Greenville woman killed in crash

A 66-year-old Greenville woman was killed when she pulled into the path of an oncoming log truck Monday, July 8, in Buckville.

Joanne Marie Hurst was traveling south on C.R. 53 around 8:13 a.m. when—for unknown reasons—she pulled into the path of a loaded 2004 Mack log truck that was headed west on U.S. 27.

The front of the semi-truck struck Hurst's 2009 Toyota on the driver's side, pushing the SUV through the parking lot of the Jiffy Food Store. The vehicles came to a final stop on the south shoulder of U.S. 27.

Hurst was pronounced dead at the scene; the truck driver, Burton Ellis Beasley, 44, of Lake City, was not injured.

Engine trouble forces pilot down on U.S. 27

A Camilla, Ga., pilot was forced to make an emergency landing Saturday on U.S. 27 near County Road 30 with no damage to the plane and all four people onboard escaping injury.

According to Perry-Foley Airport Manager Bill Roberts, the plane, a Beachcraft Bonanza, "wasn't scratched" in the landing.

Roberts said the plane was enroute to Ft. Lauderdale when it began experiencing engine failure.

"There were two couples onboard.

Two of them were pilots. They were able to land the plane. Having two pilots on board was a benefit to help go through the checklists and then find a place to land," he said. "They actually went through the railroad crossing. That was some pretty precise flying there."

Roberts said he was contacted and, while not at the airport at the time, was able to coordinate getting the plane towed to the airport, where it still remains pending an inspection by the Federal Aviation Administration.

Wall arrested Monday for DUI death

Jason Wilson Wall, 31, was formally charged with driving under the influence (DUI) manslaughter and DUI with serious bodily injury Monday, July 8—nearly two years after the death of Erin Nichole (Walker) Lawless, the Perry mother who died in a car crash the night she turned 28 years old and some five weeks after the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) issued a warrant for his arrest.

Wall, who was in court for a motion hearing related to the case, was arrested and ordered held on a \$100,000 bond. He remained in custody at the Taylor County Jail as of presstime Tuesday.

During Monday's court proceedings, it was noted that Wall had been arrested for DUI subsequent to the crash that killed Lawless and critically injured three others (himself included).

How would you spend \$12 million? RESTORE accepting proposals

The Taylor County RESTORE Act Committee is seeking potential projects to consider should the county receive money from Clean Water Act penalties levied against British Petroleum (BP) for the Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

Although the litigation involving the penalties is ongoing, Taylor County could receive between \$3 million and \$12 million depending on the eventual

settlement. "If the money is going to be handed to the county, we want to be prepared and give the issue due diligence and forethought," County Administrator Jack Brown said.

The county commission appointed 11 citizens in April to serve on the RESTORE Act Committee, which is tasked with advising the commission on how to spend whatever

funds the county ultimately receives.

The committee recently approved a pre-proposal form, which is now available at the front desk of the Courthouse Annex as well as online at www.taylorcountygov.com.

Forms must be turned in no later than Aug. 30 at 5 p.m. to the office of the county administrator (201 E.


\$10,000 reward offered in 1974 unsolved homicide

A \$10,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest of the perpetrator(s) of the 1974 murder of James Norris whose body was found in Dixie County, near the Dixie-Taylor line.

Tipsters can remain anonymous.

"Someone has the information we need to solve this murder," said Florida Department of Law Enforcement Commissioner Gerald Bailey. "We are asking anyone with information to call 1-888-ANY-TIPS and help us take these dangerous criminals off the street."

"We have a great deal of information regarding



this case and believe we are close to an arrest," said Dixie County Sheriff Dewey H. Hatcher, Sr. "Just a little information could crack this

"double trouble" describing them. Double delight is more like it.


Madison and Jonathan Thomas are the oldest of the six with March 16, 1995, as the day they were born to parents Janet and Cal Thomas.

See if you can keep this straight: Ethan is enrolled in North Florida Community College (NFCC) where he plans to earn an AA degree. From there, the future is wide open.



Euthanization rates at animal shelter falling

Dear Editor:

There. I heard it again. "I won't take any animals to the Taylor County Shelter because all the animals taken there are euthanized." How easily misinformation is spread while the facts are ignored.

Carrie Smith, Animal Control coordinator, has compiled a five-year statistical analysis which tells a different story. Smith said, "Taylor County Animal control has protocols and state statutes that are carefully followed whenever an animal arrives

at the shelter. We value the life of every animal we receive, and each one is carefully evaluated as to its condition. We make every effort to find the owner or to place the animal in a loving home."

The shelter is housed in a cement block building with a tin roof and no air conditioning. And, yes, it does get hot during the summer. However, with assistance from the volunteer group, Helping Hands of the Shelter, Inc., the ceiling was lowered, fans were purchased and

special rolling gates were installed to allow for cross ventilation. It isn't perfect, but it is better. Many improvements are on the "to do" list, but as with other county needs, money is not available. Helping Hands volunteers are working to find grants from various organizations that will provide funds for additional much-needed improvements.

The shelter building has 21 dog kennels each of which can house a momma

Photo safari

For years, I have viewed photography as a good friend. I never felt as if I traveled alone, as long as I had my camera by my side.

Recently, however, I have relaxed my emphasis on picture-taking because I have no more room for picture frames or albums at my house...and there's no need to take 20 pictures at Christmas if you can capture the best five or six to tell the story.

But on a recent weekend vacation, I couldn't resist the urge to play with my camera.

We were staying at a resort in Central Florida where wildlife had a sure refuge. On the first evening, I tracked ospreys up and down fairways usually reserved for golfers. Getting a picture of an osprey is not as easy as National Geographic would make you believe. You have to be quick with the shutter and not given to vertigo. After I spun around in circles, peering into the setting sun, craning my neck as I attempted to move my camera in the same direction that the birds were flying, I found myself staggering to the sides of the fairways which might not have seemed too unusual to the trees which stand guard there, but it was disconcerting to me.

In some frames, the ospreys would be halfway visible and halfway gone. It was difficult to center those birds, as I wished, to put their wing-spans in perfect view. When I eventually gave up, I couldn't help but wonder if the birds hadn't circled as a defense mechanism--disabling me to interfere.

The next day, I downgraded from birds to flowers because flowers don't move as fast. Hibiscus blooms allowed me to study them endlessly, while unfurling ferns stood still except when the wind blew. A snowy egret would appear, walking through water on his God-given stilts. The sunset captured my attention and then the full moon.

The next day, we were actually playing on the same golf course when I noticed a pair of beautiful, long-legged birds. Of course, I didn't have my camera and I grieved that oversight until the husband agreed to help me find these long-legged beauties again later (if I'd just quit talking about it, please).

He was good to his word, so after we checked out of the room, we continued to check out the 1000 acres upon which this resort sits. Wood ducks and blue herons prevail, but before too long, he saw--in the distance--the birds I wanted to photograph. "What are those?" he asked aloud, and I had no clue, but I was surprised that he didn't, at least, act as if he knew. He thinks he can name most birds.

He parked as close as he could and then waited with all our worldly belongings while I stealthily pursued these birds. I thought that was nice. But they saw me coming. I stopped. He motioned that I should proceed, carefully.

The birds continued to probe the ground with their dark, pointed bills and I began moving toward them.

I covered about 125 yards before I was finally in position. I could barely spot the husband through the trees, but I did remember to look for snakes.

Then I got greedy, as photographers will do.

I wanted to be closer.

So I tiptoed in.

They looked up.

I took my default picture in case no other opportunities appeared.

Then I moved closer still.

And closer.

Suddenly, I was within arm's reach of these two beautiful birds with sleek gray feathers, extended bills and striking red plumage on their faces. I stood there, underneath a grove of oak trees and wondered why fashion designers think they have created the perfect color combinations--season after season--when the same combinations have existed in nature all these years.

I voiced that observation in my softest voice, ending with, "God gets no credit."

The birds tilted their heads to the left or right, vainly noting my admiration.

I photographed them at will--took about 50 pictures of the birds together, separately, up close, full-length. I continued to coo and talk, believing this endeared me to the birds.

Upon our return home, the husband announced, "They're Sandhill Cranes."

"You should have known that," I countered. "We have sand hills." I thought nothing more of it until the days that followed.

In the meantime, our family noted but was not at all surprised that I had only one picture of the husband and 50 of the Sandhill Cranes. I regretted the inequity and my iniquity.

That next week, as I pounded the keys of my computer in order to pay for our vacation, the husband sent me an e-mail which will forever be among my keepsakes from the trip.

It read, "Sandhill Cranes often vigorously defend themselves from predators, especially when defending offspring which are not able to avoid ambushes as easily as their parents. When attacking potential avian predators they fly up at the predator and kick with their feet. When facing mammalian predators, they move toward the predator with their wings open and their bill pointed towards it. If the predator persists, the often hissing crane will attack, stabbing with their bill (which is powerful enough to pierce the skull of a small carnivore) and kicking with their feet."

Ohmigosh. Did I ever know?

If he end up as the subject of a "60 Minutes" expose while the husband acts surprised that his wife was viciously attacked and killed by Sandhill Cranes (who also took her camera) while at a vacation resort, I want you to remember this story.

And seek justice, please.

Support group meets here on 4th Thursday; you're invited!

Recie Culpepper and Angela Mendoza came to Perry to extend an invitation and spread the word: the Alzheimer's Project, based in Tallahassee, holds support group meetings in Perry on the fourth Thursday of each month.

If you are a caregiver for anyone with dementia or Alzheimers--or any other life-limiting illness--you're cordially invited.

Meetings are held at First Presbyterian church from 10:30 until 11:30 a.m. "It gives these caregivers an opportunity to hear from others about the same challenges," said Culpepper. "We always hear, 'I thought I was the only one dealing with that.' Well, invariably, you are not the only one."

Mendoza echoed that sentiment and encouraged individuals in Perry to come to the July 22 meeting. "We present coping skills and offer suggestions on various strategies."

The Alzheimer's Project was started at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Tallahassee in 1991. It now offers free services to 10 counties, including Taylor.

They applaud the respite care offered in various locations, where caregivers have a few hours to catch up on errands or simply enjoy the absence of all-consuming responsibilities. That, they admit, would be a future goal for Perry.

Culpepper and Mendoza shared statistics and stories on July 3 with the Perry Kiwanis Club, emphasizing the support they can offer by connecting local caregivers with organizations which offer additional help or opportunities for further education.

Do not let stress pile up and get in your way of enjoying those deep breaths. Take two minutes out of your busy day to close your eyes, pay attention to only your breath and say "omm." Red snapper season closes July 15 in Gulf

The 2013 Gulf of Mexico recreational red snapper season in state waters closes July 15, with the last day of harvest on July 14.

State waters are from shore to 9 nautical miles in Gulf waters; federal waters extend beyond that line to 200 nautical miles.

The Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council is considering a supplemental recreational season for later this year in federal waters. If approved, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission will consider a supplemental season for Gulf state waters at a future commission meeting.

This year's state season was 44 days long. The Gulf federal season was 28 days long and ran from June 1 through June 28.

in college at one time," he said, which explains why the twins will be traveling in separate directions but probably living under the same roof they've called home.

Adam and Ashley are both going to TCC, with plans to transfer to Florida State University (FSU) after earning their AA degrees. He wants to major in microbiology and go to medical school, hoping to become a general practitioner in a rural area.

"Would Perry count?" he was asked. "Maybe," he admitted.

Ashley is uncertain about her direction but not uncommitted.

In the Thomas set, both are FSU-bound. Madison was accepted into the College of Nursing but admits that she first thought she wanted to be a doctor.

She and Adam attended the Medical Careers workshop and she didn't embrace the emphasis on specializing, so she looked closely, again, at nursing. The Thomas twins' older sister, Kelli, is currently in nursing school at NFCC. Both Thomases will enter

FSU with a number of credits in their pockets thanks to the dual enrollment program offered through TCHS and NFCC. Jonathan plans to pursue a degree in chemical engineering.

Outsiders wonder how competitive twins are. The Allbrittons look at each other and wonder quietly if that applies. "We weren't jealous of each other, but we were competitive," they admit.

The twins, however, find that they are more different than similar. "We pick the same games, the same genres, but we don't do everything together, and we don't have the same interests always."

For Brian, this is a departure from what he experienced with his twin brother, Bruce. "We were best friends," he said, adding, "We still are."

Although Bruce now lives in Augusta, Ga., Brian says, "We did everything together while growing up. We still see each other about once a month."

The Andersons admit that

they didn't do everything together, but they do share initials and seem to gravitate toward the same colors. Adam Logan Anderson and Ashley Lauren Anderson admit academic competition, but it has served them well—they both make good grades and seem motivated to do their best.

and her litter of puppies. These kennels may house one large dog, two medium sized dogs or three or four small dogs.

There are 24 cat banks each of which may house one adult cat or several kittens each. Momma cats with newborn kittens cannot be housed in these banks because the kittens can fall out of the sides. Therefore, mothers and kittens are placed in a large dog kennel.

In the spring when the grass turns green and the flowers bloom, the puppies and the kittens arrive. In just one day in May, 22 puppies arrived. In one week as many as 40 kittens have been brought to the shelter.

Puppies are vaccinated and wormed upon arrival

at the kennel. Parvo is a highly contagious and deadly disease, and puppies are especially susceptible. Tests are administered, and if the test is positive, the puppy is put to sleep to avoid spreading this disease. Roaches, flies, cracks and crevices in the building also foster spreading of the disease and the shelter is sprayed with disinfectant at any sign of an infectious disease. Any dog showing signs of internal parasites is immediately placed on a three-day worming schedule. Dogs that show any sign of contagious disease are carefully monitored, isolated and treated when necessary.

Cats are susceptible to upper respiratory infections and because the shelter has no quarantine area, it is often necessary to euthanize an infected cat to avoid the

disease spreading to all the cats and kittens.

Let me share some of Officer Smith's statistics with you. In the budget year 2007-2008, the shelter took in 2,007 animals and in 2011-2012 intakes were 2,032. Not much of a change there. In 2007-2008 the shelter returned 154 animals to their owners and in 2011-2012 that number was 171. That number remained fairly neutral. Adoptions: in 07/08 adoptions were 154, while in 2011-2012 only 88 animals were adopted. The next number shows the positive result of effectively reaching out to rescue organizations, especially Cauzican Rescue in Wakulla County. During the period 2007 through 2009, no animals were sent to rescue groups. In 2009-2010 rescue organizations took 214, in 2010-2011,

animals sent to rescue numbered 689 and 672 went to rescue in 2011-2012. Most of these animals went to Cauzican Rescue, which was able to place the animals in welcoming homes or other rescues in different counties or states.

Euthanization rates continue to be high, as they are with most of the animal shelters. As noted recently on Tallahassee's TV Channel 6, in Lowndes County, Ga., at least 50 percent of the animals taken in are euthanized. With the help of the rescue groups, Taylor County's euthanization rate is under 50 percent. Animals are euthanized when they are determined to have a communicable disease, when they have been injured or when they are severely malnourished as a result of animal cruelty.

Animal Control and Helping Hands continues to seek ways to lower the euthanization rate. Animals adopted from the shelter are required to be spayed or neutered. Our local veterinarians have reduced their sterilization fees for animals adopted from the shelter by 30 percent and the volunteer group, Helping Hands of the Shelter, Inc., pays an additional \$20.

Pet owners in Taylor County, who meet certain requirements, may have their pets spayed or neutered by Helping Hands of the Shelter, Inc., at no cost. Applications for this service are available at the shelter office. Applications should be completed and then submitted to Helping Hands of the Shelter, Inc., for their review and acceptance or rejection.

Pets adopted from shelter receive micro chips at no charge, which is a savings of approximately \$45. This service has resulted in many animals being returned to their owner during this past year.

I hope these facts change the perception that all animals coming to the Taylor County Animal Shelter are put to sleep. Helping Hands of the Shelter welcomes additional volunteers to join us in our efforts. The group meets the second Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Chamber of Commerce building from September to May.

Norris came to Florida to buy Columbian-grade marijuana

case." On the morning of Oct. 4, 1974, San Francisco, Calif., resident James Norris arrived by commercial flight in Miami. He was traveling under the alias Richard Gunning.

The investigation shows that Norris traveled to Citrus County to purchase marijuana from an organization operating in that county. The investigation has uncovered the names of members of that organization.

Norris was carrying a large amount of cash with

the intention of purchasing Columbian-grade marijuana that was not at the time available in California.

That afternoon, Norris mailed a postcard to his family from Inglis, Fla. That was the last contact his family had with him.

On April 16, 1976, a bulldozer operator cutting through the woods off U.S. Highway 19 in northern Dixie County, near the Taylor County line, came upon skeletal remains.

The body remained unidentified until 2011 when advances in DNA allowed the remains of James Norris to be positively identified.

A \$10,000 reward is being

offered for information leading to the arrest of the killer(s) of James Norris. The tipster can remain anonymous.

The family of James Norris contributed \$6,000 to the reward fund. FDLE and Dixie County Sheriff's Office each contributed \$1,500 and Crime Stoppers contributed \$1,000.

1 dead, 3 critically injured in crash

The judge added an additional condition to Wall's bond order, stating that he must wear an alcohol monitor if he is released and that he must refrain from driving.

The arrest affidavit filed Friday, July 5, with the Clerk of Court office reflected five recommended charges: DUI manslaughter, DUI with personal injury, DUI with serious bodily injury, DUI with property damage, driving with license suspended and/or revoked (DWLS/R) and DWLS/R with serious bodily injury.

Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) Traffic Homicide Coordinator Sgt. Aaron Stephens said Tuesday the DWLS/R recommended charges indicate that Wall did not have a valid drivers license at the time of the fatal car crash.

However, the state attorney's office opted to charge Wall with just DUI manslaughter (for Lawless's death) and DUI with serious bodily injury (for injuries sustained by passenger Christopher Carnley).

Wall was also critically injured in the crash and spent an extended period of time in the hospital recuperating.

A fourth individual, Christine Marie Arnold of Clermont, was also injured in the wreck.

All four (Lawless, Wall, Carnley and Arnold) were ejected from the 2005 GMC Envoy; statements obtained by Arnold and Carnley--along with physical evidence--helped FHP investigators determine that Wall was driving at the time the crash happened.

The fatal crash happened around 2 a.m. on U.S. Highway 19 South at Josh Ezell Road on Sept. 4, 2011.

The SUV ran off the roadway, struck an embankment and went airborne. It overturned at least two times, ejecting all four occupants.

Her husband and two young children survived Lawless. She was the granddaughter of the late Alma Walker, who was a longtime volunteer for the American Red Cross, and assisted her grandmother in disaster relief efforts during Hurricane Erin in 1995. Her parents are Keith Walker of Perry and Patty McLeod.
