## Jobless rate here tumbles

In its first significant movement in five months, Taylor County's unemployment rate dropped almost a full percentage point to 8.3 percent, its lowest mark in years.

The county's rate had been holding between 9.1 and 9.3 percent since October after falling from a 2012 high of 10.1 percent in July.

For February, Taylor had the 16th highest unemployment rate with 781 people unemployed and 8,584 employed, according state figures recently released.

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## Jury still returns guilty verdict

# Suspect flees in middle of trial

Accused drug trafficker Daniel M. McCune opted to leave his fate in the hands of a jury, turning down a plea offer that included reduced charges, probation and no jail time.

Nearly three years after his arrest for

trafficking a controlled substance (oxycodone), McCune faced a jury last month...and apparently was not happy with the writing on the wall.

The 27-year-old left court during a lunch adjournment his second day of trial and

disappeared.

A statewide BOLO (be on the look out) has been issued for McCune and the Taylor County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) is pursuing his whereabouts.

"We've had people run from first appearance, but

we've never had one run from a trial," TCSO Ron Rice said.

Despite McCune's failure to return to court, the judge proceeded with the trial and the jury eventually returned a guilty verdict.

"Both sides had already

rested their cases and all that was left was for closing arguments to be presented. They did that and the jury was then sent to deliberate. They came back with a guilty verdict," Rice said.

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# Bluegrass fans bask in the sunshine, sway to sounds of traditional favorites

Despite some unpredictable weather, the 11th annual Florida State Bluegrass Festival took over Forest Capital State Park this past week, drawing large crowds for three days of music.

"The festival was a big success again this year," Coordinator Dawn Taylor said. "We had a great crowd, many of whom stayed all three days, some even arriving a few days early to spend time in Taylor County before the music started."

Taylor added that this

year's attendees included two from Denmark and at least one from Canada.

"We continue to draw people from around the world to stop by and listen to some excellent bluegrass music here in Perry."

The festival kicked off Thursday evening,

headlined by the nationally-recognized Little Roy & Lizzy. Although some forecasts were calling for an 80 percent chance of rain, the weather turned southward and Perry missed the rain, at least until after the music was finished.

The festival resumed Friday around 12 noon, although the weather continued to be unpredictable. The weather forecast called for a high in the mid 70s, but the temperature did not escape out of the 50s, providing a surprisingly chilly day of music for both attendees and the entertainers.

Bundled in jackets, musicians such as Kenny &

Amanda Smith and brother/sister duo The Roys played along with regional bands such as Swiftwater, High Cotton and the Florida State Bluegrass Band.

"We don't usually have to plan for cold weather for this festival, but everyone braved the cool temperature and enjoyed the music," Taylor said.

The weather finally cooperated on Saturday, with clear skies and a high in the upper 70s. In addition to the music on stage, festival-goers were able to participate in a series of music workshops conducted by several of the weekend's

## CAPITOL UPDATE

### 2013 Legislative Session Review

**Editor's Note:** The following summary of the Legislature's fifth week of business in Tallahassee was featured in Senator Charles Dean's weekly newsletter, "The Dean Document," which was distributed Friday. Dean was Taylor County's representative in the Florida Senate from 2007 to 2012.

"With the completion of Week 5 of the Legislative Session, we have reached the halfway point," Sen. Charles Dean said.

"This week, work continued on the budget as the Appropriations Committee considered the budget proposal which was released last week. I am proud to support this budget which increases funding to our teachers, to our state workers, and for our students. All of this is accomplished while not raising any taxes, fees, or tuition.

"Just as our constituents must do each and every day, Florida must balance its budget and live within its means. I look forward to continuing to work on this proposal with my colleagues in the House of Representatives as the session continues.

"Also this week, I was pleased to move several of my bills through their committees of reference

and also to pass Senate Bill 244 through the Senate. Senate Bill 244 requires water management districts to work together on projects, while the other bills dealt with topics such as protecting our veterans, and ensuring our law enforcement officers have access to accurate information when conducting investigations.

#### Senate Releases Budget Proposal

Last week, the Florida Senate released a budget proposal for the 2013-14 Fiscal Year.

The budget, which is a product of several weeks of meetings and informational hearings, will increase funding to education by \$1.2 billion while not raising taxes, fees or tuition on Florida's students. Of the \$1.2 billion increase in education funding, \$480 million will go to budget increases for instructional personnel, \$300 million will be used to restore funding cuts to Florida's universities and \$30 million will be used to increase university research.

In addition, the budget also has several investments to ensure Florida's students have job opportunities after graduation; \$30 million will be used for additional high school industry

certifications and \$7 million will be used to increase industry certifications in the State College System.

The budget also recognizes the work of Florida's state workers by including a three-percent increase in salary for state employees, Dean said.

"As a former teacher and sheriff, I am pleased to see the Senate's focus on providing for our teachers, students and state workers," Dean said.

"These individuals are Florida's backbone and future. I am proud to support them.

"Recognizing the need for reserves, the Senate's budget proposal sets aside \$2.9 billion for savings. Further, the budget includes \$149.6 million for county transportation projects, \$241 million for seaport development grants, and \$290 million for bridge construction among other investments to improve Florida's infrastructure."

Once the Senate and the House pass their respective budget proposals, the two chambers will meet together in conference to work out the differences between the plans. Following the conference, the joint bill will be voted on by both chambers and sent to the governor.

### Dog hit by car; owner writes to complain of speeding motorists

Dear Editor:

Death has its own time table. My expression is: Do not run in front of a Mac truck to find out if it is your time; because if it is not, it will hurt. We also know that speed kills. So why must anyone speed on a small city street where children play and a handicapped person lives?

My family bought the house on the corner of Jefferson and Wilcox Streets 52 years ago and I have lived in it since 1996. From the upstairs bedroom (at age 16-18) I watched the crowds gather behind the Woman's Club for scheduled events and the old water tower rain water down its sides as it overflowed. I never saw anyone who dared to climb the tower to write new graffiti. And I grieved when the tower was taken down.

The Woman's Club still has crowds parking behind it for scheduled events. People gather the pecans fallen from large trees behind the club and children play upon the vacant lot. The neighborhood is quiet as our children have grown

and new families with children move in to the area. We hear the laughter and squeals of children from the City Park one block away; and we watch the children marching in line from the nearby school, daycare, and Boys & Girls Club on Washington Street to the library.

So why must someone speed on streets where these events happen? Especially if this person has children?

Wynn's CPA office took the place of a beauty shop which faces Washington Street and whose driveway is 16 feet east from a dilapidated "Slow Children Playing" sign on Wilcox Street. Although the city has long since neglected the sign and those all along Washington Street, the sign is still there for a reason. To drive slow and be aware of everything along the streets. Wynn's clients have all been careful and watchful of children and the occasional "escape artist dog" who has escaped his fenced yard since a puppy on Washington Street and the black speckled dog that

marches along both sides of Jefferson Street as if it were the resident general of the area. In recent months the speckled dog has ventured along Wilcox Street and around Washington Street circling behind Wynn's and returning to Jefferson Street on its daily trek.

I hear from inside my house, those who drive past on Wilcox. I recognize which vehicle drivers speed and where they live along Wilcox and Washington Street. My daughter has actually been next to the street and raised her hand to stop some speeders.

Gardening and housework just kept me busy," she said.

She was also active with her church and joins fellow quilters every Tuesday at the Taylor County Public Library to sew.

With her days filled, the years passed by time and again.

Now, at 104, "I'm just glad to be alive."

Glad and still taking care of business, her niece explained.

"After stopping at the bank, she was off to pay her monthly bills. This included a trip to the driver's license

bureau to renew her license. She got them...didn't even need to wear her glasses for the eye examination. The day before she had driven her 1972 Plymouth to her new residence, which is now with my husband and me. She hosed down and washed that old car until it shone. Then she put it back in its shelter. It makes you want to ask, 'What will I be doing at age 104?'" Brannen related.

Snell walks up to a mile every day "every morning and night," she said.

"And I take very little medicine. No aches, no pains."

In addition to exercise,

her daily routine includes oatmeal for breakfast—a staple leftover from her childhood.

"Mama made oatmeal for us every morning and that's

what I have now," Snell said.

"Her appetite is healthy, but she doesn't snack in between meals and doesn't like potato chips. She never has," Brannen said.

Prior to moving to Perry, Brannen made her home in south Florida, in a town called Dania (near Hollywood).

Fishing was a favorite pastime and more often than not she could be found in the Keys casting a line.

When talk turns to her childhood, Snell speaks of busy days on the farm owned by her parents.

"We had nine cows and it was my job to help milk them. There was always work to be done," she said.

Snell recalls those days with fondness and a special lilt comes to her voice when she speaks of the winter mornings her mother would bundle her up "good and tight" before sending her out to walk the one-and-a-half-mile route to her school.

"No riding—it was always walking for us!"

Almost a century later, she's still putting one foot

in front of the other and forging ahead, wrapped warmly in memories that keep her loved ones near.

## Suspect was out on bond; GPS monitor deactivated

"We are still looking for McCune and he will be brought back to Taylor County where he still has pending sentencing...he has already been found guilty of the crime," Rice said.

McCune had been released on a \$25,000 bond pending the trial.


"He had a GPS monitor...when he failed to return to court, the tracker was checked and it was found to be inactive. Efforts were made to contact McCune and the court finally determined this was a case of a defendant willfully not returning," a court official said.

Under the minimum/mandatory guidelines, McCune is facing a lengthy prison sentence as well as hefty fines.

"During the course of preparing for the trial, we developed information

that lead to an arrest warrant being obtained for McCune's mother. However, we were waiting for the trial to end before taking her into custody. Then they—McCune, his mother, his father and his girlfriend—never came back. So we contacted the sheriff's office in Hamilton County (where McCune's mother resided). Deputies there made contact with the mother at her home and arrested her. She told them she didn't know where her son was, but said he had a gun and told her that he was not going back to prison," Rice said.

TCSO worked the initial case in 2010 when a trafficking amount of oxycodone was purchased from McCune. The suspect was originally from Hamilton County, but had moved to Perry temporarily at the time of his arrest.

## Caution urged during Wildfire Awareness Week

Commissioner of Agriculture Adam H. Putnam and the Florida Forest Service are reminding Floridians to be extremely careful with fires outdoors as the state's wildfire danger continues to increase.

This week is Wildfire Awareness Week, which recognizes wildfires that raged across Florida in 1998, burning more than 500,000 acres and damaging or destroying 337 homes and structures.

Wildfires generally occur in the spring and early summer months due to a lack of rainfall, low

humidity and strong winds. However, Florida is already experiencing a higher than average occurrence of wildfires near homes and neighborhoods.

"Most wildfires are caused by human carelessness," Putnam said.

"Right now, it is critical that we all do our part to prevent wildfires, especially in areas where homes and lives could be threatened."

The two most frequent causes of wildfires this year are debris escaping from burn piles and arson. Since Jan. 1, the Florida Forest

Service's firefighters have responded to more than 1,000 wildfires on 20,430 acres.

"People should be extremely cautious while burning outdoors," said James Karels, Florida Forest Service state forester.

"If we can reduce the number of human-caused wildfires, it will increase safety for Florida's citizens and firefighters alike."

Karels offers the following tips to help prevent wildfires:

- Check with your local city or county officials to see if there are any burn

restrictions in the area.

- Keep fires contained to an 8-foot diameter pile or non-combustible barrel. Fires must be at least 25 feet from forests, 25 feet from homes, 50 feet from paved public roads and 150 feet from other occupied buildings.

- Obtain a burning authorization from the Florida Forest Service for piles larger than 8 feet in diameter.

- Call your local Florida Forest Service field office (www.floridastateforests.com/field\_operations).

- Check the weather daily

and don't burn on windy days or when the humidity is below 30 percent.

- Never leave a fire unattended, and make sure it is completely out before leaving.

- Keep a shovel and water hose handy in case the small fire starts to escape containment.

- Report suspicious activity to the Arson Alert Hotline at 1-800-342-5869. Callers may remain anonymous, and information about an arson-caused fire could be worth up to a \$5,000 reward.

the first dog, which was a curious little terrier much like the Washington Street "escape artist dog."

Four years ago, my aunt gave my daughter a very large Yorkie (15-20 lbs) which needed love and attention. For three and a half years they lived in happiness in South Florida. On Nov. 1, the dog, my daughter and my grandson moved home. The dog became my shadow, every move I made it made. When outside it was always within 20 feet of me. The dog was not an "escape artist dog" nor a "general dog."

It did not wander. It was just like my Pomeranian, which lived to be 17, and who sat in a concrete flower pot on my driveway every day. It was my shadow. The Yorkie did not wander about the neighborhood. Nor chase kids on bicycles, nor chase trucks. It was my shadow.

On Monday the 25th, I took my stroke victim husband to Gainesville for a doctor's appointment. Daughter and grandson were working. The Yorkie waited for our return. Just before 5 p.m., my husband and I returned home. I let the dog out, went back to the car, lowered the electric chair so

my husband could get in it and go up the handicap ramp into the house. The dog did its business and waited for me to finish getting the chair lift back in place and gather everything from car. The dog stood where it has many times before, out of my way and waiting for command to re-enter house.

My driveway begins 135.8 feet east of Jefferson Street. West of Wynn's driveway, 15 feet south of me; 9.6 feet east of the "Slow Children" sign which is directly across from my driveway; and the dog was 143.8 ft east from Jefferson Street. The street from Jefferson Street to Washington St. is 261 feet

long and it is 17 feet wide.

There is no reason why anyone has to turn the Jefferson Street corner and accelerate to get to a house on the next corner. It is not Daytona Speedway, but that is the way it is treated. It could have been my husband in his electric wheelchair or me my husband's only caregiver. It could have been me running across the road to rescue the dog from the speeder. Or it could have been one of the many teenagers who take a shortcut to the library. Or one of his own children or other children of the neighborhood.

The driver just stared at me as I knelt by the dog

and stroked it. It had died instantly from a broken neck. It had stood there and let that driver strike it. It did not run in front of him. It stood there. It could have been his children, his neighbor's children, or me at the end of my driveway or my husband, daughter or grandson.

It is hard to tell anyone their beloved dog was killed needlessly. My 39-year-old daughter, my 19-year-old grandson, and my 72-year-old husband wept hard and openly for the little harmless loving dog named "Buffy," who is my shadow no more. It did not make it to 17 years as my Pomeranian, but it made an impression on our

lives.

There are signs for ducks crossing, horses crossing, where are the signs for children crossing, beloved pets crossing, handicapped persons crossing? Where are the new signs which have longed needed replacing to save lives?

If the city acts promptly and replaces the signs so many years neglected, maybe no children will be killed, or my husband in his electric wheelchair, or me at the edge of my driveway. Our anyone else's beloved pet being killed. A new sign will mean the little dog's loss of life will not be in vain.

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


