Obama does about-face

Consumers can keep current health plans

WASHINGTON — Bowing to pressure, President Barack Obama on Thursday announced changes to his health care law to give insurance companies the option to keep offering consumers plans that would otherwise be canceled.

The administrative changes are

good for just one year, though senior administration officials said they could be extended if problems with the law persist. Obama announced the changes at the White House.

"This fix won't solve every problem for every person, but it's going to help a lot of people," the president said.

He acknowledged that "we fumbled the rollout of this health care law"

and pledged to "just keep on chipping away at this until the job is done."

He also promised to work to regain the trust of the American people.

"I think it's legitimate for them to

Thirty teams to race Saturday on Lake Hernando

HERNANDO — As the legend goes, a man named Qu Yuan had been exiled from his homeland in ancient China, and as an act of protest against the corruption of his era, committed suicide in the Miluo River.

In an attempt to save him, local fishermen took to their boats, splashing the water with their paddles to keep the water demons and evil spirits away.

Fast-forward about 2,500 years to this Saturday, Nov. 16, when 30 or so teams will take to their

boats and splash their paddles in Lake Hernando at the inaugural Lake Hernando Dragon Boat Festival at Lake Hernando Park, 3699 E. Orange Drive (off U.S. 41 North), Hernando.

Instead of warding off water demons and evil spirits, the modern-day dragon boat paddlers will be racing toward the finish line.

The festival, sponsored by the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce, Citrus County and High Five Dragon Boat, begins at 8 a.m. and continues until 2 p.m. (or possibly later).

"Dragon boating is one of the

fastest-growing sports in the country, and we have beautiful lakes here, so this is a good way to capture that," said Jeff Inglehart, special events coordinator for the chamber.

Since 2010, Homosassa has been the site of local dragon boat races. Inglehart said basically Saturday's event is the Homosassa race that's been moved to Hernando.

"When the Chamber got involved with the race we decided that the park in Hernando has a much better viewing area and a better place for a large number

Official: County brand weak

Not everyone on board for growth

The Citrus County Economic Development Council heard the good, the bad and the potential during an update on its strategic plan.

"You have to have your house in order. Are you ready for economic development?" asked consultant

Jeannette Goldsmith, Thursday. "Do you know what you want to be?"

"Are you ready to improve your product to meet the needs of your target industries?"

She said the county is well positioned with regional partners and can readily associate with Tampa, North Florida counties and Orlando.

Her local research has found an excellent environment for small businesses and some people in the county who want to see the kind of growth that will bring high-paying jobs.

But she pointed out the county's brand is weak.

"There is a real leadership void when it comes to economic development," she said, adding, "Typically it comes from the private sector. We found it to be lacking in Citrus County."

"There is also a lack of state-level awareness; Enterprise Florida is not very familiar with Citrus County."

She said the lack of investment in economic

Man, 21, charged with sex with minor

A 15-year-old girl's 21-year-old live-in boyfriend was arrested and charged with sex with a minor after the girl disclosed to a school counselor and police that she may be pregnant.

Mario Anthony Carta Jr., of South Barbour Street in Beverly Hills, is facing a single felony count of lewd and lascivious battery on a person between ages 12 and 16. His bond

was \$5,000.

According to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office arrest affidavit, the girl told authorities on Nov. 4 that after a series of home pregnancy tests she found out she was expecting and that the prospective father is 21-year-old Carta. She also said she shared a bedroom with Carta in her mother's home.

The girl's mother admitted to investigators that Carta does share a bedroom with her daughter and that she was aware they were

of people," he said.

Teams are coming from around the state, including seven from The Villages. Local teams include Guns and Hoses (Citrus County Sheriff's Office), Jazzy Paddlers (Citrus County Jazzercise), Cavity Crusaders (Value Dental Care), Crystal River High School JROTC River Pirates and others from throughout the community.

Each boat holds 20 paddlers, 10 on each side, along with a steersman and a drummer. The drummer's job is to beat the drum in sync with the paddlers, motivating the team to the finish line.

The steersperson stands in the stern of the boat, guiding the boat straight down the race course with a 10-foot oar.

"It's actually great for team-building," Inglehart said.

Saturday's event starts at 8 a.m. with opening ceremonies, with the first race starting at 9.

In addition to the races, spectators can enjoy festival activities throughout the park with food vendors, arts and crafts vendors, nonprofit and commercial exhibitors and

live entertainment.

"We're trying to set a precedent for a quality festival/race twice a year," Inglehart said.

Carta was arrested and transported to the Citrus County Detention Facility.

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

Inverness Grand Prix gears up for third year in downtown Inverness

For Harry Lewis, he and go-kart racing go way back.

"I raced as a kid in Fruitland Park," he said.

He never really outgrew it, and about six years ago he and a friend, Joe Wigley, organized the Affordable Kart Club as a way to inspire local kids with a fun sport and something to do.

As Lewis explained, basically all you need is a frame, motor, seat, wheels, a steering wheel and brakes to have fun.

They began racing at Citrus Speedway and run as many as 30 races a year.

Two years ago the club, along with the Ice Cream Doctor and the city of Inverness, sponsored a grand prix race, transforming the streets of downtown Inverness into a racing track.

"The grand prix is different; it's a whole different class of carts," Lewis said.

Now in its third year, the event has evolved into the two-day Inverness Grand Prix and Motorsports Festival, Nov. 22 and 23, beginning with a street party from 7 to 11 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 22, at Courthouse Square, featuring Big Engine, a popular Florida rock 'n' roll band.

Classic cars will be on display in the area both days of the festival. Proceeds from the festival benefit the Boys and Girls Clubs of Citrus County.

Beginning at 10 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 23, cars will be on display and then at noon more than 60 karts will take to the streets around the courthouse, down North Apopka Avenue, Martin Luther King Jr. Avenue, Dampier and Main streets.

(These areas will be closed to vehicle traffic during the event, so watch for detours).

Tony Modica, Fox Sports announcer for the Jacksonville Jaguars, will be announcing the various heats.

"He's fantastic," Lewis said. "He'll keep everyone filled in on all the details on the track, what's happening on the street and build the excitement."

After the race concludes there will be

two driver "meet and greets" at Dillon's Irish Pub and The Ice Cream Doctor.

"The racing will be good — you don't get to see karts on the street,"

Lewis said. "They go up to 60 miles per hour."

Sharon Skeele-Hogan, special events director for the city of Inverness, said because of the event's popularity of the past two years, the plan is to eventually expand it to a three-day weekend festival.

"This is such a unique event and it's all about tourism and drawing economic development to Inverness," she said. "We hope it will expand beyond a local thing to a state and regional thing."

Sinkhole surprises Dunedin residents

DUNEDIN — Residents of several Florida homes have been evacuated due to a possible sinkhole that opened in a backyard in Pinellas County on Thursday.

Dunedin Deputy Fire Chief Trip Barrs said the hole appeared to be about 12 feet wide when officials arrived on the scene. Residents of

the neighboring houses also were evacuated as a precaution.

The *Tampa Bay Times* reported the ground is so unstable that two homes must be demolished.

Television footage showed part of a patio caved in and a boat on the edge of the hole. Tampa-area television stations reported that a neighboring pool appears to have cracks.

The affected neighborhood is in

Dunedin, a small city in northern Pinellas County, about 20 miles north of St. Petersburg.

On Feb. 28, Jeffrey Bush died when a sinkhole opened under his bedroom in Seffner, near Tampa. His body was never recovered. In August, sections of a building at a resort near Orlando collapsed into a sinkhole. No one was injured.

Homeowner Michael Dupre said

the family heard a noise that sounded like a sledgehammer pounding on the wall early Thursday.

Dupre told Bay News 9 there had been "sinkhole activity" in the area. "After the Seffner sinkhole, we were scared. We've been dealing with our insurance company and finally two days ago, they started working on our house. Now it looks like our house is gone."

Bomb threat closes Walmart

HOMOSASSA — Evacuated residents returned to shopping after no explosives were found by law enforcement personnel responding to a Thursday bomb threat at Walmart.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies and fire rescue personnel responded to the shopping center at 6885 S. Suncoast Blvd. (U.S. 19) at 11:56 a.m., according to the sheriff's office.

Reportedly, an out-of-state man called a Walmart manager and demanded \$4,000 be loaded onto a pre-paid debit card. He told the manager that if he or she did not comply that he

would have an accomplice inside the store set off a bomb.

Sheriff's office media relations coordinator Heather Yates said CCSO traced the call back to the out-of-state number and found the call to be fallacious.

Out of precaution, the store was evacuated for an hour while investigators searched the premises.

Customers were allowed back into the store after the call was determined not to be a legitimate threat.

Yates said similar threats have been reported at other Walmart stores around the country.

The incident is currently under investigation by the Citrus County Sheriff's Office.

Duke money to fund tech program planned for WTI

Withlacoochee Technical Institute (WTI) students may soon have another credential to add to their resume.

Director Denise Willis asked Citrus County School Board members to approve a \$100,000 donation from Duke Energy to WTI at the monthly school board meeting Tuesday.

"How is the money going to be utilized?" asked board member Pat Deutschman.

Willis replied that a "high-technology corridor runs from Tampa to Orlando to Gainesville" and it requires a dramatic increase in the supply of skilled workers.

"We are trying to stay ahead and prepare our students for these high-skilled and high-wage jobs," Willis said. "We are going to be starting a new program in August called Automation and Production Technology."

The program will prepare students for the Manufacturer's Skill Standards Council (MSSC) certification and the Certified Production Technician certification. It will include robotics, automation, basic electricity, programmable logic controls, mechanical drives, fluid power and CNC (Computer Numerical Control) machinery.

"With the money, we are going to be purchasing some trainers from a company called Amatrol," Willis said. "We have been working very closely with a representative from the company."

Willis said the class will be in the old electrical shop beginning August 2014.

"Our goal is to have students leave WTI with more than one credential," Willis said. "We are seeing students six years after graduation. Our goal is to get these kids right after graduation. We want to provide students with as much opportunity as possible."

School board members approved the donation with a 5-0 vote.

McCartney urges Putin to free detainees

LONDON — Paul McCartney cited the lyrics of "Back in the USSR" on Thursday as he urged Russian President Vladimir Putin to release 30 people arrested during a Greenpeace protest at an Arctic oil rig almost two months ago.

In a letter, the former Beatle told Putin that he wrote his playful homage to the former Soviet Union in 1968, "back when it wasn't fashionable for English people to say nice things about your country."

Quoting the song's line "Gee it's good to be back home," McCartney asked: "Could you make that come true for the Greenpeace prisoners?"

The 28 protesters, as well as a photographer and a videographer working for Greenpeace, were detained aboard their ship, the Arctic Sunrise, on Sept. 18 after staging a protest at an oil rig owned by Russia's Gazprom state energy giant.

They were initially charged with piracy. That was later downgraded to hooliganism, which carries a maximum sentence of seven years in prison.

In the letter, posted on McCartney's official website, the musician cited his long association with Russia, including an outdoor concert in Red Square in 2003. On that occasion, Putin gave McCartney a personally guided tour of the Kremlin.

McCartney told Putin he hoped they would meet again, "when our schedules allow."

He said Greenpeace, which stages direct-action protests against alleged environmental offenders around the world, was nonviolent and "most certainly not an anti-Russian organiza-

tion. In my experience they tend to annoy every government!"

Former Vegas mayor blames Bourdain spat on booze

LAS VEGAS — In true Vegas fashion, former mayor Oscar Goodman is blaming it on the booze.

Sin City's ubiquitous cheerleader made headlines when he threatened to go home Sunday night after waiting 20 minutes for an interview with Anthony Bourdain, host of CNN's travel show "Parts Unknown."

Bourdain was in town filming an episode. He responded via Twitter on Wednesday that he had not been late for the meeting with the former mayor at Oscar's Beef Booze Broads Steakhouse at the Plaza.

Both men denied a column in the *Las Vegas Review-Journal* that ran with a headline suggesting Goodman was "broiling" over the incident. Columnist Norm

Clarke told The Associated Press that Goodman thought Bourdain was late and was grouching about it in front of reporters and hotel officials.


On Wednesday, Goodman said if he gave the impression that he was mad, it was only because he was three martinis in. He said he should not be held accountable for his actions after 5 p.m., and that at least he wasn't smoking crack, unlike a certain Toronto official.

"We were hugging each other like two long-lost soul brothers who hadn't seen each other for 30 years," said the mob lawyer-cum-city official, who has a fondness for Borscht Belt jokes even before 5 p.m. "I was hugging him because I was trying to stand up."

Bourdain said he doesn't mind being portrayed as a jerk — using a more vulgar term — but he doesn't like being called the kind of jerk who makes people wait.



Psychic gets prison in six-figure scam case

NEW YORK — A New York City psychic convicted of conning tens of thousands of dollars from clients was sentenced Thursday to five to 15 years in prison.

Sylvia Mitchell must pay restitution to two victims following her grand larceny conviction last month.

The case debated the line between selling an unusual service and exploiting people's longing to change their lives.

One former client testified she paid more than \$120,000 after Mitchell said she'd help rout "negative energy."

Another said Mitchell told her she needed to break her attachment to money and persuaded her to hand over \$27,000 to hold. She said Mitchell balked at giving it back but eventually refunded some.

Manhattan state Supreme Court Justice Gregory Carro said that while some customers may just have dropped in Mitchell's Greenwich Village parlor for a lark, another type of client was "someone who's having some dramatic stress in their life ... and then you just con them out of thousands and thousands of dollars."

Mitchell's new lawyers said they would appeal her conviction and sentence, noting that a probation report had recommended only six months in jail.

The defense said the soothsayer was hired just to try to assist people, and there was no evidence she didn't.

"She wasn't telling the future. They came to her for help, and she told them that she would pray for them and perform certain rituals to try to get rid of whatever negativity she sensed around them," Mitchell's former attorney, William Aronwald, said after her conviction.

But prosecutors said Mitchell was a swindler who picked on desperate people. Mitchell, who lives in Mystic, Conn., worked from a Greenwich Village storefront where the sign read "Zena Clairvoyant."

One client, Debra Saalfield, was a heartbroken ballroom dancing instructor who had just lost a job and a boyfriend within a day. She testified that Mitchell told her that she'd been an ancient Egyptian princess in a past life, and her troubles stemmed from being too tied to money then.

While not entirely convinced, the single mother of three tapped a line of credit on her Naples, Fla., home to write Mitchell a \$27,000 check. "At the time, it felt like it was an emergency because I was very unstable," Saalfield testified.

One former client said Mitchell told her she needed to break her attachment to money and persuaded her to hand over \$27,000 to hold.

Library of Congress to preserve Archive of Public Broadcasting

WASHINGTON — Early interviews with John F. Kennedy, Hubert Humphrey and Ronald Reagan are part of a collection of public broadcast recordings dating to the 1950s that will be preserved at the Library of Congress.

Under a project funded by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting and announced Thursday, 40,000 hours of radio and television content is being digitized for long-term preservation at the library. It will become the American Archive of Public Broadcasting and will be housed at the library's National Audio-Visual Conservation Center in underground vaults in Culpeper, Va.

Recordings of Kennedy and Humphrey come from Twin Cities Public Television's coverage of the 1960 presidential primaries. There is also a commentary by George Lucas on his first "Star Wars" movies from KUSC in Los Angeles and 1967 interviews with then-California Gov. Ronald Reagan from Boston's WGBH.

The archive, made up of contributions from about 120 stations nationwide, also is rich with regional programming, curators said. There is a series on the history of southwest Florida, films of performances of an acclaimed organist at the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City and shows on the space program.

"It's an incredible collection for local and regional history that has not been shown to the rest of the country," said curator Alan Gevinson of the library's audio-visual conservation center.

Public, education-related radio dates to the 1920s, and public TV goes back to the 1950s — before the creation of NPR and PBS.

"But as far as archiving, nothing really had been done, and certainly not at this scale, until now," Gevinson said.

expect me to have to win back some credibility on this health care law in particular and on a whole range of these issues in general," he said.

Obama has been under enormous pressure from congressional Democrats to give ground on the cancellation issue under the health care overhaul, a program likely to be at the center of next year's midterm elections for control of the House and Senate.

It's unclear what the impact of Thursday's changes will be for the millions of people who have already had their plans canceled. While officials said insurance companies will now be able to offer those people the option to renew their old plans, companies are not required to take that step.

The main industry trade group, America's Health Insurance Plans, said Obama's offer comes too late and could lead to higher premiums, since companies already have set 2014 rates based on the assumption that many people with individual

coverage will shift over to the new markets created under Obama's law.

Karen Ignagni, president of the industry group, didn't speculate on whether companies would extend coverage for those threatened with cancellation, but warned in a statement that "changing the rules after health plans have already met the requirements of the law could destabilize the market and result in higher premiums for consumers."

Insurance companies will be required to inform consumers who want to keep canceled plans about the protections that are not included under those plans. Customers will also be notified that new options are available offering more coverage and in some cases, tax credits to cover higher premiums.

Under Obama's plan, insurance companies would not be allowed to sell coverage deemed subpar under the law to new customers, marking a difference with legislation that House Republicans intend to put to a vote on Friday.

Only last week, Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius told a Senate panel she doubted that retroactively permit-

ting insurers to sell canceled policies "can work very well since companies are now in the market with an array of new plans. Many have actually added consumer protections in the last three-and-a-half years."

Republicans were unimpressed with the changes.

House Speaker John Boehner, speaking in advance of the president's announcement, insisted it

was time to "scrap this law once and for all."

"You can't fix this government-run health care plan called Obamacare," he said. "It's just not fixable."

Obama, for his part, made clear he would continue to fight ongoing attempts to sink the whole program, saying, "I will not accept proposals that are just another brazen attempt to undermine or repeal the

overall law and drag us back into a broken system.

"We're going to solve the problems that are there, we're going to get it right, and the Affordable Care Act is going to work for the American people," he pledged.

While the White House deals with the cancellation issue, the administration is also promising improvements in a federal website

so balky that enrollments totaled fewer than 27,000 in October in 36 states combined. The administration had said in advance the enrollment numbers would fall far short of initial expectations. After weeks of highly publicized technical woes, they did.

Adding in enrollment of more than 79,000 in the 14 states with their own websites, the nationwide number of 106,000 October sign-ups was barely one-fifth of what officials had projected — and a small fraction of the millions who have received private coverage cancellations as a result of the federal law.

The administration said an additional 1 million people have been found eligible to buy coverage in the markets, with about one-third qualifying for tax credits to reduce their premiums. Another 396,000 have been found eligible for Medicaid, which covers low-income people.

Administration officials and senior congressional Democrats expressed confidence in the program's future. "We expect enrollment will grow substantially throughout the next five months," said Sebelius, who is in charge of the program.

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Attacks, deaths rampant at wild cat sanctuaries

PORTLAND, Ore. — Over the past few decades, as an exotic pet trade boomed and Americans bought cute tiger cubs and baby monkeys, sanctuaries sprang up across the nation to take care of the animals that were abandoned when they reached adult-size or were no longer wanted.

The growth in both the number of wild cats as pets and the sanctuaries that rescued them has led to attacks.

Since 1990, more than 20 people have been killed by captive big wild cats at sanctuaries, zoos and private residences, more than 200 people have been mauled and 200-plus wild cats have escaped, according to one of the nation's largest wild cat sanctuaries.

The latest death is head keeper Renee Radziwon-Chapman, 36, who was killed by a cougar at an Oregon sanctuary last week.

Experts said that because sanctuaries are largely unregulated and anyone can open one, there are no uniform safety protocols. And overconfidence or human error can lead to tragic consequences even among the most experienced of caretakers.

"It's a risky business when you're dealing with dangerous wild animals. You can't leave any room for error," said Vernon Weir, director of the Nevada-based American Sanctuary Association which certifies sanctuaries.

For decades, exotic animals have been imported into the U.S. and openly bred for the pet trade. Despite new laws that limit the trade in some states, people can easily buy an African rodent, a chimpanzee, or a baby leopard at a flea market or over the Internet.

Experts estimate the U.S. exotic pet trade is a multibillion-dollar industry. Hundreds of sanctuaries have opened throughout the U.S.

About 80 sanctuaries currently house big cats, the International Fund for Animal Welfare says. Only a dozen of them are certified or verified by two certifying organizations, the American Sanctuary Association and the Global Federation of Animal Sanctuaries.

There's little governmental oversight. The U.S. Department of Agriculture,

which enforces the federal Animal Welfare Act, licenses facilities that exhibit animals — whether domestic or wild — or do research. And the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service tracks endangered species when they are bought and sold across state or U.S. borders and issues permits to facilities moving animals across state lines.

But neither agency keeps a tally on facilities or the total number of wild animals that are housed.

And no one sets rules for how sanctuaries operate.

911 call: Sanctuary owner finds mauled employee

PORTLAND, Ore. — A chilling recording of a 911 call captures the owner of an Oregon wild cat sanctuary dragging an employee who'd been mauled to death from a cougar enclosure and screaming at two of the animals roaming inside to get away.

The audio details how Michael Tuller returned to WildCat Haven on Saturday night to discover 36-year-old Renee Radziwon-Chapman bloodied and lying on her back in the fenced-in enclosure.

Radziwon-Chapman, the sanctuary's head keeper, was alone at the suburban Portland facility when the attack occurred.

In the recording released Wednesday, Tuller tells dispatchers it's dark and he can't see, but he enters the enclosure with the cougars anyway.

While dragging out Radziwon-Chapman by the boots, he repeats, "Oh my God, Renee" over and over. He's also heard screaming, "Get out of here, go!" at the two wild

cats circling him.

Once Tuller gets Radziwon-Chapman out, the dispatcher asks Tuller if he can perform CPR on the woman. Tuller flatly answers: "No." He then tells the dispatcher that Radziwon-Chapman is beyond hope.

Autopsy results later showed Radziwon-Chapman died at the scene of multiple bite wounds concentrated at the head and the neck.

In a statement earlier this week, WildCat Haven lawyer Dale Johnson said the keeper broke the sanctuary's safety protocols when she locked only one of three cougars in a smaller cage and went into the main enclosure with the other two cougars.

Johnson also said the gate to the smaller cage where the three animals should've been locked up was operating properly.

But Radziwon-Chapman's family said they don't believe the wife and new mother broke any rules, and she had expressed concerns about working at the facility alone.

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Claims on German art trove face legal hurdles

BERLIN — When German tax authorities entered the home of a recluse collector and found a trove of art that could include works stolen by the Nazis, they stepped into a legal quagmire — one that may end up being resolved by politics as much as the law.

For a year and a half, prosecutors kept their find quiet, hoping to trace the history of some 1,406 pieces by artists such as Pablo Picasso, Henri Matisse and Marc Chagall before going public.

But since news of the case broke last week, officials have been scrambling to justify their secrecy and explain why Germany can't just hand the pictures back to the heirs. At times German authorities have appeared to be working at cross purposes as they try to balance judicial independence with public relations.

Ironically, it may be the strong protection of individ-

ual rights introduced after World War II that may support the legal argument that collector Cornelius Gurlitt should keep the works he inherited from his father Hildebrand, an art dealer who traded in works confiscated by the Nazis.

"His father did bad things during the Nazi period, but under our legal system you can't punish the son for that," said Matthias Druba, a Berlin lawyer who has dealt with other art restitution cases.

Authorities are investigating whether the paintings, prints and drawings were "misappropriated." But a spokesman for Augsburg prosecutors, who are handling the case, acknowledged that Germany's 30-year statute of limitations for most criminal prosecutions could make a legal pursuit of the art difficult.

"I never said we will give back the pictures to all those

who suffered injustice back then," prosecutor Matthias Nikolai told The Associated Press.

"We need to examine who can make what claims," he said. "To put it very carefully, there is a possibility in Germany's criminal code to hand seized objects back to victims."

Experts say the government's best option could be to appeal to Gurlitt's sense of ethics and negotiate resolutions about the art instead of heading to court.

There's some precedent for that. Two years ago, Gurlitt sold a work by German expressionist painter Max Beckmann titled "The Lion Tamer" for 864,000 euros (\$1.16 million), which he shared with the heirs of a Jewish collector who once owned the picture.

"It was all a matter of goodwill," said Karl-Sax Feddersen, a legal adviser for the Cologne auction house Lem-

pertz. "The heirs wouldn't have been able to get a German court to help them."

The elder Gurlitt, who died in 1956, was one of four art dealers commissioned by the Nazis to sell what is known as "degenerate art" — items seized from museums because they were deemed a corrupting influence on the German people. Prosecutors believe some 380 of the works found in his son's apartment were "degenerate art."

But another 590 artworks there may have been looted by the Nazis, they say.

The German government is keen to help the claimants, aware that doing otherwise would be a public relations disaster for a country trying to make amends for its Nazi past.

Government spokesman Steffen Seibert said Wednesday that authorities were using "all the available expertise at their disposal" to determine if there were legitimate claims to the works.

Mexican fisherman who lost treasure faces eviction

VERACRUZ, Mexico — Gulf-coast fisherman Raul Hurtado is a local legend — the man who found and lost millions of dollars' worth of Aztec gold almost four decades ago, was tossed in prison, then found peace making \$150 a month selling octopus and other seafood from a thatched-roof shack.

Now, Hurtado is back in the public eye because he's at risk of losing even the modest livelihood he earns on a small patch of beach known as Punta Gorda. The government plans to expand Veracruz port and make it one of Mexico's largest freight terminals, a move that threatens to evict him and dozens of others who have sold fish on the beach for decades.

It's the latest twist in a life that has had some wandering over the years whether Hurtado has been the luckiest or unluckiest fisherman ever.

"It was a story that im-

pacted us for days and months," said Veracruz resident Enoch Rodriguez. "And it was also sad."

Thirty-eight years ago, Hurtado discovered what became known as "The Fisherman's Jewels" while looking for octopus in the shallow water of the coastal reefs of Coral de Enmedio. He saw a glitter of gold on the ocean's sandy floor. It was a gold ingot, lost long ago in a

shipwreck and uncovered by ocean tides.

Hurtado said he returned to the same place a year later, in 1976, "and I found another piece, also buried."

"It was bigger than the other bar, and when I

pulled on it, I moved the sand with my hand, and that is when all the jewels began to appear," said Hurtado, 64. Altogether, he found 42 pre-Columbian gold pieces, including bracelets, pendants and cloak ornaments.

Unaware of their worth, Hurtado sold a few pieces.

"With the small amount of money I got, I bought a few little things — a bed, new tin roofing for my house."

He kept the rest. Punta Gorda residents remember Hurtado's children attaching the gold ingots to a string and pulling them around the beach like playthings.

The fisherman said he later learned the gold had an incalculable value, and was a national treasure. But, until then, "For me, they were like toys."

Things turned bad when an acquaintance reported Hurtado to authorities, who seized the artifacts and charged him with "looting the nation." He said police beat him and accused him of being a thief, and seized some of the pieces. He spent more than a year in prison.

Mexico's Supreme Court acquitted Hurtado in 1979, ruling he didn't know that the find was a national treasure or that he was required to report it. "Ignorance, and not knowing how to read or write, that was my only crime," the fisherman said.

Now, the local port authority is offering jobs to

Hurtado and the other seafood vendors if they'll leave the beach to make way for the expansion. Hurtado said he's too old to learn a new skill. "I'm going to be 65," he said. "I don't think there will be work for me."

He's appealing to President Enrique Pena Nieto to prevent the evictions, and several environmental groups have joined the cause, saying the port will damage one of the area's most important coral reefs. An appeals court is considering the case.

Hurtado said he turned his life around after he found and lost the gold treasure.

DNA shows man's best friend came from Europe

NEW YORK — For years, scientists have been dogged by this evolution question: Just where did man's best friend first appear?

The earliest known dog-like fossils come from Europe. But DNA studies have implicated east Asia and the Middle East. Now a large DNA study is lining up with the fossils, suggesting dogs originated in Europe some 19,000 to 32,000 years ago.

Experts praised the new work but said it won't end the debate.

Scientists generally agree that dogs emerged from wolves to become the first domesticated animal. Their wolf ancestors began to associate with people, maybe drawn by food in garbage dumps and carcasses left by human hunters. In the process they became tamer, and scientists believe people found them useful for things like hunting and guard duty. Over a very long time in this human environment, wolves gradually

turned into the first dogs. The latest attempt to figure out where this happened was published online Thursday by the journal Science.

Researchers gathered DNA from fossils of 18 ancient wolflike and doglike creatures that lived up to 36,000 years ago in Argentina, Belgium, Germany, Russia, Switzerland and the United States. They compared the genetic material to modern samples from 49 wolves from North America, Asia, Europe and the Middle East, 77 dogs of a wide variety of breeds including cocker spaniel, basenji and golden retriever, and four coyotes.

The DNA of modern dogs showed similarities to the genetic material from the ancient European specimens and modern-day European wolves, the researchers reported.

The first dogs evolved by associating with hunter-gatherers rather than farmers, since dogs evidently appeared before

agriculture did, they said.

"There are now, based on genetic evidence, three alternative hypotheses for the origin of dogs," said Robert Wayne of the University of California, Los Angeles, a study author.

He said his results suggest a better case for Europe than for east Asia or the Middle East. He also said the kind of wolf that gave rise to dogs is now extinct.

Olaf Thalmann of the University of Turku in Finland, another author, said the work doesn't mean that Europe is the only place where dogs emerged.

"We conclude that Europe played a major role in the domestication process," he said in an email.

The work makes a strong argument for an origin in Europe, although it might not be the only place, said Greger Larson of Durham University in England, who did not participate in the research. "I think it's a real step in the right direction."



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Toronto mayor pushes back at critics

Colorful leader angrily denies latest allegations

TORONTO — Toronto's mayor denied Thursday that he pressured a female employee for oral sex, in an obscenity-laced statement on live television in which he also threatened to take legal action against former staffers who spoke to police about his drinking and drug use.

Rob Ford, who admitted last week to smoking crack, later announced he was getting professional help. But he once again refused to step down and used a typical mix of contrition and defiance in several public appearances Thursday. He wore a football jersey to a city council session, where outraged councilors turned their backs each time he spoke and again called on him to step aside.

Later, Councilor Karen Stintz said the city has suspended all school trips to City Hall indefinitely because staff deemed it unsafe.

Ford drew gasps from reporters Thursday morning when he used an obscenity as he de-

said he believed Ford and a woman were snorting cocaine in a private room at a restaurant.

"I have to take legal action against the waiter who said I was doing lines," he said. "Out-right lies, that is not true."

The conservative Ford, 44, was elected in 2010 on a wave of discontent from Toronto's outer suburbs over what voters considered wasteful spending and elitist politics at city hall. But his term has been consumed by revelations of bad behavior, from public drunkenness to crack smoking to threatening to kill someone in a videotaped, incoherent rant.

The court documents released Wednesday are part of a drug case against Ford's friend and occasional driver. Police interviews with Ford's ex-staffers revealed their concerns about his drug use and drunk driving, with one staffer alleging another saw Ford "impaired, driving very fast," and frightening the female employee who was in the car with him.

In another incident, Ford was described by a former staff member as being "very inebriated, verbally abusive and inappropriate with" a female staff member on St. Patrick's Day. Another former staffer reported seeing the mayor drunk in his office about 15 to 20 times in the year he worked for him.

denied telling a staffer he wanted to have oral sex.

"I've never said that in my life to her, I would never do that," Ford said on live television.

The father of two school-age children said he is "happily married" and used crude language to say he enjoys enough oral sex at home.

Ford later apologized for his remarks at a news conference. He explained he was pushed

"over the line" by newly released court documents that included allegations against him involving cocaine, escorts and prostitution. He called the allegations "100 per cent lies."

He said his integrity as a father and husband had been attacked, prompting him to "see red."

"I acted on complete impulse in my remarks," Ford said.

Ford also said he didn't want to comment on the particulars of

the health care support he's receiving and asked for privacy for his family.

The mayor said he would take legal action against his former chief of staff, Mark Towhey and two other aides over their interviews with police that were detailed in court documents.

Ford did not specify what the aides might have said that was untrue. He also said he would take action against a waiter who

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

Hunt for safety drives Wall Street to record high

NEW YORK — Not all record days on the stock market are created equal. Major U.S. indexes rose to all-time highs for the second day in a row Thursday, but the gains were driven by stocks that investors tend to buy when they want to avoid risk, such as power companies, banks and drug makers.

The flight to less-volatile stocks and those that pay bigger-than-average dividends suggested that investors are becoming more cautious after a 26 percent surge in the market this year. More investors are saying the market has risen too far, too fast given the sluggish state of the U.S. economy.

“The legion of people in the last three months who think this market has topped out has grown significantly,” said JJ Kinahan, chief strategist at TD Ameritrade. However, Kinahan said the general tendency for the market is still to move higher. Across the market, the most popular names were

“defensive” stocks, ones that are seen as more likely to hold up in a downturn. Northeast Utilities, New England’s largest utility, rose 2 percent. Oil refining company Valero Energy rose 4 percent and life insurance company MetLife increased 3 percent.

The Dow Jones utility index, which is made up of 15 large utility companies, rose 1 percent, double the gain in the broader market. On the flip side, small-company stocks, which are viewed as more risky than larger, more established companies, were the only major category of stocks to fall. The Russell 2000 index edged lower.

The Dow Jones industrial average gained 54.59 points, or 0.4 percent, to 15,876.22, while the Standard & Poor’s 500 index added 8.62 points, or 0.5 percent, to 1,790.62. Both were record highs. The Nasdaq composite edged up 7.16 points, or 0.2 percent, to 3,972.74.

Network equipment maker Cisco Systems plunged after predicting a slump in sales, pulling

other large technology companies down. Cisco sank to \$2.63, or 11 percent, to \$21.36. Hewlett-Packard lost \$1.42, or 5 percent, to \$25.07 and Oracle fell 62 cents, or 2 percent, to \$34.38.

Cisco, which relies heavily on government contracts, said its revenue for the current quarter could fall as much as 10 percent from the same period a year ago. The company’s chief executive, John Chambers, blamed budget gridlock in Washington, which resulted in a partial shutdown of the federal government for 16 days and a near-breach of the nation’s borrowing limit.

“The shutdown, debt ceiling negotiations and delay of key decisions exasperated the lack of confidence among business leaders,” Chambers said in a conference call with analysts.

Investors pay close attention to what Cisco says because it’s considered a proxy for business spending on technology. Cisco manufactures equipment that makes up the backbone of the Internet such as routers and servers.

Boeing workers reject plan linked to 777X in Wash.

SEATTLE — Despite warnings that production of Boeing’s next generation 777 plane could go to another state, machinists in the Northwest voted late Wednesday to reject a contract proposal that would have exchanged concessions for decades of secure jobs.

In response, the Boeing Co. said it would begin a bid process to find a home for its 777X production line.

Members of The International Association of Machinists District 751 rejected the proposal with 67 percent of the votes. Union members who called for a no vote did so in protest of Boeing’s push to end a traditional pension plan and increase their health care costs. Workers would have received a \$10,000 signing bonus if they approved the deal.

Lockheed Martin cutting 4,000 jobs, closing plants

BETHESDA, MD. — Lockheed Martin is cutting 4,000 jobs, about 3.5 percent of its workforce, as the defense contractor continues to look for ways to lower costs.

Across-the-board spending cuts by the federal government have helped trim U.S. budget deficits but have hurt firms like Lockheed that rely on federal dollars. Budget negotiators in Congress are holding talks centered on find ways to cut spending and tax breaks to replace the automatic cuts.

Mobile gaming is fast becoming the Nordic country’s new flagship export industry, with revenues expected to double to about \$2.7 billion this year.



County must have say in hospital deal

One of the safety valves needed in the ongoing hospital dispute in Inverness involves the role of the Citrus County Commission.

The two feuding hospital boards are close to agreeing to a deal with HCA, the largest hospital company in the country, to take over Citrus Memorial hospital.

If completed, the hospital lease would create \$90 million in proceeds that would flow to a new community foundation that would serve Citrus County for many decades to come.

Commission chairman Joe Meek has come forward in recent weeks to remind both the governing board and the foundation board that the county needs to be sitting at the table when the details of this ongoing foundation are finalized.

Meek is correct to push for county involvement.

Citrus Memorial hospital was built through the leadership of some key business owners 50 years ago and they used tax dollars to get the job done.

The taxpayers own the hospital and the county commission is how their interests are represented and protected.

Some members of the governing board, those appointed by the governor, have balked at having the county involved because they believe it is their right to craft what the future looks like.

Let's think about that for a moment. Six years ago Citrus Memorial was a vibrant and respected public hospital serving the needs of its community.

Today, because of the ongoing feud over the existing lease, the hospital has wasted more than \$10 million on legal fees and sits on the

brink of financial exhaustion because of the political agendas of those involved.

Employee morale is very low and many consumers have lost confidence in the institution.

If there was ever the time for an outside arbitrator to be sitting at the table it is when these folks move ahead with the plans to spend the \$90 million.

We are hopeful the two hospital boards can successfully navigate the current negotiations to lease the hospital and establish a new foundation board to oversee how these funds are spent. And we hope all involved will create clear guidelines for spending and pledge not to touch the \$90 million principal, but instead annually allocate the proceeds from the investment.

The county commission needs to be sitting at the table to make sure the interests of the taxpayers — the owners of Citrus Memorial hospital — are protected.

The commission needs to have a public discussion at its own board meeting and clarify for all what role it wants to play in resolving the problems.

County commissioners have individually stressed that they do not have plans on diverting any portion of the \$90 million in proceeds toward their own projects. Instead, they have indicated they would like to see the funds used by this new foundation to address the health care needs of residents of this community.

Looking forward, there will always need to be a publicly elected and accountable oversight board to the foundation in case that group somehow goes astray.

That oversight entity is the county commission.

One reason Washington makes so much bad history is that so many people here know so little history. This helps explain why "comprehensive" immigration reform is floundering: Too few of today's legislators know what happened 163 years ago.

Leader Mitch McConnell does know. The most important Kentuckian since Henry Clay, McConnell knows how his hero Clay, who was called "the great compromiser," failed to engineer Senate passage of a comprehensive compromise in 1850. McConnell, who wrote his senior thesis at the University of Louisville on the Compromise of 1850, knows that this was achieved by the canniness of Stephen A. Douglas. His is a name not much mentioned on Capitol Hill since he died in 1861 at age 48.

In 1850, the "Little Giant" — he stood 5 feet 4 — was in his first term as senator from Illinois. He would win his third term in 1859, defeating the tall man who was president when Douglas died. Douglas' great achievement — the compromises of 1850 — helped save the union by releasing steam from the sectional crisis. This delayed the Civil War — the "irrepressible conflict" — until a decade of immigration and industrialization had made the North more prepared to win it, and until two other Illinois men, Abraham Lincoln and U.S. Grant, emerged.

By 1850, the country's sectional hostilities, fueled by slavery, had been exacerbated by the war with Mexico. As the North's population grew and the House of Representatives became increasingly hostile to

the expansion of slavery, the South focused on preserving the Senate balance of slave and non-slave states while the nation digested the land acquired in the war.

The tangle of disputes concerned several matters — fugitive slaves, the slave trade in the District of Columbia, statehood for California and creation of territorial governments for Utah and New Mexico. A Texas-New Mexico border dispute and some other matters were added to the witches' brew.

Clay, depressed and exhausted after failing to assemble a Senate majority for a comprehensive bill that addressed each subject, went to Rhode Island to rest. Douglas, however, proposed breaking the comprehensive bill into separate measures, which passed. He cobbled together several different majority coalitions.

There were 60 senators when the process began but 62 before it ended, after California's two arrived. For a lucid exposition of all this, read Fergus M. Bordewich's "America's Great Debate: Henry Clay, Stephen A. Douglas, and the Compromise That Preserved the Union."

Now, consider the "comprehensive" immigration bill passed this year by the Senate, and Sen. Marco Rubio's judgment that "if we stick to the position of all or nothing, we're going to end up with nothing."

The bill, in the writing of which Rubio participated, is 1,197 pages long.

It is 1,193 pages longer than the National Archive's parchment copy of the Homestead Act of 1862, which is one of the most important legislative acts in American history. Passed

when there were few national laws regulating immigration, the Homestead Act was designed to attract immigrants to settle the continent's interior.

Today's Senate bill is gigantic because it deals with everything. Its size is proportional to Washington's serene confidence that it knows everything. What should be the hourly wage of an agricultural sorter in 2016? The Senate bill (through an explanation given on page 318) says \$9.84. And the hourly wage of a worker in a nursery? Twenty cents less than the agricultural sorter's wage. Some senators know everything.

The bill also contains a remarkable geographical insight: Nevada is a border state. Your eyes tell you its southern tip is about 200 miles from the Mexican border, but the bill, which includes \$46.3 billion in border security spending, decrees that Nevada is eligible for border pork.

Immigration reforms should address three problems — border security (the least important problem; about 40 percent of those here illegally came on visas they overstayed), the needs of America's workforce, and the status of the 11 million here illegally. If McConnell were majority leader, the bill would be broken into manageable bits, and there might be found a different majority coalition for each.

But the majority leader is a Democrat (Harry Reid from the border state of Nevada) whose party has one overriding interest — turning as many of the 11 million into voters as fast as possible. They are holding all immigration reforms hostage to this objective. Which shall be the case unless and until McConnell is majority leader.

Yellen backs Fed's low rate policies

WASHINGTON — Janet Yellen made clear Thursday that she's prepared to stand by the Federal Reserve's extraordinary efforts to pump up the economy when she's chairman, if that's what it needs.

During a two-hour confirmation hearing before the Senate Banking Committee, Yellen embraced her so-called "dovish" reputation and expressed strong support for the Fed's low interest-rate policies. And she warned critics that any potential harm those policies pose are outweighed by the risk of leaving a still-weak economy to survive without them.

"I believe that supporting the recovery today is the surest path to returning to a more normal approach to monetary policy," she said.

Yellen faced tough questions, particularly from Republicans. But she also drew praise from senators in both parties and is expected to be confirmed by the full Senate, becoming the first woman to lead the powerful central bank.

Whitey Bulger sentenced to life

BOSTON — Former Boston crime boss James "Whitey" Bulger was led off to prison Thursday for the rest of his life, accepting his punishment in stone-faced silence as a judge castigated the 84-year-old gangster for his "almost unfathomable" depravity.

Bulger's sentencing for his murderous reign in the 1970s and '80s brought to a close a sordid case that exposed FBI complicity in his crimes and left a trail of devastated families whose loved ones were killed by Bulger or his henchmen.

Bulger, the former boss of the Winter Hill Gang, Boston's Irish mob, fled the city in 1994 after being tipped off by a former FBI agent that he was about to be indicted. He was a fugitive for more than 16 years until he was captured in Santa Monica, Calif., in 2011.

Seized ivory crushed by Feds

COMMERCE CITY, Colo. — U.S. officials on Thursday destroyed more than 6 tons of confiscated ivory tusks, carvings and jewelry — the bulk of the U.S. "blood ivory" stockpile — and urged other nations to follow suit to fight a \$10 billion global trade that slaughters tens of thousands of elephants each year.

Thousands of ivory items accumulated over the past 25 years were piled into a large mound, then dumped into a steel rock crusher that pulverized it all into dust at the National Wildlife Property Repository just north of Denver.

Tide of red ink slowly recedes

2013 budget deficit first in five years to dip below \$1 trillion

WASHINGTON — The U.S. government started the first month of the 2014 budget year with a smaller budget deficit, signaling further improvement in the nation's finances at a time when lawmakers are wrestling to reach a deal to keep the government open past January.

The Treasury Department said Wednesday that the deficit in October was \$91.6 billion. That's 24 percent lower than the \$120

billion imbalance recorded in October 2012. The deficit is the gap between the government's tax revenue and spending.

Across-the-board spending cuts and the partial government shutdown helped reduce expenditures last month, the first of the new budget year. Higher taxes and a better economy also boosted revenue.

The October decline comes after the government ran an annual deficit of \$680 billion in the budget year that ended on

Sept. 30. That was the lowest in five years and the first in that period below \$1 trillion. It's also half the record \$1.4 trillion gap reported in 2009.

Yet the shrinking deficit is not expected to take much pressure off of lawmakers, who are facing an informal Dec. 13 deadline to reach a deal to fund government and avoid another shutdown.

Stanley Colander, a budget expert at Qorvis Communications, says the decline is likely to have lit-


tle impact on those talks because most Americans still see a \$680 billion budget gap as too large.

"The economics of the budget are the least important part of it," he said. "It's all perception."

Last year's annual deficit was still the fifth-largest in history. And it added to the nation's record \$16.7 trillion debt. Lawmakers are also debating whether or not to raise the borrowing limit, a necessary step to avoid an economy-jarring default.

Maduro aims for decree powers

CARACAS, Venezuela — Venezuela's congress has voted in favor of granting President Nicolas Maduro the emergency decree powers he's seeking to help fight corruption and stabilize the inflation-plagued economy.

The pro-government majority on Thursday approved the request in the first of two required debates. The second will be held next week.

Opposition lawmakers allege that Maduro is trampling on Venezuela's democracy after congress this week stripped a lawmaker of her immunity from prosecution on corruption charges. With the lawmaker's removal and substitution with a government supporter, Maduro was able to garner the crucial 99th vote he needed to win passage of the bill.

Maduro has said he will use the extra powers to intensify actions against opponents and businesses he accuses of waging an "economic war" to destabilize the South American nation.

Pedophiles could face castration

SKOPJE, Macedonia — Macedonia's conservative government wants to toughen the laws against pedophilia, raising the maximum sentence to life imprisonment and imposing chemical castration on repeat offenders.

Draft legislation presented Thursday would also offer reduced sentences to first-time offenders if they agreed to voluntary chemical castration.

The current law allows for a maximum 15-year sentence for severe sexual offenses against minors. Pedophilia is a growing problem in Macedonia, and the government proposal follows warnings from a leading child protection group that current laws are not strict enough to discourage repeat offenders.

Australia arrests 65 for child porn

CANBERRA, Australia — Police have arrested 65 men across Australia as part of a sweeping Canadian-led child pornography investigation that resulted in the rescue of 386 children and arrests around the world.

Australian Federal Police commander Glen McEwen said Friday that the arrests had been made in raids across most Australian states as a result of the investigation into a child exploitation website operating out of Canada. Six Australian children had been removed by police from harm, he said.

Giant nation draws jeers for paltry aid to typhoon victims

BEIJING — The outpouring of international aid to the Philippines makes China's contribution for typhoon relief look like a trickle: Several countries and even Swedish furniture chain Ikea have done more than the world's second-largest economy. That won't help Beijing's campaign to win over neighbors with its soft power.

China has pledged less than \$2 million in cash and materials, compared to \$20 million provided by the United States, which also launched a massive military-driven rescue operation that includes an aircraft carrier.

Another Chinese rival, Japan, has pledged \$10 million and offered to send troops, ships and planes. Australia is giving \$28 million, and Ikea has offered \$2.7 million through its charitable foundation.

China's reluctance to give more — driven by a bitter feud with Manila over overlapping claims in the South China Sea — dents its global image at a time when it is vying with Washington for re-

gional influence.

"China has missed an excellent opportunity to show itself as a responsible power and to generate goodwill," said Zheng Yongnian, a China politics expert at the National University of Singapore. "They still lack strategic thinking."

The decline of American influence in Asia, with China filling the vacuum, has been predicted for years. Asian nations have become increasingly dependent on China's booming economy to purchase their exports, and Chinese companies are increasingly providers of investment and employment.

Yet, China lags far behind the U.S. in the sphere of soft power — the winning of hearts and minds through culture, education, and other non-traditional forms of diplomacy, of which emergency assistance is a major component.

Despite Chinese academics' frequent promotion of soft power, Chinese leaders don't really get it, said Zheng. Instead, they continue to rely on the levers of old-fashioned major-nation diplomacy based on economic and military might. "They still

think they can get their way through coercion," Zheng said.

China's donations to Philippines include \$100,000 each from the government and the Chinese Red Cross, and it is sending an additional \$1.64 million in tents, blankets and other goods.

Meanwhile, the USS George Washington aircraft carrier arrived off the Philippine coast Thursday, and 1,000 troops were expected on the ground in the disaster zone by the end of the week. U.S. planes and choppers carried in supplies and flew out survivors. "We are operating 24-7," Marine Capt. Cassandra Gesecki said.

In the devastated town of Tacloban, U.S. Air Force Capt. Jon Shames took a break from work on a damaged airstrip, and said he was "thankful" for the opportunity. "I hope that in my time of immense loss somebody will come and help me as well. I can tell you this is a global effort," he said.

Britain, another leading contributor to the relief effort, is sending the aircraft carrier HMS Illustrious later this month.

Mobility for US young hits historic low

WASHINGTON — U.S. mobility for young adults has fallen to the lowest level in more than 50 years as cash-strapped 20-somethings shun home-buying and refrain from major moves in a weak job market.

The new 2013 figures from the Census Bureau, which reversed earlier signs of recovery, underscore the impact of the sluggish economy on young people, many of them college graduates, whom demographers sometimes refer to as "Generation Wait."

Burdened with college debt or toiling in low-wage

jobs, they are delaying careers, marriage and having children. Waiting anxiously for their lucky break, they are staying put and doubling up with roommates or living with Mom and Dad, unable to make long-term plans or commit to buying a home — let alone pay a mortgage.

Many understood after the 2007-2009 recession that times would be tough. But few say they expected to be in economic limbo more than four years later.

Among adults ages 25-29, just 4.9 million, or 23.3 percent, moved in the 12 months ending March 2013. That's down from 24.6 percent in the same period the year before. It

was the lowest level since at least 1963. The peak of 36.7 percent came in 1965, during the nation's youth counterculture movement.

The past year's decline in migration came after a modest increase from 2011 to 2012, a sign that young adults remain tentative about testing the job market in other cities.

By metropolitan area, Portland, Ore., Austin, Texas, and Houston were among the top gainers in young adults, reflecting stronger local economies. Among college graduates 25 and older, Denver and Washington, D.C., topped the list of destinations.

Demographers say the delays in traditional mark-

ers of adulthood — full-time careers and homeownership — may prove to be longer-lasting.

Roughly 1 in 5 young adults ages 25 to 34 is now disconnected from work and school.

"Young adulthood has grown much more complex and protracted, with a huge number struggling to reach financial independence," said Mark Mather, an associate vice president at the private Population Reference Bureau. "Many will get there, but at much later ages than we've seen in the past. More and more we're seeing many young adults routinely wait until their 30s to leave the parental nest."

Ready for round two

Citrus looks for repeat performance against Springstead as postseason begins

After delivering one of the best regular seasons in school history, the Citrus football team now tries to make its mark in the postseason as it travels to Spring Hill's Booster Stadium tonight to take on Springstead at 7:30 p.m. in the FHSAA Class 6A regional quarterfinals.

The opponent will be a familiar one: Citrus (9-1, District 6A-5 runner-up) handled the Eagles (9-1, District 6A-6 champions) 42-14 in the season-opener in Inverness. Under first-year head coach Mike Garafano, a former defensive coordinator under longtime SHS head man Bill Vonada, the team has since notched its second consecutive district title, strung together its longest winning streak in school history and matched 2012's school-record nine wins.

Back in that late August contest, Steven Knowles and the rest of the 'Cane defensive front camped out in the Eagle backfield. The senior defensive end had 17 tackles — six for a loss — and two sacks. Citrus defensive coordinator Chris Stephenson's bunch totaled 17 tackles for losses against an Eagle option attack led by senior dual-threat Tyler Mahla (team-high 973 yards rushing in 2013). The 'Canes limited junior fullback Daniel Wright (924 yards rushing), who is coming off a 136-yard performance against county rival

Hernando, to just 18 yards on 13 carries.

Two Citrus defenders — Jaimee Juse (106 tackles, four sacks) and Frankie Bartley (102 tackles) — have joined Knowles (112 tackles, 39 TFLs, 20 sacks) with triple-digit tackles this season, and junior Travis Blotz isn't far behind with 99. In the opener, the 'Canes were minus Nile Waters and John Bronson, two of the team's more versatile contributors at both linebacker and running back.

"That option is something you don't see every week, and it puts a lot of pressure on your defense to stay home and play assignments," Green said. "You've got to keep Mahla and Wright in check because they run hard and

Cabrera, McCutchen tabbed AL, NL MVPs

NEW YORK — Pittsburgh Pirates center fielder Andrew McCutchen and Detroit Tigers slugger Miguel Cabrera both coasted Thursday to Most Valuable Player awards.

McCutchen won the National League honor by a surprisingly wide margin after leading a baseball revival in Pittsburgh. He drew 28 of the 30 first-place votes from members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

Seated in a sweater and tie, a smiling McCutchen juked a sort of stationary shimmy when his name was announced on MLB Network.

"If I could get up and dance right now I would, but I don't have much

room to do that," he said. "When I get off camera, I probably will."

Cabrera took the AL prize for the second straight year, once again winning by a comfortable gap over Angels outfielder Mike Trout.

A season after posting the majors' first Triple Crown in 45 years, Cabrera came back to lead baseball in hitting at .348 and finish second with 44 home runs and 137 RBIs.

Cabrera got 23 of 30 first-place votes, becoming the first player to win consecutive AL MVPs since Frank Thomas for the Chicago White Sox in 1993 and 1994.

"This is unbelievable," Cabrera said, young kids buzzing around him. "I'm so excited right now."

McCutchen ranked among the NL leaders by hitting .317 with 21 home runs and 84 RBIs. He also scored 97 runs, stole 27 bases and had a .404 on-base percentage.

The 27-year-old with the long, flowing dreadlocks helped the Pirates stop a record streak of 20 losing seasons and make the playoffs for the first time since 1992.

McCutchen, third in MVP balloting last season, got 409 points. Arizona first baseman Paul Goldschmidt finished second with 242, while St. Louis catcher Yadier Molina received the other two first-place votes and came in third.

Goldschmidt hit .302 with 36 homers and 125 RBIs. Molina batted .319 with 12 homers and 80 RBIs, and virtually shut down opponents' running games. Molina and Goldschmidt each won a Gold Glove, too.

McCutchen's win came two days after Pirates manager Clint Hurdle was picked as the NL Manager of the Year. McCutchen was the first Pittsburgh player to win the MVP since Barry Bonds in 1992.

The Pirates went 94-68 this year, a season after going 79-83. Along the way, McCutchen became the face of the franchise and heard loud "MVP!" chants when he would step to the plate at PNC Park this summer.

"I'd lie to you if I said it didn't enter my mind ever," he said. "It's awesome to hear something like that."

Pittsburgh beat Cincinnati in the NL wild-card game, then lost to St.

Louis in a division series that went the full five games.

Boston wound up beating St. Louis in the World Series. No one on the Red Sox or Cardinals won any of the major BBWAA awards.

Trout got five first-place votes and came in second, 103 points behind Cabrera. The difference was 81 points last season, when Trout was AL Rookie of the Year.

Baltimore first baseman Chris Davis, who led the majors with 53 homers and 138 RBIs, was third. Davis and Oakland third baseman Josh Donaldson each received a first-place vote.

Cabrera took his third AL batting title in a row. He also drew a \$1 million bonus for winning a second MVP during his current contract with the Tigers.

"I was so nervous because it was a great competition," he said.

The 30-year-old third baseman from Venezuela also captured the AL MVP last year when he hit .330 with 44 homers and 139 RBIs. Cabrera topped Trout 22-6 in first-place votes in that balloting.

Trout hit .323 with 27 homers and 97 RBIs this year, stole 33 bases and led the AL in runs and walks.

The Tigers have virtually owned the major postseason awards during a three-year run of success. Justin Verlander was the MVP and Cy Young winner in 2011, Cabrera took the MVP last season and Detroit ace Max Scherzer won this year's Cy Young Award on Wednesday.

Cabrera clearly was baseball's most dominant hitter for most of the season as the Tigers won their third straight AL Central crown.

they run fearless. They're looking to drive the football, and they don't care if it takes 20 plays. They want it to take 20 plays. Defensively, you've got to understand that three yards a play is too much. Anything on top of that is icing on the cake for them. You've got to win first downs and put them into second-and-longs."

Citrus was balanced on offense in the first meeting. Senior quarterback Deion Moore (69 for 154, 1,307 yards passing, 18 TDs, two interceptions in 2013) rushed for a score and found junior Desmond Franklin for a 40-yard touchdown pass, while three other 'Canes ran for touchdowns. Senior running back James Pouncey (97 carries, 816 rushing yards, 8.4 average in 2013) scored on a 42-yard sprint and added a pick six on defense. Citrus led 33-0 by the break. Springstead didn't get on the board until taking advantage of a couple of turnovers by the 'Canes deep in their own territory in the game's final five minutes.

Tonight, the Eagles are without leading tackler Conor Ross (114 tackles, six sacks), who suffered a torn ACL in his team's district-clinching win versus Land O'Lakes two weeks ago. "The last time we played them, their defense gave us some problems in the run game," Greene said, "so we had to throw the ball to loosen them up a little bit. I think a physical type of offense like that makes their defense tough. They're a lot like us, they like contact. They like getting in the phone booth. Like all games, it's going

to be won up front."

CHS wrapped up its first county championship since 2006 with last week's 50-6 drubbing of rival Crystal River. It's also been seven years since the 'Canes last made the playoffs, and five years since any Citrus County team qualified. When Greene arrived at the school in 2010, it was coming off a two-season record of 5-15. After another 2-8 campaign, the program picked up 13 wins over two seasons before launching its best run since 1987's 10-0 regular-season mark.

In 2004, Citrus won its first playoff game in 30 years with a 13-6 upset of North Marion, but has since dropped three playoff games — to a Tim Tebow-led Nease, North Marion and Williston — by a combined 170 points. The school is 3-11 all-time in the playoffs.

Greene told his team this week that the regular season is history.

"We focused so much on district games because they paved the way to get here," he said. "We talked about only 32 teams being left in our classification, and 16 of them are turning their equipment in Monday morning. It doesn't matter who we're playing, the kids understand the stakes."

This is Springstead's fifth trip to the playoffs since 2004. It's 2-6 in the tournament, and prevailed most recently in 2010 with a 40-8 victory over Wiregrass Ranch. The Eagles fell 31-7 to Ocala Vanguard in this game a year ago.

Tonight's victor advances to the regional semifinals for a game with the winner between 6A-6 runner-up Sunlake (9-1) and 6A-5 champ Gainesville (8-2). The Seahawks' only loss was by a one-point margin to Springstead. GHS defeated Citrus 38-16 at Citizens Field last month.

UF brass backs Muschamp amid losing streak

GAINESVILLE — Florida officials are coming to coach Will Muschamp's defense.

President Bernie Machen and athletic director Jeremy Foley voiced strong support for Muschamp on Wednesday, telling the school's website they are fully committed to keeping Muschamp around to fix the team's problems.

The Gators (4-5) have their second four-game losing streak in Muschamp's three seasons and are facing the possibility of missing a bowl game for the first time since 1990. If Florida doesn't upset No. 11 South Car-

olina or second-ranked Florida State this month, the program will have its first losing record since 1979.

"I'm a thousand percent convinced that Will Muschamp is the guy to lead this football program," Foley said. "Nothing has changed in what we feel about Will Muschamp from the day we hired him.

"Everyone around here wants the same thing. We want to do what is right for the University of Florida. We understand that this football season has not gone the way any of us wanted it to go, certainly not the way our fans wanted it to go, and most of all, not the way Will

Muschamp wanted it to go." Muschamp is 22-13 at Florida, including 13-10 in Southeastern Conference play. The latest loss came against Vanderbilt on Saturday. It was the Commodores' first win in the series since 1988 and first in Gainesville since 1945.

Sure, the Gators have been ravaged by injuries this season. They lost quarterback Jeff Driskel, defensive tackle Dominique Easley, running back Matt Jones and seven others to season-ending injuries. But many wonder how Florida — even with backups — can have the worst offense in the SEC and lose to Vandy by 17 points.

"We have a history of being successful. We have

a history of fixing things when they need to be fixed," Foley said. "And that is what is going to happen here, and coach Muschamp is the one that will fix it.

"I understand the passion and the disappointment. But at the end of the day, we've got great fans, they love the Gators and their passion makes this place special. They are hurting. They want the program to be successful, and we feel that hurt."

Florida finished 11-2 last year, losing to rival Georgia and then Louisville in the Sugar Bowl. Had the Gators beaten the Bulldogs, they would have played Alabama for the SEC title.

Races heat up

Conference clashes will shape BCS title picture

The race to the national championship game has been well-defined.

No. 1 Alabama and No. 2 Florida State are in control. No. 3 Ohio State and No. 4 Baylor are on deck. There is a group of one-loss teams crossing their fingers and hoping for chaos.

Then there are the conference races, where there is still plenty of sorting out to do.

American Athletic Conference — Simple. Only a major collapse could keep UCF out of the BCS as the American's representative and conference champ.

Atlantic Coast Conference — Florida State has already locked down the Atlantic Division spot in the championship Dec. 7 in Charlotte, N.C. The Coastal is messy with four teams with two losses, but could become far less cluttered if Georgia Tech losses to Clemson on Thursday night and if Duke beats No. 24 Miami on Saturday. That would give Duke a clear path to its first ACC title game by winning out. A Hurricanes win puts Virginia Tech in the driver's seat.

Big Ten — Not one, but two huge upsets would be necessary to keep Ohio State out of the conference title game as the Leaders division champ. And No. 14 Michigan State would be in great shape in the Legends division by beating Nebraska on Saturday.

Big 12 — No. 4 Baylor (5-0), No. 12 Oklahoma State (5-1) and No. 23 Texas (6-0) have yet to play each other. The sorting out starts this week when the Cowboys play at the Longhorns.

Pac-12 — The North Division is Stanford's if it can win out, but one slip gets Oregon back in the hunt. Over in the South, No. 21 Arizona State at No. 13 UCLA next week could decide it, but Southern California still has a chance to work its way back in the mix by upsetting Stanford on Saturday.

Southeastern Conference — Alabama-Auburn will decide the West, if both get through this

SEC teams scramble for bowl bids

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — The Florida Gators haven't sat out the postseason in nearly a quarter century. The Vanderbilt Commodores, who had been to four bowl games in 120 years before James Franklin's arrival, have a good shot at making it three in a row.

Plenty of other Southeastern Conference teams are also jockeying for postseason eligibility or trying to spruce up their bowl resumes for more prestigious, better-paying games in the season's final weeks.

Making a bowl means more money, practice time and exposure to recruits. Of course, the SEC can fill its coffers even more if a team is playing for the league's eighth consecutive national title.

The bowl scramble goes well beyond the BCS championship game hopes of No. 1 Alabama and perhaps No. 7 Auburn. No. 9 Missouri, No. 10 Texas A&M and No. 11 South Carolina all have hopes of making a BCS

game and/or playing for the SEC title.

Eight teams are already eligible for the SEC's 10 guaranteed bowl slots, and only Arkansas and Kentucky don't have a shot at making the postseason.

The injured Gators (4-5) are trying not to let the heat get to them, but they have to beat either South Carolina or No. 2 Florida State to become eligible, assuming they'll triumph over Georgia Southern in between.

"We're taking everything one game at a time, one snap at a time," Florida center Jon Harrison said. "If we focus on things too far in the future, we lose sight of the task at hand. We're trying to work on Florida and eliminating the self-inflicted wounds that Florida has been suffering from."

Vanderbilt's 34-17 victory over the Gators changed the bowl situation significantly for both teams. The Commodores are 5-4 and need only one more win against a favorable ending schedule: Kentucky (2-7), Tennessee (4-6) and Wake Forest (4-6).

Franklin, who led Vandy to its first bowl game since 1982 in his debut season, isn't interested in looking beyond going 1-0 each Saturday.

"From an outside perspective, talking to the media or things like that, we do bring up some of the historical things because we're still trying to change people's perception about Vanderbilt football and what we've been and where we're going," he said. "We'll talk about it a little bit.

"Internally and with our program, we've been pretty consist-

tent with our 1-0 message."

The bowl scramble is a nice issue for the SEC, which didn't fill the 10th bowl spot in Shreveport, La., last season.

Vanderbilt has the inside track among the four teams trying to get to six wins and bowl eligibility. Tennessee, Florida and Mississippi State (4-5) all still need two more wins.

The Volunteers must beat Vanderbilt and Kentucky after an open date after failing to make a bowl the past two seasons.

Ending that drought, says safety Brian Randolph is "definitely our No. 1 focus."

"It's all we've been thinking about," Randolph said.

Guard Zach Fulton said Tennessee players met to stress the importance and benefits of getting to the postseason.

"You have a lot of fun, you get to bond with your teammates on and off the field and you go to different sites and places you've never been before, and just the bonding and having extra practices is great," Fulton said.

Winston case emerged Tuesday

TALLAHASSEE — An assistant state attorney says prosecutors in Tallahassee did not receive information about an 11-month-old sexual assault allegation involving Florida State quarterback Jameis Winston until Tuesday.

Tallahassee police investigated the Heisman Trophy contender in connection with a sexual assault that was reported nearly a year ago in an off-campus apartment. FSU records show the first report was made to campus police on Dec. 7 by a student at a dormitory. The investigation was handed over to Tallahassee police.

The case was not given to prosecutors until this week.

Assistant State Attorney Georgia Cappleman says normal procedure for criminal cases in Leon County calls for police to give information to prosecutors if there is evidence for an arrest, or if it is a "close call." She says police do not tell prosecutors when they have decided against pursuing an arrest.

A day after news of the case broke, jolting college football fans and casting uncertainty on second-ranked Florida State's perfect season, there were mostly questions left unanswered.

Tallahassee police, citing the ongoing investigation, aren't saying much about the case as well, including why investigators waited until this week to hand over information about the case to local prosecutors.

The Seminoles went back to work Thursday, preparing for a home game against Syracuse on Saturday.

Coach Jimbo Fisher was scheduled to meet with the media after practice Thursday evening.

For his part, Winston is only talking football. He spoke to the media for roughly five minutes on Wednesday night. University officials warned they would cut off the press conference if anyone asked questions that weren't strictly related to football.

Timothy Jansen, the attorney representing Winston, has said his client did nothing wrong and he thought the investigation was over months ago. He said he has already handed over to prosecutors affidavits from two eyewitnesses.

"When I spoke to the detective in February he told me the case was closed," Jansen said. "I relayed that to my client and to university officials. I hadn't heard another word until Monday."

Tallahassee police on Wednesday released a heavily-redacted two-page incident report that does not mention Winston by name, but says the incident took place between 1:30 and 2 a.m. last Dec. 7.

It describes the suspect in the sexual assault case as being between 5-foot-9 and 5-11. Winston is listed by Florida State at 6-4.

Jansen said he did not know why local police waited until this week to hand over their investigation to prosecutors.

Trouble not over

Martin could sue Miami under law

MIAMI — Jonathan Martin could sue the Miami Dolphins for big money under a variety of workplace laws that make employers liable for bullying, harassment and discrimination — even if the team's hierarchy didn't know about it, according to several legal experts.

Less likely would be criminal charges against offensive lineman Richie Incognito, who was suspended by the Dolphins after fellow lineman Martin left the team 2 1/2 weeks ago. Martin's attorney, David Cornwell, says Martin was repeatedly harassed by Incognito and others in ways that "went far beyond the traditional locker room hazing."

For Martin to win a lawsuit, Nova Southeastern University law professor Bob Jarvis said he'd have to show precisely that.

"It will be crucial for Martin to convince a jury that even with a rough workplace, there is a line that cannot be crossed and it was crossed here,"

Jarvis said. One path for Martin to take would be filing a grievance with the NFL players union or a complaint with the NFL itself. Aside from that, legal experts say there are several avenues he could take to sue the Dolphins. Cornwell did not respond to an email asking for additional comment on any of these options.

The NFL's special investigator, Ted Wells, plans to meet Friday with Martin, who is with his family in Los Angeles and is receiving counseling. Dolphins owner Stephen Ross also plans to meet at a later date with Martin.

Interestingly, Martin's mother, Jane Howard-Martin, spent almost 20 years practicing employment law and wrote numerous articles in legal journals on such issues as workplace discrimination and harassment. It's not known whether she has any role in her son's decisions; Howard-Martin is now assistant general counsel for Toyota Motor Sales USA Inc. in Los Angeles.

Two labor-employment lawyers at Venable LLP in New York, Michael Volpe and Nicholas Reiter, said in a written analysis of the Martin matter that employers can face lawsuits related to bullying if the harassment involved a vic-

tim's race, religion, sexual orientation or disability. Claims can be made for harassment, infliction of emotional distress and negligent supervision.

One voice mail that has surfaced from Incognito to Martin, who is black, included a racial slur and other Dolphins players have said use of the slur in the locker room was not out of the ordinary.

In addition, Volpe and Reiter said that Martin could claim that he was essentially forced to leave the Dolphins because of workplace harassment.

There have also been reports that Incognito was told by coaches to "toughen up" Martin, which could show the team did have knowledge about the harassment, the two lawyers said.

Still, it's no slam dunk for Martin.

For example, one allegation is that Martin forked over \$15,000 for veteran Dolphins teammates to take a trip to Las Vegas that he did not attend. That could be viewed in court as being a willing participant and make a harassment lawsuit harder to prove.

If, Jarvis said, "Martin

seemed to be going along with the conduct willingly, then Martin cannot now change his mind and decide that he didn't want to be part of the culture."

For Incognito himself, the main issue would likely be his future NFL playing career. The NFL players' union announced Thursday that Incognito has filed a grievance over his indefinite suspension by the Dolphins. The union statement says that Incognito is requesting an expedited hearing so he can resume playing football immediately.

Tamara Lave, a law professor at the University of Miami, said the current national focus on bullying and hazing in schools and at the workplace would figure in Martin's favor should he take legal action. Especially, she said, because he is a physically imposing NFL player — 6-foot-5, 312 pounds — who is typically perceived as having few weaknesses.

"The fact that you have a 300-pound man who feels so threatened and uncomfortable that he leaves, that's an indication of how serious it was," Lave said.

Scott tied for early lead

MELBOURNE, Australia — Adam Scott had a share of the early lead Thursday in his Australian Masters title defense.

The second-ranked Australian star shot a 4-under 67 at Royal Melbourne, making a bogey on the par-4 eighth — his 17th hole of the day — to drop into a tie for the lead with Germany's Max Kieffer.

Scott won the Australian PGA on Sunday at Royal Pines in his first home event since winning the Masters at Augusta National. He will team with Jason Day for Australia next week in the World Cup, also at Royal Melbourne, then play the Australian Open the following week at Royal Sydney.

American Matt Kuchar opened with a 71.

Australia's Jarrod Lyle, returning to play after his second bout with leukemia, was in the afternoon session.

a 69. Fourth-place Graeme McDowell of Northern Ireland birdied three straight holes, starting from the 14th, for a 72.

Stenson closes in on European money title

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Henrik Stenson strengthened his chances of winning the European money title, shooting a 4-under 68 to leave him two strokes behind leader Alejandro Canizares after the first round of the season-ending World Tour Championship.

Quite a pair

Chad Knaus' drive has Jimmie Johnson poised for No. 6

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Here's all you need to know about Chad Knaus as the crew chief closes in on his sixth championship with Jimmie Johnson: When asked about how dominating the pair has been since they partnered in 2002, the relentless Knaus replied: "We lose a heck of a lot more races than we win." True, Johnson has lost 365 races since his rookie season. But he's won 64 with Knaus atop his pit box, and the crew chief prepared the cars for his other two Sprint Cup victories. Knaus was suspended by NASCAR for the first four races of 2006, when Johnson opened the year with wins in the Daytona 500 and at Las Vegas.

It was a rough start to the year for the duo after team owner Rick Hendrick had nearly split them during the offseason. They'd come up short once again in their bid for a championship, were fed up with each other, and the owner famously made them sit down over milk and cookies to hash out their differences.

Once Knaus returned from suspension in 2006, they never looked back and reeled off five straight titles.

Now, after watching other drivers hoist the Sprint Cup trophy the last two years, they are poised to reclaim their spot on top of the sport Sunday at Homestead-Miami Speedway. Johnson goes into the finale with a 28-point lead over Matt

Kenseth and needs to finish 23rd or better to win the title.

Knaus acknowledged this week that their success has not been as easy as it has looked.

"Jimmie and I have been together for a long time, obviously. Any relationship needs work," he said. "We've had some really good times, we've had some really stressful times together. We've had some really successful times. We've had a lot of victories and a lot of faults. Everybody thinks that we dominate and so on and so forth and that's what everybody writes about and the fans talk about, but man, we lose a lot of races, and that's taxing on anybody."

"As we're trying to do better weekly and improve weekly, it's always a challenge. The good thing we've got is that I've got 100 percent confidence in Jimmie and I feel like he has the same for me, and we know that at the end of the day, all we're trying to do is to make each other better with any of our constructive criticism, any of our feedback or any of our suggestions. It's a really nice environment to work in when you know that your driver has your back 100 percent."

It's hard for Johnson not to have complete faith in Knaus, who has dedicated the last 11 years to the No. 48 team.

Johnson, a father of two, has taken to 5:30 a.m. workouts. Asked if he's ever able to join Johnson, Knaus scoffed.

"Man, I'm coming to work at 5:30 in the morning. He gets to go train," Knaus said. "We have completely different schedules. If I had the ability to go train at 5:30 and come in at 8:00 or whatever, I would maybe do that. But unfortunately that's not how it works for me. I have to come in and go to work."

That's the martyr in Knaus, because he wouldn't have it any other way.

He's a perfectionist to his core, and he expects the same from those around him. So when Kenseth's crew botched a pit stop last week at Phoenix in a race that likely took Kenseth out of the title race, crew chief Jason Ratcliff was back-slapping his guys and trying to keep them motivated for the remainder of the day.

Had that been Knaus' crew, he more than likely would have swapped them out on the spot for another Hendrick Motorsports' crew and potentially permanently replaced the offending employees.

Knaus may go down as the best crew chief in NASCAR history. Deep down, he probably strives for that unofficial title. For now, he won't even cop to being the best in the series.

"Well, I don't think I'm the best crew chief in the garage," he said. "I think I've got the best team, I've got the best driver and the best resources. I think that keeping those pieces together is a bit of a challenge and difficult."

IndyCar racer's career over after crash

Doctors tell Franchitti he can no longer drive

Three-time Indianapolis 500 winner Dario Franchitti said Thursday that doctors have told him he can no longer race because of injuries sustained in an IndyCar crash last month.

Franchitti fractured his spine, broke his right ankle and suffered a concussion in the Oct. 6 crash at Houston. The crash occurred on the last lap when his

car made contact with another car and went sailing into a fence.

The 40-year-old Franchitti underwent two surgeries on his ankle and recently returned home to Scotland to recover.

"One month removed from the crash and based upon the expert advice of the doctors who have treated and assessed my head and spinal injuries post accident, it is their best medical opinion that I must stop racing," Franchitti said. "They have made it very clear that the risks involved in further racing are too great and could be detrimental to my

long term well-being. Based on this medical advice, I have no choice but to stop."

The four-time IndyCar champion has been the face of the series since he returned in 2009 following a brief stint in NASCAR. He won three consecutive titles from 2009 to 2011, and two of his three Indy 500 wins.

Franchitti had crossover appeal for the IndyCar Series through his 11-year marriage to actress Ashley Judd, which ended in January. But he was personable, well-spoken, popular in the paddock and passionate

about the sport. It resonated with fans and made Franchitti one of IndyCar's all-time greats.

Franchitti's 31 victories are tied for eighth on the all-time list, and his 33 poles are sixth on the all-time list.

"Dario Franchitti has done so much for Franchitti Chip Ganassi Racing, so it will be very disappointing to not see him in our cars next season," Ganassi said. "But simply put, Dario is a motorsports legend and will be sorely missed on the race track by everyone in the paddock and in the stands. His contributions to the sport of motor racing are too many to list, but I can tell you that they go way beyond what he has done on the track."
