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Give us an 'A' school

School grades were released by the state Department of Education on Friday and according to its data, all of Nassau County's middle and elementary schools earned an A except Callahan Middle, which scored a B.


Yulee Middle showed the most improvement, moving from a C in 2013 to an A this year.

The school grades are preliminary, pending completion of the annual appeals period. Results for the state's high schools and combination schools, such as Hilliard Middle Senior High, will be released later this year.

Overall, 962 elementary and middle schools statewide earned the top grade, an increase of 195 over last year.

However, the number of schools earning an F also increased, to 174 from 96 in 2013. According to the preliminary data, the North Florida counties of Hamilton, Madison and Jefferson are all F districts.

In neighboring counties, Duval received a grade of C, St. Johns an A,

Baker a C and Clay a B.

Education Commissioner Pam Stewart focused on the increased number of A schools this year in a press release, calling it "great news" and stating, "I appreciate the work by the educators and families and students and know they will continue to improve in the future even as we transition to a new grading system."

The new system that goes into effect for 2014-15 will support the Florida Standards and the Florida Standards Assessment, which will replace the FCAT. The new formula is meant to be more simple and trans-

parent, according to the department.

"Its focus on student achievement and gains will help ensure a fair accountability system that helps measure student knowledge of the new Florida Standards," said Stewart.

Grades currently are calculated using an 800-point scale for elementary and 900-point scale for middle schools, with points awarded for students that make learning gains and those that score satisfactory or higher on assessment tests, including the Florida Comprehensive Assessment

County fees favor daycare, builders, churches, doctors

Nassau County needs more daycare for kids.

To encourage development, builders won't have to pay a transportation impact fee.

The community could also use more medical offices. Developers bringing in doctors and dentists will receive a 25 percent discount on the fee.

This is part of a plan to create "a fully functioning society."

So says a proposed ordinance on mobility fees.

Here's what the proposal says about day care operations:

"It is desirable and necessary to have an abundant supply of child care facilities so that parents with young children are able to fully participate in the labor market if they so choose."

These are among the decisions and comments made by a special task force assigned to draft a county mobility fee ordinance and create a fee schedule.

They've been at it for almost three years and finally wrapped up their work last week after dozens of meetings, several studies and huddles with attorneys.

The next step is to send the pro-

posed mobility fee ordinance to the county commission for a vote, and that might happen later this month, or by August, according to the county attorney.

What took so long?

It's hard to say. But the task force included government officials, local real estate professionals and a Jacksonville real estate developer and it can be hard to corral a committee.

The last hurdle, however, involved churches and religious schools. And the question was whether to hit them with a mobility impact fee. The task force once had a \$62 per seat fee for new churches but religious leaders pushed back.

The final recommendation calls for dropping the fee for churches and religious schools. But the panel called for a special traffic study first. While officials want to encourage development, they also want their decisions to hold up in court, said County Attorney David Hallman.

"When someone is trying to build, we want to give them all kinds of breaks to come here," said Hallman. "I don't want to be in a courtroom (defending this)."

To that, task force member Bob

County permits doggie dining

The county commission meeting started at 6 p.m. as usual Monday and ended in less than 20 minutes. But no one left the chambers because public hearings start at 7 p.m. and the doggie dining ordinance was up for discussion for its second hearing and final vote.

That was approved in a 3-0 vote. So, dogs will be allowed to accompany their owners to restaurants with al fresco dining just as soon as a business owner comes forward and applies for a permit.

The permits are free, but there are rules for restaurants to follow, including guidelines on signage and sanitation.

Commissioner Danny Leeper and Commissioner Walter "Jr." Boatright were both on scheduled vacations and did not attend the meeting. They are expected to attend a scheduled meeting at 9 a.m. today.

The 42-minute wait between the meeting and the public hearing prompted Commission Chair Barry Holloway to call for discussion about moving the start time for public hearings to 6 p.m. He said it would make "work flow a little quicker."

County Attorney David Hallman said holding public hearings earlier might better serve the public. When Commissioner Steve Kelley asked if there were any state statutes on time requirements, Hallman told him 5 p.m. is the earliest legal minimum for

4 candidates for city commission seat so far

Former city commissioner Tim Poynter has filed to seek election again this fall. He has challenged incumbent Commissioner Charlie Corbett, who has filed for reelection.

Commissioner Sarah Pelican also has filed for reelection. She is challenged by Robin Lentz, a guidance counselor at Fernandina Beach Middle School who has not sought

public office locally before.

Other candidates may still file for the city election Nov. 4.

Corbett and Pelican were first elected three years ago. There are five city commissioners, each elected to a three-year term, with no more than two on the ballot in any given year.

Poynter was elected in 2009, but lost his reelection bid in 2012 follow-

ing the unpopular Forward Fernandina initiative. Current Mayor Ed Boner defeated Poynter by a 57-43 percent margin in 2012.

Corbett won election in 2011 by defeating former mayor Susan Steger; Pelican defeated former vice mayor Eric Childers. Both incumbents were victims of the Forward Fernandina controversy.

Qualifying for the city election

ends at 5 p.m. Aug. 8.

Candidates must be a qualified, registered voter in the city of Fernandina Beach, pay an election assessment fee and either obtain valid petition signatures or pay an additional filing fee of \$360.



 Test, End-of-Course Assessments and the Florida Alternate Assessment for students for whom the FCAT 2.0 is not an appropriate measurement.
 Middle school grades include an additional component measuring students' participation and performance on high-level EOC assessments and industry certifications, according to the Department of Education.
 High school grades also consider graduation rates, acceleration and college readiness, which are calculated at the end of the calendar year and presented in a separate

report.
 A school can earn "bonus points" in each area if performance improved. Conversely, schools can lose points if performance declined.
 "A" grades earn districts more than bragging rights – under the Florida School Recognition Program, schools that receive an A, or improve at least one grade from the previous year, are eligible to earn an additional \$100 per student.

 Hallman suggested 6 o'clock or "as soon after."
 "I think that's a good idea," said Kelley.
 Holloway asked the attorney to investigate the issue further and bring back recommendations at the July 28 meeting. Holloway said he wanted input from Leeper and Boatright. Also at the meeting:
 • The board approved Hallman's request to file a lawsuit against the state to collect \$147,000 the county has overpaid for juvenile justice fees. He said the deadline to file suit is Friday and that he would work with Florida Association of Counties (FAC) on the case.
 • The assistant fire chief for the Yulee volunteer department, Danny Lightsey, told the board during public comment that it has received certification from the State Fire Marshal's Office, as requested by the board, and that there are 19 volunteers and equipment ready to "step up and help the community."
 Holloway said, "I'm glad you're back on board. Thank you." He asked Lightsey to schedule a meeting with County Manager Ted Selby and Fire Rescue Chief Matt Graves. At the meeting, Lightsey sat next to Curtis Bollinger, president of Professional Firefighters Local Union 3101.
 • The board approved the continued special collection of fees for beach protection. The South Amelia Island Shore Stabilization Project (SAISSA) will collect more than \$12 million through the Municipal

Service Benefit Unit (MSBU). The tax is imposed on property owners on the south end of Amelia Island and will be collected on the ad valorem tax bill mailed in November. A public hearing on the matter will be held on Aug. 25 at 7 p.m.
 • The board authorized Elton Alan, Inc. to replace guardrails at eight locations around the county for \$66,540.
 • The board approved the final release of a lien for Florida Infrastructure Inc. now that the CR 121 culvert extension project is complete.
 • The board accepted maintenance responsibility for the roadways and associated infrastructure of Timber Creek Plantation Phase III in Yulee from developer BWC Land, LLC.
 • The board approved a finance package, including the receipt of \$29,460 from the city of Fernandina Beach for supplies and equipment from the Supervisor of Elections. The county also received a grant for \$46,237 for 911 operations and maintenance from the rural county grant spring program.

 Spaeth said, "It's a delicate line."
 "Yes," said task force chair and County Commissioner Danny Leeper.
 Task force member Mike Stokes raised another angle.
 "We have other mechanisms for that," said Stokes.
 "Yes," said Leeper, referring to the county's economic development grant. The issue has come up before.
 The county offers a tax incentive program, started about two years ago. Under the program, companies can get a tax refund if they make a capital investment or create new jobs.
 The definition of "new" jobs is loose, because it can include, say, transferring a worker from an office in New Jersey to Nassau County.
 This thread of conversation between Spaeth, Leeper and Stokes was short and stopped with that brief exchange.
 The task force heard from local engineer Nick Gillette of Gillette & Associates in Fernandina Beach. He was hired to study traffic. The county paid more than \$175,000 for his work.
 He also was asked this spring to take a deeper look at traffic and churches.
 Gillette's church land use and trip generation study dated June 19 determined that churches don't generate enough traffic.
 "It's too small to track," said Gillette.
 He put the number at 0.39 daily trips per seat at a local church.
 Gillette said he considered traffic for three churches in Yulee, including Journey Church (600 seats), Celebration Baptist Church (339 seats) and Yulee United Methodist Church (156 seats).
 The elimination of church fees answered the prayers of two people who attended the meeting.
 "Thank you," said Fred Atwell, who represents the

Roman Catholic Diocese of St. Augustine.
 But there are limits.
 Once churches have more than 1,275 seats they will face impact fees, according to the draft ordinance.
 Not happy with the proposed ordinance is residential real estate developer Sandy Semanik. His company, SEDA Construction based in Jacksonville, builds thousands of houses. SEDA developed the Flora Parke subdivision in Yulee and has properties in development on US 17.
 "Why are you exempting anyone?" said Semanik. "I'm a Christian. But it seems a little arbitrary."
 Semanik lost a lawsuit earlier this year with the Nassau County School Board over school impact fees.
 Impact fees have been used by counties and municipalities around the country for decades. And, they continue to face legal challenges.
 It is easy to understand why. Impact fees are expensive.
 Under the proposed county mobility fee ordinance, SEDA Construction would pay \$1,150 to build a single-family house in Yulee. And, if it builds that house west of I-95, the fee would be \$1,168.
 For now, the county has a moratorium on mobility fees until September.
 The task force included a variety of people in real estate investment, development, buying and selling, including Phil Griffin and Pat Keogh and builder Tom Ford, who also chairs the Planning & Zoning Board.
 The group also included an executive from Sleiman Enterprises, a commercial real estate developer based in Jacksonville. The company has built some of the largest shopping centers in the county, including The Villages in Yulee, which is anchored by the Publix supermarket.
 The company is subject to impact fees and was invited by county officials to sit on the task force and vote on how much to charge.

 The prescription discount cards can be used by all county residents regardless of age, income or existing health coverage, and it's accepted at 14 pharmacies in the county.
 There is no enrollment form to receive the card, no membership fee and no restrictions or limits on the frequency of use. Cardholders and their family members may use the card at any time their prescriptions are not covered by insurance.
 Simply present the card to the participating pharmacy to receive your discount. The card can also be used on some pet medications.
 Cards are available for pickup at various locations throughout the county including the Nassau County Courthouse in Fernandina Beach, the Robert M. Foster Justice Center in Yulee, the Nassau County Manager's Office in Yulee and

'Is doing nothing a solution?'

During Harry Truman's first term as president circa 1947, he nicknamed the Congress, which was controlled by Republicans, the "Do Nothing Congress." This insult worked and not only did it help Truman win re-election in 1948, it also helped the Democrats win both houses of Congress. Labeling someone or some group as "Do Nothing" is never a compliment. President Obama has used the same phrase recently in hopes of getting similar results.

In my experience the reasons people "do nothing" and don't reach agreements are: 1) they are afraid to make a mistake and 2) they don't trust the party they are dealing with to either come to a fair agreement or abide by the agreement once reached. In the first case you are usually dealing with someone ineffective as with me handling chores around the house. However in the second case, the people may be talented and effective in regard to other situations.

For example, some members of the "Do Nothing Congress" were considered quite effective. Henry Cabot Lodge, Robert Taft and William Fulbright all are quite famous for other accomplishments. Israeli Prime Minister Bibi Netanyahu was ranked by *Forbes* magazine in 2013 as the third most powerful leader in the world and many people admire what Israel has

accomplished. However, Martin Indyk, who was John Kerry's special envoy in trying to get an agreement in the Middle East, just resigned because he couldn't get anything done. The

reason, Indyk said, is "the parties don't trust each other" and Netanyahu was one of Indyk's problems.

This same scenario is also true today with President Obama and the Republicans regarding immigration. As we all know, to get a fair agreement, the negotiating parties must compromise. However, if you don't trust the party to compromise or abide by the agreement, why risk the political capital to get a deal? In addition, there is a belief (re immigration) that you may be worse off once the agreement is consummated. So the question is, how do you get people who lack trust to reach an agreement? A recent conversation with a friend made me rethink some answers.

This friend had just finished the book *Wooden*. He was so impressed with the book and the fact that John Wooden's UCLA teams won

10 NCAA basketball championships in 12 years, he began doing further research. He found a speech delivered by Wooden entitled "The Difference Between Winning and Succeeding." In this speech Wooden quotes the great philosopher Cervantes. "The journey is better than the end." In Wooden's world he believed if the journey is done correctly, most likely it will have a good ending. He further states, "I liked our practices to be the journey and the game would be the end."

Some leaders might take this statement to heart. In business, companies don't get great earnings by accident, but by doing all the right things along the way. This is also true in sports. Successful companies and sports teams don't avoid issues by waiting for a confrontation or a disaster to first take action. In dealing with adversaries, whether they were unions or competitors, or even in dealing with our own people, how we approached and dealt with them during the "journey" usually heavily influenced the "end" result. I remember during a unionization drive at our Pennsauken margarine plant, one of our more influential employees came to me with a legitimate complaint. "The only time we see corporate management is when you have a problem or want something." I promised him that would not remain a fact and

worked hard to keep that promise.

Unfortunately, this is especially true in politics. Many leaders feel they don't have time for the journey and refuse to address issues like immigration until they have real problems or even disasters arise. Once this happens, the leaders want everyone to work together to find a solution. However, as the worker in Pennsauken implied, at this point there is little trust for a compromise. They believe the leader who skipped the journey just wants to get rid of the problem and doesn't care who is hurt. Doing nothing, they feel, is the safe way out.

The problem is, you can do nothing for a while in the hope that the situation and maybe the players will change. However, hoping doesn't create solutions, and at some point the problems become worse and there may no longer be good solutions.

Success is brewing here

Innovation is brewing in North Florida.

But it's not a typical high-tech creation or some new health care procedure. Instead, this takes on the unconventional forms of lagers and pilsners and IPAs.

More importantly, this innovation is following a tried pathway to success, demonstrated time and time again in other locations. With similar levels of prosperity.

This innovation is packaged inside microbreweries. And these funky brewpubs are forming in our area as quickly as a foamy head on a freshly poured beer.

Already in Jacksonville, some eight microbreweries have opened (local restaurants like Seven Bridges and Ragtime also brew their own beers). They are popular and successful. And others are expected.

Even in historic Fernandina Beach, several entrepreneurs are planning to open a microbrewery on Centre Street in the heart of downtown. The microbrewery will inhabit the old O'Kane's Irish Bar location.

The owners of two tremendously successful operations – Espana and Salty Pelican – will team up to launch the new brewery. They have involved the community in the heralded launch by asking residents to suggest creative names.

Also in Fernandina Beach, a distillery is targeted to open on the outside of downtown. Reportedly, the distillery will eventually produce several local label liquors.

The microbrewery concept has exploded across the U.S. And the towns that have welcomed the onslaught are reporting remarkable suc-

cesses. The entire state of North Carolina has embraced the cutting-edge trend. The innovative Tar Heel state is the "hottest emerging state for craft beer

right now," according to a company that tracks these things. The numbers are enough to make your eyes blur (similar to a couple pints of high-octane microbrew). North Carolina now boasts 110 microbreweries and produces more than 260,000 barrels of craft beer.

The mountains of western North Carolina have truly become microbrewery capitals. The charming city of Asheville now has 18 microbreweries, and centered its revitalization efforts in the 1990s through attracting brewpubs.

North Carolina readily leaped into the microbrewery phase by adopting a "Pop the Cap" law, allowing for higher alcohol content in beers. This opened the door for many private-label microbrews, which contain more alcohol than traditional beers (as much as 15 percent by volume).

Within the U.S., there are now 3,000 microbreweries – and the number is skyrocketing. Several new breweries are targeted for Jacksonville, to complement an impressive lineup already.

Bold City, Intuition, Engine 15 and Green Room Brewing have already established themselves as premier microbreweries in Jacksonville. The numbers are likely to continue to grow here (as they are in trendy Charlotte, N.C.) – considering the popularity of the craze.

In Jacksonville, three college buddies have formed an enterprising company to capitalize on the newfound brewing industry here. The "Jax Brew Bus" provides tours to the various microbreweries, and incorporates samples of the colorfully named libations as part of the experience.

Now, that's plain and simple innovation.

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County candidates master the 2-minute drill

Two minutes. Candidates running for the county commission faced a crowd and a clock timing stump speeches at a business meeting in Callahan last week.

The Greater Nassau Chamber of Commerce gave Republican contenders about the same amount of time to talk as it takes to brush your teeth or feed the dog.

The candidates were up for the challenge and shared ideas about important issues, including roadway maintenance, the upcoming construction of the sheriff's administration building and fiscal responsibility.

Three out of four registered candidates attended the meet, greet and eat political luncheon Thursday at the Pig Bar-B-Q Restaurant.

They included District 4 incumbent Barry Holloway and challenger George Spicer. The two faced each other at the last election in 2010.

District 2 challenger and for-

mer commissioner Mike Boyle was there, though incumbent Steve Kelley was not. Those two candidates also faced each other in the last election.

Holloway, who is trying for his third consecutive term, spoke first, offering a state-funded plan for roadway maintenance and stating the importance of identifying new evacuation routes that could qualify for public funding.

State funding is needed. At a board meeting earlier this month, commissioners voted 3-2 to raise property taxes and eliminate the county's \$1.5 million pavement management plan. Holloway voted no.

Holloway said his plan calls for asking the state for more money to help pave roads using its small county assistance and small county operations pro-

grams known as SCRAP and SCOP.

"We can now use the money to pave dirt roads, before we couldn't," said Holloway.

He said the money is critical for residents that live west of I-95.

"We're identifying higher priorities on the West Side because we realize that major growth is coming this way."

Holloway said that identifying new evacuation routes might help bring more state funding to the county.

The state is already a big contributor to local roads.

Holloway said that the state spent \$80 million to widen SR 301 in Callahan because industrial development is expected at Crawford Diamond. Right now the site is undeveloped land waiting for a taker.

But Holloway said the state's investment is a good signal that development is on the way.

"They wouldn't spend this money if growth wasn't coming," said Holloway. "Believe you me."

It was a lot of information to impart in a short amount of time, but Holloway beat the clock.

Challenger and former commissioner Mike Boyle, who represented District 2 from 2006-10, spoke next, launching into his two-minute campaign speech by complimenting the food.

"I'm from the East Side and food on the West Side is incredibly good. Thank you," said Boyle.

He said that when he left office, the county had \$14 million in reserves.

"Some people said that was too much," said Boyle. "But it's just about gone now."

Boyle advocated financing the new sheriff's administration building. A \$7.7 million bid was accepted last week for the

design and construction.

He said paying cash puts payments on the shoulders of current property taxpayers.

"If we use that option, who's paying? Everyone in this room," said Boyle.

Low-rate financing is a better option, he said, because it would spread payments to people who move to the county over the next few years.

"Otherwise they get a free ride," said Boyle.

When George Spicer took the microphone, he walked up and down the room like a seasoned politician.

He said the lunch was so good that he was ready for a nap. Then he launched into a short speech with his personal background, including the fact that at age 60 he is a great-grandfather.

"I want to see Nassau County as a place to live, work and raise our families," said Spicer.

He said he is a conservative who believes in a "debt-free county."

"Get out of debt, stay out of

debt, pay as you go," said Spicer.

That is a mantra offered by Commissioner Steve Kelley. The two candidates are friends and it is common to see their campaign signs hanging side-by-side.

There is a write-in candidate for District 2. Eugene Alley. He is a 65-year-old estimator for a commercial shipping operation in Jacksonville. In an interview last week, Alley said that he has never run for public office.

As a write-in, Alley will compete in the general election against Kelley or Boyle but his name will not appear on the ballot.

Chamber members also heard from Carole Franklin, who is running unopposed for re-election on the Ocean Highway and Port Authority for District 4.

"We need to get people interested," said Franklin. "No one comes to meetings. We could break Sunshine laws just by holding a meeting. I'd like to see more people involved."

City has moral obligations

I'm reading a great book by Hedrick Smith called *Who Stole the American Dream*. It is at once enlightening, maddening, frightening and depressing. Just an excerpt or two:

- "The top 0.01 percent, comprising just 15,426 families, enjoyed an average income of \$9.1 million in 2007 ... 6 percent of the nation's overall income, or 600 times their share in terms of numbers."

- "The 74 people at the pinnacle each made \$50 million or more in 2009, while recession was squeezing millions of American families ... the average income was \$518.8 million — \$10 million a week."

These skyrocketing income numbers for a very, very few people combined with stagnant or falling real income numbers for everybody else is re-creating what author Smith and a lot of really smart economists are calling the "wealth gap." This gap was a chasm during the second Industrial Revolution of the late 1800s, but it closed markedly with tremendous economic expansion post-WWII. Now, given the various structural problems with our economy, it's back, growing at a rate that concerns even the most devoted free-market economist.

What's all this got to do with Fernandina Beach, or Nassau County? Quite a lot, actually.

One of the constants of budget time at our local level is the loud debate concerning how much funding should go to nonprofits, those agencies and organizations committed to helping and making a positive impact on the lives of those in our community who've suffered most. Think about it — if the reemergence of the "wealth gap" has made life difficult for a shrinking middle class, what must the daily struggles be like for those who have fallen lower still?

going to nonprofits:

- The forced charitable giving argument — "If I want to donate to a nonprofit, let me, but no government should force me to give by allocating my tax dollars."

- The priority spending argument: "Let the churches and individuals give to the nonprofits, take our tax dollars and spend them on what governments were created to do, you know, police, fire, stuff like that."

- The double-taxation argument: "The county's going to donate to nonprofits, too, and 30 percent of those dollars come from city taxpayers, so the city commission shouldn't contribute anything — let the county do it."

Here's the thing, private donations don't come close to meeting the need, and is there anything more important for government to do than helping those who find it difficult to help themselves? I don't think so.

The Fernandina Beach City Commission has allocated \$11,000 for nonprofits — \$5,000

Nonprofits, the heart of a progressive, caring community, depend on countless hours donated by hundreds of little-recognized, much-needed volunteers, private contributions and contributions from city and county governments, the latter having become uncertain, subject to "situational" ideological imperatives, political posturing evidenced through speechmaking and ever dwindling amounts from year to year.

I've heard all the arguments against tax dollars

for the Council on Aging, \$1,000 for Starting Point, \$1,000 for Micah's Place, \$3,000 for Barnabas and \$1,000 for Family Services. No commission has ever allocated so little, both in real numbers and as a percentage of the total budget. I don't know the county's allocation numbers.

Some commissioners, due to much-repeated ideological imperatives or political convenience, find it necessary to worry, publicly, and speech-make, endlessly, about the money requested by nonprofits. Yet, the "situational" nature of their ideological imperatives become apparent when considering the following:

- They have no problem allocating \$600,000 in tax dollars to subsidize the golf course and marina contracts.

- Ideology is never mentioned when they vote to spend \$200,000 or \$300,000 for a waterfront park that the people of Fernandina Beach don't need or want.

- Fiscal responsibility goes out the window when a parking garage along the waterfront is offered by one commissioner to solve the downtown's imaginary parking problem.

- Allocating an unknown number of tax dollars to help bring about a seemingly endless parade of events and festivals to ensure our competitive edge with other beach attractions for tourist dollars.

The wealth gap is real, as are structural problems within our economy, and some people, due to physical, psychological or age reasons, find day-to-day life difficult and stressful. If city and county governments can help ease that difficulty, that stress even a little bit, don't they have the moral obligation to do so? In my book, yes.

Raise tax,
or reduce
expenses?

Nassau County Commissioners have approved, on a 3-2 vote, an increase in the property tax rate of one mill for fiscal 2014-15, which begins Oct. 1. The tax hike is tentative, subject to public hearings and final approval by the board in September.

We side with the two naysayers, and urge the commission to reconsider.

The tax increase would cost Nassau County property owners an average \$110 to \$130 per \$100,000 of assessed value on a homesteaded property. That's too much.

The increase would raise about \$6 million, which would be applied to government services, including an average 2.5 percent pay raise for county employees.

Our economy is doing better since the depths of the Great Recession, but we are not out of the woods yet. And this is no time to ask local taxpayers to pony up for more government.

Many of our private industries cut pay during the recession. Perhaps the county should consider asking its top-paid workers, those making over \$50,000 a year, to take a 10 percent pay cut; those making \$30,000 to \$50,000 to take a 7.5 percent cut; and those at the bottom of the pay scale to take a 5 percent cut. That would be in line with what some local businesses did to cut expenses.

We understand the need for additional firefighters as our county population grows, but don't try to tell us that would cut overtime pay for our current firefighters. In our experience, no matter how many you hire, overtime pay continues to climb. Firefighter overtime pay is a scandal that remains substantially unaddressed by county officials. There may be enough waste there to pay for three more firefighters.

We acknowledge the county has aging infrastructure, new demands for services and new legal requirements, such as fully funding pension plans, but a tax hike simply allows commissioners to apply a Band-aid rather than performing serious surgery on the still bloated county budget.

And we agree with those who say we should pay as we go for a new sheriff's administration building and 911 call center rather than borrow the \$10 million needed for those projects. Borrowing money allows the commission to divert millions of dollars to county spending today rather than making the hard choices required to bring our finances in line for the future.

The easy way out is to add to the burden of local taxpayers by raising the property tax. But that is not the responsible way.

The county commission should hold the line on taxes, and further tighten the screws on spending. The time may come when a tax increase is unavoidable. That time is not yet.

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Skydiving

"Skydiving planes circling, dropping skydivers on the beach every 10-15 minutes ..." ("Skydiving on the beach," July 11).

I love the airport. I live below one of the runway approaches. I stop to watch the planes, jets and helicopters. I think the airport is a great asset to the island, which makes us a world-class destination, and I wish I had the personal time (and means) to become an amateur pilot myself.

However, the concept of slow droning commercial skydiving planes taking off every 10-15 minutes all day every day the weather is nice — and never leaving the air space above our heads — to make money dropping tourists on the beach in front of Sliders — does not appeal to me one bit. I would consider this a significant neighborhood "peace and quiet" issue that deserves resident approval, not city commission approval.

Back to the year 2000 and Willie. In October, a phone call. "Mrs. Hoyt, we tracked you down through Blockbuster. We can't keep Willie — my grandson is too small and rough for a puppy and we would like you to have him if you would?"

A call to Bill. Yes! Let's go pick him up. Off to Gourmet Gourmet for a tenderloin lunch (which we loved) and home for a bath (which he didn't). I wrapped him in a towel and put him under my comforter. Then fast asleep, a little damp ball of fur named Charley.

Charley was perfect every day of his life. We didn't ever really have to teach him anything. Potty trained in three days, sit, lie down, come "now" meant right away. When dogs in the neighborhood that came to play left, running away, Charley would stop at the edge of the grass.

He shopped in all the stores in Fernandina, most everyone knew him and were amused by the way he shopped, too, two steps then sitting while we browsed. He also smiled, a Bichon trait, all the while.

He never wore a leash and was welcome to eat at the restaurants on

the island, from the most high end to the smallest. Some of the chefs would come out and say "hi" or ask what he wanted to eat tonight. One came out to say, "Charley, I knew it was you because the meatballs were ordered with no sauce!"

He had a birthday party at Carrabba's in Jacksonville and sat, watching his ice cream with a candle while they sang an Italian Happy Birthday to him. No, he didn't blow out the candle. (I don't know why not!)

The day after he died the *News-Leader* headline said, "City OKs dining with dogs." Outside, of course. We think it should be called Charley's law.

There are so many things: he was true and right all the way, and you talked to him like he was a person. "Come this way, sweetie, stop here." Dogs barked and he didn't look, he liked most people but held opinions about others. He hated to swim so when he walked straight into the pool the night before he died, we really knew that it was over. He had liver cancer and it went very fast.

I slept by his side for 14 years and now our home has a very empty space that we can't fill. We loved him so much and I think, as we were his charges, he loved us even more.

P.S. My purpose for writing about the Nassau Humane Society — there is a quote from the Bible I'm paraphrasing, "If you do good things well and give it everything you have to give, it will be returned to you ten-fold."

Bird Paradise

One of the fun things about watching nature around here is that things keep changing. The more I think I know about local wildlife the more I still have to learn. Take the dogma about white pelicans, for instance.

It used to be a well-known fact that white pelicans (a species much larger than our typical brown pelicans) only winter here in our coastal marsh waters and then return to freshwater lakes out West to breed in the summer months.

Occasionally a few juvenile birds stuck around and bypassed this many-hundred-mile journey. In recent years a handful of these immature white pelicans have remained in our coastal waterways throughout the year where only those with boats are likely to see them.

But now, for us landlubbers, this year things have gotten interesting in the white pelican world. You only need to drive off the south bridge on Amelia Island and look to your left when you arrive on neighboring Big Talbot Island to see what I mean. The large pond formerly known as "Spoonbill Pond," because these pink birds used to hang out there, has now become "Pelican Pond." Even though it is the middle of summer, scores of immature white pelicans have now staked their claim.

You can get a glimpse of the birds as you drive by but if you really want the full experience, park in the Florida State Parks lot across the highway and walk over and take a look. Although the unfinished bike trail boardwalk is mostly in the way of your view, if you walk along the shoulder you will be sure to see the pelicans. (But please keep a look out for the speeding car traffic

too.)

Although this pond has, for the many years that I've been driving by, changed from high levels to low along with the tides, recent changes have altered the regime causing the water level in the pond to remain high. But birds seem to like this situation.

There seem to be plenty of food fish in the pond at the moment, at least enough to keep the white pelicans interested. On a recent visit to the pond I counted maybe 60 white pelicans standing in two groups on the opposite shore, and another group of about a dozen floating in a group, herding and catching fish.

And white pelicans are not the only birds you will see when you visit the pond. During our brief visit at mid-day Bucko and I saw a handful of wood storks in the trees at the north end, scores of egrets in other trees to the south and a handful of gulls perched on the boardwalk pilings. As we watched an osprey swooped into the center of the pond and scored its own fish too.

If this bird-watching experience whets your appetite for more, you might want to continue driving down the road to the parking lot on the south end of Little Talbot Island, a few miles further south. This freshwater pond is a giant watering trough for the hundreds of laughing gulls from the colony across the strait, in Huguenot Park. Over the years this laughing gull population has been increasing but that's not really a good thing. Laughing gulls are opportunistic predators that consume the eggs and chicks of other rare and threatened birds that also share this territory. An increase in laughing gulls goes with a decline in other species. But, regardless, their drinking swoops over this retention pond are fun to watch.

Other birds frequent this pond as well. Groups of ducks and ducklings float across the surface or shelter on the grassy banks along with the occasional egret or heron. In years gone by the dead trees created when the parking lot

was built were the roosting place for dozens of ospreys, especially when the mullet were running in the nearby strait. But these snags eventually rotted and the tops snapped off and at most only one or two osprey still perch in this area.

This area is ever changing. Recently a group of turkey vultures (sometimes called a

"committee") has taken over this area for itself. These red-headed birds are a different species than the black vultures which are more common on Amelia Island, often seen roosting near the North End Boat Ramp. The two species maintain different colonies, but sometimes they share the same carcasses on the road before heading back

to their respective camps.

The key to enjoying nature in one place like ours is learning more about the behavior of the species involved and watching the changes in species composition over time. Sadly, all too many of these changes are negative with more and more natural habitat destroyed and replaced with structures and

pavement. Overall the diversity and abundance of wildlife in our area continues to decline due to the "hand of man." But for those of us who enjoy nature watching, luckily there's always something.

The 'Posse' is on the trail



The purpose of Northeast Florida Camp Cadet is to provide today's youth with the tools necessary to overcome challenges, instill strict discipline and bestow confidence and leadership abilities. Camp Cadet is a tuition-free, one-week event, staffed by state and local police and sheriff's offices from Bradford, Clay, Duval and Nassau counties. The officers and deputies serve as camp staff, counselors and instructors.

This is not a camp for troubled youth and the camp is

structured as a mini-version of a basic police academy. The program provides an opportunity for youth ages 12-15 to gain better relationships with local law enforcement, as well as experiencing exercises in developing leadership and teamwork skills. This is done by a rugged schedule of training based on a modified law enforcement educational syllabus. Cadets receive instruction in numerous aspects of law enforcement, which will challenge them physically and mentally.

Categories of training include drill and marching techniques, crime scene processing, trial procedures (including a mock criminal trial), leadership skills, CPR certification, anti-DUI and drug education, essay writing and many challenging physical activities.

Emphasis at the camp is placed on developing leadership skills, self-discipline, self-esteem, and confidence building through teamwork, accomplishments, and making new friends. Through this program, the cadets gain a sense of accomplishment, self-worth and pride.

FBHS vandalized

Several buildings were burglarized at the baseball field at Fernandina Beach High School and several items were stolen during the night before July 3, according to a city police report. A high school baseball coach contacted police a little before 7 a.m. July

3 to report that door handles on several buildings on the field property had been damaged.

Police found broken door locks and handles on several buildings, including a concession area, according to the report. The padlock to a soft-drink cooler was reportedly damaged and some candy and drinks were stolen, and the building had spray paint damage to the doors and interior.

Several dozen baseballs had also been thrown around the field, and a gas can had reportedly been set on fire. A pickaxe was discovered under the stairs to the press box, and a hacksaw was also found that was presumably used in an attempt to cut a chain and padlock, according to the report.

A bicycle track and shoe prints were observed on the sidewalk leading from Hickory Street to the concession area, and shoe prints were also found in other areas.

Digital photos were taken of the damage, and fingerprints were taken

from the cooler. Several items were collected to process for evidence, including paint cans, the pickaxe and the hacksaw. Shoe impressions were taken from around the area.

Five door handles were found to be damaged and 15 dozen baseballs were ruined due to water damage, according to the report. Other damaged items included an upright Pepsi cooler, a gas can and a padlock with latch. Two boxes of candy were stolen from the concession area and a Black & Decker drill was taken. Total losses were estimated at about \$2,500.

The baseball coach also told police that a door handle had been damaged two nights earlier, and two boxes of candy were stolen from the concession area.

The case was forwarded to the investigations bureau.

COURT REPORT

■ Nicholas Stephen Becker was served an affidavit and denied two counts of violation of probation being served for criminal mischief over \$200 but under \$1,000, petit theft and burglary of a structure.

Friday and came back to the Fernandina harbor Marina with a big catch of red snapper. Ross skippers the charter fishing boat Pirates Cup.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is asking anglers to help collect vital information about the Atlantic red snapper fishery.

Researchers at the FWC's

Fish and Wildlife Research Institute will be out along Florida's east coast during each day of the season, asking recreational fishermen about their red snapper trips and their catch.

This special survey is needed to gather more precise information on the numbers of red snapper caught by recreational anglers.

Researchers will also collect biological samples of harvested fish to help determine the age of each red snapper.

Fishermen must first clean their red snapper catches and then donate the carcasses to the FWC officer for research.

The tiny ear bone of the red snapper gives vital information to researchers including the health and age of the fish.

Lessons from the Golf Pro

Golf shoes are apparel that need quite a bit of care, yet they rarely get the attention that they need. One of the main problems is that they shrink due to the elements as well as storage. The best way to keep your golf shoes in prime condition is to insert a shoe tree inside your shoe. This will hold the shoe's shape, minimize shrinkage and eliminate moisture buildup. If you have leather golf shoes, you should treat them with either polish or a silicone spray. Today, most golf courses want you to wear soft golf spikes instead of the old metal ones. If you still have metal spikes and one comes loose, the standard spike wrench will do the job. However, if you do not have a spike wrench to use, try using a divot repair tool or a towel that is pressed firmly against the golf shoe spike.


