TDC To Make Presence Known At Tourism Event

Jefferson County Tourist Development Council (TDC) Coordinator Nancy Wideman will be one of the many tourism and hospitality industry representatives participating in the Florida Tourism Day at the State Capitol this Wednesday, March 12.

Designed to celebrate the significance of Florida's tourism industry, the daylong event will include food and refreshments, live music and other activities. But the greater underlying message that

the industry wants to convey is the importance of tourism to the state's economy.

According to the Partnership for Florida's Tourism, which is sponsoring the event, preliminary estimates indicate that 94.7 million visitors came to Florida in 2013, making it a record year that far exceeded the previous high of 91.5 million visitors.

Wideman said she planned to share information about Jefferson County, Visit Florida and Visit Natural North Florida with Senators Bill Montford and Charles Dean and House Representatives

Halsey Beshears and Michelle Rehwinkel-Vasilinda, among others.

"I'm getting together a list of talking points," Wideman said on Friday, March 7.

Ten statewide associations are participating in the event, including the Florida Restaurant and Lodging Association, Visit Florida, the Florida Association of Destination Marketing Organizations, Florida Association of RV Parks and Campgrounds, the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and Film Florida.

Members of the various organizations will be meeting with legislators one-on-one throughout the day to press for the full funding of tourism, hospitality, and marketing programs in the coming legislative session. They will also emphasize the point that tourism generates jobs and generates revenues for the state and small communities such as Monticello.

The TDC is the main tourism promoting entity in Jefferson County. It is funded by a tax imposed on the tourism and hospitality industry in the county.

Florida Joins Ongoing Gulf Oil Spill Litigation

What impact it may have in the long run, or at the local level for that matter, is largely conjecture at this point, as is much having to do with the ongoing litigation and supposed millions that are expected to come eventually from the government and oil companies settlements over the 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

For what's it worth, however, Florida on Wednesday, March 5, joined the multi-state federal litigation currently pending in the Eastern District of Louisiana over the nearly four-year-old oil spill. Filing the suit against BP and other

entities involved in the oil spill were the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) and Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).

The two agencies' complaint reportedly name BP, Anadarko, and Transocean as defendants, holding the three responsible for environmental harm to the state's coastal ecology and associated environmental and recreational opportunities.

This most recent complaint follows the suit that the Attorney General's Office filed separately last year. The Attorney General's suit deals with economic losses to the state as a result of the oil spill. Please See OIL SPILL Page 3

City & FMB Resolve Issue Of Subdivision

City officials and Farmers and Merchants Bank (FMB) have come to an agreement regarding the uncompleted subdivision named Bide-a-Wee on the easternmost part of town.

It happened at the Monticello City Council on Tuesday evening, March 4.

Based on the recommendation of City Manager Steve Wingate, who determined it would cost about \$37,000 to put in the sewer line that the subdivision still lacks, city officials and FMB representative Mike Rogers agreed that the developer — presumably FMB, which currently owns the property, or whomever the purchaser, should FMB sell it in the interim — will be responsible for installing the line.

The sewer line, what's more, must be installed before any buildings can go up on the seven remaining undeveloped lots that make up the subdivision.

In return, the city will reimburse the developer for the cost of the installation from the system development charges that it collects from residences when these connect to the city's sewer system.

City officials made it clear that the reimbursements won't be immediate nor will the system development charges from the seven lots be enough to reimburse the developer in total for the cost of installing the system; but it will go a ways.

FMB agreed to the deal for the sake of getting the final plat approved and expediting the development, which has been dormant since Please See AGREEMENT Page 3

Florida's Finances Strong, Says New Report

The fiscal condition of Florida's state government is in good shape as evidenced by a new study that ranks the state sixth overall in the nation, though there are some limitations with the report's findings, according to Florida TaxWatch.

"Florida continues to manage its finances very responsibly," said Dominic M. Calabro, president and CEO of Florida TaxWatch, the independent, nonpartisan, non-profit taxpayer research institute and government watchdog organization. "This report is

further evidence that Florida's fiscal house is in order.

Florida's top ranking from the study is consistent with the state's excellent bond ratings, such as a "AAA" rating from Standard and Poor's, the highest rating available. A good indication of financial health, the state has received the top rating since 2005.

While the analysis of the report by Florida TaxWatch yielded a similar conclusion, it also raised some questions. Florida's high ranking in cash and budget solvency is not surprising, due to state's significant cash reserves, the balanced budget requirement in the Florida constitution, and the way the legislature dealt with the revenue shortfalls during the recession.

However, Florida's low long-run solvency ranking is surprising, as Florida has the fifth-lowest combined tax supported debt and unfunded pension liabilities in the nation. Florida's number two ranking in service-level solvency is likely overestimated by the report, and TaxWatch questions if that index is meaningful. TaxWatch also points out that it is very difficult to adequately compare state governments without considering the role local governments have in providing public services. Florida has the second largest reliance on local governments in the nation, measured by local government's share of total state and local revenue (55.6 percent).

spill. The latest suit seeks to hold the named defendants accountable for oil spill related injuries to the state's environment. Meanwhile, the FDEP on March 3 began soliciting grant applications to fund stormwater projects and other "non-point source" management practices, a process that it will continue through May 23. The solicitation follows the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) recent award of a \$6.14 million grant to the FDEP intended to be used to assist local governments accomplish water quality restoration projects. The EPA's formula-based funding is specifically intended for the protection and restoration of watersheds affected by non-point source pollution — or pollutants transported by urban and agricultural stormwater runoff. Examples of such pollutants would be fertilizers, pesticides, animal waste and septic tank discharges. Projects eligible for these so-called 319 grants include urban stormwater retrofits; septic tank pollution abatement; silviculture (forestry) best management practices; erosion and sediment control projects; and low impact development.

The funds may be awarded for construction, project-related monitoring and project-related public education. Not eligible for the funding are the costs of the project design, engineering, land acquisition, and activities required by federal permit. Project sponsors must provide a minimum 40 percent non-federal match, which may come from local expenditures on in-kind services such as staff time and contract administration, as well as design, engineering, monitoring, or public education. Other federal funds and land acquisition costs may not be used as match. State agencies, local governments, colleges and universities, non-profit organizations, public utilities and water management districts may sponsor projects. Awards are targeted at projects designed to restore "impaired" springs, rivers, lakes, and estuaries — water bodies that do not meet Florida's stringent water quality standards. The Department ranks projects for funding based on estimated pollutant load reductions.

the mid 2000s. The way the council left the matter on Tuesday evening, the attorney for FMB, in conjunction with City Attorney Bruce Leinback, will draft the agreement for presentation to the council at its next meeting on April 1, at which time the final plat should be approved. The reason for the unusual agreement — which applies only to the sewer line, not the already installed water line — goes back to the circumstances surrounding the original

approval of the development about 2005. Those circumstances involved vagueness and ambiguity in the legal language spelling out the contractual responsibilities of the city and developer, leaving open to interpretation which of two was ultimately responsible for installation of the sewer line. Subsequently, the recession happened; the developer forfeited on the project, which is how FMB came to own the property; and the subdivision languished, except for the development of a few of the

original 11 lots. FMB's attempt to revive the project comes in light of the perceived economic recovery and its institutional hope of recouping some financial benefit from the property. City officials had conditionally approved the final plat in December, pending the resolution of the sewer line issue. Bide-a-Wee means "Stay a While". The subdivision is located on the easternmost side of the city, between Pearl and Washington streets.



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Man Drinks Beer After Deadly Snake Bite

In Yeppoon, Australia, a man bitten by an eastern brown snake, instead of calling for help, decided instead to have a cold beer. Rodney Somerville was gardening at his home when the deadly snake bit him on the finger. After hitting the snake in the head with a shovel, the 54-year-old decided to have at least one last beer. "I said to myself, if I'm going to cark it, I'm going to have a beer, so I got a Goldie out of the fridge and drank that; 'cause you know eastern browns are the second most venomous snake in the world," Somerville said. "If you panic it makes it worse." He called the ambulance and was given the anti-venom, but suffered an allergic reaction to the medicine and is still in the hospital three weeks later, which Somerville calls a "double whammy."

Man Trapped In Storm Drain Two Days Chasing \$20 Bill




