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Death threats at City Hall

City manager, police captain say lives threatened

Following a public debate that resonated in uncivil terms--with audience members booing speakers and lobbing allegations against a seated council member--City Manager Bob Brown called for an end to personal attacks that have included death threats against him.

"I have personally had my life threatened, and my family's well-being has been threatened during this time. My personal vehicle has been broken into and its seat belts slashed, solely because of my job. Many slanderous signs and social media postings--which are false--have been published. No one should be subjected to this type of abuse,"

Brown said.

Brown stated he would continue to hold firm in his course as city manager and hoped to continue his service for years to come.

"I have always maintained the highest level of integrity in all of my personal and professional dealings. I will vigorously defend my reputation and willingness to continue to volunteer and work to make Perry a better community for everyone. Personal attacks must end, civil public debate must continue. I look forward to serving Perry for a long time and at the pleasure of the city council," he said. (A full copy of Brown's letter is featured on today's Editorial page, A-3.)

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Permit calls for Buckeye upgrades

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) has issued a notice of a draft permit that includes numerous improvements at Buckeye including a 15-mile pipeline to discharge the mill's effluent near the gulf.

According to a legal advertisement in today's **Taco Times**, the FDEP will host a public meeting at the Catholic Parish Hall on Tuesday, Oct. 22, starting at 5 p.m. Agency personnel will be available to answer questions about the permit and to accept oral and written comments.

The permit, known as the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit, is required for all point-source surface water dischargers.

Buckeye spokesperson Dan Simmons said the draft proposed permit will require significant changes to the plant's manufacturing, wastewater treatment and disposal processes.

"The draft permit includes a comprehensive plan to address dissolved oxygen, nutrients, salinity and transparency to avoid adverse impacts to the Fenholloway River and seagrass growth in near-

Search for first-degree murder suspect spanned three states

Two months after the shooting death of former Taylor County resident Samuel Lee Hamilton Jr. in Gainesville, the U.S. Marshals Florida Regional Fugitive Task Force (FRFTF) apprehended suspect Larry Whitehead Jr. Sunday morning (Sept. 15) in Hampton, Va., after an investigation spanning three states.


Whitehead was wanted on an outstanding Alachua

County arrest warrant charging him with first-degree murder, armed burglary and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon which was issued after Whitehead was identified by Gainesville Police as the person responsible for the shooting death of Hamilton at Southern Pines Apartments in southwest Gainesville on July 14. Whitehead fled from the scene after the murder

leaving his whereabouts unknown.

The search for Whitehead was immediately submitted to the FRFTF by task force members at the Gainesville Police Department and the Alachua County Sheriff's Office, and shortly after was deemed a major case investigation by the U.S. Marshals Service, making Whitehead's capture a

Council votes to close portion of Washington St.

Weighing letters of support from community leaders and technical input from engineers against petitions and citizen protests, the Perry City Council voted 3-2 to close a portion of Washington Street so the area could be incorporated into a sprawling downtown lake and park.

David Malcolm, who is with the planning firm of Woods & Partners hired by the city more than a year ago to develop a revitalization plan for Perry's historic downtown, said the move would not only be a safety enhancement for the lake project, but would also help with water quality and storm water runoff.

The suggestion to close a portion of Washington Street came at the recommendation of the design firm and project engineers.

Malcolm said eliminating the bridge would also help improve the lake's habitat.

Just over a year ago, the city council adopted a downtown revitalization plan which included building a new park

Facebook? Check your sources for gov't news

At a recent conference, former U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor said she was appalled by how much so many in this country don't know about their government.

"The more I read and the more I listen, the more apparent it is that our society suffers from an alarming degree of public ignorance," O'Connor said.

Among the statistics she quoted, according to the **Idaho Statesman**, at the "Transforming America: Women and Leadership in the 21st Century" Conference were:

- Two-thirds of Americans cannot name a single Supreme Court justice;

- Only one-third can name the three branches of government; and

- Fewer than 20 percent of high school seniors can explain how citizen participation benefits democracy.

"Less than one-third of eighth-graders can identify the historical purpose of the Declaration of Independence, and it's right there in the name," O'Connor said.

President Abraham Lincoln ended his Gettysburg address by stating his hope that "government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

But when the people do not take the time to be informed about their government, it is no longer by the people, and soon it will not be for the people.

That holds true whether we are talking about the federal branch or our own local city and county governments.

The Perry City Council, Taylor County Commission and Taylor County School

Board each meet twice a month and most of these meetings are held in nearly empty halls, except for a handful of people, usually those with issues on that particular night's agenda.

It seems many people vote for their leaders and then don't see their officials again until the next election.

As the primary source of news for Perry and Taylor County, we do our best to keep our readers informed about what their governments are doing, whether it's new regulations, road paving decisions or land use issues.

And we've been doing it for quite some time.

Of course, we've also heard many times over the years, "You can't believe what's in the newspaper."

It's fine if you want to believe that—we tend to disagree, of course—but if you choose not to learn about your government through us, we urge to find out for yourself.

But do not simply read about it on Facebook or other so-called news sources from people who are more interested in sharing their opinions than informing others of what is actually going on in their community.

If you want to be informed, we urge you to go to the meetings, sit down and watch your elected officials in action.

Then decide for yourself if you think the boards are serving this community well.

If you want your government to truly be of the people, by the people, for the people, sometimes you have to work for it, even if you just sit there and listen. After all, one of the most sincere forms of respect is actually listening to what another has to say.

Having immersed myself in my family's laundry, finances and food for 30-something years, I find myself missing my Only Child status.

Not that I want to toss my family aside, I still want them there: I just want them to be clean, financially independent and not hungry.

I'm ready to play bridge, take art classes, return to the piano, arrange flowers, travel the 50 states and pretend that I am the center of the universe.

Don't think you're going to offend me with a "selfish" designation. I want it all; I've always wanted it all. If you were honest, you'd admit that you want it all too.

Having grown up an Only Child, I was accustomed to people casually making the "spoiled" or "selfish" Only Child designation. They loved doing it. Some of us (Only Children included) believe that finding the flaws in others makes our flaws less noticeable.

I knew, however, that down deep in their hearts, in those dark little crevices we all try not to acknowledge, those people flaunting the Only Child insult were working under the assumption that the grass is always greener on the Only Child's lot.

To be sure, no sibling took my toys or stole the spotlight. But let me remind you, the Only Child designation also means that no other sibling shares the brunt of parental guidance, interference, scrutiny and constructive criticism. There is no shift of emphasis from one child to the other as crises ebb and flow.

While there's only one to put through college and dream for, there's only also one to pin all your hopes and dreams upon. If I had been in the family with a "black sheep," can you imagine how good I might have looked?

After about 10 years of the "spoiled" Only Child designation, I approached my mother with a complaint, to prove that I was—without a doubt—a "spoiled" Only Child. I was not eloquent, I am sure, but I was sincere. It sounded something like this:

"Everybody says that all Only Children are spoiled so I want to know why Betty and Carol Jean both have convertibles for their Barbie dolls and I do not. Betty has another sister, and Carol Jean has both a sister and a brother. But they both have Barbie cars. If I'm supposed to be a 'spoiled' Only Child, shouldn't I have a Barbie convertible?"

Now, mind you, this wasn't a Barbie car for me to ride in; this was a car for Barbie's transportation and pleasure because I was always thinking of others. Of course, it was a small toy car with a Mattel price tag which didn't seem so small to my parents.

My mother, an old school teacher, looked at me like I was from another planet—obviously, that planet from which all Only Children

originate. She was not ruffled by my complaint in the least—at this point in my life or any point, God rest her soul. If she ever felt guilty about my treatment or the trips I missed, she hid it completely. I believe she was a woman without regrets.

I received her Depression Sermon, verse 23, following the story about using tea bags twice and not having stockings for the winter. "I had two sisters and the three of us had to share a bicycle," she said, pointing a bony little finger at me. "You, on the other hand, have your own bicycle. Be grateful."

I wanted to say, it's 1965; nobody shares a bike, but I didn't. I wasn't that stupid.

Instead, I toned it down a bit and tried to be very reasonable. "I am grateful, but everybody now has a bicycle," I explained to her because she was old and obviously didn't get it. "And almost everybody has a car for their Barbie, but I don't," I whined, "and that's what I really want," I re-stated in case my central point was missed.

Painful silence followed when she was probably deciding whether to whack my back side or reason with me. Then she stared me down.

"I think you are very fortunate," she said, pointing to my four-poster bed in our three-bedroom brick house. She alluded to the fact that my parents loved me (despite my bent toward selfishness), and that my extended family included endless cousins—close by—with which to play and fight. "Why, you have so many friends and so many pretty clothes. I can't imagine why anybody would complain about a silly toy car with all this," she said, looking around.

"Now, pick up your toys and put a smile on your face."

She neither enjoyed nor tolerated debate.

While Christmas at my house was always fabulous because of the family, friends and food, it was rarely lavish. My mother wasn't about to go into triple digits to impress the neighborhood.

A doll. A book. A pair of pajamas. One new outfit. A record.

In the stocking, a new Swingline mini-stapler, a huge peppermint candy cane, some tangerines and a devotional book.

Only now can I see the message: Christmas isn't about the merchandise.

Further: living well has little to do with a Barbie car.

But on a Christmas when my friends had nearly worn the wheels off their Barbie cars, my Barbie got a car and it was their turn to be envious.

"Thank you, thank you, thank you," I said, waving my hands wildly.

It was a proud day for this Only Child.

Finally, I had raised my parents... and, I don't care what anybody says, it's not easy work.

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City manager: 'Personal attacks must end'

Editor's Note: At the Thursday, Sept. 12, Perry City Council meeting, City Manager Bob Brown read a message aloud alleging "personal attacks" against himself and his family. That letter is printed here in full.

I want to say what a pleasure it has been to serve for and under the direction of the city council for nearly eight years. They've been great bosses. The leadership and wisdom shown by the council in directing the management team how to move the city forward has been very intelligent.

The council steered the city through the worst economic storm in our lifetimes. The city emerged from this storm stronger than when it entered. Perry didn't end up on the rocks or have to throw programs

overboard to stay afloat like many other cities in our country. The council lowered taxes from what they were before the current management team was hired and has managed to keep them lower. Council has kept city utility rates some of the lowest in Florida for its citizens. The city budget we discussed tonight is about \$4.5 million lower than eight years ago.

The council has provided additional parks for the community during this time. The fire department has improved fire fighter capability, where homeowners in the city enjoy the lowest priced fire insurance ratings. Most of our surrounding neighbors outside the city do not have that luxury. Council has provided incentives and

plans for the restoration of downtown, many of the building owners are taking advantage of this and the results are visible. The

police department has one of the best case closure rates in the entire state.

Several large national

and regional retail/hotel firms have built in Perry during the economic downturn, at the same time when they were closing in other communities. Eight years ago there were no Fortune 500 manufacturing companies located in our community, now there are two in the top Fortune 300. Council obtained state and federal grant money to build a wastewater re-use pipeline from the city's sewer plant to Buckeye. Perry now has the only 100-percent single re-use water capable operation in Florida. This not only saves city taxpayers tens of thousands of dollars a year, it also reduces nearly a million gallons per day of water withdrawal from the ground. The city has been awarded the most prestigious award in North America

on financial reporting every year. With council's direction and leadership, the city has taken great strides and improvements for its citizens. The future looks even brighter.

Civil public debate on issues is part of the American way. Unfortunately in the past year or so, some have taken to scorched earth and personal attacks against public officials. These attacks generally have no basis whatsoever in fact and often have just been made up and are totally untrue. Florida has some of the most transparent open records and government accountability laws in the country. People who want to know the facts can view these records to see what is really true.

I have personally had

my life threatened, and my family's well-being has been threatened during this time. My personal vehicle has been broken into and its seat belts slashed, solely because of my job. Many slanderous signs and social media postings which are false have been published. No one should be subjected to this type of abuse.

Frazier: Charges result of 'police corruption'

Dear Editor:

I didn't feel the need to respond after my first arrest in August of 2012, but I can't let this last arrest go without a response.

I feel my customers, as well as all the citizens of Taylor County, need to hear my side of this ongoing nonsense. I have been out on bond for the charge of illegally operating as a bottle club for over a year now. My court date for this keeps being pushed down the docket, and I have been offered many plea deals. I refuse them all as I am innocent. The Perry Police Department has now charged me again with this bogus charge.

I own Frazier's Auto Detailing. I also operate the Infernal Club. I previously applied for an alcohol license at this establishment but was unfairly denied by City Manager Bob Brown, without explanation. Because of this, the hours of operations for the Infernal Club are 1 to 3 a.m. Saturday and Sunday, after the local bars close. I choose these hours because of the fact that I cannot serve alcohol and cannot compete with those that are given a license to do so. If Bob had signed the license, I would open and close by 1 a.m. like all other clubs. The Infernal Club presently provides the locals a place to dance and eat and have non-alcoholic beverages. One must be 18 years of age to enter.

The paper reported that during my first arrest

alcohol, drugs and firearms were found on the premises. That is incorrect. There were absolutely no guns. There were a few pills by the DJ booth that were confiscated and sent off to be tested by the PPD, but they were found to be non-narcotic. The alcohol that was found indoors consisted of two bottles of Hennessy and one Four Loko can that was dug out of the trash.

My staff and I "pat down" everyone who comes through the doors of the Infernal Club. I no longer allow anyone to enter with a cup in their hand. I no longer sell cups or ice. I only sell bottled water or Pepsi in the can. I do my very best to keep any and all alcohol from entering in.

I have appeared before the Code Enforcement Board three times on this charge of operating as a bottle club. The first time, the board charged me a \$250 fine for alcohol being found on the premises. All three times, I was found "not guilty" of operating as a bottle club. I do not stock or sell mixers for alcohol, and I have a zero tolerance for consumption of alcohol in my business.

I feel the 2012 charge came about as a result of Captain Jamie Cruse falsely alerting state authorities that I was operating in this manner. Two undercover agents entered my club with two bottles and reported that they mixed drinks and were not prevented from doing so. They were not seen by myself or staff. When this

went before the CEB, the PPD presented the board with multiple pictures of the same two bottles placed in different locations. I feel this was an attempt to make it appear that there was more liquor than what was actually found. One of the gentlemen on the board picked up on this right away and when questioned, the police responded that indeed there were only two bottles, and they had photographed them in various locations after being confiscated.

I have a Bachelor of Science degree in criminal justice and am a former law enforcement officer. Sadly, I know the practices of corruption within a police force, and the citizens of Perry need to be warned that you indeed have a problem with this here. The report written that night in 2012 was pre-written and handed over to a rookie officer to copy. I witnessed this with my own eyes.

During this latest arrest, two half pints of liquor and one Four Loko can were found again. Clearly when officers enter in, anything anyone has in their person is being dumped so as not to be personally caught. When these items were found on individuals, I asked the police to write the individuals tickets. They chose to write me a ticket for a city civil infraction giving me the option to pay a \$500 fine, or I could elect a hearing before the Code Enforcement Board. I was provided with the number for Captain Jamie Cruse

if I elected to have a date scheduled for a hearing. I have done my best to keep alcohol out.

It is my position that I am doing a decent job of this when three out of a hundred people have been successful at sneaking something past me. They chose to write me a ticket for operating as a bottle club when this is clearly not the case. It should also be noted that I have asked Captain Cruse if I could personally hire off-duty officers to assist me in keeping alcohol out and he replied, "We are not gonna help you run your business. We are going to shut you down." I also had a friend approach Sheriff Bumby Williams, and inquire about hiring off-duty deputies to help me. He was told that he no longer allows this.

Less than four days after receiving this ticket, I was served with a warrant and arrested at my car wash. I was held without bond for a period of 24 hours. I feel that I am being targeted and harassed, plain and simple. If you have taken the time to talk with me, you know that I am a no nonsense person. I manage both my businesses well with the utmost attention. Anyone who has worked for me can tell you that I tolerate no foolishness. I feel this is a personal vendetta against me by City Manager Bob Brown as he didn't approve of one of his family members patronizing the Infernal Club. This is no longer happening since my campaign to have him fired has begun. Bob is using the

police force to further his agenda. He has no business in the day-to-day operations of the PPD. I assure you if Captain Cruse is successful at shutting my business down, he is your next police chief, appointed solely by Bob Brown, a power given to him by the city charter.

It now appears the city manager has been successful at dissolving the CEB and hiring a special magistrate at the taxpayers' expense. This is none other than an effort to get a ruling to suspend my license for longer than six months, so I will not be able to re-open a business at this location. The Infernal Club has been grandfathered in as a business since zoning was established. The city has the club listed as being in residential zoning. If I am shut down for six months or longer, there can never be another business in this establishment.

Bob Brown also lied to a city council member telling him in 2012 that they had "got" me. He told this council member that they had pictures of me with liquor bottles in my hand. I can assure you that you will never find any pictures of me holding liquor bottles as I do not drink, nor do I smoke. I do not begrudge those that do drink, but I don't, and I certainly do not allow it in my non-alcoholic establishment. This council member attended the CEB hearing to see this evidence. He saw none. There wasn't any evidence to support this.

It appears law officers are now getting "creative" in their writing of these police reports against me. This isn't a term I make up, but a term I am well aware of, dating back to the days when I was a law officer.

This is a form of corruption that takes place within the department, something I would never participate in. Twice, I have read that officers reported they heard a siren sound inside my club as to alert patrons that they were there. This is "creatively" a lie. I have no siren to sound, nor does my DJ. When you're not doing anything wrong, you shouldn't have anything to worry about...unless, of course, you become a victim of this creative writing.

I urge the citizens to take a closer look at the way your city is being managed. My case may seem unimportant to you, but when the corruption turns on you or your loved ones, you will wish something had been done about it sooner. With power comes abuse of power. Power attracts the corruptible. Absolute power corrupts absolutely. Your charter gives Bob Brown absolute power. The fight against corruption is never easy. It takes a toll on anyone who engages in the battle, but there is one thing I know. In the end, the price you pay will be well worth it.

Society maintains its dignity. I know I am worthy of honor and respect. How about you?

Holton: 'Public officials should be held accountable'

Dear Editor:

Once again the Sept. 11 edition of the **Taco Times** reported City Manager, Bob Brown, as saying, "This ordinance (930 - Magistrate Ordinance) does not impact the current seven member Code Enforcement Board. It doesn't dissolve the board. Rather, it gives the council the opportunity to go to a special magistrate (system). If the ordinance passes and the council wants to go to a special magistrate, then it would be just the matter of a simple vote rather than having to do an ordinance."

Council meeting minutes from Aug. 13 read exactly as follows: "City Manager Bob Brown had provided for Council information on a Special Magistrate (hearing officer) for the Code Enforcement Board.

Mayor Gunter asked Mr. Curtis to explain the roll of a Special Magistrate. City Attorney Ray Curtis explained to Council that a Special Magistrate is an attorney who hears cases and acts in a quasi-judicial capacity. The Special Magistrate would then make a determination and provide recommendation within the guidelines of the law. Mayor Gunter stated the Magistrate roll worked really well for the County and helped take some of the politics out of it. Both Councilmember Deming and Councilmember Cook said it would be interesting in seeing someone in the position of Special Magistrate. Councilmember Deming made a motion to have Mr. Brown draft some kind of transition plan for a Special Magistrate. The motion was

seconded by Woodfaulk." (The minutes then reflect the vote with Councilmember Shirlee Hampton being the sole no vote). The minutes continue to read, "Mr. Brown suggested he would do some research to see how the County went by hiring a special magistrate then we would go ahead and do a similar solicitation as we did the city attorney position for a hearing officer if that's agreeable with Council."

If the board isn't being dissolved, why would solicitations start for the hiring of a magistrate? Do you see who runs the show yet?

Interestingly enough, council minutes from Feb. 12, 2013, state that "Council member Mike Deming thanked Mrs. Holton and Mr. August for their service

on the Board, as well as expressing appreciation for the work the entire board does... Council Member Deming said the board does a good job working with the people and the board should make the best decisions they can working as a board. Council Member Deming said he would support the Board."

Now, in just a few short months, that support has vanished. Does he now feel the board doesn't do a good job working with the people? Is he no longer appreciative of the board?

On Sept. 5, it is true, as the paper reported, that I posted a picture of a car illegally parked at Council Member Mike Deming's home to my social media account.

On Sept. 7, I posted comparison photos of a

home we were asked to code violate months ago and the home of a family member of the city manager. The same day I posted a photo of Mike Deming spitefully and illegally parking at his home on the city sidewalk. That morning he parked on the sidewalk in front of his home along Jefferson street and was waving at people passing by, until my husband happened by.

When Deming saw my husband, he gave him the middle finger gesture or for lack of better words, shot him a bird.

Are we going to keep tolerating such behavior from those we elect? Are we not going to hold them to higher ethical standards? Are we not going to demand they uphold their oath of office?

I called the law twice that

day to respond to Deming's home and ask that they be made to comply with the law. It appeared no law officer wanted to be involved in this.

If you think it is fine that Deming puts himself in a position to heavy hand laws onto everyone else but doesn't have to comply with them himself, then pay me no mind.

If you think it is fine that the city manager parks his boat on city property (I posted photo evidence of this also), then pay me no mind.

But if you think public officials should be held accountable the same as the average citizen, then take heed. Deming nor Brown should get special privileges because of who they are.

Centennial celebration

Woman's Club prepares to celebrate 100 years: 1914-2014

As the Perry Woman's Club looked forward to the new 2013-14 year, members also spent a great deal of time looking back, during the inaugural meeting of the new year.

The year 2014 marks the centennial for the PWC which is the oldest civic club in Taylor County. Throughout the years, the PWC has been remembered for its first political stand: keeping cows and pigs off the streets of Perry.

The club's first contribution to charity was \$5 and dues in 1916-17 were listed as \$2.

"We have such a rich history," said President Shawna Beach, showing members a minute book from 1919 "with beautiful cursive handwriting and a notation that there was \$15 in the building fund."

Beach found the book during a historical excavation of the building's locked-up contents, assisted by Taylor County Historical Society representatives J.T. Davis and Bettie Page.

"We also found a membership card for Mrs. Bloodworth from 1937, which was part of the Bloodworth Collection donated to the Historical Society," Beach added.

Plans for the centennial celebration will unfold as the months progress, but Beach hopes to replicate

the minute book from 1919. She showed members a similar leather-bound book she had just purchased which will be engraved with the club's centennial year.

"We will write our minutes in cursive in this new book, so the two--spanning nearly a hundred years--can be preserved together."

Display cases will be set

up in the club, to showcase memorabilia. "We also hope to have a Fashion Through the Ages show, as well as

Council approves special magistrate ordinance with 3-2 vote, begins advertising for applicants

Council members, who weathered a gamut of comments during the meeting that ranged from harshly critical to solidly supportive, did not offer any feedback on Brown's statements.

On Tuesday, Perry Police Department (PPD) Capt. Jamie Cruse confirmed the threats against Brown's wellbeing as well as threats made against his own life.

"The threats are not baseless threats. They are real and they are being investigated by an outside agency," he said.

Cruse added that the PPD was handling the investigation into the reported vandalism of Brown's vehicle "and we have collected items of evidence that could lead to the identification of the person who did it."

During last Thursday's

meeting, supporters and detractors filled the council room as members considered votes on a recommendation to close a portion of Washington Street as well as their next move regarding the city's Code Enforcement Board.

Ultimately, the council voted to approve the road closure by a vote of 3-2 (Mayor Daryll Gunter, Councilman Don Cook and Councilman Mike Deming voted in favor of the motion; Councilwoman Venita Woodfaulk and Councilwoman Shirlee Hampton voted against the move).

The council also approved an ordinance that gave it the option of utilizing a special magistrate to hear code enforcement violation cases. Again the vote was 3-2 with Gunter, Cook and Deming in favor, and Woodfaulk and Hampton against.

Members then voted to go forward with advertising

for a code enforcement hearing magistrate, a move that will ultimately lead to the dissolution of the current seven-member Code Enforcement Board.

Woodfaulk and Hampton again voted against the action.

During discussions on the ordinance, Hampton said, "I was not aware we were having problems with the Code Enforcement Board. We just appointed two new members and hired a new attorney. Let's give them some time to work."

"I'm not for it. When we first voted on it, I was under the impression the special magistrate would be coming in to help the board—not that we were going to dissolve the board. I think our peers should be judged by their peers," Woodfaulk said.

She then questioned how the position would be funded.

"From the general fund," Gunter said.

"Your cost is going to be very close to the same as what you are funding now for the Code Enforcement Board," Brown noted.

"It may be \$1,000 to \$1,500 more. We will have a contract with the magistrate.

He (or she) will not be a city employee or receive a salary," Finance Director Penny Staffney explained.

"I don't agree with that," Woodfaulk said.

A legal notice calling for applications for the

position is included in today's classifieds. It states that the council will consider applications and take whatever action it deems appropriate at its next meeting, Tuesday, Sept. 24.

high priority. Using the U.S. Marshals' nationwide network of fugitive investigators, FRFTF members in Gainesville directed the investigation to Virginia, New York and then back to Virginia where Whitehead was ultimately captured this morning at a house in Hampton.

During the course of the investigation, FRFTF members in Gainesville worked with task force members from the Capital Area Regional Fugitive Task Force in Virginia and the New York/New Jersey Regional Fugitive Task Force in New York and developed information which caused the search to extend to Long Island, N.Y.

Last week, U.S. Marshals confirmed Whitehead was in New York after locating an air mattress and clothes belonging to Whitehead in an attic of a house

where Whitehead had been hiding.

Task force members in Gainesville suspected Whitehead would attempt to return to Virginia and began focusing on key locations there as well as various modes of transportation between New York and Virginia including buses.

Sunday morning, Task Force members in Gainesville developed information that Whitehead had returned to Virginia the night before and was now possibly hiding at a house in Hampton.

Task Force members in Gainesville immediately began coordinating with task force members in Virginia who initiated surveillance at this house.

Task force members located Whitehead inside the house a short time later and placed him under arrest.

Whitehead was booked into the Hampton City Jail on first degree murder charges and is being held

without bond.

U.S. Marshal Ed Spooner of the Northern District of Florida stated that the arrest of Whitehead "highlights the great cooperation between the U.S. Marshals Florida Regional Fugitive Task Force and local law enforcement agencies, including the Gainesville Police Department and the Alachua County Sheriff's Office, to track down and apprehend fugitives wanted for violent crimes."

Spooner also noted the work by the three task forces in Florida, Virginia and New York.

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To earn season's first win

Bulldogs shut out Potter's House 40-0

The Taylor County Bulldogs put together their best all-around game of the young season and routed Potter's House Christian, 40-0 Friday night in their home opener at Dorsett Stadium.

The Bulldogs improved to 1-2 on the year and kicked off a four-game home stand by dominating the visiting Lions, who fell to 0-3 and were shut out for the third straight game. It was the Bulldogs' first shut-out since opening the 2011 season with a 34-0 win over Dixie County.

The Taylor County defense contributed to the blow-out victory by scoring two touchdowns of their own, as Jermaine Watkins and Mitch Stephens both returned interceptions for touchdowns.

The shut-out was even more impressive considering the Bulldogs were playing without top defensive player Luke Kallschmidt, who suffered a concussion the previous week.

QB Daniel Wentworth completed 14 of 19 passes for 176 yards and 2 TDs passing in addition to rushing 12 times for 34 yards and another touchdown for the Bulldog offense.

Moral Stephens (23-yard TD catch), Jalen Oliver (8-yard TD run) and Chance Rodgers (23-yard TD catch).

The Bulldog offense used a very balanced attack – rushing for 172 yards and 2 TDs and passing for 180 yards and 2 TDs – while the Taylor County defense held Potter's House to just 90 total yards (67 yards passing, 21 yards rushing).

Led by Marc Hamilton (5 solo tackles, 1 QB hurry, 1 big hit) and Evan Grambling (4 solo, 1 assist, 2 tackles for loss, 2 sacks, 1 QB hurry), the Bulldog defense allowed just 21 yards on 23 rushing plays (0.9 yards per carry) and harassed the Lions QB into completing just 6 of his 24 passes for 67 yards and three interceptions. Jalen Oliver intercepted a pass on the game's final play.

"This win was a good one for our kids. They played hard and made plays, which is what we preach all the time. I was happy with the effort," Head Coach Ryan Smith said. "We had guys flying around and making plays."

"I thought our defense played very well. To only allow 21 yards rushing was impressive. I was pleased with the defensive effort and they hit every

and the second was stopped thanks to a tackle for loss by Jermarcus Robertson and Justin Cruse (2 solo, 2 assists), as well as a pass break-up by Johnny Anderson.

The Bulldogs' offense struggled on their opening drive after Art Nelson (8 carries, 43 yards) picked up 18 yards on the first run of the game. Nelson was thrown for a loss, and a bad snap resulted in a 10-yard loss when lineman Ja'Nard Robson had to fall on the loose ball to keep from giving the ball to the Lions.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Bulldogs exploded for 27 straight points, beginning with Moral Stephens' 23-yard TD on a screen pass from Wentworth on the first play of the second quarter. The score was set up by nice runs by Wentworth, Nelson, Darrell Cook (4 carries, 32 yards) and Watkins (4 carries, 34 yards).

Ward's kick was ruled to be wide right to give the Bulldogs a 6-0 lead with 11:51 left in the 2nd quarter.

After forcing a punt – thanks to a big 16-yard sack by Jamar McNeal – the Bulldogs drove all the way down to the Potter's House 3-yard line before stalling and turning the ball over on downs when the offensive line couldn't open holes and allowed tackles for loss on three straight plays.

However, the Bulldogs' defense gave Taylor a 13-0 lead when Jordan White pressured the Lion QB into throwing an errant pass that Mitch Stephens picked off at the 20 and returned for a touchdown. Grant Parker's PAT was good.

Another short kickoff resulted in a 40-yard kick return that helped Potter's House drive down inside the Bulldogs' 20-yard line,

but Watkins stepped in front of a pass at the 3-yard line and used his speed to return the interception 97 yards for a touchdown to give the Bulldogs a 19-0 lead after Parker missed the PAT.

After Grambling made two more sacks to stop the Lions, Wentworth threw a perfect post pass to Moral Stephens for a 37-yard gain down to the 5-yard

line before capping the first half scoring with a 5-yard TD run with 1:06 left in the 2nd quarter. Wentworth completed a 2-point conversion pass to Jalen Oliver to make the halftime score 27-0.

After a failed onside kickoff, the Bulldogs opened the second half with an impressive drive down to the 9-yard line, but once

again the offense stalled when Wentworth dropped back to pass and was immediately hit, fumbled and lost the ball.

Hamilton came up big with a tackle on a fake punt attempt to give the Bulldogs the ball back, but once again Taylor drove inside the Lions' 10-yard

from South Jefferson Street. A grand pavilion, splash pad and fully handicap-accessible playground has already been completed and the next phase calls for the addition of a lake spanning the area between Jefferson Street and Center.

The lakefront will include walking paths, amphitheatre and fishing opportunities.

definitely addresses the issues of safety so that you will not have children crossing a street with oncoming traffic."

His wife, Adrienne Tish, called the lake park "exactly what you need."

Referencing comments about the road being needed when it was built in 1965, Tish noted, "that was almost 50 years ago. You need to progress. I have a degree in biology and removing the bridge road is the best idea if you want to have a good habitat in the lake. The worst thing you can do is have a large body of water, then a narrow channel

opening back up into a large body of water."

On the opposing side, local resident Madelyn Collins presented a number of signed petitions against the road closure. She also expressed her concerns about the amount of traffic that would be redirected to Center Street and Jefferson with the road closure.

Eunice Hicks said while she is in support of revitalization efforts for downtown, she worried about the burden increased traffic would place on Jefferson Street. She also questioned the cost of maintenance for the park.

Nancy Taylor Geohagan, who has been a longtime support of the Adopt-a-Highway program, asked the council "to promise me you will maintain (the park) properly. Veterans Memorial Park is very dear to my heart and I know the problems we have had regarding maintenance costs for that park."

She closed her remarks by reading a scripture that called for "bitterness to be set aside."

"There will always be pros and cons. The older I get, the more I realize that people have to work together, not against one

another. So please, let's work together," she said.

Councilman Mike Deming said that while the majority of calls he received regarding the proposal were against closing the road, "in the last few days, we have received letters of support on the project and more technical information about the project. I think it will be a good thing."


"I think the park works without closing the road. I listen to my constituents and am going to vote 'no,'" Councilwoman Shirlye Hampton said.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) gives notice of its preparation of an NPDES draft permit, administrative order, fact sheet, and Level II Water Quality Based Effluent Limit (WQBEL), and establishment of the Level II WQBEL, pursuant to paragraph 62-302.531(2)(a)1.d., Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), as site specific numeric interpretations of the narrative nutrient criterion that will supersede otherwise applicable numeric nutrient criteria. The Department is also announcing a public meeting to receive public comment on the permit application of Buckeye Florida, L.P. - Perry, Florida and the establishment of the Level II WQBEL as site specific numeric nutrient interpretations of the narrative nutrient criterion. The permit and compliance order will require Buckeye to implement upgrades to the paper mill manufacturing process, modify the existing wastewater treatment system, and relocate their discharge outfall. These steps collectively will enable Buckeye to meet applicable Class III marine water quality criteria for the discharge to the Lower Fenholloway River. This permit authorizes a new outfall location into the marine portion of the Lower Fenholloway River that is more suitable for the salinity of the discharge. The draft permit and administrative order authorize the permittee to operate at One Buckeye Drive, Perry, Florida an existing 58 million gallon per day (design) industrial wastewater treatment system discharging at the current location (Outfall D-001), and to

shore gulf waters. The permit requires Fenholloway and marine waters near the river to meet Class 3, fishable/swimmable standards," Simmons said.

Simmons said Buckeye expects to support the proposed permit.

According to an informational brochure provided by Buckeye, the plant has invested \$74 million in new technology to restore the Fenholloway River and it is committed to investing an additional \$101 million for oxygen delignification on its #2 mill, improved brownstock washing on its #1 mill, phase 3 of its San Pedro

Bay wetlands enhancement work, an upgrade to its effluent treatment system and relocation of the discharge point to compete the restoration.

The purpose of the proposed pipeline is to remove the plant's salty effluent from the freshwater portion of the Fenholloway

to the brackish portion of the lower river where the effluent's salt content will not be an issue, according to the brochure.

The pipeline was initially proposed in the early 1990s. Once the current NPDES permit is issued, Buckeye will have seven years to complete the project.
