After two-day trial

Phelps' fate in hands of the jury

Testimony in the murder trial of Lloyd Phelps, 59, peeled back the curtain on a story of crippling addictions, alleged jealousies and uncontrolled rage.

The all-white, five-man, one-woman jury began

hearing from witnesses early Monday morning, July 22, with testimony continuing well into the

following afternoon.

Deliberations in the trial continued as of presstime Tuesday with the jury

dismissed to confer around 4:40 p.m. Complete updates of the verdict will be available online (www.perrynewspapers.com) and in Friday's **Perry News-Herald**.

At the center of the case is 39-year-old Patricia "Niece" Knight, who was last seen in January 2006. First presumed missing, her case was upgraded to a murder investigation five years later, in 2011.

In opening remarks, Assistant State Attorney John Weed began with a hammering statement: "The defendant killed--Lloyd Phelps--killed Patricia Knight."

He then followed by saying, "She's dead. Yet you are still going to hear from her. She is going to tell you she was killed and she is going to tell you Lloyd Phelps killed her."

Weed then gave a detailed narrative of what he said the state was going to show was the sequence of events following the last time anyone saw Knight alive; this included eyewitness testimony from a woman (Kimberly Hockaday) who said she saw Phelps attacking Knight in the master bedroom of his mobile home.

In the eyewitness account, the woman said another

Rivers over their banks as rains continue

Local rivers are rising again after another rain-filled weekend, causing flooding in some areas along the Steinhatchee and Econfinna rivers.

The National Weather Service (NWS) has issued

flood warnings for the Steinhatchee and Econfinna rivers in Taylor County as well as for the Aucilla River at Lamont, and local officials are continuing to monitor the situation.

"All the rivers are rising

slowly," Taylor County Emergency Management Coordinator Steve Spradley said Tuesday. "If we can get a break in the rain, they should crest soon."

The Florida Forestry Service station in Perry

reported more than four inches of rain over the weekend, bringing the month's total to a foot.

Rain chances remain at 50 percent for the remainder of the week.

Suspect remains at large

Former Perry man killed in Gainesville

The United States Marshal's Service and the Gainesville Police Department (GPD) are still searching for the suspect in the July 15 shooting death of former Perry resident Samuel Lee Hamilton Jr. in Gainesville.

According to GPD, just after 6 a.m. on Sunday, July 15, the department received multiple 911 calls reporting a person shot in the area of Southern Pines Apartments (4125 SW 17th Pl.). Multiple GPD officers

arrived and established a perimeter in the area with assistance from deputies from the Alachua County Sheriff's office. Officers located Hamilton, 37, deceased with an apparent gunshot wound to his head.

According to multiple witnesses, suspect Larry Whitehead Jr., 26, forced his way into the apartment where he and Hamilton got into a verbal altercation which ultimately resulted

Crash knocks out power for 70 customers

An 18-year-old Perry man allegedly left the scene of a one-vehicle crash Monday afternoon on Ash Street which damaged a power pole, cutting off electricity for around 70 Duke Energy customers.

According to a report from the Perry Police Department (PPD), Achilles Bradley Mantzanas, 18, was traveling east on Ash Street in the area of Calhoun Street shortly after 4 p.m.

Witnesses report the vehicle was traveling at a high rate of speed, including


tailgating the witness," PPD Lt. Scott McKenzie stated in the report.

"The vehicle left the road at the intersection of Ash Street and Calhoun Street and failed to navigate the left turn onto Calhoun Street."

The vehicle, a 1985 Ford F150, left the roadway, "striking a power pole head-on and causing extensive damage to the vehicle and the power pole owned by Duke Electric/Progress

man, Johnny Flowers, was also at the home at the time of the attack and that she heard the two men discussing how to "get rid of the body (Knight's)."

The woman said the men

threatened to kill her if she talked about what she had witnessed.

When defense attorney Baya Harrison took the podium, he began by disagreeing with Weed's account.

"You heard Mr. Weed talking as if he was a

witness to all that happened. I respectfully disagree with that. The evidence will show there is very little credible evidence to convict Lloyd Phelps in this case.

I think the evidence will show that it is not as clean-cut...as (Mr. Weed) suggested. Ms. Knight

was a troubled individual at this time (the time of her disappearance/death) and had ongoing very serious issues with drugs and associated every day with people who could do her harm," Harrison said.

He then cautioned the jury

to consider the credibility of Hockaday, noting "the evidence will show that you should have real questions before believing Ms. Hockaday."

What followed was nearly two complete days of sometimes conflicting testimony with witnesses

on both sides refuting the other's account.

Phelps himself took the stand to declare his innocence.

Three SHIP projects awarded to local contractor

The Taylor County Commission awarded three State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) rehabilitation projects to local contractor Weiss Construction Co.

Weiss was the low bidder for all three projects, which are entirely funded through the SHIP program. The total cost of the three projects is

\$65,250.

The commission opened bids from three firms--Weiss, C.B. Construction, Inc., and Florida Homes, Inc.--at its July 1 meeting.

Last week, the commission voted unanimously to accept the bid committee's recommendation to award the projects to Weiss.

The money for the

projects consumed the remaining rehabilitation funds from the county's last SHIP allocation in 2011. At that time, the commission agreed to hold back a portion of the funds to use a match in an attempt to receive a federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for housing rehabilitation.

According to Grants Coordinator Melody Cox, the CDBG program only funded two projects last year and Taylor County was not chosen.

Although the state was not expected to fund SHIP this year, Taylor County recently learned it will receive \$350,000 in new SHIP funds.


Cox said it has not yet been determined if the county will once again use a portion of the funds to try for a CDBG allocation.

Another decision the county will need to make is whether to work from the existing SHIP waiting list compiled in 2011 or start over with a new solicitation for projects.

According to Cox, there are still 46 people on the existing waiting list which have not yet received assistance.

She did say the county does have money available for first-time homebuyer down-payment assistance, also funded by SHIP, and is currently taking applications.

does not appear to be in any danger of flooding to houses at this time," Spradley said.

"The residents have moved their vehicles to higher ground. They saw this coming," he added.

The county road department has installed signs warning motorists not to travel down River Road.

No one needs to be

driving down there unless they live on that road," Spradley said.

According to the NWS, the Aucilla River at Lamont was at 9.3 feet Tuesday and expected to continue to rise to 9.9 feet by Thursday evening and then begin falling.

Spradley said the Aucilla is still rising at Nutall Rise but there are no structures in danger at this time.

"We are pre-positioning some water down there in case people's wells are damaged," he said.

As for the Econfina, the

picnic area at U.S. 98 is flooded but Econfina Resort and the nearby RV park are not.

"It needs to rise another 10 to 12 inches before they're in danger," Spradley said. "There may be some hunting camps in the woods flooded."

"Light of the World" by James Lee Burke





FWC issues alert

Leaping sturgeon injures child on Choctawhatchee

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is urging boaters to go slow and be vigilant on the Choctawhatchee River. The request to go slow comes after a Bay County child was severely injured June 22 on a fishing trip with his family when a large Gulf sturgeon leapt into their boat, hitting three children.

One of them, Nathaniel Smith, who turned 8 last week, was hospitalized with skull fractures but is now recuperating at his Youngstown home. He is the son of Angela and Wilson Scott Smith.

"We were bream fishing and it started to rain, so we cranked up and the kids huddled under a tarp in the front of the boat," Smith said. "The sturgeon just came out of nowhere, and I yelled and tried to cut the motor but it was too late."

The sturgeon, which Smith believes was 3-4 feet long, grazed the back of the head of his nephew Austin and then hit his 16-year-old daughter, Amber, with enough force to knock her out of the boat.

Smith wheeled the boat around, pulled Amber aboard and then realized Nathaniel had taken the brunt of the collision with a blow to the head. The impact left Nathaniel unconscious. Doctors later determined he

had two skull fractures.

Nathaniel was flown to Bay Medical Center Sacred Heart Health System in Panama City, then on to Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola and was released on July 2.

Scott said his son still has headaches but is recovering.

"I've fished the river before but I never even thought that a sturgeon might jump and hurt you. That's just something you don't ever expect to experience," he said.

While sturgeon strikes are rare on the Choctawhatchee, they have happened before.

On Aug. 4, 2002, Brian Clements, who lived near Bozeman School at the time, was motoring down the river by himself when he caught the full impact of a leaping sturgeon in the middle of his chest. Clement spent a week in Gulf Coast Hospital with a cracked sternum and bruised internal organs.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS)

does extensive work on northwest Florida rivers with Gulf sturgeon. In 2012, the FWS estimated the population at 3,400 in the Choctawhatchee River and 500-1,000 in the Apalachicola River. The Suwannee River, in northeast Florida, has the most, with a population estimated at 10,000 to 14,000 fish. There have been numerous injuries to humans on the Suwannee from sturgeon strikes over the past several decades.

Scientists don't know why sturgeon jump or leap from the water.

Meanwhile, fisheries biologists say by the end of summer Gulf sturgeon will leave all northwest Florida rivers and head to the Gulf, where they will spend the winter. They say the best thing boaters can do is slow down, wear a life jacket and be observant.
