water blends with the Withlacoochee's tannic-colored waters,

the river make a serpentine path

toward Lake Rousseau.

A popular boat ramp located near Dunnellon City Hall pro-

vides access but limited parking

can create headaches at times.

Further along the river, boaters will find the lower stretches of the Withlacoochee dotted with chan-

nel markers equipped with green

and red numbered panels begin-

ning near the Goldendale area

where another small boat ramp is

present.

When navigating westward, make sure to keep the red chan-

nel markers on your left, green on

your right. Conversely, when re-

turning or heading easterly, keep the red markers on your right—

red, right, return.

One of the things that keeps

many boaters away from Lake

Rousseau is the fact there are

thousands of trees and stumps in

the water. The marked channel is

clear from stumps and safe to op-

erate a boat within its narrow con-

fines. But remember that even a

momentary diversion outside of

the markers can meet with severe

consequences.

A few weeks ago I watched a

young man operating his brand

new Triton bass boat along the

channel only to become momen-

tarily confused or distracted. At 55

miles per hour, his boat's engine

and a 100-year-old stump collided

underwater. The stump was the

victor. As I watched the sickened

boater limp back to the boat ramp

with a broken boat and thought

there was no doubt a hefty repair

bill was forthcoming. Worse yet,



'Boneless' and 'skinless' don't have to mean 'flavorless'

Boneless, skinless chicken breasts are literally THE white meat of the meat world. They are a great lean protein, quick and easy to prepare, freeze well, and take to just about any flavor or cuisine you care for. But they also can be rather dull. So we've come up with three ways to jazz up this week-night staple:

Spice-rubbed chicken breasts

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (about 1 pound)
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/2 teaspoon sweet paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice

DIRECTIONS:

Set the chicken breasts on a cutting board and slice horizontally across the piece to create 2 thinner halves. One at a time, cover each half with plastic wrap, then use a meat mallet to pound to an even thickness. Drizzle the pounded halves with the olive oil and rub all over.

In a small bowl, combine the brown sugar, cumin, garlic powder, onion powder, paprika, thyme, salt, pepper and allspice. Rub the mixture over both sides of each of the 4 pieces of meat.

If cooking on the grill, heat to medium heat. Cook for 2 minutes per side. If cooking on the stovetop, in a large skillet heat 1 tablespoon of canola oil over medium-high. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes per side, or until the chicken reaches an internal temperature of 160 degrees. Let rest for 5 minutes.

Orange-cilantro smothered chicken

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (about 1 pound), cut into 2-inch chunks
- 1/2 cup low-sodium chicken broth
- 1/2 cup orange marmalade
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped cilantro

DIRECTIONS:

Heat the oven to 400 degrees. In a large, oven-safe skillet, mix together the chicken broth, marmalade, brown sugar, red pepper flakes, salt, black pepper and cilantro. Bring to a boil and cook until reduced by half. Add the chicken, turning to coat, then place the skillet in

the oven and cook for 20 to 25 minutes, or until chicken reaches 160 degrees.

Miso-lime marinated chicken strips

Prep them in the morning, then just cook off when you

get home from work. They can be cooked on the grill, on the stove, or in the oven.

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 tablespoons white miso
- 2 tablespoons lime juice
- Zest of 1 lime
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper

- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 teaspoon chili-garlic paste
- 2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (about 1 pound), cut into strips

DIRECTIONS:

In a zip-close plastic bag, combine the miso, lime juice, lime zest, black pepper, honey and chili-garlic paste. Squish around in the bag until well combined. Place the chicken strips into the bag and squeeze out any air. Refrigerate for 6 to 8 hours.

When ready to cook, heat the oven to 450 degrees or heat the grill to medium-high. If using the oven, place a wire rack over a baking sheet and mist with cooking spray.

Drain the chicken, discarding the marinade. Arrange the chicken strips over the rack-baking sheet or on the grates of the heated grill. Grill for 2 minutes or roast for 4 to 5 minutes, or until the chicken reaches an internal temperature of 160 degrees. Let rest for 5 minutes.

Makes: 16 servings

1/4 cup (1/2 stick) margarine, melted

1 8-ounce package Neufchatel cheese, softened

1 cup sugar

2 eggs

2 tablespoons flour

1/4 teaspoon baking powder

- 3 teaspoons turmeric

Building an empire, from the ground up

A new paperback, "The Barefoot Spirit," is not a story eulogizing the American pioneer character. Rather it is a fun read about "how hardship, hustle and heart built America's No. 1 wine brand." Surely anyone who has visited the shelves of a favorite wine boutique or supermarket has noticed the attractive pastel bottles with the funny-looking imprint of what looks very much like someone's bare foot stamped into a sandy beach.

"Barefoot" wines are the quintessential consumer-friendly, everyday wines in a broad variety of flavors, something for everyone, at an appealing price point of about \$5. The book chronicles the remarkable saga of how two hardworking wine novices created from scratch a No. 1 American brand, who took it from zero sales to a half-million cases per year in fewer than 20 years.

This duo of Michael Houlihan and Bonnie Harvey created the company in the early 1980s and sold out to the giant Gallo wines just 20 years later. The brand actually began at the home of California winemaker Davis Bynum, a guy with a sense of humor and a marketing sense who called his product "Chateau La Feet," a send-up, for folks who may not know, of the ultra-famous first-growth superstar French Bordeaux Château Lafite Rothschild.

Bynum abandoned the "cutesy" name in 1974 when he moved his operation to Sonoma. Enter Bonnie, who lived nearby Bynum Winery and was a pal of Bynum's son Michael.

Bonnie, like so many people of her era, was apprehensive about wine.


She knew nothing about it, could not pronounce the grape names, and generally figured wine was encased in some mysterious code — certainly not her cup of tea.

Still, one has to make a living, so Bonnie went to work in the back office of Davis Bynum's business.

Michael Houlihan was working at the fringes of the California wine business as well, consulting on contracts, negotiating with government agencies and helping with financials, yet he didn't know any more than Bonnie about actual wine.

One day, working with the Souverain wine people, who were in debt to a friend of theirs Mark Lyon,

Houlihan concocted a deal to bottle and sell about 18,000 cases of wine just sitting in Souverain tanks.

This was a way to pay back their debt to Mike. How hard could it be? Step one for Michael and Bonnie was a name and a label, one easy to identify. To accomplish this job, they went around and talked with a lot of people in the business, as well as some big supermarket chains.

The buyer of wine for the Lucky supermarket chain was a tough old bird who was flabbergasted by anyone asking his personal opinion regarding labels.. He told them, "Don't make it a hill or a valley or a creek, I got enough of those. Don't put flowers on it, don't call it 'Chateau,' but do make it big, so anybody can read it from four feet away pushing a cart."

Suffice to say, the original comical variation on Lafite suddenly evolved for them in one of those thunderbolt-of-inspiration moments. Bonnie got Michael to draw a foot, a big one, tilted to the right with plenty of arch. "Now write 'Barefoot' next to it," she said.

Michael, while traveling in France, had found "vin de pays," or local country wine. There was nothing fancy about these country selections, and both partners decided that what America needed

was a really good bottle of wine for about \$5.

They wanted the flavors to be varietally correct, with enough fruit in the reds to show through, ripe and consistent year after year. The wine was made for the mass market, so it should hold no surprises for consumers who want to buy again and again.

For gentle readers who are interested in old-fashioned American entrepreneurship and who enjoy a glass of decent table wine now and then, this is surely a fun book to read, as well as a decent inexpensive wine choice to sip.



school lunches, and therefore eat healthier than they might otherwise.

After all, Pistone said, "Proper nutrition is very, very important. It helps with getting them through the day."

The balanced energy provided by school

breakfasts, as well as lunches, is intended to have "staying power," Pistone said. What look like doughnuts, cinnamon buns, and cookies that are served at breakfast are actually packed with nutrients, fiber, whole grains and protein.

Pistone and Niblett also stress the importance of fresh fruits and vegetables in kids' diets. They get as much

fruit and other produce from Florida as possible, and utilize seasonal fruits and vegetables in temporary offerings like salads with Florida blueberries and strawberries. These are also easy foods for kids to have at home. Even if parents aren't home when they are, foods like those make for easy, healthy snacks.


Celebrate Citrus County's rich history
