Crossing the county line Friday, TCSO Deputy Robert Lundy said the long-awaited words his brothers and sisters in law enforcement had been waiting to hear for more than two months: "TC28 to Perry...10-8." The call signaled he was home (back in service).

Coming home

"I'm coming home."
When Taylor County Sheriff's Deputy Robert Lundy said those three simple words Friday morning, it sparked a flurry of actions from the front door of the rehab center in Gainesville to the driveway of his front yard in Steinhatchee.

community supporters lined the route to welcome this hometown hero. There was even a helicopter escorting the caravan.
"It was a very overwhelming and humbling moment...to see and realize the many people God has put in my life. It was very emotional—a happy emotional journey," Lundy said.

Gainesville included representatives from Perry and Taylor County law enforcement departments as well as units from Dixie and Alachua counties.
Academy students in Gainesville, high school students in Cross City and elementary students in Steinhatchee all came out to cheer Lundy and his family.
"It was just heartwarming and indescribable to see the

children at the schools come out and when we turned on the bridge (in Steinhatchee) and saw all the people, it is all something we'll never forget."
Nearly a hundred people crowded into Lundy's driveway as the welcome celebration slipped into the afternoon.

Victims 'targeted,' 1 was shot in the face

One of the victims of last week's bloody home invasion has been released from the hospital while the second victim remains in serious condition at an area facility, recovering from multiple wounds—including a gunshot to the face.
The two suspects charged with attempted first degree murder in the case, Jordan White, 19, and Aaron Price, 26, remain in custody.

Brown resigns as county administrator

Taylor County Administrator Jack Brown will soon leave his position here to take a new job as the Escambia County administrator.
The Taylor County Commission held a special meeting Monday afternoon during which Brown gave his formal notice to the board, which subsequently voted to offer Assistant County Administrator Dustin Hinkel a one-year contract to fill Brown's role (see related story).
On Thursday, April 10, the Escambia County Commission voted unanimously to select Brown as their new administrator—ending a 19-month search—offering him a one-year contract.
When asked Tuesday, Brown said he first applied for the job in October, adding that he spoke with commissioners here individually prior to doing so.

Hinkel hired to replace Brown

The Taylor County Commission's search for a new county administrator to replace Jack Brown lasted about 15 minutes, with the board voting 4-1 to offer Assistant County Administrator Dustin Hinkel a one-year contract to fill the soon-to-be vacant position.
The commission made the decision at a special meeting held Monday, during which Brown gave

Suspected bank robber caught

A suspect who is believed to have robbed two Live Oak banks—and is possibly linked to a bank robbery here at Citizens State Bank—was captured and taken into custody in Tallahassee Monday, according to Live Oak

Police Chief Buddy Williams.
Kenneth Lamar Ellington, 45, of Quincy, allegedly entered both banks wearing a knitted hat, dark jacket, boots, a fake beard, mustache and wig, and robbed TD Bank and the

First Federal Bank South Branch by passing a note to a teller. Reports indicate this scenario was similar to Perry's bank robbery.
The Perry Police Department is coordinating its investigation with the Live Oak police.

Tag fees going down

With Florida Gov. Rick Scott signing Senate Bill 156, which rolled back many of the 2009 tax increases on motor vehicle registration renewals, Taylor County Tax Collector Mark Wiggins is recommending residents not purchase a two-year tag renewal until after the new law goes into effect in September.
"Last winter, we announced our intent to return \$500 million to Floridians by cutting taxes," Scott said after signing the bill. "Today, we are rolling back many of the 2009 tax increases on annual motor vehicle registrations. This will result in an annual

A World War II-era TBM-3E Avenger bomber made an unscheduled pitstop at the Perry-Foley Airport this past weekend. The plane was on its way to Cactus Air Force Wings and Wheels Museum from Titusville, where it had been a resident for the past several years. Tim Brune and Lee Griffin with the Cactus Air Force had spent the previous week getting the plane ready for its flight, but they heard a "pop" while flying near here and decided to land to check it out. They discovered a problem with a magneto and were awaiting a replacement part and specialized tools before they could resume their flight, which they expect will have another 11 (planned) stops before reaching Carson City. This particular Avenger has a "war pedigree" and saw action during four Pacific campaigns of World War II. It later found service in Canada as a fire-bomber.

his formal notice that he was leaving his position here to become Escambia County's (Pensacola) new administrator.

Hinkel has been assistant county administrator since September 2011. Prior to that, he was Taylor County Emergency Management director, a position he still holds. Hinkel started with the county in December 2009 as emergency management coordinator.

He is a graduate of the University of South Florida, where he received a bachelor's degree in environmental policy and a master's degree in geography.

Hinkel and his wife currently reside in Leon County, but they will be moving to Taylor County to meet the residency requirement for the county administrator position.

At Monday's meeting, Commission Chairman Malcolm Page asked County Attorney Conrad Bishop if the board could hire a new administrator without advertising the position. He was told they could.

The board then discussed the possibilities of hiring Hinkel on an interim basis for six months or offering him the position outright on a one-year contract. (Brown was offered a one-

year contract with Escambia County.)

During discussions, County Commissioner Pam Feagle suggested hiring Hinkel on an interim basis and not filling the assistant administrator position.

"I feel if we hire him without an assistant, we're setting him up to fail," Page said.

He then asked Hinkel if he would accept a one-year contract, and Hinkel said he would.

Commissioner Jim Moody said he was not in favor of offering a one-year contract without first advertising the position.

Feagle added that she had spoken with several members of the public and felt a search was in order.

Commissioner Jody DeVane said he was worried about the scenario in which the county lost Brown and Hinkel and had to bring someone in who didn't know about ongoing projects and activities.

"I have full confidence in Dustin," Commissioner Pat Patterson said. "He is an educated man and a man of integrity."

She then made a motion to offer Hinkel a one-year contract to be negotiated with Bishop and Page. DeVane offered a second.

During discussion of the motion, Feagle said that she had nothing against Hinkel and told him that if he was

hired by the board, she would "support you in every way I can and help you in every way I can."

Moody then asked Hinkel if he would move to Taylor County if offered the contract, and Hinkel said he would.

Patterson called for an end of discussions, and the vote was 4-1, with Feagle voting against.

"I just want to thank the board for your support in allowing me this opportunity to serve in this capacity," Hinkel said following the vote.

"I know making that decision wasn't easy, but I hope that in the course of the year you have given me, I will make your minds more confident in my abilities to lead this organization."



Warmer waters bring return of 'feisty' Spanish mackerel to Florida waters

Across Florida there are signs that spring has sprung, from the fine layer of yellow pollen coating everything in the north to folks returning to the water sans wetsuit in the south.

Warmer water also means the return of Spanish mackerel, a feisty fish that migrates south when the water temperature dips below 70, and should be returning to north Florida waters right about now.

Spanish mackerel are easy to catch, making them a great target for kids and those new to the sport, but their aggressive fighting behavior when on the line also makes them exciting for seasoned veterans.

Interested in catching a Spanish mackerel or two? Spring and early summer are a great time to target these fish as they move north along the coast. They frequent nearshore sandy and grassy areas, from bays to beaches and piers, but can also be caught farther offshore. Spanish mackerel typically follow baitfish, so look for areas where fish are jumping.

The main two ways to target Spanish mackerel are trolling for them (running a line behind your boat while it is in motion) and casting.

When it comes to gear, the goal is to replicate baitfish.

If you are trolling for them, many people use what is called a mackerel tree, a series of hooks on a line with pieces of tubing acting as lures near each hook followed by a trolling spoon.

If you plan to fish for Spanish mackerel by casting, then spoons, jigs or any shallow diving lure will work. Spanish mackerel are a fairly fragile fish that need to be handled carefully and quickly when catching and releasing.

If your artificial lures have treble hooks on them, consider bending down all the barbs or replacing the treble hooks with single

hooks. Treble hooks can cause significant damage to a fish.

Unlike some species, Spanish mackerel will go after a wide variety of artificial lures, but if you are a natural-bait fan, try threadfin herring, cigar minnows or finger-sized mullet.

Mackerel have extremely sharp teeth. So if you don't want to lose your lure and your line, make sure to use a leader that is at least 30 pound test. Above that, a good light spinning rod with 10- to 15-pound test will be plenty to reel in the fish.

Whether or not you ever hit the daily bag limit of 15 Spanish mackerel per person in state waters, there are plenty of other fish nearby to target, such as bluefish and lady fish, which also follow bait around.

Be sure to keep a measuring device nearby. The minimum size limit for Spanish mackerel is 12 inches fork length, which is measured from the tip of the lower jaw with the mouth closed to the center of the fork in the tail. Be sure to use a straight line measurement and not a flexible tape, as this can throw off your measurement.

Size limits and bag limits help ensure the Spanish mackerel population remains sustainable for future generations. The first statewide daily bag limit was set in 1986 and was four fish per person. This was increased to five in 1991, to 10 in 1993 and to where it is today, 15, in 2000. The size limit went into effect in 1999.

Find a keeper or two? Spanish mackerel are best eaten fresh, not frozen, within the first three days of being caught. Make sure to ice them down good and keep them cold. They can be grilled, fried, baked or smoked.

Catch a really big one? The current state record is 12 pounds, caught off Fort

Pierce in 1984, and the world record is 13 pounds caught in North Carolina in 1987. If you think you can beat that, visit the International Game Fish Association website at IGFA.org or, for state records, visit MyFWC.com/Fishing and click on "Saltwater" and "Grand Slam/Fishing Records."

Along Suwannee River

Additional no-wake zones activated

Two additional idle-speed, no-wake zones were reactivated on the Suwannee River Saturday, according to Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) officials. Three zones are now active on the Santa Fe and Suwannee rivers.

Zone 3, a 23-mile segment, which runs from Little River Spring to the

County Road 340 Bridge at Rock Bluff, was activated when the gauge at Branford reached 24 feet. Zone 3 was previously activated March 25 and lifted April 3.

Restrictions on the Suwannee River's Zone 4 are once again in place after the zone was deactivated April 10. The FWC reactivated boating restrictions on Zone 4 when water levels once

again reached 9 feet at the Wilcox gauge.

This section is from the County Road 340 Bridge at Rock Bluff to 1 mile below the Fowler Bluff Boat Ramp. This 51-mile segment becomes an idle-speed, no-wake zone when the Suwannee is at 9 feet on the Wilcox gauge, where flood stage is 11 feet. Zone 5 is also still active.

This 32-mile section on the Santa Fe River, which runs from River Rise within O'Leno State Park west to the confluence of the Suwannee River, was activated March 19. This area of the river becomes an idle-speed, no-wake zone when the Santa Fe River reaches 17 feet as indicated on the Three Rivers gauge, where flood stage is 19 feet.

Funds being raised to find a cure for Barth Syndrome

Dear Editor:

I am currently trying to raise funds for The Barth Syndrome Foundation (BSF), as well as raise awareness for the orphan disorder known as Barth Syndrome.

Barth Syndrome is a genetic heart condition that is passed from a mother, who shows no symptoms of this disorder, to her son. Symptoms include, but are not limited to, a weakened heart muscle, an enlarged heart and a decreased ability to fight bacterial infections. Boys born with this disease often do not survive past childhood without proper diagnosis and treatment. However, with the advances in treatment and new scientific research, boys are surviving and becoming men.

The Barth Syndrome Foundation is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to the education, advancement in treatment and search for a cure of Barth Syndrome. The BSF is the only organization in the world that is dedicated to this disorder.

I became involved in this organization after the passing of my best friend, Michael "Mikey" Bowen in December 2009. His

mother, Shelley Bowen (affectionately known as "Mama" or "Mama Shelley" to many of Michael's friends) began this organization in her living room floor off of Puckett Road.

After losing her first son, Evan, to Barth, she took Michael to meet with Dr. Peter Barth in Amsterdam to receive official diagnosis. Dr. Barth told her that there were other boys out there like Mikey--other Barth boys. She set forth to find them. Mama Shelley did just that. Despite its seemingly humble beginning, BSF is now a worldwide organization. Currently, there are less than 200 boys in the world that are diagnosed with Barth Syndrome.

Every two years, the foundation hosts its biennial Barth Syndrome Family, Medical and Scientific Conference...the families pay nothing to attend this conference. At the conference, the boys and their family are able to come together and meet with researchers, doctors and scientists who are studying Barth in hopes of finding a better treatment or cure.

This year, I am lucky enough to be a part of this conference and volunteer

to be part of the childcare team. It is my hope to make this conference a fun and memorable time for the boys, their siblings and their parents.

Sunrise, sunset

I forced myself to be quiet the other morning. "Ten minutes," I allowed myself, with the bedroom windows flung open.

That's when the birds sang to me. It seems that birds especially love Daylight Savings Time, or is it that I was previously asleep when they were singing?

Anyway, birds apparently start of the day off happy, which makes them unique among all other living creatures.

In my 10 minutes, I heard a mourning dove making a four-count call every 20 seconds. Cardinals were conversing among themselves while the tiniest birds I can't identify belted out tunes to make one's heart soar. Downstairs, the automatic dishwasher moved from one cycle to another, whirring water and detergent over a load of well-used dishes.

It became an orchestra of sorts, with woodwindish dove sounds, matched by the "strings" of the dishwasher and punctuated by the barks of neighborhood dogs.

I enjoyed the symphony from the comfort of my bed and thought perhaps that my father would be proud of me...but I should get up.

He believed that for a day to go well, you should get up long before the sun does. He was bathed and shaved before dawn, with morning newspaper and coffee in hand. He often sat outside, as the sun rose behind our house, topping the tall pine trees and backlighting the landscape. There before him were birds, plenty of birds. Choirs of songbirds. Cardinals. Thrashers. Mockingbirds. Bluebirds. Blue jays. Prissy wrens.

I think what my father liked most about the morning was the quiet. Once the two women at his house emerged from their bedrooms, quiet was scarce. He couldn't have stood that kind of clamor much earlier.

So he not only got up early to meet the sun, but to brace himself for whatever might follow.

And even though I suspect that he didn't want company at the earliest hours of the day, he often suggested that we should make a point to occasionally see the sun rise.

"I've seen the sun rise," said Mother, refusing his invitation.

"I haven't," I said.

They both looked at me and then at each other. Mother asked, "You've never seen the sun rise?"

"No, but I've seen plenty of sunsets," I gave as my defense.

Suddenly, they realized what a shallow life I had lived.

"It's just the flipside of," I suggested, and they shook their heads at their teenage child. "I can't believe you've lived this long and never seen a sunrise," my father said, definitely disappointed.

"I will," I said confidently, for I knew it would eventually be required.

The first sunrise I recall, however, was not required. It was optional. I was with a group of friends at a then-nondescript beach in Florida, called Navarre. No one had heard of it until the 1970s when "Jaws" was filmed off the coastline. Until then, it was nothing more than a handful of houses--one of which belonged to a friend's family. Every summer, 10 of us made a pilgrimage to that beach under the watchful eyes of the parents-in-charge.

What fun we had. One of our really fun friends suggested that, on the final night of our stay, we should sleep on the beach so we could wake up to the sunrise.

I thought, "My father will be so pleased."

In retrospect, I'm thinking: those parents let us sleep on the beach? But it was a remote beach, you see; and nobody killed anybody then without a good reason.

Shortly after midnight, we packed our towels and blankets, and trekked over the dunes to prepare for the sunrise. I don't remember falling asleep until someone woke me up to say that the sun was rising. I sat straight up and found myself surrounded by the biggest sun I had ever seen. It stretched from one side of the universe to the other, capable of consuming us all.

I blinked and blinked, and watched the sun take possession of the water and the beach, splashing new colors on both. And I remember thinking to myself, "This is pretty cool."

And then, with a suddenness which was disarming, the morning show started to blend in with the clouds and the sky, as the sun cast an overall pink around us and morning dawned. We ate doughnuts and drank milk.

And we felt wretched.

We had to scale those sand dunes, drag blankets, take sheets off beds at the beach house, pack up groceries, clothes, 41 bottles of shampoo and suntan lotion, and load them into a station wagon for a three-hour drive home. We sang; we talked; it never occurred to us to sleep.

We were individually dropped off at our homes, with loud goodbyes and fabulous memories. But I remember sitting down and saying to my father, "I think I may cry."

He looked alarmed and asked why. "I saw the sunrise this morning," I said.

"It's beautiful, isn't it?" he added. "But I'm so exhausted. I saw 3 a.m., too."

He shook his head at me again, and he did a lot of that during my teenage years, as I recall.

Then he and I agreed that I never had to see a sunset again, if I didn't want to.

I felt much better, and immediately entered the Land of Sleep where I am--to this day--so very comfortable.

to recover evidence that was discarded by the suspect, Perry Police Department Capt. Jamie Cruse said. "This was not a random act. These (the victims) were targeted individuals." Few details relating to

the investigation have been released; however, Cruse confirmed that the victims were transported to the hospital by a private vehicle. "We were first notified when they arrived at the emergency room with gunshot wounds." The first arrest in the case came less than four hours

after the 10 p.m. break-in. The second suspect (Price) was in custody just six hours later, around 7:30 a.m. Thursday. The home invasion occurred at a residence on Glenn Street. During the robbery, a male and a female victim (whose identities have not

Brown takes top county job in Escambia

"I would never apply for a job without letting my boss know I was applying," Brown said.

"I think it's a beautiful area," he said of Escambia County. "I think any individual wants to take on bigger challenges. I think it's a great opportunity."

Escambia County, which includes the city of Pensacola, is home to 297,000 residents.

"It's been great," he said of his time working for Taylor County. "I've enjoyed working with the different boards."

Brown previously served as county manager from March 1997 to September 2001.

He was elected to the Taylor County Commission in 2002, representing District IV. In early 2006, he announced he would not seek re-election and later applied for the county administrator position after then Administrator Buddy Humphries announced his retirement.

The commission hired Brown out of a narrowed list of five applicants in October 2006.

"It's been great to represent Taylor County as county administrator, to be a member of this community and to be able to serve the public and serve you individually," Brown said at Monday's commission meeting.

"It's with mixed feelings

I'm leaving you. I was born and raised in Taylor County. I love this community."

Brown then requested the commission consider allowing him to leave in 30 days rather than the 90 days as stated in his contract with the county, noting that he had 620 hours of accrued vacation time.

He added that he felt Hinkel was prepared to take care of the county's business in his absence.

When Commissioner Chairman Malcolm Page asked for opinions from the board, Commissioner Pam Feagle spoke first, saying she would like the board to "at least address" the idea of holding Brown to the 90 days to give the commission additional time to search for a replacement.

The rest of the board, however, stated they were comfortable with allowing Brown to leave after 30 days, with Commissioner Pat Patterson making a motion to that effect.

Commissioner Jody DeVane seconded and the measure passed 4-1, with Feagle voting against.

"Taylor County has been great to me and my family," Brown said Tuesday. "I'll miss a lot of people here. I have good friends here."

"I will miss our staff. We have a lot of good people who work hard behind the scenes where the public doesn't always see them. The county has a good commission who debate the issues, but at the end of the vote, work together."
