New Lloyd Stage Aims To Make Interchange A Happening Place

Looking for something to do this Memorial Day weekend? Consider attending the music festival set to take place at the newly erected outdoor stage and adjacent grounds just west of the Economy Lodge Motel at I-10 and SR-59 in Lloyd.

Scheduled to run 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. Sunday and Monday, May 26-27, the show will feature several recorded Southern Soul artists, including Lebrado, Karen Wolfe, Terry Wright and Andre Lee.

Described as a type of soul music that is rooted in the South and derives from the classic rhythm and blues of the 60s, Southern soul supposedly also combines elements

of soul, jazz and early rock and roll to create a sound all its own. Its practitioners cite among its pioneers the likes of Ray Charles and James Brown, as well as Little Willie John, Bobby "Blue" Bland, New Orleans R&B artist Allen Toussaint and Memphis DJ Rufus Thomas.

Lebrado, Wolfe and Wright are among today's batch of performers carrying on the music genre.

The Lloyd Pavilion, as the new stage is called, is a collaborative effort of Capital City Truck Plaza owner/operator Arun Kundra and longtime entertainment impresario and Lloyd native David Hall.

How the idea came about: Hall was putting up flyers for an upcoming

event he was promoting and Kundra, who knew Hall but not of his impresario role, asked what the latter was doing. The two got to talking, one thing led to another, and the next thing they were planning to collaborate.

Kundra contributed the land, engineering expertise relative construction of the pavilion, and also helped with establishing the governing policies for use of the facility and contributed financial resources. Hall, for his part, brings the musical connections and know-how of recruiting and booking acts, as well as investing his money, time, energy and sweat equity into the construction of the pavilion and associated. County Looking To Reduce Costs Of Having Company Move Here

The pursuit of the relocation here of American Hunter Inc. continues, with the latest twist the recent adoption of two resolutions by the Jefferson County Commission, as required by the USDA Rural Development.

The two resolutions in support of the project were part of the requirements for \$199,999 in federal funding that Economic Development Director Julie Conley is seeking from Rural Development to help offset some of the county's costs in the construction of a warehouse and office building at the industrial park to get American Hunter Inc. here.

The first resolution, as Conley explained it in an attached memorandum, affirmed the county's resolve not to allow use of the building to be constructed by any business whose relocation to the industrial park would cause the transfer of jobs from another area, "resulting in an increase in unemployment in the (first) area."

The resolution further underscored the county's determination "not to allow the premises to be used for the production of goods or services for which there is insufficient demand."

The second resolution, among other things, affirmed the county's willingness to contribute an estimated \$1,632,150 towards the realization of

having American Hunter relocate here.

That commitment, Conley clarified, would not require the county to expend any new monies on the project. Rather, the affirmation was recognition of the investments that the county had already made to bring the company here, in terms of the \$800,000 it was borrowing to construct the building and the infrastructure and other improvements it had made to the industrial park property. In return, Conley explained, the county stood to be awarded \$199,999, which would go to reduce the county's investment.

Conley reported that preparations for construction of the building that American Hunter would

occupy at the industrial park continued moving forward. She said it was the expectation that construction of the building would begin soon.

American Hunter is a Tallahassee-based retail and distribution company that sells sporting goods via the Internet.

Conley has called the company a "poster child" of the kind of business that Jefferson County wants to attract.

"It's family owned; it's a clean industry; it pays good wages; and it brings dollars from outside," Conley said.

The plan ultimately is to have American Hunter purchase the building that the county will construct at the industrial park.

Crash Caused By Mobile Phone

A two-vehicle crash occurred over the weekend when the driver of one of the vehicles was distracted by his mobile phone.

Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) reported that on May 4 at 10:30 a.m., Tyler J. Caton, 24, of Monticello, was driving a 2005 Chevrolet 1500, traveling northbound on US-27, half as mile south of Gamble Road, in the outside northbound lane.

Cassandra M. Norton, 35, of Monticello, was driving a 2000 Mazda Protégé traveling northbound at a slower rate of speed, in front of Caton's vehicle. In the vehicle, as a passenger, was Kenneth L. Norton, 50, also of Monticello.

Caton's vehicle overtook Norton's vehicle, and the front of Caton's vehicle struck the rear of Norton's vehicle.

The impact caused Norton's vehicle to travel onto the east shoulder of the roadway, in a northerly direction. The front of Norton's vehicle then struck a fence. The vehicle came to rest facing northeast on the east shoulder of the roadway.

Caton's vehicle came to a controlled stop on the east shoulder of US-27.

Caton explained that he was distracted by his mobile phone while driving. He was charged with careless driving.

FHP did not deem the crash to be alcohol-related.

All involved were wearing their seatbelts and sustained no injuries.

Caton's vehicle sustained \$1,000 damage.

Norton's vehicle sustained \$7,000 damage.

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office and Jefferson County EMS assisted FHP Trooper JD Smith on the scene.

Main St. Program Gets National Accreditation

Main Street Monticello, the local group dedicated to the revitalization of the downtown district, continues scoring successes.

In its latest achievement, Main Street Monticello has been designated an accredited National Main Street Program by the National Main Street Center, a subsidiary of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The designation is in recognition of the local organization meeting the center's revitalization performance standards.

"This took hard work by the Main Street Board and the support and encouragement of the people of Monticello and Jefferson County," Dr. Anne Holt, Main Street Monticello program manager, said about the designation on Monday, May 6.

Each year, according to the National Main Street Center, it and its partners accredit Main Street programs across the country that are deemed to have built strong revitalization organizations and demonstrated their ability to use a Main Street Four Point Approach methodology, which is designed to strengthen local economies and protect historic buildings.



"Accredited Main Street programs are meeting the challenges of the downtown in the economy head on, and are successfully using a focused, comprehensive revitalization strategy to keep their communities vibrant and sustainable," Valeria Crisafulli is quoted saying. Crisafulli is the center's acting director.

The way the accreditation process works, Main Street Florida and the National Main Street Center each year jointly evaluate the performances of this state's local organizations and identify those whose programs meet the 10 performance standards.

As defined by the center, these are standards that set the benchmarks for measuring the individual Main Street program's

ted structures.

Hall, by his own telling, has been booking professional musical acts for some 20 years, part of the time in the Tampa area and the last eight or so years in Lloyd and Tallahassee, "pulling together festival, parties and special events."

Hall, in fact, was behind the musical events staged in the baseball field near SR-59 and US 90, a situation that triggered complaints from at least one neighboring property owner because of the noise and traffic congestion in the area.

Hall and Kundra offer assurance that such problems won't be repeated at the new location in Lloyd, as there is more than sufficient parking space for attendees, the site is relatively isolated, and the hours of operation will be limited to daytime and early evening. Too, deputies and other security personnel will be on hand to monitor the situation and only ticket holders will be permitted on the grounds.

Hall and Kundra point out that the area of the Lloyd pavilion is fenced and will contain a concession stand, where festivalgoers can purchase refreshments, snacks and other food items. Festivalgoers can also take advantage of the several picnic tables that will be available, or they can stretch out blankets, pitch up tents or erect umbrellas on the ample grounds adjacent to the stage.

The idea, as Hall and Kundra tell it, is to spark economic activity in the interchange area, considered a prime location because of its proximity to Tallahassee. The two talk of holding not only music festivals, but possibly also hosting auto shows, dog shows, graduation parties, family reunions, wedding parties or whatever proves popular and people want. Call this Lloyd's bid for economic development.

"We need to do something interesting to bring more people here," says Kundra, who takes hope from the generally improving economy and continues moving forward on his plans to expand and upgrade the entire truck stop facility.

Hall, who will be operations manager for the pavilion, seconds the sentiment.

"We want to bring events that usually go to Tallahassee and keep the money here," he says. "Whatever we do, it has to make sense for the motel and the Lloyd economy."

He points out the most cities provide these types of venues and forums for

entertainment and they are proving successful. Equally important, the two say, they are undertaking the venture with their own money, absent any public funds, which they say speak well for the entrepreneurial spirit.

What they ask from the community is input. If you like what they are doing, let them know, they say. Or if people want to see different acts or types of events staged at the pavilion, let them know that also.

"If it makes sense, we'll do it," says Hall, expressing his willingness to bring artists from music genres other than southern soul, including country, jazz or whatever the public wants. He asks that folks call him at (850) 264-7951 or email him at Lloydpavilion@yahoo.com.

Hall and Kundra will hold an inaugural neighborhood party at the pavilion from 3 to 7 p.m. Saturday, May 18.

As for the Memorial Day festivities, tickets are \$20 for a single day or \$35 for the two days.

application of the Four Point Approach to commercial district revitalization.

According to the center, the evaluation criteria determines the communities that are building comprehensive and sustainable revitalization efforts and that include standards such as developing a mission, fostering strong public-private partnerships, securing an operating budget, tracking economic progress and preserving historic buildings.

Main Street Monticello describes itself as being dedicated to the revitalization of downtown Monticello and Jefferson County.

"We have a hard-working board of directors and dedicated volunteers, each a dues-paying member," Dr. Holt said. "Growth of our membership and volunteers have made it possible for us to add programs for Monticello and Jefferson County and maintain the re-

quirements of national accreditation. Without this financial and volunteer support, it would be impossible for us to plan new programs, attend conferences, collect data and make the required reports to support the honor of national recognition for Monticello and Jefferson County."

Established by the National Trust for Historic Preservation in 1980, the National Main Street Center helps communities of all sizes revitalize their older and historic commercial districts.



Remembering "The Good Ol' Days"

"Be it known," Stan Monroe writes with unusual formality and grandeur, "that I agreed to this 'Old Folks' interview having not yet reached the 'golden years.' This is acknowledgement of how long I have been paying attention and not evidence that I am (yet) old!"

Despite his alleged youth, Monroe is a tiger who has earned his whiskers. Monroe has lived in the Monticello area for his entire 55 years, going to school, attending church, working cattle, and playing with his brothers and sisters—blood relatives and com-

munity members alike.

You see, "Waukeenah was (and is) a close-knit community where neighbors and kin joyfully help one another in good times and bad," Monroe states. "The ills of childhood—later named ADD, ADHD, etc.—were cured with hugs and with switches. These were lovingly applied, with generosity, by whatever caring adult that was nearby. They didn't need permission or parental consent—they were born with it!"

Monroe grew up in a younger—though perhaps busier—Waukeenah, where one might visit, "Mr. Ralph Groom's Store, where a dime could buy more candy than a boy

needed and Mr. Oliver Andrews grocery which featured fresh meats, hand cut and artfully wrapped. Mr. Wayne Walker had a gas station in Capps at that time."

Monroe didn't grow up in the stores, though he visited them often enough—he grew up on his family farm. "Farm life was good with a healthy dose of responsibility and hard work. Farm chores included raising and tending livestock. Cattle were tended from horseback. With a decent horse, and a good dog, 'strays' had no choice but to be gathered with the herd," Monroe said. But some chores were a little too tough for a young boy to handle on his own.

Monroe fondly recounts his parents' brand of child raising. "Daddy was always nearby with strong, capable hands when a chore was just too difficult. His advice was always measured to allow freedom to learn from mistakes. Mama was an extraordinary homemaker. She cooked, canned, and sewed to keep us well fed and tended. She had a soft spot for folks who were down on their luck or just needed help."

Even between farm chores, the family found time to attend church. Said Monroe, "Waukeenah United Methodist Church (WUMC) has now been a community bedrock for 175 years. My great grandparents came to Waukeenah in 1904 and soon

joined WUMC. Daddy joined as a young man, and mama joined after they were married in 1955," recalled Monroe.

"We [Stephen and his siblings] were raised in the Church. We didn't think to not go, as [attendance] was expected—and enjoyed. Not only did we attend, but we [also] participated.

Lines were learned and parts rehearsed for skits and plays. Waukeenah women ran the church programs.

"Mr. Sam Grantham was there every Sunday helping in many ways. Delano Buzbee joined the church as an adult and spent his last years in grand service to the

church and community. Mr. Melvin Buzbee caught and donated mullet for our fish, which we still have every fall. Other men of the community also gave of their time and talents for years.

Daddy never sent us to church, he took us to church and helped keep it running. Their ample example set the tone for my life and others'. Sadly, the boys who were sent to church seemed to drift away as they grew older."

Monroe is still an active member of WUMC, where he sings bass in the choir and is a beloved Sunday school teacher. The community knows him for his well-timed jokes and service. He is also noted for—you guessed it—"his moustache," according to WUMC Pastor Donald Thompson Jr.



Choose To Be Happy

"There is something rotten in the state of Denmark." That is a centuries old phrase from William Shakespeare's masterpiece, "Hamlet." Going back to your high school English class, you might remember that strange things were indeed going on in Hamlet's world.

His father, the Danish king, had been murdered. His uncle was behind the conspiracy and had taken over the country. Ghosts and apparitions were visiting the castle. One of the characters finally states the obvious: "Something is fishy around here." Denmark has smelled rotten ever since.

But in reality, Denmark doesn't stink at all. It's a wonderful place. In fact, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, and the Scandinavian nations of Northern Europe are officially the happiest countries in the world. This seems so counterintuitive to me. No offense to the Scandinavians, but when I think of happy places, the cities of the Nordic north do not quickly come to mind. Nevertheless, the statistics don't lie.

Every year the Legatum Institute in London publishes its annual Prosperity Index that gauges the happiness level of the world's countries. Consistently, Denmark, Norway and the sister Scandinavian nations are at the top of the heap. On the other end of the scale, the countries of Haiti, Afghanistan, the Congo, and the Central African Republic have more than a stench to deal with. These countries are consistently at the bottom of the happiness list, reflecting terrible misery for their populations.

If you are curious, the United States is currently ranked 12th on the Prosperity Index. Not too bad, but we were much happier in the near past. We have been sliding downward for some time now. Our society as a whole is not as happy as it once was, and honestly I don't think that comes as much of a surprise.

While this survey says a lot about societal happiness, it says hardly anything at all about personal happiness. You can be a

healthy, wealthy, free and secure Norwegian and be absolutely miserable. You can be a Haitian child living half-starved on the streets of Port au Prince and be filled with wondrous joy.

You can be a comfortable, successful, suburban, mortgage-paying, SUV-driving husband of one and father of two and be wretchedly unhappy. You can be a poor immigrant, a single mother with four children living in squalor, scraping for every meal, and be as happy as a singing bird in a tree.

Happiness is affected by our environment. That much is true. Happiness is a product of our genetics (scientists say that an elongated 5HTT gene will make you happier on average than most). But ultimately, barring emotional or mental dysfunction, happiness is a choice we make. No, we don't live in Scandinavia. We have no control over our chromosomal makeup. We can't do anything about our age and very little to change our personal economics. There are simply some things we cannot change.

But, there are other things we can do something about. We can opt to live near our friends. We can decide to practice gratitude. We can do work we find fulfilling. We can opt

out of the blame game, and quit holding God, life, circumstances, past lovers, ex-wives, former business partners, parents, and reality responsible for doing us in.

We can make choices that will lead us toward becoming happy, joyful people or we can make choices that will result in us becoming chronically unhappy people. Regardless, that choice belongs to each and every one of us.

It was Viktor Frankl, famed Jewish Holocaust survivor and brilliant Austrian psychiatrist, who best articulated the power of choice in personal happiness. Reflecting upon his time in the concentration camps he wrote, "Everything can be taken from a man but one thing: the last of human freedoms - to choose one's attitude in any given set of circumstances."

If you want to be happy you don't have to move to Northern Europe or wait for science to alter your genetics. But you do have to choose to be happy, and no one else can make that choice for you.


