



# FWC officer injured in crash

## Driver of semitrailer truck cited by Florida Highway Patrol

Police determined the driver of a semitrailer was at fault in a Tuesday afternoon crash that sent a state wildlife officer to

the hospital. Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) cited Charles Robert Roughton for failing to yield his Airgas semitrailer to an oncoming Ford F-150 driven by Angela Maria Jane Banks,

according to an FHP crash report released Wednesday. Banks is an officer with the law enforcement division of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and was on duty at the time of

the crash. Roughton was hauling oxygen tanks.

According to FHP, 49-year-old Roughton tried to turn left onto North Independence Highway from an eastbound turn lane of State Road 44, but drove

into the path of Banks' westbound patrol truck at around 3:30 p.m.

Banks, 23, of Crystal River, stepped on her truck's brakes to avoid a collision, but her vehicle still struck the right, rear corner of the Airgas truck.

Nature Coast EMS transported Banks, who

was wearing a seat belt, to Citrus Memorial Hospital for evaluation and treatment of potential injuries. Roughton, who was also wearing a seat belt, was uninjured.

# Fewer cats, more adoptions

## Shelter shifts focus to spay/neuter program

If you want to adopt a cat, you'd better get one quick — there are only seven at the shelter.

That's a huge drop from the historical cat population there, Citrus County Animal Services Director Colleen Yarbrough said Tuesday.

"In 2015 at one point there were over 137 cats here," she said. "You can't humanely care for them all."

Those high population numbers were the result of keeping every cat, feral or otherwise, that came in the shelter's doors and trying to find the new homes for them all, she said.

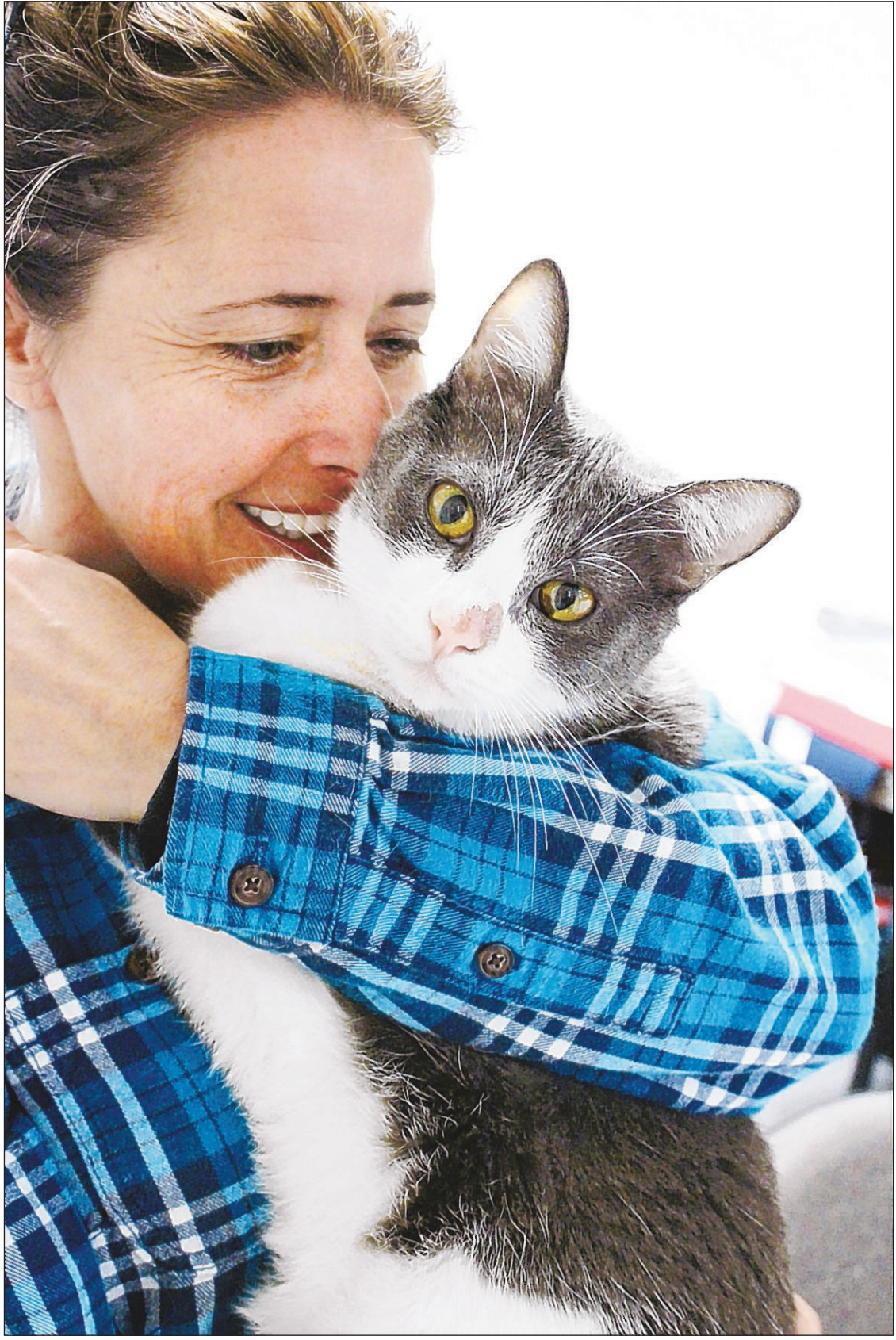
Now that the animal shelter has a full-time veterinarian, Yarbrough has been able to reinvigorate a trap-neuter-release (or TNR) program. The program includes vaccinations, and is sometimes called TNVR.

"Studies show that less than 2 percent of cats get reclaimed (by an owner)

## Eyes on the road, or else Distracted driving laws could get boost

TALLAHASSEE — Florida could outlaw drivers from putting on makeup, holding a cellphone, reading or performing other distracting activities under a bill unanimously approved by a Senate committee Wednesday.

The Senate Innovation, Industry and Technology Committee approved the measure after heart-wrenching testimony from parents whose children that have been killed in accidents caused by distracted drivers.

Republican Sen. Wilton Simpson said distracted driving has become an epidemic in Florida, and not just involving cars hitting other cars.

"Bike riding, hiking, jogging — all of those things — we've had record numbers of deaths in this state by distracted driving," Simpson said.

Right now, it is illegal to text and drive in Florida, but drivers can only be ticketed if they are first pulled over for another reason. Simpson's bill would make distracted driving a primary offense, meaning law enforcement wouldn't need another reason to ticket a driver. If enacted, Florida would ease into the law by creating a three-month period where law enforcement would only give warnings. After Dec. 1, police would be able to issue tickets.

Hands-free cellphone use would be allowed, and drivers would be able to check their phones as long as their cars aren't moving, such as at a stop light or while idling in a parking lot.

Law enforcement officers would also have to record the race and ethnicity of ticketed drivers and an annual report would have to be given to the governor, House speaker and Senate president. Democratic Sen. Randolph Bracy asked for that provision to be included due to concerns that a distracted driving ban could be used for racial profiling.

Several parents who lost children in accidents urged the committee to approve the bill. Debbie Wanninkhof said her 25-year-old son, Patrick, died in an accident caused by a driver using a cellphone.

# City mulls replacing board with officer

## Single magistrate would handle code enforcement cases

The Inverness Code Enforcement Board is likely to fade into the historic sunset as the city council moves to replace the citizen panel with a magistrate.

The council approved this week during its first of two hearings on the issue doing away with its volunteer code enforcement board and replace it with a paid magistrate, saying the change would be more efficient. The second hearing on the issue is expected to be held during the next few weeks. No member of the code enforcement board attended the meeting and objected.

Inverness City Manager Frank DiGiovanni began the initiative months ago, complaining the seven-member board often suffered from a lack of a quorum.

# Inverness to beef up powers for handling dilapidated buildings

When it comes to blighted or dilapidated buildings within Inverness, elected officials have few options other than to threaten property owners with fines and hope they comply.

That's likely to change soon. The Inverness City Council this week approved during the first of two slated hearings an ordinance that would allow city building officials to demolish those buildings when owners refuse to repair them or when they are beyond repair.

The second and final council hearing on this issue isn't yet scheduled but is expected during the next few weeks.

"This will enable the city ... to address, in a much better manner, these derelict

properties that have, quite frankly, gone on longer than they should," Inverness City Manager Frank DiGiovanni told the council during its regularly scheduled meeting.

Under the proposed ordinance, city code enforcement officers would report blighted, dilapidated or deteriorated properties to building officials. Those building officials would rule on whether the building is unsafe, a hazard or beyond repair and can only be demolished, given the value of the building and cost of repairs. The proposed ordinance would allow the city to demolish the building if the cost to repair it is 75 percent of the assessed value.

"This puts teeth into (the code enforcement process) and I think it's good that we'll have something on the books to cover

after going into a shelter. They have a better chance of finding homes being put back where they came from," Yarbrough explained. "People have indoor-outdoor cats, people's cats get out ... people also have loosely owned cats, where they have cats in the neighborhood that they care for but don't feel that they own."

"Many of them are making a good living where they came from, and they breed so fast," Yarbrough continued. "The best way to handle cat overpopulation is by spaying and neutering them and leaving them where they are." Sheltering dozens or

hundreds of cats can also have negative effects on the animals' health, she said.

"Cats are really susceptible to getting sick in a stressful environment, and shelters they find very stressful," Yarbrough said. "(The TNR program) gives us the opportunity to better care for the cats that need to be here. It saves lives, but it also saves taxpayer dollars — now we're not treating 50 or 70 cats with upper respiratory infections. It's awesome."

Having fewer, healthier cats also increases the adoption rate, she said.

"We've seen a massive decrease in euthanasia because the cats aren't staying here as long, so they aren't getting sick. We've seen a massive increase in cat adoptions,

because people aren't so overwhelmed when they walk in."

Animal Services isn't set up to be able to neuter large numbers of cats all at once, Yarbrough said. It does take in trapped cats for the TNR program on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week, but people wanting a feral cat to be trapped and neutered can also alert Animal Control or take it to the Humanitarians of Florida, Snippet Citrus or PetLuv, a nonprofit spay-and-neuter clinic in Brooksville.

"Sometimes we're not able to assemble the volunteers timely to address issues of concern and these issues tend to linger," DiGiovanni told the council during its regularly scheduled meeting this week.

Council members said reducing the code enforcement board to a single individual versed in the legal process is best.

"This would seem to be a very good idea in that we would have somebody who (would be) schooled in municipal/county law and ... be somebody who would act in a much more efficient manner," said Councilman Ken Hinkle. "That's something we're all concerned about: efficiency of getting things done."

"We need to be fair and the magistrate is going to be the answer to that question," he said.

Under the proposed ordinance, the magistrate would not answer to the city manager but work for the council. Under the plan, the city would

advertise the position.

DiGiovanni said he did not yet know the salary of the magistrate, if the city hires one.

Councilman David Ryan, who once was a code enforcement board member, agreed with Hinkle.

"I think this is a very good idea," he said.

Ryan later told the Chronicle that the board meets irregularly and that when he was a member five years ago board members often missed meetings.

DiGiovanni during the meeting also reminded the council that the magistrate would have to follow the same rules as the code enforcement board and that the magistrate would not make new policy. That was the council's role.

Ultimately, the goal is to get code violators to comply with city ordinances, DiGiovanni said.

"The whole purpose of this is to correct deficiencies ... not bring things to a magistrate, not to levy fines," DiGiovanni said. "It's about protecting the neighbors to these deficiencies and protecting their properties."

"We need to wake up to the danger of wireless communication device addicts," she said. "Cell-phone use ... is an

addiction for many. You hear the stimulus of a ping and you immediately grab the phone and you respond instantly. It happens over and over again, and just like a drug addiction, it can be deadly."

The Senate bill has

been unanimously approved in its first two of four committee stops. A similar House bill hasn't been heard in committee yet, but House sponsor Rep. Jackie Toledo said House Speaker Jose Oliva has promised it will get a hearing.

# Atlanta prosecutors to take Epstein case

MIAMI — Federal prosecutors from Atlanta will take over a Florida victims' rights case involving a wealthy financier accused of sexually abusing dozens of underage girls.

The U.S. Attorney's Office in Atlanta confirmed Wednesday that it has been assigned the case involving victims of

Jeffrey Epstein, 66, after the U.S. Attorney's Office in Miami recused itself.

"When the U.S. attorney's offices are recused because of conflicts or the appearance of conflict, it's very common for other offices to take over the investigation and that's what happened in this case," Byung J. "BJay" Pak, U.S. attorney for the Northern District of Georgia, said Wednesday.

situations like this," said Councilman David Ryan.

Council President Linda Bega agreed, but said that the intent was that owners make repairs.

"This just gives us the authority if we need to," Bega said.

The owner can petition building officials' rulings to the code enforcement board to void staff's decisions or ask for more time to make repairs.

Although the ordinance doesn't require city council approval to demolish a structure, both DiGiovanni and City Attorney Larry Haag said demolition would not begin without council approval.

"It's not something staff's going to do on its own," DiGiovanni told the council. "It's going to come back, as I understand it, to city council because there's a cost involved."

"You will make these determinations," he told the council. "Once it's adopted it will place you to the authority level to

make a determination if you want to spend the funds to raze what's on the property."

But Councilman Cabot McBride said he feared that once the 75 percent threshold is met to make repairs, demolition could happen too quickly.

But Haag said there would be ample communication between the city and property owner "before the wrecking ball shows up."

**Park plans may include RV pads**

F. Blake Longacre is still thinking a park is the best use of his property.

But something has to pay for it.

Longacre, whose plans for development have been thwarted or stalled since 2002, in September offered to set up the 11 acres as a park if he could find a buyer and the county promised to maintain it.

Now he is tweaking the plan to include RV pads and a possible store/snack bar, according to information he provided the county.

Longacre said Wednesday the update is preliminary and he isn't close to finalizing it.

"It's a long way from being anything," he said. "I don't

even have a drawing on it properly."

Longacre's history with the property on the northwest bank of the Halls River at Halls River Road, dates to him

buying the land in 2000. Two years later, he received county commission approval for Halls River Retreat, a 54-unit condominium development.

Two citizen groups successfully sued, saying the mixed-use zoning that commissioners approved for Halls River Retreat conflicted with the county's comprehensive plan.

Longacre returned with a scaled-down development called Halls River Resort, which county commissioners approved in July 2011. The new plan called for 31 stilt cabins, a manager's residence

and restaurant.

He never built the resort, but instead returned in 2015 looking for approval for a hotel, which the county commission denied.

A year ago Longacre said he heard from area residents of a need for a passive park on the Halls River. He started putting together a plan for a boardwalk and canoe/kayak launch, thinking the environmentally sensitive property would bring interest to purchase from the Trust for Public Lands.

His vision was for the county to own the land, develop the park and maintain it.

Commissioner Ron Kitchen Jr. said at the time he wanted first to see if the community supported the plan.

The latest plan provided to county officials adds a commercial element, beginning with a kayak launch that, Longacre told officials, would help pay for

the remaining phases.

Other phases include restrooms, a coin laundromat, RV pads with hookups and some sort of commercial building, such as a gift shop.

He recommended using Port-O-Lets for the kayak launch until restrooms are built. The Department of Health has nixed that idea, County Administrator Randy Oliver said in an email to county commissioners.

Longacre said Wednesday he still wants to build a park.

"It's really not different than the overall plan," he said. "It has to be able to support itself before it's even considered as a park."

Oliver told commissioners plans are in the pre-application stage. Longacre said there is no timetable to bring it along further.

**Senate panel OKs bill on student vouchers, teacher bonuses**

TALLAHASSEE — A bill that would create a new voucher program allowing more Florida students to attend private schools by tapping into taxpayer money normally used for traditional public schools began moving Wednesday in the state Senate.

The Senate Education Committee voted 5-3 for the

measure that would create the new Family Empowerment Scholarship, aimed at tackling a waiting list of thousands of lower-income students hoping to use an existing private school voucher program. Initial enrollment would be capped at 15,000 students but could increase in later years.

Unlike that program, the new one would use money that is currently spent on

public schools based on district enrollment. It's a top priority for Republican leaders — including those in the House — and GOP Gov. Ron DeSantis who favor giving parents greater school choice for their children. Eligibility would be capped at 260 percent of the federal poverty level, or about \$65,000 for a family of four.

Later Wednesday, a House

education subcommittee unanimously approved a measure aimed at providing students more pathways to a career other than attending college. Rep. Ralph Massullo, the bill's Republican sponsor, said Florida's economy will need to fill an additional 1.7 million jobs by 2030 and could struggle to meet that demand without more career options after high school.

Netflix to make 'One Hundred Years of Solitude' series

NEW YORK — Netflix has acquired the rights to Gabriel Garcia Marquez's "One Hundred Years of Solitude," one of the most celebrated novels of the 20th century. The streaming company announced Wednesday that it will adapt the 1967 book into a Spanish language series. "One Hundred Years of Solitude," which has sold an estimated 47 million copies and been translated into 46 languages, has never before been adapted for the screen. The series will be shot largely in Colombia, Netflix said. Garcia Marquez's sons, Rodrigo Garcia and Gonzalo Garcia Barcha, will serve as executive producers. While other Garcia Marquez novels have been turned into films such as "Love in the Time of Cholera" and "Chronicles of a Death Foretold," the Nobel Prize-winning Colombian novelist doubted how the expansive and mythical "One Hundred Years of Solitude" could be adapted. Garcia Marquez died in 2014.

Jason Aldean to receive artist of the decade award

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Reigning entertainer of the year Jason Aldean will receive the artist of the decade award at this year's Academy of Country Music Awards in April. The ACM announced Wednesday that Aldean will join only five other honorees that have received the award since 1969, including Marty Robbins, Loretta Lynn, Alabama, Garth Brooks and George Strait. The award is given to a country artist or group who has dominated the genre over the decade through radio, digital media, sales and streaming, events, touring, television and artistic merit. With 13 ACM awards, Aldean has had four consecutive albums reach No. 1 on Billboard's 200 albums chart and 16 No. 1 singles on Billboard's country airplay chart, which tracks radio airplay. The ACMs will air live from Las Vegas on April 7 on CBS.

Taylor Swift offers '30 things I learned before turning 30'

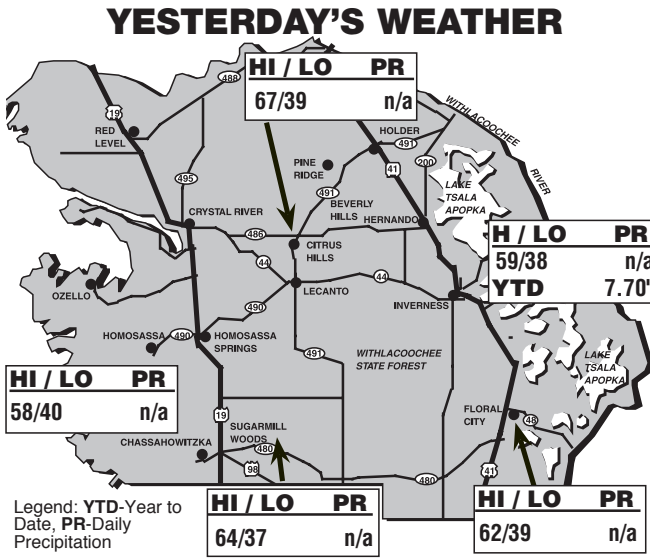

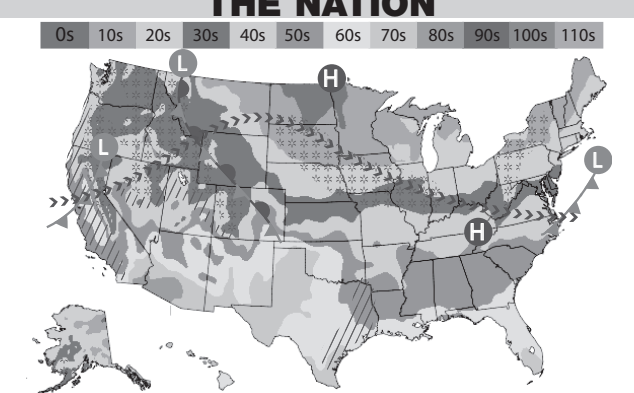

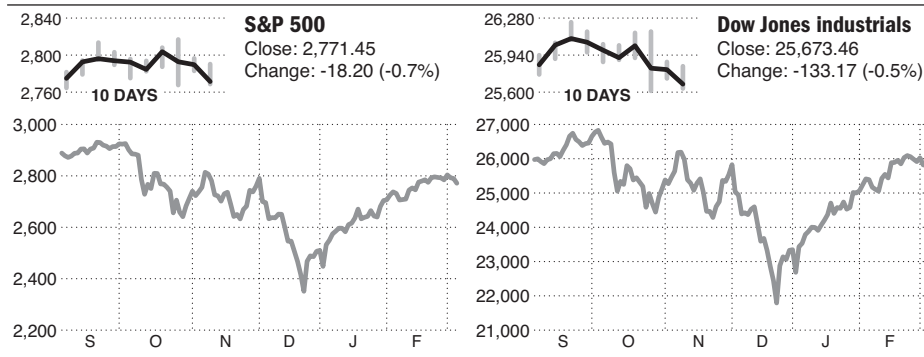

# Annexation disagreement understandable

The fact that local lawyers interpret annexation laws differently is no big surprise. Unfortunately, when it involves two governments and a private property owner, tax dollars will be the fuel for this legal dispute.

And, to a layman, the bone of contention seems like something there should be a simple, clear "yes" or "no" answer to.

Inverness lawyer John Eden plans to develop a high-end RV park on Lake Spivey on land that can't be accessed via city streets. It was county property until the Inverness City Council recently voted in favor of voluntary annexation, at Eden's request.

The county attorney says because the RV park site is not contiguous with land in city limits, the annexation creates an enclave which, she contends, is illegal.

Eden and city officials disagree. As far as they're concerned, it's a done deal.

While county government had already given Eden the green light for the development, whatever spirit of cooperation existed took a nosedive when the issue of annexation arose.

By the grace of voting for

annexation, Inverness officials are drawn into the legal rift, but City Manager Frank DiGiovanni feels they're on solid ground — even with a lake muddying the issue.

Given some strained city-county relations in the past, Eden's desire to work with, and be a part of, Inverness isn't sitting well with county officials.

The enclave issue has to be settled. The parties will seek to resolve the dispute through mediation but, if that fails, it's off to court.

There are reasons why Eden wants the RV park annexed.

The cost of utility services outside city limits is 25 percent greater, and the park would receive other services the municipality provides.

Eden is ready to proceed with the RV park. As far as he and Inverness officials are concerned, the land has been annexed.

However, the fact remains: to get to the RV park without leaving city limits, you'd have to swim or take a boat.

The rift is understandable. It's just a shame that a simple ruling based on law can't be reached without a costly legal battle.

Taxpayers do not appreciate that.

## Why consider career and technical education?

Citrus County's graduation rate reached an all-time high of 84 percent as of the 2017-2018 school year. This is wonderful news, because lack of a high-school diploma severely limits employment, opportunities and economic potential. However, a high school diploma should not be the end of education. In a 2018 report, the Joint Economic Committee of the U.S. Congress indicated that, by 2020, nearly two-thirds of American jobs will require some postsecondary training or education.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, almost 70 percent of Americans do not have a bachelor's degree. This is not a crisis, though, as most jobs simply do not require a four-year degree. The real growth is expected in the non-degree area: the national Bureau of Labor Statistics projects 2016-2026 growth rates for entry-level occupational employment of 11.1 percent for postsecondary non-degree education and 11 percent for associate degree education. Compare this to growth rates for workers with no formal education (6.4 percent), high school diploma or equivalent (5.1 percent), and those with some college but no degree (4.2 percent).

### Career and technical education a proven alternative to four-year degree

Career and technical education (CTE) provides short, focused training in skill sets that do not require a four-year college degree. It is driven by workplace demand. Most CTE programs are advised and guided by business owners and employers, so students get the knowledge they need for real-world situations through skill development and hands-on experiences. Most CTE programs take two school years or less.

CTE training addresses the so-called "middle skills" occupations: those requiring more education and/or training than high school, but not a four-year degree. Middle-skills occupations span all industries and include health-care workers, law enforcement personnel, and such technical workers as electricians/construction workers, welders, computer support specialists, and automotive service and collision technicians.

Students can earn industry certifications and credentials (often while still attending school) or attain licensure through various agencies after program completion. These certifications and credentials are portable, allowing students to work anywhere in the country. Licensure is frequently reciprocal between states.

Program graduates are able to work in their chosen field immediately, usually with salaries that outpace those of occupations requiring a bachelor's degree for entry-level employment. The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that employment for the 2016-2026 period features 44 million middle-skills job that pay more than the national median yearly income of \$31,099.

### Financial considerations

Let's not forget about the cost. CTE training is far less expensive than a four-year investment in a bachelor's degree that might not be marketable by the time it is earned. Accredited technical colleges are able to accept various forms of student financial aid, including Pell Grants and Bright Futures scholarships. Thanks to the generosity of community groups and agencies, many other scholarships are available to CTE students. Very few students leave CTE training with any sort of debt.

### Seniors on the edge of adulthood

Many high-school seniors in Citrus County have definite plans for their education following graduation, but others do not. Those without a plan are often focused on finding work immediately because school, at least as they have known it, has been frustrating or uninteresting. However, many of them move from one low-skill, low-wage job to another, never realizing their potential because they lack the additional training and skills to set them apart.

I have heard the same story over and over from CTE students in my almost 17 years in the profession: I graduated from high school, went straight to work, then hit a dead end because of my lack of skills and education. Here I am, ready to learn a trade or skill.

Now is the time for those approaching graduation to think about the future, and tailor their plans to their unique needs and talents. Not interested in an academic degree? Don't go to a university — instead, consider an internship, a technical degree, or certificate program in an area of interest. Many certificate programs are part of statewide articulation agreements with colleges. A student who successfully completes such a program is eligible to have the certificate count as college credit toward a two-year degree in a related field.

Don't know what you want to do for a career? There are online interest and ability surveys, including FloridaShines (www.floridashines.org), that will help identify interests, abilities, and characteristics needed for success in particular fields. Guidance counselors

and career advisors at all of our area high schools and at Withlacoochee Technical College (WTC) are available to assist students in this regard.

### The future is right in your backyard

Citrus County students are fortunate to have training for middle-skill occupations right in their backyard: Withlacoochee Technical College in Inverness. WTC has been called "the best kept-secret in Citrus County." Any high school student can schedule a college visit to WTC and spend a part of a day in the program(s) of choice, meeting the instructors and other students, seeing how learning takes place, and finding out more about the trade and related opportunities.

WTC has a variety of programs in many career clusters, all instructed by top professionals. Career advisors and a certified school counselor are available to guide students, and industry certifications can be taken at the on-site Assessment Center.

WTC approaches education as a holistic endeavor, including soft skills and employability training along with technical training, to craft a well-rounded professional. WTC consistently ranks in the top five of Florida's 48 technical centers for program completion, placement, and licensure — the categories that are benchmarks of success for technical colleges.

Even before graduation, students can benefit from CTE training. Those who meet eligibility requirements can attend many of WTC's certificate programs while still enrolled in high school. Depending on the program and the point of enrollment at WTC, it is possible for a student to earn a program completion certificate by the time he or she graduates from high school. Imagine the possibilities for a young person who enters the workforce already trained in the middle skills needed for success.

For 50 years, WTC alumni have gone on to be business owners, superstar employees, and productive members of their communities. Some have remained in their original trade of choice; others have used their training at WTC as a springboard to other occupations. They live all over the country. Some have returned to WTC to teach their trade to a younger generation. It is safe to say all of them benefitted from career and technical education.

Let's encourage the youth of Citrus County to consider CTE to ensure their future success.

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# Cohen delivers documents on Moscow project to panel

WASHINGTON — Michael Cohen, President Donald Trump's former lawyer, turned over documents to lawmakers Wednesday as he tried to back up his claims that a false statement he delivered to Congress in 2017 was edited by the president's attorneys, two people familiar with the case said.

It's unclear who edited the documents or what exactly was changed.

But in public testimony last week on Capitol Hill, Cohen said Trump's attorneys, including Jay Sekulow, had reviewed and edited the written statement he provided to Congress in 2017. Cohen

acknowledged in a guilty plea last year that he misled lawmakers by saying he had abandoned the Trump Tower Moscow project in January 2016, when in fact he pursued it for months after that as Trump campaigned for the presidency.

At issue is whether Trump or his lawyers knew that Cohen's statement to Congress would be false, and whether the attorneys had any direct role in crafting it. Cohen has said he believed the president wanted him to lie, but he also said Trump never directed him to do so. It's also unclear whether any of the president's lawyers knew the truth about when the Trump Tower negotiations had ended.

Sekulow has flatly denied ever editing any

statement about the duration of the project.

"Testimony by Michael Cohen that attorneys for the President edited or changed his statement to Congress to alter the

duration of the Trump Tower Moscow negotiations is completely false," Sekulow said in a statement last week.

Cohen appeared behind closed doors Wednesday

before the House intelligence committee, his fourth day of testimony on Capitol Hill as he prepares for a three-year prison sentence for lying to Congress and other charges.

Cohen has become a key figure in congressional investigations since turning on his former boss and cooperating with special counsel Robert Mueller's probe. During last week's public testimony, he called Trump a con man, a cheat and a racist. He was also interviewed privately by both the Senate and House intelligence committees last week.

"I will continue to cooperate to the fullest extent of my capabilities," Cohen said in a short statement to reporters after he finished Wednesday's testimony.

Among the issues discussed in Cohen's closed-door interviews last week was a pardon, according to people familiar with those interviews. They spoke on condition of anonymity to reveal the confidential discussion.

Cohen told Congress last week that he had never asked for and would not accept a pardon from Trump. But that may not be the full story.

According to people with knowledge of the situation, a lawyer for Cohen expressed interest to the Trump legal team in a possible pardon for his client after a raid last April on Cohen's hotel room, home and office. The people spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss it publicly.

## Democrats flex power by taking aim at money in politics

WASHINGTON — Flexing their new majority, Democrats are moving to push through the House a comprehensive elections and ethics reform package they say will reduce the role of big money in politics, ensure fair elections and restore ethics and integrity to Washington.

The legislation, called H.R. 1 to signify its importance, would make it easier to register and vote, tighten election security and require presidential candidates to disclose their tax returns.

The sweeping, 570-page bill also would make Election Day a holiday for federal workers and require "dark money" political groups to make their donors public. And it would create a public financing system for congressional campaigns that Democrats say will cut down on corruption and reduce the power of lobbyists and other special interests.

"The public is smart enough to know that where you get your money, that's where you get your marching orders," said Rep. John Sarbanes, a Maryland Democrat who is the bill's main author.

"The public is saying, 'Build a system of financing campaigns that we own and we're in charge of,' not the insiders and the lobbyists," Sarbanes said in an

interview. "We want to set it up so the public gives us our marching orders."

Lawmakers began debate on the bill Wednesday, with passage expected Friday.

Republicans call the bill a thinly disguised power grab that would expand government and use billions in taxpayer money to pay for congressional campaigns. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell has pronounced the measure dead on arrival in the Senate, while the White House says President Donald Trump would veto it if it ever reached his desk.

"This is a terrible bill," said Rep. Rodney Davis of Illinois, the top Republican on the House Administration Committee. "Who in the world is asking for taxpayer dollars to go into congressional campaigns? That's what Democrats are trying to hide in this bill."

Democrats deny that and say money for political campaigns would come from a surcharge on federal settlements made with banks and corporations that run afoul of the law.

## School lessons targeted by climate change doubters

HARTFORD, Conn. — A Connecticut lawmaker wants to strike climate change from state science standards. A Virginia legislator worries teachers are indoctrinating students with their personal views on global warming. And an Oklahoma state senator wants educators to be able to introduce alternative viewpoints without fear of losing their jobs.

As climate change becomes a hotter topic in American classrooms, politicians around the country are pushing back against the near-universal scientific consensus that global warming is real, dire and man-made.

Of the more than a dozen such measures proposed so far this year, some already have failed. But they have emerged this year in growing numbers, many of them inspired or directly encouraged by a pair of advocacy groups, the Discovery Institute and the Heartland Institute.

"You have to present two sides of the argument and allow the kids to deliberate," said Republican state Sen. David Bullard of Oklahoma, a former high school geography teacher whose bill, based on model legislation from the Discovery Institute, ran into opposition from science teachers and went nowhere.

Scientists and science education organizations have blasted such proposals for sowing confusion and doubt on a topic of global urgency. They reject the notion that there are "two sides" to the issue.

"You can't talk about two sides when the other side doesn't have a foot in reality," said University of Illinois climate scientist Donald Wuebbles.

Michael Mann, director of the Earth System Science Center at Penn State University, said these legislative proposals are dangerous, bad-faith efforts to undermine scientific findings that the fossil-fuel industry or fundamentalist religious groups don't want to hear.

In the mainstream scientific community, there is little disagreement about the basics that greenhouse gases from the burning of coal, oil and gas are causing the world to warm in a dangerous manner. More than 90 percent of the peer-reviewed studies and scientists who write them say climate change is a human-caused problem.

#### Archeologists find hidden tunnels below Alcatraz prison

SAN FRANCISCO — Archaeologists have confirmed a long-time suspicion of historians and say that famed Alcatraz prison was built over a Civil War-era military fortification.

SFGate reported researchers have found a series of buildings and tunnels under the prison yard of Alcatraz Federal Penitentiary, which once held Al Capone.

A study published in "Near Surface Geophysics" says archaeologists used ground-penetrating radar and terrestrial laser scans and historical maps and photographs.

They found fully buried structures, ammunition magazines and tunnels.

Historians believe workers built over existing structures when the prison was built in the 20th century.

Alcatraz first came to the attention of the U.S. government after it wrestled control of California from Mexico in the 1840s.

Its location in San Francisco Bay made it attractive for military fortification purposes.

#### Sen. McSally, ex-Air Force pilot, says officer raped her

WASHINGTON — Sen. Martha McSally, the first female Air Force fighter pilot to fly in combat, said Wednesday that she was sexually assaulted by a superior officer, and later, when she tried to talk about it to military officials, she "felt like the system was raping me all over again."

The Arizona Republican, a 26-year military veteran, made the disclosure at a Senate hearing on the military's efforts to prevent sexual assaults and improve the response when they occur. Lawmakers also heard from other service members who spoke of being sexually assaulted and humiliated while serving their country.

McSally said she did not report being raped because she did not trust the system, and she said she was ashamed and confused. She said she was impressed and grateful to the survivors who came forward to help change the system. She was in the ninth class at the Air Force Academy to allow women, and said sexual harassment and assault were

prevalent. Victims mostly suffered in silence, she said.

McSally read from a prepared statement getting choked up at one point. She referred to "perpetrators" who had sexually assaulted her, an indication that she had been attacked more than once.

She did not say whether her assaults happened at the academy or during active duty. She didn't name any names.

She said she stayed silent for years. But later, as she watched the military grapple with how to handle sexual assaults, she felt like she should speak out.

#### Older dog walkers experience more broken bones from falls

Broken bones from falls while dog walking are on the rise among older U.S. adults and hip fractures are among the most common injuries.

That's according to a study published Wednesday in JAMA Surgery.

University of Pennsylvania researchers examined government data on emergency room visits for dog walking injuries in adults

aged 65 and older. The numbers nationwide jumped from almost 1,700 in 2004 to about 4,400 in 2017.

Almost 80 percent of the patients were women, who tend to have less dense bones than men.

While dog-walking causes fewer than 1 percent of fractures among older adults, the numbers are higher than expected and the risk is often underappreciated, said study co-author Dr. Jaimo Ahn, an orthopedic surgeon.

Injuries typically happen when a dog pulls on a leash and walkers lose their balance.

Breaking bones, especially hips, can sharply diminish elderly adults' health. Previous research suggests that at least 1 in 4 older adults dies within one year of breaking a hip.

But research shows that dogs can be good companions for older adults and can help them stay active. So before embarking on those outings, older people should consider strength training for themselves and obedience training for their dogs, Ahn said.

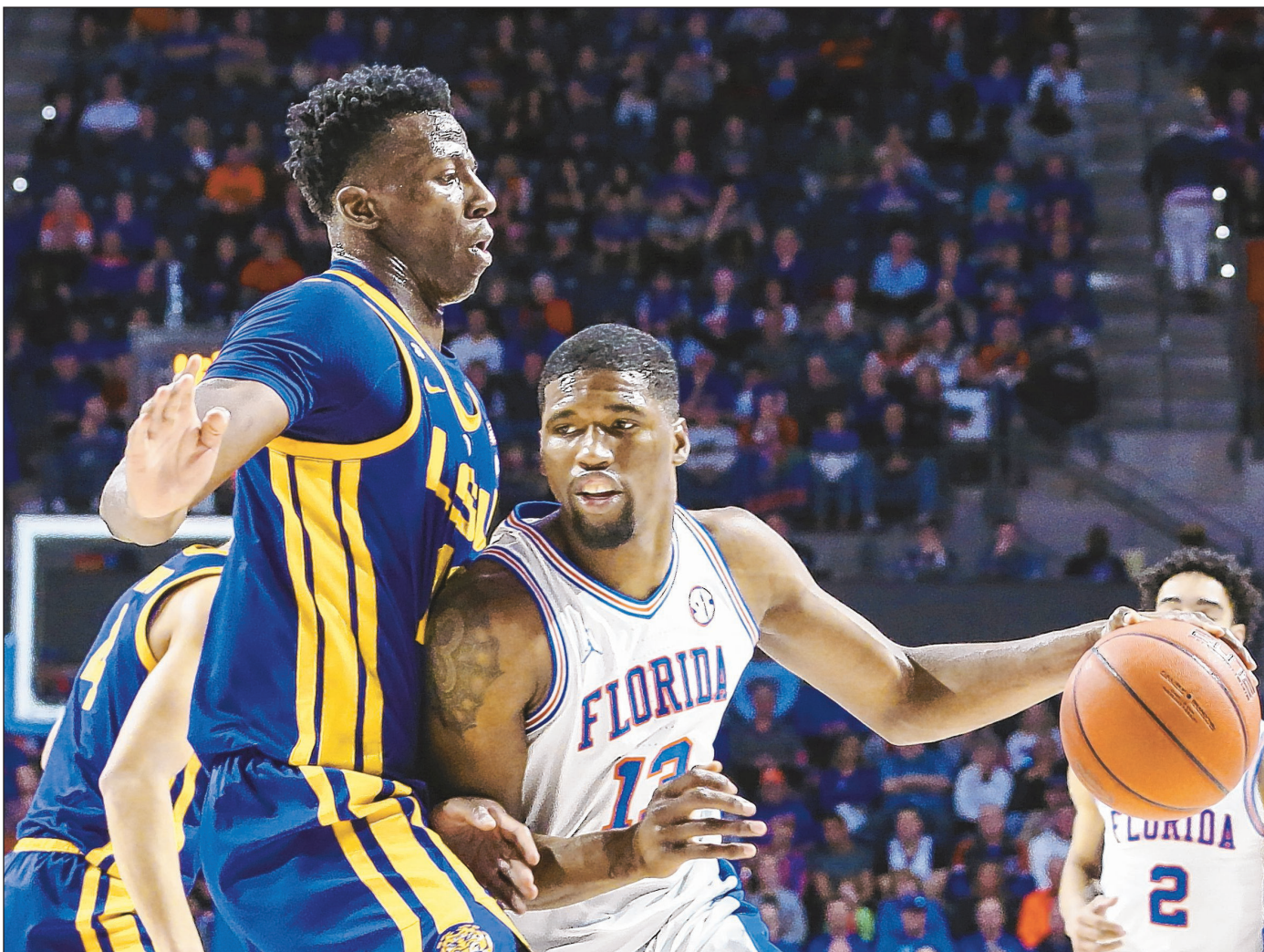

### No. 10 LSU stays hot, knocks off Florida 79-78 in OT in rematch

GAINESVILLE — Getting to overtime was the tough part for LSU.

Winning in the extra frame? That's pretty much what the Tigers have done all season.

Tremont Waters dribbled the length of the court for the tying basket with 3 seconds remaining in regulation and hit a 3-pointer early in overtime, helping No. 10 LSU escape Florida with a 79-78 victory Wednesday night.

The Tigers (25-5, 15-2 Southeastern Conference) improved to 5-1 in OT games in league play.

"It's kind of what we've done all year," LSU coach Will Wade said. "It's not very pretty."

The Gators had a chance to win it with 7.8 seconds left in the extra period, but Jalen Hudson slipped and then

KeVaughn Allen failed to get off a shot before the final buzzer.

"Golden opportunity," Florida coach Mike White said. "To not get a shot off on your last possession is very disheartening. We had done so many positive things to be in that position."

LSU nearly gave the game away in the final minute of regulation. Waters coughed up a turnover that led to a dunk at the other end and Skylar Mays missed the front end of a one-and-one.

Hudson, who scored 16 straight points in the second half in his final home game on "Senior Night," looked as if he delivered the winner after Mays' miss. His 3-pointer from the elbow rattled around the rim and fell through with 6.2 seconds left, putting the Gators (17-13, 9-8) up 72-70.

But that was enough time for Waters to go coast to coast

while splitting Florida's half-hearted defense.

"I don't think any one man can stay in front of me," Waters said. "So I just went by (Andrew) Nembhard and created that play."

Waters finished with 19 points, six assists, six turnovers, three rebounds and three steals.

"Tremont did what he does," White said.

Javonte Smart added 15 points for the Tigers, who have won eight of nine and avenged their only loss — to Florida in overtime — in the last month.

Emmitt Williams chipped in 13 points and 14 rebounds. Williams scored 11 straight in the first half, helping LSU build a double-digit lead.

"He was phenomenal," Wade said.

The Gators stormed back in the second half behind Hudson, who finished with a season-high 33 points on

11-of-20 shooting. Hudson struggled the first three months of the season but has scored in double figures in seven of the last eight games.

"It does beg the question," White said, wondering aloud where that kind of performance has been all season. "He got it going."

Allen, Florida's leading scorer, had another poor shooting performance. The senior, one of three honored before the game, had four points on 1 of 6 from the field. He has missed 21 of his last 25 shots, all in the last three games.

The Tigers pounded Florida on the glass and in the paint, enjoying a plus-10 rebounding advantage and outscoring the Gators 44-26 in the lane.

"We just needed to get the ball on the backboard," Wade said.

## Red Sox's Wright suspended

### Knuckleballer gets 80 games for HGH usage

FORT MYERS — Boston Red Sox pitcher Steven Wright will sit out the first 80 games of the season after testing positive for Human Growth Hormone, a second suspension for the knuckleballer who missed 15 games last year for violating baseball's domestic violence policy.

Wright, 34, said in a statement issued through the Major League Baseball Players Association that he learned of the positive test during the offseason.

"Although I do not dispute the validity of the test, I was shocked as I have never intentionally ingested anything for performance-enhancing purposes," the statement said. "I have fully cooperated with MLB and will continue to try and identify the source of the result."

The commissioner's office said Wright tested positive for Growth Hormone Releasing Peptide 2 (GHRP-2). He is the second player under the big league program to test positive for HGH, which has been screened for by baseball in blood tests since 2013.

"While we are disappointed by the news of this violation, we will look to provide the appropriate support to Steven at this time," the Red Sox said in a statement.

Wright was arrested on Dec. 8, 2017, at his home outside of Nashville, Tennessee, and charged with domestic related assault and prevention of a 911 call, both misdemeanors. The Boston Globe reported prosecutors retired Wright's case contingent on him completing an anger management course, refraining from violent contact with his wife, and incurring no new criminal charges for a year.

A starter for most of his career, Wright spent the bulk of last season in the bullpen, going 3-1 with a 2.68 ERA in 20 games. In addition to the 15-game suspension, he also missed all of April recovering from knee surgery and then went back on the

# Whiteside comes up big off bench

*LaVine scores 39 points, Bulls top 76ers*

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Hassan Whiteside may not be a starter right now, but he proved that isn't going to keep him from having a major impact for the Heat.

Miami's 7-foot center, who is coming off a hip injury and has been relegated to a reserve role for the first time since signing a four-year, \$98 million contract in 2016, turned in a big game at a big time in his return home.

Kelly Olynyk had 22 points and 11 rebounds, and Whiteside added 18 points, 15 rebounds and four blocks as the Heat defeated the Charlotte Hornets 91-84 on Wednesday night to break a tie for the eighth spot in the Eastern Conference.

"Hassan was tremendous," Miami coach Erik Spoelstra said. "Really had a tremendous impact on both ends of the floor. That's his best version."

If Whiteside is upset about Spoelstra's decision to start Bam Adebayo, he didn't show it after the game.

"It's whatever coach Spo wants, I'm going to do that," Whiteside said. "If he wants me to start, I'm going to start. If he wants me to come off the bench, I'm going to come off the bench."

A return home may have been what Whiteside needed.

He smiled as he answered questions, and talked about growing up 20 miles west of Charlotte in Gastonia, North Carolina where there was "only a Walmart." He said he spent time with his mother and younger brother at their nearby home in Mount Holly watching television before heading to the arena. He also

bought Bojangles chicken for his team after the win.

"It brings me back to reality," he said of his return home.

Olynyk had a big game, too.

After a rollercoaster season, he played 44 minutes and shot 8 of 14 from the field — including 5 of 7 from beyond the 3-point arc — on a night when almost everyone was struggling hitting shots.

In a game full of travels and bad passes — the teams combined for 39 turnovers — and plenty of poor shooting, the Heat emerged with the win largely because of a 16-2 fourth-quarter run.

Olynyk was huge during the stretch by hitting a pair of 3-pointers and grabbing a steal near the foul line leading to an uncontested dunk to give Miami an 80-67 lead. That prompted chants of "Let's Go Heat!" from the crowd — many of those fans wearing No. 3 jerseys in honor of Dwyane Wade's final NBA game in Charlotte.

The win was crucial for the Heat's playoff chances given the Hornets had won the previous two games this season. The teams meet again March 17 in Miami.

Kemba Walker and Frank Kaminsky each scored 20 points for Charlotte. Cody Zeller finished with 10 points and 10 rebounds.

Despite the loss, Hornets guard Nic Batum said of the team's playoff chances: "We're still in the race. ... There is a lot of basketball left."

## Bulls 108, 76ers 107

CHICAGO — Zach LaVine scored 39 points and hit the go-ahead layup in the closing seconds to lead the Chicago Bulls to a 108-107 victory over the Philadelphia 76ers.

LaVine scored 13 in the fourth quarter as the Bulls wiped out a 10-point deficit on their way to one wild victory.

LaVine missed the free throw, but the Bulls came away with the win after one more twist. He broke up Ben Simmons' inbound pass to Butler underneath the 76ers' basket. Both teams walked off the court and fans started to file out of the arena. The problem was, the horn sounded before anyone touched the ball.

After a review, the referees put 0.5 seconds back on the clock. But with one more chance, Philadelphia came up short when the inbound pass skipped off Butler's hands.

Harper has Phillies fans spending stupid money on his No. 3 jerseys, tees and caps, and the franchise has set records with ticket sales headed into the March 28 opener.

Billboards welcoming Harper to Philly line the interstate headed to Citizens Bank Park — and it's Harper driving retail traffic at a record clip.

No. 3 gear is No. 1 in Philadelphia.

"I can't wait to be a part of the Phillies for a long period of time," Harper said. "I've grown to love playing in Philly, love playing in Citizens Bank Park."

When Harper looks in the stands on opening day — and over the remainder of his record \$330 million, 13-year deal — he'll see thousands of fans wearing his jersey.

Fanatics said Harper's No. 3 Phillies jersey was the all-time best-seller for any athlete during the first 24 hours of launch. Aramark, which manages the Phillies New Era Team Store at the ballpark, said "interest is high and sales are brisk" and new waves of merchandise arrive daily. MLBShop.com offered free shipping on all U.S. orders over \$39 — a

walk in the park for fans buying the \$119 Harper batting practice waffle pullover hoodie or \$44.99 for the Harper toddler official cool base player jersey.

How's this for a sign that Harper Mania has come out of left field? A notice was posted on the team store this week the store ran out of letters and did "not have any more R's for Adult Home and Road Jerseys."

The die-hards haven't balked at the \$145 jerseys and \$35 T-shirts and shoppers are leaving with the bags full. One fan even sold the first Topps Bryce Harper Phillies baseball card for \$199.99 on eBay — no stale stick of gum included.

Fanatics, an online retailer, declined to reveal sales numbers but said New York Yankees slugger

Aaron Judge was the top seller last season and Harper, wearing No. 34 for the Washington Nationals, was 12th.

Harper already is a hit on the field, with a home run Wednesday in his first scrimmage with the Phillies.

Harper could make a case for MVP to stand for Most Valuable Purchase.

The Phillies once had the toughest ticket in baseball shortly after Citizens Bank Park opened in 2004 and the franchise set an NL record with 257 straight sellouts from 2009-12. The Phillies drew 3,777,322 fans in 2010 but failed to reach 2 million in any season from 2015-17. They were in the playoff hunt until August last season and drew 2,158,124 fans, though tickets flooded the secondary market at less than

\$10 a pop.

The Bryce Boon has formed old-school lines at the ticket window.

John Weber, the Phillies senior vice president of ticket operations, said the team sold 100,000 tickets last Thursday when the team signed Harper and another 80,000 tickets the next day. The Phillies sold 50,000 tickets over Saturday and Sunday and 45,000 more on Monday. Philadelphia sells face value tickets ranging from \$20 to \$140 — but opening day tickets started at \$103 (before fees) Wednesday on StubHub.

Weber said full season ticket equivalents have jumped from 9,500 to 12,300, thanks to the additions of Harper and four other All-Stars.

"You hope you have a price that is fair for the ups and downs as best you

can," Weber said. "It's not perfect. But we're not raising prices \$20, \$30 dollars. Let's get our fans here and let them enjoy the game as we move forward."

Marsha Zisling, of Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, was a season ticket holder during the World Series seasons and gave them up once the team bottomed out in the NL East. Zisling held a shopping bag with a Harper authentic jersey as she stood in line this week at the ticket window and browsed potential dates. She even tuned into a local sports radio station on the way to the park because she knew Harper would be a guest on the show.

"It's just been an exciting time to finally have enthusiasm about the Phillies," she said. "He was just on the radio, and I swear I started to cry

listening to him. He's just so genuine and really sincere about coming here and making the city his home."

Nancy Hatfield, of Philadelphia, said Phillies outfielder Andrew McCutchen was actually her favorite player but she had to splurge on Harper merchandise. She held a couple of Harper T-shirts on her stop at the stadium to pick up her tickets. Hatfield has been a season ticket holder since 1996 and said Harper has energized the fanbase perhaps even more than the Ryan Howard-Chase Utley-Jimmy Rollins glory years.

"We've been waiting for something good to happen," she said. "Now we just hope he doesn't get injured. That's the Philly Curse. It's been sad, all the empty seats the last couple of years."

Not everyone is on board with Harper's arrival.

Let's check in with Elias, the guitar-strumming WWE bad guy, of course, and not the source of baseball statistics and historical data.

"But you really want to know how I know I'm in Philly," he sang at Monday's WWE show. "Because the children here have no future no matter how hard they try. But you really want to know how I know I'm in Philly. Because Bryce Harper told me this was where his career would go to die."

The fans erupted in boos toward anyone who would dare slander their newest All-Star. Many fans were already wearing No. 3 T-shirts.

But Phillies fans may want to slow the spending spree and save some of their cash for a rainy day.

After all, Mike Trout is a free agent in two years.

# Calling all toms

The turkey hunters in south Florida have been in the woods busting beaks and filling skillets for a couple of weeks now. I'm getting reports rolling in from many of my friends telling me that the breeding season is in full swing down that way with some mighty impressive trophies. Here, in our hunting zone, which is anywhere north of State Road 70, the birds are just beginning to fire up and that means big things are in store for our season opener.

The woods have been alive with the gobblers herding their flocks and I'm excited. The 2019 season is kicking off this weekend with the two day youth season, which is a great gift to the kids from our Florida Wildlife Commission, to allow them to take to the woods for their own chance at calling in a gobbler for their family's table, but without having to do so in competition with the adults. Happily, I get to take advantage of this weekend, sort of a dress rehearsal for me, by guiding a youth to his first tom.

I was asked by a member of the 10can hunting team — who is organizing youth hunting opportunities on behalf of the FWC

— a few weeks back for help getting one of their participants a gobbler. I was very happy to assist and it works out well that the property they are hunting, happens to be one that I'm fairly intimate with and have taken some impressive old longbeards from in the past. I'll give an update next week to let you know how my assigned youth did.

Early season is an exciting time as the birds are fired up and I with use loud exciting calls to get a gobblers attention. I make my own callers and have a new box call I just finished sanding and tuning that is sounding perfect. I'll be using it in the mornings as the turkeys fly down to try to bring in a big boss tom right off of the limb. If he doesn't come on the run and gets henned-up with a harem it'll be a few hours before he's bred the receptive ones and breaks away. These late morning birds are the most vulnerable. That's when I'm trading up my box call for a pot and glass call made by Spring King calls.

I was contacted a while back and asked to use one of their calls to offer some feedback and I gave them a two thumbs up. It's got a soft and subtle yelp which

is an all-natural sound you won't find on the shelves in one of the mass-market chain stores. So, for late morning gobblers, desperate for a hen, I'm going to let that King sing and I'm pretty well confident I'm going to have a great time in the woods with this call.

If you haven't tried calling turkeys, there are only three vocalizations you need to master on your call to hunt them with success — yelps, clucks and purrs. Yelps strung together five or seven at a time in a rhythm to mimic a hen searching for a mate. Clucks are simply a casual call as if to say, "Hey, I'm over here," and purrs are the sound of content and feeding turkeys which when that big tom is hung up out of range, looking for the hen he thought was calling to him. Soft feeding purrs will sometimes draw him nearer to see if he can find that receptive hen while she is searching for her lunch.

You can find digital recordings of these, as well as a full range of turkey vocalizations at the National Wild Turkey Federation website, www.NWTF.org, to listen and practice mimicking on your own callers.

# Take a guide golfing, not fishing

First off, I'd just like to mention, we lost a captain friend that had been battling cancer. Capt. Don Franklin of Homosassa went home to be with the Lord last Saturday 3-2-19.

He was a longtime friend, associate and at once even my landlord. His unique forte was to take disabled and/or handicapped folks out on the water in his custom pontoon boat modified for easy wheelchair entry and exit for fishing, or just a scenic river cruise, running his Florida River Cruises business. He will be sorely missed.

Well, we're officially into March, and on the heels of the ever popular "cynoscion nebulosus," or spotted sea trout! Which, just for added info, did you know the spotted sea trout is actually in the "drum" family? Same category as the redfish and other related species.

BTW, I'm booking tarpon trips now for May and June. With a several good dates still open.

The trout fishing has been good when ole' Mother Nature straightens out and wants to cooperate. Especially when finding the warmer days instead of the ole' ugly cold front that moved through like the beginning of the week. Let's hope this is the last of the cold.

Good catches have been coming in behind the inner islands up and down the coast, from Yankeetown to Chass. Please watch your tides, and fish the last hour and a half or so of incoming, and first of falling, for best success. We've been using the Saltwater Assassin in pearl white and baby bass colors, rigged Texas weedless style or stupid style. This artificial bait darts and dashes with a motion that is never the same twice. Imitating an injured baitfish that trout won't leave alone if they're in the vicinity, and on the feed.

Redfish reports are spotty, with some catches coming in the same areas as trout. A lot of undersized ones in the mix. Work your points and bars.

Spawning, and with the same plastic Assassin lures, has been effective. This is a lot like bassing, which is one reason that makes it popular. What do you do a lot of when you bass fish? Casting and trolling. Unless your shiner fishing. The backcountry of Ozello and behind St. Martins Keys has been producing catches.

If you love bassing, and you're not going, you're missing out! I'm being told the bass are already bedding. What does that mean? They're congregated, hungry, and holding shallow. My good friend Larry told me he caught a nice one the other day on a buzzbait. He threw it right up to the edge of the bank. As he proceeded to crank and work it on top of the water an obese 3-pound bass exploded on it four times before piercing itself in the lip in a distance of probably 30 inches, before finally ending up in a igloo on ice. What does that tell ya? They're definitely hungry, and aggressive. No spaghetti that night for dinner!

Pan catches, as in specks and gills (bluegills), in the local waters, are still coming in strong, also. Get out there with your favorite color beetle spins or live baits, such as crickets or wigglers for the gills and minnows for specks to enjoy some of the action. There's no bad way to catch some "pans." And no better rod-bending fun for the kids.

If you recall in one of my earlier articles, I said to be a better angler you have to do a couple things. One of which that actually applies to any area you want to be good in. Which is what? You've got to hang around, or associate yourself with other people that share the same common goal or interest. Let stuff rub off, if ya know what I mean.

The other big secret is naturally spending time on the water fishing. You can't go golfing just twice a year and expect to be reel productive. Or any other thing for that matter. You get the idea. If you only want to go fishing a couple times a year and hope to be productive ... hire a guide then. That's what we're here for. Yeah, that's a better idea! Be safe, and good fishing.

### FRESHWATER

**WITHLACOOCHEE/RAINBOW RIVERS/ LAKE ROUSSEAU** — Captain Bob Jewett out of Angler's Resort in Dunnellon reports lots of bluegill hitting on jigs, crickets and wiggler worms on the Rainbow. There are some good-sized bass up the river, biting on wild and domestic shiners, as well as topwater plugs and worms in watermelon red or green pumpkin. Where the two rivers meet, a couple of nice catfish were caught using dead shiners and night crawlers. There have been bass in the same area caught on wild shiners. Up the Withlacoochee, bass are biting on wild and domestic shiners or frogs, while bluegill are hitting on wiggler worms and crickets. On Lake Rousseau, nice-sized bass are going for wild shiners.

**LAKE ROUSSEAU** — Bill Burgess of Lake Rousseau RV and Fishing reports crappie still hitting, in good sizes and quantities, as they seem to be moving up more into the

shallow. Use white or pink jigs tipped with a minnow, or a Road Runner tipped with a minnow. Nice quantities of catfish, weighing 3-4 pounds, have been caught using cut mullet. Bass fishing is solid, as they are in spawn and should remain there for a while. Folks are catching fish with topwater baits right up next to the weeds on Devil's Horses or Zoom Lizards.

### SALTWATER

**WITHLACOOCHEE** — Hook-Line and Sinker Bait and Tackle in Inglis reports lots of under- and lower-slot redfish caught in the river and flats around Yankeetown. Try shrimp, mud minnows or cut mullet during incoming or outgoing tides. Trout are biting on the inner and outer flats, use live shrimp on a jig head. Pompano are showing up regularly around the rock structure and flat areas.

**CRYSTAL RIVER/ BARGE CANAL** — Ed's Tackle Shop reports trout are biting in 1-2 feet of water, use an 8-ounce jig head on Gulp! Redfish are hitting during the incoming tide around the mangrove islands on Gulp! jerk

shad in new penny. Snook can be found on the rocky points around the mangrove islands, and mackerel are in 7-10 feet of water biting on live shrimp.

**HOMOSSASSA RIVER** — Bill Korade of Blue Water Bait and Tackle said there were good trout reports over the weekend, from around Markers 22-24. Use live shrimp under an equalizer. Spanish mackerel are starting to show up around the Bird Rack area. Redfish are fair, biting on cut mullet and cut pinfish. There are good mangrove snapper reports, in 30-35 feet of water hitting on small pinfish or cut sardines.

**KING'S BAY** — Jeff Fahrnkopf from Pete's Pier in Crystal River said the trout bite is real good in 3-5 feet of water, using Peter's Pier live shrimp under a float or a popping cork under a jig head, as well as an artificial lure under a popping cork. The redfish bite is starting to pick up on the oyster bars and mangrove islands using live shrimp or cut mullet. The sheepshead bite is real slow, with some caught in 25-30 feet of water using live shrimp under a knocker rig.

### AROUND CITRUS

Captain William Toney (352-422-4141) said, "With this week's burst of cold air expect the cooler water to bunch the trout back up. Again rocky points and knee-deep rock flats will hold the fish. D.O.A. glow jerk baits and MirrO lure MirrOdines will get the bite.

"The snook bite has been good on the incoming tide. They seem to be laying more away from the keys in sandy holes or deep pockets. I will

fish my way in from about 100 yards away from the intended spot so as not to run the snook over.

"I expect any time for some mixed fish action to start out on the inshore rock piles. Trout, Spanish mackerel, flounder, sea bass and bluefish will feed on shrimp near the bottom and sometimes will create a mud. Soft plastic lures in dark colors will get the bite. Remember if you are lucky enough to come across one of these

muds fish the up-tide end of it to stay with the fish.

"Tripletail have made an appearance on the stone crab trap buoys. The waters west of Crystal River seem to have more of them. When a tripletail is spotted do a wide circle around it and set up a drift to let the boat quietly drift to within casting distance with a live shrimp. High incoming tide will be early morning or late evening this weekend."

## Mango Tangos offers fresh seafood and more in Old Homosassa

**M**ango Tangos Tropical Grill in Old Homosassa is destination dining for folks who yearn for a taste of Cajun cooking, plus many other creative specialties.

The new owner is Brad Burkhardt, and Billy Curry manages the kitchen in the former Neon Leon's restaurant.

Curry segued to the new location from the Suncoast Diner on U.S. 19 after extensive highway construction forced that venue to close a couple of years ago.

Burkhardt said he learned the restaurant trade working in such places as pizza parlors to tonier dining such as Ruth's Chris Steakhouse in the Richmond, Virginia, area.

Curry notes he now cooks up "gallons of gumbo" weekly at Mango Tangos, along with spicy etoufee and jambalaya. The "Suncoast Specialty," is gumbo with chicken, sausage and okra swimming in white rice topped with blackened shrimp.

A familiar site along Yulee Drive about a mile from U.S. 19, Mango Tangos continues to evolve with fresh paint, new decor and an ambitious menu that includes daily \$7 lunch specials from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Weekends attract music lovers to the sounds of Zydeco and steel drums played by Cajun Dave on Friday nights, and the acoustic guitar of Walt Whitney on Sundays.

The ambiance definitely evokes scenes from New Orleans and Cajun country in Louisiana, with flashes of colorful walls and other decor.

Other entrees at Mango Tangos include a soft shell crab platter, \$30; crab cake platter, \$16; and shrimp scampi in a lemon wine herb sauce and fresh

shrimp over pasta in regular or Cajun style.

Some other choices are mussels Lafayette, fried oyster dinner, Key West blackened grouper with mango salsa and shrimp, New Orleans grouper stuffed with crabmeat piccata, crab-stuffed flounder and much more from the seafood list.

The grill is busy, too, offering a 10-ounce ribeye steak, pork chops, Danish baby back ribs, smothered chicken breast and "Sassy Chicken" with a sticky mango habanero sauce.

To name just a few of the \$7 lunch items, you will find meatloaf dinners, 1/2 rack of ribs, po' boy fish sandwiches, clam strip baskets, 5-ounce pork chops and other selections daily, all served with coffee or tea.

Wing lovers will enjoy myriad flavors including Cajun rub, mango habanero and honey teriyaki, at six for \$6, 12 for \$11 and 24 for \$20.

A smoked fish dip served with mango salsa and Captain's Wafers find favor with those who appreciate toothsome starters.

All sorts of subs, sandwiches and burgers, plus salads and popular sides such as macaroni and cheese, mixed greens, Cajun dirty rice, blackeyed peas, baked beans and potato salad round out the menu.

■ Needed a break from the usual kitchen duties earlier this week, so we went to World Fusion on County Road 486, when a yen for Asian specialties

would not be denied. I've never had a bad meal there, but this was time was exceptional, the freshly prepared sushi, a vegetable tempura plate with sweet potatoes, asparagus and eggplant and the delicious Israeli salad.

The folks in the kitchen at Fusion and behind the sushi bar really know what they're doing!

■ Earlier in the week, I turned a couple of quarts of fresh strawberries into shortcake with Bisquick biscuits for a winter treat. One of the best things about living in Florida is the abundance of strawberries in late winter and early spring.

■ Today's featured restaurant, Mango Tangos Tropical Grill, might tempt you to navigate the traffic mess in Homosassa. Friendly hosts and a menu to savor will make the trip worthwhile, along with the renovated former Neon Leon's site on Yulee Drive.

■ For the first time recently we tried Wright's

brand bacon when Winn-Dixie had a great special and I have to say, once you've tried it you probably won't go back to anything else. Thick sliced and meaty and so full of real bacon flavor. We had the Apple Wood Smoked version — sooo good! Sided it with homemade bread French toast for a super supper.

■ Lovers of all foods Mexican, take note that Taco Bell is testing the "Triplelupa," which is essentially three chalupas connected end-to-end with an abundance of fresh condiments.

The three-pack chain of chalupas is perforated for easy tearing and sharing.

The item, dubbed a "Triplelupa," first debuted during a test run in Orange County, Calif., last year, and is now available in Minneapolis as part of further testing, Taco Bell confirmed.

Much like a three-car freight train — albeit one transporting seasoned beef and cheese — each section of the Triplelupa

can be unhitched from one another at the two "tear-away" hinges located on the inner joints of the "caboose" or "engine."

Here's hoping the triple chalupa makes a debut in our county soon.

■ Finally, ever on the lookout for a great meat loaf, I came across the following easy recipe from a foodie friend on a recipe forum:

## BEST MEATLOAF EVER

- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 14-ounce can diced tomatoes with green chile peppers
- 1 sleeve buttery round (Ritz) crackers, crushed
- 1 teaspoon onion

flakes plus 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

■ 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder plus 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt

Preheat an oven to 375 degrees. Beat the egg in a mixing bowl, then add the ground beef, crushed crackers and tomatoes. Season with onion flakes, garlic powder, pepper and salt. Mix until evenly combined.

Pack into a 9- by 5-inch loaf pan. Top with favorite glaze or mixture of ketchup and a teaspoon of brown sugar. Bake in the preheated oven until no longer pink in the center, about 1 hour. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read at least 160 degrees. Serve with mashed potatoes.

Not only that, Daniel is also on the school board, so we get in on quite a bit of school stuff these days, which we enjoy.

Just yesterday, we took hot lunch for the teachers and all the school-children. We enjoyed every bit of it and even got to help the children play during recess time.

Now, since we can't just press a button to have our fresh bread going by on wheels, why not join me as we roll up our sleeves and mix up a batch of good old-fashioned bread?

I remember as a very young girl, helping my mother by kneading bread dough for her. To my shame, I distinctly recall how I thought it was completely unfair that my brothers didn't have to take their turn.

You know what? Today I am going to look for an opportunity to simply thank her for not giving in to all my wimpy ideas and self-pity.

30-45 minutes or until well doubled. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes, then rotate pans and bake another 15 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from bread from pans. Let set 20 minutes before putting into bags.

## GLORIA'S HOMEMADE BREAD

- 4 cups warm water
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar
  - 1/2 cup shortening
  - 1 tablespoon salt
  - 2 tablespoon instant yeast
  - 2 rounded tablespoons wheat gluten (available in bulk food stores)
  - 3 cups whole wheat flour
  - 9-10 cups bread flour
- Mix well. Rise till double (about 30 minutes), smash down and rise again till double.

Next, spread a bit of shortening onto the table or wherever you're working out your dough, then kneed into a loaf shape, dividing into 4 well-greased loaf pans, (it'll be approximately 1 1/2 pounds per loaf).

Let rise another

# Cheesy nachos sure to get your kids' party started

## America's Test Kitchen

These nachos are a cinch to make and can turn after-school snack time for a few kids into something of a fiesta. Or double the recipe and use a 13- by 9-inch baking dish, and you'll have enough nachos to really get the party started!

If you like your nachos spicy, layer in some drained pickled jalapeno chiles along with the scallions. Monterey Jack cheese melts well and is the classic choice for nachos, but cheddar

works too. Follow this recipe with your kids.

## NACHOS

- Servings:** 4-6  
**Start to finish:** 35 minutes  
**Prepare Ingredients:**
- 1 (15-ounce) can pinto beans
  - 4 ounces tortilla chips
  - 1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese
  - 2 scallions, sliced thin
  - 1 cup tomato salsa
  - Greek yogurt or sour cream

## Gather Cooking Equipment:

- Colander
  - Can opener
  - 1/2 cup dry measuring cup
  - 8- by 8-inch square baking dish
  - Oven mitts
  - Cooling rack
  - Spoon
- Adjust oven rack to middle position and heat oven to 400 degrees. Set colander in sink. Open can of pinto beans and pour into colander. Rinse beans with cold water and shake colander to

drain well. Measure out 1/2 cup beans; refrigerate remaining beans for another use.

Spread half of chips in even layer in 8- by 8-inch square baking dish. Sprinkle chips evenly with half of cheese.

Sprinkle beans over cheese, then sprinkle half of scallions on top. Repeat with remaining chips, cheese and scallions.

Place baking dish in oven and bake until cheese is melted, 7 to 10 minutes. Use oven mitts to remove nachos from oven (ask an adult for help). Place baking dish

on cooling rack. Let cool for 2 minutes.

Spoon half of salsa over top of nachos. Serve with remaining salsa and yogurt.
