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\$50,000 sought for Sports Complex

The Taylor County Commission has agreed to submit a second grant this year to the Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program (FRDAP) seeking \$50,000 in funding for improvements at the Taylor County Sports Complex.

The commission unanimously agreed in August to apply for a FRDAP grant for the Steinhatchee Community Center Park.

"The FRDAP program allows for the county to have three open grants or pending applications," County Grants Director Melody Cox told commissioners during a public hearing held last week on the grant application.

"The county currently has one open grant for the Hodges Park Improvement Project," Cox continued. "With this, the county would be eligible to submit an additional application. The Capital Improvement Program 2015-20 includes continued development needs at the Taylor County Sports Complex. Staff is recommending submitting grant application requesting funding assistance in the amount of \$50,000 for the sports complex."

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Council favors alcohol sales in restaurants on Sundays?

The Perry City Council appears to be moving toward amending its current alcohol ordinance to allow restaurants to serve alcoholic beverages on

Sundays.

Last week, council members heard from supporters and opponents of the proposal during a first reading of the

amended ordinance. At the end of the discussion, the council directed staff to return proposed language that would not only allow Sunday alcohol sales in

restaurants, but also special event permits for outside events (i.e. beer gardens at festivals/community events). Members also asked for a second option

that would allow Sunday sales at all businesses which offer alcohol (i.e. sports bars, package stores, etc.).

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Hampton Springs

Historic site prey for 'rampant vandalism'

Facing frequent vandalism and a lack of resources to properly maintain its Hampton Springs Park, the county is looking for "creative solutions" for the park's future, one of which could be leasing the property to a private individual for stewardship.

The park is the site of the historic Hotel Hampton, a world-renowned resort for North Florida in the early 1900s. The building burned down in 1954.

In 2001, the county, with the help of a number of state grants, began historical excavations and restoration at the site, as well as the construction of a trailhead and park amenities, including restroom facilities.

The issue of Hampton Springs was discussed during the county commission's workshop held last week, with County

Administrator Dustin Hinkel outlining the latest damages to the park's

facilities as well as the resulting liability concerns.

Hinkel said county staff is

regularly fixing the fencing around the parking lot, which people are apparently

tearing down to allow vehicle access into the park. Additionally, the fencing around the hotel's pool has been stolen, along with the sign detailing the park's rules and regulations.

Vandalism at the park has been a problem at the site for years, with reports of people destroying the fencing as well as breaking into the restrooms to tear fixtures from the walls.

Speaking with the **Taco Times** Tuesday, Hinkel acknowledged the problems are "not new."

"It means what we're doing to solve these problems is not working," he said. "So what we need are creative solutions."

He said the initial quote to fix the fencing around the pool is around \$1,000, but added that the cost could increase if the county decides to go with a stronger

Those amended draft proposals are slated to be presented during council's Tuesday, Nov. 11 meeting.

In last Tuesday's discussions, representatives from the Tourism Development Council (TDC) spoke in favor of the ordinance change.

"I am here on behalf of the TDC as well as the hospitality and lodging industry. We support this change. The City of Perry has been missing out on amazing opportunities. Our hospitality businesses are at a disadvantage with other areas where alcohol can be served on Sundays. This will open the door for other businesses to come to Perry—increasing job growth in Perry," TDC President Dawn Taylor said.

"I am not only here because the TDC supports the ordinance change, but also because we would like to have a special event permit option included as well. This will allow us to compete against other special events and festivals in the area. For example, our Blues & BBQ festival would grow much more quickly if we were allowed to have a beer garden. I have been to many other events that are very family-friendly that have beer or wine gardens. It would be a designated area that would not be anywhere near the children's event. Having this option would open the door to more sponsors and additional attendees for the event," TDC Chairman Sandy Beach said.

"I just want to point out that Forest Capital Park (where the festival is held) is not in the city limits," Mayor Mike Deming said.

"I know, but if we wanted to have something downtown at the same time...while you're working on the ordinance, why not go ahead and incorporate (the special events permit) with it?" Beach said.

Local resident Ray Williams addressed the council on behalf of his pastor and church: "I am just a sinner saved by grace. We are against this ordinance. This is nothing personal; I know what you're trying to do. But our youngsters get enough beer and wine without having it in a restaurant on a Sunday. Our whole church is against it. I would like you to consider that when you go to vote. I am just a Christian person trying to live a Christian life in a small town."

Dianna "Mama" Sandonato of Mama's Italian Restaurant said, "I have always been a proponent of growth and Perry is an ideal place to grow. I have always had an issue with the fact someone could come in (our restaurant) to have a lovely meal and I could not serve them a glass of wine or beer on a Sunday, but they could go to Winn Dixie or Walmart and buy all they wanted. As a restaurant, it would be my pleasure to be able to offer it (on Sundays) with discretion. On the other hand, I also want you to consider what constitutes a restaurant—a restaurant is far different than a sports bar. A restaurant depends on food sales—51 percent or better. A sports bar is a bar whose primary business comes from alcohol sales and food sales are a secondary item.

"I would welcome an Olive Garden but I don't know how I'd feel about a sports bar," she said.

"I am against this. I have lived on both sides of this alcohol deal. I had my first drink when I was about this tall and I know what it will do to a life. It took God to get me out of it and it took a lot of years of Him working with me to get me out of that," local resident Van McGuire said.

Former county commissioner Johnny

Hankerson said he agreed with the move to change the ordinance with one exception: "If you are going to allow the sale of alcohol on Sunday then you need to let everyone sell alcohol to be fair. The sale of alcohol is not going to stop you from going to heaven. It's the choices we make that make us do wrong. The church is in your heart, not in the four walls of the church. We need industry. They elected you guys to help the economy. You can't save anybody. You can't do that. God gave us free will and he wants us to make our decisions for ourselves."

At the close of comments from the public, council members voiced their responses, with Shirlee Hampton and Venita Woodfaulk expressing their desire to see the ordinance expanded to include "all sales of alcohol on Sundays."

"Everyone should be able to sell, to be fair," Hampton said.

Councilman Alan Hall, who initially brought the proposed change to the council's attention, said in response to the public's input: "I respect your opinion greatly and I believe in a lot of the stuff you said. I am not promoting alcohol. If we got rid of alcohol and drugs in America right now, it would be a better place. But I do not believe in my heart if we open up an Outback it's going to increase people drinking alcohol in Perry, Fla. People drink and we go to into those restaurants six days a week. One more day is not going to increase or change alcohol consumption in Perry.

"I am a Christian. I do not drink. I don't see alcohol—I see the growth and jobs. All of us, each of us, have a choice when we go into these restaurants. We see

people drinking there the other six days a week and we choose not to drink.

"Every day is a holy day. You can't be a Christian just on Sundays."

"I agree with Mr. Hall. I, too, am a Christian and I am looking at employment

opportunities, revenue. I think this might be too big for the council. Maybe we should refer it to the voters to decide," Hampton said.

"I agree with both of you. I am not pushing for alcohol. I am pushing for business," Woodfaulk said.

"I am not in favor of bars being allowed to serve on Sundays but I am for restaurants being allowed to serve on Sunday. From an economic development standpoint, we are not going to get any quality restaurants to come to Perry when they

can't tap into 14 percent of their profit margins," Councilman David Sullivan said.

"I am looking at it from an economic development perspective. We are not here to legislate morality," Deming said.

Grant would fund add'l 'shade'

According to Cox, the grant would help fund shade covering for one of the playgrounds, shade covering for bleachers, lights for the basketball court, fitness equipment for the walking trail and an additional picnic area, as well as nature habitat signage.

During the hearing, Commissioner Pam Feagle questioned whether the grant could be used for lighting at the tennis courts rather than the basketball courts, since she had received requests for lighting for the former but not the latter.

Cox said based on the grant program's point system, the sports complex application was already not as competitive at the Steinhatchee Community Center grant, and improvements to the basketball court earned more points than the tennis courts.

She did say, however, that she and staff had identified alternative funding sources for potential money for lighting at the tennis courts.

After a brief discussion, the commission unanimously approved the application.

As for the Steinhatchee application, the Steinhatchee Projects Board is providing a \$5,000 match for the proposed grant, which would fund a canoe and kayak launch to be built next to the existing pier, handicapped parking spaces on the river side near the pier, a shade covering for the existing playground as well as new equipment for "older children," and a small basketball court (if there is space available).

According to Cox, the county will know how its two applications rank statewide in April 2015, but will not know if the projects are funded until after the legislative session concludes later in the spring.

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
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

Will miss playoffs for first time in 6 years

Bulldogs lose 'chippy' game 41-14

The Taylor County Bulldogs will miss the playoffs for the first time in six years after a disappointing 42-14 district loss to Fort White on the road Friday night.

The Bulldogs pounded the ball right at the Indians' defense early in the game and jumped out to an early lead, but two Bulldog turnovers helped Fort White to a 21-6 halftime lead.

A third turnover and a pile of unsportsmanlike conduct penalties against the Bulldogs in the third quarter led to Fort White scoring 42 unanswered points and a running clock in the fourth quarter, when Taylor County managed a late touchdown.

The Bulldogs fell to 4-4 overall and 1-2 in district, while Fort White improved to 5-3 overall and 2-1 in District 2-4A. The Indians will advance to the playoffs as district runner-up, while the Madison County Cowboys (7-3, 3-1) are district champs.

In a chippy game between two bitter district rivals, officials nearly lost control of the game in the third quarter, when both teams were penalized for extracurricular activities after the whistle.

Taylor County came out on the losing end of the flag fest, as the Bulldogs were hit with 7 personal foul or unsportsmanlike conduct penalties and had

16 penalties for minus 165 yards, compared to Fort White's 8 penalties for 75 yards (one unsportsmanlike conduct penalty).

Taylor County's Nate Kallschmidt was also ejected from the game – the second Bulldog to be ejected this season.

Early in the game it appeared the Taylor County offense would be able to run over Fort White's defense, as Kallschmidt (6 carries, 34 yards, 1 TD rushing, 4-yard catch) and Art Nelson (21 carries, 66 yards) gashed the Indian defense in the first half behind the Bulldogs' offensive line.

Nelson ripped off runs of 13, 9 and 3 yards on the opening drive of the game, while Kallschmidt picked up 5 yards on the first carry of the game before scoring on a 7-yard run.

The drive was keyed by Jalen Oliver (3 catches, 57 yards), who turned a short hitch pass into a 41-yard gain after breaking two tackles.

With kicker Evan Ward still serving a three-game suspension, the Bulldogs elected to go for the two-point conversion, which failed due to a bad snap.

Fort White drove down to the Bulldogs' 25-yard line before being stopped by a great defensive stand that included tackles by Landon Byrd, Vic Conde (4 tackles), Shawn Burney and Kallschmidt that forced the

Indians to turn the ball over on downs.

However, Nelson fumbled the ball away on the very next play, allowing Fort White to take a 7-6 lead two plays later on a 1-yard TD run.

The Bulldogs went back to their ground attack and moved from their own 32 all the way down to the Indians' 3-yard line behind the running of Kallschmidt and Nelson with a nice pass from QB Rayshawn Hamilton (13 of 25 passing for 157 yards, 2 interceptions) to Justin Cruse (3 catches, 24 yards).

However, the Bulldogs couldn't punch it in, as Kallschmidt was thrown for a 1-yard loss on 1st and goal. Willie Elder was stopped at the goal line on the next play and Nelson was hit in the backfield for a 5-yard loss on 3rd and goal.

After a timeout, the Bulldogs went for the touchdown on 4th down and Hamilton was picked off in the endzone on a pass intended for Oliver.

The interception was returned 50 yards, and the Bulldogs were hit with a

personal foul penalty to help set up an 8-yard TD run that put Fort White up 14-6 with 8:31 remaining in the 2nd quarter.

It was all Fort White from there, as the Indians scored on a 46-yard pass just 30 seconds before halftime to take a 21-6 lead and took advantage of an interception early in the 3rd quarter to score on a 1-yard run for a 28-6 advantage.

Back-to-back 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalties set up Fort White's 55-yard TD run that gave the Indians a 35-6 lead with 5:42 left in the 3rd quarter and another 15-yard penalty killed a Bulldog drive that led to a 5-yard Fort White TD run with 1:34 left in the 3rd quarter.

The 42-6 lead triggered a running clock as the 4th quarter began, and the Bulldogs put together a

nice, long drive that ate up the remaining 15 minutes of the game.

Hamilton completed passes to Chris Reaves (3 catches, 38 yards) and Ken Smith (3 catches, 23 yards) on the drive before being forced out of the game with an injury. Reaves (2 for 2, 25 yards passing, 1 TD) came in and hit Cam Collins (2 catches, 36 yards, 1 TD) on a 22-yard TD pass to end the drive.

Nelson had a 13-yard run that helped set up the Bulldogs' late touchdown, but was held to just 8 yards on 5 carries in the second half after gaining 58 on 10 carries in the first half.

The Bulldogs led Fort White 198-180 in total yards in the first half, but were held to minus 14 rushing yards in the second half (due in part to two bad snaps). Taylor County's

offense was held to just 67 yards in the second half (81 yards passing, minus 14 rushing), while Fort White rushed for 170 yards and passed for 9 yards in the second half.

The Indians finished the game with a 359-265 edge in total yards and did not commit a turnover.

Taylor County finished with two interceptions and lost one of five fumbles.

Kids' fishing clinic set for Saturday in Steinhatchee

There will be a kids' fishing clinic this Saturday, Nov. 8, in Steinhatchee at the Good Times Motel and Marina beginning at 9 a.m. and concluding at 12 noon.

Saltwater Kids' Fishing Clinics are one-day educational events for kids ages 5-15. These events were established by the Outreach and Education section of the Division of Marine Fisheries Management, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

One of the main goals for the Kids' Fishing Clinics is to create responsible marine resource stewards by teaching children the vulnerability of Florida's marine ecosystems.

In addition, FWC staff hopes to teach fundamental saltwater fishing skills and to provide kids with a positive fishing experience.

At the clinics, the children go through five mandatory skill stations: casting, knot tying, fishing tackle, good angler and touch tank. 52,000 children and 43,000 parents have participated in the Kids' Fishing Clinics.

Park to be leased to private landowner?

fence in an attempt to ward off further vandalism.

At last week's workshop, commissioners expressed liability concerns, especially about the pool, which now has nothing around it to prevent people from falling in.

"It's a good 10, 12 foot drop straight to the bottom with no fence," Hinkel told commissioners. "It's coming to the point that I have another \$1,000 quote to put fencing around the pool again to keep people out of the pool, but you look at it and think, 'How long will this last?'"

"In the global scheme of things, from Steinhatchee to Shady Grove, you have a lot of parks spread out over a lot of unattended areas," he continued. "You have a lot of good parks in a lot of well-traveled areas that are easier to maintain. You're spread out. Not only do you have to maintain this one, but you have to go up to Shady Grove and down to Steinhatchee to catch all your other parks."

"The way we're set up now, you're never going to keep up with something that is going to be a constant vandalism, constant trash (problem)."

As the discussion turned to what the county could

do with the park, several expressed a desire to see the area remain open to the public due to its historic significance.

"This is a piece of history of Taylor County, an important piece of history for us," Commissioner Pam Feagle said. "I don't think we think should keep spending money on it, if we're going to waste money, but the historical aspect of it, I don't know."

Commissioner Jody DeVane suggested temporarily closing the park until the liability issues could be resolved and the commission decided what to do with the property.

"I swam there when I

was a child," DeVane said. "My grandma took us over there all the time. Until we got a swimming pool, that's where we swam. We went over there, kept it clean. She made us pick up all the trash. I know kids don't do that anymore, but if you wanted to go swim, you had to pick up trash."

The question of whether the state would be interested in taking over the site was considered, but Hinkel said it was doubtful.

The idea of leasing the property to a private party was also mentioned, with the stipulation that the historical elements would be maintained.

DeVane then suggested

the county contact Joe Mattingly, who owns the adjacent Rocky's store and RV park.

Mattingly appeared at the commission's regular meeting Monday to discuss Hampton Springs, stating he had been contacted by two commissioners about the possibility of him leasing the site, a proposal he had some interest in.

During the resulting discussion, several commissioners called the proposal a "win/win" for him and the county if the site could be maintained and Mattingly could utilize the property.

Commission Chairman Malcolm Page said that if

the county were to pursue the proposal, they would most likely need to open it out for bids.

Another issue raised was the state grants which were used for most of the park's enhancements, and the covenants the county agreed to at the time they were signed which might preclude the commission from leasing the property.

Since the issue was only a discussion item, no action could be taken, but the commission did ask County Attorney Conrad Bishop to research the grant agreements to determine what, if anything, the county can do with the property.




