Amy Meek stepping down; Meghan Pitzer becoming executive director

Although Meghan Pitzer is not a new face at United Way of Citrus County, she hasn't been the face of United Way of Citrus County.

Coast Guard saves Inverness boaters

Rescuers saved four Inverness boaters Saturday from a capsized boat off the coast of Citrus County.

Brian and Brittany Thompson, 35 and 34, and Lincoln and Joanna Fraser, 44 and 42, activated a personal locator beacon at around 11:29 a.m. after their vessel overturned roughly 35 miles west of Homosassa, according to a U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) news release.

A USCG MH-60 Jayhawk helicopter lifted off from Clearwater and found the four people without life jackets sitting and clinging to their overturned 26-foot boat.

The helicopter crew hoisted the boaters from the water, and took them back to Clearwater, where medics were waiting for them.

A USCG boat crew from the agency's station in Yankeetown and the USCG Cutter Pelican were also called to assist.

Governor announces task force on opioid crisis

Fla. attorney general will chair the group

SANFORD — Florida's Office of Drug Control will be re-established in the governor's office and a state task force on drug abuse will be set up to provide a unified vision for battling the state's opioid epidemic, Gov. Ron DeSantis said Monday.

The governor appointed Attorney General Ashley Moody to chair the statewide task force, which will develop a strategy and make recommendations. The Office of Drug Control will support the task force's efforts.

Moody said Florida loses 17 people a day to the drug crisis, including one on Monday in Seminole County, where the announcement took place.

These efforts will help the people "who are fighting in the trenches on a daily basis have the tools and resources they need not only to prevent people from becoming addicted but to go after the drug organizations that seek to poison our children and citizens," Moody said.

The drug control office will coordinate with state and federal officials in leveraging resources to reduce opioid abuse. Various state agencies already have substance-abuse programs but the Office of Drug Control will centralize those efforts so Florida can act with a unified vision, the governor said.

"The opioid epidemic has devastated families and communities throughout our state," DeSantis said during a news conference at the Sanford Fire Department. "These are issues that require serious, comprehensive action."

Former Gov. Jeb Bush established the Office of Drug Control in the late 1990s as one of his first acts as governor. Bush's daughter, Noelle Bush, battled addiction and had a stint in

'Agritourism' owner faces deadline over building permit

County says fire-code inspection needed for weddings/receptions in barn; landowner disagrees

A landowner who has battled the county for nearly two years over his offering weddings and receptions on his Lakeside ranch now faces a Friday deadline to apply for a building permit over fire code issues.

Gregory Williams, who has requested annexation to the city of Inverness, is hosting weddings and receptions in an enclosed barn that is meant only for storage of farm equipment, county

officials say.

Letters from the county's fire marshal to Williams say he has until Friday to file for a building permit, which would then lead to the county formally inspecting the property to ensure it meets fire codes.

Williams, who has three lawsuits pending against the county over his "agritourism" business on the property, said he has no intention to meet the deadline.

County Attorney Denise Dymond Lyn said if Williams does not file for the permit by Friday,

she may ask the county commission next week for permission to seek a court injunction that would stop Williams from hosting weddings and receptions until the fire marshal's matter is cleared.

"I don't want to be responsible for the lives of how many people who might be at a wedding reception, who are assuming they're going to a place with correct safety measures," County Attorney Denise Dymond Lyn said Monday.

Williams, who has named Lyn personally in two of the three lawsuits against the county, said state law protects agritourism activities. So long as the building capacity is below 300, he said, a permit isn't necessary.

Plus, he said, the barn is used most of the time to store farm equipment, such as tractors and horse carriages. It's emptied of equipment for weddings.

"There are agritourism regulations specific to barns for agritourism," he said Monday. "It's their position they don't apply. My position is they do."

The county and Williams have fought over whether wedding receptions fit into the agritourism definition.

Williams owns over 600 acres of farmland adjacent to Lakeside Country Club, about midway between Inverness and Hernando off U.S. 41.

In 2017, Williams received a waiver from the county for complying with Florida building code when he wanted to provide electricity to one of the structures known as the "white" barn. The county gave him the blanket release, stating it was a "nonresidential farm building," exempt from the state building code.

Williams's application states the building would be used for "storage of farm equipment and irrigation."

Williams said he didn't include that it would also house weddings and receptions because the county already knew that

based on prior code compliance enforcement.

"They knew what we were doing," he said.

Citrus County Fire Rescue didn't see it that way. According to a letter it sent Williams in January, the county learned the enclosed barn was being utilized for weddings and

receptions, and they asked for an inspection. From the inspection, fire officials concluded that Williams should have applied for an electrical permit and for a building permit that would allow for inspections to bring the

barn into fire code. Williams said he is happy to make the barn safe for anyone renting it, but he doesn't believe the county has the authority to order him to apply for a building permit.

"I think we've met all the safety measures we require," he said. "It's more of the same games that get played over there."

Lyn said if the April 5 deadline to Williams passes without compliance, she may ask the county commission at its meeting next week to seek court action.

"Public safety could be endangered without proper permits," she said. "He has weddings scheduled through January, February of next year."

Williams said he is trying to be reasonable.

"We want to bend over backwards," he said, "to make it safe."

Florida could make it tougher to amend state constitution

TALLAHASSEE — It could become more difficult to change the Florida constitution through a petition drive under a bill approved by a Senate committee.

The Senate Judiciary Committee approved the bill 4-2 on Monday, with Republicans supporting the measure and Democrats opposed.

The bill places new restrictions on paid petition gatherers. All would have to be Florida residents, and all would have to register with the Department of State. Petition gatherers would have to be paid an hourly salary and could not be paid based on the number of signatures gathered.

Committee Chairman Sen. David Simmons said the bill is to protect the integrity of the petition process. Democratic Sen. Javier Rodriguez opposed the bill, saying it's an attempt to silence voters.

Eighth panther death of the year recorded

The eighth Florida panther death of the year was announced Monday by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

The remains of the panther, an uncollared 4-year-old male known as UCFP352, were collected on Saturday by the agency on State Road 80, approximately a half-mile west Murray Road in Hendry County. The panther reportedly died after being struck by a vehicle.

Six of the panther deaths this year have been attributed to vehicle collisions.

Thirty panther deaths were recorded in Florida in 2018, 26 of which were attributed to vehicle collisions. Three litters encompassing nine kittens — five males and four females — were recorded by FWC last year.

At this point in 2018, the agency had recorded 13 panther deaths.

The agency estimates there are approximately 120 to 230 wild adult panthers left in Florida.

State drops pot fight

Dispensary operator allowed to open more locations

TALLAHASSEE — State health officials have dropped an appeal of a Tallahassee judge's ruling and agreed to allow Florida's largest medical marijuana operator to open more dispensaries than a state law allowed.

Quincy-based Trulieve challenged a limit on the number of storefronts that was included in

a 2017 law aimed at carrying out a 2016 constitutional amendment that broadly legalized medical marijuana.

The cap, initially set at 25 dispensaries for each operator, gradually increases as the number of eligible patients in a statewide database increases. The cap, now at 35, is slated to end in April 2020. Trulieve, which currently operates 26 dispensaries, argued the restriction

"arbitrarily impairs product availability and safety" and "unfairly penalizes" pot providers. Trulieve also argued that the cap was problematic because it was imposed after the company had already opened 14 locations.

Leon County Circuit Judge Karen Gievers agreed, finding that the voter-approved constitutional amendment included no caps on the number of dispensaries.

Man agrees to five-year plea deal

As his trial was gearing up to start Tuesday with opening statements, a Homosassa man agreed to spend five years behind bars for ransacking a Homosassa vehicle dealership.

Attorneys were about to question a jury panel Monday morning when 31-year-old Robert James Jordan II made Assistant State Attorney Kevin Davis an offer to serve a five-year term as a habitual felony offender (HFO) for breaking into and stealing from Village Toyota last May, according to Davis and court records.

Davis agreed. Jordan pleaded no contest to burglarizing a structure and possessing burglary tools and Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard adjudicated Jordan guilty on his third-degree felony counts.

Jordan's third charge, of stealing between \$300 and \$5,000 in goods, was dropped by Davis. Jordan's imprisonment will also serve as punishment for his six other felony theft cases in Citrus County stemming from offenses committed last May, June and August, court records show.

Had a jury convicted Jordan as charged, Howard could have imposed a prison sentence of up to 15 years, or more if the judge designated Jordan as an HFO.

Davis, in a phone interview after court, said he decided to accept Jordan's low-end offer

because the defendant didn't score prison time.

Jordan had been previously convicted of five similar third-degree felonies from 2012 to 2015, but was not imprisoned as punishment, according to Davis.

A Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputy pulled Jordan and Dakota Lee Tedder over for driving out of the dealership at around 4:37 a.m. on May 27 without headlights on. Jordan's arrest report shows.

From the vehicle, police recovered four tires, four tire rims, a ladder, a gas can and a trailer hitch that were stolen from the dealership, valued at \$1,625.

Tedder, 29, of Homosassa, pleaded no contest in November to charges of burglarizing a structure and possessing burglary tools in exchange for 30 months in prison as an HFO, court records show.

Jordan's offer also followed Howard's ruling that morning to deny to a pair of motions his lawyer, Amanda Micallef, filed late Sunday night and early Monday morning to have Howard postpone Jordan's trial and to suppress part of Davis' case from becoming evidence.

Howard asked Micallef how Davis was supposed to respond to her court filings hours before jury selection.

"Who also is going to be up but you?" the judge said.

"It won't matter what time it was filed electronically," Micallef responded. "Let me put it on the record."

Micallef explained she was forced to file those motions because Davis gave her information last Friday on the surveillance company responsible for the camera footage provided to authorities that purportedly showed Jordan and Tedder burglarizing the dealership's shed.

Davis told Howard he did not list the surveillance company as a trial witness.

Micallef added she had also been asking Davis for those specifics for six months, adding her private detective was delayed in getting onto the dealership's lot to do more investigating.

"The state is the one controlling the discovery in this case," Micallef said. "They have an obligation to provide that information in a timely manner."

Howard rejected Micallef's motions for being "legal nullities."

"I'm not going to waste everybody's time on your late filings," the judge told Micallef. "You can tell that to the Supreme Court ... they're going to laugh you right out of the court."

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



Game of Thrones takes over Bellagio fountains in Vegas

LAS VEGAS — Winter came to Las Vegas. Fire-breathing dragons held court over the world-famous fountains at the Bellagio casino-resort Sunday, as familiar elements from the TV phenomenon "Game of Thrones" were projected on the rising water. The jets danced to a score incorporating the recognizable theme song before one of the colossal beasts lit up the lake along the Las Vegas Strip in a blaze of pyrotechnics. Florida's drug court program.

Former Gov. Rick Scott dismantled the office as one of his first acts as governor more than a decade later. Despite calls to re-establish the office as the opioid epidemic grew worse this decade, Scott never did, and it became a priority for Moody as she campaigned for office last year.

before us," DeSantis said. Bush on Monday tweeted a thanks to DeSantis. "I know his efforts will go a long way in helping Florida fight this growing and heartbreaking crisis," Bush said.

DeSantis also said Florida has secured an additional \$26 million in federal funding for the state's opioid response project. At the news conference, the governor also announced

Dr. Scott Rivkees as the next Florida Surgeon General. At a separate announcement later in the day in Palm Beach County, the governor said he was naming Thomas Frazer as Florida's first chief

science officer.

Dr. Gary Goodman, an emergency medicine physician in Seminole County, said he sees more than a half-dozen overdoses each day and most of them require critical-care attention, like a ventilator.

"If they can give us an opportunity to take care of patients in Florida a lot better, it's going to make our days a lot easier and patient survival a lot better and a lot higher," said Goodman after the news conference.



Government closest to people governs best

The Jeffersonian maxim that government closest to the people governs best is a central plank of republicanism. Nonetheless, Florida’s Republican-dominated Legislature in recent years has been steadily moving away from this central plank toward centralizing local governance at the state level.

Reflecting an attitude that Tallahassee knows best, Republican lawmakers in past legislative sessions have supported legislation that has preempted to the state a number of local governance functions, such as the regulation of guns and ride-sharing companies.

The current legislative session is proving no different with a potpourri of nearly 50 proposals aimed at giving the state control over a variety of local matters. Illustrative of the state’s intrusion into local matters are proposals as to where vegetable gardens and short-term rentals can be located, when community redevelopment agencies can be created, how restaurants and other establishments distribute plastic straws, and how “local option” sales-tax referendums are to be handled.

Among this potpourri of legislative proposals that erode home rule, HB 5 (Discretionary Sales Surtax) proposed by state Rep. Nick DiCeglie, R-Indian Rocks Beach, promises to be the most damaging, if passed.

As proposed, HB 5 would require local option sales-tax referendums to be held only during general elections and require two-thirds approval of the voters. Furthermore, it would mandate

that local option sales tax referendums be reviewed and audited by the state’s Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability 180 days prior to a general election, which could possibly stop the referendum from even occurring.

This would constitute a dramatic change from the current requirement that allows counties and municipalities to raise the sales tax by up to 2.5 cents above the state’s rate of 6 cents on the

dollar with the approval of a majority of voters during either a general, primary or special election.

Of all the Tallahassee preemption proposals, HB 5 has created a groundswell of angst among county and municipal officials, given that it is a direct assault on home rule that would greatly restrict the ability of local governments to build roads and schools, buy police cars or fire trucks, and provide essential services.

To think that what is good for Duval County is good for Citrus County or what is good for St. Petersburg is good for Crystal River denies the reality that each community has different needs and approaches. As such, local officials must have the ability and flexibility to do what they know is best for their communities.

It is certainly ironic that Republican state lawmakers like to invoke the Jeffersonian maxim that government closest to the people governs best when citing Washington’s overreach into the state’s domain, but continue to erode home rule each legislative session in favor of dictates from Tallahassee.

Biden team blasts 'trolls' amid scrutiny

WASHINGTON — Aides to Joe Biden struck a more aggressive tone on Monday as the former vice president faced scrutiny over his past behavior toward women.

In a statement, Biden spokesman Bill Russo blasted "right wing trolls" from "the dark recesses of the internet" for conflating images of Biden embracing acquaintances, colleagues and friends in his official capacity during swearing-in ceremonies with uninvited touching.

The move came on a day in which a second woman said Biden had acted inappropriately, touching her face with both hands and rubbing noses with her in 2009. The allegation by Amy Lappos, a former aide to Democratic Rep. Jim Hines of Connecticut, followed a magazine essay by former Nevada politician Lucy Flores.

Boeing, FAA say more time needed for fix

Boeing and U.S. aviation regulators say the company needs more time to finish changes in a flight-control system suspected of playing a role in two deadly crashes.

The Federal Aviation Administration said Monday it anticipates Boeing's final software improvements for 737 Max airliners "in the coming weeks."

Boeing was expected to complete the work last week, but FAA spokesman Greg Martin said the company needs more time to make sure it has identified and addressed all issues.

Baltimore mayor on leave as scandal grows

BALTIMORE — Baltimore's embattled mayor announced Monday that she is taking an indefinite leave of absence, just as a political scandal intensifies over what critics call a "self-dealing" book-sales arrangement that threatens her political career.

Mayor Catherine Pugh's office says she feels unable to fulfill her obligations as mayor due to deteriorating health brought on by a recent bout of pneumonia.

In a letter to the state prosecutor released Monday, Gov. Larry Hogan said allegations facing Pugh and her questionable no-contract arrangements to sell her "Healthy Holly" children's books are "deeply disturbing." Hogan said he was particularly concerned about \$500,000 in sales over seven years to a university-based health care system "because it has significant continuing ties with the State and receives very substantial public funding."

Dems demand report

Congressional leaders preparing to subpoena Justice Department

WASHINGTON — The House Judiciary Committee will prepare subpoenas this week seeking special counsel Robert Mueller's full Russia report as the Justice Department appears likely to miss an April 2 deadline set by Democrats for the report's release.

The Judiciary panel plans to vote on subpoenas Wednesday, a day after the deadline. The chairmen of several House committees asked for the full, unredacted report last week

after Attorney General William Barr released a four-page summary laying out the report's "principal conclusions." Barr said in a letter to the House and Senate Judiciary committees on Friday that a redacted version of the full 300 page report would be released by mid-April, "if not sooner."

The planned committee vote, announced Monday morning, would not automatically issue subpoenas but authorize House Judiciary Committee Chairman Jerrold Nadler, D-N.Y., to send them if he decides to do so.

"As I have made clear,

Congress requires the full and complete special counsel report, without redactions, as well as access to the underlying evidence," Nadler said in a statement. "Attorney General Barr has thus far indicated he will not meet the April 2 deadline set by myself and five other committee chairs, and refused to work with us to provide the full report, without redactions, to Congress."

The vote comes as Democrats are escalating their battle with the Justice Department over how much of the report they will be able to see — a fight that could eventually end up in

court. Democrats have said they will not accept redactions and will almost certainly be unhappy with the amount of information provided by Barr when the department releases the report in the coming weeks.

The panel will also vote Wednesday to authorize subpoenas related to a number of President Donald Trump's former top advisers, including strategist Steve Bannon, Communications Director Hope Hicks, Chief of Staff Reince Priebus, White House Counsel Donald McGahn and counsel Ann Donaldson.

Erdogan faces setbacks in local elections

ISTANBUL — Turkey's opposition looked poised to win control of the country's two biggest cities Monday as it dealt President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's conservative party one of its most serious electoral setbacks in years. The opposition won Ankara, a ruling party stronghold for decades, and was leading a tight race for mayor in Istanbul, according to unofficial figures Monday.

The leader who has dominated Turkish politics for 16 years declared victory despite the opposition gains.

Sunday's local elections were widely seen as a gauge of support for Erdogan as the nation of 81 million faces a daunting economic recession. They were also a first test for Erdogan since he got widely expanded presidential powers last year.

Venezuelan judge could strip Guaido's immunity

CARACAS, Venezuela — Venezuela's chief justice on Monday asked lawmakers to strip opposition leader Juan Guaido of immunity, taking a step toward prosecuting him for alleged crimes as he seeks to oust President Nicolas Maduro.

Supreme Court Justice Maikel Moreno said Guaido should be prosecuted for violating a ban on leaving the country when he went on a tour of Latin American nations that back a change in Venezuela's government.

Since a massive power failure struck March 7, the nation has experienced near-daily blackouts and a breakdown in critical services such as running water and public transportation.

UK Parliament rejects Brexit alternatives

LONDON — Britain's Parliament has spoken — and it has said no, again.


Lawmakers seeking a way out of the country's Brexit morass on Monday rejected four alternatives to the government's unpopular European Union divorce deal that would have softened or even halted Britain's departure.

With just 12 days until the U.K. must come up with a new plan or crash out of the bloc in chaos, the House of Commons threw out four options designed to replace Prime Minister Theresa May's thrice-rejected Brexit deal — though in some cases by a whisker.

The result leaves May's Conservative government facing difficult and risky choices. It can gamble on a fourth attempt to push May's unloved deal through Parliament, let Britain tumble out of the bloc without a deal, or roll the dice by seeking a snap election to shake up Parliament. May has summoned her Cabinet for a marathon meeting Tuesday to thrash out the options.

Official would reportedly coordinate government response

WASHINGTON — As he threatens to shut down the southern border, President Donald Trump is considering bringing on a "border" or "immigration czar" to coordinate immigration policy across various federal agencies, according to four people familiar with the discussions.

Trump is weighing at least two potential candidates for the post: former Kansas Secretary of State Kris Kobach and former Virginia Attorney General Ken Cuccinelli, according to the people, who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the conversations publicly.

Kobach and Cuccinelli are far-right conservatives with strong views on immigration. Cuccinelli was seen at the White House on Monday.

The planning comes as Trump is threatening anew to close the U.S.-Mexico border as soon as this week if Mexico does not completely halt illegal immigration

into the U.S. And it serves as the latest sign that the president plans to continue to hammer his hard-line immigration rhetoric and policies as he moves past the special counsel's Russia investigation and works to rally his base heading into his 2020 re-election campaign.

Aides hope the potential appointment, which they caution is still in the planning stages, would serve as the "face" of the administration on immigration issues and would placate both the president and his supporters, showing he is serious and taking action.

White House press aides, Kobach and Cuccinelli did not immediately respond Monday to requests for comment. Kobach previously served as vice chair of the president's short-lived election fraud commission, which was disbanded after finding little evidence of widespread abuse.

A Department of Homeland Security official noted that White House czars have been appointed in the past when there has been an "urgent need" for sustained, inter-agency policy coordination. While Homeland Security often plays a leading role when it

comes to immigration policy and enforcement, the department is not in charge of officials at the departments of Health and Human Services, State, Defense and Justice, which often play key roles.

Trump has often complained, both publicly and privately, about how he has not been able to do more to stop the tide of illegal immigration, which he has likened to an "invasion" and described as a national security crisis. Arrests along the southern border have skyrocketed in recent months and border agents were on track to make 100,000 arrests or denials of entry in March. More than half of those are families with children.

Still, Trump has been pushing. He has deployed National Guard troops to the border, forced a government shutdown to try to pressure Congress to provide more money for his long-promised border wall, and eventually signed an emergency declaration to circumvent lawmakers. He also moved Saturday to cut direct aid to El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras, where citizens are fleeing north and overwhelming U.S. resources at the southern border.

Four dead at North Dakota business

MANDAN, N.D. — Four people were found dead Monday in what police called a "multiple homicide" at a North Dakota property-management business.

Three men and a woman were found dead inside RJR Maintenance and Management in Mandan, a city of about 22,000 just across the Missouri River west of Bismarck, Police Chief Jason Ziegler said. The victims weren't immediately identified and police didn't say how they died.

"It's quite a large crime

scene, so it's not something that's going to be easy for us to get in and do quickly," Ziegler said of the pace of the investigation.

The building has a front office area and a large back warehouse area. Officers were at the scene all day and planned to be there "as long as it takes us to get everything that we need," the chief said.

Ziegler said the public wasn't believed to be in danger, but he also said police do not believe the suspect is among the dead. He said he had no information on a suspect and that police have no motive. Authorities were not

searching any other buildings or locations.

"The crime scene is contained to where it's at, and there is no evidence based upon what we see that the public at large is in any danger from what happened there," Ziegler said. "It looks like an isolated incident."

He said he was not aware of officers responding to any other recent incidents at the business that might have been connected to the killings.

The building had numerous surveillance cameras, Ziegler said, and he asked any other businesses in the area with video footage

they thought might be relevant to come forward.

Police announced in a brief statement Monday morning that they had found "several" bodies while responding to a "medical call" to RJR. As hours passed without additional information, people with friends or loved ones who work at RJR gathered beyond a police line, anxious for news about those inside.

RJR's website identified it as a family-owned company that has been handling commercial and residential properties in Bismarck and Mandan for more than 20 years.

Lightning join elite club with 60th victory

Just the third team in NHL history to mark

OTTAWA, Ontario — Yannick Gourde had two goals and an assist and the Tampa Bay Lightning became just the third team in NHL history to win 60 games in a season with a 5-2 victory over the Ottawa Senators on Monday night.

Mikhail Sergachev, Brayden Point and Steven Stamkos also scored for the Lightning (60-15-4), while Nikita Kucherov had two assists. Andrei Vasilevskiy made 22 saves.

The other teams to win at least 60 regular-season games in a season are the 1976-77 Montreal Canadiens (60-8-12) and the 1995-96 Detroit Red Wings (62-13-7).

Brady Tkachuk and Max Veronneau scored for the Senators. Craig Anderson, playing in his 400th game with the

Senators, stopped 21 shots.

Trailing 3-1, the Senators made it a one-goal game as Veronneau scored his second career goal in tight on Vasilevskiy, but less than a minute later the Lightning regained their two-goal lead with Gourde scoring his second of the game on a breakthrough.

Stamkos made it 5-2 with less than three minutes remaining.

The Lightning jumped out to a 3-1 second-period lead after a slow start to the game.

Sergachev made it 2-1 midway through the period with a shot from just inside the blueline with Anderson screened, while Point made it 3-1 with his 41st of the season. Gourde made a behind-the-back pass to Point, who was left all alone out front.

The Lightning opened the scoring at

Lowe, Kiermaier homer, streaking Rays hammer Rockies 7-1

ST. PETERSBURG — Brandon Lowe and Kevin Kiermaier homered to back a strong performance by Tampa Bay's bullpen in a 7-1 victory over the Colorado Rockies on Monday night.

Employing the opener strategy that has been an integral part of their success since the team began using relievers to fill in for traditional starting pitchers last May, the Rays won for the fourth straight time since a season-opening loss to

Houston — matching the best five-game start in franchise history.

Opener Ryne Stanek got it started before a crowd of 10,860, with Ryan Yarbrough (1-0) following and allowing one run and three hits over 4 2/3 innings. Relievers Wilmer Font, Jalen Beeks, Jose Alvarado and Diego Castillo finished up.

Lowe hit a two-run homer in the fourth and Kiermaier added a three-run shot in the sixth to inflict most of the damage against Colorado starter Chad Bettis (0-1), who allowed six runs

and seven hits in 5 2/3 innings.

Kiermaier drove in a fourth run with a seventh-inning sacrifice fly.

Nolan Arenado's RBI double in the sixth snapped a 17-inning scoreless streak for the Rockies, who've dropped three straight after winning the first two games of the season at Miami.

Yarbrough led major league rookies with 16 victories last season, 14 of them out of the bullpen — most by a reliever since Toronto's Mark Eichhorn and Roger McDowell of the New York Mets

The trip is always emotional, but Izzo has done it before. This will be his eighth Final Four and a chance for a second national championship.

The other three Final Four coaches all will be the new kids at the dance.

Chris Beard's nomadic journey struck a vein of gold in his 12th coaching stop at Texas Tech, with a gritty pack of ball-hawking players grasping the program's first Final Four. Their opponent next Saturday in Minneapolis: Izzo's Spartans.

Virginia's Tony Bennett finally got over the hump in his 10th season with the Cavaliers, putting them in position for a different kind of history after last year's historic first-round flame out against No. 16 UMBC.

And Bruce Pearl found some gems at Auburn after an acrimonious split with Tennessee, guiding the Tigers to Minneapolis where they'll face Virginia despite the cloud of a federal investigation hanging over the program.

"I'm so happy for the people at Auburn who have been waiting forever to get their first Final Four," Pearl said.



Pearl was fired by Tennessee in 2011 and hit with a "show-cause" penalty by the NCAA for a string of violations and lying to investigators.

He landed at Auburn in 2014 and the dark clouds followed.

Tigers assistant Chuck Person pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit bribery and two players, Austin Wiley and Danjel Purifoy, were ruled ineligible last season as a result of the federal investigation. Just before this year's SEC tournament, assistant coach Ira Bowman was suspended indefinitely amid bribery allegations during his time at Pennsylvania.

Despite the off-court issues, The Tigers (30-9) shot their way into the Final Four for the first time by taking down blue bloods Kansas, North Carolina and Kentucky in succession.

"No matter how low we got this season, no matter how much adversity went through, we always believed this is where we could get to," said Auburn's Bryce Brown, who had 24 points in the Elite

Eight win over Kentucky. Beard was at Division II Angelo State just four years ago, the ABA's South Carolina Warriors three years before that. He took over a middling Texas Tech program in 2016 and turned it around by getting non-five-star players to buy into his defensive philosophies.

Texas Tech reached the Elite Eight for the first time in Beard's second season a year ago, but not much was expected from the Red Raiders this season after losing five of their top six scorers.

Picked to finish seventh in the preseason poll, Texas Tech was one of college basketball's biggest surprises, sharing the Big 12 regular-season championship with Kansas State to end Kansas' 14-year reign. After a hiccup against West Virginia in the conference tournament, Texas Tech (30-6) and the nation's most efficient defense shut down four straight NCAA Tournament opponents to reach the program's first Final Four.

"It is real. That defense is real," Gonzaga coach Mark Few said after the Red Raiders bounced the Zags from the Elite Eight. So is Virginia's. Using the same

principles his father, Dick, ran at Wisconsin and Washington State, Cavaliers coach Tony Bennett runs a "pack line" defense that forces teams to the perimeter. As the name suggests, Virginia packs its defense into the paint, clogging driving lanes, help defenders already in place to fill the gaps in the defense.

Bennett needed a few years to cement the foundation of his defensive principles, but once he did, Virginia became one of the nation's top defenses. The Cavaliers led the nation in scoring at 55 points per game this season and are fifth in KenPom's defensive efficiency. Virginia (33-3) shut down its first three opponents and survived an offensive onslaught by Purdue's Carsen Edwards to earn its first Final Four since 1984.

Bounced in a historic loss a year ago, the Cavaliers finally got Bennett

the one piece missing from his resume.

"There was a burning desire to get these guys and our program to a Final Four and hopefully beyond," Tony Bennett said.

GREENSBORO, N.C. — Lauren Cox had 22 points and 11 rebounds, and Baylor earned its first Final Four berth since 2012 by beating Iowa 85-53 on Monday night in the Greensboro Regional final.

Didi Richards added 16 points and 10 rebounds, Chloe Jackson had 14 points and the Bears (35-1) — the top overall seed — won their 27th straight game by shooting 53%, clamping down on All-American Megan Gustafson and her supporting cast and holding the nation's best shooting team to a season-worst 32%.

Now it's on to Tampa for the school's fourth Final Four and its first in seven years — when the Bears won their second national championship.

The 6-foot-4 Cox — a third-team AP All-America pick — and fellow twin tower Kalani Brown, a 6-7 second-team All-American, teamed up to dominate both the glass and the heavily-hyped matchup with Gustafson, the nation's leading scorer at 27.9 points per game.

Brown finished with 14 points, and Baylor held a 47-26 rebounding advantage with 20 second-chance points to six for Iowa.

Gustafson finished with 23 points on 9-of-17 shooting, but was held without a rebound in the second half for second-seeded Iowa (29-7). Kathleen Doyle and Tania Davis each had 10 points.

Take medications as prescribed

Sticking to your medication routine means taking your medications as prescribed, the right dose, at the right time, in the right way and frequency.

Why is doing these things important? Simply put, not taking your medicine as prescribed by a doctor or instructed by a pharmacist could lead to your disease getting worse, hospitalization, even death. And, this failure to take medications as prescribed has significant consequences.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that failure to take medications as instructed causes 30 to 50 percent of chronic disease treatment failures, and 125,000 deaths per year

in this country. For example, 25 to 50 percent of patients being treated with statins, which are cholesterol-lowering medications, who stop their therapy within one year have up to a 25 percent increased risk for dying.

And the statistics regarding taking medications as directed are eye opening. Did you know that 20 to 30 percent of new prescriptions are never filled at the pharmacy? And that medication is not taken as prescribed 50 percent of the time. And this is seen in both

chronic conditions, as well as acute ones.

For patients prescribed medications for chronic diseases, after six months, the majority take less

medication than prescribed, or stop the medication altogether. And only 51 percent of patients taking medications for high blood pressure continue taking their medication during their long-term treatment.

So, why do we have problems following medication schedules? Many patients do not follow health-care provider instructions on how to take medications for various reasons: such as, not understanding the directions, forgetfulness, multiple medications with different regimens, unpleasant side effects, or the medication doesn't seem to be working. And, the cost can also be a factor causing medication non-adherence; patients can't afford to fill their prescriptions or decide to take less than the prescribed dose to make the prescription last longer due to budget constraints.

Are intranasal steroids safe?

Intranasal steroids are used for a number of reasons including treating congestion, allergies and nasal polyps to name a few. Intranasal steroids like their big brothers, oral and injectable steroids, sometimes get a bad rap.

We have naturally occurring steroids from the adrenal gland called mineralocorticoids which have an influence on salt and electrolyte potassium metabolism. Another type of naturally occurring steroid (glucocorticoid) influences general — i.e., carbohydrate metabolism — and is very useful for inflammatory problems, it is called cortisol.

A third hormone is androgens — sexual. So we have salt, sugar and sex hormones.

Cortisol is clinically helpful for reducing swelling and edema in the body. Scientists have developed synthetic cortisol-like medications to be used in a number of diseases and acute inflammatory situations such as swelling of the airway, to mention one of many applications.

As an ear, nose and throat doctor, I find that steroids are very helpful. We mainly use intranasal sprays and rinses for allergic and nasal polyp disease. For many years, there has been this misconception that intranasal steroids can affect cataract formation and increase eye pressure in glaucoma patients.

It is true that steroids taken by mouth and/or intravenously can cause these problems and others if used long term; however, that does not seem to be the case with topically applied intranasal steroids.

Heavy and long-term use of steroids by mouth or intravenous can also have effects on bones and tendons and it can also increase the chance of infection, raise the blood sugar and blood pressure.

Other side effects include water retention, problems with the stomach including indigestion and potential ulcer development.

Even disruption of sleep quality has been observed. Behavioral and mood disturbances (depression anxiety and psychosis) can also be noted with large and extended doses of oral steroids, but not with nasal sprays.

The safety of intranasal steroid sprays have been long established, however misinformation and myths remain despite widespread information available to the general public.

In some instances there remains a perception in the general public that intranasal sprayed steroids can cause systemic side effects similar to oral steroid consumption.

Rules of engagement

We must remember the sensory and cognitive deficits when we approach a person with dementia. The basic rules are: Approach at eye level. Pause more than three feet away to get their attention. Smile, speak slowly, lower your tone of voice and use simple sentences that contain only one thought or instruction.

Be mindful of 'approach, voice, touch' with dementia

Those of us caring for a loved one with dementia know that it is more art than science. What works one day does not the next.

There are some basic rules of engagement, but most of the time it seems we must be flexible and creative in dealing with a person who is in a frequent state of change.

The basic rules of engagement involve approach, voice, and touch. We must be mindful of the basic sensory deficits in a person living with dementia.

We must remember that their vision has changed; they have reduced peripheral vision and possibly a loss of depth perception.

We must remember that their auditory perception has changed as well. They may be experiencing a constant distraction of white noise, they may hear loud and confusing phantom noises, and they will have lost their ability to immediately identify the direction from which a sound is coming.

In addition to their loss of sensory abilities, they will have lost the ability to process information as quickly as you can. What we grasp in an instant may take them several seconds to process.

When we speak at a normal rate, they may completely lose some of the words in the sentence we have spoken. When we try to be as clear as we can, it may not make sense to them.

We must remember the sensory and cognitive deficits when we approach a person with dementia. The basic rules are: Approach at eye level. Pause more than three feet away to get their attention. Smile, speak slowly, lower your tone of voice and use simple sentences that contain only one thought or instruction.

Do not approach closer until you have eye

contact and an indication that they are ready to receive you.

This welcoming indication may be their outstretched hand or a smile.

Only then can you approach closer and make physical contact by gently but firmly grasping their dominant hand, which is the hand they might hit with if an improper approach has frightened them.

Never approach quickly or from the side or behind, which will be out of their range of vision. Always use a soothing voice, smile, compliment them and address them by name.

Tell them how good they look today or how happy you are to see them.

Remember that even when they understand every word you say, they will process the information at a much slower rate. Pause between sentences and never hurry them.

Once you have mastered the skills of approach, voice and touch, you need to be mindful that their reality may not be the same as yours. Often, a person with dementia may move within their mind to an earlier time in their life.

I know a man whose mother started calling him the name of her brother; his uncle who had died years ago. This upset him at first, but soon he realized that his mother had moved to a different reality and he began to work with her within that reality.

When she called him by his uncle's name, he responded to it and asked her to talk about the thing they liked to do together. The woman happily described events of decades before, which seemed to make her very happy and put her at ease.

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April is Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month

Display, information will be available to public

April has been designated Parkinson's disease (PD) awareness month. James Parkinson, who was born in the month of April, was the English physician that first clinically defined this condition in 1817 and called it the "Shaking Palsy."

Since then, neurologists have classified PD as a movement disorder, characterized by four key movement (motor) symptoms that include the "shaking" (tremor) described by Dr. Parkinson in addition to muscle

rigidity and stiffness, slowness of movement (bradykinesia) and impaired balance and coordination (postural instability).

In the 1960s, it was discovered that these motor symptoms were caused by the death and malfunction of nerve cells in a section of the brain that produces a chemical called dopamine.

This chemical sends messages that control movement and coordination. However, more recently it has been determined that many other parts of the brain and nervous system are

affected by this chronic and progressively disabling disorder.

Today, PD is considered much more than just a movement disorder. Non-motor symptoms of this disease may include pain, dementia or confusion, fatigue, sleep disturbances, dizziness, depression, constipation, cognitive changes, fear and anxiety, and urinary problems.

Like many other neurological disorders, the cause(s) of PD are not known, but both environment and genetic factors are thought to be involved.

There currently is no cure for PD, but numerous medications and other treatment options, including surgery, are available to improve symptoms and the quality of life for people with this disease. In addition, many new medications and devices are currently in development for PD.

While the disease process may begin years earlier, the average age of diagnosis for PD is 60 years, but many individuals are diagnosed in their 50s and 40s, or even younger. It is estimated that nearly 1.5 million Americans are living with PD and approximately 60,000 Americans are

newly diagnosed each year.

There are several national organizations that can provide you with more information, one of which is the Parkinson's Foundation.

Retired pharmacist/medical writer Richard P. Hoffmann and his wife, Margaret, who has young-onset Parkinson's disease, are research advocates for the Parkinson's Foundation and will provide an informational display and free materials

about PD at the Lakes Region Library in Inverness during the month of April.

In addition, they will offer a presentation, "Parkinson's Disease — Past, Present & Future" at Grand Living at Citrus Hills, 850 W. Norvell Bryant Highway, Hernando, from 2-3:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 10.

This presentation for PD patients, care partners, family members, health care workers and anyone else interested in PD will address the topics of the history of PD, how common is the disease, symptoms, progression, treatments and more. Useful PD resources will be addressed as well.

Senior Companions become part of a team of caregivers. They are healthy older adults who help other adults live independently. Senior Companions make the lives of those they serve less lonely by serving them on a regular basis.

Companions must commit to work a minimum of five hours per week. In exchange they will receive a stipend, mileage allowance, paid vacation and sick time. The purpose of this program is to help housebound seniors stay independent in their homes. Without the help of Senior Companions, many older adults would be unable to continue living at home and would require more expensive, less personal care.

We all have to realize that taking your medicine as prescribed is important for controlling chronic conditions, treating temporary conditions, and overall long-term health and well-being. A personal connection with your health care

provider or pharmacist is an important part of medication adherence.

However, you play the most important part by taking all of your medications as directed. Be your own health care advocate.

So, here are some tips to help you adhere to a medications schedule. Take your medication at the same time every day. This is easier to remember. Try

taking your medications with a daily routine like brushing your teeth or getting ready for bed.

Before choosing mealtime for your routine, check if your medication should be taken on a full or empty stomach. Also, use a pill container. Some types have sections for multiple doses at different times, such as morning, lunch, evening and night. And when you use a pill container, refill it at the same

time each week.

When traveling, be certain to bring enough of your medication, plus a few days extra, in case your return is delayed. And finally, if you're flying, keep your medication in your carry-on bag to avoid lost luggage. Temperatures inside the cargo hold could damage your medication.

If you have questions about your medication, don't be shy,

your health is important, ask your health care provider or pharmacist if you are unsure. Remember, the life you save may be your own!

The first time a loved one with dementia does not recognize you or calls you by someone else's name, it really hurts. You must not take it personally; they are not trying to hurt you. You must try to remember that they are not giving you a hard time; they are having a hard time.

The cardinal rule of dementia care is to validate what your loved one believes and says. Never contradict and never argue. You will never be successful in dragging them back into your reality; rather, it is

your job to try to understand their reality and validate — not challenge or contradict — their beliefs.

As I said at the outset of this column, effectively engaging your loved one with dementia is an art, not a science. Beyond the basic rules of approach, voice and touch, you are often in unknown territory. What worked one day may not the next. But if you find ways to validate what they do and say, care-giving will become much easier.

Keep in mind that individuals living with dementia do not live in a world of logic or real time. They live in a world of feelings. They react to how others make them feel. As a caregiver, a big part of your job is to make them feel validated and useful.

Don't treat them like a task.

Treat them like a person of value who may see the world differently than you do, and who is certainly struggling to cope within the world in which you live.

It is never easy, but often when we think they are making it hard on us, it is because we have unintentionally made it hard on them by not understanding and practicing the basic rules of engagement.
