No commercial loans or bonds

City is debt-free

For the first time in more than three decades, the City of Perry is debt-free.

"We don't have any loans and we just paid off our last bond July 25. We are commercially debt-free," City Manager Bob Brown said Tuesday.

The final payment put to bed a 30-year sewer bond executed in the early 1990s. "About four or five years ago, we refinanced the bond for a lower interest rate. Using that lower interest rate, we made larger payments and were able to pay the bond off nine years early."

The debt clearance comes as the city is preparing to undertake a \$5.5 million sewer plant expansion project in the coming year; one step in that process includes filing a suit with the state of Florida regarding the bond. That filing is included in today's legal notices.

"That project will be funded 60/40—60 percent bond and 40 percent low interest (2-2.5%) grant. We planned it this way, having the bond paid off by this date knowing that later this year, or early next year, we would be rolling into

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Registration underway for ATVs

The City of Perry has opened registration for all non-road-legal motorized vehicles (4-wheelers/dirt bikes/ATVs) per a recently enacted ordinance adopted by the city council. The one-time registration fee is \$5. Registration forms are available at City Hall. Owners must include the vehicle model, VIN number, manufacturer and model year. The stickers must be "clearly visible at all times from both the front and rear of the vehicle from a distance of at least 100 feet, including when the vehicle is in operation."

Thunderstorm causes delay on 1st day of new school year

An afternoon thunderstorm struck just as the first day of school ended for Taylor County students Monday, adding a few snags into what is already an involved process for officials helping children find their bus rides home.

Superintendent Paul Dyal said that other than the rain delay, however, the first day of the 2014-15 school year

provided a "very, very good start."

"I've received reports from all of the principals around the district and we had a good start getting the students in place," Dyal said.

"We did have several new enrollees show up on Monday and we had to get them schedules.

"Bus transportation was

going good until we had that heavy rain right as we were letting the students out. We had to delay a little so that held us up a bit.

"You have kindergarteners who we have to help find their buses as well as new students and third graders new to Taylor County Elementary School who have to learn how it works there.

That first day is always a learning time for those students.

"I expect that by the end of the week, things will be running smoothly."

Meanwhile, local law enforcement officials are urging motorists to use caution with classes back in session and more children traveling to and from school.

Owner seeks payment for pecan tree removal

The Taylor County Commission has declined to reimburse a property owner near the Perry-Foley Airport for four pecan trees removed from her property during an airport safety project conducted earlier this year.

Wendell Ezell addressed the commission Monday, Aug. 4, on behalf of Glenda Simpson, who he said should be compensated for the trees removed from her property. He first brought up the subject earlier this summer and returned stating there had not been a resolution to his claim.

Simpson was one of six property owners near the airport who had trees deemed to be in the flight pattern of the airport. Last year, the county received a grant to cover the cost of the tree removal, which county officials say is done every few years to maintain the airport's certification with the Federal Aviation Administration.

"I believe she was taken advantage of," Ezell told commissioners.

He acknowledged that Simpson signed a contract allowing the trees to be removed, but stated she was given the choice to sign the document and allow the county to do the work or be forced to cover the expense herself later.

Ezell said that the pecan trees (a single pine tree was also removed from Simpson's property) were different from other trees

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Have you tried early voting?

Medicinal marijuana is 'a medical issue, not political'

Dear Editor:

In the Ask A Lawyer column by Pierce Kelley printed Aug. 13 in the **Taco Times**, there are a couple of pieces of information that are incorrect or may just need to be clarified.

The bill regarding the Compassionate Medical Cannabis Act approved by the legislature and signed by Gov. Rick Scott on June 6 does allow the use of a

specific low THC high CBD cannabis plant as medicine.

It also allows use of the same plant for those with cancer or ALS, Lou Gehrig's disease. Unfortunately, this plant has only been shown to be effective in limited strains of epilepsy, not all, and not for all patients.

Cancer and ALS, as well as HIV, AIDS and Lyme's disease require the use of plants with a higher level

of THC than that found in the strain called "Charlotte's Web," the plant approved by Gov. Scott's signature in June. Lyme's disease, in particular, is caused by bacteria that is antibiotic-resistant, but that is killed by THC.

For another point, Minnesota became the 23rd state to allow the use of medical cannabis in 2014, thus Florida would be state number 24 should Amendment 2 pass in November. However, since there are 13 other states with medical cannabis initiatives pending, we could conceivably become state number 37 to adopt the compassionate use of cannabis.

According to a poll conducted by Quinnipiac University, reported in the Aug. 14, 2014, edition of the International Business Times, Florida voters poll 88% in favor of medical cannabis, with 10% opposing. These numbers would appear to show almost 9 to 1 in favor of allowing cancer patients, ALS patients and those suffering from AIDS, HIV and other terrible diseases another medicine to use in their treatment.

The argument that higher THC levels in other strains could cause a patient to feel "high" I find confusing--

"Come to church with me," my 91-year-old aunt always encourages when I'm visiting for the weekend.

Oftentimes, our travel schedule prevents my attendance but this past weekend, I told her on Friday, "Yes," and there wasn't an event of national or international prominence which could have allowed me to change my mind.

"I'll pick you up," she said, because her church is undergoing a \$1 million renovation/remodeling project and parking is limited.

I no longer argue. I just say, "Yes ma'am."

She changed those directions on Sunday, an hour before pick-up. "You come pick me up," she said, having charted out this morning as if it was a corporate take-over. "That way," she said, "you can drop me off after church, and I can prepare lunch while you finish packing up your house. Your husband will be here by then, and we'll all have lunch at my house."

"No, no, let's not do that this time," I argued, already having a mental picture of the day in my head.

"The roast is in the oven; I'm not taking any excuses," she said. "See you in 45 minutes. Don't be late."

Some would say she's bossy. Some do say she's bossy. Nobody disagrees. She's always been bossy. Now she's hard-of-hearing, so she's not only bossy, she doesn't hear your disagreement, which I think is working out pretty well for her.

I picked her up at 10:40 a.m. because she wanted to be there by 10:45 a.m.

When I left my house, which is barely a mile from hers, the sun was shining. By the time I arrived at her house, the rain had started and she was standing under a tree in her Sunday dress.

"Well, why didn't you go back inside?" I asked, opening the car door for her.

"Because I figured I'd slip on those tiles so I'd take my chances with the rain."

Then she said abruptly, "Button my dress please." She had on a bright, daffodil-yellow linen dress with large, self-covered buttons down the back. She couldn't reach the top two.

"In the rain?" I asked.

She didn't hear me, so rather than spend any more time arguing in the rain, I stood there and buttoned her dress while my hair, which I had spent the previous 10 times trying to tame, became a limp dishrag.

Inside the car, she said, "I'm so glad you're going to church with me," brushing the raindrops from her cheeks.

When I responded, she said, "Good Lord, I left my hearing aids in the house—I can't hear a word you're saying. When I'm in there by myself, I forget that I need them."

I knew what I had to say: "I'll go get them." She gave me directions, so with the umbrella, I ran through her yard and got completely drenched finding the hide-a-key, then opening the front door, running through the house to the back bedroom, and finding the hearing aids on the chest in a box.

I reversed the procedure.

Then I collapsed like my

umbrella into the car and said, "I'm drenched."

"What?" she said and I handed her the box.

She placed the aids in her ears and turned to me, "I'm drenched," I said.

She laughed and said, "Bless your heart," smoothing the rain from the shoulders of my dress. "Do you want my jacket?"

Now she asks.

She apologized profusely for forgetting her hearing aids, for causing my damp appearance and said, "Your Mother would say to me, 'Hazel, I'm not doing this again.'"

I laughed and smiled because I had already entertained that thought but wasn't about to admit it.

Since she's the oldest member of this Presbyterian congregation, they "save" her a parking spot by the side door. We maneuvered the car into that spot, and I circled around to give her an extra pull.

Everybody was so pleased to see her and maybe to see me, too. I think she's probably one of their bargaining chips: "Hey, if 91-year-old Hazel can make it to church every Sunday morning and every Wednesday night, then I don't really want to hear your excuse."

Two friends of hers were waiting in the foyer, beside the bulletins, because they apparently enter in unison, or she had called them and strongly suggested it.

"Here's a mint," said one, handing me a peppermint from a basket on the table.

"Here's a bulletin," said the other, passing me a large printed Order of Worship with an artist rendering of the church on the front. From the volume of the bulletin it looked like we might be there until 4 p.m.

They pointed to the second row on the left where the chairs were identical except for the one on the end by the aisle, and it had arms. "Since we're remodeling, we're worshipping in our fellowship hall. Hazel told them she couldn't get up and down for the prayers without something to push up on, so they brought her a chair," explained her friend who is only 83.

My aunt elaborated, "The head deacon asked me, 'Well, do you want a Queen Anne chair or a Lazy-Boy?' I told him I'd leave that decision up to the church session" and a modest chair—with arms—was probably pulled from the pastor's study.

"I usually sit beside her," the friend named Joy said, still pointing, "but today you'll sit there and I'll sit on the other side of you. And she'll sit on the other side of me," she said, pointing to her other friend.

"Yes ma'am," I said to all three, realizing that was probably all I'd be saying for the rest of the day.

Then the three of them looked at me with amusement and said, "Do you know what we call our pew?"

They looked at Hazel to offer up the answer: "Deaf Row," she said, and we all laughed too loudly in the foyer.

On Sunday--"The Lord's Day," the bulletin declared--I sat on Deaf Row with the three that have been "sentenced" there and sang, "It Is Well With My Soul."

And it was.

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Four suspects charged with kidnapping

At 11:05 p.m. Sunday, while patrolling Interstate 10 (SR8) in Madison County, Sleigher observed a vehicle matching the BOLO notice pass him traveling westbound. Two minutes later, Sleigher, along with Trooper Nathan Stidham, stopped the vehicle on westbound Interstate 10 in the area of the 255 mile marker.

While Trooper Sleigher made contact with the driver, Trooper Stidham made contact with the right rear passenger and the child.

Stidham advised that the child's clothing description matched that of the BOLO notice. At that time, Stidham took custody of the child until the Florida Department of Children and Families (DCF) arrived.

It was confirmed that there was probable cause for the arrest of the four vehicle occupants, FHP reported.

Trooper Sleigher placed the suspects under arrest for kidnapping and transported them to the Madison County Jail without incident. Those arrested included: Jakevia Rodriguez, 30, and Latoya Rodriguez, 31, both of Colquitt, Ga.; Precious Seymour, 23, of Miami Gardens; and Lakeysha Robinson, 29, of Satsuma.

FHP was assisted by the St. John's County Sheriff's Office, the Madison County Sheriff's Office and the Florida Department of Children and Families.

County covered the cost of tree removal

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removed during the project because they were valuable

and could provide Simpson with future revenue.

County Grants Director Melody Cox said that in the 14 years she has been

with the county that no property owner has been compensated for removed trees, adding that the zoning around the airport allows the county to remove trees at the owner's expense.

Traditionally, the county covered those costs, she said. The only difference during this last project was that the removal was grant-funded rather than funded from the county's budget.

Don Curtis with The Forestry Company, which won the contract for the tree removal project, said the local project was the seventh such airport tree removal contract his company has worked on.

"What made this one unique is that the county paid for the clearing," Curtis said. "The others made the landowners pay."

He said they met with the six affected landowners who all six signed the agreements, adding that they "went above and beyond the scope" of their contract with the county to provide additional services at no cost to the landowners,

including clean-up or stacking the resulting lumber for firework.

"We received positive feedback," Curtis said. "We did your work and felt the landowners were happy."

During discussion, commissioners stated they were against reimbursing Simpson for the trees, with Commissioner Jody DeVane noting that a pecan tree was removed from one of the other properties as well.

When asked for advice on how the commission should proceed, County Attorney Conrad Bishop said the board could decide to take no action or it could vote to deny the request.

Commission Vice Chair Pam Feagle, who was leading the meeting in place of Chairman Malcolm Page (who was not present), said she would prefer the board take official action on the issue. DeVane then offered a motion to deny the request, which was seconded by Commissioner Pat Patterson. The motion passed 4-0.

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the sewer plant expansion project. We wanted to get the bond paid off early so there would be no debt load going into the project. In fact, the payment on the new bond will be less than the old one we just paid off...it will be a 40-year bond, but we can plan to pay it off early," Brown said.

Overall the city's financial bearings remain in much better shape than many surrounding municipalities, he noted.

Brown cited area news reports indicating financial troubles in Madison, Chieffland and Quincy, to name a few.

"When you compare us with these cities, Perry has fared well. Our employees have not missed getting a raise when the economy took a downturn--which in turn helps the local economy. We haven't seen the turnovers in employees other cities have and the city's medical insurance plan hasn't changed.

"Many other cities have been struggling to stay afloat. I know that in Madison, they have talked about eliminating their police department, their fire department and even their planning and zoning department. Their millage rate is also a lot higher than ours.

"Quincy has had to borrow money to make payroll and they are also having major financial problems in Chieffland."

The last date to request an absentee mail ballot to be mailed for the Primary Election is Wednesday, August 20, 2014. Any registered voter may vote an absentee mail ballot. Request can be accepted only from the voter, a member of the voter's immediate family or legal guardian. Please call the elections office at (850) 838-3515 to request an absentee mail ballot.

HAVE YOU RETURNED YOUR ABSENTEE MAIL BALLOT?

All absentee mail ballots must be received in the Supervisor of Elections office on or before 7 p.m., Tuesday, August 26, 2014. Any ballot that is received in the elections office after 7 p.m. will be considered late.

EARLY VOTING ENDS SATURDAY, AUGUST 23, 2014 AT 5 p.m.

Early voting is now taking place in the Supervisor of Elections office on the 2nd floor of the county courthouse and will end on Saturday, August 23, 2014. Early voting hours are from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. each day. Any registered voter in the county may vote early in lieu of going to their polling location on Election Day.

Once early voting ends any registered voter who wishes to cast a ballot in the Primary Election will need to do so at their designated precinct on Election Day.



If you are in need of assistance at the polls on Election Day please remember to ask one of the poll workers at your precinct. If you need to vote on the disability equipment at your precinct let the poll worker assisting you know before they issue you a paper ballot. All fourteen precincts are equipped with disability compliant equipment.

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DJJ launches mentoring program

The Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) has established a Faith Community Network and Chaplaincy Services program to service local youth.

Spring Warrior Church of Christ preacher Dan Chaney is one of the first to register with the program as both a chaplain and mentor. All residents interested in helping young people in Taylor County can sign up to become a mentor, said County Judge Bill Blue, who has been active in the effort to recruit volunteers.

"In every community the actions and well-being of the residents affect each other. This is especially true in a small community like Taylor County. Our young people are not only our community's future, but they also affect our present economic conditions today. Young people are our future because the path they set upon today will determine whether they get an education that will not only secure their own individual livelihood, but

also collectively attract future employers looking for a well-educated workforce. Their path will determine whether they will be taxpayers or service takers. No one sets out in life looking to become uneducated, unemployed, addicted to substances or in jail, but the choices they make and the friendships they develop in their youth can set them on that path. This is why mentors are so important," he said.

"Young people are affecting our present economic conditions also. Kids who perform poorly in school score poorly on the FCAT. A handful of low FCAT scores can lower an entire school's grade. Communities with schools that have low grades are not as attractive to prospective new employers. Plant managers have children too and they do not want to build a plant in a community that they don't want their kids attending school.

"Anyone can be a mentor and most of us have had several in our lifetime. We can all contribute something.

Some hunt, others fish, play sports, music or chess, or have some other interest in common with young people. That common interest you have can serve as the opportunity to share some of your wisdom and values

that may inspire a young person to lead a productive life. Dan Chaney is a fine example. Dan is a preacher and he has good moral values, but he also coaches soccer and basketball. He likes to hog hunt. He knows

how to work on trucks. He has many opportunities to relate to many different young people. With approximately 85 churches in Taylor County, I know we can find more individuals, not just preachers, who

have the time to serve as mentors."
