

# **Florida expects** extra money for **Michael recoverv**

# State Road 44 rollover

Westbound traffic on S.R. 44 in Inverness was blocked for over an hour after a Thursday morning wreck. According to Florida Highway Patrol Trooper Curtis Vaughn, the driver of a pickup truck was eastbound on S.R. 44 and came around a curve too fast for wet pavement conditions. The driver lost control of the pickup, which fishtailed near South Cove Walk and crossed the concrete median into the westbound lanes, striking a car. Both drivers, whose identities were unavailable Thursday, were transported to hospitals for treatment of non life-threatening injuries, Vaughn said. The accident led to a second minor chain-reaction collision of three eastbound vehicles that were trying to stop to avoid the pickup. Vaughn said charges against the pickup's driver are pending. S.R. 44 westbound was blocked from about 9 to 10:15 a.m.

# Van Gogh's 'Sunflowers' staying put in Amsterdam


AMSTERDAM — A "full body scan" carried out on the Van Gogh Museum's version of the Dutch master's iconic "Sunflowers" has shown the painting is not fit to travel because it's in "stable but vulnerable" condition, the museum's director said Thursday.

'We've decided that any stresses that the picture could be subjected to were it to travel, were (it) to be lent, that those might be too risky," director Axel Rueger told The Associated Press in the studio where the painting is undergoing restoration. "So therefore we decided that from now on we will not be able to lend the picture any more to other exhibitions to other museums - so it will always stay in Amsterdam."

For Van Gogh fans who can't make it to Amsterdam, the predominantly yellow 1889 painting of a bunch of sunflowers in a vase is based on another version of the work painted a year earlier that is on display at London's National Gallery. Other versions of the work are in Philadelphia, Tokyo and Munich.

The painting in Amsterdam is hardly a frequent flyer — it has only been loaned out six times, the last time to the National Gallery so it could hang next to that London museum's version.

Ella Hendriks, who worked on the current restoration project, said the painting underwent a series of tests she likened to a "full body scan" on a human patient. The tests used precision imaging machines to peer through the surface and decide what could and could not be done to the painting

# **Apple cuts jobs** in shakeup of self-driving car division

SAN FRANCISCO -Apple is reducing the size of its workforce assigned to driverless car technology as the company reorganizes amid weakening sales of iPhones, its biggest moneymaker.

The company acknowledged the cutbacks in a Thursday statement, without specifying the number of jobs affected. CNBC reported that more than 200 employees were dismissed from Apple's self-driving car division, known internally as "Project Titan."





# **Clearer reporting** would be helpful

Sometimes news stories just make little sense. More effort should be made to clarify things. Take, for example, the Sunday article that seems to imply, in a blatantly oxymoronic fashion, that the number of veterans in the county has fallen despite having gone up ("VA says Citrus veteran population took a dive," Jan. 13, page A11). Hmmm. A quick bit of research shows that it can be explained and more correctly reported, or at least more clearly reported, that despite VA's projections for 2016, the actual number of veterans went up. The projection formula clearly demonstrates how that could happen. I kid you not. Here is the formula used: "Vets t,a = Vets t-1, a-1 + Seps fy(t,a-1) -Deaths fy(t,a-1) +/- Net Migration fy(t,a-1), where 't' represents time and 'a' represents age." This formula -VetPop2016 — represents the eighth generation of the Veteran Population Projection Model which began in the 1990s. The math is well bevond my comprehension and is likely liked only by math geeks and actuaries.

But the bigger flaw in the article is that either the reporter or the source does not correctly describe a veteran. The article says that "rather than simply counting members of the retired military, the VA is using a calculation ..." which implies that the

number of retired military is the number of veterans. A veteran, as defined in the U.S. Code Title 38, is "a person who served in the active



# Maduro rival offers amnesty

CARACAS, Venezuela -All eyes were on Juan Guaido's next step after the popular Venezuelan opposition leader declared he was temporarily assuming presidential powers in a high-stakes bid to unseat Nicolas Maduro, whose powerful loyalists went on the offensive Thursday in support of the embattled leader.

Guaido has disappeared from view since swearing before tens of thousands of cheering supporters to uphold the constitution and rid Venezuela of Maduro's dictatorship, and his constitution to recover the whereabouts remained shrouded in mystery.

In his first public comments since declaring himself interim president, and speaking from an undisclosed location, Guaido all U.S. diplomats out of told Univision he would the country

# Senate rejects plans to end shutdown

WASHINGTON — A splintered Senate swatted down competing Democratic and Republican plans for ending the 34-day partial government shutdown on Thursday, but the twin setbacks prompted a burst of bipartisan talks aimed at temporarily halting the longest-ever closure of federal agencies and the damage it's inflicting around the country.

In the first serious talks in weeks, Senate Majority Leader Mitch Mc-Connell, R-Ky., quickly called Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., to his office to explore potential next steps for solving the vitriolic stalemate. Senators from both sides floated a plan to reopen agencies for three weeks and pay

"At least we're talking about it. That's better than it was before," Mc-Connell told reporters in one of the most encouraging statements heard since the shutdown began Dec. 22.

Thursday's votes came after Vice President Mike Pence lunched privately with GOP senators, who told him they were itching for the standoff to end, participants said. Sen. Roy Blunt, R-Mo., said their message to Pence was, "Find a way forward."

The York Haven man said he received approval from his doctor to use Wally as his emotional support animal after not wanting to go on medication for depression, he told Philly.com.

"I had Wally, and when I came home and was around him, it was all OK," he said. "My doctor knew about Wally and figured it works, so why not?"

Wally was rescued from outside Orlando at 14 months old and is still growing; Henney said Wally could be 16 feet long one day. Henney says Wally eats chicken wings and shares an indoor plastic pond with a smaller rescue alligator named Scrappy.

Wally, who turns 4 this year, is a big teddy bear, in Hennev's words. The coldblooded reptile likes to rest his snout on Henney's, and "he likes to give hugs," he said.

The alligator has never bitten anyone and is even afraid of cats, according to Henney.

Henney acknowledged that Wally is still a dangerous wild animal and could probably tear his arm off, but says he's never been afraid of him

# Illinois may seek new sentencing in **McDonald slaying**

CHICAGO — The Illinois attorney general's office has signaled it may be considering a rare sentencing-related appeal if it concludes a white Chicago police officer's

less-than-seven-year prison sentence in the slaving of black teenager Laguan Mc-Donald was wrongly calculated.

The office said in a statement Thursday it is reviewing Jason Van Dyke's sentence. With credit for good behavior. Van Dvke will likely serve only around three years for firing 16 bullets into McDonald in 2014.

An activist who helped force the city to release dashcam video of the shooting in 2015, William Calloway, echoed the sentiment of many Chicago residents last week when he said the sentence amounted to "a slap on the wrist."

Van Dyke's attorney, Dan Herbert, says raising the idea of an appeal is "about politics not the law."

# **Immigrant suspect** in four killings accused of thefts

CARSON CITY, Nev. - A suspect in four fatal shootings in Nevada was accused in court Thursday of being in the U.S. illegally and selling jewelry stolen from some of the dead.

Wilber Ernesto Martinez-Guzman, a 19-year-old immigrant from El Salvador, appeared in court in Carson City in shackles with a Spanish-language interpreter and a public defender at his side.

The judge spent more than 25 minutes reading aloud a 36-count criminal complaint that suggested property theft as a motive for the slavings. He set bail at \$500,000.

Martinez-Guzman was not charged with murder and did not enter a plea to burglary, stolen property and weapon charges that are punishable by decades in prison. Authorities in nearby Douglas and Washoe counties, where the four victims lived, have said they plan to file murder charges against him soon. perhaps as early as Friday. - From wire reports


**High expectations**

# **Rams K Greg Zuerlein's** foot injury isn't serious

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. - Los Angeles Rams kicker Greg Zuerlein strained his non-kicking foot at halftime of the NFC championship game by slipping on a turf-covered metal plate during

warmups on the Superdome field. Zuerlein's injury doesn't appear to be serious, and the Rams expect him to kick in the Super Bowl next week, coach Sean McVay said Thursday.

Rams special teams coordinator John Fassel disclosed what happened to Zuerlein, but the coach wasn't even aware his kicker had injured himself until well after their 26-23 overtime victory over the New Orleans Saints.

Zuerlein made four field goals against the Saints, including three after halftime. He hit a 48-yard field goal with 15 seconds left in regulation to force overtime, followed by a booming 57-yard field goal that went in with plenty of distance to spare, clinching the Rams' first conference title in 17 years.

The right-footed Zuerlein was wearing a walking boot on his left foot earlier in the week, but McVay said the team is only being cautious. He has been listed on the Rams' injury report for the past two davs.

## **Former umpire Jim** McKean dead at 73

Jim McKean, who umpired 10 nohitters and three World Series during a big league career from 1973-01, has died. He was 73.

Jamie McKean, one of his sons, said McKean died in his sleep early Thursday at Bayfront Medical Center in St. Petersburg, Florida, near his home. Jim McKean had kidney issues and while at St. Anthony's Hospital in St. Petersburg around Thanksgiving developed an MRSA infection. He had appeared to have recovered from the infection but remained weakened.

A Montreal native, McKean umpired All-Star Games in 1980, 1982 and 1993, and the World Series in 1979, 1985 and 1995.

# Pollock agrees to \$55M, **4-year deal with Dodgers**

LOS ANGELES — A person familiar with the negotiations said free-agent outfielder AJ Pollock and the Los Angeles Dodgers have agreed to a \$55 million, four-year contract.

The person spoke Thursday on condition of anonymity because the agreement has not been announced. The deal includes a \$10 million player option for 2023 with a \$5 million buyout that would make the deal worth over \$60 million during the four years.

Pollock can opt out after the 2022 season and \$45 million and become a free agent again if he meets specified plate appearance thresholds.

Oladipo was injured during Wednesday night's 110-106 victory over Toronto and left the court on a stretcher with 4:05 left in the first half.

Team officials acknowledged during the game that the injury was serious but waited until after the results of Thursday's MRI returned to announce how much time he would miss. Coach Nate McMillan said he was unsure when Oladipo would have surgery or whether he would be ready for the start of next season.

Oladipo led the Pacers in scoring at 19.2 points per game, was a first-team all-NBA defensive selection last season and one of the Pacers' co-captains.

Rocky, also a small-time club fighter, gets a shot at the world heavyweight championship. The film also stars Talia Shire as

Adrian, Burt Young as Adrian's brother Paulie, Burgess Meredith as Rocky's trainer Mickey Goldmill and Carl Weathers as the champion, Apollo Creed.

The film, made on a budget of just over \$1 million, was a sleeper hit; it earned \$225 million in global box office receipts, becoming the highest-grossing film of 1976 and went on to win three Oscars, including Best Picture. The film received many positive reviews and turned Stallone into a major star.

# Accepting mistakes

everal years ago, I attended a lecture by Elliot Aronson, co-author of a great book, "Mistakes Were Made (but not by me)."

The author described our tendency for self-justification: We don't admit that we have made a mistake because we can't bear to be wrong. Research has shown that mistake-makers who acknowledge their errors are often more accepted than those who insist on their own innocence.

I am hoping that this research is correct, as I confess that I inadvertently sent in a two-yearold column instead of the correct column last week. Mea culpa. I hope no one's plans were ruined by my mistake. And I dream that this spirit of disclosure floats up to Washington.

When I watch musicians perform, I rarely hear mistakes, but even my uncritical ear could pick up a big oops two weeks ago at The Florida Orchestra Pops show, "Nat and Natalie." Denzal Sinclaire, a noted jazz vocalist, began singing the Nat King Cole song "L-O-V-E" with full orchestra accompaniment. Instead of starting with "L — is for the way you look at me" he began "O — is for the only one I see." It was a show stopper, literally. How did the audience react to this mistake With laughter, not boos. For some, it was the hit of the show. Even some big-name performers have made mistakes and accepted them. Listen to the very beginning of "Roxanne" by The Police. There is a wrong note, followed by Sting's soft laugh. They could have fixed it but chose to live with the mistake. In "Love Shack," by The B-52s, Cindy Wilson's a capella scream "Tin roof rusted!" was a mistake that the band decided to keep. So going forward, let's all accept and acknowledge our mistakes and encourage others to do the same. At least in the world of music, a mistake can sometimes become a hit.



In 2006, the film was selected for preservation in the United States National Film Registry by the Library of Congress as being "culturally, historically or aesthetically significant.' "Rocky" is considered to be one of the greatest sports films ever made and was ranked as the second-best in the genre, after "Raging Bull," by the American Film Institute in 2008.

■ Feb. 8 — "8 1⁄2" (NR) is a 1963 surrealist comedy-drama film directed by Federico Fellini. Co-scripted by Fellini, Tullio Pinelli, Ennio Flaiano and Brunello Rondi, it stars Marcello Mastroianni as Guido Anselmi, a famous Italian film director who suffers from stifled creativity as he attempts to direct an epic science fiction film.

Shot in black-and-white by cinematographer Gianni Di Venanzo, the film features a soundtrack by Nino Rota with costume and set designs by Piero Gherardi. Its title refers to it being Fellini's eighth and a half film as a director. His

sisted of six features, two short segments and a collaboration with another director, Alberto Lattuada, the latter three treated as "half" films. "8 1⁄2" won the Academy

Awards for Best Foreign Language Film and Best Costume Design (black-and-white). In 2005, the British Film Institute included this film on British Film Institute list of the 50 films you should see by the

age of 14.

■ Feb. 24 — "The African Queen" (PG) is a 1951 British-American adventure film adapted from the 1935 novel of the same name by C. S. Forester.

The film was directed by John Huston and produced by Sam Spiegel and John Woolf. The screenplay was adapted by James Agee, John Huston, John Collier and Peter Viertel. It was photographed in Technicolor by Jack Cardiff and had a music score by Allan Gray.



North responded with the Jacoby Forcing Raise, showing four-plus spades and at least game-going values. South took over with Blackwood.


With no losers in the side suits, South just needs to draw trumps. That will not be a problem if they are 2-1, which the mathematicians tell us happens 78 percent of the time. If West has all three spades, the contract is hopeless. But if East has three, declarer can set a trap.

He should win the first trick with dummy's diamond king and call for the spade jack.

If East plays low smoothly, South will go up with the ace, assuming a 2-1 split -- and here he will go down. But if East covers the jack with the queen, declarer wins with his ace, crosses back to dummy in either minor and finesses East out of his spade 10. Sneaky!


