



## Gudis, Guy offer contrasting vision

### Crystal River City Council candidates square off at forum

A veteran Crystal River councilman and a city business owner did their best Monday night to convince a crowd of roughly 30 people that their vision for the city's future was the right one.

Chronicle's Crystal River political forum at the George Washington Carver Community Center in downtown, incumbent Councilman Mike Gudis and challenger Cindi Guy shared their stances on the future site of a new city hall, the best way to approach tourism in the city and the city's relationship with businesses, the sheriff's office and federal wildlife authorities.

### In Gadsden County, Michael runs roughshod

My first visit to Gadsden County, just west of Tallahassee, occurred on a beautiful sunny Saturday with a little hint of fall in the air.

Throughout the rural county of 46,000 people came the late-afternoon aroma of burning leaves.

Residents chopped firewood, preparing for the winter ahead.

And lots of folks were out and about, shopping at the Piggly Wiggly or Walmart, taking drives to Havana or Chattahoochee.

At least that's how it would appear on first glance.

But a closer look revealed a county doing its best to hang on, just a few days after Hurricane Michael slammed into it carrying 125 mph winds.

The aroma was of people burning debris, mounds that covered their yards. The burning became so intense that, on Monday, the county issued a no-burn notice.

Residents weren't chopping wood for winter. They were trying to get out of their driveways, or removing limbs from their roofs. In a county where trees outnumber people 100 to 1, it seemed like everyone was dealing with a tree on their roof or limbs scattered throughout their yards.

The main roads were clear, but lined with oak trees toppled onto electric wires.

And, yes, a lot of folks were out and about to the Piggly Wiggly and Walmart, but that's only because those businesses and a handful of others had generator power. Until Sunday, no one in Gadsden, not even the sheriff's emergency operation center, had electricity. The cities and county were using

### President, first lady tour devastated Panhandle

LYNN HAVEN, Fla. — President Donald Trump marveled at the roofless homes and uprooted trees he saw Monday while touring Florida Panhandle communities ravaged by the force of Hurricane Michael.

Trump toured devastated coastal communities by air, land and foot before he and the first lady helped hand out bottled water at a Federal Emergency Management Agency aid distribution center, where the needy signed up for temporary housing and picked up clothing, diapers, water and other supplies.

The president said someone described Hurricane Michael to him as being "like a very wide, extremely wide, tornado."

"Look behind you. I mean, those massive trees are just ripped out of the earth. This is really incredible," Trump said.

Trump narrowly won Florida over Democrat Hillary Clinton in the 2016 presidential election, boosted by strong voter turnout in the Panhandle.

The state is important to Trump not only for

## State Supreme Court Next governor will pick new justices

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's next governor and not incumbent Gov. Rick Scott will get to pick three new justices to the state Supreme Court, the court ruled Monday in a decision with major implications in this year's gubernatorial campaign.

In a major rebuke to Scott, the Supreme Court concluded that the Republican governor exceeded his authority when he started the process to find replacements for the three justices.

Age limits of 70 are forcing three of the seven justices — Barbara Pariente,

R. Fred Lewis and Peggy Quince — to retire at midnight Jan. 8, the same day Scott is scheduled to leave the governor's office. Scott, claiming he had authority to name the replacements, last month asked a nominating commission to start accepting applications with a Nov. 10 deadline.

The court's one-page ruling Monday says "the governor who is elected in the November 2018 general election has the sole authority to fill the vacancies" triggered by those mandatory retirements.

Scott, barred from seeking re-election as governor because of term limits, is running against Democratic U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson.

generators to keep traffic signals activated.

Residents waited in long lines for cases of bottled water, MREs (meals ready to eat), ice and, when available, blue tarps. The National Guard and sheriff's office volunteers were on hand to help out.

I had volunteered for hurricane duty in Gadsden, which sits on the Florida-Georgia border, to help out my former Chronicle co-worker, Cheri Harris. As editor of the weekly Gadsden County Times, a newspaper owned by Chronicle publisher Citrus Publishing, Cheri was dealing with storm-related issues of her own.

The county seat is Quincy, a town about the size of Inverness. Unlike Citrus, where the population is spread throughout housing developments, Gadsden's population is centered around Quincy and five other small cities. One of those cities, on the far western edge, is Chattahoochee, a town established in 1834 on the Apalachicola River.

When I drove there Saturday, my heart broke for that town. Along Washington Street, the main thoroughfare along U.S. 98, it

looked like a bomb had exploded: businesses mangled, shop windows blown out, the roof caved in on a flower shop.

According to the sheriff's office, Hurricane Michael's worst winds — 120 to 125 mph — were recorded in Chattahoochee. That's high on the Category 3 scale.

Only a few people were around. One was Anita Smith, who swept glass and debris on the sidewalk outside Second Chance

Outreach Ministries, which she operates.

"Our theme is, 'We're not Goodwill, but we're doing God's will,'" she said.

Smith hopes the thrift store makes enough money to help fund a half-way house a block away.

The two-story house, built in 1834, is a work in progress, she said. Michael didn't help, ripping shingles off the roof and tearing out siding.

Her store has some damage, but Smith's thoughts

are with Chattahoochee.

"It was like an explosion around here, like World War III," she said. "Everything is a mess. Trees are all over the road. We didn't have nothing already and now it's a disaster zone."

Heading back east, closer to Gretna, I spotted a man with a chainsaw just off the roadway. Terry Shaw and his son, Isaac, were working to clear large limbs that had blocked his driveway for three days.

Shaw, a pastor who runs

Fresh Start CGB Inc., a nonprofit re-entry program for women offenders, stayed home during the hurricane with his wife, two kids, two church members and one woman's baby.

"In my 56 years I've been through a few good storms, but I've never witnessed anything like this one," he said. "I was scared for my life."

There were reports, unconfirmed, of possible tornadoes in the

Chattahoochee area. Shaw said he wouldn't doubt it.

"I was standing on my front porch, and first there was the wind, then you hear the trees just snapping, snapping," he said. "When it got real bad we ran into the hallway. Things were flying everywhere. Twice it sounded like a train coming."

Some of my notes are not so clear, as I tried writing while walking. Such was the case when I met up with Shanice Austin and Shawn Herring, Quincy residents who were in the line of cars waiting to pull into the Gadsden County jail parking lot for water and other provisions. I spoke with Shanice as slowly she moved along the line.

She had several children, I think six, and the oldest is 7. The hurricane's power outages spoiled all their food. Shanice has a job in Tallahassee but without electricity, she wasn't sure how to get gas. And her 7-year-old daughter is scared.

"She doesn't know what's going on," Shanice said.

Still, like many people I met, despite her circumstances Shanice's heart was with others.

"This is like Hurricane Katrina," she said. "I feel sorry for those people in Panama City."

his hopes of being re-elected in 2020 but also as he campaigns aggressively to help Republicans expand their slim 51-49 majority in the U.S. Senate. Fellow Republican and Florida Gov. Rick Scott is running for the Senate, partly at Trump's urging, and is in a close contest against Democratic incumbent Bill Nelson just weeks before Election Day. Scott shadowed Trump throughout Monday's visit.

Trump and his wife, Melania, initially saw uprooted trees and houses topped with blue tarps after his helicopter lifted off from Eglin Air Force

Base near Valparaiso, his first stop after leaving Washington. But the severity of the damage worsened significantly as Trump approached Mexico Beach, which was nearly wiped off the map after taking a direct hit from the hurricane and its 155 mph winds last week.

Many of the houses in the town of about 1,000 people had no roofs. In some cases, only the foundations were left standing. A water tower lay on its side, and 18-wheelers were scattered in a parking lot like children's toys.

In Panama City, where Trump landed, power poles bowed toward the ground, pieces of metal roofing were scattered about and pine trees had been uprooted or snapped in half.

The view on the drive toward Panama City included houses smashed by trees, bent billboards and a demolished trailer park.

In nearby Lynn Haven, where the mayor said there was no loss of life, Trump walked up to a house where a massive pine tree lay on the front yard next to a palm tree that stood tall. Repairs were being made to the home, owned by Michael Rollins, who told Trump he rode out the storm there.

"I knew I had made my commitment to stay with my animals. I have two dogs and a parrot," Rollins told Trump.

More than 190,000 homes and businesses in Florida were without electricity as of Sunday, days after the hurricane hit. That's in

addition to about 120,000 in Georgia, where Trump arrived later Monday afternoon and planned to survey hurricane damage. Residents also grappled with widespread cellphone outages.

Throughout the day, the president profusely praised

Scott's hurricane response.

"The job they've done in Florida has been incredible," Trump told reporters. He told Scott: "You're a great governor."


Scott said FEMA had granted all his requests and that he'd spoken with Trump "almost every day."

The mood at the aid distribution center seemed lighthearted despite the surrounding devastation, as Trump bantered with a crowd that seemed more interested in selfies with him than in the bottled water he was offering in the heat and humidity.

Citrus County sheriff's detectives are asking for the public's help to find a pair of missing teenagers.

**Dunnellon man dies in accident**

*Man apparently fell out of car on the interstate; FHP investigating*

A Dunnellon man died early Monday morning after he fell out of a moving car on a North Florida interstate.

At around 12:30 a.m., 35-year-old Susan Marie Baccili and her passenger,

39-year-old Anthony Baccili, were traveling in a 2005 Buick LaCrosse north on Interstate 75 near mile marker 437, according to a crash report from the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP).

During the drive, near the Columbia-Suwannee county line, Anthony Baccili fell out

of the car and was later pronounced dead on scene, FHP's report states.

Susan Baccili was uninjured. FHP does not believe alcohol was a factor, its report shows.

FHP spokesperson Lt. Kim Montes said FHP is still investigating how Anthony Bac-

cili left the vehicle.

**Inverness eyes raises for city employees**

The Inverness City Council on Tuesday will consider pay raises for the city's employees, marking the third time in as many years workers could see their paychecks swell a little.

The council will consider implementing the raises for both supervisors and rank-and-file workers. The city also has an employee bargaining unit for workers, but City Manager Frank DiGiovanni said the bargaining unit has not contacted the city about salaries, so the raises would be implemented regardless and rank-and-file workers would also see the raises, if approved.

The raises were budgeted for in the city's 2018-2019 budget. The cost to the city will be \$61,155 annually.

This is how the pay raises will be distributed if approved:

Employees with a base annual pay of less than \$33,350 will receive a \$1,000 annual increase.

Employees who earn \$33,351 or more a year will receive a 3 percent increase.

Part-time employees will be eligible for a \$500 annual increase, applied on their anniversary date.

The city has 39 full-time employees and seven part-time employees who will be affected by the raises if they are approved.

The council approved similar raises during the past two years.

The council is expected to approve the raises. The council set the money aside when it approved its budget earlier this year.

Councilman Cabot

McBride said earlier this summer when approving the Inverness budget that he was proud that a city the size of Inverness could operate with such a small staff.

"You all dazzle and amaze us," he told the attending staff.

Along with the raises, the city also pays for the employees' health insurance, including a 6 percent increase this year.

Health insurance for the city's employees, and six elected council officials, increased \$25,587 this year.

Currently, the city pays 100 percent of its employees' and elected officials' health insurance. Public Risk Management is the insurance provider.

Along with the increase, the city currently pays about \$450,000 annually for its employees' and elected officials'

health insurance. The health-insurance cost per employee and elected official is \$10,355 per person per year.

The city is paying for the health and pay increases by raising property taxes.

The council approved a 0.2 mill increase this summer, expected to generate between \$90,000 and \$100,000 — enough to cover the city's rising operational costs and employee raises.

One mill in property, or ad valorem, taxes is equal to \$1 for each \$1,000 of the property's taxable value. So if a property is worth \$75,000, after homestead exemptions, the property owner's city property taxes will be \$620.47, about \$15 more than if the rate had stayed at 8.0729.

**Justices strike down expert witness law**

TALLAHASSEE — In a case stemming from a man who developed the asbestos-related disease mesothelioma, a sharply divided Florida Supreme Court on Monday said a controversial 2013 law about expert-witness testimony was an unconstitutional infringement on the court's authority.

Justices, in a 4-3 decision, overturned a ruling by the 4th District Court of Appeal and ordered reinstatement of an \$8 million verdict for Richard DeLisle, who contended he suffered mesothelioma because of exposure to asbestos in cigarette filters and in workplaces.

Bigger picture, the court majority found unconstitutional a move by the Legislature in 2013 to tighten standards for expert witnesses in court cases — a move that was backed by business groups but opposed by plaintiffs' attorneys. The Supreme Court said the law violated the constitutional separation of powers because justices have the authority to set court-system procedures.

The 2013 law involved changing from the state's use of what is known in the legal world as the "Frye" standard to what is known as the "Daubert" standard for

expert witnesses. Testimony from expert witnesses can play a crucial role in complicated civil lawsuits and in criminal cases that involve scientific evidence.

"We recognize that Frye and Daubert are competing methods for a trial judge to determine the reliability of expert testimony before allowing it to be admitted into evidence," Justice Peggy Quince wrote in the majority decision, joined by justices Barbara Pariente, R. Fred Lewis and Jorge Labarga. "Both purport to provide a trial judge with the tools necessary to ensure that only reliable evidence is presented to the jury. Frye relies on the scientific community to determine reliability whereas Daubert relies on the scientific savvy of trial judges to determine the significance of the methodology used. With our decision today, we reaffirm that Frye, not Daubert, is the appropriate test in Florida courts."

But Chief Justice Charles Canady, in a blistering dissent joined by justices Ricky Polston and Alan Lawson, said the court did not have the legal basis to decide the case because there had not been conflicting decisions in lower courts. Canady wrote that the majority "charts an unprecedented and ill-advised course" in the case.

"The constitutionality of (the 2013 law) is

unquestionably an important issue that is worthy of consideration by this (Supreme) Court," Canady wrote. "But the importance of an issue does not justify transgressing the constitutional bounds of this court's jurisdiction. Instead, such an issue should be considered by this court only in a case that presents a proper basis for jurisdiction under our Constitution."

During the legislative debate supporters of moving to the Daubert standard, which is used in federal courts, argued it could help prevent the use of "junk science" in court cases. The standard includes a three-part test in determining whether expert testimony can be admitted. That test involves whether the testimony is "based upon sufficient facts or data;" whether it is the "product of reliable principles and methods;" and whether a witness has "applied the principles and methods reliably to the facts of the case."

But opponents argued that using the standard in Florida courts would make cases more expensive and time-consuming — effectively making it harder for people to pursue lawsuits. Pariente, in a concurring opinion Monday, echoed those concerns.

"I acknowledge that neither Frye nor Daubert is a perfect standard that will

seem fair to all litigants in every proceeding," Pariente wrote in a concurrence joined by Labarga. "However, this (Supreme) Court's case law makes clear that a proper and thorough application of Frye allows the trial judge to inquire beyond bare assertions of general acceptance. Daubert, on the other hand, has the potential to infringe on litigants' constitutional right to access the courts."

The Supreme Court signaled last year that it had "grave constitutional concerns" about the Daubert standard and refused to adopt it as part of the evidence code. But countering Canady's dissent, Labarga wrote in a concurring opinion that "resolution as to which standard applies is critical to resolve uncertainty in Florida law."

DeLisle filed a lawsuit in Broward County against a series of defendants alleging that exposure to asbestos had caused mesothelioma. For example, he argued that filtered Kent cigarettes he smoked in the 1950s contained asbestos.

A jury trial led to an \$8 million award for DeLisle. But R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., a successor to the firm that made Kent cigarettes, and Crane Co., which was alleged to have made sheet gaskets that contained asbestos, appealed.

The tour began Oct. 3, with **Mike Campbell** and **Neil Finn** replacing Buckingham.

## Chance the Rapper goes undercover to raise money for arts

CHICAGO — **Chance the Rapper** is so serious about raising money for arts education programs in Chicago that he took a second job as a Lyft driver to spread the word.

The Chicago Tribune reports that the Chicago-born Grammy-winning hip-hop artist who has given millions of dollars to Chicago Public Schools recently went undercover as a driver for the rideshare service to make a video that encourages riders to donate to the city's public

The video shows **Chance** wearing shades and a maroon hat telling riders his name is John. Then he reveals his true identity and encourages riders to use the Lyft app's feature called Round Up and Donate that allows users to support his charity, The New Chance Fund, or others of their choice.

## Court tosses DeLorean widow's lawsuit

NEWARK, N.J. — A federal court has dismissed a lawsuit brought by the widow of automaker **John DeLorean** over royalties stemming from the "Back to the Future" movies.

**Sally DeLorean** claimed a Texas company using the DeLorean name had illegally accepted royalties from Universal Pictures for the promotional use of images of the iconic car. But a judge ruled Friday that a 2015 settlement agreement in a separate lawsuit over trademarks prohibited her from suing for the royalties.

The sleek, angular car with


gull-wing doors was featured in the movie franchise starring **Michael J. Fox** about a kid who travels back in time to engineer his parents' meeting.

In her lawsuit filed in April, **Sally DeLorean**, who lives in New Jersey, claimed the Texas-based DeLorean Motor Co. had illegally profited from a 1989 agreement between her late husband and Universal. That agreement gave John DeLorean and his heirs 5 percent of net receipts for any merchandising and promotions that featured the car and logo "as a key component."


The Texas company isn't affiliated with the one John DeLorean started, but under the 2015 settlement agreement was allowed to use the DeLorean name and trademarks.

**Sally DeLorean** claimed in the current lawsuit that the Texas company had illegally represented to Universal that it had the right to the royalties and had already received "a substantial payment" from Universal.



colonel who started with the county in May 2017, said in an interview he is frustrated with the county's lack of vision.

He noted that the county conducted months of workshops on land development code changes, such as relaxing the waterfront setback for homes, only to have a majority vote to keep standards in place.

"My job has been a little bit challenging," he said. "We're really lacking as a community a strategic plan or vision. If we had a set of three to five goals or visions to champion behind, that would really help."

Oliver is recommending that the new assistant county administrator, who hasn't been hired yet, serve as interim growth management director until Green's position is filled.

Growth management oversees land development, building permits and code compliance. Oliver said none of those division directors have the broad skills to oversee the entire department.

Demers, who recently marked her fifth year with the county, is leaving to become controller of an Ocala business.

"I've affected all the change I can with the county at this point," she said.

As the county's budget director, Demers helped

the county commission steer gas-tax revenue toward paying for resurfacing neighborhood roads, and expanded her department to include the administration of grants.

Fiscal specialist Erin Dohren will serve as interim director until the position is filled.

Oliver said a committee has interviewed three finalists for assistant county administrator, and the applicants are meeting Monday and Tuesday with individual commissioners.

He said he hopes to have a decision on the new assistant for the board's first meeting in November.

The ruling came in a lawsuit filed by the Florida branch of the League of Women Voters and Common Cause.

The decision means that either Democrat Andrew Gillum, mayor of Tallahassee, or Republican Ron DeSantis, a former congressman, will be able to choose three new justices who could serve on the court for years and sway its balance of power. The two are vying for Florida's governorship in the Nov. 6 election.

There was no immediate comment from the governor's office or the plaintiffs. But the Gillum and DeSantis campaigns issued statements

signaling that the looming appointments will become a major issue in the race.

"It is a duty I take extremely seriously and, as governor, one of my top priorities will be to restore integrity to the judicial nominating process," Gillum said.

Stephen Lawson, a spokesman for DeSantis, cast the ruling in more partisan terms, contending that if Gillum wins "out-of-state, radical groups" would pressure him to pick activist judges who would "legislate from the bench" in ideological terms.

"The consequences of this would be felt for generations, and it would be dangerous for every person in our state," Lawson said. "As governor, Ron DeSantis will appoint justices to the Supreme Court who are fair, who will

uphold the constitution, and who will follow the law as it is written."

The three departing justices are often part of a majority that has ruled against Scott and the Republican-controlled Legislature in recent years.

Scott has previously said he planned to name the three new justices the morning of his departure but also would work with his successor on a list of finalists and try to reach an agreement on the replacements. Outgoing Gov. Lawton Chiles and incoming Gov. Jeb Bush reached such an agreement in 1998.

The Supreme Court will hear oral arguments Nov. 8 on the issue of when the Supreme Court Judicial Nominating Commission can certify its nominations to the high court.



of 12 years. He served a pair of two-year terms in the late 1990s and was elected to a pair of four-year terms in 2010 and again in 2014.

"I'm proud to be a team member of Crystal River council that has done so much in the last four years," Gudis said in opening.

Guy has been a business owner in the city's downtown since late 2013, when she opened up the family-run Majestic Manatee Tours. Guy also officiates weddings at her Majestic Wedding Chapel, which has been in business since 2015.

Guy said she's ready to bring the city's business community back in the forefront of council priorities.

"I know what it takes to run a business that breathes customer service," she said. "I'm here to roll up my sleeves, listen to my community and go to work."

Brandon Buckingham, the third contender for the seat, was not able to attend the forum since Florida emergency officials directed his Crystal River business, Advanced Septic, to assist in Hurricane Michael recovery efforts in Panama City.

Buckingham said Monday afternoon his crews were loading up equipment and generators before leaving later that afternoon to restart Panama City's wastewater lift stations and utilities.

Meredith Bleakley, a spokeswoman for Buckingham, read an opening statement prepared by the third-generation Crystal River native, who called for the continued restoration of local waterways, smarter collection of tourism dollars and a stronger partnership between city staff and businesses.

"You need to know that I am not a politician, and with no disrespect I say that with pride," Bleakley read from Buckingham's

statement. "I am just a local guy, a business owner, a father, a husband and a concerned community member that wants to see forward movement in the success of our city."

Here's a summary of topics covered during the forum, and candidates responses:

### Is Crystal River a business-friendly city?

Gudis said the city "has had some problems in the past" between businesses and the city's Planning and Community Development department, headed by Director Jackie Gorman, and plans are in the works to streamline the permitting process.

"We have a very small staff and a lady who has been probably overworked," he said. "There are times when things can be solved and there are times where it can't be."

Guy and Gudis said council needs to do more in modernizing city codes and ordinances to better facilitate commercial build-up.

Guy shared a story of a business owner in the city who told her he submitted a permit to refurbish a business site within the city, but but got mired in the permitting process.

"They kept pushing the permit around ... and it all came down to one parking lot. All he wanted to do was fix it up, and that's unacceptable," Guy said. "There's a negative attitude that's been going on for several years."

Guy added it wasn't right for the city to construct its unfinished Riverwalk in downtown Crystal River when it hadn't gotten the OK from all affected property

owners.

"Prior planning would have provided a better performance," she said.

### How do you go about fixing blighted shopping plazas in the city?

Gudis said council is doing something about filling vacant properties along Citrus Avenue and U.S. 19, but out-of-town property owners are not acting on city staff's calls for action and solutions.

"Hopefully we can get some people to respond," Gudis said, adding fines need to be imposed on uncooperative lot owners.

Guy said punishing developers by having them pay is not how the city promotes growth. Business owners, the city and even the county must work together to find strategies to ease development setbacks and other restrictions, she said.

"Work with them and see how we can help them ... find out problems and how we could start a business incubator with the county," she said.

"You can promise anything by going to the property owners ... but there are some people who don't pay attention to us," Gudis rebutted. "Sometimes fining them would be the only way to do it."

### What else can the city do benefit from its tourism industry and Three Sisters Springs?

Both Guy and Gudis are in favor of working with the county's Tourist Development Council to better control and monetize tourists.

Guy said the city needs to distance itself from funding tourist services, like the city-run trolley, and privatize those

functions by bidding out to dependable local companies.

"I know of a couple business owners that have put in an application and wanting the city to go out to bid," Guy said. "But it just got put on the back burner."

Gudis said the city first tried to have a private concessionaire run the trolley, but had to take over the operation because the company could not handle the job.

"If it wasn't for the city taking it over, there wouldn't be any trolley," Gudis said. "I would be in favor of a private business running it, but they need to prove that."

Gudis continued, saying Crystal River should have taken over management of the Three Sisters Springs wildlife refuge from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service. Gudis contends the service has been negligent for years in developing the property into what it was promised to be, he said.

Guy said she doesn't want city taxpayer dollars going toward Three Sisters, and laid delays of Three Sisters' development at the city's feet.

"(USFWS) got tied up by city hall," she said. "It was in the hands of our city

officials and they did nothing."

"That's a matter of opinion," Gudis said back. "Both sides could have done a better job. It was a matter of the two sides getting together and getting stuff done, and that's being done."

### Where should the next city hall go?

Gudis said he's in favor of demolishing the current city hall and rebuilding a new two-story city headquarters nearby.

While a recently released feasibility study recommended the southeast corner of U.S. 19 as the future site of city hall, Gudis said he'd rather see a mixed-use building put there instead.

Guy said it would be cheaper to bring city hall inside the Crystal River Mall, where city staff can also assist in enticing businesses back to the empty storefront.

"Put the city hall in the mall and have a development agency there to bring businesses back," she said.

"I love to be able to help the mall," Gudis said. "But

I don't think city hall belongs in the mall, it belongs in the center of the city."

### How well is the county sheriff's office providing services to Crystal River?

Gudis and Guy said they're not happy with city residents paying the Citrus County Sheriff's Office thousands of dollars for "enhanced services" they may not be getting.

"They need to be a little more accountable," Guy said. "Accountable to residents who have complaints, like noise violations."

"They're doing a great job, but I'm not happy in paying extra money," Gudis said, adding city and sheriff's-office officials are meeting regularly. "We are asking them to do more and more."

Guy and Gudis agreed that council and the sheriff's office must do more to combat a growing drug problem in Crystal River, and work with area churches to get the homeless population back into a contributing society.

**Jurors: Don't**  
**throw out**  
**Roundup verdict**

SAN FRANCISCO — Jurors who found that agribusiness giant Monsanto's Roundup weed killer contributed to a school groundskeeper's cancer are urging a San Francisco judge not to throw out the bulk of their \$289 million award in his favor, a newspaper reported Monday.

Juror Gary Kitahata told Judge Suzanne Bolanos in a letter that the jury was convinced by the evidence, the San Francisco Chronicle said.

"I urge you to respect and honor our verdict and the six weeks of our lives that we dedicated to this trial," he said.

Juror Robert Howard wrote to the judge that the jury had paid "studious attention" to the evidence and any decision to overturn its verdict would shake his confidence in the judicial system.

Bolanos said last week she is inclined to throw out \$250 million in punitive damages in favor of DeWayne Johnson. She is also considering dramatically reducing the remaining award. Her final decision is due by Oct. 22.

Johnson sprayed Roundup and a similar product, Ranger Pro, at his job as a pest control manager at a San Francisco Bay Area school district, according to his attorneys. He was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma in 2014 at age 42.

His lawsuit is among hundreds alleging Roundup caused cancer, but it was the first one to go to trial.

Many government regulators have rejected a link between glyphosate — the active ingredient in Roundup — and cancer. Monsanto has vehemently denied such a connection, saying hundreds of studies have established that glyphosate is safe.

**Deputies search**  
**for girl whose**  
**parents are dead**

BARRON, Wis. — Authorities searched Monday for a 13-year-old girl they believe is in danger after her parents were found dead in their western Wisconsin home.

Deputies went to the home in Barron after dispatchers received a 911 call from an unknown person at around 1 a.m. Monday, Barron County Sheriff Chris Fitzgerald said. He said they found the bodies of Jayme Closs' parents, who were later identified by the sheriff's department as 56-year-old James Closs and his 46-year-old wife, Denise Closs. Fitzgerald also said there had been gunshots, but he stopped short of saying that's how the couple died.

"At the end of the day, I want a 13-year-old here safe and sound. That's our goal. That's our only goal right now," Fitzgerald said at a news briefing.

**Warren touts DNA test**

*Senator, 2020 hopeful says results prove Native American claims*

BOSTON — Sen. Elizabeth Warren on Monday released the results of a DNA analysis that she said indicated she has some Native American heritage, a rebuttal to President Donald Trump, who has long mocked her ancestral claims and repeatedly referred to her as "Pocahontas."

The Massachusetts Democrat and potential 2020 presidential contender challenged Trump to make good on his pledge to donate \$1 million to charity if she provided proof of Native American heritage, a moment that was caught on video. Trump falsely denied ever making the offer and later said he would donate the money only if he can personally administer the genetic test.

The analysis was done by Stanford University

professor Carlos D. Bustamante, a prominent expert in the field. He concluded that the great majority of Warren's ancestry is European but added that the results "strongly support" the existence of a Native American ancestor.

In his report, Bustamante said he analyzed Warren's sample without knowing the identity of the donor. He concluded that Warren has a pure Native American ancestor who probably lived six to 10 generations ago, and that it was impossible to determine the individual's tribal connection.

Warren, who has said her Native American roots were part of "family lore," also released a video produced by her Senate re-election campaign. In it, she said: "The president likes to call my mom a liar. What do the facts say?"

Bustamante replied:

"The facts suggest that you absolutely have Native American ancestry in your pedigree."

The analysis is not the first evidence of Warren's heritage. An 1894 document previously unearthed by the New England Genealogical Society suggested Warren's great-great-great-grandmother, O.C. Sarah Smith, was at least partially Native American, making the senator as much as 1/32nd Native American.

The genealogy group has said it has no conclusive evidence of her ancestry, and a spokesman said Monday it would not comment on the genetic findings.

If Warren's ancestor were six generations removed, she would be 1/64th Native American. But if her ancestor had

been as much as 10 generations removed, that would make the individual a great-great-great-great-great-great-great-great-great-great-grandparent and render Warren only 1/1,024th Native American, according to Blaine Bettinger, a genealogist and author who specializes in DNA evidence.

Such a finding could potentially further excite Warren's critics instead of placating them.

Warren's effort to address questions about her ancestry and the release of the video are her latest moves telegraphing a likely presidential run in 2020. During the summer, she also released a decade's worth of tax returns, drawing a contrast with Trump's unwillingness to release his own tax documents.

**Australia might**  
**move embassy**  
**to Jerusalem**

CANBERRA, Australia — Australia's prime minister said Tuesday that he was open to shifting the Australian Embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem in line with President Donald Trump's decision to recognize the contested holy city as Israel's capital.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison said the idea was suggested to him by a former ambassador to Israel, Dave Sharma, who is a candidate for Morrison's conservative Liberal Party in a crucial by-election Saturday in a Sydney electorate with a large Jewish population.

Morrison said Australia remained committed to finding a two-state solution to Israel's conflict with the Palestinians.

"When sensible suggestions are put forward that are consistent with your policy positioning and in this case pursuing a two-state solution, Australia should be open-minded to this and I am open-minded to this and our government is open-minded to this," Morrison told reporters.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said he had recently spoken to Morrison and welcomed the Australian policy shift.

**Honduran migrant**  
**caravan headed**  
**to US border**

OCOTOPEQUE, Honduras — A caravan of hundreds of Honduran migrants crossed the Guatemalan border under a broiling sun Monday hoping to make it to new lives in the United States.

Singing the Honduran national anthem, praying and chanting, "Yes, we can," the group estimated at 1,600 or more defied an order by the Guatemalan government that they not be allowed to pass.

"We have rights," the migrants shouted.

Keilin Umana, a 21-year-old who is two months pregnant, said she was moved to migrate to save herself and her unborn child after she was threatened with death.

"A letter arrived at my house saying I could not stay, that I had to leave, or else they were going to kill me," said Umana, who is a nurse.

*Trump: 'Rogue killers' could be behind writer's disappearance*

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump suggested Monday that "rogue killers" could be responsible for the mysterious disappearance of Saudi journalist Jamal Khashoggi, an explanation offering U.S. ally Saudi Arabia a possible path out of a global diplomatic firestorm. The Saudis continued to deny they killed the writer, but there were indications the story could soon change.

While Trump commented at the White House, Turkish crime scene investigators finally entered the Saudi consulate to comb the building where Khashoggi was last seen alive two weeks ago.

Trump spoke after a personal 20-minute phone call with Saudi King Salman and as the president

dispatched his secretary of state to Riyadh for a face-to-face discussion with the king. Late in the day, there were published reports that the Saudis were preparing to concede that Khashoggi, a U.S.-based Saudi contributor to The Washington Post, had been killed in an interrogation gone wrong.

"The king firmly denied any knowledge of it," Trump told reporters as he left the White House for a trip to survey hurricane damage in Florida and Georgia. Trump said he didn't "want to get into (Salman's) mind," but he added, "it sounded to me like maybe these could have been rogue killers. I mean, who knows? We're going to try getting to the bottom of it very soon, but his was a flat denial."

Khashoggi, a critic of the Saudi government and in particular Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, was last seen entering the consulate on Oct. 2 to get

paperwork for his upcoming marriage to a Turkish woman. Turkish officials have said he was killed and dismembered.

In a sign of new cooperation between Turkey and Saudi Arabia that could shed light on the disappearance, Turkish investigators wearing coveralls and gloves entered the consulate Monday. It remained unclear what evidence they might be able to uncover. Earlier Monday, a cleaning crew with mops, trash bags and what appeared to be bottles of bleach walked in past waiting journalists.

Trump administration officials told The Associated Press that intelligence collected by the U.S. is inconclusive as to what actually happened to Khashoggi. With such a lack of clarity, the administration has not ruled out any possible scenario. The officials were not authorized to comment publicly on the matter and requested anonymity.

**Gov't wants pharma ads to disclose drug prices**

TRENTON, N.J. — The federal government said Monday that it wants to force drugmakers to disclose prices for prescription medicines in their TV commercials.

The drug industry's main trade group said drug companies are only willing to disclose the prices on their websites, not in commercials, and

they'll start doing that next spring.

Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar unveiled a proposal that would apply to all brand-name drugs covered by the Medicare and Medicaid programs, which is most medicines.

"Patients deserve to know what a given drug could cost when they're being told about the benefits and risks it may have," Azar said in prepared

remarks. "They deserve to know if the drug company has pushed their prices to abusive levels. And they deserve to know this every time they see a drug advertised to them on TV."

Most Americans don't pay the full price for prescriptions — one reason drugmakers have opposed disclosing the list prices, arguing that would just confuse the public. But insurance plans base their copayments on the list

price set by drugmakers. And patients with high-deductibles plans or no insurance sometimes pay full price.

President Trump has long promised to bring down drug prices, and in May, his administration released a "blueprint" with vague proposals for doing so, including exploring listing prices in TV commercials.

Hours before Azar's announcement, the trade

group Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America, known as PhRMA, said its 33 member companies agreed to include in commercials a website that would give the drug's list price, the range of likely out-of-pocket costs and any available financial assistance. The group also plans its own website, where patients could look up drugs by name and find similar information.



## Pirates go down swinging

*Hernando eliminates Crystal River from postseason in three sets*

LECANTO — A tough season may have come to a close Monday night for the Crystal River volleyball team, but the Pirates didn't go down without a fight in the District 6A-7 opener at Lecanto High School against Hernando.

But that's when Balogh took over for the Leopards. She recorded a block, had four kills in a row and added another block to cap off an 11-0 Hernando run and all of a sudden it was a 14-6 Leopard lead. The Pirates would not get closer than seven points the rest of the set.



# Warriors roll into tonight's 2A-4 semifinals

LECANTO — Step one successfully navigated for Seven Rivers Christian's volleyball squad. Step two comes tonight and, if there is a message to be delivered to the Warriors by their coach, Steve Stack, it was that the regular season is over.

To keep playing now, you've got to keep winning.

In Monday's victory over Spring Hill Classical Prep in an opening-round match in the District 2A-4 tournament, Seven Rivers proved it was the better team. By far. It's 25-9, 25-15, 25-9 triumph supplied any testimony needed.

But it wasn't a dominant-type win. Too often, the Warriors took control of the match, then surrendered it with a mistake. Or, as Stack described it,

Bayshore Christian, the top seed in the South. Seven Rivers' district semifinal will be at 7 p.m. tonight at home.


Classical Prep coach Jimmy Barbarise knew his team was facing a steep climb against Seven Rivers.

# Struggling Bucs fire Smith

TAMPA — Mike Smith is out as defensive coordinator of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, replaced by linebackers coach Mark Duffner.

Riding a three-game losing streak and not showing any signs of being able to fix a porous unit that keeps undermining the team's chances of winning, the Bucs dismissed the former Atlanta Falcons coach Monday after yielding 92 points in the first half of consecutive losses to Pittsburgh, Chicago and Atlanta.

Tampa Bay, which has the NFL's second-ranked offense and No. 1 passing attack, rallied to make two of those games close, however pressure on coach Dirk Koetter to make a change had been mounting since Mitchell Trubisky threw a career-best six touchdown passes in the Bears' 48-10 rout of the Bucs on Sept. 30.

The day after the loss to Chicago, Koetter said he had no intentions of dismissing Smith because the defensive woes were not the fault of any one person.

The Bucs had a bye after that game, but having an extra week to prepare for Atlanta didn't turn out to be an advantage. The Falcons gained 219 yards and scored touchdowns on their first three possessions to open a 21-6 lead before holding on late for a 34-29 victory that apparently sealed Smith's fate.

"I have the utmost respect for Mike Smith as a man and as a football coach," Koetter said. "These decisions are always difficult, but our top priority here is to ensure that we do everything possible to help this team succeed."


Through five games, the Bucs (2-3) are 31st in total defense at 439.8 yards per game. They're last in pass defense (355.6), while also allowing a league-high 34.6 points per game.

Opponents have scored 30 or more points four times, including 40-plus twice.

"I thought it was important that both sides of the ball be able to go through the self-scouting process during the bye week to see if we could make some adjustments that would help us play better as a football team," Koetter said, explaining the decision to keep Smith after the loss to Chicago.

"I do think we had a good plan on defense for Atlanta. We did a lot of things we planned to do. We did some things differently. It just didn't work out that way," Koetter added. "This is a production business. We have to play better on defense. We have to play better as a football team."

Smith coached the Falcons from 2008 to 2014. He sat out a year after being fired in Atlanta, where Koetter served as his offensive coordinator, and joined the Bucs when Koetter succeeded Lovie Smith as Bucs coach after the 2015 season.

# Monopoli takes advantage of late-race caution

With caution out, Monopoli found herself restarting the event outside the race leader with only nine laps to go.

Once the field went back to race action Monopoli immediately pressured Burkhalter for the lead. Burkhalter fought back and kept Monopoli on the outside lane before he lost the top spot.

"He drove me up (the track) a few times," Monopoli said of the battle with Burkhalter for the lead. "I just told myself to hold on and stuck through it."

Monopoli went on to win the event by 0.474 seconds over Rich Clouser, Leroy Moore, Burkhalter, Haag, Brandon Pletcher, Adam Briggs, Jeffrey White, Colt Cecil and Carter Brown.

A new track record was put in the books in the Pro Truck division during qualifying for the Pro Truck 50. Monopoli initially set the night's fast time with a 14.444 second, 62.310 mph lap time on her fifth and final qualifying lap. That record, however,

Shannon Kennedy took the Liberty Tax Street Stock 25 wire-to-wire to win his first event of the season. Joe Gerard finished second, Danny Maddox third, Shawn Bailey fourth and Dwight Benson fifth. Points leader and division hot show Dillon Sivils

failed to finish the event after a heated battle with Kennedy early in the 25-lap race forced him off the track in a cloud of smoke due to an unknown mechanical failure.

"I could feel him on my back bumper," Kennedy said after competing with Sivils. "He was quick."

Saturday's race card includes the PRT Super Late Model 50, Legends Cars, Mini Stocks and Modified Mini. Gates open at 5:30 p.m. Race action starts at 6:30 p.m.

# Burnett leads Panthers to district repeat

'Canes, Pirates advance three

CITRUS HILLS — What would it be like if the Lecanto High School girls golf team repeated as the district champions? For a young squad made up of three sophomores, two juniors and a freshman, it might just mean more to come.

"That'd be awesome," Panthers coach Doug Warren said. "That would just mean we could go back-to-back-to-back. We can only get better. It'd great because we can just keep on improving."

Lecanto is well on its way of doing just that after taking the 2A-7 crown for the second year in a row Monday at the Citrus Hills Golf and Country Club. The dominant Panthers took first overall with a score of 385, ahead of the only other full lineup in South Sumter which finished with a 519.

It helped that the low medalist on the day was sophomore Panther Wyndom Burnett, who carded a 2-under 68 — 19 strokes better than the runner-up who also happened to be Lecanto freshman Hannah Shortt. Burnett, who finished No. 5 in the state last season, was paired with her younger teammate throughout the

18 holes played Monday.

Not a bad way to start the week — apart from the golfers spending close to six hours out in the heat.

"I think it went pretty well," Burnett said. "Playing with another teammate definitely helps your attitude. I feel like we both fed off of one another. Playing with a different person who doesn't know the course as well, you definitely have the upper hand, but with a teammate, you're able to communicate a lot better. Having someone on your side playing with you ups your positivity."

There was plenty to be positive about for Lecanto. In addition to boasting the district low medalist and runner-up, the Panthers also had the fourth best finish on the day in sophomore Trinity Keeran. Seeing as how Lecanto and South Sumter were the only teams with a full roster, that also meant each would advance to the regional meet as a team. This left Crystal River and Citrus to advance three of its four total players.

The Pirates and Hurricanes have been struggling with roster size throughout the season, but that won't diminish each team's presence in next week's Region 3 meet. Crystal River's lone golfer,

freshman Megan Allen, impressed with a third-place finish at 105.

"I feel like it's more pressure on her maybe (being the team's only golfer), but she played well — it's her freshman year, first time in districts," Pirates coach Brennan McNally said. "She's got to be able to putt though. Her putting could change her score 10 strokes if she putts what she normally does. She knows though. Practice makes perfect. I'm proud of her. Her

temperament throughout the entire course was something to be proud of."

As for Citrus, two sisters will move on in sophomores Brycelyn and Camryn Dempsey, who carded a 134 and 126, respectively.

"I figured that two of our three would move on," Citrus coach Dana Rise said. "But Ally (Loggins) did really well on the front nine and she's only a freshman. Hopefully we'll have a full team next season so she'll be able to move onto regionals then."

Also advancing for the Panthers, who will be looking to repeat as regional champs, are Julia Farrel and Riona Westphal.

The regional meet will take place Oct. 22 at Sugar-mill Woods Country Club, a course Burnett is very familiar with and confident on.

"She should be," Warren said. "That's a course she plays a lot on top of everything else. She plays well no matter what though."

Though confidence is

key and Burnett figures to be a favorite to advance to state again, there's no such thing as perfect — no matter how much her scorecard would beg to differ.

"I'm just trying to work on the short game and getting it as sharp as it can be," she said. "Because if you have a good short game it can save you from pretty much everything."

The Class 2A State Championship is scheduled for Nov. 2-3 at Mission Inn Resort (Howey-in-the-Hills).

## Play it smart

Review your benefits now

During the fall and as the holidays approach, it's easy to forget to take advantage of your insurance benefits. Early October is a good time to review your outstanding health care needs and take full advantage of paid-up deductibles or available funds in flexible spending accounts.

"In considering their health care needs, people should also consider the best strategy for using their available health insurance plan benefits," said Dr. Johnnie R. DeGraw, family medicine. "Take advantage of unused benefits to complete outstanding treatments or recommended tests or procedures before the year ends."

Most health insurance plans have a deductible requirement — a predetermined amount of health care expense that must be covered before the plan begins paying the majority of (if not all) remaining expenses. DeGraw said it's crucial to know how close you are to meeting your deductible — or if you've already met it "because once you reach that threshold, you have a limited window of opportunity to obtain health care services and have the bulk of that expense covered by your plan. Remember: a new year brings a new deductible," he said.

The close of 2018 also affects individuals who have flexible spending accounts (FSAs) — which are pre-tax dollars set aside primarily for health-related expenses. The Internal Revenue Service requires those funds to be spent — or forfeited — by Dec. 31. It's a "use it or lose it" proposition, said DeGraw.

If you have been putting off scheduling care, such as an annual check-up, allergy testing or knee-replacement surgery, it would be wise to check your deductible status and your FSA balance to see if there's money to be saved.

"It's important to schedule services promptly so there is enough time to have the test or elective procedure done before the end of the year. Getting everything squared-away by early December will help ensure the services you receive are considered part of your 2018 coverage," DeGraw said.

Every health plan is different. It is important to know how your plan works so you can get the most from your benefits.

# Regular exercise lowers cancer risk

Through the years, I have discussed many different factors that are related to our risk of developing cancer.

These factors range from diet, alcohol utilization, tobacco utilization and our level of physical fitness. Now even more data supports the fact that regular exercise will decrease your chance of developing cancer.

In a recent study, researchers found that only three percent of adults in the United States were aware of the fact that physical activity and regular exercise can lower your

risk of cancer. To me, this is an extremely concerning fact and indicates a need to inform the public of the benefits of regular exercise.

This study, conducted by researchers at the Division of Public Health Sciences at Washington University in St. Louis and recently published in the Journal of Health Communication, highlights the importance of notifying everyone in this country about the potential health benefits of regular exercise.

Now, to be honest, most of us hate to exercise,

while some of us actually love it. But as one would expect, people who are unaware of the link of exercise and better health will be much less motivated to participate in any type of regular physical activity or exercise.

In this study, the researchers surveyed 360 adults across the United States with the average age of the study participants being 47 years old. Researchers asked the participants to name three illnesses that can be caused by failing to exercise enough and participate in physical activities. Sadly, only 44 percent of participants were able to name three different health-related issues tied to a lack of exercise.

It was somewhat encouraging,

however, to note that 65 percent of the adults in this study were able to associate the fact that being overweight is associated with a higher risk of diabetes and heart disease. Fewer participants realized that a lack of exercise can be associated with problems involving the muscles and bones of our body, including muscle loss, osteoporosis, as well as neurologic situations such as depression and stress.

From my standpoint as an oncologist, it is very disappointing to note that only 3 percent of people who were surveyed listed an increased risk of cancer and its link to lack of exercise.



This study does, however, highlight the fact that many people do not understand that physical activity cannot only reduce your risk of diabetes and heart disease by helping you to lose weight, but we need to make sure that everyone understands that these same activities can be beneficial for your overall health and can decrease your risk of cancer.

So why don't more people know about this link? Part of it is that in this country, we have emphasized physical activity and maintaining a normal

body weight to be associated with assisting with lowering our risk of heart disease and diabetes, but we have never really gotten the word out to the public about the benefit of developing cancer.

Current recommendations regarding exercise suggest that people in this country should try to perform 115 minutes of moderate intensity exercise every single week. This can be walking, riding a bicycle, swimming or running. With this amount of exercise, there is a tremendous amount of scientific evidence out there that states that higher levels of physical activity are associated with lowering the risk of colon cancer,

breast cancer and endometrial cancer.

So, the take-home message is we all need to exercise more, and for those of us who don't like to exercise, like myself, it is time to get up and get back into a healthy routine.

This year, President Madeline Markowitz and three past Crystal River Woman's Club presidents who serve on the Florida Federation Board as pages — Becky Culver, Holly Oder and myself — represented the Crystal River Club.

For the second time, Florida has adopted "Operation Smile" as their two-year project. Many club members were able to tour abroad to the area and observe the transformation of children, teens and adults as medical volunteers brought them the gift of a smile. No longer would they be bullied as children and teens

and told they were ugly, even monsters. It is a lonely, solitary life for many. Socialization is practically nonexistent.

During the past administration, one club member told of a teen who chose her to be the one to receive his first kiss after his surgery. What a worthy project—Operation Smile!

I'd like to share a few leadership qualities and secrets I received at this year's Fall Board meeting in Orlando that could be of help in any volunteer organization:

- Do not depend upon luck, rather always trust your future to hard work, stamina, tenacity and a positive attitude.

- Adequate training is the strength of members and is essential and cannot be disregarded by leaders.

- Every member has value.

- Great leaders accept failure at some things in order to excel in more important ones.

- Put the most capable person in charge, give them the responsibility, the guidelines and authority and hold them

responsible.

- Leaders always aim high, going after things that will make a difference, rather than seeking the safe path of mediocrity.

- Leaders must remember that hospitality, warmth and courtesy will captivate even the most oppressive foe.

- Followers are best prepared when given appropriate challenges at successively higher levels of responsibility. If it would be easy to be a leader, everyone would be one.

- Leaders develop the ability to ask the right questions at the right time.

- A leader can never be in charge if she rides at the rear.

Here are just a few highlights of this year's amazing meeting:

- The theme of this year's Fall Board was "Suitcase of Smiles."

- Jolie Franfurth, GFWC Treasurer, shared with us the telling question, "How many people does it take to make a difference?" We know the answer — it's one person. Each of us have certain gifts to share specially designed to make a better life for others, living the volunteer spirit.

- Wendy Finklea, director of programs for Arts-4 All Florida/

VSA, shared the vision of the Florida 67 Counties program celebrating the gifts of artists; cultural programs for all.

- Barbara Beck, President of Habitat For Humanity of Florida (which builds 700 new homes every year with 0-percent mortgages) told us an average Habitat home has three bedrooms with a \$600 payment per month, and that volunteering with Habitat boosts a person's self-esteem. We learned that Habitat volunteers do repair work from hurricanes. (When a homeowner gets a home, their story begins!)

- Nine-hundred bras were collected for needy young women.

- There were 444 clubwomen at the Fall Board meeting.

- The Read Across America Book Sale garnered \$2,200 and 96 books were donated to four local Orlando schools.

- Workshops we attended and paged were International Outreach, Education, Public Issues, Domestic Violence, Conservation, and Home Life.

- Conservation includes planting a tree for Arbor Day on Jan. 18, 2019 because trees breathe life into our atmosphere by absorbing carbon dioxide

and exhaling oxygen, absorbing airborne particles, cooling the air and providing shade and homes for wildlife.

- The Soles 4 Souls project, founded by a Disaster Relief organization, provides gently-worn shoes for distribution to people in need in 127 countries and all 50 states.

- The Home Life Committee volunteers with care centers and veterans and provides Vials For Life with vital information that could save your life when you have a medical emergency. This group also volunteers for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and the March of Dimes for Healthful Pregnancies and Suicide Prevention.

Victoria Rusu-Ebert shared with us that Operation Smile helps heal the smiles of more than 20,000 patients a year with the help of many community partnerships, including GFWC Woman's Clubs across the nation, including our Crystal River club.






