Commissioners Reverse Sidewalk Decision; Go With Lloyd Project

Two weeks after the Jefferson County Commission decided to extend the sidewalk on U.S. 19 South rather than installing a new sidewalk along CR-158A in Lloyd, the board reversed itself, with Commission Chairman John Nelson again casting the deciding vote.

Readers may recall that on Dec. 6, the board voted 3-2 to use \$118,000 that had come available from the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to extend the sidewalk on South Jefferson Street from its current stopping point in front of the lumber supply store to the medical clinic, and possibly beyond.

On Thursday, Dec. 20, however, the board voted 3-2 to use the funding instead to install a sidewalk in Lloyd, with Nelson reversing himself and casting his vote with Commissioners Betsy Barfield and Stephen Walker, as opposed to siding with Commissioners Hines Boyd and Benny Bishop, as was the case the first time around.

Nelson said he had misunderstood the original explanation of the stipulations surrounding the FDOT funding. But more important, he said, was the new information that had come to light, as related by Court of Clerk Kirk Reams and Preble-Rish consultant engineer Alan Wise.

One new piece of that information had to do with the expressed confidence of Reams and Wise, based on their subsequent conversations with FDOT officials, that the state agency itself will likely tackle the sidewalk on U.S. 19 on its own, given that it's a federal highway.

The FDOT, moreover, wants the sidewalk on U.S. 19 extended all the way to the Waukeenah Street, which puts the project at a "ballpark" price of about \$425,000, Reams said.


Wise added another caveat. That caveat was that if the commission decided to go with the U.S. 19 extension regardless, the FDOT would administer the project. Meaning that the \$118,000 would have to be returned to the state agency and it would use the money solely for the planning phase of the project. Then, if and when funding became available again, the FDOT would proceed with the actual sidewalk, a process that could take years.

Why the significant difference in the cost of the project, from Wise's original estimate of \$160,000 and the new figure of \$425,000? Bishop asked.

Part of it had to do with the longer distance that the FDOT proposed for the extension, Wise said. As a rule of thumb, however, "When the FDOT manages a project, the costs will go up," he said.

Added Wise in summary, "If you go with the decision to do the U.S. 19 sidewalk, the FDOT will get Please See SIDEWALK Page 4

Response To Mosquito Control Stinger

I am writing this letter in response to a "Stinger" in the Monday, December 17th paper. I would like to address several complaints the letter writer had.

First, all residents of Jefferson County are able to get service if they have a visible 911 address so we can identify the correct property. If the property must be accessed by a gate, a phone number must be provided so that the driver can call you the night your route is sprayed.

Second, "The Mosquito Control Hotline" is a voicemail set up to take requests for service so that new customers can be added permanently to a route. The system is set up so that all the information needed to begin spraying a residence can be obtained via voicemail without having to call you back. If a service request cannot be completed, we will do our best to call you back.

All 1,145 residents that have requested mosquito control service are assigned to one of 30 routes that one of eight drivers is scheduled to spray seven days a week with one of three trucks from sun down to midnight.

Finally, the author claims they had two family members sick with West Nile Virus. In 2012, there were no reported human cases of West Nile Virus in Jefferson County. A Leon County man that spent time in Jefferson County did get the virus, but it is uncertain where he contracted the illness. West Nile Virus is a serious threat to public health and our local economy.

Jefferson County's mosquito control program was started back in 2001 after we became the first county in Florida to find a dead crow infected with West Nile Virus.

I hope that this clears up a few misunderstandings and will enable the author and others to get the service their tax dollars pay for and we are happy to provide. If anyone has further interest in mosquito control efforts, our 2012 Accomplishment Report is now available on the County's web page under the news and announcements section.


Applications Being Accepted For MLK Parade

the money, they will use it for planning, and they will decide that it will go all the way to Waukeelah. Off the cuff, we foresaw this and tried to explain it gingerly before.”

In light of the new information and his acknowledged previous misunderstanding, Nelson said that he wanted to withdraw his earlier vote and recast it in favor of the Lloyd project. Which he did, once the board rescinded its Dec. 6 vote and voted anew on the issue.

Nelson disagreed with Boyd that the lack of a sidewalk on U.S. 19 posed a

safety hazard for pedestrians who used the roadway to access the clinic. Rather than using U.S. 19, most residents preferred Waukeelah Street to access the clinic, Nelson said.

Wise and Reams made commissioners aware of the availability of \$118,000 for a pedestrian network development on Dec. 6, saying it was up to commissioners to decide how the money should be used.

At the time, Wise posed two possibilities for commissioners: extend the U.S. 19 sidewalk or install a new sidewalk in Lloyd.

It was both his and

Reams' argument then that the selection of the Lloyd sidewalk was the best choice, as it was unlikely that state funds would again be available for a county road anytime soon.

Wise estimated that the cost of the U.S. 19 sidewalk extension would be about \$160,000 and the cost of the Lloyd project about \$230,000, if the objective in the latter case were to reach the Leon County line. No matter the choice, the \$118,000 would only allow for a portion of either project to be completed, he said.

as possible after the New Year.

Arun Kundra, owner/operator of the Capitol City Travel Center (also known as the Big Bend Travel Plaza in Lloyd), made the request to the commission on Thursday evening, Dec. 20, along with submitting a petition that reportedly contained some 300 signatures.

In his brief remarks to the board, Kundra argued that Jefferson County's prohibition of the sale of alcohol on Sundays was hurting local convenience stores, general retail stores, restaurants and bars, and it was also creating an inconvenience for residents.

As well, he said, the prohibition was creating a public safety hazard, as it forced residents who wanted alcohol to drive to adjacent counties and sometimes these individuals consumed alcohol on their return trip.

The prohibition failed to prevent the consumption of alcohol on Sundays, Kundra stated flatly. It merely caused an inconvenience for citi-

zens and created business for neighboring counties, he said.

What's more, the prohibition was potentially hampering economic development, as it acted as a disincentive to restaurant chains such as Applebee's, Chili's, which might otherwise locate here.

"This is an outdated regulation," Kundra said. "I believe that citizens are smart enough to decide for themselves. It would also level the playing field for local businesses. I want the commission to vote out this outdated regulation."

Kundra found support among a few of the citizens attending the meeting.

Jay Adams noted that lifting the prohibition would result in a little more business for local enterprises and ultimately it would put money into the county's coffers, by way of taxes.

"It's a small differential around the margins, but it would bring in some money," Adams said.

He offered a telling anecdote. He and his mate liked to prepare a special dish that required wine, he said. Lacking the necessary bottle of wine one Sunday, and unable to buy one locally, the two had driven to Tallahassee to buy the wine, he said. And in the process, they had also bought pasta and other necessary ingredients for the dinner and had ended up spending a total of \$120, he said.

That was \$120 that could have gone to the local Winn Dixie, had the sale of alcohol been per-

mitted, he said.

Paul Henry observed that alcohol sales were currently allowed on Saturdays, and Mondays through Fridays.

"So why not Sundays?" he said.

Commissioner Benny Bishop put the Sheriff on the spot, asking for law-enforcement's view on the issue.

Sheriff David Hobbs said he personally didn't have an opinion on the issue. But speaking strictly as the county's chief law enforcement officer, he had to point out that the county currently had eight or nine bars, several of which required his deputies' attention "on a fairly frequent basis."

Would lifting the prohibition have an impact on his department? Hobbs asked rhetorically.

"Yes it would," he answered himself.

Beth Davis took slight issue with the Sheriff's representation. She noted that drinking on Sunday occurred regularly among responsible drinkers currently, and it didn't create a problem.

"I have enough friends who are drinking on Sundays and they're not getting arrested," Davis said.

Which statement prompted a comeback from Bishop.

"As a responsible drinker, couldn't you buy enough on Saturday to get you through Sunday?" Bishop asked.

Kate Calvin offered an answer.

"It's about freedom," Calvin said, further urging the board, "Come on, guys, let's join the modern era."

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

Varsity Tigers Drop First Two

The Jefferson County varsity Tigers dropped their first two games to now stand at 0-2 on the season.

Jefferson hit the hardwood against Godby in their season opener on November 29 and the Tigers were caged for a 57-43 loss.

The Tigers were outscored in the first quarter, 18-7, and in the second quarter, 18-4. Jefferson came back to take the third quarter, 23-14, and the fourth quarter, 9-7.

As a team, the Tigers netted 13 of 32 attempts from the field, bucketed four of eight attempts from the three-point zone, and hit five of 13 attempts from the free-throw line for 43 points. They had seven offensive and 25 defensive rebounds for a total of 32 rebounds, with three assists, two blocked shots, 11 steals, 20 turnovers and 20 personal fouls.

Individually, Lenorris Footman targeted six of 12 attempts from the field, and netted three of eight attempts from the free-throw line for 15 points. He had four offensive and eight defensive rebounds for a total of 12 rebounds and a double-double, with three assists, two blocked shots, two steals, two turnovers and three personal fouls.

Robert Nealy netted one of two attempts from the field, and one of two attempts from the free-throw line for five points. He had one defensive rebound, and four personal fouls.

Gene Noel netted one of four attempts from the field and one of two attempts from the free-throw line for three points. He had three offensive and four defensive rebounds for a total of seven rebounds, with two steals, five turnovers and four personal fouls.

Ramez Nealy bucketed five of 11 attempts from the field, and targeted two of two attempts from the three-point zone for 16 points. He had seven defensive rebounds, two steals, one turnover and one personal foul.

The Tigers faced off against Melody Christian Academy, on December 11, and Jefferson was downed for a 58-47 loss.

The Tigers squeaked Melody, 11-10 in the first quarter, and Melody came back to take the second quarter, 15-10. Melody Christian took the third quarter, 12-10, and the fourth quarter, 21-16.

Footman targeted six of eight attempts from the field, and missed two attempts from the free-throw line for 12 points. He had three offensive and four defensive rebounds for a total of seven rebounds, with one assist, three steals, three turnovers and four personal fouls.

Robert Nealy hit three of five attempts from the three-point zone, and targeted two of two attempts from the free-throw line for 11 points. He had one defensive rebound, three turnovers, and one personal foul.

Ramez Nealy netted three of six attempts from the field, and five of eight attempts from the free-throw line for 11 points. He had one defensive rebound, two steals, four turnovers, and two personal fouls.

Blue had one defensive rebound. Edwards netted two of five attempts from the field, and one attempt from the three-point zone for seven points. He had three defensive rebounds, three steals and five turnovers.

Hansberry targeted two of three attempts from the field, for four points. He had two defensive rebounds, two turnovers, and five personal fouls.

Williams netted one attempt from the field, for two points.

Tigers Take Two

The Jefferson County varsity Tigers took victories in their past two games to now stand 2-2-0 on the season and 1-1-0 in league play.

Jefferson hit the hardwood against Lafayette, on December 13, and the Tigers mauled their opponent for a 55-30 victory.

The Tigers commanded the first quarter, 22-2, and the second, 21-12. The Tigers skimmed Lafayette, 7-6 in the third quarter and Lafayette took the fourth quarter, 10-5.

"Ramez Nealy played very well in a must-win District game. He led the team in points, rebounds, and played hard-nose defense from the beginning to the final seconds of the game" said Coach Herbert Thomas. He was named the MVP of the game.

As a team, the Tigers netted 15 of 28 attempts from the field, targeted five of six attempts from the three-point zone, and dropped in six of 10 attempts from the free-throw line for 55 points. They collected 11 assists, 14 offensive rebounds and 33 defensive rebounds for a total of 47 rebounds, with 17 steals, 12 turnovers and 19 personal fouls.

Individually, Lenorris Footman, netted one of three attempts from the field, targeted two of two attempts from the three-point zone, and bucketed four of four attempts from the free-throw line for 12 points. He had three assists, three offensive and six defensive rebounds for a total of nine rebounds, with three steals, one turnover and three personal fouls.

We at Porch de Salomon moved toward the end of an impactful 2012 striving to finish well with teams, medical clinics, three more house builds, children's ministry, challenges, new opportunities and friends, some with great needs. Many of us find it easier to start things than to finish them well; we welcome your prayers for perseverance and wisdom.

Here are three year-end stories that have helped us finish 2012 well. As always, with the help of our mission partners:

*The first is one that will not be done until early 2013. Cecilia is an indigenous, pregnant single mother with five children. Her husband abandoned her four years ago for another woman; without resources, she and the children were forced to live in a crumbling, dirt floor lean-to behind her in-laws' house. Hector describes it as "similar to having a dog tied up out back." With this arrangement, the husband has returned, uninvited, and impregnated her twice. Burdened, Hector has worked hard to obtain a small home site for them at a safe distance from her husband's

family. A generous donation from the Lewis Hall and Mildred Sasser Singletary Foundation, combined with the work and funds of incoming teams, will allow us to build her a quality, concrete-roof house so that she and her children can regain a modicum of dignity and independence.

*Several years ago, we met teenager Leidy, at her mother's adobe house. Her single mother suffers from crippling arthritis and limited earning capacity; she and her siblings never have enough to eat. We have helped remedy that with our weekly food/protein program (and a chicken coop!) Leidy was able to start attending school again with a Porch "Beca" school scholarship. Last month, she has finished this year very well as the number one student in her class! *Felicidades Leidy!*

*One of our recent joys has been helping Edwin and his family as they end this year on a high note. Christ the Shepherd Lutheran team member Randy Potts writes: *Edwin's body is ravaged from cerebral palsy and he rarely gets to leave his room. Our team had the privilege of celebrating his 26th birthday with him and his family at a Solomon's Porch diner.* As our weeklong work here began, we were asked to be open to "defining moments" during the trip. Edwin wanted to watch us play billiards from his wheelchair; he said he understood the game. He intently watched our every move, smiled "ear to ear" and cheered us on in his own way. I was deeply touched by his joy and smile at such a simple thing as watching a billiards game up close. While our team came to serve, Edwin's smile, joy, loud excited sounds and waving his twisted hands and arms were all a true gift and blessing to me. He humbled me as I consider the many simple things that God provides us and yet we take for granted. Not Edwin, for him it was a night to remember... and for me also, because of him. That night, Edwin became the touch of Jesus to me and I am so humbled and grateful for that touch.
