Tortoise slathered in paint

Frank Eckstein is used to seeing gopher

He grew up here, and moved home to Homosassa later in life. He's familiar with the local environment — as a fisherman and outdoor enthusiast, he spends a lot of time in nature.

But on Monday afternoon, nature came to him.

"I found him right in front of our house," Eckstein said Tuesday. "He basically walked up to me — it was almost like he asked me for help."

"He" was a gopher tortoise that'd had its shell painted by someone — not just a crime, but potentially very harmful to the animal.

After talking to local law enforcement and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), neither of which could help, Eckstein was referred to Nature World Wildlife Rescue by a local veterinarian and

responses to a post he made on Facebook.

Nature World, a nonprofit dedicated to the rescue, care and rehabilitation of wildlife, picked the tortoise up and took it to see Dr. Gwennyth Hall, a Homosassa veterinarian who specializes in exotic animals. Hall performs examinations and surgeries on many injured animals Nature World assists, including eagles, owls, opossums and tortoises

The tortoise is expected to be OK, but See PAINT/Page A11

The Homosassa 'chicken man' didn't let challenges keep him down

"Good morning from Brother Herb, bringing you good tidings from the land of orange juice.

That, or something similar, is what Herb Terry would say over the airwaves every Friday morning from a small local Christian radio station in Homosassa.

He'd tell stories, read scripture, preach a little sermon.

"He had the gift of gab," said Dianne Terry, his wife of 30 years, "and he lived a

life of hope."

Even through his 12 years of multiple myeloma, his heart problems, cancer, back surgery and then dementia, Herb Terry never lost hope and faith — and joy.

As he would tell you, the joy of the Lord was his strength.

Herbert T. Terry died March 21. He was

Raised on a chicken farm in upstate New York, Herb called himself the "chicken man," and in his later years he had a brood of his own, his "girls," at his home in Homosassa.

Prior to his death, and in the middle of his dementia, he wrote a book, "Beyond Awesome," about his life.

In it he recalled trying to ride a pig and his Uncle George betting him a dime to do it, trying to ride a heifer bareback, running away from a workhorse named Charley.

Board: Sheriff unfairly targeting county for not replacing bulletproof vests

A nonchalant comment offered up by two Citrus County residents led county commissioners to a discussion on whether Sheriff Mike Prendergast is telling the community that the board's budget decisions left his deputies in peril.

John Burton of Hernando said he received a call asking for fundraising help to buy the sheriff's office bulletproof vests for its officers. Burton thought that should be a standard part of the uniform. Then Inverness resident Stephen Du-

Vall got to the point. "We understand you guys had to do a little cutting in the budget," he said. "We

need to make sure our officers are well

That led commissioners to accuse Pendergast of misleading the public into thinking the board wouldn't fund bulletproof vests for deputies.

"This board has given the sheriff every dime he's asked for," board Chairman Ron Kitchen Jr. said, adding it's "absolutely false" to tell the public the board wouldn't pay for bulletproof vests.



Mike Pendergast Sheriff's written budget request to the county last year included \$61,656 to replace the 84 vests, according to the detail list of items he provided the county.

Sheriff's officials reached Tuesday afternoon said commissioners should have known about the need for bulletproof vests — because they told them.

And the office provided a report documentation that the sheriff's office received about \$577,841 less than its budget request.



Board lauds road-resurfacing program

The popular neighborhood roadresurfacing program continues to roll

Since deciding four years ago to stop the medical corridor plan on County Road 491, the county has spent about \$20 million to resur-



face 200 miles of neighborhood roads, **Public Works Director** Randall Olney told county commissioners Tuesday. Board Chairman

Ron Kitchen Jr. said the public is pleased. Kitchen Jr. "Four years ago, this was the number-one issue – roads,

roads, roads," Kitchen said. The board is spending about \$3 million annually on neighborhood road resurfacing. The road list is prioritized by a combination of pavement condition and density.

Poll gives Scott edge in Senate race

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Rick Scott has an edge over Democratic incumbent Bill Nelson in this year's U.S. Senate race, while large numbers of voters in both parties remain undecided on Florida's next governor, according to a new poll.

The survey from the Florida Atlantic University Business and Economics Polling Initiative showed Scott, a Republican, with a 44.3 percent to 39.5 percent edge over Nelson in a survey of registered voters. Sixteen percent of the voters were undecided. Narrowing the poll to "likely" voters showed the two U.S. Senate candidates in a tie at 45 percent each.

Meanwhile, the race to replace Scott in the governor's office is largely wide open, with 43 percent of the registered Republicans undecided about the candidates heading to the Aug. 28 primary. Forty-two percent of the registered Democrats were undecided in their primary selection, the poll showed.

In the Republican field, U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis of Palm Coast had support from 16 percent of registered voters to state Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam's 15 percent. Narrowed to "likely" GOP voters, DeSantis had 19.6 percent to Putnam's 16.9 percent.

In the Democratic field, former Miami Beach Mayor Philip Levine had 16 percent of the registered voters, while former U.S. Rep. Gwen Graham of Tallahassee had 15 percent, businessman Chris King of Winter Park had 10 percent and Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum had 6 percent, the poll showed. Narrowed to likely primary voters, Levine had 17.6 percent, Graham 15.3 percent, King 10.5 percent and Gillum 6 per-

cent, according to the poll. Wagner said approval ratings for President Donald Trump could be a factor for some Re-

publicans, including Scott. The new survey showed Trump's approval rating among Florida voters at a high of

43 percent, compared to prior FAU polls that included a low of 35 percent last June. Some 45 percent of Florida voters disapproved of Trump in the new poll, down from a peak disapproval rating of 47 percent in November.

Monica Escaleras, director of the Business and Economics Polling Initiative, said it was not unusual to have so many voters undecided in the primary campaigns for governor, "as even the leading candidates are still introducing themselves to much Florida."

The issues most important to voters included immigration (23 percent), health care (20 percent), the economy (13 percent) and gun control (12 percent), the poll showed. The survey of 1,000 regis-

tered voters was conducted online and by telephone from Friday through Monday and had a margin of error of 3 percentage points. The samples for the gubernatorial primaries were smaller with larger margins of error.

UFC, Disney reach agreement

LAS VEGAS — UFC and The Walt Disney Co. on Tuesday announced an agreement for live fight coverage on its new subscription streaming service beginning in January.

The agreement calls for 15 live UFC events to stream exclusively on ESPN Plus. Each event will be called "UFC on ESPN Plus Fight Night" and will feature 12 bouts.

The deal gives Disney's new Direct-to-Consumer and International segment mixed martial arts inventory popular with young audiences. Financial terms were not disclosed.

UFC has had a broadcast agreement with Fox that started in 2011 and expires at the end of this year.

UFC spokesman Chris Bellitti said discussions are being held with Fox about having fights on its main network or FS1. Fox declined to comment.

"One of our goals for ESPN Plus is to bring sports fans of all genres content they love and are passionate about, and this agreement with UFC is illustrative of exactly that," Directto-Consumer and International chairman Kevin Mayer said. "We look forward to providing UFC's enthusiastic, growing fan base with a wide array of live events and building a lasting relationship with the industry leader in mixed martial arts."

ESPN's television channels will carry UFC content, including a 30-minute special previewing upcoming bouts and breaking down matchups leading up to each UFC pay-per-view fight cards, as well as UFC library programming and re-airs of UFC PPV events.

'The Big Bang Theory' tops ratings

NEW YORK — As it heads toward the end of another season, CBS' "The Big Bang Theory" has regained its familiar spot at the top of the television rankings.

The CBS comedy was seen by nearly 13 million people last week, the Nielsen company said. The revived "Rosanne," which has created a sensation since returning to the air on ABC, slipped to fourth in last week's ratings, with an audience of 10.43 million viewers last Tuesday.

CBS' "NCIS" was the second most-popular show of the week for the first of a two-episode arc featuring actress Pauley Perrette's exit after 15 years of playing the character Abby.

Thirteen of the week's 20 most-watched shows were on CBS and five were on ABC. The other two were episodes of "The Voice" on NBC.

Network executives have

spent the past few weeks looking at pilots to determine which new shows will hit the air next season. The networks announce their plans for the fall to advertisers next week in New York.

CBS won the week in prime time, averaging 6.7 million viewers. ABC had 4.9 million viewers, NBC had 4.5 million, Fox had 2.5 million, Univision had 1.4 million, ION Television had 1.2 million, Telemundo had 1.1 million and the CW had 1 million.

TNT was the week's most popular cable network, averaging 3.32 million viewers in prime time. Fox News Channel had 2.3 million viewers, MSNBC had 1.71 million, ESPN had 1.33 million and USA had 1.28 million.

ABC's "World News Tonight" topped the evening newscasts with an average of 8.9 million viewers. NBC's "Nightly News" was second with 8.5 million and the "CBS Evening News" had 6.5 million viewers.



Medicaid official acknowledges opposition to cut

A top Florida Medicaid official has notified the federal government that Gov. Rick Scott's administration provided incorrect information about a proposed cut to the

Medicaid program. Beth Kidder, deputy secretary for Medicaid at the state Agency for Health Care Administration, said in a letter Monday that some legislators voiced objections to the proposed \$98 million cut, which was contrary to information the state had previously submitted to the federal government. Florida is asking for the federal Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services to approve a change to eligibility rules used for the state's main safety-net health program, resulting in the proposed cut. Kidder wrote the letter after incoming Senate Minority Leader Audrey Gibson, D-Jacksonville, slammed the

to note that Senate Democrats raised questions about the proposed cut during debate over this year's state budget.

"We apologize for the oversight," Kidder said in the letter, which added that she planned to apologize to the Jacksonville senator.

Gibson on Monday said that despite the "alternative facts" presented by the Agency for Health Care Administration. Senate Democrats opposed the plan to change Medicaid eligibility rules.

"Attempting to sell this as a bipartisan blessing on bad policy is an untruth," she said.

Court to hear felons' rights fight in July

Moving quickly on the issue, a federal appeals court has tentatively scheduled oral arguments in July in a constitutional battle about Florida's process for restoring the voting rights of felons.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals is expected to hear

July 23 in Atlanta, though an online docket does not list a specific date.

In an order filed late last month, the appeals court said it was expediting consideration of the case, a move that included speeding up deadlines for attorneys to file briefs. The case went to the Atlanta-based appeals court after U.S. District Judge Mark Walker declared unconstitutional Florida's process for restoring the voting rights of felons who have served their sentences.

Gov. Rick Scott and members of the state Cabinet, who serve as the clemency board, have defended the current process, which involves felons waiting five to seven years to apply to have their rights restored — and years after that to complete the process. Walker had ordered Scott and the Cabinet to revamp the process by April 26. But state officials won a partial victory April 25, when a panel of the federal appeals court granted a stay of the order.

Oil falls on US pullout from Iran nuclear deal

The major U.S. stock indexes partially recovered from a daylong slide in the final minutes of trading Tuesday to finish essentially flat.

The indexes had been drifting slightly lower as investors weighed the Trump administration's decision to withdraw from a 2015 nuclear deal with Iran and reinstate sanctions on the country.

The policy change, announced in an afternoon speech by President Donlargely expected by traders, who sent crude oil prices sliding more than 2 percent a day after crude reached above \$70 a barrel for the first time in more than three years.

Health care, utilities and consumer-goods companies were among the biggest decliners. Banks. technology stocks and industrials posted gains. Energy sector companies also eked out a gain after being in a slump much of the day on lower oil prices.

"defective at its core." The ket was expecting," said move reinstalls sanctions on the Iranian regime. The 2015 agreement required Iran to curb its nuclear enrichment program in exchange for relief from international sanctions.

After Trump's remarks, oil prices pared some of their earlier losses. Benchmark U.S. crude oil fell \$1.67, or 2.4 percent, to \$69.06 per barrel in New York. Uncertainty over whether the U.S. would pull out of the Iran pact helped lift the price of crude on Monday above \$70 a barrel for the first time since November

Tuesday, Brent On crude, which is used to price international oils, lost \$1.32, or 1.7 percent, to \$74.85 per barrel in London.

Bond prices fell. The yield on the 10-year Treasury rose to 2.97 percent from 2.95 percent late Monday. The rise in yields pushed up interest rates, which allows banks to make more money from loans. That helped drive financial sector stocks higher. Capital One Financial rose 1.4 percent to



SeaWorld shares jump on attendance boost

NEW YORK — Shares of SeaWorld Entertainment jumped Tuesday after the company topped Wall Street expectations and reported a boost in attendance during the first quarter.

The stock gained \$1.50, or 9.5 percent, to \$17.35 in afternoon trading on the key attendance boost during the first three months of the year where most of its theme parks are still closed. The company has been trying to rebuild its image and boost attendance since 2013, when the documentary "Blackfish" suggested that the company's treatment of animals may have led to the deaths of trainers.

It announced last year that it would not breed killer whales and would stop using them in shows.

Attendance rose 14.9 percent during the period to 3.2 million guests.

"Our first-quarter results were mainly driven by our new marketing and com-

tions and events and new promotional pricing strategies," said John Reilly, interim CEO. "Attendance also benefited from the earlier timing of the Easter holiday in 2018.

The Orlando, Florida-based company lost \$62.8 million, or 73 cents per share, compared with a loss of \$61.1 million, or 72 cents per share, a year earlier. Losses, adjusted for non-recurring costs, were 53 cents per share. Revenue rose 16.5 percent to \$217.2 million.

SeaWorld Entertainment Inc., which operates 12 theme parks, typically reports a loss in the first quarter because it only has five parks open during the period. It has SeaWorld parks in Florida, California, and Texas, along with Busch Gardens parks in Florida and Virginia. The company also operates Sesame

Place in Pennsylvania. SeaWorld shares have increased 17 percent since the beginning of the year. The stock has declined slightly

Orug supply firm execs say they didn't cause opioids crisis

WASHINGTON — Top executives of the nation's leading wholesale drug distributors told Congress under oath Tuesday that their companies didn't help cause the nation's deadly opioid epidemic, drawing bipartisan wrath that included one lawmaker suggesting prison terms for some company officials.

The confrontation came at a House subcommittee hearing at which legislators asked why huge numbers of potentially addictive prescription opioid pills had been shipped to West Virginia, among the states overdoses, two-thirds from opioids.

Trump takes action

President declares US leaving 'horrible' Iran nuclear accord

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump withdrew the U.S. from the landmark nuclear accord with Iran on Tuesday, abruptly restoring harsh sanctions in the most consequential foreign policy action of his presidency. He declared he was making the world safer, but he also deepened his isolation on the world stage and revived doubts about American credibility.

The 2015 agreement, which was negotiated by the Obama administration and included Germany, France and Britain, had lifted most U.S. and international economic sanctions against Iran. In exchange, Iran agreed to restrictions on its nuclear program, making it impossible to produce a bomb and establishing rigorous

But Trump, a severe critic of the deal dating back to his presidential campaign, said in a televised address from the White House that it was "defective at its core."

U.S. allies in Europe had tried to keep him in and lamented his move to abandon it. Iran's leader ominously warned his country might "start enriching uranium more than before.'

The sanctions seek to punish Iran for its nuclear program by limiting its ability to sell oil or do business overseas, affecting a wide range of Iranian economic sectors and individuals.

Major companies in the U.S. and Europe could be hurt, too. Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said that licenses held by Boeing and its European competitor Airbus to sell billions of dollars in commercial jetliners to Iran will be revoked. Certain exemptions are to be negotiated, but Mnuchin refused to discuss what products might qualify.

He said the sanctions will sharply curtail sales of oil by Iran, which is currently the world's fifth largest oil producer. Mnuchin said he didn't expect oil prices to rise sharply, forecasting that other producers will step up production.

Iran's government must now decide whether to follow the U.S. and withdraw or try to salvage what's left with the Europeans. Iranian President Hassan Rouhani scramble to extricate themselves or run as a "historic move."

Yet nations like Israel and Saudi Arabia that loathed the deal saw the action as a sign the United States is returning to a more skeptical, less trusting approach to dealing with adversaries.

More Americans expect to work until 70

When it comes to retirement, later may be better. Americans long viewed

65 as the age to stop working. It was considered full retirement age by Social Security for many, Medicare benefits kick in then and historical practice had established it as the goal.

Now some experts are suggesting people set their sights a bit higher — on 70.

The reason? Working a few more years or drawing your Social Security benefits later can significantly boost income. That's particularly important as fewer workers receive pensions. Americans largely the required minimum

retirement — often failing to do so adequately.

We keep adding years of IRA. life and it all got tacked on to the retirement period and it never changed the retirement age," said Steve Vernon, a research scholar at the Stanford Center on Longevity in its financial security division.

From women's defender to alleged abuser

NEW YORK — Less than three months ago. New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman went before the news cameras to announce a lawsuit accusing movie mogul Harvey Weinstein and his former studio of abusing and intimidating a multitude of women.

"We have never seen anything as despicable as what we've seen here," Schneiderman declared.

Now, in a stunning turn rife with seeming hypocrisy, Schneiderman's own career has imploded, collapsing just three hours after the 63-year-old Democrat was accused of choking, slapping, threatening or otherwise abusing four women during intimate encounters.

The allegations, which Schneiderman contests but which led him to resign, emerged Monday in an article in The New Yorker.

Former 'Fight Club' teacher pleads not guilty

NORWICH, Conn. — A former Connecticut substitute teacher accused of organizing a student fight club is pleading not guilty.

Twenty-three-year-old Ryan Fish is charged with multiple counts of risk of injury to a child and reckless endangerment while teaching at Montville High School. He filed his plea with an attorney in Norwich Superior Court Tuesday and is requesting a jury trial.

The high school's principal, assistant principal and schools superintendent were arrested in April for not telling authorities about the fight allegations and have been placed on leave. Fish is accused of organizing fights between students inside a math classroom.

He was fired in October.

Syrian TV reports Israeli attack near Damascus

BEIRUT — Syrian staterun media is reporting an Israeli attack near the capital Damascus, saying Syrian air defenses shot down two missiles.

The official news agency SANA said Tuesday night's attack occurred in the countryside in Kisweh, just south of Damascus. It took place about an hour after President Donald Trump announced he was withdrawing from the Iran nuclear deal, calling Tehran a main exporter of terrorism in the region.

An official with the Iranled axis of resistance said the strike targeted a Syrian army position and caused only material damage. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to give official statements.

Paxton tosses no-hitter on home soil

First Canadian to hurl no-no in country

TORONTO - James Paxton of the Seattle Mariners became the first Canadian to pitch a no-hitter in his home country, shutting down the Toronto Blue Jays 5-0 Tuesday night.

Paxton joined Dick Fowler of the 1945 Philadelphia Athletics as the only Canadians to throw

Paxton, who's from British Columbia, pointed to a tattoo on his right forearm of a maple leaf—a national symbol — as he celebrated to a standing ovation at Rogers Centre.

"Of all places, to do it in Toronto, it's pretty amazing," he said.

"The fans were great. They were giving me some trouble in the seventh inning, but once I got

past that, they started kind of cheering me on. It was cool," he said.

The 29-year-old lefty threw 99 pitches in tossing the third no-hitter in the majors this year — all three have come in different countries.

Oakland's Sean Manaea pitched one against Boston on April 21 in California. Four Los Angeles Dodgers combined to no-hit San Diego in Mexico last Friday.

France family 'dedicated' to racing

 $\begin{array}{c} CHARLOTTE, N.C. - The \ president \ of \ NASCAR \ told \ employees \end{array}$ Tuesday the France family that owns a majority stake in the nation's top auto racing series "remains dedicated to the long term growth of our sport" following a report of a possible sale.

President Brent Dewar sent a memo to staff one day after a media report said the France family was exploring a potential sale of its NASCAR holdings. The Associated Press received a copy of the memo from a person who shared it on condition of anonymity due to the sensitive nature of the topic.

Dewar wrote in the memo that NASCAR does not comment on "incally address a possible deal by the France family.

"For over 70 years, the France family has worked hard to invest in the sport of NASCAR, including our recent acquisitions of ARCA. Dewar wrote, referring to the recent purchase of the Automobile Racing Series of America, a lower-tier stock car series that sometimes races in conjunction with NASCAR events.

NASCAR has struggled with recent ratings and attendance declines and several big-name sponsors have scaled back or pulled out. Lowe's, the only sponsor seven-time champion Jimmie Johnson has had in his 18-year career, is leaving at the end of the season. Home Depot, Target, Subway, Dollar General and scores of other sponsors have already exited

Additionally, title sponsor Monster Energy signed just a one-year extension through 2019 and NASCAR admitted it is re-evaluat-

ing its sponsorship structure. There have been rumors dating to last season that NASCAR Chairman Brian France wanted out, but many team owners seemed surprised by Monday's report from Reuters citing unidentified sources that the family has engaged investment bank Goldman Sachs to explore a sale. One team owner, who spoke to AP only on condition of anonymity, said France firmly told owners in recent months the series

was not for sale. Television ratings have continued to decline over the past decade and the retirements of Jeff Gordon, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Tony Stewart, Danica Patrick and Carl Edwards may have contributed to fans tuning out. But at-track attendance has also suffered and the three public companies that own tracks where NASCAR races are held have all reported attendance revenue declines.

NASCAR was founded by Bill France Sr., and handed down to his sons, Bill France Jr., and Jim. The current structure has Bill France Jr.'s son, Brian, running NASCAR, while his daughter, Lesa, controls International Speedway Corp., the sister company that owns many of the venues.

UF paying Grantham \$1.39M this season MARK LONG AP sports writer

GAINESVILLE — Florida is spending big in an effort to get its defense back among the nation's elite.

The Gators gave new defensive coordinator Todd Grantham a three-year deal worth \$4.47 million, making him the highest-paid assistant in school history. Grantham will earn \$1.39 million this season, \$1.49 million in 2019 and \$1.59 million in 2020, according to contracts the school released Tuesday in response to public records requests.

Coach Dan Mullen's on-field staff will earn a total of \$4.74 million this season, with Grantham getting the largest cut.

Only 15 college football assistants made more than \$1 million in 2017, with nine of those in the Southeastern Conference.

Former Florida defensive coordinator Randy Shannon made \$976,500 last year. Mullen fired Shannon in late November, parting ways with him after the Gators finished 31st in the nation in total defense. It was the school's lowest defensive ranking in a decade.

The Gators finished 15th or better in total defense nationally — and in the top 10 eight times — in the nine seasons between 2007 and 2017.

The 51-year-old Grantham spent one year with Mullen at Mississippi State and turned the Bulldogs into one of the league's top defenses. They ranked third in the conference in yards allowed and fifth in points last season,

both considerable improvements from

Grantham has 31 years of coaching experience, including 11 as a defensive coordinator. He served in that role at Mississippi State (2017), Louisville (2014-16), Georgia (2010-13) and with the Cleveland Browns (2005-07).

■ Co-offensive coordinators Billy Gonzales and John Hevesy signed twoyear contracts that will pay them \$565,000 each this season and \$590,000 in 2019.

■ Defensive line coach Sal Sunseri got a two-year deal worth \$565,000 annually.

■ Running backs coach/special teams coordinator Greg Knox signed a two-year deal worth \$440,000 annually.

■ Quarterbacks coach Brian Johnson got a two-year contract that will pay him \$415,000 this season and \$440,000 in 2019.

■ Safeties coach Ron English, a former head coach at Eastern Michigan, signed a two-year deal worth \$340,000 annually.

■ Tight ends coach Larry Scott got a two-year contract that will pay him \$190,000 this season and \$415,000 in 2019. Scott is getting paid by Tennes-

see in 2018. ■ Cornerbacks coach Charlton Warren signed a two-year deal that will pay him \$190,000 this season and \$390,000 in 2019. The Volunteers also are paying Warren in 2018.

■ Linebackers coach Christian Robinson got a two-year contract worth \$80,000 annually.

Dungy next inductee into Buccaneers Ring of Honor

TAMPA — Super Bowl-winning Hall of Fame coach Tony Dungy is the next inductee into the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' Ring of Honor.

The Bucs made the announcement Tuesday, saying Dungy will be honored at a halftime ceremony during the club's nationally televised home game against the Pittsburgh Steelers on Sept. 24.

Dungy won a Super Bowl as a player with the Steelers in 1978. He coached the Bucs from 1996-2001, compiling 54-42 regular-season record and transforming a struggling franchise into a championship contender.

His .563 winning percentage with Tampa Bay is the best in club history. The Bucs made the playoffs four times, including 1999, when they reached the NFC championship game. He was fired after the 2001 season, and his replacement, Jon Gruden, led Tampa Bay to its only Super Bowl title the following year.

Dungy will be the 13th inductee into the Ring of Honor.

Mainly because of Woods, Mickelson has never been PGA Tour player of the year, has never been No. 1 in the world and has never won the money title.

"It was the most remarkable golf in the history of the game, and I think unrepeat-Mickelson said. "I think it was that good. I look at 2000 as being kind of the benchmark at the U.S. Open as being the greatest golf I've ever witnessed and I believe has ever been played. And it sucked to have to play against him.'

Lefty still got in a few jabs that year. He ended Woods' six-tournament winning streak at Torrey Pines in early 2000. At the end of that year, he beat him at the Tour Championship to end four straight years of Woods winning when he had at least a share of the 54-hole lead.

They have been there for each other in tough times.

Woods reached out to Mickelson when his wife, Amy, was diagnosed with breast cancer. Woods told of Mickelson sending nothing but encouraging texts when Woods was struggling with his chipping in early 2015 as his back was still ailing. "He offered numerous times to help me

out with technique and just about it," Woods said. "I said, 'Yeah, you and I have the same philosophy in how we approach chipping and how we do it. I just can't physically do it. "But now it's different. I feel better,"

Woods said. "And my short game has turned around.' Game on.

Mickelson, of course, wanted something even better.

"I look at the cover of the newspaper and the pairing is on there and the excitement that's been going on around here, it gets me thinking," Mickelson said Tuesday. "Why don't we just bypass all the ancillary stuff of a tournament and just go head-to-head and just have kind of a highstakes, winner-take-all match.'

Many people think cycling offers a way to:





Declarer saw four possible losers: two spades and two diamonds. But surely one of the diamond finesses would work.


South drew trumps and played a diamond to dummy's queen. East won with the king and shifted to the spade nine.

ear Annie: I'm hoping you'll print this for Be Kind to Animals Week. While traveling, my daughter saw four dogs lying beside an interstate. When she stopped, two ran off into the woods. With the aid of another motorist, she managed to get two dogs into her car and drive them to a shelter in the nearest city. One was adopted. The

other was not. Sharing her sorrow, I penned the following letter, meant for the person who abandoned those dogs:



DEAR ANNIE

Your dog died today, and you don't even know it. He was young much too young. I found him lying by the side of the road. I stopped. He lay there, bloodied and unable to stand. I thought he had been hit, but it turned out his wounds were caused by bites from other animals. He allowed me, a stranger, to carry him to my

The hospital treated his physical wounds successfully, but his mental wounds were not so easily overcome, and he was put down because he was "unadoptable." What did you think would happen when you dropped him somewhere? Or did he run off from a place that held no joy for him only pain and deprivation? Did you hope someone would take him in? Did you think, "He'll survive somehow"? Did you think at all?

Your dog was put to death today. The good thing is that his belly was full and loving hands held him. The bad thing is that he was much too young, and they weren't even your hands. — Ann in Illinois

Dear Ann: I'm happy to print your letter in honor of Be Kind to Animals Week, which is the first full week of May every year.

Abandoning a pet is illegal in many states and immoral in all of them. But that doesn't stop people from doing it. Your letter tells a heartbreaking and, unfortunately, all-toocommon story.

To anyone considering a pet: Please be sure you're ready to commit to caring for that animal for the rest of his or her life; spay and neuter so as not to contribute to the overpopulation problem; and adopt from a shelter. As reported by the ASPCA, 6.5 million companion animals enter U.S. shelters every year. Millions of tails, just waiting to wag for that special somebody who will become their person.


