Body discovered

House fire under investigation

The Taylor County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) and State Fire Marshal's Office are investigating a house fire that may have claimed the life of a local man last week, Dec. 30. His cause of death remains under investigation. The fire was first reported

waiting for confirmation from the medical examiner as to the victim's identity, sources said the man was Manning (M.L.) Tucker, 82. The fire was first reported around noon last Monday (Dec. 30); when deputies arrived at the scene on James Carlton Road, they discovered a singlewide mobile home that had been completely destroyed by fire.

"A body was discovered and we are awaiting an ID confirmation," TCSO Capt. Ron Rice said.

The fire apparently occurred late Sunday night/early Monday morning as the flames had already

burned out by the time it was discovered.

Coldest night of the season

New year starts with a deep freeze



High noon brought a high of only 31 degrees Tuesday, Jan. 7. Some residents took the opportunity of below-freezing-temperatures to run water sprinklers throughout the night to create their own ice gardens.

By noon Tuesday, the temperature was still not above freezing, hovering at 31 degrees.

The coldest day of the 2013-14 winter season followed the coldest night of the season so far, with the temperature dropping to 23 in the early morning hours of Tuesday and a reported windchill dropping that figure to as low as 14, according to the National Weather Service station at Perry-Foley Airport.

Taylor County and the entire region was under a hard freeze warning Monday night and Tuesday until noon, with a second warning for Tuesday night and this morning (Wednesday).

The frigid air which blasted much of the eastern United States reached Taylor Monday, with temperatures dropping throughout the day after reaching a high of 48 around 2 p.m.

The temperature reached 32 just before midnight and remained at or below freezing for the next 13 hours.

The high today is forecast to reach into the low 50s, with temperatures rising through the week so that the highs on Friday and Saturday are expected to reach into the low 70s.

With the warmer temperatures, rain chances will also arrive, fluctuating between 20 and 30 percent beginning tonight.

Is your child over weight? Under?

With Florida Surgeon General Dr. John Armstrong putting an emphasis on the statewide "Healthiest Weight" initiative, Taylor County parents could receive letters within the next month notifying them that their child is over or underweight.

According to Rachel LaValle, RN, school health coordinator at the Florida Department of Health (FDOH) in Taylor County, the letters will result from vision, hearing, height and weight examinations given to students in kindergarten, first, third and sixth grades.

School nurses already notify parents of vision and hearing issues discovered during the tests, but stopped

sending letters about weight several years ago due to negative response from parents, LaValle said.

"The surgeon general for Florida recently initiated a program called 'Healthiest Weight' for our state," LaValle said. "It was established to address what is causing the obesity epidemic and to collaborate with other entities in the state to help people make more informed choices about what they eat and how they exercise."

"One of school health nurses' role in this will be sending out BMI letters for over and underweight children as per Florida statute and school health guidelines. There has not

been a positive response to these letters in the past. The parents feel that we are calling their children 'fat.' We are not. We are simply trying to do what our profession teaches us to do, and that is help people

live healthy lives. If we can identify risk factors for obesity early, and make parents aware, we can help them make changes to hopefully prevent chronic disease."

According to FDOH, 65

percent of adult Floridians are either obese or overweight.

The state goals of the "Healthiest Weight" initiative include:


They are active members of Calvary Baptist Church where they have attended since childhood.

With colder temperatures, protect pets, pipes, plants

With winter weather becoming more common in the new year, residents and visitors should remember the "Five P's" of cold weather safety: protecting people, protecting plants, protecting pets, protecting exposed pipes, and practicing fire safety.

The Florida Division of Emergency Management offers the following safety measures:

- Stay indoors and use safe heating sources.
- Be aware of the fire danger from space heaters and candles. Keep such devices away from all flammable materials such as curtains and furniture, and install recommended smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Indoors: Do not use charcoal or other fuel-burning devices, such as grills that produce carbon monoxide. Install at least one carbon monoxide detector per floor in your home.
- Outdoors: Stay dry and in wind-protected areas.
- Wear multiple layers of loose-fitting, warm clothing.
- Drink non-alcoholic fluids.
- Shelter or bring inside animals, especially pets.

Severe Weather Awareness contest nearing for students

Emergency Management (FDEM) will host the 2014 Severe Weather Awareness Week, Feb. 24 through Feb. 28. The division's annual public education campaign provides an opportunity for teachers to discuss severe weather with students and families.

The Severe Weather Awareness Week events include a poster contest for Florida's elementary school students and a video public service announcement (PSA) contest for Florida's middle and high school students.

"We are excited to once again host the Severe Weather Awareness Week contest, and look forward to the creative entries we receive," said FDEM Director Bryan W. Koon.

"This week of events

is an important tool to bring awareness about the severe weather and hazards Floridians may face and help to strengthen the culture of preparedness in our communities."

Annual Poster Contest

The poster contest is open to all Florida elementary school students in public, private and charter schools, as well as those enrolled in home-school programs. Posters should depict what severe weather in Florida means to the student. Poster submissions must be postmarked by Feb. 1, and sent to the Capitol Area Chapter of the Red Cross in Tallahassee.

Annual Video PSA Contest

The video PSA contest is open to all Florida middle and high school students enrolled in public, private and charter schools as well as those enrolled in home-school programs. Entries should be a 30-second public service announcement (PSA) that incorporates a safety or preparedness message relating to evacuation planning or disaster supply kits.

One winner will be selected from the middle school entries and one from the high school entries. The winning videos will be professionally re-produced for broadcast use by FDEM in their statewide public awareness campaign. Final digital videos should be submitted via the FDEM Video Portal at www.KidsGetAPlan.com.

All entries must be uploaded by Feb. 1. The top three finalists for each category will be announced Friday, Feb. 7. Online voting will be open to the public from Feb. 8 through Feb. 28. The winners will be announced the first week of March.

Midweek Muddle

Drinks are on the house: how do you like your tea?

I can directly trace my "No Alcohol" policy at company parties to the Christmas of 1977 when I landed at my first newspaper job on the Alabama-Georgia line, delineated by the Chattahoochee River.

At that newspaper, I was the New Kid on the Block in every sense of the description. Everyone else had grown up in that community, knew the pitfalls to avoid, and allowed me to find them on my own. I got the tasks that cub reporters always get: the obituaries, the stories nobody else wanted to do, the tragedies nobody else wanted to cover, the cooking schools the older employees refused to do, and the seminars nobody else was interested in attending. As I had been instructed in journalism school, I said, "Yes sir" to every task given to me, and tried to make myself indispensable because, as my general manager had told me, "Journalists are a dime a dozen."

But for three months, I navigated those troubled waters and was still afloat.

December arrived, and the Christmas party was a lovely affair at the publisher's "estate" which extended to include private, lighted tennis courts and a pool. The party was a catered affair for the daily newspaper staff and significant others. I had met a few "others," but didn't deem any of them significant enough for an office party. So I went with another single girlfriend from the staff, admiring the publisher's house aglow with Christmas lights, professionally decorated for the season and the occasion.

The food was delightful; the alcohol was abundant.

The conversation and camaraderie became more boisterous as the night grew on but I was glad to have somewhere to be in this town which typically rolled up its sidewalks about 9 p.m.

My managing editor--a towering, 6'6" man whom we'll just call Moody--was an unlikeable person who seemed to be part Marine, part male chauvinist pig and part idiot. All that proved true when alcohol was added to the mix.

Even though I'm aware I had "Baptist" engraved on my forehead, I wasn't opposed to everyone else making fools of themselves (in front of their employer and his wife, who wouldn't forget) if that's how they wanted to celebrate the Christmas season.

Moody, however, crossed the line, in a flamboyant manner.

I was in deep conversation with my hostess' mother, the Grand Mother of the publisher's children, who had come for the party, when Moody sauntered over to "chat us up." I could tell by her facial expression that she found him tedious, too. He wasn't a complete idiot, however, because he picked up those social cues and moved back to the rowdy section, largely inhabited by people of his gender who were very jovial and likeable, and also very happy to consume the publisher's liquor even if they had to talk to Moody in the process.

The jokes continued. The food was delicious. We enjoyed lounging by the pool and exchanging insults before gravitating back toward the sumptuous buffet for more of the delicious crab dip. Mrs. Walls found me again and before I had time to prepare myself for what was about to happen, Moody turned around and mooned us...dropping his drawers right there in the dining room of this sprawling estate.

Well, I was shocked and thoroughly disgusted, but the Grand Mother was Appalled (with a capital "A"). Her daughter, the hostess, urgently flew to our aid, corralled us both and led us to another room where I wondered what horrific tragedy I'd have to photograph in order to get this picture out of my head. The publisher looked at his henchman, the newspaper's general manager, and said, "Get him out of here."

And if there was any question about when, he added succinctly, "Now."

The party was really fun, then, until it became obvious that we should all leave.

Moody, of course, had been too drunk to realize that his days were numbered, but I immediately picked up on that finer detail. It had nothing to do with humiliating me although Grand Mother acted as if she was mostly horrified for my benefit--me being a guest, and an impressionable young lady.

I knew the publisher came from a long line of newspaper gurus, but I also knew that his wife wore the pants, the shirt and the hat in that relationship: this was not what she envisioned in the presence of her Old Master silverware.

On the Monday after the party, Moody was nothing but professional to me which annoys me terribly about drunks: they can't recall their offensive behavior and the rest of us are left with images too hideous to forget. It's enough to make you drink, too.

I'm sure I rolled my eyes at him, when he wasn't looking, but I followed through on all my required tasks and still answered him with a "Yes, sir" even though he clearly didn't deserve it. By the end of his day, which included a few closed-door meetings with the publisher, Moody came to apologize.

I offered my forgiveness earnestly and insisted that it didn't bother me in the least--because the only thing worse than Moody and his normal idiocy, was Moody groveling at the feet of someone who fit into that category of "a dime a dozen."

The new year didn't ring in happily for the newspaper man, who disappeared into the sunset, with very little fanfare, and was never heard from again.

I still think of Moody, however, and the impression he made upon me. He taught me little about newspapers, but he has caused me to say, every Christmas since, "Would you care for sweet or unsweet tea?"





as a youth soccer coach as a teenager, and working part-time at Zeigler's Florist to put himself through college.

As an adult, Hall started his career with the Taylor County Sheriff's Office. Deciding to make a career change that would allow him to focus his time on the youth of Taylor County, Hall said he began his career with the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice in 1994. He continues to serve youth and their families in Taylor County, as well as in three surrounding counties, as a supervisor for juvenile probation officers.

Hall currently serves as the chairman of the Taylor County Recreation Advisory Board (TCRAB), which oversees the use and

care of the Taylor County Sports Complex. He is also chairman of the Perry Soccer Association (PSA), as well as the athletic director of the sports program at Point of Grace Christian.

"It is important to me to be involved in every aspect of community life here in Perry, but I am particularly interested in making Perry a place that our young people can come home to, in order to raise their families. It is important that we not lose our children to other communities when we can provide what they need to be happy and successful right here in Perry," Hall said.

NEW HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION APPLICATION

FLORIDA LAW requires that applications be made by MARCH 1, 2014, to be eligible for this exemption.

In order to qualify for this exemption you must:

- Hold title to the property as of January 1, 2014.
- Reside on the property as of January 1, 2014.
- Be a LEGAL resident of the State of Florida as of January 1, 2014.

You must then appear personally at the County Property Appraiser's Office.

PLEASE BRING THE FOLLOWING DOCUMENTATION ON YOU AND YOUR SPOUSE:

Florida Driver's License, Social Security Number, Florida Car Registration, Florida Voter's Registration or Declaration of Domicile. If not a U.S. citizen, bring Residency (Green) card.

If filing on a mobile home you will need to purchase a real property sticker, please bring a copy of your mobile home registration.

AGRICULTURAL (GREENBELT) FILINGS

All owners or lessees of agricultural lands who desire agricultural classifications for tax purposes on their property must file an agricultural application with the Appraiser between January 1 and March 1.

DISABILITY EXEMPTION - \$500.00

Every Florida resident who is totally and permanently disabled qualifies for the \$500 exemption. If filing for the first time, present proof of the total and permanent disability by obtaining a certificate from a licensed Florida physician or by the Social Security Administration. Residency must be as of January 1, 2014.

DISABLED VETERAN'S EXEMPTION \$5,000.00

A disabled veteran who has 10% or more war time disability is entitled to an additional \$5000.00 beyond Homestead Exemption. A "V.A." letter must accompany application. Veterans who are totally and permanently disabled as a result of certain service connected disabilities should contact the Appraiser's Office for determination of other special benefits.

DISCOUNT FOR VETERANS 65 AND OLDER WITH A COMBAT-RELATED DISABILITY

A veteran who is disabled, 65 or older, and owns homestead property may qualify for a property tax discount based on percent of disability. To be eligible, you must have an honorable discharge from military service, be partially disabled with a permanent service-connected disability, at least part of which is combat-related.

AUTOMATICALLY RENEWED

DO NOT RETURN YOUR RENEWAL CARD IF YOU STILL QUALIFY FOR THE EXEMPTION

Is it necessary to apply for homestead exemption each year? No, you will receive an automatic renewal card as long as you had a homestead or agricultural classification last year. Most Taylor Countians who have lived in the same home for a number of years have already made initial application, and therefore do not have to come by the property appraiser's office. However, if you move, or if there is a change of ownership, it is necessary to make new application.

If I move to another residence, is the homestead exemption automatically transferred to my new home? No. Exemptions are NOT automatically transferred. In order for you to receive the exemption on your new home you must apply between January 1 and March 1st.

\$500 WIDOWS/WIDOWERS EXEMPTION

Any widow/widower who is a permanent Florida resident may claim this exemption. If the widow/widower remarries, she/he is no longer eligible and if the husband and wife were divorced before his/her death, the woman is not considered a widow, nor the man a widower. If filing for the first time, please present a recorded copy of a Death Certificate.

TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY

Tangible Personal Property returns must be filed no later than April 1st. Failure to file a return will result in a penalty and an assessment will be made as provided by Florida Law. Tangible Personal Property includes property such as business furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, household goods, and personal effects. (Florida residents are exempt from the tax on household goods and personal effects in their homestead.) The deadline for charitable and qualified non-profit organizations eligible as such exemption is March 1st. All others must file by April 1st.

EXEMPTION FOR TOTALLY AND PERMANENTLY DISABLED PERSONS

Quadriplegics should contact the appraiser's office for special benefit information: If paraplegic, hemiplegic or other totally and permanently disabled person who must use a wheelchair for mobility or who is legally blind may qualify for this exemption. A statement of gross income must accompany the application. If filing for the first time, please bring a certificate from (2) licensed doctors of this state.

3 'Dogs named to 4A All-State team

Three members of the Taylor County High football team have been selected to the Class 4A All-State football team for the 2013 season.

Senior linebacker Luke

Kallschmidt (6-3, 200), along with senior punter Daniel Wentworth (6-1, 190) were selected to the second team defense while senior wide receiver Moral Stephens (6-4, 220)

was an honorable mention selection.

Fish Busters' Bulletin

Crappie anglers enjoy a happy new year

Welcome to 2014. Black crappie are favorite cool-weather targets for freshwater anglers, so join the fun, check your fishing license ([License.MyFWC.com](#)) and the list of top sites and tips below and go fishing. What better way to start off a new year than with some healthy outdoor activity and a mess of fresh fish?

Crappie are among the most popular freshwater fishes in Florida. Their deep body with nearly

symmetrical dorsal and anal fins and a speckled pattern on the body make them easy to distinguish. Crappie spend much of their time offshore, feeding on small fish. This time of year they will be preparing to spawn and, as the temperatures reach 62-65 degrees Fahrenheit, they move inshore to build nests in colonies. Nests over gravel or muddy bottoms in depths of 3-8 feet are fanned by males.

Crappie eat crustaceans, insects and small fishes. A

bright, 1/16-oz. to 1/8-oz. jig or Hal-flies will produce once they are inshore. If they are schooling offshore, drift Missouri minnows or grass shrimp below a float, with a #4 hook and small split shot. Depth is key, as crappie school at the same level, so experiment until you find the right depth.

Crappie (aka speckled perch or papermouth) longer than 14 inches or heavier than 2 pounds qualify

Two major league power pitchers will be conducting a one-day baseball camp here on Saturday, Jan. 25, at the Taylor County High baseball field.

In addition to Mathieson

and Aumont, other professional ball players are expected to attend. The camps will concentrate on pitching, batting, fielding and conditioning skills.


