## All drivers escape serious injury, but not charges

### Semi-truck overturns

Morning traffic was blocked for a short while Tuesday due to an overturned semi-truck at the intersection of County Road 30 and U.S. 19.

Bryon Williams, 55, of Perry was cited for careless driving in the accident.

According to the Florida Highway Patrol report, Williams was turning eastbound onto C.R. 30 from U.S. 19 around 7:45 a.m. when he over steered to the right, causing the right side of the vehicle to "raise off the roadway." The semi-truck overturned onto its left side in the eastbound lane of traffic on 30, blocking the roadway.

Williams sustained minor injuries and was transported to Doctors' Memorial Hospital (DMH) for treatment.

Trooper Matthew C. Boatwright responded to the crash and was assisted by the Taylor County Sheriff's Office, Taylor County Fire-Rescue and DMH Emergency Medical Services (EMS).

Florida Highway Patrol Trooper Nathan K. Stidham reported Knight was traveling south on Hwy. 221 when he crossed the centerline. The left side of the SUV collided with a guardrail face on the east shoulder of the road. The vehicle hit the guardrail a second time, causing it to spin left and cross the centerline a second time. The vehicle hit the guardrail on the west shoulder of the road before coming to a final rest facing northeast in the southbound lane of traffic.

Knight was ejected from the vehicle onto the roadway; he was treated at the scene and transported to Doctors' Memorial Hospital. He was charged with attaching tag not assigned, failure to wear a seatbelt, failure to maintain lane and expired tag less than six months.

# DOE approves district's request to build a new Perry Primary School

The Florida Department of Education's (DOE) Special Facilities Construction Committee has approved the Taylor County School District's request for funding assistance to construct a new Perry Primary School.

Although the committee voted to recommend the proposal be included in the

department's 2015 budget, the funding is not certain until the Florida governor releases his budget in February.

District officials were notified last week that the district's proposal was ranked third out of the five rural districts to make applications this year.

"The committee deemed

the Taylor County Primary School project a critical need," DEO representative Linda Champion said in a letter to Superintendent Paul Dyal.

"The committee voted to recommend, for inclusion in the commissioner's Capital Outlay Budget for 2015-16, the Taylor County Primary School project.

The district's request for this project totaled \$17,643,531 to construct 788 student stations with a student capacity of 788. The committee ranked this project third on the project list."

Local officials made a presentation before the Special Facilities Committee at a hearing

Friday, Aug. 15, to make their case for funding along with representatives from Jefferson, Jackson, Liberty and Hamilton counties.

According to Superintendent Paul Dyal, Hamilton was ranked first followed by Jefferson in second, Liberty in fourth

I remember so vividly the moment the doctor told my family there was nothing else they could do to treat my father's illness. There were so many thoughts and emotions going through my mind; primarily that there was no way that my dad could die. He was only 66 years old, much too young to die. I needed him, my children needed him and

he had to see them grow up. I could not process everything that was being said or even comprehend the notion that my dad was going to die.

Through my tears I asked the doctor "How long does dad have?"

"It could be weeks or even months, I just don't know," the doctor said. "You need to focus on making it about the quality of the time

you have with your dad, not the quantity of time."

That is a hard concept to grasp when you are talking about someone you love. The doctor suggested we might want to talk to someone with hospice. Deep down I felt like accepting care from hospice meant that I was giving up and that his death was imminent. I never thought that what it really meant was making

the most of the time we still had together as a family.

We agreed to meet with someone from hospice to learn more about the services offered and so began our journey with Covenant Hospice.

Covenant Hospice had

been serving the Tallahassee and surrounding counties since 2003 and is widely recognized as one of the largest and most comprehensive hospices in the nation, providing quality time for more than 30 years for patients with

life-limiting illnesses, their families and loved ones.

Hearing those words, "there is nothing else we can do," set off a roller coaster emotions for everyone in my family. From my dad

My employer handed out bright orange t-shirts--three sizes too big--for me and the other workers to wear with white shorts. Emblazoned on the front of each was the very official title of Parks and Recreation Staff.

I winced and tried to be polite, "I'm afraid I don't know enough about tennis to assist. I can barely play."

"Oh that doesn't matter," he said quickly. "Mrs. Dorman is a very capable teacher. She just needs someone to help with class control, handing out equipment, and so forth."

"Oh, okay," I said, knowing that it was important to be pleasant, cooperative and willing.

"On Tuesdays and Thursdays, you will lead a pre-school class in the morning," he continued, "and that's easy. Just eight or 10 youngsters for activities. Four days out of the week, you will be in charge of arts and crafts classes in the afternoon for two different age groups, and then help with answering the telephone, setting up for weekend reunions, and so forth."

My eyes were rolling back in my head. "Mary Lucy will help you with your plans," he assured me.

Mary Lucy was the calm and confident receptionist whom I immediately identified as qualified to run the whole department single-handedly.

For my first day at the job, I donned my orange t-shirt with an adorable pair of white culottes and hit the tennis courts with Mrs. Dorman who was pleasantly thin, attractively dressed in glistening white tennis attire and sported a healthy-looking, even tan. She also just happened to be an alcoholic and was hung over for the first day.

"I'm not feeling so well," she said. "Why don't you start off the class?"

"Mrs. Dorman," I said in pure shock, "I don't know anything about playing tennis," as if I were Prissy in "Gone With The Wind" and didn't know anything about birthing babies.

"Just divide them in groups and have them volley against the wall," she said, wiping her forehead as she sweated profusely.

I did as she asked. She barked orders from her chair, a visor shading her eyes, and took generous chugs of something from her thermos. We volleyed and volleyed, until she got up to demonstrate serving.

She whispered to me, "Just stand behind me to give me some stability," she said.

I had never propped up a grown alcoholic before.

When parental cars arrived to collect children, a long 60 minutes later, Mrs. Dorman grabbed her tennis towel, racket and cooler, and headed back to the staff office, by car. The office was a significant hike from the tennis courts, and uphill all the way.

"If you need to make several trips to bring back the balls and other equipment, that's okay," she said to me, out her car window, zooming away.

Twice I walked up and down that hill, lugging equipment.

Thirty minutes later, I was hot and tired, and more than a little disgruntled.

I went immediately to Mary Lucy and said in a shout of a whisper, "She's drunk!"

Mary Lucy looked at me kindly, as I studied her peaches-and-cream complexion and cropped strawberry blonde hair. Softly she said, "She usually is."

"He doesn't care?" I whispered loudly, pointing toward the director's office.

She just shook her head to indicate that he did not.

"Let's get ready for your next class," she said.

We had a couple of hours to prepare for arts and crafts, which required us to soak corn husks in glycerine for the making of cornhusk dolls.

"She's a good tennis teacher; she just has a drinking problem," Mary Lucy said as we husked.

"Every day?" I asked.  
"Nearly," she said, with a knowing chuckle.

For three months, I propped up that "very capable" tennis teacher so she could teach young things how to volley and serve, keep score and win.

And I just kept thinking about what my father said, "...it's a good opportunity to make some money..."

In arts and crafts, we moved from cornhusk dolls to making candles. We did decoupage, plaster art and anything else you can think of which creates a tremendous mess.

As we scraped plaster and wax off the linoleum floor one day, she said, "Maybe your pre-school classes today will be easy," but she rolled her eyes in a way which did not bode well.

At first, the pre-schoolers were quiet and shy. Twenty minutes later, the mothers were long gone, and these children were completely comfortable and very loud. You simply can't plan too much for that 90 minutes when three-minute attention spans are the norm, not the exception.

I shall never forget the boy student, who dazzled me with his artistic ability as we painted. It was fingerpainting, and most of the children had created unrecognizable things of which they were very proud. There were abstract flowers, and blobs they called their dog or their mother. I bragged brazenly.

But this young man had obviously painted me: in an orange shirt with green eyeshadow (yes, I fear it was an accurate portrayal). "Wow, that's really good," I said to him, patting him on the back. It was so unusual to actually recognize the painting, that I was overcome with joy. So I ventured to ask, "What are these black and gray shapes behind me?"

"Those are the tombstones where we're all gonna be buried."

I said nothing, but looked at him for a reaction. He had none.

"Who, all, who?" I asked, like a confused owl.

"Everybody in this class," he said. "Prob'ly soon."

I looked at him and then at the other children, and decided--as God is my witness-- I wouldn't be doing this for the rest of my life. In true pre-school teacher form, I said, "Let's sing!" and I grabbed the Disney musical collection where we made a circle and belted out a few favorites.

I was exhausted by 5 p.m. and quiet at the dinner table.

"So how's your job going?" my mother asked, as if it was a "Father Knows Best" episode.

"It's a good opportunity for me to make some money," I said dutifully while making eye contact with my father, thinking that if I repeated that statement long enough, it would propel me forward.

He refused to laugh.

Soon enough, I was put in charge of the recreation department's entry in the Fourth of July parade. Our youngsters pulled wagons and bicycles decorated in red-white-and-blue around the Courthouse Square. My mother was in the crowd.

As I sweated in noontday heat and corralled the patriotic youth-on-wheels in an effort which strongly resembled herding cats, I darted into the crowd only briefly to say to my mother, "I won't be doing this next year."

She smiled and nodded.

But I was back the next summer.

And the year after that, too.

Repeat after me: it's a good opportunity to make some money.

It's an even better opportunity to find out what you don't want to do for the rest of your life: nothing teaches you what you don't want to do any better than a job, any job.

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# Volunteers sought for Taylor County Guardian ad Litem

The end of summer and the start of a new school year are exciting times for most children. But for some, the beginning of school could reveal a dark secret when signs of abuse and neglect these children have suffered over the summer are noticed by teachers, staff and other parents.

“Because children are subject to less adult supervision over the summer, it’s not uncommon for reports of suspected abuse and neglect to spike at the start of the school year,” said Linda Dedge, Guardian ad Litem circuit director.

Many of the children who are confirmed as victims

are removed from their homes and placed into foster care--often far from their friends, families and schools. Volunteers from the Guardian ad Litem (GAL) program are specially screened and trained to speak up for abused and neglected children who end up in the foster care system.

“Being uprooted from their homes and families is scary for these children. At the Guardian ad Litem program, we want to make sure that they do not get lost in the overburdened foster care system,” Dedge said. “For that reason, we

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Taylor County currently has 11 Guardian ad Litem volunteers.

and Jackson in fifth.

In July, the Taylor County School Board entered into a contract to purchase a parcel of property adjacent to Taylor County Elementary School (TCES) for the proposed new school.

The property in question, located directly north of TCES on Howard Street, is owned by The Clark Properties of Taylor County, LLC, and the approved selling price is \$230,000.

According to the contract, the deal to buy

the approximately 31-acre property is contingent on the district receiving legislative funding.

The district has twice before received funding through the program to assist with building new schools: \$8.5 million in 2001-02 for TCES (with \$4.4 million in local funds), and \$10.2 million in 1991-92 for Taylor County High School (with \$3.9 million in local funds). The program requires districts to allocate revenues from their 1.5 mill capital improvement property tax for three years to a funded project.

Highway 19/98.

Jessie Wesley Cannon Jr., 46, was charged with driving under the influence (DUI), and driving with a suspended license; he was also issued citations for cutting across the median, open container (by the driver) and not wearing his seat belt.

Additionally, Cannon was also held on a warrant for possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

The crash happened around 10 p.m. as Cannon and passenger Tina Cauley, 38, were traveling south on U.S. 19/98 in the inside

lane; the vehicle crossed the grass median cutting over both northbound lanes. The 2003 Ford F-150 crossed the paved apron and onto the east grass shoulder of the highway before colliding with a ditch.

Florida Highway Patrol Trooper John Sleigher stated that Cannon advised under oath that “he cut across the median to pull into a private driveway but cut too short.”

Cannon sustained only minor injuries; Cauley, who was wearing her seatbelt, was not injured. Taylor County Sheriff’s deputies and DMH Emergency Medical Services assisted at the scene.

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

need more people in our community to speak up and make sure these children's voices are heard. We want to help ensure that their stay in foster care is as short as

possible and that they are placed in safe, loving homes quickly so they can begin to heal."

There are 82 children involved in the court system in Taylor County, and only 11 GAL volunteers to advocate for their best interest.

"Too many children are forced to go through the chaos of moving through the child protection system alone," Dedge said. "The Guardian ad Litem Program needs more volunteers to step up and be a voice for children who desperately

need them."

Gail Mickel has been a GAL volunteer for nine years. As a GAL volunteer, she advocates for children's needs in court and in the child welfare system. She helps them through their struggles in foster care. She

says her number one goal is to help the children find safe, loving families.

"We need more dedicated GAL volunteers like Gail to walk with children every step of the way and ensure that they are placed into safe, permanent homes as

quickly as possible," Dedge commented.

to my six children all the way up to my 90-year-old grandmother, there was a wide range of feelings, emotions and questions that each one of us had. ## 'Dogs beat Williston 41-28

# Jones wins first game as TCHS coach

The Taylor County Bulldogs won a wild 41-28 shoot-out with Williston Friday night at Dorsett Stadium, avenging a loss to the Red Devils last year and giving Bulldogs' Head Coach Tanner Jones his first career varsity victory.

Freshman Chris Reaves, sophomore Willie "Flash" Elder and junior QB Rayshawn Hamilton all had big games for the 'Dogs.

Reaves completed 7 of 11 passes for 108 yards and 1 TD and rushed 14 times for 79 yards and another score. Hamilton completed 7 of 13 passes for 102 yards, 2 TDs and one interception, while running for another touchdown. Elder scored on an 80-yard punt return and finished with 115 total yards (23 rushing, 92 on kick returns).

The Bulldogs dominated

the stat sheet, out-gaining Williston 390-175 in total yards and had a 20-5 edge in first downs. Williston was held to 5 yards passing in the first half and just 27 in the game, while Taylor County completed 14 of 24 passes for 210 yards and 3 TDs.

The Bulldogs also held a 184-148 edge in rushing yards, but Williston may have set a school-record with 335 return yards and 3 TDs on kick or interception returns.

"After coming out slow and struggling early in the game, we managed to put four quarters together and come back and win a big game," Jones said.

"We fumbled away a snap on the first series and then allowed them to score. Then we drove down in the red zone three different times and came away with no points," Jones said.

"Austin Roberts had a big catch to get us started and really sparked the offense, but as soon as we rallied back to score two straight times and take the lead, we gave up a long kick return that allowed them to go up 21-14 at the half, but I am proud of the adjustments we made on both offense and defense to come back and dominate the second half," Jones said.

"Our defense played lights out and gave up only 53 total yards of offense in the second half. Coach (Defensive Coordinator) Doug Cain deserves a lot of credit for making some great halftime adjustments and shutting them down in the second half.

"It seemed like every time we would score and take the lead we would give up a big kick return

or turn the ball over, but our defense deserves a lot of credit for only giving up one touchdown and holding them scoreless the final three quarters," Jones said.

According to Jones, senior runningback Art Nelson had a great game and ran the ball very hard. Jalen Oliver came up with some clutch catches, including a 33-yard TD. Nathan Kallschmidt not only ran twice for 5 yards, but hauled in a 27-yard pass and drew praise for his blocking.

Cameron Collins had a 23-yard reception, and also blocked well, while Ward

had a 10-yard catch.

The Bulldogs (1-1) dominated most of the night on offense and defense, but allowed Williston to stay in the game with turnovers, penalties and special teams miscues.

In a back-and-forth game, Williston was held to just one offensive touchdown – a 66-yard TD run late in the first quarter to take a 7-0 lead.

The Bulldogs scored on a 43-yard bomb from Hamilton to senior wide receiver Austin Roberts to tie the game at 7-7 just seconds into the 2nd quarter

and took a 14-7 lead on their next series with a 33-yard pass from Hamilton to senior receiver Jalen Oliver.

However, the Bulldogs' special teams unit gave up an 86-yard kickoff return touchdown just 13 seconds later to allow the Red Devils to tie the game at 14-14 with 6:24 to go before the half.

A bad snap and fumble by the Bulldogs gave Williston the ball back, but the big hit of the night by Shawn Burney and a sack by Devonta Fudge stopped the Red Devils.




