Bad road at Blackrock no more Construction delays but end is finally in sight

Blackrock Road in Yulee will not re-open Thursday as scheduled. The construction crew is still building a bridge over Lanceford Creek.

The county's project manager said during a tour of the work on Friday that he expects the road to open to traffic in mid- to late June, and that work continues on the \$3.7 million, two-mile rebuilding project until the end of September.

"We had planned for a 30-day closure, but we're probably looking at another two or maybe three more weeks," said County Engineer Jonathan Page.

Page said that a new approach to constructing the bridge has slowed things down. But, he said, a more traditional effort would have meant a 75-day building schedule.

"So even if we need to add a little more time we're still going to be well under 75 days," said Page.

The construction process, he said, involves wrapping stones in sheeting, and then repeating the process over several layers.

"It's like making burritos with rocks," said Page. "Put some stones in, wrap it up and do it again."

That doesn't sound like new technology. And Page said it isn't.

"The Great Wall of China was basically built by stacking layers of rock," said Page.

Page said the process would make a smooth transition between the roadway and the bridge.

"And remember how much this road dipped here? The bridge is being raised three and a half feet," said Page.

The new bridge, which is being widened to 44 feet from 20 feet, is also being built over the existing culvert.

"So we don't have to dump the concrete box somewhere to be a man-made reef," said Page. "That saves time, money and adds a green component."

This approach also saved a year by eliminating the need for a permit from the St.

Johns River Water Management District, said Page, and \$35,000 on a hydraulic study.

Credit the Federal Highway Administration (FHA) for this new approach.

Since 2010, the FHA has been pushing state and local governments to improve efficiency, safety and environmental protection under a program called Every Day Counts.

The FHA spreads the word through workshops and white papers. Page said he has heard several presentations through the Florida Association of Counties.

"We don't buy their stuff hook, line and sinker, but this is proving to be a good approach," said Page.

In fact, he said, the county spent \$15,000 on additional research to ensure it was making the right choice.

"I think that was money well spent," said Page.

Federal and state roadway officials joined local leaders in May for a ceremonial project launch. A trade journal wrote a story with a

City voters may decide parks issue

City residents may have the chance to vote on funding a park that encompasses the city waterfront, if commissioners approve the ballot question before Aug. 5.

If approved by voters, funding the waterfront park through a general obligation bond would mean an increase in city property taxes to pay for it.

City commissioners held a special meeting Friday to discuss the possible referendum.

City Attorney Tammi Bach, who asked for the special meeting, said the ballot question could be worded in a way that asks voters if they are interested in the city project, or could be a question about whether they want a general obligation bond, which would require repayment through property taxes.

"You can always put in a non-binding question (on the ballot) that would enable you to get the pulse of voters without a specific commitment," Bach said.

Veering in another direction, Vice Mayor Sarah Pelican asked about recent Facebook posts by Commissioner Johnny Miller (who was absent from Friday's meeting) regarding a plan for Main Beach Park.

"It seems there's renewed interest in that, too," Pelican said. Pelican also suggested doing an "unofficial" straw poll with a "not to exceed" cost in the ballot question.

Commissioner Pat Gass said she was also interested to know if people would like to see an improved park at Main Beach, but seemed to be in favor of getting direction from the public in general.

"If we say the money is for (a specific project), we as commissioners can't fudge," Gass said.

Gass also stressed the need to educate the public.

"If we're going into debt, we need to educate the population," Gass said. "If money is spent, the people in this community are spending it."

Mayor Ed Boner said he had "mixed feelings" about putting the project out for the voters to decide on.

"People trust you to do things a certain way," Boner said. "We can't go to the polls every time we need to make a big decision."

"I heard (the people) want a water park, and (they) want it right now," Commissioner Charles Corbett said, pounding the dais. "That's why we're here. ... Don't we already have an estimate from Zev Cohen?"

Resident and Florida Inland Navigation District Commissioner Lynn Williams told commissioners city voters would vote "no" to any increase in taxes, whether for Main Beach or a city waterfront park.

"This is a town of many factions," Williams said. "We need you to weave through this tricky business to come to the right conclusion."

Williams also urged commissioners to get going on a recently approved small waterfront park at parking lot B at the city marina. The estimated cost for that plan is about \$200,000.

"We could have that park in place by mid-October,"

Dr. Harry Halley made things happen

The Dr. Harry Halley Bow Tie Award for Distinguished Volunteer Service is given each year by the Amelia Island-Fernandina Beach-Yulee Chamber of Commerce to honor a longtime chamber advocate. It is a lasting tribute to a man who made a difference in business, government and the community life of Nassau County.

Halley was president of the chamber and a leading advocate for its causes. Beyond that, he served as a trustee and chair of the board of trustees for Florida Community College at Jacksonville, which has a campus in Yulee.

He also served on the Northeast Florida Regional Planning Council as well as other boards here and in Tallahassee upon appointment by then Gov. Lawton Chiles. And that's not the half of what he accomplished locally - this coming after a long and distinguished career in the military, government and academe.

"Harry was a fine man and will be remembered as one who made a difference in our world," wrote Pamela Brown, local financial advisor and longtime chamber member and board chair, on an online tribute site for Halley.

Harry John Halley, career naval officer, government and university executive, civic leader and exemplary public servant, died at age 90 on May 23, 2014, in Williamsburg, Va.

Military: As a commissioned career naval officer who served over 20 years (February 1944 to September 1965), Cdr. Halley, USN (ret.) was ordered to active duty in World War II while in his senior year at Georgia School of Technology (now Georgia Institute of Technology). His naval career spanned field and national levels, both domestic and international including liaison with the Admiralty and Ministry of Supply in the United Kingdom, worldwide management of shipboard

\$5 million more for St. Johns ferry

JACKSONVILLE - The St. Johns River Ferry has received an additional \$4.97 million to be used toward the replacement of the slip walls at both the Mayport and Fort George landings.

The funding consists of a \$1 million appropriation in the state's budget (signed by Gov. Rick Scott on Monday) and a \$3.97 million Passenger Ferry Grant awarded by the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT), also announced Monday.

"This funding overcomes what was perceived to be a nearly insurmountable amount of capital dollars needed to make structural improvements necessary for the continued operation of the ferry, and will go a long way to replace the slip walls in Mayport and Fort George," said John Crescimbeni, chairman of the St. Johns River Ferry Commission.

The \$1 million appropriation is the result of legislation sponsored this year by both Sen. Aaron Bean and Rep. Janet Adkins. The St. Johns River Ferry Commission thanked Scott, Bean, Adkins as well as the entire Duval delegation "for recognizing the importance of the St. Johns River Ferry which provides regional transportation options with national significance."

The \$3.97 million grant awarded by the USDOT is administered separately through the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Passenger Ferry Grant Program, which provides funds to support existing ferry service, establish new ferry service, or help to repair and modernize ferry boats, terminals and related facilities.

The grant application was submitted on behalf of the St. Johns River

She was employed by the Surf Restaurant of Fernandina for over 40 years and was a faithful member of Trinity United Methodist Church.



Mrs. Faye Edwards Justice, age 92, of Fernandina Beach, passed away on Thursday afternoon, May 29, 2014 at Quality Health Care of Fernandina.

Born in Fort Payne, Alabama, she was one of ten and the last living child born to the late David Noah and Sarah W. Lively Edwards. As a child



growing up in a rural community during the Depression, she learned thriftiness at an early age. After graduating from high

school in Northeast Alabama, she attended Business School. She and a sister opened a Restaurant in Birmingham in the late 1930s where she met her future husband, Jesse Paxton Justice, of Banner, Alabama.

In 1942, she married Mr. Justice and the newlyweds moved to California where she worked supporting the war effort and her husband completed his military enlistment. At the time of her husband's discharge, the Justices returned to Birmingham.

In 1946 while visiting Fernandina, the coast appealed to them, her husband applied at the Mill, was accepted and they moved to Fernandina. Upon arriving here, her husband began a long career in the Paper Industry and Mrs. Justice began a long career with Southern Bell as a Switchboard Operator. mechanical and electrical inventory (supporting the Polaris nuclear and submarine program), logistic support of naval aircraft and ships, directing industrial relations national institutes for the Office of Industrial Relations, and teaching introductory marine engineering at the U.S. Naval Academy. Over the years, he was stationed in (deployed to) Norfolk, London, San Diego, Japan, Monterey, Annapolis, and Washington, D.C. He earned an M.S. degree in Management in 1962 from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School.

Government: After his military service, Harry embarked on a second career as a federal government administrator beginning at the Executive Office of the President at the founding of the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) when that agency was in its infancy under the leadership of Director Sargent Shriver and Dr. Joseph Kershaw (Office of Research, Plans, Programs and Evaluation).

Then, after earning a DBA (Doctor of Business Administration) in 1971 at George Washington University (and writing his doctoral dissertation on the OEO national antipoverty planning process), he was recruited to the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System to serve as Deputy Controller and

Program Director for Management Systems under the leadership of Chairman Arthur Burns and Governor William Sherrill.

Business and Academic: Dr. Halley was recruited to be Senior Vice President for Corporate Planning and Acquisitions at the Associates Corporation of North America. Then he was recruited to the School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania to organize and implement resource management functions under the leadership of Dean Edward J. Stemmler. He retired as Acting Vice President for Penn Medical Center and Executive Director for School of Medicine Administration. After retirement, he was a management consultant to Academic Medical Centers, which sought his proficiency in leading problem-solving teams and working with varied constituencies. His particular expertise was in strategic planning, budgeting and control systems, and he was an advocate of Total Quality Management.

Public Service: After his

retirement, Dr. Halley took on yet a third career as a civic leader. He was appointed by Gov. Lawton Chiles (with advice and consent of the Florida Senate where required) to various posts, including: Florida Real Estate Commission Education and Research Foundation Advisory Committee (Member/Chair); Northeast Florida Regional Planning Council (Member); and District Board of Trustee, Florida Community College at Jacksonville (Member/Chair). He was also recruited to be President of the Amelia Island-Fernandina Beach-Yulee Chamber of Commerce (later Chairman); and he served on numerous boards including the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Board, Hospice of Northeast Florida, College of Health Dean's Council University of North Florida and several others.

Avocations and Philosophy: Harry was an avid reader, mainly in history, biography and political events. He was quite a fisherman, as befits ocean lovers and watermen. He was a

serious cyclist, often biking 100 miles a week, and he loved hiking alone and with his family in the Virginia Blue Ridge Mountains, Point Lobos State Reserve and in New Hampshire's White Mountains.

In all his various roles, and in all his dealings, Harry was a man of courage and fine character. People of many persuasions liked Harry because they knew he was trustworthy, honest and fair-minded. People who knew him well regarded Harry as both a systematic thinker with a vision, and a pragmatic actor who liked to get things done. As he said, "Making things happen is not done passively. It takes energy and commitment. Leaders must put themselves in the line of fire."

Despite multiple serious medical conditions in recent years, Harry was a military man to the end: He died on his feet, as his caretakers helped him walk down the hall.

Dr. Halley was born Oct. 4, 1923 in Dallas, Texas. He is survived by his beloved wife of 68 years, Elinore Alexander Halley of Williamsburg, Va., and by a daughter, Alexis Ann Halley (spouse Bayard L. Catron III) of Charlottesville, Va. A second daughter, Patricia Lawton Halley, predeceased him.

Williams said. "It will support the (Community Redevelopment Area) and you people should be behind it. You ought to be leading the charge to do that, and avoid a referendum."

"I don't agree with a referendum," resident and city activist Lou Goldman said. "I feel there's already been a referendum when you got elected."

Commissioners agreed the truncated plan for parking lot B should go forward regardless, but City Manager Joe Gerrity reminded them that funding for that project was still not in place. He also noted there were still "holes" in the city budget due to the city golf course and marina losing money.

"Impact fees will not cover 100 percent of (the parking lot B plan)," Gerrity said. "I would hate to not be able to make a \$200,000-400,000 improvement, but right now we haven't identified the funding."

Resident Eric Bartelt, who worked on the parking lot B plan before approval, said commissioners should consider completing the smaller park plan as leverage for voters before they decide on a complete waterfront park.

"(Completing) parking lot B may be the opportunity to convince people this is the right thing to do," Bartelt said.

Consulting firm Zev Cohen of Jacksonville estimated in 2012 a complete waterfront park at the Fernandina Harbor Marina and waterfront would cost about \$6 million. The city

borrowed \$2.6 million for Phase I of the strategic plan called Forward Fernandina, but the project was controversial from the start, and commissioners voted last year to return much of the borrowed money.

According to Gerrity, city residents are still paying off the portion of the Forward Fernandina loan that was not returned to the bank. A franchise fee was added to residential utility bills at about 55 cents per \$100 at the time of the loan.

"The city commission voted to return a little more than \$1 million," Gerrity wrote in an email Monday. "However, the principal payment stayed the same but for a shorter duration. The interest was cut by \$12,000/year."

General obligation bonds are borrowed for specific purposes and are paid back by the city's pledging to repay the bond through its property taxes. Revenue bonds can be paid back by sources other than property taxes, such as franchise fees.

Voters approved a general obligation bond in 2001 for the acquisition of Egans Creek Greenway, other park areas and expanded beach access.

According to Bach, the ordinance approving the referendum must be formally adopted by Aug. 5 so the ballot language can be sent to the Nassau County Supervisor of Elections by Aug. 26.

Ferry Commission by the Jacksonville Transportation Authority, which will actually administer the grant locally.

"The JTA is proud to be part

of a collaborative effort to improve our ferry and serve the citizens of Northeast Florida. We look forward to working with the St. Johns River Ferry Commission, the city of Jacksonville and the state and

federal transportation authorities to continue to improve our transportation network," said JTA board member Ed Burr.

The \$3.97 million Passenger Ferry Grant is in addition to a

\$900,000 Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP) grant awarded in April. Last year, the commission hired grant consultant Langton Associates to write two grants which together have now yielded \$4.87 million.

When contacted by several local residents, Carmike officials indicated that they'd consider keeping the existing theater open. That is, if the community rallies around it.

It's not just about a theater closing. Yes, it's more convenient for island residents to have a theater here.

But surrounding businesses would also be impacted - in a ripple-like effect. And this would not be a positive ripple.

Objectivity matters

The Donald Sterling situation is interesting. Mr. Sterling, a cantankerous billionaire, has been a thorn in the side of the NBA for over 30 years and everyone knew what type of individual he was. Racial issues resulted in his being sued a number of times over the years. Yet not only did the NBA do nothing, but a year ago one of the more respected black coaches in the NBA agreed to join the team. Then came the dumb conversation with his girlfriend and everything changed.

In fact, most people would probably agree on a scale of 1 to 10, with 10 being the worst, that the conversation was a 10 for stupid and maybe a 7 or 8 for being racist. I am sure his PR people told him to apologize and maybe salvage the situation. What did Mr. Sterling do? Not surprising, he doubled down, attacked Magic Johnson and made everything worse.

Why, you ask, did he not just apologize for his statements? Because in my opinion he lacks objectivity, one of the more important traits you need to look for when getting involved with people like Mr. Sterling. Mr. Sterling, like Bernie Madoff, Donald Trump and Aaron Hernandez, is probably an example of people who have been extremely successful but lack objectivity. The only people who get hurt when doing business with them are their partners, their investors or their employers.

When we were asked to do personal profiles, one of the more important traits we measured was objectivity. People with objectivity take responsibility for their mistakes, consider the needs of others and, since they are open to feedback, are able to develop and address issues. People who lack objectivity rationalize their mistakes and end up believing nothing is their fault. Since everyone loses objectivity under stress, people with less objectivity can become dan-

gerous when things go wrong. We advised clients that we were unable to coach managers or executives who lacked objectivity.

One individual whom I was asked to

coach was Ken, a CFO of a successful hedge fund. The CEO loved Ken because he put in hundreds of hours each week and did whatever the CEO wanted. The CEO decided that growing the firm was important and hired a very successful executive as the new president. After about a month, the new president, with whom I had worked at his previous firm, decided that if he was going to be successful, he needed to have his executive team become more leadership than management focused. After doing an employee attitude study, where Ken was labeled the worst executive to work for, the president asked me to coach Ken. We did an assessment and it was obvious Ken put himself under a lot stress and lacked objectivity. However, the president advised that, as Ken was a favorite of the CEO, we had to give it a try. And we did. Interestingly, when I met with Ken he seemed very open to development, admitting he needed to make some changes.

So we would meet for a couple of hours every few weeks and we would come up with a plan for what Ken needed to do to change the way he operated. At the next meeting, Ken would be apologetic but would advise that he just did not have the time to complete any of the tasks or plans we had agreed upon. There would be incidents which Ken advised could not be avoided. Finally, after six months, I admitted defeat and advised the president that Ken's lack of objectivity made it impossible to continue. About three months later, Ken was taken out of his position as CFO and put in a special finance position without any direct reports, reporting to the CEO where his lack of objectivity didn't really matter.

In another situation, a new CEO whom I knew well wanted to introduce our coaching program to the company. The head of Human Resources, whom we had never met, decided she needed to take the profile first. When my partner advised me that she was the first executive in his 40 years in the business to test out as having zero objectivity, I knew we were in big trouble. The feedback session was a disaster. Not surprisingly, she advised the CEO we were a bad fit for the assignment, and since there were other firms to choose from, he was OK. Nine months later, the CEO let her go and called me to compare notes. Ten years later we were still coaching executives at the company.

Many executives who lack objectivity are very focused, hardworking, smart and extremely successful. However, they are difficult to work with and, since they never accept responsibility for mistakes, they are dangerous to rely on or trust. As employees you can usually deal with the issues, but when you go into business or invest with them you are generally at their mercy.

photo, but it rained hard that day and the shot largely shows a gathering of yellow raincoats and big umbrellas. But County Commissioner Danny Leeper and Public Works Director Scott Herring were there.

More interesting will be the time-lapse video of the bridge-work. On Friday, a camera sat on a temporary dam support, which is holding back the water of Lanceford Creek, to continuously record the job site.

“Road geeks like me are going to have a field day with the video,” said Page. “And state and federal highway officials are going to use our project as a showcase. That’s exciting.”

The county is reconstructing a two-mile stretch of Blackrock Road from just north of Heron Isles Parkway to A1A. The roadway will also widen to 24 feet from 18 feet.

A left-turn lane is planned for northbound Blackrock Road onto westbound Heron Isles Parkway.

Sidewalks will be added for \$195,000, but they are going to stop about 50 feet shy of the railroad crossing. That’s because the Florida Department of Transportation is overhauling the crossing in 2016-17.

“It will look confusing to people, but we didn’t want to pay for sidewalks that will be ripped out in two years,” said Page. “The state said they will match their work to our road.”

The big project has a big price tag because the road has not been properly maintained, said Page.

“I’d say the price is just about double,” said Page. “It’s like not replacing shingles on your roof. It’s a lot more expensive once you let this thing go.”

Page said Blackrock Road has not been overhauled since the 1950s and is in bad shape. “It’s the worst,” he said.

The county is picking up the entire \$3.7 million tab for this

Money dwindles

There is not a lot of money in the bank for new roadway projects in Nassau County. About \$1.5 million, according to the clerk’s office.

The reconstruction of a two-mile stretch of Blackrock Road under way now costs \$3.7 million, though the lead project engineer says the cost would be half that if the roadway had been properly maintained over the years. But the county does not have a lot of money for maintenance either.

Blackrock Road is funded with transportation impact fees, which were last collected in 2008.

At that time, the fund balance was \$11.7 million, according to the clerk’s finance chief deputy. It is now down to \$1,542,144 in available funding, says Mary Potochnik.

A special task force has spent more than two years looking at getting the fees started back up. The chairman is Commissioner Danny Leeper, and he knows that the money is needed.

The group is almost ready to present its final recommendation, but they cancelled a meeting this week to give traffic engineers, who have been paid more than \$175,000, more time to look at fees for churches. Religious organizations say they don’t think they should pay, and the group is leaning in that direction.

County Attorney David Hallman said the date for the next meeting has not been set.

project without financial contribution from the state. The money will come from transportation impact fees, though the sidewalks will be paid from the general fund since, by ordinance, impact fees can only be used to increase roadway capacity.

Transportation fees have not been collected since June 2008. The account balance currently stands at \$1.5 million, down from \$11.7 million when the county halted the fees.

More people and traffic in the area are adding to the pressure on the roadway. The Heron Isles subdivision is bustling again with new housing, and Page said a traffic study conducted in 2009 supports growing numbers.

According to the study, the average daily number of vehicles is 3,381 per day, and by 2020 is expected to jump to 4,894 vehicles.

The study also looked at peak hours, from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. The existing daily average is 4,700, and that number is expected to jump to 6,400 vehicles in 2020.

That Blackrock Road is in bad shape is not news to people who live along it.

This includes Bill Young, 68. Page stopped his county pickup truck (with hand-crank windows because trimming the budget means no automatic windows for staff vehicles) on his driveway. He knows his daughter Ella Cowin, 45, from high school.

Young, who said he moved to the area in the 1950s, wants to know when the roadway improvement is coming to his house. He lives closer to Chester Road, well outside the project’s boundaries.

“I would gladly pay more money in taxes to get the roads fixed,” said Young. “A dollar or two sounds reasonable. And why not a gas tax? A few pennies sounds like a good deal to me to get the burden off property taxpayers.”

His daughter shared a different concern.

She said, “I want to know when they’re going to stop paving over the whole of Yulee.”

County impact fees help pay for growth

Perhaps you have heard of impact fees but are not really sure what they are or what they are used for. Impact fees are collected during the permitting process for new construction in the unincorporated areas of Nassau County because each new structure or expansion causes an "impact" on the county in some way. For example, construction of new homes has an impact on the amount of traffic traveling on a particular road, an increase in calls for fire/rescue and law enforcement services and an increase in the need for new parks and facilities.

Currently there are five different types of impact fees imposed by the Board of County Commissioners, in addition to the School Board impact fees which are collected by the county on behalf of the School Board. While each type of

impact fee collected serves a different purpose, all are collected to be used strictly on capital improvement projects. Let's explore those different impact fees and look at how some of those funds have been used to improve our county over the past five years.

Recreation Impact Fees were created based upon the theory that for every new house built, additional parks and open space should be made available to the community. Since 2010, Recreation Impact Fees have been used for several recreation related projects including a new restroom facility at the Yulee Ballpark, Bryceville Ballpark T-Ball Field improvements and for construction of the Julia Street Recreational Path on Amelia Island. Nassau County currently has four ballparks, five beachfront parks and seven boat ramps, however, based on the current population, Nassau County is lacking in the amount

of recreation and open space currently available to its citizens. Staff is drafting the county's first Recreational Plan in an effort to identify the areas where additional recreation is needed and to provide a clear plan on how to effectively meet the needs of our communities.

Administrative Space Impact Fees are used for building, renovating and/or expanding public buildings such as courthouses, maintenance facilities, jails and administrative offices. Though Administrative Impact Fees have not been used for projects recently, the much-needed Sheriff's Administration Building may be funded partially by Administrative Impact

Fees, in addition to Law Enforcement Impact Fees which are discussed below.

Law Enforcement Impact Fees and Fire Impact Fees are based on the knowledge that public safety needs are directly proportional to the presence of people. With growth comes the need for additional fire stations, larger jails and equipment for new deputies. Fire Impact Fees have been used to partially fund a new fire station in Bryceville and staff is currently investigating the possibility of using Fire Impact Fees to assist with funding a new fire station on the West Side. A combination of Fire and Law Enforcement Impact Fees are also being considered for funding a new 911 call center.

The last impact fee is the Transportation Impact Fee. This fee is perhaps the most

important as it funds major road projects such as paving and widening, intersection improvements, signalization upgrades and expansion of bridges. When you consider that the average household has two cars, you have to realize that for every new house built, the number of cars traveling on our roads is growing exponentially. Nassau County Public Works has been working hard to insure our roads are safe and have coordinated numerous major transportation projects since 2010 including intersection improvements at:

- 14th Street at Lime
- 14th Street at Simmons
- Sadler Road at Citrona Drive
- US 301 at Ford Road
- US 301 at Sandy Ford Road
- Lem Turner Road at Spring Lakes Estate
- CR 108 at CR 115
- US 1 at Ratliff Road

Transportation Impact Fees also funded Chester Road widening from Home Depot to Heron Isles Parkway and Blackrock Road widening

which is currently under way.

Money available in the Transportation Impact Fee Fund is currently dwindling as collection of these fees has been suspended since July 1, 2008. The county is currently working with a consultant to create a new Mobility Fee to replace Transportation Impact Fees. Though the Mobility Fee is similar and will be collected during the permitting process, it differs from the current Transportation Impact Fee in that transportation projects are identified prior to the money being collected from the customer. This allows the customer to have a clear understanding on what their money will be used for. It is important that the county works quickly in developing the new Mobility Fee as the need for road improvements never ceases. A final draft of the Mobility Fee will be presented to the Board of County Commissioners for consideration later this summer.





STATE OF FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION CONSOLIDATED NOTICE OF INTENT TO ISSUE PERMIT AND AUTHORIZATION TO USE SOVEREIGN SUBMERGED LANDS

The Department of Environmental Protection gives notice of its intent to issue a joint coastal permit (File No. 0196204-016-JC) and letter of consent to use sovereign submerged lands to the United States Department of the Navy, 1063 USS Tennessee Avenue, Kings Bay, Georgia, 31547, to periodically maintain the Kings Bay Entrance Channel and the Kings Bay Inner Channel, disposing the material in one or more of six (6) existing disposal facilities in Florida. The project site is located in the St. Marys River Entrance Channel, and the disposal of dredge material will occur along the shoreline and offshore of Amelia Island, Nassau County, Section 8, Township 2, Range 29, St. Marys River and Atlantic Ocean, Fort Clinch State Park Aquatic Preserve, Outstanding Florida Water, Class III Waters.

A person whose substantial interests are affected by the Department's action may petition for an administrative hearing in accordance with sections 120.569 and 120.57, Florida Statutes (F.S.). The petition must contain the information set forth below and must be filed (received by the clerk) in the Office of General Counsel of the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000.

Because the administrative hearing process is designed to redetermine final agency action on the application, the filing of a petition for an administrative hearing may result in a modification of the permit or even a denial of the application. Under rule 62-110.106(4), Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), a person whose substantial interests are affected by the Department's action may also request an extension of time to file a petition for an administrative hearing. The Department may, for good cause shown, grant the request for an extension of time. Requests for extension of time must be filed with the Office of General Counsel of the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000, before the applicable deadline. A timely request for extension of time shall toll the running of the time period for filing a petition until the request is acted upon. If a request is filed late, the Department may still grant it upon a motion by the requesting party showing that the failure to file a request for an extension of time before the deadline was the result of excusable neglect.

In the event that a timely and sufficient petition for an administrative hearing is filed, other persons whose substantial interests will be affected by the outcome of the administrative process have the right to petition to intervene in the proceeding. Any intervention will be only at the discretion of the presiding judge upon the filing of a motion in compliance with rule 28-106.205, F.A.C.

In accordance with rules 28-106.111(2) and 62-110.106(3)(a)(1), F.A.C., petitions for an administrative hearing by the applicant must be filed within 14 days of receipt of this written notice. Petitions filed by any persons other than the applicant, and other than those entitled to written notice under section 120.60(3), F.S., must be filed within 14 days of publication of the notice or within 14 days of receipt of the written notice, whichever occurs first. Under section 120.60(3), F.S., however, any person who has asked the Department for notice of agency action may file a petition within 14 days of receipt of such notice, regardless of the date of publication.

The petitioner shall mail a copy of the petition to the applicant at the address indicated above at the time of filing. The failure of any person to file a petition for an administrative hearing within the appropriate time period shall constitute a waiver of that person's right to request an administrative determination (hearing) under sections 120.569 and 120.57, F.S.

A petition that disputes the material facts on which the Department's action is based must contain the following information: (a) The name and address of each agency affected and each agency's file or identification number, if known; (b) The name, address, and telephone number of the petitioner; the name, address, and telephone number of the petitioner's representative, if any, which shall be the address for service purposes during the course of the proceeding; and an explanation of how the petitioner's substantial interests are or will be affected by the agency determination; (c) A statement of when and how the petitioner received notice of the agency decision; (d) A statement of all disputed issues of material fact. If there are none, the petition must so indicate; (e) A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, including the specific facts that the petitioner contends warrant reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action; (f) A statement of the specific rules or statutes that the petitioner contends require reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action, including an explanation of how the alleged facts relate to the specific rules or statutes; and (g) A statement of the relief sought by the petitioner, stating precisely the action that the petitioner wishes the agency to take with respect to the agency's proposed action.

A petition that does not dispute the material facts on which the Department's action is based shall state that no such facts are in dispute and otherwise shall contain the same information as set forth above, as required by rule 28-106.301, F.A.C. Under sections 120.569(2)(c) and (d), F.S., a petition for administrative hearing must be dismissed by the agency if the petition does not substantially comply with the above requirements or is untimely filed.

This intent to issue constitutes an order of the Department. The applicant has the right to seek judicial review of the order under section 120.68, F.S., by the filing of a notice of appeal under rule 9.110 of the Florida Rules of Appellate Procedure with the Clerk of the Department in the Office of General Counsel, 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399 3000; and by filing a copy of the notice of appeal accompanied by the applicable filing fees with the appropriate district court of appeal. The notice of appeal must be filed within 30 days from the date when the final order is filed with the Clerk of the Department.

Amazing evening of music

I was treated to a treat for all my senses as music and setting combined to provide a delightful evening when I attended Beer and G-Strings II: Gypsy Sparks at Walker's Landing.

The next to the last performance of the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival, the evening featured internationally renowned violinist Susie Park, distinguished pianist Elizabeth Pridgen, and the festival's General and Artistic Director, gifted cellist Christopher Rex.

The first half of the concert featured the trio performing lively music in keeping with the gypsy theme, including Hungarian Dances and a piano trio by Brahms.

I was especially moved by the third movement of the Piano Trio Op. 87 in C Major by Brahms. Rex explained the piece's character and mood first, giving the audience an insight into the composer's intention for the beautiful composition.

As violin spoke and cello answered, I could almost visualize lovers torn apart by circumstance, reaching out to one another across time and space. The piano contributed perfectly to the drama and pathos of the composition.

Pridgen's deft touch continued during her tour de force performance of Brahms' Hungarian Rhapsody, eliciting an enthusiastic response from the audience.

Rounding out the first part of the evening's performance was Gypsy Airs by Pablo Sarasate, performed by Park and Pridgen.

The violin part of this piece was so exquisite, I found myself absolutely spellbound. Park made her instrument cry, laugh and sing with profound emotion.

And Pridgen had no trouble at all keeping up with Park during the piece's final portion. More than one foot was tapping in the audience as the pair navigated the quick, intricate sequence with ease.

After an intermission spent admiring the natural beauty of the marsh surrounding Walker's Landing, the second half of the concert began with a 20th century piece by Zoltan Kodaly.

Duo for violin and Cello, Op. 7 composed in 1914, is "the music of the people," said Rex, who explained the textures, cadences and flavors of each movement of the composition first as he and Parks played excerpts before joining forces to play the powerful, challenging piece.

Although I found this selection a bit too discordant and erratic for my taste, I was in awe of the technical prowess displayed in its performance.

I was amazed not only by the memory required to play such a demanding piece, but by the way Park and Rex merged their talents to produce a memorable performance that brought the audience to their feet.

The final selection, Tzigane by Maurice Ravel, is a favorite of Park's and was a perfect finale to an exceptional evening of music.

We don't need waterfront park

For a local political writer the past couple of weeks or so have been a veritable cornucopia of goodies – discussions surrounding an infuriated county commission, a disgruntled constituent and First Amendment rights; that same infuriated commission's dust-up with the clerk of the courts and the meaning of separation of powers and checks and balances; the non-issue issues regarding the property rights of chicken owners and neighbors of chicken owners; dogs sitting and dining at a table near you, etc., pick one – to paraphrase Holden Caulfield, "They're coming in the window."

One reason the ill-conceived waterfront park concept keeps hanging around, like a splinter that hasn't been removed, is the public's perception that the greater community actually wants a waterfront park; it's affordable, needed – it's just one of the many projects the commission hasn't gotten done. Baloney.

It is true that a handful of ardent, wide-eyed, never-say-die supporters of some kind of waterfront park – usually Disneyesque, complete with water fountains and neatly trimmed landscaping shaped like pirates (OK, I made that last part up – but I can see it happening) – routinely parade their plans before increasingly disinterested commissions – over and over. They just never make it out of the due diligence Q and A. It usually went something like this:

Wide-eyed supporter: "This park will be great; it'll be fantastic!"

This time, though, it's a little bit scary, especially for taxpayers – the commission is actually thinking about putting the waterfront park issue on the ballot in the form of 1) a non-binding referendum; a straw ballot, or 2) a general obligation bond, or GOB.

The straw ballot thing, I don't know, what happens if it passes? Will the wide-eyed enthusiasts play the mandate card and demand action? Aside – imagine this: dad gathers the family around the kitchen table for a discussion about their next vacation: "Hey kids, all in favor of spending a week in Vail, Colo., snow-skiing, snowboarding, sitting around the fire at our rustic lodge sipping hot chocolate and doing other snow things say aye." "Aye," the excited, foaming-at-the-mouth family shouts back in unison! "Dad, are we really going to Vail and do all those things?" "Nah," says dad, feigning interest, "I just wanted to get your input." That's what a straw ballot does for you. Nothing.

The GOB, well, that's another story. If the GOB passes they'll have to do it, they'll have to build some kind of park at the foot of Centre Street. How much that park will cost is anybody's guess. How the park will affect parking

and traffic, well, that's anybody's guess, too. The good thing about a GOB: all of that will have to be itemized, detailed and explained to taxpayers – the ones who'll have to pay the thing.

My impressions are these:

- The city's portion of the waterfront – from the foot of Centre Street south to parking lot E – with its public boardwalk, sun shelters and green space, has never looked better or been more inviting.

- The public dock at the foot of Centre Street is a gathering place throughout the day for tourists and hometowners alike, but especially in the evening, at sunset, and the comments are always, always positive, never negative.

- The real conversation concerning improving the waterfront should be about the private properties from Centre Street north. The conversation should be about ways the city could work with property owners to improve their property, if that means improving Front Street, let's talk about it, if that means putting in a bulkhead and creating more land for property owners to work with, let's talk about that; let's start having meaningful conversations about realistic ways we can improve the waterfront.

- Sunset the CRA (it should be re-named the DSF – developer slush fund) and have a conversation about other ways to enhance the waterfront that will benefit the general fund – the taxpayers of Fernandina Beach.

But let's stop having conversations about a waterfront park. I know, it sounds nice, but do we really need it? Can we afford it? Will it impact already stressed infrastructure?

We don't need a straw ballot, we don't need a GOB, let's finally get out a needle like my mother used to do and take out the splinter – sure, it'll flare up a little bit, it'll fester, but it will finally go away.

FPU rate hike

I do not support FPU's request for a rate increase, based on the poor justifications presented in the article on May 21. Please consider the following comments:

1. Failure to properly assess the capital expenditures necessary to continue to operate a utility the size of FPU seems to be a failure of Chesapeake management and its consultants – particularly during a significant corporate purchase such as FPU. For example, the wooden poles in my yard have been marked with red metal tags denoting the tops and bottoms of the poles are rotten, and they've been tagged since way before 2009 and those tags are visible from the street. All one needs to do is drive around town and look at the poor condition of the poles to know that the entire system looks "value engineered" and maintenance appears to have been deferred for some time in many areas.

2. On South Fletcher (where I live) the utilities look terrible and cause the entire street to look like a tenement, like a ghetto. Residents have been commenting for the 29 years I've lived here that the utilities desperately need to be buried. During windstorms, underground utilities would be safer. Underground utilities would require less maintenance. The South Fletcher residents did not ask for the enormous and ugly concrete poles to be erected. To my knowledge, no notice was provided they were coming nor were residents provided any opportunity for input. We were not told they would have an impact on our wallet. We do not now wish to be billed for their arbitrary cost, in arrears. Who approved and provided the permission for FPU to erect these enormous and ugly concrete poles along the beach road on the island? Next time you drive along South Fletcher, imagine this street without poles and wires. It would be beautiful, benefit visitors and residents alike and help add revenues to the tax base over time through improved property valuation and increased sales taxes generated by visitors.

3. Providing a 6-week notice in the middle of the calendar year to businesses and residents who budget their expenses on an annual basis that utility costs are suddenly going to jump 6.7 percent seems pretty unacceptable to me. The information provided in the article was also sketchy and vague. Are rates going up equally for both business and residential customers? Or will one

group be footing the bill for the other?

4. 6.7 percent is triple the Consumer Price Index (CPI), the standard by which most rate increases are governed.

5. Basing the increase on "lack of growth" is interesting. The city of Fernandina Beach is fairly well developed with very strict zoning rules that prohibit mowing down existing single-family homes and erecting high density developments. In 2009, during the decision to buy the company with a pro-forma based on "population growth," where was this growth expected to be?

I request the city of Fernandina Beach provide a formal position on the state of above-ground utilities on the island, as well as its position on this unexpected and sudden rate increase by FPU, as they are allowed to be operating as a monopoly within our community.

If you live on South Fletcher and wish to be involved in discussion about burying utilities, visit www.southfletcher.nextdoor.com and sign up. You must be one of the 1,200 or so property owners along South Fletcher. Your identity will be verified by your neighbors before you are allowed to join. It is free and you can quit later if you don't like it.

The article on May 21 also stated a meeting would be scheduled by FPU for input. I look forward to learning the date and time, and hopefully that information is not released the day before the meeting, to allow residents to plan time to be included. I did write a letter to Mr. Householder last year, and received no response. I just received my latest electrical bill yesterday, and no notice of a rate increase was inserted in the bill.

Waterfront park

Again, our city commissioners are working hard and long – with little or no results. To my surprise, they have taken a step "Forward" regarding the long issue of the waterfront park in Fernandina Beach.

Many years ago, a plan was developed and approved by the then commissioners to develop a public park on our waterfront where our citizens of Fernandina Beach could enjoy music, picnics or watch the activities on the river. If you remember, a committee of two groups, the Waterfront Committee and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee, developed a waterfront plan which was approved by the then commissioners with funds from the approved "Forward Fernandina." Funds in the form of a 2 percent loan paid by the citizens. The next commissioners gave the loan back and money was also given back.

The park was planned with many of the issues that are brought out today in the various workshops, i.e., parking. However, in fairness to our past efforts, the original plans were put in the file cabinet. In the past year, a reinvented plan was presented by Mr. (Randy) Rice and had most of the former plans in but for minor changes. However, the major difference was the private funding of the park which was presented to various committees and to the city commissioners.

On the issue of the parking, some good suggestions have come out. My view and suggestion is if a parking structure is considered – a logical spot could be the lot across for City Hall. Special events will have a difficult time in trying to solve a 100,000 increase once or twice a year. More consideration to the daily and normal parking needs would be a better beginning.

The public funding is a good idea but a difficult issue that the citizens must understand would take a long time and consideration – we have tried this before. (i.e., the water slide). During several of the workshops held, many comments were, "Well, the tax dollars and etc. would not be spent. No tax dollars and on and on." Wrong, tax dollars will be involved – believe me.

Another issue, we can't afford a loan – many of our city capital improvements are through loans, bonds and grants. These are sources that the city most likely could afford to finance this park.

I believe that too many people are looking at their own plans – and perhaps their own interests. Like

the old saying "Too many cooks might spoil the broth."

"I have a personal reason for seeing this waterfront park developed, having spent many hours with the two committees (Waterfront Park and Parks/Recreation Committee), public hearings and various staff help – we do have a good plan.

Now, before we go off, the commissioners should consider the two above committees for their input and help in final plans as (one who has worked with big projects) if you go out for bids, any changes or additions could be costly.

You already, have several individuals from these committees, if willing, could be a separate group of advisors – reporting to the commissioners and overseeing the approved plans.

My famous professor once questioned, "Why have an expensive fountain when you have a beautiful river to look at?"



Walk and waddle, an island tradition

When it comes to my morning walks, I'm a creature of habit. Here in Fernandina my usual morning walk is from five to seven miles, either along our beaches when the tide is right or in the Egans Creek Greenway when it isn't.

But lately I've started a new habit, not really a great one for my fitness I must say. Sometimes after my walks here on the island I top it off with a trip to T-Rays to fill up on a mighty breakfast that only they serve right – eggs, spicy sausage links, homemade biscuits, cheese grits. Yummy. But my waistline is starting to reflect this new habit too.

On a recent trip to Long Island, N.Y., to visit my in-laws I still kept to this pattern. In the mornings I leave Mom-Pat's house in quaint Blue Point and trek along a now familiar route. First it's a stop at the nearby deli to pick up a cup of coffee and then I head down Blue Point Avenue to the town fishing dock. Ever curious, I spend a few minutes chatting with the local fishermen, who are always willing to chat. Sometimes they are netting crabs lured with a chicken part on a string. Other

times they are catching fish, but rarely. Mostly they are just hanging out, it seems, enjoying the view and their time together.

Further down along the bayside in sheltered inlets a few commercial fishing boats are docked. Some clambers still work these waters, dragging rakes along the bottom and pulling up clams, but the clam population has declined and this fishing practice is diminishing as well. But fishermen, ever resourceful, now catch horseshoe crabs which they use to bait traps for whelks and eels, among other things.

When I continue my walk it's along residential streets bisected by a handful of small natural ponds and streams flowing into the bay. This time, in spring, each pond had its own resident family of geese, usually two vigilant parents and an ever-declining number of off-spring each day I pass them. One day I saw

one reason for this decline in numbers. The largest snapping turtle I've ever seen, with its head the size of a salad bowl, was visible underwater, right near a group of goslings. The next day, there was one gosling less in that batch. It makes me wonder about our proliferation of geese. In many of our man-made retention ponds there are few such predators to keep the geese numbers in check. In our area it is not unusual for as many as eight geese to be successfully raised by their parents, not the two or three that make it in Blue Point.

But spring in Blue Point is full of other natural wonders besides geese. As I walk along the residential streets I enjoy the sights and smells of cherry trees in bloom, with flower petals raining on me as I pass under them. Irises, tulips, daffodils and lilac and forsythia bushes adorn the well-tended gardens of those wealthy enough – or long-lived enough – to afford to live here near the water. As I walk in this charming neighborhood, other walkers greet me, their dogs wag their tails and are happy when I pet them. In many ways, despite the different scenery, it's not so unlike my

walks on Amelia Island where I also chat with everyone and pet their dogs.

But, unfortunately, my routine breakfast after a walk is easy to fulfill in Long Island too. About three miles from Mom-Pat's home, in the village of Patchogue, I've found my T-Rays substitute. This area of town is Latino and I've discovered a little café frequented by Spanish-speaking residents with origins from many countries. Although English is not well understood by the servers behind the buffet counter, I find it easy enough to get a giant platter of beans and rice and fried plantains and eggs and pork chops and tamales and what have you. All for maybe three dollars!

So, each morning I waddle out of this café and trek back to Mom Pat's home in Blue Point about two pounds heavier, it seems, than I started. But hey, this is a vacation after all!

But those T-Ray's breakfasts at home? OK, so a once a week splurge never hurts anyone, right?

'Improving economy' lifts Nassau property values

The Nassau County Property Appraiser's Office has released the 2014 estimated preliminary tax roll and the initial numbers show an increase in the tax base for the first time since 2007.

According to Property Appraiser Mike Hickox, strong sales activity during the 2013 calendar year have helped stabilize the real estate market by reducing inventory levels.

"The strong demand and lower inventory has caused values to increase as the market has shifted from a buyer's market to a seller's market in some price ranges," said Hickox in a press release. "These are signs of an improving economy."

Hickox presented the 2014 estimated values to the taxing authorities on Thursday so they

can begin their budget process and determine the tax rate for the property owners in Nassau County.

The 2014 market value estimates increased by almost 5 percent to \$9.718 billion. The market value includes all property before any exemptions, classifications or capped assessments.

Taxable values have increased as well; however, property owners are protected by the Save Our Homes amendment which caps the amount the assessed value can increase. The 2014 cap is based on the consumer price index (CPI) of 1.5 percent. Non-homesteaded properties are capped at 10 percent.

In 2014, Nassau County's taxable value is estimated to be

about \$6.45 billion, compared to a little more than \$6.20 billion in 2013, or about a 3.8 percent increase.

The city of Fernandina could see the taxable value rise to \$1.6 billion, an increase of over 4 percent.

Callahan is estimated to have an increase in its taxable value to over \$69 million, up by almost 2 percent from last year.

Hilliard is expected to see an increase of almost 2 percent, bringing its taxable value to over \$74 million.

The official preliminary tax roll is expected to be released to the taxing authorities and the state Department of Revenue by July.

Are you prepared for a hurricane? Many are not

TAMPA – Hurricane season began on Sunday, but three in 10 (29 percent) of Florida residents do not make advanced preparations, according to a recent AAA Consumer Pulse survey.

Colorado State University predicts a below-average hurricane season with nine named storms, three hurricanes and one major hurricane this year. If a named storm moved toward Florida, nearly one in five (17 percent) Floridians say they would not leave their homes. However, of those who would evacuate, the majority (65 percent) say they would only leave for a Category 3 hurricane or greater.

"Residents should stay vigilant and be prepared for a major weather event," said Mark Jenkins, spokesman, AAA – The Auto Club Group. "Part of that preparation includes having a storm kit, evacuation plan and flood insurance. Every home is in a flood zone, whether you live near the coast or not."

Floods are the number one disaster in the United States.

Homes in low risk zones account for 25 percent of flood claims every year. Just two inches of water in a 2,000-square-foot home can cause as much as \$21,000 or more in damage. However, only 31 percent of Floridians have flood insurance, which is separate from homeowners insurance.

A preferred risk flood insurance policy costing 85 cents a day will cover \$100,000 in structural damage and \$40,000 for damage to contents inside the home.

"Only half of people know there is a 30-day waiting period for a new flood policy to take effect," Jenkins said. "If you wait until a storm is named and heading your direction, you will be too late. Now is a great time to check with your homeowner's insurance provider to ensure you are covered before the busy storm season begins."

AAA also offers these hurricane preparation tips:

- **Secure Your Home** – Inspect your home for minor repairs needed to roof, windows, down spouts, etc. Trim

trees or bushes that could cause damage to your home in case of high winds.

- **Make a Plan** – Develop a Family Emergency Plan to include ways to contact each other, alternative meeting locations, and an out-of-town contact person.

- **Identify a safe room or safest areas in your home.** Research your evacuation route. Be sure and include plans for your pets.

- **Take Inventory** – Update your Home Inventory quickly by walking through your home with a video camera or smart phone. Keep a record of large purchases including the cost of the item, when purchased and model and serial numbers as available.

- **Stock Emergency Supplies**

- **SPlan** for a weeks worth of non-perishable food and water. Be sure and have flashlights, extra batteries, battery-powered radio, medications, first aid kit, blankets, toiletries, diapers, etc. You may also want to prepare a portable kit and keep in your car should you evacuate.

Biker hits deer

Dennis L. Stoll, 35, of Hilliard was seriously injured when his motorcycle struck a deer Saturday night.

Stoll was driving westbound on Henry Smith Road east of Timber Trail when he struck the deer in the roadway and lost control of his vehicle, according to the Florida Highway Patrol. Stoll was ejected onto the roadway and struck his head, police said. The deer died at the scene, according to the report.

The accident occurred about 8:35 p.m. and Stoll was transported to UF Shands in Jacksonville.

Fleeing driver caught

A man from St. Louis was arrested on several charges by Nassau County deputies May 23 when he attempted to flee police after a traffic stop, according to a report.

A deputy reported that as he headed south at the Florida/Georgia line the morning of May 23 on I-95, he observed a black VW Jetta in the center lane begin slowing down to create distance from his patrol car.

Due to the VW driver abruptly applying breaks, a truck was forced to change lanes abruptly to avoid colliding with the VW, according to the report.

The deputy moved to the right, allowing the VW to pass, then pulled the driver over at mile marker 376, the report stated.

On asking the driver for his license, registration and insurance, the deputy noticed a smell of burnt marijuana, and also observed tobacco had been removed from a cigar in the center console. The driver, Leandro Planell, 40, reportedly told the deputy repeatedly that he did not have any "weed" in the car.

As the deputy waited for backup officers, he told Planell that, due to the smell of burnt marijuana, Planell would have to

exit the vehicle for a search.

According to the report, Planell stated, "You do not have a warrant, and I do not consent to your search," to which the deputy replied he did not need a warrant as he could smell the marijuana.

Planell then reportedly became agitated, put the car in "drive" and fled at a high rate of speed.

The deputy began pursuing Planell, who was reportedly driving at speeds exceeding 100 miles per hour and weaving in and out of southbound traffic.

Unable to pass cars in the center lane, Planell reportedly began passing cars on the shoulder of the highway, exiting at mile marker 373 and turning west on A1A.

Planell eventually turned into a gas station and was apprehended by another deputy, according to the report. He was placed in handcuffs and a search revealed a small amount of marijuana in his clothing.

A witness told police that Planell had thrown a plastic shopping bag from the front passenger-side window during the pursuit.

Police later recovered the bag, which contained 549.5 grams of marijuana, according to the report.

Planell was charged with fleeing or eluding police with disregard for safety of persons

or property; smuggling marijuana into the state; and possession of marijuana over 20 grams.

Craigslist deal foiled

A 20-year-old Fernandina Beach man was arrested May 23 after he was caught in an attempt to sell a stolen laptop on Craigslist, according to a Nassau County Sheriff's Office report.

A Yulee resident told deputies May 23 that an Acer laptop valued at \$425 had been stolen from his living room by someone who gained access to his home through an unlocked garage door. He said that after discovering the laptop missing, he found an identical laptop being advertised on Craigslist for \$200 that he believed was his.

After checking a computer database, police found the phone number on the Craigslist ad belonged to Xavier Dewaye May, 20, 123 Hirth Road, No. 1502, Fernandina Beach.

Another witness told deputies that May and another person had arrived at her home earlier in the day to ask if she was interested in buying a black laptop, the report stated.

The co-defendant, a student a Yulee High School, was questioned along with May, who reportedly told police the co-

defendant took the laptop with the victim's permission. May also told police the co-defendant had used May's phone number in the Craigslist ad.

The laptop was returned to the victim, according to the report, and May was charged with grand theft, burglary of an unoccupied dwelling and dealing in stolen property.

Salvation Army aids probationers

Ever since founder William Booth began knocking on the doors of prisons in 1852 offering to assist newly released offenders, the Salvation Army has been doing its best to provide a helping hand to this often overlooked segment of society through Salvation Army Correctional Services (SACS).

Melvin Malcolm, chief of Misdemeanor Probation at the Yulee location, said his office assists those who commit misdemeanor offenses including petty theft of less than \$300, simple battery, criminal mischief, DUI and other misdemeanors. These individuals have served a year in jail and paid up to a \$100 fine.

After a career in law enforcement, Malcolm has heard it all and seen just about everything, so he is well equipped to advise his clients.

"The main thing I try to do is encourage them because when they come in here, they feel like the weight of the world is on their shoulders."

In addition to helping them manage their probation, the agency works with individuals to address all needs including economic, social and emotional.

"We try to help those who have been arrested by referring them to other services," said Malcolm, who gives each probationer a Nassau County Community Resource Guide that lists a myriad of service organizations able to provide assistance with everything from housing, food, childcare, health, shelter and transportation.

Veterans are given information for contacts to help with their specific needs.

Individuals with mental health, drug or alcohol issues are referred to Starting Point Behavioral Health, McPherson Counseling Services or Awakening Nassau to complete court ordered counseling.

Clients are frequently required to perform community service and SACS partners with local nonprofits to help them meet that requirement by arranging various projects such as picking up trash on designated sections of highway, clearing out a ditch or painting stripes in a parking lot.

This allows probationers to give back for the offense they committed and provides some savings in the community because the work is performed at no cost to taxpayers.

The agency networks with businesses to hire probationers and holds job fairs to increase their sphere of opportunities.

The new location between Career Source and Family Support Services allows his office to provide more service, notes Malcolm, and now that the Council on Aging bus service has created a bus stop at the Lofton Square shopping center, it is very convenient for his clients.

For those convicted of domestic battery, there is a 26-week batterers' intervention program. Attendees are taught how to replace their power and control tendencies with more appropriate nonviolent ways of handling their relationships.

An eight-hour anger management class helps probationers learn specific techniques for handling their anger.

The various classes, payments and community service have an impact on most probationers, notes Malcolm.

"I'd say about 70 or 80 percent of my clients 'get it.' In other words, they see all that they've had to go through following a DUI or domestic battery, and how it impacts not only them but their families, and they say they don't want to have to deal with all that again."

The Salvation Army Correctional Services office is located at 96030 Lofton Square. Business hours are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Thursday 9 a.m.-7 p.m. and the second Saturday of each month by appointment. Phone 225-1958.

Some individuals are referred to Hope House at 410 S. Ninth St. in Fernandina Beach for assistance with food, clothing and social services.

That office sees probation clients only on Fridays from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Phone 321-0435.

building corps of volunteers and his own willingness to serve. Christenson comes from seven years working for the First Coast

YMCA, which he notes is not dissimilar from his new job in that "both are nonprofits, so you are doing a lot of fundraising and looking for volunteers" as well as working together with board members.

Christenson, who replaces Brandy Carvalho after she departed for a job at White Oak Plantation this spring, knows a thing or two about volunteering himself. He served a year in the Americorps program, building houses in Kentucky after graduating Minnesota's St. Mary University in 2005 with a Bachelor of Arts in Pastoral and Youth Ministry. He's also on the board of directors for

the Nassau County Special Olympics, among numerous other community endeavors too lengthy to list but including Amelia Island Runners, the Katie Ride for Life, the Shrimp Festival and First Coast Kids Tri.

"I had dyslexia growing

up," said Christenson in a recent interview. As a result he sometimes spent time in special needs classes to help deal with his disability, "and it's there that I developed a love of working with kids with special needs."

However as his wife, Jenny, pursued her studies – she now works in the marine mammal training program at Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay in Georgia – he moved to accommodate her career, first to Miami and then to the First Coast eight years ago.

Just over three years ago they settled in Fernandina Beach, purchasing a home on the north end of the island that they share with their two rescue dogs, black labs named Ripley and Tide, or Rip-Tide for short.

When the couple – both natives of Minnesota – first moved to Northeast Florida, Christenson initially took a management job at the Orange Park Dillard's, but "I knew that was not the path I wanted to go, so I applied to the Y."

While Christenson started on the front desk as a membership associate at the McArthur Family YMCA here in Fernandina Beach, he quickly moved up the ladder and by May 2013 was named the Jacksonville Brooks Family YMCA aquatics director, supervising programs that totaled 1,750 participants, 15 volunteers, 30 employees, five pools and a \$261,000 budget.

"It's really about building relationships in the community, and that's what I do," Christenson said of his past experience and his new role at NHS. "With the capital campaign it's especially exciting."

It's those qualities that convinced the Nassau Humane Society board of directors that he would be a good fit for their growing organization.

"Tom has good leadership

and interpersonal skills. His open communications and lead-by-example attitude should make the NHS family a stronger unit," said board president John Landregan.

However, what really stood out is Christenson's volunteer commitment.

"During the interview process, Tom discussed his role as the volunteer county director for the Nassau County Special Olympics. He stated if he was offered the NHS executive director position, he would like to continue to volunteer with Special Olympics," said Landregan.

"Since NHS success is based on the number of volunteers, over 400, Tom's commitment to continue to volunteer his personal time demonstrates his understanding of how important volunteers are to nonprofit organizations. It also means he is a good time manager and needs to have balance in his personal life," said Landregan.

As construction progresses on Nassau Humane Society's new shelter on city land across from the municip-

pal airport, those skills will be needed more than ever. The estimated completion date is around the middle of July, said Landregan, and the design and layout are now clearly visible.

"It is really starting to take shape," said Landregan, though \$350,000 is still needed to close the gap on the construction cost and fundraising is ongoing.

That will be Christenson's focus moving forward, as well as preparing the shelter to open and to make the transition from the old facility to the new, he said. He's also in charge of the NHS Dog Park on Airport Road and the agency's Second Chance Store on South 14th Street.

"Expenses will rise and operational costs will be higher once the shelter opens, and with that fundraising will have to increase," Christenson noted. "We're completely open for all opportunities."





FSU's Stewart second-team All-American

On the eve of the 2014 Tallahassee Regional, Florida State University was recognized by *Collegiate Baseball* newspaper with a pair of Louisville Slugger All-Americans. D.J. Stewart and Luke Weaver were honored as second- and third-team All-Americans, respectively, in 2014.

Stewart, who garnered All-ACC honors for the second year in a row, became the seventh Seminole in school history to garner Player of the Year accolades. He was also recently recognized as a semifinalist for both the Golden Spikes Award and Dick Howser Trophy.

The sophomore outfielder heads into the NCAA Tournament ranked in the top 10 in the ACC in nine offensive categories while leading the league in average (.348), on-base percentage (.469) and slugging percentage (.561). He also ranks in the top 50 nationally in four categories including double per game (0.37, 31st), on-base percentage (34th), base-on-balls per game (0.75, 34th) and doubles (19, 35th).

Stewart finished league play hitting .388 with 11 doubles, four home runs and 30 RBI in 26 games. The Yulee native sits second on the team in both multi-hit (19) and multi-RBI (12) games. He has recorded a career-high four hits three times in 2014. Stewart has reached base safely in 50 of the 51 games in which he has played this year.

Weaver of DeLand has served as Florida State's Friday night starter all season long. The junior right hander currently leads the team in wins (8), innings pitched (101.1) and strikeouts (81). In 15 starts, Weaver has posted a record of 8-3 with an ERA of 2.66. Opponents are hitting just .224 against Weaver this year.

The award for both Seminoles marks the first of their careers. Stewart was named a first-team preseason All-American by *Collegiate Baseball* in 2014, while Weaver garnered second-team preseason accolades.

Stewart was also recognized for his work in the classroom this past year, earning Capital One Academic All-America accolades. The 2014 Academic All-America Division I Baseball team was announced on Friday and selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America. Stewart was named to the third team. Teammate Gage Smith garnered second-team honors.

It marked just the second time in school history, and first since 1970, that multiple Seminoles were named Academic All-Americans in the same year. In 1970, Florida State was recognized with three honorees, including Greg Gromek (SS, first team), Carl Gromek (P, first team) and Dick Nichols (INF, second team).

Smith and Stewart become the 10th and 11th Seminole baseball players to earn this honor and the first since James Ramsey was honored in back-to-back seasons in 2011 and 2012.

Florida State was one of four schools in 2014 to place two student-athletes on the Division I Academic All-America team, joining Mercer, Southeast Missouri and Canisius.

An ACC Academic Honor Roll honoree, Stewart is a two-time member of FSU's dean's list. He is currently pursuing his bachelor's degree in sport management.

Fifth-ranked Florida State (43-17) saw its season come to an end Saturday afternoon as the Seminoles fell to Alabama (35-23) 6-5 in an elimination game of the 2014 Tallahassee Regional on Mike Martin Field inside Dick Howser Stadium.

The Seminoles refused to go down without a fight, putting together a ninth inning rally but in the end came up a run short as Florida State dropped the first two games of an NCAA regional for the first time since 1984 when FSU fell to Stetson and East Carolina.

Stewart kept the ninth inning alive with a two-run single to center to cut Florida State's deficit to 6-5. He finished the game with two hits and two RBI.

Florida State, which dropped its opening game to Georgia Southern 7-0 Friday night, ended the season with 40 wins for the 37th year in a row, while clinching the ACC Atlantic Division title for the eighth consecutive year.

Friday's loss to Georgia Southern snapped FSU's 19-game winning streak in regional play as it marked the Seminoles first set back in the NCAA regionals since falling to Bucknell, 7-0, in the opening game of the 2008 Tallahassee Regional.

The shutout on Friday night was just the second time the Seminoles were held without a run this year.

Stewart led off the bottom of the seventh inning Friday with an infield single, becoming FSU first base runner to reach since the second inning. Visit www.seminoles.com.

The St. Jude Classic began in 1958 as the Memphis Open. The idea came from seven Memphis businessmen looking to bring golf to western Tennessee. Most people have known this tournament as being hosted by Danny Thomas and his tireless work with the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. One of the greatest golf accomplishments occurred at this tournament in 1977. Al Geiberger did the unthinkable and fired a 13-under par round of 59 during his second round on the longest course on the PGA Tour.

Hideki Matsuyama earned his first victory in the United States and validation as one of golf's young stars Sunday with a birdie on the 18th hole to force a playoff and a 10-foot par putt on the first extra hole to win the Memorial. Masters champion Bubba Watson had a one-shot lead with five holes to play. He was 3-over par the rest of the way. Adam Scott, the No. 1 player in the world, was tied for the lead until playing the last seven holes in 4-over par.

Lessons from the Golf Pro

One of the biggest weaknesses that the amateur golfer has is the tendency to get very tentative when it comes to putting. We try to hit the putt so perfect that we are looking for it to "die" as it reaches the hole. This is a good strategy on long putts where you want to lag them near the hole, but we do it too many times on the short putts. You need to have the reverse mindset and try to slam the putt into the hole. The area within a couple feet of the hole is where everybody walks during their round. As a result, there is a greater likelihood of having more spike marks in place to knock putts off-line. Therefore, you need to put enough authority into the short putts to make sure you keep the line. Even if you go past the hole more than a few times, this is a better way to make more putts in the future.

ried through a meal. You do not see obese people.

Instead of a breakfast bar of packaged cereals, donuts, frozen orange juice and coffee offered to travelers in this country, each morning we had a variety of freshly baked pastries, fruits, vegetables and meats, with freshly squeezed juices and delicious dark coffee. Each breakfast was a photo opportunity. Beautifully displayed and tempting.

Yes, a good long walk was scheduled each day. We were refreshed by water, never a sugared soft drink. When it was time for lunch we would either enjoy a picnic of local cheeses, fruits and some sweets or enjoy a lengthy luncheon with many

courses that were savored and digested slowly and not on the run.

Dinner was always more than a meal. It was about entertainment and friendship. Beautifully set tables – with the silver and glassware to accommodate the many coursed meal. More often than not the chef and/or owner came out to make sure everyone was enjoying their meal. We always were.

The original Mediterranean Diet includes lots of olive oil, fish, cheese, milk, yogurt, moderate consumption of meat, beans and legumes, three or four eggs a week and my favorite – wine – especially red. Snacks include nuts, another diet basic. For example, residents of Greece aver-

age six or more servings a day of antioxidant-rich fruits and vegetables. Research shows that this healthy diet offers a reduced risk of death from heart disease and cancer and a reduced incidence of Parkinson's and Alzheimer's diseases.

Now I am home and determined to continue healthy eating. It is the right time of year with wonderful fresh fruits and vegetables available. My adventure trip has reminded me how important healthy eating is!



Excavation site

Archaeologists from the Florida Museum of Natural History at the University of Florida are conducting an excavation on the grounds of Mission Nombre de Dios in St. Augustine. Based on archaeological discoveries, historical documents and other evidence, the site is believed to be the foundation of a church built by Governor Pablo de Hita y Salazar in 1677, to serve Mission Nombre de Dios and the Shrine of Nuestra Señora de la Leche. Governor de Hita was a soldier and the governor of Florida from 1674-1680.

The excavations have uncovered the exterior wall foundations of the church, as well as interior partition walls. Artifacts recovered include items such as coquina, tabby, mortar and nails, as well as Native American and Spanish pottery dating from the late 1600s to the early 1700s.

The unexpected findings, specifically the number of interior walls and apparent stages of construction, have excited even archaeologists with years of excavating experience in St. Augustine, and researchers plan to continue excavation efforts through early June.

The public is welcome to view the excavations while under way, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday, weather permitting. For information, call Eric Johnson, director of Mission Nombre de Dios of the Diocese of St. Augustine at (904) 824-2809.
