Proposal Calls For Reducing Planning Dept's Permit Fees

It's still in the early stages — commissioners, in fact, only received the proposal two weeks ago — but if they embrace the proposed changes as expected, Planning Department permits fees should soon see a reduction.

Coordinator Parish Barwick and Planning Official Bill Tellefsen reportedly

had been in the process of reworking the fees for months. But Commissioner Benny Bishop also had something to do with it. Bishop, it seems, has been quietly pressing behind the scenes for a reduction of the fees, which he believes are somewhat burdensome and don't always reflect the service rendered.

Crashes One Third More Than Usual

Florida Highway Patrol reported that within the 24-hour period of Sunday, March 16, crashes in both Jefferson and Madison counties were one third higher than normal. Both counties were experiencing light to moderate rain during the afternoon and evening.



Rainfall in the two neighboring counties are usually about the same. It was reported that in a 24-hour period, Jefferson County received 3.57 inches of rain.

In Madison County, there were 18 crashes. Six of those crashes resulted in road blockage, and there was only one

incident which involved someone being injured.

In Jefferson County, there were 20 crashes. Four of the crashes resulted in road blockages, and only two involved anyone being injured.

Now, in comparison, last year, exactly one year ago on Sunday, March 17, 2013, Jefferson County set the record for FHP crashes, which kept law enforcement hopping for several hours.

FHP Lt. David Folsom, who is over Jefferson, Madison, and Taylor counties, reported that within a span of six miles on I-10, and within a four-hour period, there were Please See CRASHES Page 3

State Formally Charges Scott

The State Attorney's office recently filed formal charges against former Mayor Idella Scott, stemming from her arrest last November.

Assistant State Attorney John Wilson told the Monticello News on Thursday, March 13,

that his office had just filed the formal charges the week before.

"It took a long time to research and straighten out the evidence," Wilson said in explanation of the time lapse. "We had to make sure that all the pieces were in place."

He said the formal charges weren't substantially different from the original charges, which were for forgery, uttering a forged instrument and grand theft. But the evidence now strengthened the state's case, he said.

As to whether the case would go to trial, Wilson said it was anyone's guess at this point.

"We're at the very beginning of the process," he said.

Great Friends And Good Food



My plate of Bombay Curry, made for me by my friend Judith, that I "personalized" with assorted condiments to suit my taste buds.

I was in Jacksonville this past weekend with a really good friend from my hometown. We were there for a seminar, and although we both gained a lot from it, we really enjoyed our free time together. We shared what had been happening in our lives, went to the beach, relaxed and soaked up our coveted down time and ate... and ate.

If you are passionate about food, one of the things you really enjoy, is to be with someone else who is also passionate about food, especially when eating. Needless to say, Judith and I are both very passionate about food and are both of the mind that when somewhere new, you never eat the same food twice, and if you can help it, never the same place twice. And, lucky for me, she loves a good dessert after a good meal. We ate and compared and experimented until it was time to leave. I dropped her off at the airport and we hugged good-

bye, with light hearts and full bellies.

My time with Judith made me think of a dish she first served me in her home and also surprised me with another time when my home in Arkansas was in shambles as I was packing to move here. Judith and her husband, a former pastor, are life-long missionaries and on one of their trips to Jamaica, was given this recipe from a fellow missionary, who had received the recipe from a good friend in Tanzania. The recipe charmed me because of the way it was served. A beef curry is prepared and served over rice in bowls and placed in front of you. On the table are various condiments you can choose and add to your bowl, creating a final dish, suited to your taste. It's much like when you have a fix-your-own pizza, where guests can create a pizza with individual ingredients they like, assuring everyone has a meal they love, and having fun in the process; this version is



just a little dressier. Having good friends over to eat is really fun for me, and this dish adds even more to the party. It also helps alleviate some of the pressure of having to second guess what someone does or doesn't like, as they can create their own plate. The original recipe calls for beef, but the next time I prepare it, I'm going to try it with chicken. The amount and type of condiments are totally up to you; add and delete, as you like. The most important thing when preparing this tasty dish is to serve with great friends.

Jamaican Curry

- 2 tbsp. vegetable oil
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, finely minced
- 2 lbs. sirloin steak, cubed
- 5 to 6 tbsp. curry powder
- 3 tbsp. flour
- 1/8 tsp. ground red pepper
- 1/8 tsp. ground black pepper
- 2 tbsp. molasses (or brown sugar)
- 2 tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 (28 oz.) can of tomatoes (diced or whole)
- Cooked rice to serve

In a Dutch oven combine oil, onion and garlic; cook until onion is translucent. Add steak and cook until browned. Stir in curry powder, flour, red and black pepper; cook about one minute. Add molasses and Worcestershire; stir until well blended. Add tomatoes. Add water just until meat is covered. Bring to a boil then reduce heat and simmer on very low heat until meat is tender. (Judith cooks her meat mixture in a crock-pot). Serve over cooked rice and serve with small bowls of condiments.

Condiment suggestions: chopped banana, chopped green onions, chopped green peppers, shredded coconut, chopped or whole peanuts, grated cheese, pineapple, raisins, chopped tomatoes, chutney.

A few years ago I read a special story called "The Room." I then ran it in both my Madison County and Jefferson County newspapers. The response I heard was overwhelming. The impact that one story can make is amazing.

I think of that story often, so I decided to re-run it again. For those of you who have never read it – read it. It is a good read. For those of you who read it a few years ago – it's worth the read again. It says so much more than what I could possibly try to write myself, so I've decided to share it again.

The Room...

In that place between wakefulness and dreams, I found myself in the room. There were no distinguishing features except for the one wall covered with small index card files. They were like the ones in libraries that list titles by author or subject in alphabetical order.

But these files, which stretched from floor to ceiling and seemingly endless in either direction, had very different headings. As I drew near the wall of files, the first to catch my attention was one that read "Girls I have liked." I opened it and began flipping through the cards. I quickly shut it, shocked to realize that I recognized the names written on each one.

And then without being told, I knew exactly where I was. This lifeless room with its small files was a crude catalog system for my life. Here were written the actions of my every moment, big and small, in a detail my memory couldn't match. A sense of wonder and curiosity, coupled with horror, stirred within me as I began randomly open-

ing files and exploring their content.

Some brought joy and sweet memories; others a sense of shame and regret so intense that I would look over my shoulder to see if anyone was watching.

A file named "Friends" was next to one marked "Friends I have betrayed." The titles ranged from the mundane to the outright weird "Books I Have Read," "Lies I have told," "Comfort I have given," "Jokes I have laughed at." Some were almost hilarious in their exactness: "Things I've yelled at my brothers." Others I couldn't laugh at: "Things I Have Done in My Anger" "Things I Have Muttered under My Breath at My Parents" I never ceased to be surprised by the contents.

Often there were many more cards than I expected. Sometimes fewer than I hoped. I was overwhelmed by the sheer volume of the life I had lived. Could it be possible that I had the time in my years to fill each of these thousands or even millions of cards? But each card confirmed this truth. Each was written in my own handwriting. Each signed with my signature.

When I pulled out the file marked "TV Shows I have watched" I realized the files grew to contain their contents. The cards were packed tightly and yet after two or three yards, I hadn't found the end of the file. I shut it, shamed, not so much by the quality of shows but more by the vast time I knew that file represented.

When I came to a file marked "Lustful Thoughts," I felt a chill run through my body. I pulled the file out only an inch, not willing to test its size and drew out a card. I shuddered at its detailed content.

I felt sick to think that such a moment had been recorded. An almost animal rage broke on me. One thought dominated my mind: No one must ever see these cards! No one must ever see this room! I have to destroy them!" In insane frenzy I yanked the file out. Its size didn't matter now. I had to empty it and burn the cards. But as I took it at one end and began pounding it on the floor, I could not dislodge a single card. I became desperate and pulled out a card, only to find it as strong as steel when I tried to tear it.

Defeated and utterly helpless, I returned the file to its slot. Leaning my forehead against the wall, I let out a long, self-pitying sigh.

And then I saw it. The title bore "People I Have Shared the Gospel with." The handle was brighter than those around it, newer, almost unused. I pulled on its handle and a small box not more

than three inches long fell into my hands. I could count the cards it contained on one hand. And then the tears came. I began to weep, sobs so deep that they hurt. They started in my stomach and shook through me. I fell on my knees and cried. I cried out of shame, from the overwhelming shame of it all. The rows of file shelves swirled in my tear-filled eyes. No one must ever, ever, know of this room. I must lock it up and hide the key. But then as I pushed away the tears, I saw Him.

No, please not Him. Not here. Oh, anyone but Jesus. I watched helplessly as He began to open the files and read the cards. I couldn't bear to watch His response. And in the moments I could bring myself to look at His face, I saw a sorrow deeper than my own. He seemed to intuitively go to the worst boxes. Why did He have to read every one?

Finally He turned and looked at me from across the room. He looked at me with pity in His eyes. But this was a pity that didn't anger me. I dropped my head, covered my face with my hands and began to cry again. He walked over and put His arm around me. He could have said so many things. But He didn't say a word. He just cried with me.

Then He got up and walked back to the wall of files. Starting at one end of the room, He took out a file and, one by one, began to sign His name over mine on each card. "No!" I shouted rushing to Him. All I could find to say was "No, no," as I pulled the card from Him. His name shouldn't be on these cards. But there it was, written in red so rich, so dark, and so alive. The name of Jesus covered mine. It was written with His blood. He gently took the card back. He smiled a sad smile and began to sign the cards. I don't think I'll ever understand how He did it so quickly, but the next instant it seemed I heard Him close the last file and walk back to my side.

He placed His hand on my shoulder and said, "It is finished." I stood up, and He led me out of the room. There was no lock on its door. There were still cards to be written.

As we go through life, EVERYTHING we do is written in our book of life. We should always be aware of our actions, and if they are pleasing to God, for NOTHING goes unnoticed by Him.

One of the most profound things I heard, one time, was, "When you stand before God on Judgment Day He will not ask you how other people treated you – He will ask you how you treated others."

mation that the building is about to undergo.

It seems that after being in a state of partial abandonment for a while, the building is about to get a second lease on life. Meaning that School Superintendent Al Cooksey has decided to reverse the decision of the previous administration and instead renovate the building, with the idea of moving the administrative staff back into its former home.

In fact, the work has already started. Chief Financial Officer Robert Lloyd told the *Monticello News* last week that it was too early to say how much the renovation might cost. He said a cost estimate was one of the things that the district was in the process of getting from CRA Architects.

In the meantime, he said, the district was already undertaking small repairs and other necessary work to make building inhabitable and viable once again as an administration building. He described some of these activities as improving the drainage system, doing some rewiring, getting rid of old

records and bringing fiber-optic cable into the building.

He said others of the contemplated improvements include bringing the facility up to code, reconfiguring the office spaces, making the overall building and the restrooms ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant, and changing around the School Board meeting room to provide more public space.

Lloyd said the entire project could take two to three years to complete. The goal, however, was to move the administrative staff into the building by late this spring or early summer, he said.

Meanwhile, district staff has also started fixing up the old high school auditorium on Water Street, another of the buildings that had been partially abandoned and undergoing slow deterioration over the years.

Lloyd said he expected the cost of the first phase of the auditorium renovation work would be between \$70,000 and \$80,000. This work, he said, would involve bringing the building up to code,

making the restrooms ADA compliant, addressing the leaky roof and correcting problems with the performance stage.

He said a later phase would involve a general sprucing of the facility, including upgrades to the acoustics, sound system, stage curtain and carpeting.

"We're doing things that should have been done 10 years ago," Lloyd said.

As in the case of the administrative building renovation, he said the project would likely take two to three years to complete.

As for the money for the two renovations, Lloyd said it was coming from two sources.

One source, he said, was the more than \$1 million that the district received in insurance money for the building that burned at the elementary school about two years ago. The other, he said, was the Local Capital Outlay tax of 1.5 mills that the district annually levies for the upkeep and improvement of school properties.

The 1.5 mills, Lloyd said, generates about three quarters of a million dollars each year.

February, compared with the previous month.

So indicates the latest released figures from the Jefferson County/City of Monticello Building Inspection and Contractor Licensing Department.

The February report shows the city and county issued a combined 37 permits, up two from January, with home repair and renovation projects accounting for the majority of the activity, by now almost a given.

The 37 permits generated a combined \$6,239.78 in fees, compared with \$8,720 during the previous month. Of the 37 permits, the city issued six

and collected \$495.85 in fees, and the county issued 31 and collected \$5,743.93.

A breakdown of the 37 permits shows 30 were for repairs and additions; two for new residential construction; two for commercial-related projects; one for a mobile home; and two for miscellaneous uses such as sheds, signs, workshops or barns.

In the residential permit category, the valuation was \$279,387, down from the \$936,719 in the previous month. This valuation was zero in February 2013.

The valuation for commercial permits was \$108,000, slightly down from the \$110,000

in January. It was \$71,100 in February 2013.

And the valuation for other permits (a category that includes additions, re-roofs and non-residential structures) was \$218,832, way down from the \$1,020,564 recorded in January. This valuation was \$352,452 in February 2013.

Meanwhile, the Jefferson County Planning and Zoning Department issued eight permits and collected \$2,887.07 in February, compared with seven permits and \$4,662.26 collected in January. In February 2013, the department issued seven permits and collected \$1,466.25.

the look and feel of an old southern town, a quality conveyed in large part by the Spanish moss festooned oak trees and canopy roads. He urged the council to consider designating one or two streets within the city as heritage roads, if only for the sake protecting and preserving them.

As part of his presentation, Avera distributed to council members a brochure and other heritage roads program literature, wherein it stated that more than simply being canopy roads, the county's heritage roads

offer glimpses of the community's past, present and future aspirations.

The county's four named trails or loops traverse distinct topographical areas, all the while touching on the cultural, historical and natural assets of each. The four are the Miccosukee-Magnolia Trail in the northwest, the Plantation Trail in the northeast, the Spanish Trace Trail in the central part, and the Flatwoods in the south.

and Tellefsen presented commissioners with the product of their combined efforts.

One of the biggest proposed changes will affect individual property owners who want to construct a single house. Whereas the development permit is presently \$500 for such a structure, the proposal calls for reducing it to \$100.

"A development permit is required to obtain any other type of construction permit," is the way Tellefsen explained it. "It is essentially a 'ticket' to get any other permit."

Some others of the rates on the proposed new fee schedule: a site plan review would cost \$50 plus \$0.05 per square foot; a subdivision review, \$75 per lot; a rezoning application, \$250; a large-scale Comprehensive Plan Amendment review, \$3,000; a small-scale Comprehensive Plan, \$1,500; and a road name change, \$100.

Barwick and Tellefsen asked commissioners to review the proposed fees and be ready to discuss them at a workshop.

In the background information that Tellefsen provided to the commission, he emphasized that the proposed fee changes applied solely to the planning part of the process, not to the building inspections operation, which was working on its own revised fee schedule.

The fees, moreover, applied to the application and review process for every type of development, whether a subdivision or a site plan, he said.

Tellefsen identified the three present levels of review and approval processes as residing in his office, the Planning Commission and the Board of County Commissioners.

The proposed fees, he said, would affect subdivisions, site

plans, developments and miscellaneous activities. In the case of subdivisions, the fee would be based solely on the number of lots, regardless of the level of review required, he said.

In the case of site plans, the fees would be based on the total size of all buildings on the site, he said.

As for development permits, they were required prior to construction on any parcel, whether residential or nonresidential, he said, explaining that the fees were to cover the planning staff's review time to ensure that developments complied with the Land Development Code before the issuance of any type of construction permit.

Tellefsen gave a brief outline of the activities in his office since his hiring in October 2006. He noted that with the exception of six cell towers and a microwave tower that the Planning Commission had approved, very few applications for major developments had come through his office during the last seven plus years.

Indeed, out of seven major projects considered or approved by the Planning Commission during the period, three were never constructed, one was withdrawn, one remained in limbo and the sixth was still unoccupied, he said.

And other developments, such as Heritage Hills and the Sanctuary subdivisions, had since been repossessed by the banks and had thus far been minimally, with only a few of the houses approved on the original plats actually constructed.

The commission takes up the proposed fee schedule at a workshop set for 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 18, in the courthouse annex off Water Street.

Florida Man Solicited Prostitute With Son In Car

In Daytona Beach, police arrested a man accused of soliciting a prostitute with his young son in the back seat of his car.

Patrick Williams had his toddler in the back seat when he allegedly spoke to a prostitute on Ridgewood Avenue, and arranged to pay her for services. The woman turned out to be an undercover police officer and Williams was arrested on a solicitation charge.

Williams denied the solicitation. "I never solicited in any way. She came over, offered everything. It's a big entrapment. Police sting," Williams said. "The reality is I thought it was some crazy crackhead. I felt bad for her, prayed for her and drove off."

Caregiver Disguised As Patient Attempts To Steal From Bank Account

In Whetstone, England, Linda Cramphorn, 47, disguised herself as an 81-year-old Alzheimer's patient in an attempt to steal from her bank account.

Cramphorn was working as a caregiver for the Alzheimer's patient and admitted stealing the elderly woman's checkbook and personal documents before disguising herself and visiting a branch of the Halifax bank.

Cramphorn was able to withdraw \$664 from the woman's account but made bank workers suspicious when she sought a \$36,531 bank draft. The workers contacted police who arrested Cramphorn and Sanjay Patel, 43, who was waiting for Cramphorn outside. Both pleaded guilty to fraud by false representation and sentenced to 16 months in prison.

Woman Uses Scissors To Sever Husband's Privates

In China, a 30-year-old woman cut off her husband's genitals, after he asked her for a divorce.

Han Zhang reportedly crushed sleeping pills and put them in her husband, Han Mou's, drink. After he fell asleep, Zhang used scissors to cut off a part of Mou's genitals and flushed it down the toilet before he woke.

Zhang stated, "If he and I divorced...our children will have a stepmother, a terrible thing."

She was released on bail and returned home to her children and husband Mou, who forgave her. "I still love my wife," he said. "She was 16 years old just like me, and gave me two sons."

Zhang reportedly became jealous again, used a syringe to inject a box of milk with more crushed sleeping pills, then took scissors and cut off the remainder of her husband's genitals and threw them on the ground. Zhang then called for an ambulance and turned herself in to police.


