'His mission was to kill'

Shooting survivor readies for 4th surgery, grateful for outpouring of prayers

Sometimes the best medicine doesn't come in a bottle, but has four paws and a wet nose.

For shooting survivor Mike Cook, a visit from his beloved dog Bella was just what the doctor ordered Sunday afternoon.

Sitting in a wheelchair in the front courtyard outside Doctors' Memorial Hospital, he was able to turn his face toward the sun and, for a brief moment, simply bask in the moment of having his wife close and his favorite "fur child" in his arms.

Peaceful moments like that have been few and far between for the Cook family since the day—just two weeks ago—when a man drove his truck into the lobby of Timberland

Ford and opened fire with a shotgun.

"He had to be going 45-50 miles per hour," Cook said of the driver (later identified as fellow Timberland employee Edward Clague Jr.).

"It was extremely loud and the noise...it just froze me."

Quickly getting over the shock, Mike and his twin brother, Joe (also a Timberland employee) both ran toward the truck.

"I guess we thought somebody had just hit the gas instead of the brake, or maybe they had passed out or something."

It was then Clague exited the truck and started shooting.

"I was pinned in my office...he saw me and we just began the dance of dodging. I was shifting

to the right and when everybody saw he had a gun, they broke left and started running out toward the back door. I broke left and was hit in the top of the head and eventually in the bottom (left) of my back.

"He (Clague) didn't say anything. It was like he was picking apples, had a could-care-less look on his face. He was just going to shoot you and that's it.

"I had never been around the guy. His mission was to kill. I don't know what his thinking process was at that moment. He just had a blank stare with no emotion whatsoever."

At this point, Cook said, he fell to the ground and didn't see much else until paramedics were on scene and transported him to the hospital.

"Leeroy (Driver) came

over to me and was there when the EMTs got to me. It was just very chaotic.

"I'm not really sure what happened after I was shot. From what I've heard, my brother ran to the back and that's when he saw the deputy (Robert Lundy), and he came out and there was more shooting."

Clague was killed, Lundy himself was shot as well as one other individual (Timberland employee John Mahoney).

Lundy remains in critical condition at Shands Hospital in Gainesville; Mahoney is continuing to improve at Tallahassee Memorial Hospital.

Cook's wife, Debra, was at work when an emergency room nurse called to let her know her husband was in

Lee gets life sentence for murder

Raymond Mark Lee, who admitted under oath to bludgeoning Perry resident Derek Dixon to death with an industrial wrench, was sentenced to life in prison Monday morning, Feb. 17.

The sentencing hearing was held two weeks after a jury found Lee guilty of second degree murder in a case that started with the

discovery of Dixon's body hidden in thick underbrush just off U.S. Highway 98.

Although Lee initially pled not guilty to murder charges, he asserted self-defense when the trial got underway Jan. 27 of this year.

Taking the witness stand on his own behalf, Lee told the jury he and Dixon had

gotten into an altercation and "I took it too far."

Lee, who has five previous felony convictions, was sentenced as a violent repeat offender and was also levied fines totaling some \$11,000.

He was also sentenced to five years each (to run concurrently) for two separate counts of tampering

with evidence.

Lee was also given a five-year sentence (concurrent) for violation of probation (VOP).

The former Jacksonville resident was in town working on the Aucilla River bridge project when the murder occurred.

Dixon was a lifelong

resident of Perry, graduating from Taylor County High School in 1986.

His mother and daughter attended the trial, and expressed relief at the jury's verdict.

Dixon's family was given the opportunity to comment during the sentencing hearing Monday, but declined.

Just as I locked up the House Of My Childhood in Greenville, Ala., I heard a commercial for a cruiseline playing on the television set. It suggested a vacation which allows you to "Come back new."

I liked that concept, and noted that without any luxuries or amenities, my home-away-from-home often provides that same feeling. It is quiet; life moves slower; there are only 12 t.v. channels; I don't cook or wash clothes. After two days of such a "vacation," I was prepared to return to Perry, Fla.-- new, despite the grueling events of the previous week.

My car was packed, and I closed the final curtain which always makes me feel a little sentimental. "I'll be back," I assured the brick home, my last true blood relative on this hill.

My car reminded me that I had 100 miles left before it would begin haranguing me about getting gas. I decided to drive, remembering that gas was priced for \$3.05 a gallon about 40 miles away.

In two days' time, the price had increased to \$3.07, but still, what a deal. I pulled up to the pump and proceeded to exit my car when the horn blew, one of its annoying ways of getting my attention. I looked at the message board and it declared, "Remote device left in vehicle."

For those of you who don't have a remote device, it's the contemporary replacement for a key. You don't have to insert it into the ignition; you simply must keep it "on your person" and your car recognizes you as its owner. A remote device has its advantages; it also has its shortcomings and I was about to realize another.

I found the message from my car strange because the device had been in my pocket as I packed. But I searched and it wasn't there.

My first illogical thought (in a series of many)

was, "Ohmigosh, what if I left it 40 miles back at home..." but then I realized the car would not have cranked. Would it?

So I decided I must have put it in my purse, but it was nowhere to be found. I began a preliminary search of the seat cushions, floor mats, cup holders and console.

Nothing.

Was the computer chip within the device malfunctioning? How did the car start for me 40 miles ago if the device wasn't in my possession? And if it was in my possession, where would it be?

The clerks inside were beginning to notice me. In addition to frisking myself and talking to nobody in particular, I was taking up valuable space at the pump while I proceeded to rifle through bags of dirty clothes. In my brief brush with logic, I decided to get gas and hope that the car cranked again when I returned. I knew I couldn't lock it, so I observed that the bearded guy on the motorcycle and the lady in church clothes wouldn't be threats to security.

I raced in; I raced out.

I admit it: I prayed. What in the world am I going to do in Rutledge, Ala., on a Sunday morning if this car doesn't crank?

It cranked and I gave thanks.

Then I called Perry. "I know if I lose my cell phone, I can call the number from another phone and follow the rings to find it. Is there any way to locate a missing remote vehicle entry device?"

The husband responded, "Hate that thing. Just give me a key. What's the advantage anyway?" Although we are old and enjoy such arguments, I wasn't really in the mood for a debate. "Ask the son," I said, and he did.

In a word, the answer was "No."

"Can't you call Onstar?" the husband then asked, and I found that a little irritating, since he was the one who insisted we didn't need Onstar.

"That stupid remote is probably just in your purse," he said, and I knew it was a distinct possibility because my purse always looks like it's ready to be in the audience of "Let's Make a Deal." Before I began driving again, I dumped my purse one more time to find nail polish, cash, checks, breath mints, lipstick, Tagamet, Tylenol, measurements for AC filters, eyeglasses, six lists of things to do, dental floss, cents-off coupons, my cell phone and a notepad.

No remote device.

But my car was running and so I drove. I usually smell the roses, looking at the farmhouses on the left and right, enjoying the camellias at the old homesites, admiring neat front porches on some and wondering why other people are genetically junky.

"Don't turn off the car until you've found the device," the husband had cautioned.

I knew that sounded both ridiculous and reasonable, but good grief, I couldn't make it five hours without food or a bathroom stop.

I pulled up, left my car running, asked the clerk hurriedly, "Please watch my car, I can't turn it off," and then I visited the bathroom and ordered lunch. When I finally turned off the car, the horn blew to signal the message, "Remote device left in vehicle."

I just rolled my eyes.

The husband repeated all my searches, in the seat cushions, behind the seats, under the mats.

We then took the rest of the bags and I tried cranking the car again.

One by one, we took the bags back to the car and attempted to crank it.

When the tote which held my make-up bag was returned to the car, it cranked.

This terry-cloth zippered make-up bag has a two-inch opening where the zipper has pulled away from the cloth. Somehow, we theorized, the key fell from my pocket while I was packing the car and landed in that opening, right there amongst the powder and the mascara.

"What are the chances?" we both exclaimed. "I would have never found it!" I surmised.

I have often thought that vacations—even short, humble ones—require transition. Someone needs to be at the threshold of your home, taking your hand, and reminding you, "You're back. We're sorry the tranquil peace of your getaway is over, but you're back. Now brace yourself. Life with all its twists and turns awaits you."

Come back new?

It's a lovely concept... but my remote device for that wasn't working that day either.

Who knew?

Tomatoes can clean teeth, dissolve animal fat, reduce high blood pressure, relieve bloodshot eyes?

Tomatoes contain lycopene which is one of nature's most powerful antioxidants.

• "Especially when cooked, the tomato has been found to help prevent prostate, lung, stomach, pancreatic, colorectal, esophageal, oral, breast and cervical cancers."

• Most sources agree that cooking tomatoes more than doubles the effectiveness of the lycopene they contain, while a small amount of olive oil—such as what you would add in a pizza or tomato sauce—intensifies the protective effect further.

• Studies have shown that consuming tomatoes with lycopene reduces the risk of cardiovascular disease, and that tomatoes help to dissolve animal fat in butter, cheese, eggs, pork, beef and many deep-fried foods (preventing hardening of the arteries).

• The high potassium content helps reduce high blood pressure. (One jumbo tomato, approximately 3 inches in diameter, weighing 7 ounces, contains nearly 450 mg. of potassium).

• In regions of New Guinea and South America, the fresh leaf of the tomato plant—crushed with some water into a poultice—is applied as an antibiotic for infections.

• Chinese doctors suggest eating one or two fresh tomatoes first thing in the morning on an empty stomach to relieve bloodshot eyes.

• Healing sunburn? Lycopene has been shown to improve the skin's ability to protect against harmful rays. A slice of tomato placed on a sunburn for 15 minutes takes away the burning feeling and prevents the skin from peeling or blistering; or soak peeled

It's almost Tomato Time

Many gardening enthusiasts are starting now or have started vegetable transplants for spring planting, especially tomatoes. The tomato species has numerous types, sizes and colors to choose from. We have the big slicers, Roma, cherry, bush types, etc. as well as colors in (determinate) bush types or vining types that (in-determinate) needing staking.

Tomato seed can be started now inside, protected from frost/freezing temperatures, when temps are consistently above 45 F. Seedlings planted inside following germination, good light is required (strong enough) directly above the plant to keep it from becoming "leggy" (spindly). A good soil with plenty of organic matter is usually best for seed germination and production. Light fertilizer (dilute Miracle Grow) can be used once seed breaks the ground, then periodically until transplanted. Usually after six to eight weeks, small plants can be transplanted to a permanent growing site. This can be in buckets, raised beds, or in the garden spot that has at least 6 hours of direct sun.

Using new ground or soil (not planted with tomato plant family – nightshade- includes peppers, potatoes, and eggplant) is important. Planting the same plant family in the same location year after year develops disease in the soil (bacteria, fungi, virus) particular to that family that kills the plant, so it is important to practice crop (plant family) rotation.

Soil testing prior to planting can show what nutrients are present in the soil and what is needed for good crop production. Manures and compost can greatly enhance production as they hold moisture and nutrients close to the plant. Fertilizers (granular) should be used every 30 days

following transplanting. If soils are deficient in any of the 16 elements required for plant growth, tomato yield, plant health, and longevity will be affected. Rates of fertilizer can be increased as plant size increases and granular materials are longer lasting and less expensive than liquids.

Tomatoes are pollinated by wind, so bees are not necessary for fruit set as they are with cucurbits (melons, squash, etc.) Tomato fruit set will begin as plants get 30 days old after transplanting and continue throughout the plant production cycle.

Fruit set in large slicing type (better boy, big boy, Rutgers etc.) tomatoes will stop after night temperatures reach 70 F degrees, usually sometime in June. After June 30 varieties like Solar Set, or Sunny need to be used for large tomato production during the summer months. This production window will also require some vigilance with disease and insect control. The Cherry, Roma, and smaller types generally do not have that fruit set issues with higher night temperatures and continue to produce as long as pests are

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


the hospital.

"I told them to call my wife, that's what I kept asking them to do."

Debra said, "My first question to her was 'Is it his heart?' She said, 'I can't tell

you.' But I just demanded she tell me and that's when I found out he'd been shot. I called a friend to drive me here."

She hasn't left her husband's side since the shooting and said, "I'm not leaving until he does."

On Tuesday morning,

Cook was facing his fourth surgery and was hoping to be discharged Wednesday.

He sustained a fractured skull and serious internal injuries from the two gunshot wounds that took him down.

"The first surgery took

about five hours, but he came through it really well. They had to go back in the next day to remove damaged tissue. Fortunately he was breathing on his own and didn't need to be put on a respirator," Debra said.

The couple's emotions

remain close to the surface when talking about the long recovery Mike is facing and bubble over when the conversation turns to the support they have received from the community in the face of what is, at times, simply overwhelming.

"The community has

opened their arms to us and Dr. (Miles) Nelson is unbelievable. The hospital, the nurses, everybody has been extremely wonderful. They have shown us such care and compassion.

"It has been a horrific experience, but we are going to get through it."

Facility Location: The existing Perry Mill is located in Taylor County within the city of Perry, Florida at 1509 South Byron Butler Parkway.
Project: The Perry Mill processes south pine logs into chips, bark and graded finished lumber. The facility currently consists of a 46 million British thermal units per hour wood-fired boiler that supplies heat to two indirect-fired lumber kilns. One kiln has an annual capacity of 63 million board feet (MBF/yr) while the other has an annual capacity of 33 MBF/yr. In addition, there is one direct-fired lumber kiln with an annual capacity of 60 MBF/yr. The project involves the replacement of the two existing indirect-fired kilns with a new direct-fired lumber kiln with a capacity of 90 MBF. Also, as a result of this project, the wood-fired boiler will be permanently shut down.
Based on the air permit application submitted by Gilman, and taking into account the reduction in emissions from the replaced kilns and the retired boiler, the project will result in emissions increases of 1.8 tons per year of sulfur dioxide (SO2), 74.1 tons per year of volatile organic compounds (VOC) and 14,469 TPY of carbon dioxide equivalents (CO2e) or greenhouse gases (GHG). Emissions of all other criteria



pollutants will be reduced as a result of this project. As defined in Rule 62-210.200, F.A.C., the project results in significant net emissions increases for VOC emissions thereby requiring a Best Available Control Technology (BACT) determination for this pollutant. The project does not trigger PSD for SO2 or GHG.
