A two-car crash on the Interstate Thursday afternoon resulted in some bottleneck traffic and slow downs for motorists.

The Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) reported that at 1:50 p.m. on Thursday, September 27, Susie Ann Clary, 62, of Gainesville, FL, was driving a 2007 Ford Taurus traveling westbound on I-10 at the 219-mile marker.

Sandra Lee Nargiz, 59, of Tallahassee was driving a 2008 Chevrolet Suburban traveling eastbound in the inside lane.

Man Caught Red-Handed Stealing Lawnmower

A Tallahassee man was caught red-handed last week as he was attempting to steal a local resident's riding lawnmower.

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office reported that on September 29 Deputy Jerrod Rigdon was dispatched to a South Main Avenue residence in response to a lawnmower being taken.

Upon the deputy's arrival, he noticed a lawn mower in the ditch approximately 300 yards west of the victim's address. The deputy also noticed a white van parked next to the lawnmower.

He made contact with the female subject in the van, who stated that her husband had just stopped a white man with no shirt and a cut on his forehead, from stealing the

lawnmower. She said the suspect was walking westward and her husband fol-

lowed him in a white Chevrolet pick-up truck.

Deputy Rigdon continued down South Main Avenue approximately half a mile, where he noticed two white males talking in front of a white pick-up truck.

The deputy made contact with the subjects and the first subject met the description of the suspect given by the wife. He was identified as Bobby Lee Ross, 39, of Tallahassee. The second subject was the husband.

The husband said that he lives next door and was watching the property for his father. He said he looked out of his house and saw Ross driving his father's John Deere Zero Turn Z225 lawnmower down the driveway and onto South Main Avenue.

City Looking To Amend Parts Of Sign Ordinance

City officials are in the process of amending the sign ordinance to provide for a scale and placement of signs that are in keeping with the city's historic character.

Ordinance 12-05, set for a final hearing

and adoption on Tuesday evening, Oct. 2, comes at the recommendation of the Monticello Local Planning Agency (LPA), which deals with planning and zoning issues.

Per City Clerk Emily Anderson, the ordinance, which applies to Chapter 54 of the Monticello Code of Ordi-

nances, "modifies the maximum allowable signage according to zoning districts and establishes regulations governing the allowable sign size according to distance from the right-of-way."

The proposed changes apply only to permanent signs for which a permit is re-

quired. The ordinance defines as permanent those signs on walls, mansards, marquees, canopies and roofs, as well as freestanding and ground signs.

Per the ordinance, permanent signs are allowed in

Commission Approves Budget & Millage Rate

After months of fussing and feuding over the numbers, and just in time for the start of the new fiscal year on Oct. 1, the Jefferson County Commission last week approved the final budget and millage rate in a matter of minutes, absent any fanfare.

At a public hearing on Friday evening, Sept. 28, the board approved four resolutions in quick succession, bringing to an end the lengthy budget preparation process.

Resolution 12-092823-01 adopted the rolled-back rate of 8.3114 mills, a lower rate than the just-concluded year's rate of 8.3226 mills. The rolled-



back rate is calculated to raise the same revenues as the previous year, taking into account changes in property values. Ad-valorem taxes are projected to raise \$4,480,370 in the coming year.

Resolution 12-092812-02 adopted a balanced budget off \$22,710,648.

Resolution 12-092812-03 adopted a fire assessment. Please See

Registration For Election Set To Close Next Week

With Nov. 6 barely a month away, the elections office is reminding would-be voters that registration for the general election closes in a matter of days.

To be exact, the registration closes on Tuesday, Oct. 9, with early voting set to begin on Saturday, Oct. 27, and continue through Saturday, Nov. 3.

The registration requirement, Elections Supervisor Marty Bishop explains, applies only to first-time registrants and out-of-state voters new to the county. Voters already registered do not have to re-register.

Bishop advises that voters be prepared for a lengthy and complicated ballot, as it contains a number of local, state and national elective offices, as well as numerous proposed amendments. He suggests that voters complete the sample ballots at home and bring them to the polls on Election Day, so that that the process doesn't bog down with voters taking inordinate amounts of time at the voting booths, trying to read through the many choices.

For the sake of clarity and to help promote voter understanding, the newspaper will publish a nonpartisan summary of the 11 amendments in the coming paper, along with the pros and cons of each and what a yes and no vote means, in terms of how the individual citizen may want to vote.

As for the public offices up for election, five to be decided locally, along with a Local Option Tax Referendum. The five offices are County Commission, Districts 1 and 3; School Board, District 1; and Tax Collector and School Superintendent.

In the District 1 County Commission race, the candidates are Benjamin Bishop, Democrat; and Ed Volltersen, Republican.

In the District 3 County Commission race, the candidates are incumbent Hines Boyd, No Party Affiliation (NPA), seeking a second term; and challengers C.P. Miller, NPA, and Vernie Key, Democrat.

In the nonpartisan District 1 School Board race, the candidates are Phil Barker and Ann Herring.

The two countywide races are for the offices of Tax Collector and School Superintendent.

In the Tax Collector race, the candidates are incumbent Lois Hunter, Democrat, seeking a fourth term; and challenger Paul Michael, Republican.

In the School Superintendent race, the candidates are incumbent Bill Brumfield, Democrat, seeking a second term; and challengers Al Cooksey, Republican, and Nancy Whitty and Charles Parrish, both running as NPA.

The local referendum, sponsored by the Jefferson County Economic Development Council, aims to give a tax break to new and existing businesses that promote

ment of \$101.16 for single-family residences; \$57.46 per unit for multiple-family residences; and \$.056 per square foot for commercial structures, with a mandatory minimum payment of \$143.75 and a maximum of \$3,327.50 for the latter category.

And Resolution 12-092812-04 adopted a landfill assessment of \$175 for single-family residences and a base fee of \$175 for commercial customers, with an additional per pickup usage fee to be applied to commercial customers that generate a great deal of trash.

County staff is still in the process of trying to determine what the additional usage fee will be per pickup for commercial customers.

For residential customers, the \$175

represents a reduction of \$49.88 from the current assessment of \$224.88. Meanwhile, for small commercial operations that don't generate much trash and that require no onsite pickup, the \$175 base fee also represents a significant reduction from the current rate structure.

Presently, commercial customers pay \$0.57 per square foot for the landfill assessment, with a mandatory minimum payment of \$380.46 and a maximum of \$3,535.90, regardless of the garbage generated.

The budget summary noted that the commission's proposed operating budget expenditures would be 11.81 percent less than the just completed fiscal year's total operating expenditures.

job creation, either by locating here or expanding. The measure leaves it to the discretion of the commission to decide when and under what conditions the tax break would be granted.

The ballot also includes several judicial, state and national contests.

In the race for State Attorney for the 2nd Judicial Circuit, the candidates are incumbent Willie Meggs, Democrat; and challenger Pete Williams, Republican.

In the Judgeship for the Second Judicial Circuit, the contest is between presiding Judge Josephina Tamayo, appointed to the seat by Gov. Charlie Crist in 2010; and challenger Barbara Hobbs.

Seven judgeships are up for retention, requiring a yes or no vote. Three are Florida Supreme Court Justices and four are First District Court of Appeal judgeships. The three Supreme Court Justices up for retention are R. Fred Lewis, Barbara J. Pariente and Peggy A. Quince.

The four First District Court of Appeal Judges are Simone Marsteller, Stephanie Ray, Ron Swanson and Brad

Thomas.

In the race for State Representative District 7, which takes in Jefferson County, the candidates are newcomers Halsey Beshears, Republican; and Robert Hill, Democrat.

In the race for State Senate District 3, which also takes in the northern part of Jefferson County, the candidates are incumbent Bill Montford, Democrat; and challenger John Shaw, Republican.

In the race for Congressional seat, District 2, the candidates are incumbent Steve Southerland, Republican; and challenger Al Lawson, Democrat.

In the U.S. Senate race, the candidates are incumbent Bill Nelson, Democrat; Connie Mack, Republican; Bill Gaylor, NPA; and Chris Borgia, NPA.

A total of 24 candidates are listed in the presidential/vice presidential race, starting with Mitt Romney and Paul Ryan, Republicans, and President Barack Obama and Vice President Joe Biden, Democrats, along with a host of lesser-known candidates.

The polls will open 7 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 6, and close at 7 p.m.

He said he got into his truck and chased Ross down. He added that when pulling out of his driveway he noticed a brown truck with a trailer attached, sitting on the side of the road. He said that as he entered onto the road the brown truck sped away.

The husband said he used his truck to block Ross off the road, causing him to stick the lawnmower in the ditch. He said his wife came out there and that was when Ross walked away.

He said he called the Sheriff's Department and began following behind

Ross. He said he found Ross hiding in the woods and he began questioning him about his actions. The husband advised the deputy that while speaking to Ross, Ross told him that he was going to use the lawnmower to mow the husband's father's lawn. He said this story did not make sense to him as his wife had mowed the lawn earlier in the day and had just parked the lawnmower back under the shed, where it is kept.

He said that the only work that Ross had done for his father was hanging drywall and that

job was completed on Friday, September 28 and Ross no longer had any reason to be on the property.

Ross told the deputy that he was borrowing the lawnmower to mow his lawn. Ross said he had been doing some work for the father and he thought he could use the lawnmower whenever he wanted.

Deputy Rigdon noted that the lawnmower is valued at \$2,900.

Ross was arrested and charged with burglary of a structure and grand theft. A total bond of \$5,000 was set and he remained at the County Jail October 2.

all zoning districts with the exception of agricultural and residential districts, unless otherwise specifically prohibited elsewhere in the codebook.

The aggregate surface area of all signs — including the structures and supports for free-standing signs — "shall not exceed two square feet of area for each foot of building footage occupied by the business displaying signs, or one square foot of area for each foot of frontage of property occupied by the building."

The square footage for double-faced free-standing signs is to be calculated using one side of the surface area.

The ordinance also addresses the maximum aggregate surface area allowed for each building or property frontage. That maximum aggregate surface is 40 square feet in Business-1 and Mixed-Use Business/Residential districts, and 160 sq. feet within all other zoning districts where signs are allowed.

Where it concerns multiple occupancy buildings, each occupant within such buildings will be permitted wall signs and wall sign area as if each were occupying an individual building with individual street frontage.

As for ground signs, multiple occupant buildings are permitted one ground sign each with a surface area "not to exceed one square foot of property frontage of the building or two square feet per foot of building frontage, with a maximum of 150 square feet."

The ordinance, among other things, allows a maximum of one ground sign plus one of the other types of signs on each property, with a

few noted exceptions; requires that all freestanding signs be on public road right-of-way or on a

paved dedicated access easement; and establishes setbacks for the different sized signs.



SHOULD YOU PREPARE FOR "FISCAL CLIFF"?

As an investor, you can sometimes still feel you're at the mercy of forces beyond your control. This may be especially true today, when the Federal Reserve has warned of an approaching "fiscal cliff." What can you do in the face of such a dire prediction?

First of all, you need to understand what led to the Fed's remarks. Here's the story: Some \$1.2 trillion in spending cuts are scheduled to begin in 2013 while, simultaneously, the Bush-era tax cuts — including the reduction in capital gains and dividend taxes — are set to expire. This combination of spending cuts and higher taxes could take some \$600 billion out of the economy, leading to a possible recession — and maybe something much worse, at least in the eyes of the Fed.

Still, there's no need for panic. Despite its political infighting, Congress is likely to reduce the "cliff" to a smaller bump, though it probably won't happen until after the election. But as an investor, you may need to be prepared for two significant events: market volatility, at least in the short term, and higher taxes, probably for the foreseeable future.

To combat market volatility, you need to own a broadly diversified portfolio that can handle "bumps," "cliffs" and other rugged investment terrain. This means you'll need a mix of stocks, bonds and other securities that are suitable for your needs. (Keep in mind, though, that while diversification can reduce the impact of market volatility, it cannot guarantee profits or protect against losses.) You may also need to "rebalance" your portfolio to ensure that it's still aligned with your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon, despite the impact of volatility.

Now, let's turn to taxes. Even if taxes on income, capital gains and dividends do rise, they will still, in all likelihood, be much lower than they've been at various points in the past. Nonetheless, you may want to consider a variety of steps, including the following:

Take advantage of tax-deferred vehicles. Contribute as much as possible to your traditional IRA, your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan, and any education savings accounts you may have, such as a 529 plan. Consider converting your traditional IRA to a Roth IRA. A Roth IRA provides tax-free earnings, provided you don't start taking withdrawals until you're 59½ and you've had your account for at least five years. (Be aware, though, that this conversion is taxable and may not be appropriate if you don't have money readily available to pay the taxes.)

Consider municipal bonds. If you're in one of the upper tax brackets, you may benefit from investing in "munis," which pay interest that's free of federal taxes, and possibly state and local taxes as well.

Not all these choices will be suitable for your situation, of course. Before taking action on these items, you may want to consult with your tax and financial advisors. But give these options some thought because they may prove helpful in keeping your financial goals from going "over a cliff."

911 Addresses

Where do those 911 addresses come from? Have you ever wondered? Well, in Jefferson County it begins at the Sheriff's Office, in a little room that was until just recently occupied by longtime employee Grace Thomas. She has been a county resident for 18+ years, so she prouls herself for "really knowing the county!"

Thomas has worked with Jefferson County for 19 years. Her hobbies include quilting, ceramics and antiques. And so, after much thought, she has decided to retire. Her last day was Wednesday, September 26. Her plans are to spend more time with her son in Tennessee.

When a new dwelling or power pole has been established there is a permit process that has to be followed, first by contacting the building and planning department. Once the new address has been validated, a measurement in footage is taken by Thomas or another Sheriff's Office employee.

Starting at the new driveway, the footage is measured to Highway 90 north or south or to Highway 19 east or west, depending on where that location is. If you live east of Monticello, your distance is measured from west to east of Highway 19. Odd numbers are always given to dwellings on the left side of the road and even numbers are always given to dwellings on the right side of the road. An example would be: 633 = 6 tenths of a mile + 1/3 of a tenth or 12350 = 12 miles from beginning of road + 3/10 of a mile + ½ fraction of a tenth of a mile.

911 posting began with signs in 2000. The signs were posted on power poles at the beginning of each road and street in the county. Now plaques are posted at every dwelling in the Jefferson County area. This 911 process began with informational packets delivered to every address in the county. Residents were asked to mail or bring in their completed packets. It is the responsibility of the resident to get this paperwork to Thomas' office. When the paperwork is received, a 911

plaque and number will be issued. The numbered plaque should then be displayed in such a manner that emergency vehicles can see the number easily and without confusion from any direction.

This 911 process is a valuable tool for everyone, and especially EMS, Fire and law enforcement. It saves time and stress for all involved and helps in response time. 911 calls have evolved from these 911 addresses. When a call comes in to law enforcement it is dispatched and the location is more easily located for the emergency personnel and vehicles.

There is no more worry about a missing street sign or a new road... any location with two or more dwellings is considered a 'road.' Thomas' greatest fear has always been for the officers she sends out on calls.

Thomas' job had always been to make sure all dwelling have a 911 address in all of Jefferson County and in Greenville; updating maps for the deputies, officers, EMS, fire departments, building inspectors, property appraisers, and elections office. All this time and work is hand done to date. It is quite the job to do, and Thomas has enjoyed almost every minute of it.

Monticello Area Historic Preservation Association Meeting Scheduled

In 1993, a study funded by the Florida Department of State, Division of Historic Preservation, identified over 500 buildings, homes and structures in the City of Monticello that possibly merited consideration of some sort of historic designation. Over the past 20 years since that study, there are others that have become eligible. Over the same period of time, a few of those gems and treasures have been lost to fire and neglect, a few are currently empty and decaying, and a few more slowly deteriorating because of a lack of interest or ability on the part of owners to maintain them. Once these treasures are gone, it is almost cost prohibitive to replace them.

In spite of the losses, a slightly greater number of homes and buildings in our unique Jefferson County communities have been preserved with pride and sensitivity to their architectural importance. Both City and County government, have, through ordinances, resolutions, and the study mentioned above, provided supporting frameworks by which interested individuals and groups could further promote historic preservation and its ongoing value to our community.

A number of community organizations as well as city and county government have been involved in well intended and worthy projects as promoting business development, increasing tourism, expansion of recreational options in the city and county, preservation of ecosystems, improvement of infrastructure, efforts to improve access to transportation, and additional initiatives have, each in their own way probably contributed to fostering improvement in the quality of life in our community. In order to initiate and continue these initiatives, it appears that we

have expectations of city and county government to provide significant ongoing support with dwindling resources to do so. As the nation and our small community slowly evolve from one of the most serious financial crises in its history, this appears to be a significant point in history to make a concerted effort to look at potential revenue for our local elected officials and to help stabilize those sources. One way is to focus on preservation of the remaining historic homes and structures in Monticello and Jefferson County to insure the ongoing charm and beauty of our community. Preservation of our large inventory of historic buildings will increase their values, modestly increase related property tax revenue for local government, encourage increased tourism to support local business, and encourage owners to invest more in their properties for long-term accrual of value.

To that end, a grassroots effort of local homeowners has established a local Florida not for profit organization with a focus on promoting historic preservation. Comprised of local individuals who live in historic homes, have lived in historic homes, or those who just have a sincere interest in preservation, the Monticello Area Historic Preservation Association, Inc., is a new, 100 percent volunteer run organization that appears to fit a niche that does not appear to be addressed locally at this point in time.

The purpose of the organization is to encourage and assist in the preservation of historic buildings and structures in Monticello and surrounding Jefferson County through support to individuals and the city and county in their efforts to focus on historic preservation following their approved ordinances and regulations. This organization owns no buildings, has no office and has no employ-

ees. It is the intention of the group to assist interested parties to understand the benefits of preserving architecture through voluntarily placing property in a Monticello Historic District or the National Register of Historic Places through communication of accurate information. Repurposing buildings and saving the facades can be an effective, lost cost/high benefit strategy to help maintain a unique and vibrant historic community that will attract others for years to come as well as encourage new businesses to fill those buildings.

The first meeting of the Monticello Area Historical Preservation Association, Inc., is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 25, at the Christ Church Parish Hall at 320 North Jefferson Street in Monticello. The main speaker will be Bob Jones, with the Florida Department of State, Division of Historic Preservation, speaking about the process and benefits of placing qualified buildings and homes on the National Register of Historic Places. Emily Anderson, Monticello City Clerk will discuss the process for nominating qualified buildings and homes to be included in a city historic district. Membership is free for those who complete a membership form that evening. While a web based information portal is being constructed, additional information can be obtained by calling 850-997-6552. Founding members look forward to working with other forward thinking organizations and individuals who are of a like mind. Home ownership is not a requirement to join. Folks of all ages and parts of town are invited to participate. Future programs will be determined in large part by input from those who join the organization so as to keep the meetings appropriate and meaningful to attendees. Florida. The first Ebenezer church building burned to the ground, but a new church was built off Ebenezer Church Road in 1852, which still serves as the church sanctuary today.

The adjoining cemetery, which holds the remains of multiple generations of former members and their families, including some Con-

federate soldiers, is a testament to the past.

The stone monument in front of the church commemorates the founding of the Florida Baptist Convention held at Ebenezer in 1843.






Warriors Blank St. Francis, Improve to 3-1

Shutouts are a notably rare achievement in today's offensively fertile football locale. Where once such offenses as the Spread and West Coast were found only in the minds of NFL geniuses, now the offensive blitz has found its way into every facet and level of organized football. Gone are the days of "three yards and a cloud of dust"; now are the days of "no-huddle" and basketball scores on turf.

This setting provides the frame for Aucilla Christian's 52-0 rubbing of the Wolves of St. Francis, who themselves run a multiple spread offense, the fourth such shutout since the beginning of last season. And as impressive as the Warriors were on defense, an effort in which a season-high 13 players contributed with at least one tackle, seniors Hans Sorensen and Bradley Holm kept pace with yet another joint 200 yard rushing effort. The duo combined for a total of 212 yards and four touchdowns.

The Warriors now find themselves on a three-game winning streak in which Sorensen and Holm have averaged 115 and 106 yards respectively per game, as well as 11 total touchdowns, five belonging to Sorensen and six belonging to Holm. The pair represent the grassroots bread-and-butter engine of the Warrior offense, an offense which has averaged in excess of 450 yards in each of the past three victories.

Said head coach Colby Roberts, "We really rely on our ability to rush the football. These two seniors are stepping up in a big way, and the team is benefiting from it."

Specifically profiting from the improved ground game is sophomore quarterback Wesley Smyrnios, who has thrown for 11 touchdowns and 656 yards since the Warriors began their current streak, 215 yards and three touchdowns of which came on Friday night. While defensive coordinators scheme to stop the run, Smyrnios has worked the play action pass with deadly effect.

Senior Jared Jackson led all Aucilla receivers with his 105 yard, one touchdown performance. Jackson's statistics now total 577 yards and eight touchdowns for the season, well ahead of his record-setting pace last season.

On defense, senior linebacker Gus Smyrnios led a suffocating squad with 12 total tackles, including seven solo stops. Nearly constant pressure produced four sacks, two each by sophomore defensive lineman Nick Roberts and Cole Schwab. The Warriors also forced three fumbles to round out their dominant show.

Aucilla now looks to continue their string of victories in what is sure to be the most emotional contest of the season so far as the Warriors host the Bobcats of Robert F. Munroe. Aucilla has dropped three straight to their arch-rivals and will play for both revenge and conference perfection in this home matchup, which will begin at 7:30 p.m. on Aucilla's campus.

Did You Know?

Bless him, the man who invented peanut butter. No-one knows his (or her) name simply because although the making of peanut butter can be traced back to almost 1000 BC there is no mention of the name of who made it first. Claims to the modern recipe are easier to follow: New Yorker Rose Davis made peanut butter in 1840, Canadian Marcellus Edson gained a patent for it in 1884, George A. Bayle made peanut butter in 1890, John Harvey Kellogg - he of the famous Kellogg's cereals - received a patent for suchlike product in 1897, and Ambrose Straub from St Louis, Missouri patented a peanut butter making machine in the 1903, the same year George Washington Carver introduced his peanut butter recipe. The next year, C H Sumner introduced peanut butter commercially at the Universal Exposition in St Louis. But it would be Joseph L. Rosenfield who would take it big time from 1922 onward. Rosenfield licensed his churning process for smooth peanut butter to the Peter Pan brand in 1928 but in 1932 introduced his own Skippy brand.

The Man Who Invented Peanut Butter

Today, peanut butter is a billion dollar industry. Thanks to that guy or girl whose name we don't know. Beyond the world of crunchy or smooth peanut butter there is white or dark chocolate peanut butter (both real yummy), cinnamon and raisin peanut butter, even spicy peanut butter, just some of the flavors produced by Lee Zalben's Peanut Butter & Co. And it doesn't stop there. (Zalben also suggests a marshmallow fluff spread on top of the peanut butter.) Think about combination sandwiches such as peanut butter and banana, peanut butter and mayonnaise, peanut butter and dill, or peanut butter and onion. Who can top that? "Man cannot live by bread alone; he must have peanut butter." - James A. Garfield.



It's not just those numbers that have FCA organizers excited about Fields of Faith. It's the real-life impact that these gatherings are



Sammy Ritter passed eight runners to finish 134th with a time of 24:48.


Chaz Hamilton passed seven runners to finish 137th with a time of 25:01.
