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## Community Seeks To Renew Critical Economic Designation (County Also Receives \$175,000 Grant)

Jefferson County is seeking to have its RACEC designation renewed.

Economic Development Director Julie Conley informed the *Monticello News* last week that she had already mailed the letter of support for re-designation of the county as a RACEC community, as approved by the Jefferson County Commission the previous week. The designation is renewed through the Florida Department of Economic Development.

RACEC stands for Rural Areas of Critical Economic Concern, defined as rural communities (or regions composed of rural communities) that have been adversely affected by extraordinary economic events or natural disasters. The designation must be renewed periodically, with its assignment dependent on a community not having made such economic advancements in the interim that would disqualify it for the RACEC status.

The Governor, by executive order, may designate up to three RACECs in the state, which he has done and which designation establishes each region as a priority assignment for Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI) agencies.

REDI, meanwhile, was established by the Legislature to better serve Florida's rural communities by providing a more focused and coordinated effort among the various state and regional agencies that provide programs and services for rural areas. The list of REDI agencies includes the Department of Agriculture & Consumer Services, De-

partment of Children and Family Services, Department of Corrections, Department of Education, Department of Environmental Protection and Department of Health, among many more.

The RACEC designation also allows the Governor to waive criteria of any economic development incentive, including the county's Please See RACEC Page 3

## Commission Takes Small Step On Roads Inventory

It took some doing, but one of three architects of a roads inventory that forms the basis of the county's current road improvement program recently got the Jefferson County Commission to accept the inventory as the ruling document and the Clerk of Court as its official custodian.

Phil Calandra, along with Clerk of Court Kirk Reams and Preble-Rish Inc. engineer Alan Wise, spent about two years inventorying each of the county's roads, along with identifying each according to such criteria as the number of residences on the road, the condition of the road surface, and whether the road connected to a state road.

Based on the effort, the group came up with a list of 192 roads that it prioritized accordingly per district. But in no way was the prioritization intended to be absolute; nor did the list in any way argue for one type of road surface over another; Calandra told the commission on Thursday morning, Feb. 7.

What he was requesting, Calandra said, was that the commission reaffirm last year's vote and re-designate the data as the authoritative inventory and Reams as its official custodian.

One reason for the request was that the last election had changed the composition of the board by two commissioners, Calandra said. But more important, having an officially designated authoritative copy would avoid the problem of multiple and conflicting copies causing confusion and dissension in the future, he said.

And having Reams designated the official custodian would ensure that all changes went through him and that other individuals couldn't simply change document at will, absent a board's vote.

"It will avoid a lot of arm waving, confusion and mirrors and smoke in the future," Calandra said.

He refuted any suggestion that the inventory was the work of a clique, that the effort had any hidden agenda, or that the criteria used to grade the roads was in any way subjective.

"This is an inventory of the total dirt roads in the county," Calandra said. "This locks you into nothing. It's a tool for the five of you to make decisions. It's information. But unless you have a single source for the data, it's easily corrupted or changed. By having a single source, you have one point of change. This is not a power grab or anything like that."

In the end, the board approved Calandra's request, both making the inventory the official document and designating Reams as custodian.

## Road Surfaces Likely To Be Topic At Commission Meet

Expect a discussion on asphalt paving and chip sealing if you attend the Jefferson County Commission evening meeting on Thursday evening, Feb. 21.

That's because the commission recently voted to asphalt pave some county roads and chip seal others and some residents apparently are unhappy with the choice made for their particular road or are confused as to the difference between the two methods.

Commissioner Hines Boyd, a proponent of chip seal, argues that chip seal is a more appropriate paving surface on low-traffic county roads such as those in Jefferson County. He maintains that chip seal will allow more paving since it costs about half as much as hot asphalt. Boyd makes a case for chip seal on page 2.

Others of the commissioners, however, hold equally strong views on the superiority of asphalt paving, which should make for an interesting, if lengthy, discussion.

Generally speaking, asphalt paving entails using a premixed emulsion, or oil and rock combination, and rock mixed inside a commercial asphalt plant to create warm or hot asphalt. A truck then dumps the warm mixture into an asphalt paver, which lays the asphalt in a smooth path along the roadway. A compaction roller is next used to create the required asphalt density.

Chip seal, on the other hand, entails a layered process that involves applying a coat of oil to the roadway and using a chip spreader machine to cover the oil with small washed rock. A pneumatic roller is used to ensure adherence of the rock to the oil on the roadway.

Chip seal is said to be cost effective and may be used in maintenance as well as in new road construction. But it is most commonly seen on rural roads with low traffic, where expensive paving would not be worth the cost but drivers still need serviceable roads, the experts say.

Again, generally speaking, experts say asphalt lasts longer than chip seal in high-traffic areas and that it retains its integrity better. Chip seal, on the other hand, uses less expensive materials and equipment and can cover a longer area quickly because of the lack of large machines. But it reportedly has difficulty maintaining its integrity in higher traffic areas and may require grinding and paving to repair.

No doubt, attendees at the meeting will hear much more about the pros and cons of the two methods. The meeting starts at 6 p.m. in the courthouse annex off Water Street.

## Meeting Set For March 12 On Future Of Wacissa Post Office

Several weeks ago, a survey was sent to those postal customers who have boxes at the Wacissa Post Office. The survey listed several different options for customers to choose from regarding their postal service.

Frank Kolb, postmaster at Wacissa, informed this writer that a meeting has been set for 4 p.m. on March 12 to announce the results of the survey.

"We will be going to four hours a day," Kolb said. "It's all but confirmed."

The post office, which has been in operation for 170 years, was put in a newly constructed building approximately six years ago. At this time, the post office has no Saturday window hours for business transactions. Kolb goes in the building on Saturday and simply puts mail in the boxes for people to pick up.

While the decision will most likely be to operate the business window hours for four hours a day, five days a week, Kolb said the decision will not be final until the March 12 meeting.

All postal patrons are urged to fill out the survey and return them to the Wacissa Post Office.

### Chip Seal: A Natural for Paving Country Roads

Chip seal paving is not new to Jefferson County. Most of our first paved roads were chip seal. Many of those lasted over thirty years before being resurfaced with hot-mix asphalt.

Chip seal paving has been around since the 1920's. In many states, it is still commonly used on rural roads and as a low cost surface preservation treatment on busy asphalt layered streets and highways. In some countries, it is the primary paving surface for most roads.

Chip seal surfaces have an attractive gravel texture that is pleasantly appealing in country settings like ours. It's about half the cost of the slick black hot-mix asphalt paving commonly used in urban settings.

Both chip seal and hot-mix asphalt are made with the same ingredients but applied in different ways. Those ingredients are asphalt emulsion and aggregate, mostly rocks of various sizes. To make hot-mix asphalt, heated asphalt is blended with aggregate at a plant and hauled to the job site where it's laid.

With chip seal, the heated asphalt emulsion is applied directly to the carefully smoothed road surface and immediately overlaid with a thin layer (or layers) of granite rock. The rock is then rolled into the sticky, warm as-

phalt. As the asphalt emulsion cools and cures, it locks the rock to the road surface.

Hot-mix asphalt can be applied year round and immediately opened to all traffic without restrictions. Chip seal should be applied only in warm weather. To avoid damage during the short curing phase, traffic is usually limited to light vehicles traveling slowly. So most area paving contractors no longer apply chip seal. Jefferson County is fortunate to have found a specialty paving company with two generations of chip seal experience and a stellar reputation.

The life of a properly installed chip seal road depends primarily on traffic conditions. The road shown on page one is over forty years old, still in excellent condition—and it has more traffic, including heavy truck traffic, than any road Jefferson County is currently targeting for paving.

Heavy, fast, high volume traffic is often the enemy of chip seal. Such traffic may loosen the rock from its asphalt base, generating the need to resurface. That's why hot-mix asphalt surfaces are commonly used in such circumstances.

Hot-mix asphalt has its limitations, too. Exposure to water and sun oxidize and deteriorate the petroleum-based asphalt

surface. It starts to crack. Even light traffic can then break it up. That doesn't happen with the granite surfaces of chip seal roads. So chip seal often outlasts hot-mix asphalt on low traffic roads like the ones we are about to pave.

#### GETTING MORE MILES WITH CHIP SEAL

It will cost Jefferson County about \$140,000 per mile to prepare and pave a hot-mix asphalt road (or \$170,000 if a contractor does the preparation work, too). The same road paved with chip seal will cost about \$100,000. So we should be able to get about 40% more paved roads if we use only chip seal.

At the last County Commission meeting, I made a motion to chip seal pave all four of the roads our Road Department has prepared for paving. At the request of a Commissioner, that motion was modified to pave one road with hot-mix asphalt. That exception could open a Pandora's Box, with other groups demanding the more expensive surface treatment, too. Hopefully, the Commission will resist the temptation to cut service to the many to satisfy the demands of a few.

We just borrowed \$4.5 million for road improvements. Those funds can go a long way toward improving the drivability of our dirt roads and the convenience of the citizens who live on them while still maintaining the rural charm of our county—if we spend that money carefully and wisely.

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required match for certain grants, the Qualified Target Industry Tax Refund Program, the Quick Response Training Program and the Quick Response Training Program for participants in the welfare transition program, among others.

Jefferson County is part of the third RACEC, or the North Central Rural Area of Critical Economic Concern, which is also comprised of Baker, Bradford, Columbia, Dixie, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Lafayette, Levy, Madison, Putnam, Suwannee, Taylor and Union counties.

The other two RACECs in the state are the Northwest Rural Area of Critical Economic Concern and the South Central Rural Area of Critical Economic Concern. Jefferson County has been a RACEC designated county since the early the 2000s.

On a related issue, Conley reported that Jefferson County had been awarded a \$175,000 Rural Infrastructure Fund Grant for completion of the retention pond at the industrial park, the completion of which is a necessary step to facilitate the relocation here of American Hunter Inc., a Tallahassee based company that sells sporting goods via the Internet.

The Jefferson County Commission last year committed to borrowing \$800,000 to construct a building for American Hunter Inc. at the industrial park to lure the company here.

Conley told the commission that staff was in the process of developing the specifications for the building and said expectations were that bids would be received within 45 or so days. The idea is that American Hunter will eventually purchase the building.

"The project is finally going to happen," Conley said, referring to the more than two-year effort to get American Hunter here.

Meanwhile, Conley added, she was pursuing other funding sources in order to help offset as much as possible of the county's construction cost for the building.

The aim of the Rural Infrastructure Fund Grant is to facilitate the planning, preparing and financing of traditional economic development or nature-based tourism infrastructure projects that encourage job creation and capital investment in rural communities.

Finally, Conley reported that the community had been well represented at a recent meeting of the North Florida Economic Development Partnership (NFEDP) at Florida Gateway College in Lake City. Representing this community at the meeting, along with Conley, were Commissioner Hines Boyd, Mayor Idella Scott, Councilman John Jones, and School Board Member Larry Halsey.

Conley said that during the NFEDP meeting, she had recognized the Jefferson County contingent and acknowledged appreciation for their individual commitments to economic development in this community.

The NFEDP is a regional economic development organization that focuses on improving the economy in the Third RACEC. A public/private, the partnership is comprised of local economic developers, county commissioners, workforce development boards, regional planning councils and private businesses.

Such a designation wouldn't make for a drastic change from the way that things are done now relative to historic properties, City Clerk Emily Anderson, who is more or less fronting the proposal, told the City Council on Tuesday evening, Feb. 5.

But the designation could benefit the city in terms of state grants and technical assistance and training, Anderson said. And it could also translate into tax exemptions for property owners who undertook renovations of historic structures, she said.

It would, however, require that members of the Monticello Historic Design Review Board have a certain level of expertise and that this board adopt certain rules of procedures, she said.

Possibly the biggest change, Anderson said, was that the Historic Design Review Board would become the final authority on certificates of appropriateness for restorations and demolitions, as opposed to what it does now, which is make recommendations to the council.

Of course, the review board's decisions could always be appealed to the council, Anderson said. Which, in effect, made the council ultimately the final arbiter, she said.

Among others of the CLG requirements, Anderson said, were that three of the design review board's members must live within the historic district, that one must be an architect, and that the board must meet at least four times a year.

The council instructed Anderson and legal staff to proceed with exploration of the designation and the drafting of the proposed ordinance for the sake of advancing the possibility, with special attention to be paid to the responses of the design review board's current members.

The council also authorized Anderson to reimburse the registration fee to any member of the review board, the council or staff who attended a coming conference on the CLG program in Tallahassee.

Enacted in 1980 as part of the National Historic Preservation Act Amendments, the CLG program links federal, state and local governments in a preservation partnership whose expressed purpose is the identification, evaluation and protection of historic properties.

Designation as a CLG entity entails making historic preservation a public policy through adoption of a historic preservation ordinance and establishment of a historic preservation board to develop and oversee the functions of a historic preservation program.

Since its inception in 1986, Florida's CLG program has reportedly assisted in the survey, designation and preservation of thousands of historic and cultural resources and helped to increase public awareness of historic preservation. Participation in the program also impacts on local planning processes, as governments in Florida must address historic preservation in their comprehensive planning decisions.

Florida cities and counties that are Certified Local Governments are eligible to apply for special matching grants from the Bureau of Historic Preservation to assist their preservation programs.

### WHAT DO NEW TAX LAWS MEAN TO YOU?

As you know, the U.S. Congress has adopted some measures to help avoid the much-feared "fiscal cliff." At this point, important spending decisions have been put off, but new tax laws are in place — and, as an investor, you'll want to know just how this legislation will affect you.

Let's look at the impact of the tax laws on three different income levels:

**Up to \$200,000/\$250,000** — If you earn less than \$200,000 (if you're single) or \$250,000 (if you're married and file jointly), your income tax bracket will not change, nor will the tax rates assessed on dividends you receive from stocks or long-term capital gains you receive from selling investments that have appreciated in value. However, a 3.8% Medicare tax will apply to the lesser of your net investment income or your modified adjusted gross income in excess of the \$200,000 or \$250,000 levels, respectively.

**\$250,000 — \$400,000** — If your adjusted gross income is at or more than \$250,000 (for single filers) or \$300,000 (for married couples), your itemized deductions will begin to phase out, as will your personal exemption deductions, possibly resulting in higher effective tax rates. And the 3.8% Medicare tax will apply to part, or all, of your investment income. But your tax bracket stays the same, as do the tax rates on dividends and capital gains.

**\$400,000/\$450,000** — If you earn at least \$400,000 (if you're single) or \$450,000 (if you're married), you will be subject to the phase-out of deductions described above. More importantly, however, your marginal tax rate will rise from 35% to 39.6%. Plus, taxes on qualified dividends and long-term capital gains will rise from 15% to 20% — or, actually, 23.8%, when the 3.8% Medicare tax is added in. Consequently, you may have some decisions to make; at a minimum, you'll need to know how the new rates might — or might not — affect your investment choices. For example, if you rely on bonds to provide a source of income, be aware that your interest payments — taxed at your marginal tax rate — will now be taxed more heavily. As for capital gains, the slightly higher rates now give you even more incentive to be a "buy-and-hold" investor, which is usually a good strategy for most people. And the increase in dividend taxes doesn't detract from the key benefit of dividends — namely the ability to provide a potential source of rising income that can help keep you ahead of inflation. Keep in mind that dividends can be increased, decreased or eliminated at anytime without notice.

Overall, the changes in investment-related taxes are probably less substantial than many people had anticipated. And in any case, taxes are but a single component of investment decisions — and usually not the most important one. Rather than let taxes drive your investment choices, focus instead on whether a particular investment is appropriate for your individual situation, and if it fits your risk tolerance, and if it helps you diversify your portfolio. Diversification can help you reduce the effects of market volatility, though it can't guarantee profits or protect against loss.

Still, the new tax legislation is significant, so you should consult with your financial advisor and tax professional to determine what moves, if any, you may want to make. It's always wise to be up-to-date on what's happening in Washington — especially when lawmakers' decisions can affect your ability to achieve your important financial goals.

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## Seed Time Harvest Farm

Hi family and friends, and thanks to those of you who placed orders last week. We appreciate the support you give to our farmers by purchasing produce through our Community Supported Agricultural (CSA) program.

Seed Time Harvest is the brainchild of Cetta Barnhart who saw a need to bring awareness to the wonderful produce growing in the fields of many farmers in Monticello and Jefferson County. Farmers who have been growing produce for any number of years had traditionally grown the same items seasonally that generated enough income to keep them going. Most would sell to the same customer base year after year increasing their market by word of mouth. However, at the end of the season, there would always, always be an abundance of produce that would go to waste because there was more food produced than there were customers to consume it.

The vision of Seed Time Harvest is threefold. 1) To reduce the amount of food being wasted in the fields; 2) to increase the sustainability of farmers mainly in Jefferson County and the surrounding areas; and 3) build a consumers market to share information on where to obtain fresh local produce at a reasonable cost.

The delivery service is a kicker. Understanding our consumers busy lives, we wanted to bring the

convenience of shopping online while adding the personal touch of seeing someone hand deliver your items on a weekly or as needed basis, your choice. This would also give you a personal source to relay information if things went well or if things went wrong. And there have been times when things went wrong... for instance last week we discovered to never store broccoli in freezer storage bags. The gases build up and give off a horrific smell. (Lesson learned? - revamped packaging).

Seed Time Harvest is connected with organizations like the Tallahassee Food Network, FAMU, and the University of Florida who are land-grant institutions. These resources help to gather and disseminate information to farmers sharing ways to help them increase their production and variety types, expand their knowledge of the best growing methods using natural growing practices (least or best chemical applications) and ways to continue nurturing their soil as they grow food year after year. We also provide the technical assistance needed at times to help farmers meet specific requirements for selling to larger markets. This is done through the Jefferson County Farmer's Alliance. Not all farmers have to be a part, but it sure can be a benefit in expanding their services and access to new markets.

What that means for



participants of Seed Time Harvest is that you have direct contact with local growers who are as concerned about what they are feeding your family as they are concerned about feeding their own. I don't know a farmer who doesn't eat what they grow, at least not in Jefferson County or the region we serve. You get the unique service of having fresh produce harvested no more than 1-2 day prior to delivery straight to your home or business.

In addition, you will be privy to food parties and demonstrations on what to do with fresh produce. From talking with some of our customers, we realize that sometimes you might not know what to do with a rutabaga, turnip root, or beet. You might not even know the difference between them. Your memory bank says "YUCK" or "What do I do with that?" So, you sit back and don't order! Seed Time Harvest, along with the Tallahassee Food Network, will be working together to host events in Jefferson, Leon, and Gadsden counties that will teach you what to do with these wonderful veggies. They are packed full of nutrients and are 'good eats' when cooked properly in a unique and fun way.

We have a wonderful chef. Chef Shac will be working with us on this venture. These food demonstrations will be hosted at different farms, farmers markets and venues in the three county areas. This expanded service is due in part to a grant received along with the Tallahassee Food Network to promote farmer's markets and food out-

reach services. You'll be hearing more about this in the future.

Seed Time Harvest is also preparing its fields as an education and demonstration sites for community gardens and other growing projects. Our website (so soon to come) will show you the progress we are making on this venture. In the meantime, you can visit our Facebook page at Seed Time Harvest Farms. When ready, hopefully by early Spring, we will offer opportunity for families, small organizations, schools, daycares, and other groups to lease garden plots for seasonal growing and schedule trips to participate and learn about the business of farming.

This will be a busy year and we look to having you be a part of it. We really can't do it without you. If no one shows up for the party, then it's considered a flop! So, here's our guarantee... everything we do at Seed Time Harvest will be fresh and fabulous! It's our job to make that happen. It's your job to show up and participate. We really look forward to serving you very soon. Winn Dixie has a slogan that says, "If you like our service, tell your friends. If you don't like our service, tell us." I like that. 
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


