# Fix violations or face the judge

"We all have those houses in our communities. Hopefully this will take care of it."

Most people clear up code violations when brought to their attention, but commissioners have a message to the minority who ignore warnings and fines: You're in for a rude awakening.

Citrus County commissioners on Tuesday unanimously

approved a code compliance ordinance that allows the county to haul violators into

county court 60 days after they've been cited.

Commissioner Brian Coleman, who spearheaded the changes, said the ordinance goes into effect immediately, allowing the county to whittle away at hundreds of backlogged code cases where violators have been fined but violations continue.

Property owners who then ignore a judge's order to clear the

violation could find themselves back in court with a contempt violation — and jail time.

"I don't think anyone in this room wants to go to jail," Coleman said.

Coleman said the largest complaint from residents is related to code compliance, such as junkyard conditions or abandoned vehicles in someone's yard. While 94 percent of

violations are cleared within 30 to 60 days, Coleman said, those that aren't can go on for years with no true enforcement other than \$50-a-day fines compiled as property liens that are not paid unless the property is sold.

The new ordinance gives code officers and fire inspectors the ability to issue citations on the spot for dangerous

### Sheriff seeks missing woman

Citrus County Sheriff's Office investigators are asking for the public's help in locating a missing woman.

Rebecca Raquel Del Campo, 39, was last seen wearing black pants and a pink top at 10 p.m. on Oct. 31, but was not reported missing until Nov. 9, according to the sheriff's office.

Del Campo is 5 feet 7 inches tall, weighs about 135 pounds and



has brown hair and eyes. She might be in Inverness or Hernando, driving a black 2005 Pontiac Grand Am with a Virginia license plate.

### School route gets \$1.08M

Citrus County commissioners on Tuesday unanimously approved \$1.08 million in impact fees for the Citrus County School District to construct an emergency evacuation route from the Roger Weaver Educational Complex in Lecanto.

The school district is in the process of designing an emergency exit route from the educational complex off County Road 491. The complex houses five schools and administrative offices, and is accessible from Educational Path, a windy road off County Road 491.

Because of the road's configuration, school board members have concerns about getting school buses out of the complex to the highway.

## After accidents elsewhere, parents, deputies urge motorists to be careful

Angela Wenig can't count the number of close calls she and her two children had with passing cars while they've waited for the school bus off Roosevelt Boulevard.

"People not paying attention, swerving over. It's bad," Wenig said as her son and daughter, ages 6 and 11, played with other children next to the Beverly Hills roadway as vehicles cruised by. "People need to slow down, they're going to hit one of our kids."

habit of speeding down the 1.8-mile road, which has a speed limit of 25 mph. Just down the street from the Wenig

bus stop, a Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputy pulled over a car for going too fast.

Once during the four years

Wenig's has taken her kids to the bus stop, a car even traveled into the road's bike lane and would not move over for her and other parents flagging them down.

"We have some people that do the speed limit, but then we have others who are in a rush for work, and they are excessively speeding. It's 25 and they're doing 50," Wenig said.

More than 10,000 Citrus students travel to school by bus, according to the Citrus County School District's transportation department.

For the past few months, workers have been making cosmetic improvements, and the results will be on display during Thursday's grand reopening sale.

"We have enjoyed being part of the Crystal River community, and we are very excited to unveil a new experience to our guests," Bealls senior vice president Matt Beall said in a press release.

**Man won't fight child porn charges**

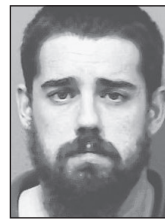

A Tennessee man will no longer fight allegations he solicited pornographic images and videos from a local girl last year, and is expected to serve a couple of years in prison.

On Tuesday, Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard scheduled Clinton Emory Caudill's change-of-plea hearing for Dec. 19, when the 29-year-old will substitute his not-guilty plea with one of no contest.

Assistant State Attorney Shannon Schlarf said Caudill faces between four and 35 years in prison for his three felony charges of using a child in a sexual performance, promoting a child's sexual performance and soliciting a child for unlawful sexual conduct.

Caudill's change of plea will be in exchange for Schlarf's downward-departure offer of two years imprisonment followed by five years of sex-offender probation,

which Schlarf said she offered so that Caudill's alleged victim would not have to go through depositions.

Authorities in the Volunteer State extradited Caudill to Florida in July on a Citrus County warrant alleging he extorted a then-9-year-old girl into sending him illicit images of herself online last October.

According to prior reports, Caudill falsified social media profiles and posed as a

14-year-old boy to gain the girl's trust and obtain her photos over the course of a few days.

Caudill also threatened to release the material to the girl's family and friends if she did not comply.

After being informed by the girl's mother, Citrus County Sheriff's Office investigators were able to connect Caudill to the fake profiles.

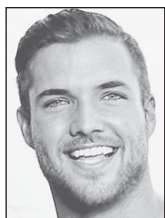

Jordan Kimball is returning to Citrus County this weekend, hoping once again to lend his "Bachelorette" fame to a worthy cause.

Jordan will join his dad, John Kimball, and family at a car wash Saturday in Crystal River, the first of three to raise money to buy bicycles for needy children this Christmas.

The first car wash is from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Advance

Auto Parts parking lot, 6850 State Road 44, Crystal River, near the Citrus Springs Shopping Center, where Publix is located. Two others are planned on Saturdays at the same time and place: Dec. 1 and Dec. 15.

John Kimball, the store manager, said every year the store has car-wash events and gives the money to the Bible Baptist Church in Crystal River, which uses it to buy bicycles for Christmas presents.

"This will be our sixth year,"

Kimball said. "I don't think a lot of folks realize how many people struggle at Christmastime."

Last year the car washes raised about \$1,000 — enough to buy 25 to 28 bicycles from Walmart, which offers the church a discount. This year, he said, he'd like to raise enough for 50 bikes.

Jordan, a Crystal River High School graduate who starred on "Bachelorette" and its spinoff, "Bachelor in Paradise," parlayed his now widespread name recognition into the Manatee Fun Run in August that raised

funds and awareness for Anna's Foundation, which supports families of stillborn children.

Jordan is now under contract with ABC for a yet-to-be decided project. He is traveling the U.S. and Canada modeling and pursuing a new career in public speaking.

"He's all over the place," John Kimball said. "He really enjoys motivational speaking — teaching self-love and confidence. He's very well-spoken."

**Florida's effort to find non-citizen voters had slim results**

TALLAHASSEE — Contrary to what's claimed in a tweet by Donald Trump Jr., an effort by Florida to find non-citizens on its voter rolls did not result in the discovery of tens of thousands of illegal voters.

In the past few days, some Republicans and conservatives have latched onto a six-year-old story that detailed efforts by the administration of Gov. Rick Scott to identify and remove ineligible voters. The president's son even tweeted out a link Monday to the May 2012 story by

The Associated Press. The headline on the story said "Nearly 200,000 Florida voters may not be citizens."

Ultimately, however, the push by the Scott administration did not come anywhere close to finding that many non-citizens. Instead the state of Florida discovered a total of 207 ineligible voters.

**Police: Suspected shoplifter runs over woman outside store**

OCOOE — Police in central Florida said a woman was hit by a getaway driver who was assisting a man who had just stolen a cart full of groceries. Ocoee police told new outlets the

woman and another woman alerted a Publix grocery store manager that the theft was taking place Monday night. When they got outside the store, the man had already put the groceries in the trunk of a car.

Police said as one woman tried to take a picture, the car backed up and hit her twice. Authorities said she injured her legs but is expected to be OK. Police are searching for the two men.

**Man tells 911 dispatcher he fatally shot his dad**

TARPON SPRINGS — Police said a 25-year-old Florida man called 911

and told dispatchers he shot his father.

Tarpon Springs police said in a news release that the call came in at 1:02 a.m. Tuesday. When officers arrived at the home, they found a 68-year-old man dead in a third-floor bedroom.

Police said the two men shared the home.

Investigators took the son into custody and were interviewing him on Tuesday morning.

The names of the father and son haven't been released.

Authorities said they were the only two at the home when the shooting happened.

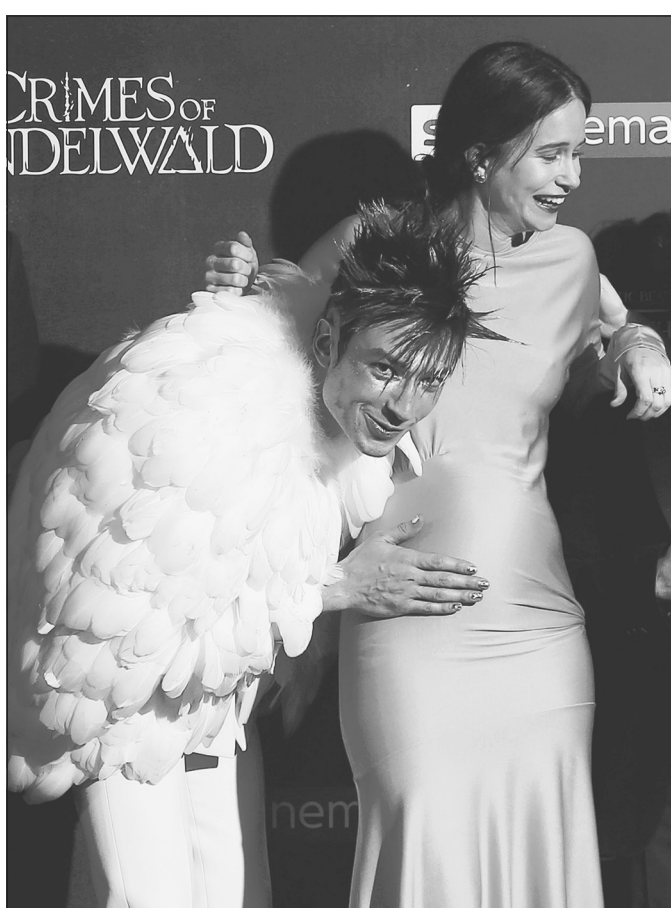

Cornell died in May 2017 at age 52. His death was ruled a suicide.

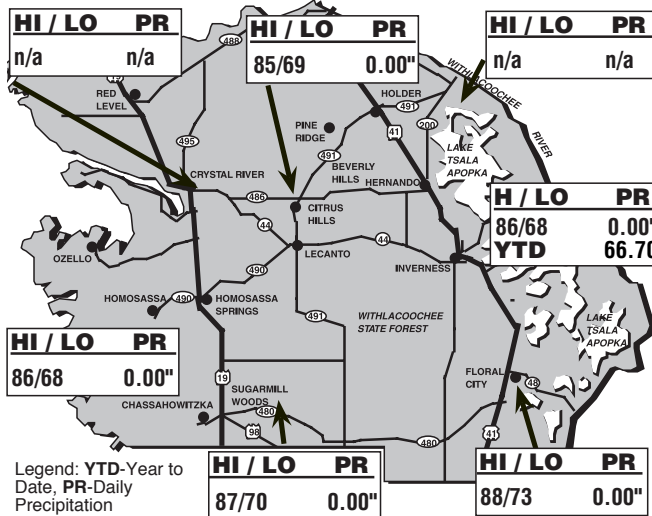
## Cardi B, Chance, T.I. to judge hip-hop competition series

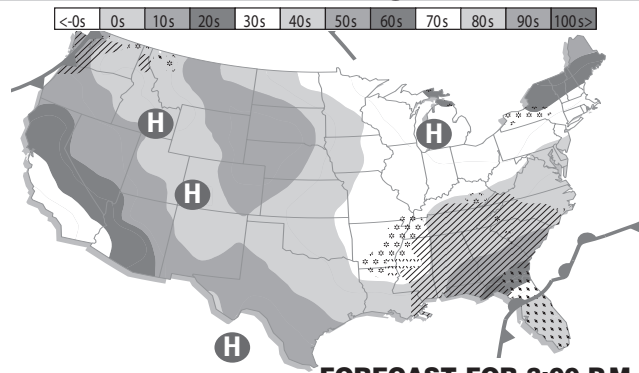

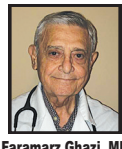

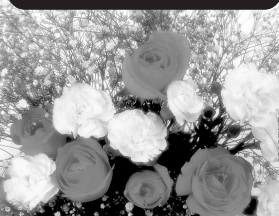

conditions or in situations that are not curable, such as someone illegally clear-cutting trees from property.

Other violations will go through the routine process of a 30-day notice. If there is no compliance, the county could issue a notice that if the violation is not cleared within another 30 days, the property owner must appear in county court.

Coleman said the new ordinance should make a significant dent in the number of code violation cases of neighborhood eyesores that have dragged on for years.

"We all have those houses in our communities," he said. "Hopefully this will take care of it."

relatives frequently stand with their young ones alongside bustling county roadways to wait for the bus, in part to keep an eye on the traffic passing by.

They've recently been given reason to be even more vigilant.

Near Rochester, Indiana, a truck struck and killed two twin 6-year-old boys and their 9-year-old sister and injured an 11-year-old boy Oct. 30 when the children were crossing a roadway.

Police arrested a 24-year-old woman in connection with the deaths and charged her with three counts of reckless homicide. She told authorities she didn't see the school bus or children in time to stop.

Just two days later, a vehicle struck and injured three children and two adults at a bus stop in Tampa.

"Our hearts go out to the families. It is astounding what happens to a car when people aren't paying attention," Citrus County Sheriff's Office Deputy Russell Howard said. "We're blessed that we

haven't had anything like that, and I'm very thankful for that."

Howard has tallied up roughly 15 years of experience patrolling and writing up traffic violators in Citrus County.

Howard will soon rejoin the sheriff's eight-deputy Traffic Unit, which focuses on investigating crashes, enforcing speed limits, setting up DUI checkpoints, escorting parades and following up on traffic complaints.

These deputies also stage in and around designated school zones and bus stops to curb speeders and distracted drivers with their presence and traffic stops.

"Take the extra time, even if it means leaving the house a minute early ... and don't be impatient," Howard said. "I understand everybody's got a place to go ... but it's not worth somebody getting hurt or losing their life."

Howard said no particular signaled school zone in Citrus County is more prone to lawbreakers.

"We have had our share of complaints ... and we try to curb the problem immediately," Howard said. "At all school zones, you're going to have

## Bus Stop Safety Tips

### FOR PARENTS

- Familiarize your children with their bus stop, arrive five minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive, stand at least six feet away from the curb and wait until the bus stops before boarding.

- Never let children walk or cross behind a bus. Children should make eye contact with bus drivers before crossing a street in front of them.

### FOR DRIVERS

- Watch out for children when backing out of a driveway or garage.

- Watch out and slow down for children gathering near a bus stop.

- Slow down in school zones and pay attention to children darting into the street on their way to school.

- Learn and obey school bus laws. A bus' yellow flashing lights means the bus is about to stop to load or unload children. Flashing red lights and extended stop arms and signs mean motorists must stop.

someone who doesn't pay attention.

"There's a slew of excuses," Howard added, "but the whole point is, it doesn't matter the excuse. If you harm a child or something happens, did it matter?"

Marilyn Farmer, director of the district's

transportation department, said her drivers' biggest concern is motorists blowing by a bus that's stopping.

"Right as the reds are going on, they try to beat

the light," Farmer said, referencing the stop bar and stop signs that are extended from the bus as it slows to pick up or drop off children.

Per Florida law, vehicles traveling behind the bus and in adjacent travel lanes not separated by a raised, unpaved or barricaded divider or median must stop in both directions for a signaled bus. But whether it's because of ignorance or impatience, motorists disregard the law.

"And that always surprises me because it's a big yellow bus with lights flashing everywhere," Farmer said.

Many bus stops are next to a major road, because that's where the majority of people live, and relocating a stop to a side-street could endanger children because they'd be forced to walk down a highway to get there, Farmer said.

In her 17 years with the department, Farmer can't recall an incident where a vehicle has unlawfully travelled on the same side of the bus where kids have gotten on, but knowing what could happen

because of inattentiveness is enough to make them cringe.

"It's everyone's worst nightmare," Farmer said.

Bus drivers and sheriff's deputies communicate through radio channels and school resource officers to warn each other of negligent drivers, vehicle crashes and suspicious characters near bus stops.

Farmer said while it's hard for deputies to track down offenders, they're responsive and proactive in making sure motorists' bad driving doesn't escalate.

"We don't want to wait until tragedy occurs, we want to nip it in the bud," Howard said, adding the sheriff's office will keep enacting traffic-safety campaigns, like its "Stop Or Be Stopped" initiative, to educate drivers and put them on notice.

Wenig also suggested speed bumps be installed at major bus stops to help remind motorists to slow down for buses and kids.

"Nobody wants to see anyone's child get killed," she said. "Eventually, it's going to happen — here."

# FDLE chief 'troubled' by Bondi assertions

TALLAHASSEE — The commissioner of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement said he is "deeply troubled" that Attorney General Pam Bondi thought he would not pursue investigations into potential criminal activity related to last week's elections.

In a letter Monday to Bondi, Commissioner Rick Swearingen wrote that his office was working with the secretary of state and local, state and federal agencies to vet complaints and that a "preliminary inquiry" had already been initiated before Bondi ripped him on Sunday for failing to pursue undefined allegations of election "fraud."

"I am deeply troubled that you think I have announced that FDLE would not be pursuing any investigations or inquiry into the conduct of elections officials in Broward and Palm Beach counties (or any other county) that may rise to criminal conduct during the 2018 election," Swearingen wrote. "I have made no such announcement."

On Sunday, Bondi's office released a two-page letter rooted, at least in part, in Gov. Rick Scott's controversial statement Thursday night that he was asking the FDLE to investigate irregularities in Broward and Palm Beach counties. Scott is locked in a fierce election battle to try to unseat Democratic U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson, while also teaming with Bondi and other members of the state Cab-

net to oversee the FDLE.

Bondi wrote in her letter Sunday to Swearingen that she was "deeply troubled" and that his "duty is not limited to investigating allegations made by the secretary of state."

Bondi also said FDLE had pointed to a lack of a written complaint in deciding not to pursue an investigation. In his letter Monday, Swearingen chalked that up to "confusion" by the media, as state law requires a written order from the governor in cases where a state employee faces suspension or removal for misconduct.

Scott and his Republican supporters have repeatedly argued that there has been "rampant fraud" and efforts to steal the election in the two heavily-Democratic counties, charges that have been

repeated in a number of lawsuits — and rebutted by Democrats.

U.S. Rep. Francis Rooney, R-Fla., in a media conference call hosted Tuesday's by Scott's campaign, talked about ballots being counted after the election and said the Republican governor will win the Senate contest if "only the legal ballots" are counted. Otherwise the race will become "mired in corruption and deceit," Rooney said.

President Donald Trump on Tuesday called in a tweet for Nelson to concede, as "the characters running Broward and Palm Beach voting will not be able to 'find' enough votes, too much spotlight on them now!"

A day earlier, Trump tweeted "that large numbers of new ballots showed

up out of nowhere, and many ballots are missing or forged."

"An honest vote count is no longer possible-ballots massively infected," Trump tweeted. "Must go with Election Night!"

On Tuesday, Palm Beach County Circuit Judge Krista Marx was critical of the allegations of corruption, as she heard Scott's request that state and local law enforcement are needed to secure voting equipment and ballots in Palm Beach County.

"Other than hearsay, there has not been any suggestion ... there hasn't been any finding by any court, or even any pleading that there's anything untoward or that nobody is properly doing their job, that there's anybody improperly doing their job," Marx said.

# Trump eyeing Homeland Security, White House shakeup

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump is weighing an administration-wide shakeup as he looks to prepare his White House for divided government, but it is unclear who is going and who is staying.

Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen was thought to be out as soon as this week, according to two people with knowledge of the issue, but she is now likely to remain in the post for a longer period because there is no obvious successor in place.

Trump has soured on Nielsen and White House chief of staff John Kelly, in part over frustration that his administration is not doing more to address what he has called a crisis at the U.S.-Mexico border, according to the people. But the scope of the contemplated changes is far broader, as Trump gears up for a wave of Democratic oversight requests and to devote more effort to his own re-election campaign.

According to people familiar with the situation, Trump is also discussing replacing Kelly with Vice President Mike Pence's chief of staff, Nick Ayers. Kelly, a retired Marine general, has been credited with bringing order and process to a chaotic West Wing, but he has fallen out of favor with the president as well as presidential

daughter Ivanka Trump and son-in-law Jared Kushner.

Ayers, a seasoned campaign operative, would restore a political-mindset to the role, but he faces stiff opposition from some corners of the West Wing, with some aides lobbying Trump directly against the move.

Other changes are afoot, as Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross and Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke are being discussed for replacement. And in an extraordinary move Tuesday, first lady Melania Trump's office called publicly for the firing of Trump's deputy national security adviser, Mira Ricardel.

For all of the talk of churn, Trump often expresses frustration with aides and then does not take action. Talk of Kelly's exit has percolated for

months and he remains in place.

Nielsen had hoped to complete one year in the job and leave in December, but it appeared unlikely she would last that long, said two sources. Both people who had knowledge of the debate spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly.

Curbing illegal immigration is Trump's signature issue — and one he returns to as a way to rally his most loyal supporters.

But anyone who takes over at Homeland Security is likely to run up against the same problems that Nielsen faced. The administration has already tried to clamp down at the border but those efforts have been largely thwarted or watered down

due to legal challenges.

Trump also told allies that he never fully trusted Nielsen, whom he associated with President George W. Bush, a longtime foe. And he told those close to him that he felt, at times, that her loyalty was more toward her longtime mentor — Kelly — than to the president.

Zinke, who faces several ethics investigations, said in interview with The Associated Press on Monday that he has spoken in recent days with Trump, Pence and Kelly about probes into his leadership and they remain supportive. He denied any wrongdoing.

Ross addressed turnover rumors at a Yahoo! Finance summit Tuesday, saying he was in the post to give back to the country and support Trump.

"I worked very hard to get President Trump elected," he said. "Now I'd like to work equally hard to have him succeed and be re-elected."

Questions about Nielsen's job security are not new. Earlier this year, she pushed back on a New York Times report that she drafted a resignation letter but did not submit it, after Trump scolded her at a Cabinet meeting.

**Death of black guard brings call for investigation**

CHICAGO — A suburban Chicago alderman called Tuesday for prosecutors to investigate the fatal shooting of a black security guard by a white police officer outside the bar where the guard worked.

Authorities have said little about the scene that ended early Sunday with the death of 26-year-old Jemel Roberson, who was apparently wearing a hat emblazoned with "security" across the front when he was shot outside Manny's Blue Room in Robbins, a predominantly black community just south of Chicago.

At the time, according to witnesses and a lawsuit, Roberson was attempting to detain a suspect in a separate shooting that wounded several other people at the tavern.

"Here is a security guard who is subduing a suspect," but the officer "just sees a black man with a gun and kills him," Alderman Keith Price said.

Price said he learned from witnesses that there are security cameras inside and outside the bar. He urged the Cook County State's Attorney's Office to launch an investigation.

The Illinois State Police declined to comment on their investigation.

**Photographer: 'Nazi salute' was just boys waving**

MILWAUKEE — The parent who took a photo of Wisconsin high school boys giving what appears to be a Nazi salute on the steps of a local courthouse said Tuesday he was simply asking the teens to wave goodbye to their parents before they headed to prom and never anticipated the image would draw widespread condemnation.

But Pete Gust, who has a son in the photo, said he understood why his photo of about 60 boys outside the Sauk County Courthouse in Baraboo last spring offended some people. About two-thirds of the boys have their right arms raised in the gesture, many grinning widely.

"The optics aren't good," Gust told The Associated Press, though he said he didn't believe the boys were doing a Nazi salute: "There was never any inkling of that whatsoever. ... There was nothing intended in any way shape or form to simulate anything that was offensive to anyone."

Gust maintained that his camera merely caught the boys' wave prematurely.

Many viewers of the photo felt strongly otherwise, with criticism pouring in from individuals and from Jewish organizations including the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial and Museum in Poland.

**Dems win in Arizona**

*Rep. Kyrsten Sinema to replace retiring GOP Senator Jeff Flake*

In a year of liberal challenges to President Donald Trump, an avowed centrist scored the Democratic Party's biggest coup — flipping a red state's U.S. Senate seat.

Rep. Kyrsten Sinema won the Arizona Senate seat being vacated by Republican Jeff Flake to become the first woman to win a U.S. Senate seat in the state. The race against Republican Rep. Martha McSally was tight enough that a winner wasn't decided until Monday, after a slow count of mail-in ballots gave her an insurmountable lead.

Sinema's win achieves a longtime Democratic goal of making Arizona, with its growing Latino population, a competitive state.

And she did it by pointedly not running against the president, or even critiquing his headline immigration stance.

"She didn't put the progressive bit in her mouth and run with it," said

Chuck Coughlin, a GOP strategist in Phoenix. "She spit it out and did something else."

Sinema targeted moderate Republican and independent women by painting herself as a

nonpartisan problem-solver who voted to support Trump's agenda 60 percent of the time. Her nearly single-issue campaign talked about the importance of health care and protections for people with pre-existing conditions.

She knew McSally was vulnerable there because she backed the Republicans' failed attempt to repeal President Barack Obama's health care law.

Sinema tailored her campaign for conservative-leaning Arizona rather than the national environment, but it may be a guide for Democrats who hope to expand the electoral map in 2020. While some liberals won important races in California, Colorado and Kansas, the left's highest-profile champions disappointed on Election Day.

**Cease-fire takes hold between Israel and Hamas**

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip — Hamas and other militant groups said Tuesday they had accepted an Egyptian-brokered cease-fire to end two days of intense fighting with Israel that had pushed the sworn enemies to the brink of a new war.

The sudden announcement brought relief to a region that had been paralyzed by hundreds of Palestinian rocket attacks in southern Israel and scores of Israeli airstrikes on targets in the Gaza Strip. But it did not address the deeper issues that pushed Israel and Gaza's Hamas rulers toward their latest violence and left doubts about international efforts to forge a broader truce agreement.

Those efforts had appeared to be making progress in recent days as Israel allowed Qatar to deliver financial aid to the cash-strapped Hamas government, and Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu declared that he wanted to avert an "unnecessary" war in Gaza. Hamas, in turn, had scaled back its mass protests that have led to weekly bloodshed along the Israeli border.

**Cabinet to meet after Britain, EU reach Brexit deal**

LONDON — After months of stalled talks, false starts and setbacks, negotiators from Britain and the European Union struck a proposed divorce deal Tuesday to provide for the U.K.'s smooth exit from the bloc.

But the agreement faces major political hurdles starting Wednesday, when British Prime Minister Theresa May will try to win the approval of her divided Cabinet for a deal many ministers view with skepticism.

*Some residents allowed back to view earlier devastation*

MALIBU, Calif. — Southern California's huge wildfire roared to life again Tuesday in a mountain wilderness area. But in a sign of significant progress against the blaze, more neighborhoods were reopened to thousands of residents who fled last week.

A massive plume rose suddenly at midmorning in the Santa Monica Mountains near the community of Lake Sherwood, prompting authorities to send numerous aircraft to drop fire retardant and water on the blaze.

Forecasters had warned of on-going fire danger because of persistent Santa Ana winds, the withering, dry gusts that sweep out of the interior toward the coast, pushing back moist ocean breezes.

But except for an apartment building that burned overnight in coastal Malibu, there was little sign of fire activity elsewhere in the vast fire zone west of Los Angeles.

Officials tempered optimism

with caution, saying there were hotspots and pockets of unburned vegetation.

"We are not out of the woods yet. We still have some incredibly tough conditions ahead of us," Ventura County Fire Chief Mark Lorenzen said.

The death toll from the Woolsey fire stood at two — a pair of adults found last week in a car

overtaken by flames. They have not been identified.

The number of homes and other structures destroyed had reached 435. Damage assessments were continuing, with crews having to gain access to canyon areas on foot.

"That number is going to rise significantly," Los Angeles County Fire Chief Daryl Osby said.

**Officials: Custody dispute led to slayings of eight**

WAVERLY, Ohio — A family of four was arrested Tuesday in the gruesome 2016 slayings of eight people from another family in rural Ohio in a crime that prosecutors suggested stemmed from a custody dispute, authorities said.

Ohio Attorney General

Mike DeWine said a grand jury indicted the four on aggravated murder charges and could be sentenced to death if convicted.

DeWine gave scant detail about why the victims were killed, but said the custody of a young child played a role. He said they had carefully planned the killings for months.

"There certainly was an obsession with custody,

obsession with control of children," said DeWine, who earlier this month was elected governor.

He added: "I just might tell you this is just the most bizarre story I've ever seen in being involved in law enforcement."

Authorities said marijuana growing operations were found at three of the four crime scenes. That's not uncommon in this

corner of Appalachia but stoked rumors that the slayings were related to drugs, one of many theories on possible motives that percolated in public locally.

DeWine said Tuesday "there's an undercurrent of drugs" in the case, but there's no evidence the killings were drug-related. He wouldn't elaborate.

Arrested were four members of the Wagner

family, who lived near the scenes of the killing about 60 miles south of Columbus. They've long been considered the chief suspects, DeWine said.

One of those arrested was Edward "Jake" Wagner, 26, who was a long-time former boyfriend of 19-year-old Hayna Rhoden, one of the eight victims, and shared custody of their daughter at the time of the massacre.

NEW YORK — Oakland's Bob Melvin was voted Manager of the Year for the third time, winning the American League honor Tuesday after leading the Athletics to the playoffs despite the lowest opening-day payroll in the major leagues.

Atlanta's Brian Snitker won the National League award following the Braves' surprising first-place finish.

Melvin received 18 first-place votes, 19 seconds and one third for 121 points from the Baseball Writers' Association of America. He is the eighth manager to win three or more times and is one shy of the record shared by Bobby Cox and Tony La Russa. Melvin won with Oakland in 2012 and took the NL honor with Arizona in 2007.

His A's went 97-65 — a 22-win improvement over 2017 — even with a \$68.6 million payroll when the season began. They lost to the New York Yankees in the AL wild-card game.

Boston's Alex Cora was second with seven firsts and 79 points after leading the Red Sox to a team-record 108 wins. Tampa Bay's Kevin Cash, whose innovation of using a reliever as an "opener" was copied by other teams — including Oakland — later in the season, was next with five firsts and 57 points.

Snitker received 17 firsts, nine seconds and one third for 116 points, the only manager picked on every NL ballot. Milwaukee's Craig Counsell was second with 11 firsts and for 99 points. Colorado's Bud Black was third with 41 points.

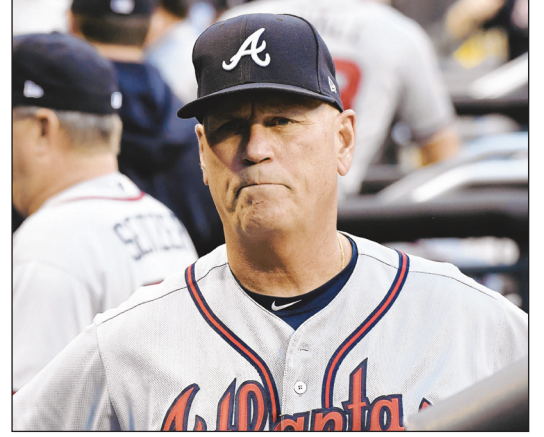
Snitker has spent 42 seasons with the Braves, managing at every level and serving as the big league third base coach from 2007-13. He was managing at Triple-A Gwinnett when took over Atlanta in May 2016 after Fredi Gonzalez was fired for a 9-28 start. The Braves went 59-65 during the rest of the season, and Snitker was given the job full-time.

Atlanta went 72-90, and then improved to 90-72 this year, when the Braves lost to the Los Angeles Dodgers in a four-game Division Series.

## Lecanto peppers Crystal River with 35 shots, wins opener 9-1

LECANTO — Lecanto turned a five-goal first half into a 9-1 rout of Crystal River in girls district play Tuesday for the soccer season opener, getting a hat trick from Tristen King.

The Panthers (1-0) continued their dominance of their cross-town rival in the latest match, controlling possession, along with most of the pitch against the Pirates (0-1). They fired a barrage of shots, tallying a blistering 35 shots on frame that goalkeeper Haylee Woodhouse did her best to stop.

The Pirates simply had no answers for the Panthers, who despite losing some talented players to graduation last season, return a strong core of seasoned players. The Panthers controlled the midfield, generated attacks from the wings and were on point with centering and crossing passes.

King netted two of her three goals in

the second half, assisting on another goal in the first frame. With the Panthers making a historic push through the state playoffs last year, King said afterward the team had a lot of motivation coming into the game.

"Just the group of girls we had coming off the final four season, I think it was just really special for us and we were ready to prove ourselves coming out onto the field and let everyone know that we can do it again," she said. "I think we were a little bit nervous but coming out but once we got out there — we took a little bit — but once we got into our routine, we did exactly what I thought we were going to do."

The Pirates, with less depth on their roster and missing three starters coming in, have had their struggles against the Panthers. They have only beaten Lecanto once in 19 meetings, with their lone win coming in a 2-0 shutout in 2010; the Panthers hold a 15-1-3 all-time series record.

"Obviously you don't want to get mercy ruled ever, especially to a county rival, but the experience level is a major gap that for us to fight for that long, I was proud of the fight. I was proud of the effort," Pirates coach Bill Reyes said. "We're going to have to learn, we're going to have to grow."

Minutes into the game, the Panthers made it clear the game was going to be a shootout. In a span of just four minutes, four shots went just wide of goal. The fifth shot — a centering pass from Kaitie Van Cleef that Kaitlin Zoucha placed in the back of the net — had the home team up 1-0.

The goal was followed by a volley of Lecanto near misses, before a Marley Spate up 2-0. King assist put the Panthers up 2-0. While the Pirates were quick to respond with an Elizabeth Salute goal that came on a centering pass from Lauren Acker to cut the deficit to 1, the celebration ended quickly.

## Top four remain the same

The College Football Playoff rankings held steady at the top, with Alabama, Clemson, Notre Dame and Michigan an unchanged first four from last week.

The third rankings of the season were drama-free Tuesday night after every top-10 team won last weekend. In fact, the selection committee's entire top 10 stayed the same, the first time that has happened in the five seasons since the CFP was born.

With three weekends left until the final selections are made on Dec. 2, Georgia was fifth and Oklahoma was sixth. LSU, Washington State, West Virginia and Ohio State rounded out the top 10.

UCF moved up one spot to No. 11 and remained the highest-ranked team from outside the Power Five conferences. The Knights on Saturday play Cincinnati, which is ranked or the first time by the selection committee this season at No. 24.

### DON'T COUNT ON STABILITY

In the four-year history of the College Football Playoff, the four teams at the top of the rankings after three weeks have never all made it to the semifinals. As much as it might feel as if the field is well set, it would be best to expect an unexpected result or two over the next three weeks.

Three not-so-outlandish upsets that could create confusion for the selection committee:

1. Alabama loses the SEC championship game to Georgia.

This could lead to the most controversial call in CFP history. The Crimson Tide is the defending national champion and Tua Tagovailoa and Co. have been stomping everyone in their path. The Tide is not losing this week to the Citadel. The chances are slim Auburn beats 'Bama at home. But even if that were to happen, Alabama could quickly redeem itself by beating Georgia to win the SEC on championship weekend. A 12-1 SEC champion Alabama is not getting left out of the playoff, nor should it under any available circumstances this season.

But 12-1 without an SEC championship? The committee has already twice sent teams that did not reach their conference title games to the playoff. Last year it was Alabama and the year before, Ohio State got there.

The committee has to be rooting for the Tide to keep it out of this mess.

2. Ohio State beats Michigan and wins the Big Ten.

Big 12 fans will disagree, but Michigan at 12-1 looks like a good bet to sail into the playoff — especially if Notre Dame finishes unbeaten, therefore making the Wolverines' only loss a one-score

PITTSBURGH — Le'Veon Bell won't play in 2018.

The star running back declined to sign his one-year \$14.4 million franchise tender with the Pittsburgh Steelers by Tuesday's deadline, making him ineligible to suit up for the AFC North-leading Steelers or anyone else this season.

The unusual decision to sit out won't prevent Bell from becoming a free agent next spring, when the three-time Pro Bowler hopes to cash in with a contract that would make him the highest-paid back in the NFL.

Steelers coach Mike Tomlin seemed resigned to Bell's decision shortly before the 4 p.m. deadline, saying simply "so be it" when asked about the possibility of Bell never returning to the team that drafted him in the second round of the 2013 draft and helped mold him into one of the league's top players.

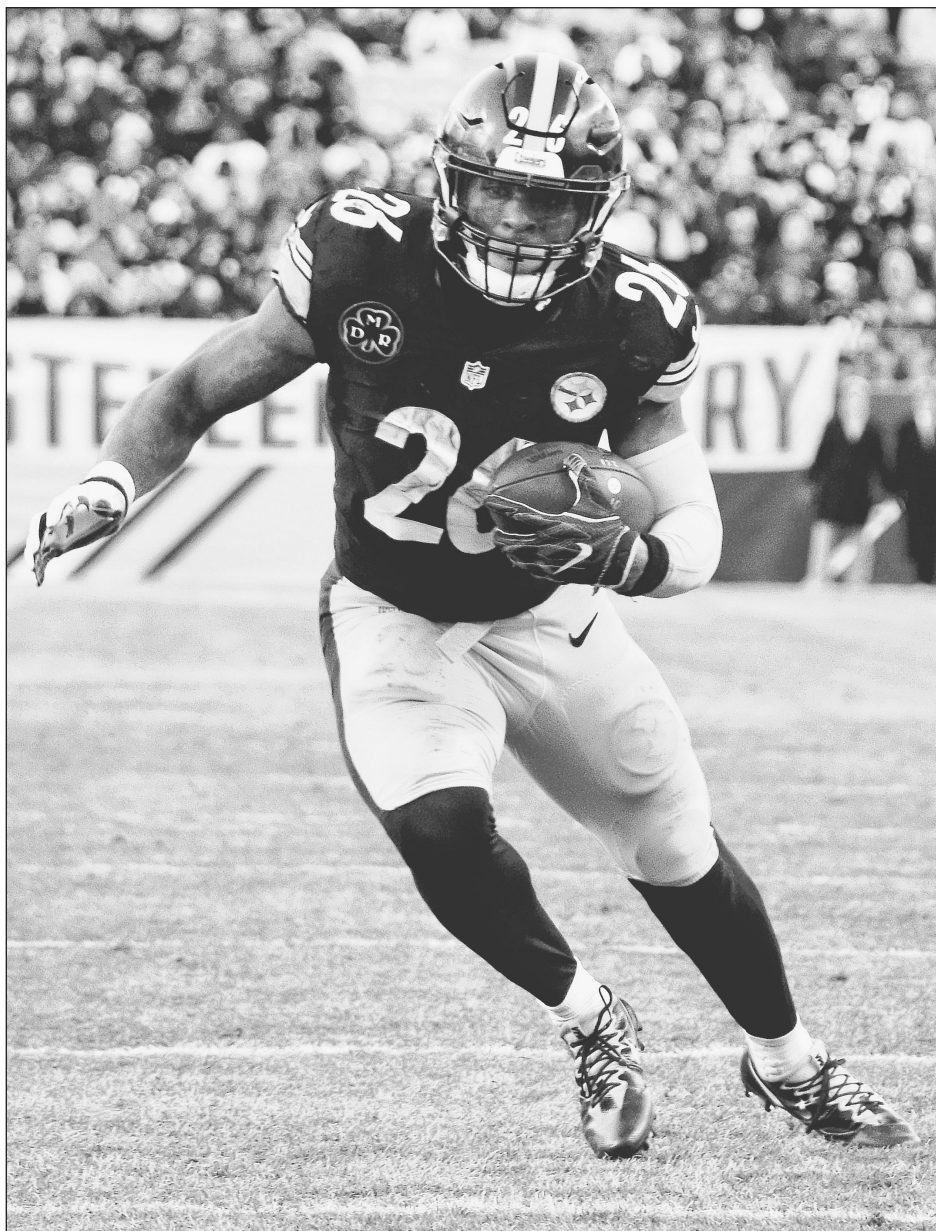
"Even when we don't understand it, we're sensitive to it, so we're not shocked when things happen from a business standpoint, no," Tomlin said.

The Steelers, who have won five straight to sprint to the top of the division heading into a visit to Jacksonville on Sunday, will turn to second-year back James Conner and reserves Stevan Ridley and rookie Jaylen Samuels to help shoulder the load with Bell out of the picture.

All season Tomlin stressed he was focused on the players in the locker room and not the ones outside it and hardly seems bothered by Pittsburgh's quest for a postseason berth without the talented 26-year-old Bell.

"That train has left the station," Tomlin said. "We're comfortable with how we function, the people at our disposal, the division of labor and our ability to ready ourselves for the challenges."

The Steelers drafted Bell with the

48th overall pick in the 2013 draft, won over by his youth, size and versatility. Along with wide receiver Antonio Brown, Bell became the linchpin in

which the Steelers rebuilt themselves on the fly as the franchise's identity shifted from away from the defense that fueled three Super Bowl appearances

in six years from 2005-2010 toward an offense that ranked among the most dynamic in the league.

The makeover relied heavily on Bell, whose patient running style became his trademark while helping Pittsburgh to four straight playoff berths.

Bell is one of only three players to be franchise tagged in consecutive seasons. The first two — linebacker Karlos Dansby and quarterback Kirk Cousins — played all 16 games during their second season under the tag then went and cashed in elsewhere in free agency.

As his star rose, Bell insisted he wasn't merely a running back, pointing to his success as a receiver — he finished 10th in the league with 85 catches in 2017 — as proof that he should be paid far above his peers.

When Bell and the Steelers failed to reach an agreement on a new deal last summer, he said "both sides worked extremely hard" in an attempt to get something done. When it didn't happen, he skipped training camp again, just as he did in 2017. His teammates stressed it was no big deal, confident Bell would show up in time for the regular-season opener.

Only he didn't. And when preparations for Pittsburgh's Week 1 trip to Cleveland began without Bell, several of his teammates — particularly the offensive line — vented their frustrations publicly.

The anger eased as the weeks passed and Conner thrived in Bell's absence while Bell remained in Florida, where encounters captured on social media found him riding a Jet Ski or hitting the club. He returned to Pittsburgh last week and even played some pickup basketball at a fitness center.

It's as close to breaking a sweat with the Steelers as Bell will get. Though the team could use the franchise or transition tag on Bell next spring, it's more likely he'll just walk away.

Now the player who would frequently place his hand on the back of an offensive lineman while waiting for a hole to open — much as a child sticking close to a parent in a crowded store — finds himself all alone in uncharted territory.

# Hutton stops 30 shots to top Bolts

# Purple heart vet speaks with students

## LHS welcomes Richard 'Bud' Allen

In honor of Veterans Day, Lecanto High School was privileged to receive a visit from local veteran Richard "Bud" Allen. The Marine Corps veteran paid a visit to English teacher Jong Ash's classes Nov. 8 and 9 to bring awareness through his presentation of the many sacrifices made by United States soldiers throughout the ages.

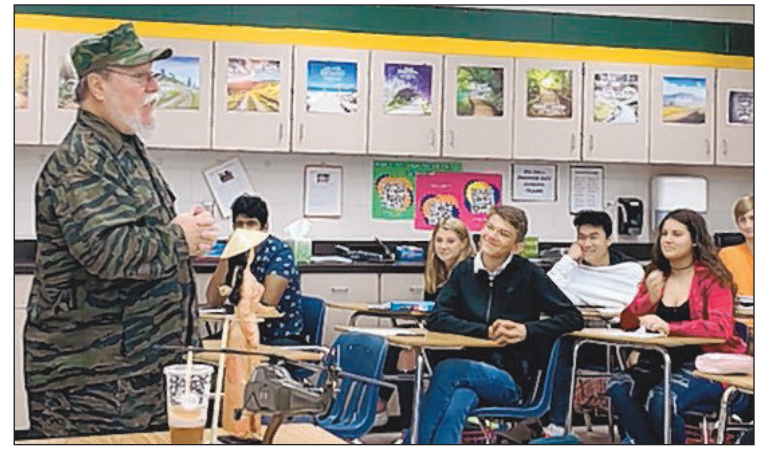
Upon his arrival in Vietnam, Allen was in complete shock at the contrast from the familiar American culture. Allen spent several years of his life serving in the Marine Corps, specifically as an aircraft electrician, during the Vietnam War. Allen

particularly worked in medical evacuation and resupplying, which meant he spent quite a bit of time transporting the wounded or deceased bodies to safer grounds, as well as bringing supplies to those in need.

"I felt I had stepped back two generations," said Allen. "I had no idea these people would be living with no water, no electricity, barely anything."

Regardless of the extreme conditions, Allen made it clear that he was grateful for his experience of service and have no regrets.

"Did I always make the best decisions? Of course not. That could be said about anybody. But it is what it is, and I still wouldn't change a thing," said Allen.

## Middle school students learn while having fun

It was all using science STEM activities, about repurposing, learning about recycling and more.

That's exactly what Lecanto's Middle School seventh-grade advanced science students in Becky Clymer's class and seventh-grade science students in Mylene Taylor's classes did when they created board games using recycled cardboard boxes.

This was a cardboard box arcade recycle project, teaching students how important it is to repurpose items to help save the environment.

"Our students began brainstorming their ideas a week before the event," said Clymer.

They had to decide what materials to use, make up rules for their games, prepare game instructions and implement prizes for the winners.

"It took them three days to build their cardboard box arcades," Clymer said.

And the students worked as teams on the environmental project.

"Each team was allotted a 2-foot by three-foot footprint," she said.

When the board games were completed, students tried their hands at each game in their classroom and had to evaluate each one of the other teams' games by scoring them. For prizes, some had tickets, while some had candy and so forth.

Next door, teacher Mylene Taylor's class was also busy trying each created game, then rating each one.

Both seventh-grade rooms were filled with various homemade cardboard games such as a claw machine, which was popular as students used a claw to pick up candy lying on the bottom. Lilly Marzallek, Jasmine Stanley, Shannon Nero and Farah Anderson made the claw machine game.

Both classes displayed many different games using "the science STEM activities, which is a STEM engineer design process," said Clymer.

Some of the other games included pinball, "down the clown," a maze, "feed the shark," foosball, air hockey, "whack a mole," ring toss, ball drop and more.

"We do this project every year," said Taylor. "Two years ago, students in my class had a pinball game that was unusual, with someone underneath the game who would tilt it at times."

"Using the STEM engineering process is part of the Florida curriculum to learn the importance of our environment and the human impact on it," Clymer added.

Lecanto Middle School students seemed to enjoy testing out each recycled game, then doing the serious job of scoring each project and entering information of their iPads.

Some students found this as an eye-opening experience, as Allen shared unimaginable stories the average person would never think of in the United States.

"The (soldiers) sacrifice

their lives and endure unthinkable conditions for us to have many privileges in this country," said junior Brian Torcuator.

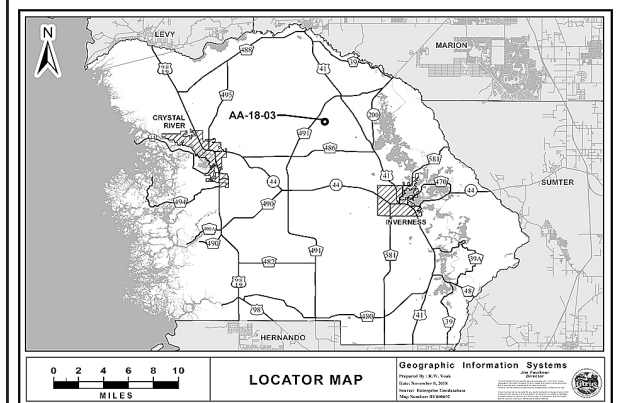

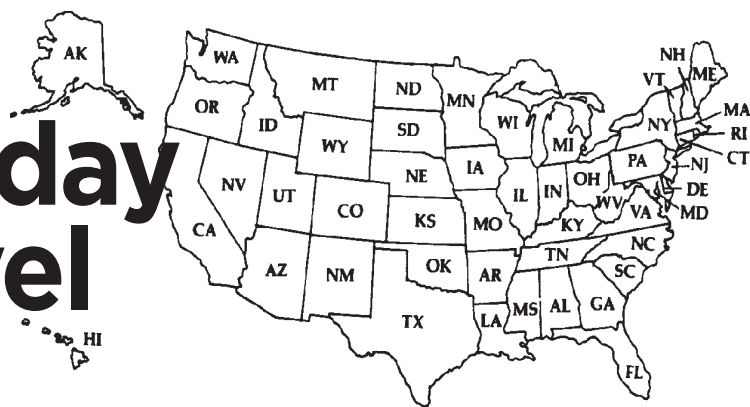

### Pumpkin Spice Cake

Dear Annie: Many years ago, I was in the U.S. military. I was sent to Southeast Asia and served three six-month tours. On my last tour, I suspected my wife had an affair, but I had no proof. While I was in training for a job after I was released from active duty, I heard that my wife had spent the night with one of the men from the base. I confronted her, but she lied to me; her good friend eventually told me the truth. I believe she was faithful to me after that for maybe 15 years. But our relationship was strained. There was passion, but there was always that element of distrust.

One day, I returned from a business trip in the middle of the night two days early and went to the lower-level guest room to sleep. That morning, the phone rang. I picked it up, and she was on the phone with a man. I heard him describing things he wanted to do to her that night. I went to her bedroom and told her what I had heard. She repented. I forgave again.

Five years later, I bought us a house in another state. I had to go back to our home state every other month for two to three weeks for business. I filed for legal separation and moved back to our home state.

After five years of legal separation, I met a widow who was a bit younger than I was and asked my ex to file for divorce. We had been married for over 40 years. I knew she couldn't support herself, so I gave her several thousand dollars a month and all the cash investments I had.

My second wife and I have been together now for over 15 years. She insists I have no communication with my ex. It has been very hard to persuade the ex to not communicate. We had a son, who is now deceased. His children, my grandchildren, do not know the truth. They blame me for the divorce. I have not told them all the sordid details and probably never will. They do not care to have a relationship with me.

I write this in hopes that someone who has experienced a similar case of dishonor will recognize the situation and get counseling for the wayward spouse and himself or herself to salvage their family and their relationship. — Still in Misery in Missouri

Dear Still in Misery: Thank you for being so vulnerable in sharing this to help others. But it's not too late to help yourself. I would encourage you to take a more proactive — rather than reactive — role in your relationships and life. For instance, it does sound as if it is wise for you to keep your distance from your ex-wife, as toxic relationships have a way of retaining their potency long after their end. However, if you don't talk to her, it should be because you recognize it's healthiest for you not to, not because your current wife forbids it.

Also, if your grandchildren are adults now, you might try writing them letters expressing your side of the story. No sordid details are needed. Just tell them that things aren't so cut-and-dried as they seem and that you wish you could be closer to them. You've got nothing to lose by saying that much. Lastly, I hope you yourself are currently in counseling, as there is understandably a lot of emotional scar tissue from everything that's happened. Perhaps you and your wife could go together.

If you wish to "buy" a friend a magazine subscription, sign her or him up for Bridge Magazine, which comes via email once a month. The cost? Free!

Also, since it is emailed, the number of pages per month is generous. For example, last month's issue contained 96.

Even though it comes from England, the magazine primarily uses two-over-one (five-card

majors and a strong no-trump), not Acol (four-card majors and a weak no-trump).

There are lots of tournament reports and instructional columns, and a few quizzes. My favorite articles are those by David Bird about the monks of St. Titus. In this deal, the monastery's best player, Brother Lucius, handles the dummy with his usual accuracy. What did he do in four hearts doubled after West led a diamond, then East took the trick with his king and shifted to the spade queen?

Brother Paulo (North) made an overbid by jumping to four hearts, but he did have a good side suit and a singleton. Also, it simplified getting to the desired contract.

Declarer is threatened with losing one trick in each suit, and given the spade switch, there isn't time to attack trumps. Instead, Lucius played a club to the king at trick three. East took the trick and led another spade. South won, played a club to dummy's queen and led the club jack. When East ruffed, declarer overruffed, trumped a diamond and played the club 10. When East had to ruff with the heart ace, South discarded his spade loser and was home.
