# County OKs tax hike, 3-2

The Nassau County Commission has tentatively approved a property tax increase as part of a plan to balance next year's budget.

At a special meeting Monday, the board voted 3-2 to raise the tax rate by one mill for fiscal 2014-15, which starts Oct. 1. This would mean an estimated increase of \$110 to \$130 for each \$100,000 of assessed value for a home-steaded property in Nassau County.

Two public hearings are required and likely will be held in September. Final approval of the budget would come before the new fiscal year begins Oct. 1. The county could still lower the property tax rate, but could not raise it above the increase approved Monday.

The tax hike is estimated to raise an additional \$6.1 million, say budget offi-

cial. While the money is significant, it was not enough to close the \$11.2 million shortfall projected by the county Office of Management and Budget.

The board also voted to eliminate a \$1.5 million maintenance plan for the county's paved roads.

They also cut in half a plan to reduce the fleet replacement program, to \$1.5 million from \$3 million.

The board added \$2.5 million to its capital improvement projects and will also use money from the one-cent fund and reserve account to balance the budget, as required by state statute.

# A1A to be closed this weekend

State Road A1A will be completely closed from 5:30 a.m. Saturday to 8 p.m. Monday at the railroad crossing between I-95 and US 17 in Nassau County while the crossing is reconstructed. The detour routes are US 17 and I-95.

Motorists and pedestrians will be allowed to access businesses and residences on A1A but will not be allowed to cross the railroad tracks. Semi-trucks are encouraged to completely avoid the area due to insufficient space to turn around.

Emergency rescue crews, law enforcement and school transportation officials have been notified and are already preparing for the closures. Six off-duty police officers will assist with traffic around the

construction area. The roadway will reopen early if the work is completed ahead of schedule, but it could possibly be closed longer if rain delays the work.

The existing railroad crossing, owned by CSX Transportation Inc., is being replaced with a new concrete crossing designed to last longer and hold up better under heavy traffic.

The area is also being resurfaced once the crossing is replaced. Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is overseeing the construction and roadway resurfacing.

# Mother turns heartbreak to help for needy animals

Leigh Cranford's sudden, unexpected loss of her 31-year-old daughter, Erin Cranford Williams, last year is something she's still trying to process.

"It's not like, well, your year is up, get over it. It doesn't work like that. People probably think that I'm doing really well, and happy and all but... it hurts."

Erin was an athletic young woman who loved sharing her enthusiasm with her Cranford Fitness Training clients.

She also did pet sitting and it is this endeavor that her mother took over after her death.

An ardent animal lover, Erin was often seen driving around town with her friend's West Highland White Terrier sitting in the front seat of her little convertible.

Taking over her daughter's pet sitting business gave Cranford the opportunity to honor her memory and benefit homeless animals at the same time by suggesting that clients make a donation to the

Nassau Humane Society instead of paying her.

That business plan resulted in a donation of \$1,000 recently when fitness and pet sitting client Julie Bennett donated that amount after Cranford pet-sat her two West Highland White Terriers, Chevy Joe and Chrysler Ann.

"Leigh volunteers for the Nassau Humane Society and she does such a great job. The donation was an unexpected gift to me that I didn't want to accept so I accepted it anyway and gave it to the Humane Society," said Bennett, whose generosity had a profound impact on Cranford.

"My mouth fell open when she told me she was giving me a check for \$1,000 for the Humane Society. Her kindness and generosity were a total surprise."

Cranford's only other clients are a Yorkie and his Shih-Tzu companion in her own neighborhood.

"I don't pet sit that much, but the Humane Society doesn't care about that. They are happy to get a donation in any amount."

# Keep it safe for boaters, manatees

Boaters can help reduce the risk of collisions with manatees and other wildlife by being extra vigilant when out on county waterways. Slowing down in manatee habitat and observing all posted boat speed regulations can save manatee lives. Also, statistics on human/watercraft injuries and fatalities continue to concern Floridians and visitors who enjoy the state's waterways.

A recent press release from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) states that 62 people lost their lives in Florida in 2013 due to boating accidents, and there have been 11 deaths so far in 2014. Since boat traffic often doubles or triples during the summer holidays, dangerous conditions for the boating community as well as the slow-moving manatees can increase dramatically.

Save the Manatee Club produces bright yellow, waterproof boating banners and provides them free to Florida boaters to help warn other boaters when manatees are sighted in the area.

By carrying the "Please Slow Manatees Below" banner in motorboats, kayaks and canoes, it's much easier and more efficient to alert other boaters when manatees are present. Remember, manatees must surface to breathe and prefer shallow waters. If you see a manatee when operating a powerboat, remain a safe distance away - about 300 feet. If you want to observe the manatee, cut the motor, but don't drift over the manatee.

Lori Dement from South Pasadena takes the club's boating banner along whenever she and her husband, Cyrus, are out on local waterways in their dinghy. "I requested the banner

so that I can do what I can to protect the manatees - they are just so very precious," said Dement.

The club also produces and distributes free shoreline property signs and boating decals with the message to "Slow

Please," and both feature the FWC's hotline number for reporting manatees in distress.

If you see an injured, dead, tagged or orphaned manatee, or a manatee who is

being harassed, call the FWC at 1-888-404-FWCC (3922) or #FWC or \*FWC on your cellular phone, use VHF Channel 16 on your marine radio, or send a text to [Tip@MyFWC.com](mailto:Tip@MyFWC.com).

"Responsible boating practices can save both human and manatee lives," says Dr. Katie Tripp, director of Science and Conservation for Save the Manatee Club. "This is especially crucial during busy holidays when more boaters are out on the water and the risks increase."

Commissioner Steve Kelley: No.

Both Holloway and Kelley acknowledged the county's money trouble during a lengthy board discussion that started at 9 a.m. and ended after 3 p.m., with an hour or so break for lunch. But still both commissioners said no to the budget proposal.

Why? They did not say. Holloway and Kelley did not offer explanation during public discussion, and they quickly left the meeting after it ended.

Holloway said he was late for an appointment and did not have time to speak with a reporter about his vote. Kelley ignored the *News-Leader's* request for comment on his way out the door.

Holloway and Kelley both seek re-election this year. Kelley and Mike Boyle will face each other in a closed primary Aug. 26 and the winner will face write-in candidate Gene Alley in November's general election. The race between Republicans Holloway and George Spicer will be open to all voters since there are no opponents in November.

Despite the board's vote, there is still time to re-work the budget, and even potentially for the tax increase to go away.

Commissioners are hoping that bids for the new sheriff's administration building come in lower than \$10 million. That's how much money the board has set aside for the project, but there is widespread belief that the bids will come in at \$6 million. If they do, that could potentially free \$4 million.

The bids will be opened today at 10 a.m. The lowest bid will be accepted and pursued.

But for now, the board's budget discussions centered on a tax increase and cuts virtually across the board.

Here is how Holloway described it.

"We're just taking out our scissors and cutting, cutting,

cutting," said Holloway.

The board questioned every department and expense.

"Wooooo Lordy," said Kelley about a \$2.1 million expense for new radios for the sheriff, fire rescue and Road and Bridge departments. "We're down here shaking pennies."

Staff was also asked to justify expenses.

Fire Chief Matt Graves asked to replace "poorly performing and obsolete extrication equipment," with four new units for \$139,000. The board said he could have two.

Here's some of the discussion.

Holloway: Public safety is a priority, but that being said, can we get by with two?

Leeper: "Any way they can be phased in over two or three years?"

Graves: "You know as well as I do, when you're trapped in a car you want out. (This equipment means) getting the person out potentially quicker."

The board slashed a \$233,000 request by Facilities Maintenance to replace seven beach access walkovers. It agreed to fund two projects, including Peters Point and another on the south end at #110 for \$155,000.

The board signed off on a \$90,000 request from the Supervisor of Elections Office for new voting equipment.

Road & Bridge will receive \$81,000 for a carport. Supervisor David Hearn said a variety of equipment, including mowers, cement mixers and excavation equipment, is "sitting in the open deteriorating."

He also told the board that workers are overburdened with maintenance projects.

The budget also includes a 2.5 percent salary increase for union workers and staff and, for the first time, the county must begin funding a portion of pension liabilities starting next year under a new state statute.

Boatright asked if health care costs were up, and he was told no.

Boatright also wanted to

**County won't inspect road work**

At a special budget meeting Monday, the Nassau County Commission questioned planned road projects, including repaving Chester Road.

While the state is planning to give the county more than \$13 million to do the work, commissioners discussed eliminating the project altogether because the county's obligation for the roadway is about \$1.5 million.

The board also cut \$250,000 from Public Works for a road inspector on the expansion of Commerce Drive behind Publix in Yulee.

For the first time, the county is allowing a private real estate developer to help build and pay for a new road. And they put Sleiman Enterprises in charge of construction and inspection.

Sleiman officials say they have their own inspector. "You're spending additional money. That's a waste," said Sleiman executive Michael Herzberg, who attended the budget meeting with a trio of colleagues, including Eli Sleiman, one of the owners.

The board liked what he had to say. County Engineer Jonathan Page did not.

"You don't get what you expect, you get what you inspect," said Page to commissioners.

Public Works Director Scott Herring, who was on a scheduled vacation and did not attend the meeting, had previously argued in support of using an independent inspector to protect the county's interest. The board had previously agreed with him. But now it changed its mind.

With the opportunity to save money, the board said it wants the contract with the road inspector canceled.

Commissioner Danny Leeper answered conflict of interest concerns by asking Herzberg if the company is experienced and reliable.

"You've built a lot of roadways. Has this historically been a problem?" said Leeper to Herzberg.

"No," said Herzberg. "There's never been a bond called to my knowledge."

know why the county is spending almost \$1 million to fund a health department since it is a state agency. And he didn't like approving a \$65,000 expense to upgrade the department's phone system.

Budget Director and Assistant County Manager Shanea Jones walked commissioners through the numbers with support from Cindy Wood, who also works in the budget office.

They worked on an interactive spreadsheet that was projected onto a screen and shown to the audience watching online.

No one from the public attended the meeting.

Jones told commissioners that she had met with Clerk of Court John Crawford and that

he was "on board" with her budget numbers and projections.

She offered five-year projections, but Holloway told her to ignore them.

"We're only concerned with 2014-2015," said Holloway.

That request puzzled Edwards.

"We're talking about eliminating the five-year plan?" said Edwards. "That leaves us with no plan."

County Manager Ted Selby agreed. He has been pushing the board for years for a long-term plan.

"These items need to be mentioned that are looming," said Selby. "I don't think you can take one clean swipe. You need to know what's out there."

**St. Johns water district cuts tax rate again**

PALATKA – The St. Johns River Water Management District's Governing Board on Tuesday approved a tentative budget that reduces the millage rate for taxpayers and funds major district initiatives, including projects to protect the region's springs and improve water quality in the Indian River Lagoon and St. Johns River.

The tentative 0.3164 millage rate would result in \$81.8 million in revenue that would be part of a total \$141.9 million budget for fiscal year 2014-15, which begins Oct. 1.

The budget also is funded through state, federal and other district sources (including timber sales, cattle leases, interest earnings and permit fees).

The millage rate adopted by the board is approximately 3.6

percent less than the current year's tax rate.

Under a 0.3164 millage rate – 31.64 cents for every \$1,000 of assessed property value – the owner of a \$200,000 house with a \$50,000 homestead exemption would pay \$47.46 in the coming year in property taxes to the district.

"The tentative budget will allow the district to continue the momentum on its strategic

priorities and to implement critical projects that will result in greater protection for our springs and improved water quality in surface waters," said Governing Board Chairman John Miklos of Orlando.



## What's new? Same old

The root word to "news" is "new," but the nagging issues attracting headlines within Nassau County are old in nature. With some renewed twists.

Issues surrounding budget woes and the Fernandina Beach marina and the golf course have been swirling since David Yulee, or at least it seems that way. And yet they re-emerge. Heck, even Yulee himself has come under unfriendly fire.

It's overly simplistic to say that the budget and the marina and the golf course are complicated issues. Maybe that's why they have been so difficult to resolve over the years - and have made for ideal fodder for discussion.

The budget complications extend from the county to the city. While Fernandina Beach is in better budgetary shape than the county, there are still issues there.

Fernandina Beach commissioners relied on a tax-rate increase last year to balance their budget. Meanwhile, they still assess anti-capitalistic impact fees on new businesses.

The county's budget outlook is worse. Proponents of higher property taxes contend there is as much as a \$12 million budget shortfall - that only new revenues can purportedly rectify. Others (like me) believe there are surplus funds in reserve to neatly fill the gap for this year.

The biggest mess and albatross of them all is the Fernandina Beach Municipal Golf Course. It's especially

disconcerting because the golf course was running smoothly three years ago under Scott Womble's able guidance - before former city officials interceded.

The notion of privatizing the golf course operations is realistic and even opportunistic. The way it played out left a lot to be desired.

The root of the problem is the contract signed by the city to hire Billy Casper Golf to manage the course. The contract does not contain a performance clause and even penalizes the city monetarily if it backs out early.

Therefore, the Casper group collects something like \$100,000 a year - regardless of the course's condition or financial status. Meanwhile, the city pays the salaries and retirement benefits for employees there.

And, granted, this is a small contract for Casper. That's probably why Casper originally sent an administrative clerk here to manage the course. The clerk lacked PGA certification and could not even provide golf lessons.

The only resolution for the golf course is to renegotiate with Casper or bring in another company on better terms.

Closing (or selling) one of the three nine-hole courses is another alternative, which would then require less maintenance, upkeep and staff.

The city marina was handled much the same. A private company, Westrec, was brought in to replace the former marina manager (who was a city employee). Westrec seems to be doing an admirable job, however.

The marina looks and operates much better than before. The Westrec dockworkers are courteous and professional. There's just this annoying silt problem to complicate matters.

While the mounds of silt are hardly Westrec's fault, they confound marina operations. Many local citizens support the ATM plan, an elaborate study that called for extending the existing bulkhead beyond the silt and then relocating some of the docks to the north.

This is the only plan that really makes sense. If nothing is done, the silt will again accumulate and incur substantial costs to the city for its removal.

Sorry to say at this late juncture, but only things that float (boats, docks, etc.) are appropriate for a marina. It's difficult to take issue with that.

As part of a continued commitment to patient safety, Baptist Health is partnering with Vestagen Technical Textiles of Orlando, a global innovator in the development of advanced textile technologies.

More than 30,000 pieces of staff uniforms, lab coats and scrub jackets for employees are being distributed in phase one and will feature Vestex textile technology, which has a durable fluid barrier, an antimicrobial and a special breathable material for wearer comfort. Baptist Health plans to roll out patient apparel featuring the same technology in September.

The fabric's fluid barrier binds to individual fibers, resulting in material that is highly repellent to bodily fluids, water, oil and dirt. This high repellency has been shown to synergize with Vestagen's embedded antimicrobial technology to prevent organisms from being acquired and retained on the fabric. Soft surfaces, like uniforms, are vectors for the spread of organisms in acute care settings.

"Patient safety is the bedrock of what we do," said Baptist Health President and CEO Hugh Greene in a press release. "There is nothing more important than the safety of our patients and these garments are part of an organization-wide emphasis on quality and safety to create the safest possible environment for our patients and staff."

More than 6,000 Baptist Health inpatient staff with frequent patient contact, including nursing, imaging, respiratory therapy and environmental services members, are converting to the new uniforms during the phase one distribution. Staff uniforms will also be color-coded by function so that patients can more easily recognize who is caring for them.

Baptist Health is focused on making health care safer for everyone – staff as well as patients and their families. The

more than \$1 million Baptist Health is investing in phase one for the uniforms and patient garments represent this commitment to safety and the brand promise of "Changing Health Care for Good."

Diane Raines, Baptist Health's senior vice president and chief nursing officer, said patients ages 1 year and older also will receive newly-designed apparel made from Vestex protected fabric that "provide them with dignity as well as protection. Baptist Health is not making the change because of a problem with infection, but to be proactive in our use of technology to enhance our environment. The technology is part of a broader safety strategy designed to reduce exposure to pathogens."

Hand washing, Raines said, remains the primary strategy as well as rigorous cleaning of rooms and other surfaces, appropriate use of personal protective equipment, appropriate preparation of patients for surgery, and other measures.

"We know that this technology is not the ultimate answer to achieving zero infections," Raines said. "However, as with many patient safety 'bundles,' the adoption of this technology combined with an enhanced emphasis on other infection prevention techniques will elevate our level of protection for patients and staff and enhance the safety of the health care environment."

The health care industry nationally is moving toward improvements in infection control. Baptist Health is a pioneer in the field well before guidance came out in February from the Society for Healthcare Epidemiology of America on recommendations to prevent transmission of health care-

associated infections from health care personnel attire. The report points to studies demonstrating that clothing of health care personnel, including the traditional white coat, may have a role in transmission of pathogens and that future studies are needed.

"We believe this is not just an investment in uniforms, but in an innovative technology that will make our environment safer," said John Wilbanks, Baptist Health chief operating officer. "This is a symbol of our commitment to our staff and their families, and our patients and their families."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports about one in 25 hospital patients has at least one health care-associated infection. The agency estimates that 2 million patients suffer from hospital-acquired infections every year and nearly 100,000 of them die. Hospital-acquired infections result in up to \$4.5 billion in additional health care expenses annually.

Vestagen executives said Baptist Health is "blazing the trail" and setting the standard for others in the health care industry. Some other institutions have used the staff uniforms on a smaller scale, but Baptist Health is the first to institute the Vestex uniforms systemwide for staff with direct patient contact.

Baptist Health is also the first to have Vestex patient apparel.

Research on the Vestex uniforms published in Infection Control and Hospital Epidemiology documented a greater than 99.99 percent reduction in the super-bug MRSA on the Vestex uniforms compared to the non-protective uniforms.

## City to defend 2 new lawsuits

The Fernandina Beach commission last week authorized City Attorney Tammi Bach to defend the city in two new litigation matters involving property within the city.

Gateway to Amelia Condominium Association, represented by Yulee attorney Mollie Garrett, has petitioned Nassau County Judicial Court to review a recent city ordinance that annexed 17.46 county acres into the city at South Eighth Street and Gateway Boulevard.

The petition for "writ of certiorari" claims the property owners at Gateway to Amelia "will suffer material injury" as a result of the annexation because of increased property taxes they will have to pay in the city, and because of "more stringent regulations for operating their business and development of their properties."

The petitioner also seeks to recover attorney costs already incurred by opposing the annexation.

The petitioner is asking the court to determine if it was afforded due process and whether the city's annexation "was based on competent and substantial evidence."

The annexed area includes the Gateway to Amelia retail/office center, a Florida Public Utilities substation, restaurants and a gas station.

The Somerset residential units, which were originally part of the annexation, were removed because its sewer system is not connected to the city and because the Somerset

annexation agreement was never recorded by the city, according to city staff.

The annexation was proposed because the properties are already hooked into the city sewer system and because the area has become contiguous to the city.

In another litigation matter, First National Bank South of Alma, Ga., is seeking mediation with the city regarding the city's denial of a wetlands variance for 14.8 acres at South 14th and Lime streets.

The variance was denied in May by the Board of Adjustment, which claimed the land is unique due to an unmaintained ditch that has "resulted in the conversion of uplands to wetlands."

According to the petition, the wetlands were created by a mosquito control ditch that was abandoned 20 years ago, and have accumulated enough water to "impact upland species and trees."

The petition also notes, "The wetlands on the subject property are low quality, with little benefit to wildlife ... due, in part, to the fact that ... they are relatively small ... and surrounded by other development including busy roadways."

Michael Mullin of Rogers Towers, attorney for the applicant, writes, "The denial of the variance by the BOA adversely impacts the applicant's ability to achieve the intended use of the subject property by unreasonably and unfairly burdening the property."

Bach said at the meeting July 1 that such mediation "usually ends in some type of develop-

ment agreement between the parties." She also noted the city would be getting an independent environmental report on the parcel before going to mediation.

Several residents spoke in support of the variance denial, including local zoologist and environmental advocate Pat Foster Turley, who writes the weekly Wild Ways column for the *News-Leader*.

"I just hope everybody knows this is going to set a trend if we give in to this," Turley said. She added that, because of the surrounding wetlands, there was a greater diversity of species on the island.

"I hope you are not willing to lay down," resident Julie Ferreira told commissioners. "I think this amounts to greed ... this is a bank coming to our community and trying to change our laws (and) trying to increase property values before they sell it to a developer."

"These are jurisdictional wetlands and not open for any debate," said resident Bailey Struss.

Bach also said at the meeting that a petition filed in June 2013 by The Palms of Amelia

Condominium Association was denied on June 27 by Circuit Court Judge Suzanne Bass.

The condo association had petitioned the court for a review of an annexation ordinance for an 8.5-acre parcel of county land off Nectarine Street that was annexed into the city in June 2013.

Residents of the complex, represented by local attorney Harrison Poole, opposed annexation with essentially the same arguments as the Gateway to Amelia petition, saying they did not sign an annexation agreement with the city, nor did they know the property was to be annexed when they bought their units.

The residents also said they did not want to be annexed into the city because property taxes and permit fees were higher than the county's.

"The Court finds that the decision of the City Commission of Fernandina Beach of June 4, 2013 was supported by competent substantial evidence, that the Plaintiff was accorded procedural due process ... and the essential requirements of law have been observed," Bass wrote.

## Also, freedom from religion

Every coin has two sides, and so does every story. Today, from reactions to my column published a couple of weeks ago, I will present the other side.

My side was that public school officials in Brawley, Calif., went too far in telling a high school salutatorian that he could not mention God in his graduation speech. They said references to his religion were "inappropriate."

I maintained – and still do – that the Free Exercise Clause of the First Amendment allows a student speaker, or a student writer of an assignment, to talk about his or her religion.

Here, then, is the other side from a reader in Florahome:

"Your recent column, 'Graduation speaker finally gets his say,' spoke volumes to me about how hard it is for an even mildly religious person to understand the hurt caused by being preached to or 'witnessed' by a person of a religious faith which is anathema to his own.

"For those in this country who happen to be religious, if you lump all Christians together, they are by far the majority. That shouldn't mean the rest of us are forced to endure distinctly Christian prayers and testimony at government, school or employment functions. Religion is emotional, spiritual stuff. But in a country with separation of church and state as a founding principle, there really should be a freedom from being forced to listen to other people's versions. ...

"Yes, I would agree, you are right about the freedom of speech aspects of including religious references in the graduation speech. But it seems you missed the point of the school district's rule. They might have been 'paranoid that the court will smite them.' It is more likely it was the desire to not cause discomfort to anyone. ..."

A reader in Spruce Pine, N.C., wrote this: "... What the law does mean is that teachers and principals, etc., can't force a student into religious expression. In Mitchell County, I would say we have the opposite problem. I would be willing to bet you can find teachers leading morning prayer and students getting shamed or feeling left out if they don't pray."

The reader in Spruce Pine is right. The U.S. Supreme Court did outlaw state-sanctioned prayer in public schools. But there's a big difference in a public school teacher – a state employee – voicing a prayer in class and an individual student saying in a speech how much his faith means to him.

Decades ago, we students read the Bible and said a prayer before high school classes began. Our daughters could not do that. But my wife and I did not depend on our kids' public schools to promote faith. That job belonged to us parents and to the church.

I'd like to think, however, that if one of our daughters had wanted to talk about her faith in a speech at school, she would have been allowed to do so. And without interference from overreaching speech police with black Magic Markers.

## Keep the golf course

Unfortunately, I voted for Fernandina Beach Commissioner Johnny Miller, who suggests that we don't need the city-owned golf course. Now we have the *News-Leader* editor in agreement. I love it when people voice opinions on something they don't participate in. "Can you say bias?"

I work in the golf shop at the city course. It is my retirement job. I also live in the city and my taxes help support the marina and city park, neither of which I use. But I gladly support them because they have value. They help make Amelia Island a great place to visit and a wonderful place to live. I feel the same way about the golf course. It is one of the reasons my wife and I chose Amelia Island as our retirement home. We thought having a 27-hole public golf course nearby was fantastic. It is true that the golf course loses money, due to old debt (clubhouse and irrigation system). Without it the golf course would break even. It's also true that the golf course made significant profits for a number of years, which went directly to the city, and was subsequently spent, not reinvested in the golf course. As a result the golf course deteriorated to the point where it was no longer competitive.

Despite many challenges, bumps in the road and a limited budget, the golf course has significantly improved under Billy Casper management, compared to its condition just prior. It is now very playable and can compete once again in the marketplace. Bad press in this paper kept some people away, and those that have tried us anyway are pleasantly surprised. The Fernandina Beach High School golf teams practice and play some of their matches at the city course. Junior camps are also hosted during the summer months. We are a perfect course for families, providing an affordable and playable golf course. The course has 340 members and hosts numerous winter visitors, some of which have been golfing at the city course for 25 years. Groups of winter visitors, some as large as 40, play the course nearly every day for the three or four months they are here. They not only spend money at the golf course, they rent condos, eat out at our restaurants and support many of our local businesses. Would they visit the island without the city golf course? Perhaps. But without competition, the rates at the other public golf course would most likely increase, potentially forcing some winter visitors to look elsewhere for a winter vacation spot.

Sending vacationers to other cities for golf doesn't seem to support our goal of increasing profits for our local businesses. When tourists come in after a round of golf and ask for recommendations for where to eat and shop, I send them to one of our many wonderful local businesses. I don't believe that one of the off-island courses would send them back here – do you? This could potentially cost our businesses a lot of revenue. The other golf courses on the island are associated with the Omni or are semi-private, private and expensive. We frequently have guests staying at The Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island or Omni Amelia Island Plantation Resort playing golf at the city course. The other two courses in Yulee are either too difficult, expensive or both.

Although the golf course loses money, I believe it can be profitable again. The South course nine holes is receiving new greens, and will reopen Aug 1. The plan is to redo the West and North course greens next. This will substantially make the golf course more competitive, and I think some of the golfers who

left due to poor conditions will return. And the improvements will increase our ability to draw new golfers who were not willing to try us before. Keep the city golf course. It is an underappreciated gem!

The golf course attracts a sizable number of people to the island that contribute in a myriad of ways to the local economy. A major influence in prompting me to return here year after year was the fact that there was a municipal golf course whose rates were reasonable and allowed unrestricted walking, still the only course within a reasonable distance that offers this combination of features. Since moving here I have met many others who have also chosen to vacation or reside here because they value these same qualities that are offered by the city course. Selling or leasing the course to a private entity would almost guarantee the loss of pricing and walking guidelines that the municipal course is able to offer. As an aside I would commend the Billy Casper group for the improved course conditions they have made while working with tight budgetary constraints.

I would conclude by stating that the "subsidy" some city commissioners feel is being paid to keep the golf course does in reality come back as a financial advantage to the community businesses and individuals where the golfers that have been mentioned spend their money.

For once the tides were right for a dawn walk, with the sun rising just about the time the tide was nearing its lowest state. Fourth of July, dawn, was still a bit early for all the beachgoers. By 9 a.m. on the Fourth I heard that Peters Point and Scott Road beach accesses were already filled to capacity. But at 6 a.m., the hordes were not yet awake. Good luck for me.

And as far as location goes, I had that one all figured out too. My husband Bucko was working the early shift at the Fort Clinch State Park gate, so I decided to visit the park too, the long way around. Before dawn I drove to the north end of the island and was the only car there in the city's North End beach access. Great! A perfect start to a perfect Fourth!

I was alone on the beach. I walked north towards the Fort Clinch Fishing Pier and beyond as the light started filtering above the horizon. Along the way I saw tracks of a sea turtle that had come to lay eggs. I watched a laughing gull tear into a fresh fish, an osprey perching on a signal buoy and sandpipers scuttling along the sand, all the regular cast of characters. But wait, what is that light-colored duck with a thin orange beak standing near the surf? I took photos and later learned that it was a red-breasted merganser, normally here in the winter but what was it doing here now? Another snowbird that didn't fly home. It's happening more and more these days, in the avian and human community alike.

When I passed the fishing pier I was on my favorite stretch of beach and today I was not disappointed. Across the water I could see Cumberland Island, Ga., and heading out the channel was a bright orange Navy vessel, which I guessed was going out to meet a submarine. Later from the front gate Bucko confirmed this, having admitted a group of Navy families heading to the fort early to wave their husbands home again.

I didn't stick around for the submarine - I've seen their magnificence many times before. No, it was the nature that drew my attention. And this morning, the nature was mostly deer. All along the open areas bordering the beach I saw deer. Mostly they were unperturbed by my quiet arrival, briefly looking up from their grazing then settling back in

to finish their breakfast. During my three hour, 8-mile hike that morning I counted nine different deer in different sections of the park. Too many deer, in fact, is getting to be a problem for the habitat at Fort Clinch.

In recent years the number of bobcat sightings has declined dramatically, for unknown reasons, but maybe due to an infectious disease. And with few predators, too many fawns produced here are growing up, and having their own offspring. At some point, if not already, the carrying capacity of the park for deer will be exceeded, the vegetation will be overgrazed, the ecosystem will be unbalanced and other native species will decline in numbers. Here's hoping more bobcats migrate here from neighboring areas to repopulate the park before the situation becomes critical.

I continued my walk past the fort, and around to the River Campground, and then back through the main road of the park and onto the road to the beach parking area. Along the way I peered down gopher tortoise burrows and kept my eyes open for snakes crossing the road. On previous trips along this road I've seen a diamondback rattlesnake (alive and moving) and a coachwhip snake (sadly hit by a car and dying). I'm always hopeful for more snake sightings, but alas, today, nothing.

By the time I hit the beach again I was getting hot and tired. By now it was nearly 9 a.m., and sure enough the beach was coming to life. Here and there fishermen were parked beside their buckets and poles, walkers were coming my way, and families were beginning to set up their canopies for the day. The north end beach parking access was filling up.

The crowds over the weekend filled up our beaches, roads and businesses and that's great for our economy. And what's great for me is finding a way to avoid these crowds like I did on the morning of the Fourth. A perfect Fourth of July for one and all!

## State reaccredits county jail

The Nassau County Jail & Detention Facility was re-accredited June 24 by the Florida Corrections Accreditation Commission at its semi-annual conference in Bonita Springs.

Sheriff Bill Leeper accepted the FCAC Accreditation Certification on behalf of each member of the detention facility. "Maintaining accreditation status ensures the Nassau County Sheriff's Office meets the highest professional standards set by the Florida Corrections Accreditation Commission," said Leeper in a press release. "As sheriff of Nassau County I will continue to work tirelessly to meet, and exceed, the high standards set by FCAC."

In May 2014 assessment teams from FCAC conducted independent, intensive and thorough inspections of the detention facility. To earn reac-

creditation an agency must comply with all applicable FCAC mandatory standards. Independent assessors were provided with complete access to review written documentation, conduct personnel and inmate interviews, observe agency operations and conduct facility inspections to ensure the Sheriff's Office compliance of accreditation standards. The assessment team found the Nassau County Sheriff's Office in compliance with mandatory FCAC accreditation standards and recommended reaccredited status to their respective Commission.

"Those who are placed in jail usually are facing many challenges in their personal lives. We are committed to providing a clean, safe and well-operated facility for those in our care, custody and control," Leeper said.

## Fingerprint your children

Nearly 800,000 children are reported missing each year in the United States. According to the U.S. Department of Justice's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, about one-third of those children have been kidnapped and about one-fifth were taken by non-family members. If an average of 2,185 children are reported missing each day, what can we do to protect our kids?

"We live in a high-tech soci-

ety that is moving faster every day," Nassau County Sheriff Bill Leeper said. "We all have smartphones and computers to stay connected with our kids, but we need to continue fingerprinting our children to protect them in the event they go missing."

If a child is missing, authorities can use a child's fingerprints to scan into the National Crime Information Center database. These fingerprints can immediately be used to help

locate a child in a variety of ways.

Fingerprints are composed of a unique combination of ridges that make patterns of loops, arches, ridges, forks, dots, spurs and other distinguishing marks.

Fingerprinting is the only infallible means of identifying individuals, and in 80 years of fingerprint classification, no two identical sets have been found.

Unique fingerprints are

formed seven months after conception. Although the size of each finger continues to grow from birth to adulthood, the relative position of ridges remains the same. An average fingerprint yields 175 to 180 points of information which makes it a really important source of information in the event of a missing child scenario.

## Don't fall for this construction scam

TALLAHASSEE – A combination of warmer weather and hurricane season can bring out the door-to-door solicitors in Florida neighborhoods.

One red flag is the company that claims to have "extra" materials left over from another job nearby and can do the work right away at minimal cost. Don't fall for it, said Dan Hendrickson, a communica-

tions coordinator for the Better Business Bureau, adding that professional contractors estimate the materials they'll need for a project with great accuracy.

"If a company comes to your door and says, 'Hey, we've got a bunch of leftover asphalt,' chances are it's a company that's kind of flying by the seat of their pants, or maybe really doesn't know what they're doing," Hendrickson said. "In many cases like this, we hear from customers who agree to work with them and then come back and say, 'Well, the work is horrible. They charged me way more than they said they would – and now, I don't know how to find them.'"

When dealing with a door-to-door solicitor, Hendrickson said, people always should ask for identification and references, verify the company and that the individual works for it, and inquire about his or her licensing.

Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi has just released a Hurricane Preparedness Guide to help people avoid storm-

related scams.

Hendrickson cautioned people to be wary of high-pressure sales tactics, particularly in the wake of a storm that brings out bogus roofers and tree-removal companies, explaining that any paperwork that's signed could be construed as a contract.

"Even if they just say, 'Well, this will just kind of get us started to check out your roof,'" he said. "In some cases, we've had complaints where people say, 'Well, now suddenly they're (the contractor) saying it's a contract' – and in some cases, it actually is a contract. So, at that point, then people have a headache on their hands to try and straighten out."

He also reminded people that it is, after all, their house – so if they don't like where the sales pitch is going, they always can take a step back and close the door.

# Don't leave kids in a hot car!

Even great parents can forget a child in the back seat, but caregivers who are unaccustomed to transporting children are especially prone to forgetting.

Think about the last time your routine was interrupted. Maybe you forgot something, or were afraid you might forget something. Or maybe you decided to leave your child alone in the car, thinking "I'll just run into the store for a minute." In either case, it's important to know the risks and consequences associated with leaving kids in cars - especially hot cars.

"Shopping with children can be challenging. The process of buckling and unbuckling a child repeatedly to take him/her in and out of the car for errands may become unpleasant for both of you," said Sheriff Bill Leeper in a press release. "As tempting as it is to leave your child behind in the car, leaving a youngster unattended in a vehicle might lead to serious consequences."

Risks:

- In 10 minutes, a car can heat up 20 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Cracking a window does little to keep the car cool.
- With temperatures in the 60s, your car can heat up to

well above 110 degrees.

- A child's body temperature can rise up to five times faster than an adult's.

- Heatstroke can happen when the temperature is as low as 57 degrees outside!

- A child can die when his/her temperature reaches 107.

Consequences

- The heat-related death of a child.

- Misdemeanor with fines as high as \$500 - and even imprisonment - in some states.

- Felony, depending on the state, if bodily harm results from leaving kids alone in a hot car.

According to Florida State Statute 316.6135, parents, legal guardians or caregivers of children younger than 6 may not leave them unattended or unsupervised in any kind of motor

vehicle for longer than 15 minutes. If the vehicle is running, or if the child is in any danger, no amount of unattended time is acceptable.

Officers are instructed to remove the unattended child immediately. Individuals could face fines up to \$500 or jail time.

Any Florida law enforcement officer who sees a child alone or unsupervised in a motor vehicle is instructed to do whatever is necessary to remove the child from the vehicle. After removing the child, the officer places paperwork notification of the child's whereabouts inside the car. If the officer is immediately unable to find the parents, legal guardian or caregiver, the child will be placed with the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services.

Prevention tips:

- Never leave a child alone in a car.

- Don't let your kids play in an unattended vehicle. Teach them that a vehicle is not a play area.

- Never leave infants or children in a parked vehicle, even if the windows are partially open.

- Keep a large teddy bear or other stuffed animal in the car seat when it's empty. Move the teddy bear to the front seat when you place the child in the seat as a visual reminder.

- If you are dropping your children off at childcare, but normally your spouse or partner drops them off, have your spouse or partner call you to make sure they were not left in the car.

- Become vigilant about looking in the vehicle before locking the door. Always look front and back before walking away - always!

"Leaving a child alone in a vehicle - even for just a minute - is a bad idea," Leeper said. "Left unattended, a child in a vehicle is vulnerable to abduction and dehydration. Please don't take the chance."

## New law on child car seats

TAMPA - Gov. Rick Scott signed legislation that requires children to be properly restrained in passenger vehicles through age five, ensuring that Florida no longer has the weakest child passenger safety law in the country. Previously, Florida law required that only children through three years old be secured in a separate car seat. Children ages four and older were required to be restrained but could use the vehicle's safety belts which are designed for adults.

"Adult passenger safety belts do not fit properly on young children and can cause them injury in a crash," said Kevin Bakewell, senior vice president and chief public affairs Officer for AAA - The Auto Club Group. "AAA is pleased the legislature and the governor took action to protect children by requiring they be properly restrained in an appropriate safety seat."

Motor vehicle injuries are the leading cause of death among children in the U.S., but many of these deaths can be prevented by placing children in age- and size-appropriate car seats.

"While this law does not cover all children who need to be safely restrained, it is a step in the right direction," said Bakewell. "On matters of public safety, Florida's parents look to state law for solid guidance. That's why this law is so important."

AAA, the American Academy of Pediatrics and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration recommend that children who have outgrown their five-point harness car seat by weight or height use a booster seat until they reach the height of 4-feet, nine inches (typically between the ages of 8-12).

A booster seat simply "boosts" a child up and allows for proper placement of the lap and shoulder belt, which is crucial for safety during a crash. Without a booster seat, safety belts improperly cross over a child's soft stomach and neck, which can lead to serious debilitating injuries in the event of a crash. Use of booster seats can reduce injuries by 45 percent compared to using an adult safety belt alone.

## Clerk's division exceeds standards

The Nassau County Clerk's Criminal Division participated in the 2014 Biennial Computerized Criminal History Audit. The audit was conducted by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) in May, and the results exceeded performance standards. The records submitted by the Nassau County Clerk of Courts were 100 percent accurate.

The audit consists of obtaining arrest affidavits and arrest fingerprint cards from the agency for the arrest events identified in the audit sample. In addition, copies of the respective final court dispositions were received from Florida's Clerks of the Courts. These documents were compared to

the corresponding criminal records in CCH to determine the number and percentage of errors and discrepancies.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement recognized the Clerk John Crawford for the prompt attention and quick

turnaround in returning the requested source documents needed to complete the audit. The FDLE also encouraged the clerk to continue his commitment to provide accurate and complete criminal history records in Florida.

Second base seems to be his niche. He hit .323 this spring for the Hornets with a







## Red snapper season opening Friday

Recreational fishermen will be able to harvest red snapper beginning Friday. The red snapper mini-season will be open for eight days, consisting of weekend openings.

The first two open weekends will be this Friday through Sunday and July 18-20. The last open weekend will be July 25-26. The bag limit in federal waters will be one fish per person per day and there is no minimum size limit.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission are asking anglers to help collect vital information about the Atlantic red snapper fishery.

Researchers at the FWC's Fish and Wildlife Research Institute will be out along Florida's east coast during each day of the season, asking recreational fishers about their red snapper trips and their catch.

This special survey is needed to gather more precise information on the numbers of red snapper caught by recreational anglers. Researchers will also collect biological samples of harvested fish to help determine the age of each red snapper.

Fishermen will first clean their red snapper catches and then donate the carcasses to the FWC officer for research. The tiny ear bone of the red snapper gives vital information to researchers, including the health and age of the fish.

Last year researchers collected 1,701 samples from red snapper harvested during the three-day recreational season.

"Information shared by recreational fishers during this cooperative research effort is an important opportunity for fisheries scientists to obtain valuable data that can be used to assess the health of the stock and sustainability of the fishery," explained FWRI researcher Beverly Sauls. "Data provided by recreational anglers during the 2013 season helped to make the 2014 season possible; these data are integral to understanding the Atlantic red snapper fishery."


While the federal opening will have no minimum size limit and a bag limit of one fish per person per day, in Florida state waters (from shore to three nautical miles), there is a 20-inch total length minimum size limit and a bag limit of two fish per person per day. Vessels with red snapper smaller than the state's minimum size limit must travel through state waters without stopping and have fishing gear stowed.

When anglers catch a tagged red snapper, FWC researchers ask that they

report it to the Angler Tag Return Hotline (800-367-4461). When calling, anglers should indicate species, tag number, date and time of capture, catch location, fish length, type of bait used and whether the fish was kept or released. If it is released, the

angler is asked to leave the tag in place to help with future data collection.

During last year's mini-red snapper season, there were several area sport fishing boats participating in the open red snapper weekends. Some of the best red snapper

fishing was coming from FB, FC, HH and the Amberjack Hole.

Bottom fishermen this year have been reporting excellent fishing for red snapper that seem to get in their way when targeting other species of bottom fish.

The harvesting of red snapper has been close for some four fishing seasons now by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The next major kingfish tournament will be this weekend with the Ancient City

Game Fish Challenge. The popular Southern Kingfish Association-sanctioned kingfish tournament will be held from St. Augustine's Camanche Cove Yacht Harbor.

Weibring are the only golfers to win this event three times in its history. Stricker won it three consecutive years, from 2009 to 2011. In 2005 and 2006, the tournament gave a sponsor's exemption to teenager Michelle Wie. She missed the cut in both events.

### Last Week: Angel Cabrera wins Greenbrier Classic

Argentina's Angel Cabrera won the Greenbrier Classic by two strokes on Sunday. The two-time major champion tapped in at 18 for his second-straight six-under 64 to finish at 16-under 264. George McNeill finished in second after closing with a final round 61 that included a hole-in-one at the eighth. Webb Simpson shot a seven-under 63 and he ended alone in third at 10-under 270. This was Cabrera's first non-major victory in the US. His two previous wins in the US were both in major championships, the 2009 Masters and 2007 US Open.

### Lessons from the Golf Pro

A problem a lot of us amateurs have on our pitch shots and bunker shots is the tendency to fall backwards once we have made the swing. Our perception on these shots is that we have to scoop the ball out, resulting in an improper weight shift to the back foot. However, there is a trick that you should try the next time you are on the practice range to eliminate this problem. On the practice tee, as you set up, stand your back foot up on the toe before you swing. What this is doing is forcing all the weight fully on the front foot. Now, leaving the back foot straight up, practice your pitch and sand shots to get the feel of having the weight completely forward. After a few tries, you will naturally get the proper weight placement when you go back to your regular stance.

# Caring for big cats

Recently, the Fernandina Beach Rotary Club enjoyed a presentation by Curt LoGuidice, director and curator of The Catty Shack Ranch Wildlife Sanctuary in Jacksonville.

LoGuidice began working with exotic animals in the 1980s and founded Catty Shack Ranch to provide a safe and healthy environment for big cats and other exotics. The facility is fully licensed by both state and federal governments and run solely by volunteers, including an all-volunteer medical team.

Many of the animals were confiscated from facilities unable to care for them or were acquired from owners who could no longer handle their "house pets." Once rehomed at Catty Shack Ranch, the animals are never sold or traded and will live out their lives at the sanctuary.

The facility is now home to nearly 50 animals, primarily big cats including tigers, lions, cougars, leopards and bobcats as well as coati mundi (members of the raccoon family) and foxes. The animals eat more than 600 pounds of meat each day. Funding comes from private donations, the sale of merchandise at the Catty

Shack Ranch thrift shop and the price of tours.

Though the sanctuary is only open to the public a few times a month, more than 50,000 people visited in 2013 and it has been named the number one attraction in Jacksonville by TripAdvisor. LoGuidice closed by saying that while Catty Shack was his dream, it had taken a group




