Snyder's-Lance starting work on new pre-treatment system

Snyder's-Lance Inc., a leading manufacturer and distributor of premium snacks, will soon break ground on a new, state-of-the-art wastewater pre-treatment plant at its manufacturing facility in Perry. Because of the importance of this facility to the company and the community, Snyder's-Lance has invested significant funds for this highly specialized construction project, company officials said. The company will begin preparing the site in the coming weeks and expects construction to take several months.

Snyder's-Lance engaged an external consulting firm to develop a treatment process and plant design that is appropriate for the community and also accommodates future growth and use, officials said. The wastewater pre-treatment plant will be completely enclosed and provide greater efficiencies and treatment for the wastewater at this facility. Upon completion and full implementation of the new plant, the existing wastewater lagoon will be decommissioned and removed from the site. During construction, the company will do its best to mitigate any odor related to the existing treatment

County buys building for elections office

In an attempt to alleviate overcrowding within the county courthouse, commissioners are finalizing the purchase of a former convenience store on U.S. 19 to be the future home of the Taylor County Supervisor of Elections office. County commissioners unanimously approved closing paperwork Monday night for the property, which they are purchasing for \$137,000. The board

included funds for the purchase in its 2013-14 budget. According to Supervisor of Elections Dana Southerland, she settled on the site, which is located just north of Doctors' Memorial Hospital, after a nearly year-long search of

July's new laws include restrictions on selling e-cigarettes, expansion of state move-over rule

The Florida Legislature passed more than 100 laws this past spring, and many of them went into effect last week for the first time, including a ban on selling e-cigarettes to minors and a prohibition against insurance companies from denying coverage because a person owns a gun. The changes in Florida law which went into effect on July 1 include:

- Under **Senate Bill 224**, it is now unlawful to sell e-cigarettes to minors, bringing the devices in line with existing bans on tobacco products.
- **House Bill 1131** provides for the increased availability of epinephrine auto-injectors for those experiencing severe allergic reactions by allowing restaurants, theme parks, sports arenas and similar establishments to acquire a prescription, after a representative receives training, to keep injectors onsite. The new law also provides civil liability immunity for those following the statutes.
- **House Bill 424** prohibits property or automobile insurers from refusing to issue, reissue, or renew a policy,

The Founders Fellowship conference offers lectures by constitutional scholars and classroom lessons on topics including property and commerce and the Constitution, public policy debates about central economic planning, and Supreme Court decisions regarding property rights, among others. Sadler is one of seven teachers sponsored to attend from GP's facility communities across Alabama, Arkansas, California, Florida, Texas and Wisconsin. "GP and the Foley Cellulose Mill are proud to support teachers, like Sonya, who desire to teach the Constitution and the freedoms it provides for our students," said Foley Cellulose Public Affairs Manager Scott Mixon. "We value teachers who educate our children to understand the intent and ideas of America's founders, leading to greater entrepreneurship and a stronger free enterprise system." More Floridians using the sun to power homes

Consumer confidence in generating and using renewables continued to increase this year, according to electric utility reports filed with the Florida Public Service Commission (PSC). Customer-owned renewable energy grew approximately 27 percent in 2013, to 6,697 systems, up from 5,302 in 2012. Statewide, electric generation capacity from these systems reached 63,055 kilowatts (kW), an approximate 49 percent increase since last year.

Florida's PSC assisted this growth by establishing rules in 2007 that promote development of customer-owned renewable generation. By making it easier for customers to interconnect their system with the utility's grid, the PSC's net metering rules encourage customer use of clean renewable generation that also lowers their utility bills. Since the first year of reporting, the number of renewable systems has increased more than elevenfold.

When customers generate more energy than they use in a billing cycle, putting more electricity back into the grid than they took, the net metering rules require electric utilities to credit the

customer's next bill at the full retail price.

"That helps customers offset the high cost of having their own renewable energy systems," said PSC Chairman Art Graham. "Full retail credit under net metering was adopted by the PSC as a way to 'prime the pump,' and it has accelerated the momentum of renewables."

Solar photovoltaic panels continue to be the most popular renewable choice; however, wind turbines and anaerobic digester usage is increasing. Anaerobic digestion is a multi-step process that uses microorganisms to break down organic material to form methane and carbon dioxide gases, which are used to generate electricity.

Florida's investor-owned utilities (IOUs)—Florida Power & Light Company, Duke Energy Florida, Tampa Electric Company, Gulf Power Company and Florida Public Utilities Company—are required by the rules to offer an expedited interconnection agreement process so that homeowners and businesses interested in generating their own energy can do so quickly.

Customers who receive

their electricity from a municipal electric utility or a rural electric cooperative also have renewable generation incentives. Every Florida municipal and cooperative that sells electricity at retail is required, by statute, to provide a standardized interconnection agreement and net metering program for customer-owned renewable generation systems.

Residents interested in learning more about interconnecting renewable generation systems or net metering should contact their local utility for procedures and eligibility requirements.

To help encourage the development of solar energy in Florida, the PSC approved IOU solar energy pilot programs that provide customer rebates to offset some installation costs for solar photovoltaic and solar hot water heating systems. The programs also provide solar energy equipment to low-income customers and to schools. Approved through 2014, the pilot programs include an annual expenditure cap to limit the rate impact to all customers.


The Projects Board has

Midweek Muddle

Snakes alive

On a country ride in the 1960s, my father and I happened upon a rattlesnake crossing the road in what was absolutely the middle of nowhere. My father skillfully veered his winged, blue Chevrolet over that snake, keeping the world a safer place for both of us, and perhaps others, too.

Twenty years later, when we were driving to pick up firewood, I stunned him when I said, "This is where you ran over that rattlesnake."

He was astonished. The only landmarks in the area were kudzu and grapevine.

"You remember that?" he asked. "It must have been 20 years ago."

I remember how the sky met the landscape; I remember the kudzu climbing the power poles; I remember the clay-filled culvert. I remember it all.

Truth is, I may not be able to find my car keys or remember where I put a Christmas present I bought in July, but I can tell you every place in my world where I have seen a snake.

By the hydrant

I was trying to place palm branches in a container filled with water to keep them fresh for the Palm Sunday processional at church. It was dusk, when day meets dark, and I bent down to position the last palm frond when a snake slithered up the wall by the hydrant, about three inches from my back side.

I threw the palms and the water, then tripped over the dog, before lunging into the house and screaming, "There's a snake."

Always and forever, the answer is the same: what kind of snake?

Really? Not, "Are you okay?" or, "Here, let me help and protect you..."

I don't usually know what kind of snake it is, and I have tried to convince myself that I should, but a snake is a snake. As it turns out, this one was an oak snake—harmless, people will tell you. I, however, don't believe anything which makes my blood pressure spike should be deemed harmless.

Up the oak tree

Any hunter will tell you that your camouflage must match the woods in which you hunt. Any hunter may have learned that from an oak snake which is perfectly shaded in order to completely disguise himself while slithering up a tree. If I hadn't spotted the snake first on my patio, I would have never seen him on the tree trunk, even though I had weeded the garden below, just moments before.

He traveled high in that tree, as high as I could see, and I had to wonder: where's a squirrel when you need one?

That same camouflage works for snakes in the grout between the flagstone. I once saw a snake

on my courtyard wall, traveling in style, away from the roses I had just pruned, snaking his way around the big stones and little ones too.

Where was he when my hands were deep into the bushes?

I flashed back and flashed hot as I remembered that I had observed a coral snake in the same location. For that sighting, I rushed inside for I couldn't remember whether the saying was, "Red on black, jump back jack," or "Red on yellow, friendly fellow."

Do coral snakes wonder why people recite platitudes in their presence?

Always by the hose

Snakes immediately recognize water hoses as distant cousins and will often flock to them where they can stretch out underneath horizontally, or imitate the curvature of the hose with their muscular body.

I now throw things at my hose before I pick it up. It seems logical to me, if not to those who observe such behavior.

In my hydrangeas

My blue hydrangeas are my pride and joy. They grow happily over the drain field for the septic tank line, and you can decide why. Expert gardeners vary on whether bushes should be cut back in the spring, but I generally lean toward a light pruning.

That was my protocol until I caught two black snakes mating on the limbs near the base of my hydrangea bush.

I now approach my blue hydrangeas with caution; I am too young to see that again and I am too old to log in another snake sighting.

Is it me?

We live on three acres. How is it that snakes find their way to my hose, my hydrangeas, my oak tree, my courtyard wall?

As I child, I would only read the "S" World Book in the direst of circumstances. I veered away from that volume because of its extensive color plates on snakes.

If I saw the pictures of snakes, I dreamed of them. I adhered to the "out of sight, out of mind" philosophy and if I had the opportunity to do a report on J.D. Salinger or Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, I picked Longfellow. No snake pictures to confront.

Now, when I'm old enough to know better, I only look for snakes in the places I have seen them...as if they only seek out a hose, or a hydrangea.

It's ludicrous, I know, to believe that the descendants from that snake from 50 years ago, only cross that country road where I saw the original predator.

But I do.

And I file it under "S" where I always proceed with caution.



potential properties. "We started looking around the courthouse," she said. "I would have loved to be downtown. We looked at every empty building we could find. We even looked in shopping centers. The county wanted to buy a property. They didn't want to lease, but we would have

leased a building if we could have found one that would accommodate our needs.

"We need room to grow," she added.

According to Southerland, they chose the building (located at 433 U.S. 19 North) because the rear of the parcel is adjacent to

property already owned by the county.

This will allow the county to eventually expand the building to include warehouse space for the supervisor of elections' equipment, which is currently housed at the county road department, she

said. There is no timetable on when the move will occur, but Southerland said it will not be before the current election cycle. When she moves will be determined by the amount of time it takes for the needed renovations to be made to the building.

In June, First Presbyterian Church commissioned missionaries for service in Jamaica. Bob Bell made his 16th journey with JEMM (the Jamaican Ecumenical Medical Mission). He was accompanied by Kristie Harper, Brad Wilson and Emily Rouse who helped other members of the JEMM team provide medications and clinical care.

"We see a lot of high blood pressure, diabetes and people suffering from the impacts of hard work in the elements," Bell said. While many were administering medical care, another group built a house for a woman suffering from HIV. As Bell explained, individuals with HIV are ostracized from their families and this woman had been living in the outskirts with her children.



"Part of a nurse's job is to teach," and Kristie Harper shared her skills at clinics in Jamaica, with Emily Rouse, Bob Bell and Brad Davis. She and Emily are pictured below with a Jamaican friend and co-worker, Pearl.



The medical team saw 300-350 patients; the dental team served 300. "We're not the only medical team which comes to the area," Bell said, but photographs underscored the warm welcome they received. "These women came to the clinic, dressed to the nines. The churches we worked with fed us and the women even got together to bring their china from home. It was a sweet gesture."

Chicken Foot Soup is among Bell's favorites from the region, but Harper loved the mango trees "just dripping with delicious fruit." In addition to a spectrum of antibiotics, the team brought school supplies for the children. The motto was unforgettable: "Every child can learn; every child must learn."

Also in June, First Baptist Church sent Pastor Campbell with Sandy and Benny Duff, Bonnie Sue Agner, Sheryl Ann Curles, Jordan Crouse and Haley Jones to New York City. "Our team partnered with Salem Church for Hurricane Sandy relief. While we were there, we teamed up with Tunnels 2 Towers, a non-profit organization that was birthed in honor of a firefighter who lost his life on 9/11.

'Big Catch' program features 33 targets

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) encourages families and young anglers to try a diversity of freshwater fishing locations and techniques to catch a variety of fish.

The "Big Catch" program is Florida's family-

friendly, freshwater angler-recognition program, with 33 different freshwater fish to target. Simply catch a fish that exceeds the qualifying length or weight, take a photo and submit it to BigCatchFlorida.com. Special youth sizes encourage their participation, and qualifiers earn a customized color-certificate, decal and discount for a photo mount.

Big Catch's origins go back to 1953, but the concept was revamped in 1996 with creation of categories for Specialists (five qualifying fish of the same species), Masters (five qualifying fish of different species) and Elite anglers (10 qualifying fish of different species), as well as a youth category representing a size roughly 25-percent smaller than the adult qualification size.

Rules were relaxed to allow either a length or weight measurement to qualify.

Ivan Salis of Callahan was an early participant following the program's rebirth and quickly qualified as a Channel Catfish Specialist, which remains his passion. Salis came from Ohio after a stint in the Merchant Marines. Now he is sharing his love of fishing with the next generation.

About nine months ago, Salis met Ishmael Lacoste, a 12-year-old, whose mother knew Lacoste's wife. Lacoste saw Salis' Specialist Certificate and became intrigued. Salis has

since mentored Lacoste in his quest to become a successful angler. We are talking commitment, passion and love for fishing.

The bulk of the work was completed in homes, repairing hurricane damage. The remainder of our time allowed for us to assist in the ministries of Salem Church," Campbell said.

"We canvassed neighborhoods, engaged people in the public arena, and found popular places

on Staten Island to share the gospel message of Jesus Christ. The conclusion and climax of the week was a celebration service on a Sunday morning. This was an outdoor service in a park near the church. Here, we had the privilege of watching 30-plus people be baptized. We then served the community lunch."

This will be the second year that Jon Anderson has served on the staff with Youth Conference Ministries (YCM), traveling through the United States for two months to many of the Fun in the Son and The Great Escape events.

Twenty-two people from Perry participated in the Hands & Feet mission in Haiti where the goal is "to care for the world's orphaned and abandoned with the love of Christ."

This was Kendall Cruce's fourth trip. "When Dorie, Kellie and I were looking for a mission trip, we really loved the vision of the Hands & Feet organization. They don't just care for these children in Haiti to make them available for adoption. Instead, they want to give them proper schooling and as many opportunities as possible so they can grow up in Haiti and bring about the changes needed in their country," Cruce said.

The Children's Village houses 66 children and employs another 60 Haitians. "They have house moms and nannies who are like real moms to these children. Others work in the kitchen, do laundry or construction. They want their workers to be Haitian so they can pay them a wage which will, in turn, help their families."

When volunteers arrive, Cruce says their tasks are as varied as the individuals who make the journey. "When Kellie went, she was a nurse so she did medical assessments. But we have done it all: bookkeeping, construction, painting, organization—we usually work from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m., and then we have time with the kids, to play."

The Cruces' devotion to the Children's Village

(Dorie has made five trips, and Kellie, three), has reverberated throughout Perry. "We all come back and become advocates for this mission," she said. "Currently, 18 children are being sponsored through our church (First Baptist)." She wears a bracelet from a young boy "and it reminds me to pray for him," she said. "I know what prayer can do." Facebook updates keep her in touch.

"What we do for these children in Haiti is nothing; what they do for us is everything," she said.

canceling or otherwise terminating a policy, or charging an unfairly discriminatory rate based on the lawful use, possession or ownership of a firearm or ammunition by the insurance applicant.

• **House Bill 523** allows county tax collectors to take concealed weapon permit applications and establishes a process through which collectors can apply to accept permit applications. Meanwhile, **House Bill 525** adds an exemption to state public record laws for personal information (held by county tax collectors) of those who have applied for a license to carry a concealed weapon or firearm.

• **HB 7005** expands Florida's move-over law, which previously included emergency vehicles and wreckers, to also include sanitation and utility service vehicles. The law requires motorists passing such vehicles to vacate the lane closest to stopped vehicle or, if unable to do so, slow to 20 mph below the posted speed limit.

• **Senate Bill 450** prohibits a telephone solicitor from transmitting certain text messages to a consumer if the consumer is on the "no sales solicitation calls" list maintained by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services or if the consumer has previously communicated such a request to the telephone solicitor.

TrophyCatch rewards anglers who catch, document and release bass

In nine months, Lacoste has submitted nearly 40 qualifying Big Catches culminating in earning his Elite Angler Certificate on June 4. His first Big Catch was a longnose gar on Nov. 23, 2013. It was followed by bass, bluegill, brown bullhead and redear sunfish, earning him his Master Angler Certificate in January. To attain his elite status he added spotted sunfish, Florida gar, warmouth, bowfin and yellow bullhead. Along the way, he has been recognized as a specialist for six different species and documented a Bream Slam (catching four different panfish species on the same day).

"I'd like to make fishing a career someday," said Lacoste, who is home-schooled. He is very appreciative of Salis' mentoring him and being so inspirational. Together they have persevered through

wind, rain and yellow flies in their ongoing quest.

Salis says he has enjoyed watching Lacoste learn and take on new challenges.

Another thing that makes their productivity so impressive is that all of their catches have been from shore or fishing piers. Thanks to the FWC's Fish Management Area (FMA) lakes in Duval County, they have had plenty of quality opportunities, including at Oceanway and Bethesda. FWC fisheries technician Willie Prevatt has spent over 20 years ensuring anglers have great fishing opportunities at those and other regional FMAs and helping teach youth and adults to fish. Prevatt is a favorite resource for Salis and Lacoste.

"I was very happy Ishmael made Elite Angler, not because he caught most of his fish in the FMAs I work in, but simply because he is a really good person/student," Prevatt said. "I think I am most proud of Ishmael

and Mr. Salis because they proved by example that you can compete with anglers fishing big lakes in expensive bass boats and with fancy equipment, in a small FMA on the shore or dock, even in an urban area."

Fishing is fun, challenging and a great way to spend quality time with family and friends, but there is more to it. A "Special Report on Fishing and Boating 2013," makes the case succinctly:

"Fishing — on lakes, streams, rivers and seas — is one of the most popular outdoor activities. As a 'gateway activity,' it not only connects Americans with the outdoors and a healthy lifestyle, but also introduces them to other outdoor activities. As active outdoor participants, Americans learn the value of environmental stewardship and a healthy connection to nature, while also supporting public lands and community programs nationwide through license fees and federal aid."

The FWC is creating the next generation that cares by reaching out to all youth via a variety of outreach programs, including the Florida Youth Conservation Centers Network (www.FYCCN.org). You can register for TrophyCatch and Big Catch at the same time, which makes you eligible for a drawing for a Phoenix bass boat, powered by Mercury Marine and equipped with a Power-Pole.
